France Counting On Two Olympic Titles

PARIS, May 28 (UP)—Two Olympic boxing titles are counted upon by France at the games in August.

H. PICARD RANKS AS FAVORITE

J., May 28 (UP)—With Sam Parks, Jr., of Pittsburgh, the defending champion, conceded little more than a hundred to one chance of winning, most of the nation's top-flight golfers begin play June 4 over the Baltusrol course in what is expected to be one of the most wide open U. S. Open championships in history.

Most notable absentee from the field of 134 professionals and 38 amateurs who will set out on the first of two 18-hole qualifying rounds is Lawson Little of San Francisco, amateur king of the United States and Great Britain during the last two years.

Actual betting favorite for the tourney is Henry Picard of Hershey, Pa., who is quoted at 9-1 to win, 4-1 to place and 2-1 to show.

Gene Sarazen, open winner in 1922 and 1932, is rated up near Picard, while the betting men also figure Harry Cooper and Horton Smith, winner of the Master's tournament at Augusta in April, as real threats.

The odds against such stars as Walter Hagen, winner in 1914, and 1919, Tommy Armour, Billy Burke, 1931 champion, and MacDonald Smith run all the way from 25 to 1 to 40 to 1.

NEW YORK, May 28—Another ingredient, as to speak, in the secret of Joe Louis' punching power, is the explosive nature of his punches.

They burst on an opponent at unexpected moments, and from unexpected angles.

Now Louis isn't a one-punch killer. At least not yet.

He doesn't knock an opponent cold with a single smash. He is more likely to start 'em up queer street with a left hook, but the instant they teeter, he is on them like a brown wolf.

British Seek To Learn The Primer Of Baseball

Puzzled By Peanuts And Seventh Inning Stretch

LONDON, May 28 (UP)—Peanuts and the good old seventh inning stretch are subjects which baffle British baseball fans in their efforts to learn the sport's primer.

These rituals, connected with America's national pastime intrigue British sports writers who are brave enough to comment on baseball.

Cricket leagues, especially in the north, are disturbed about the inroads which baseball may make against their traditional gentlemen's game.

Some sports columnist in attempting to explain the seventh inning stretch wrote: "Apparently, as soon as the opposing side has completed its seventh innings, everybody in the crowd gets to his feet, stretches, turns around and sits down again.

Another writer commenting on the traditional stretch which was instituted a number of years after baseball started in the 1850's, stated: "This stretching business has been done over here."

Even Royalty Stretched Some years ago when the Chicago White Sox played at Stamford Bridge in an exhibition game, a large crowd, including the king, then Prince of Wales, and George Bernard Shaw, heard and obeyed the exhortation to 'stretch' given by a white-clad cheer leader in front of the stand.

Peanuts are used in this country to feed a certain species of animals at the zoo and getting his body behind nearly all his punches. He punches from his heels, so to speak.

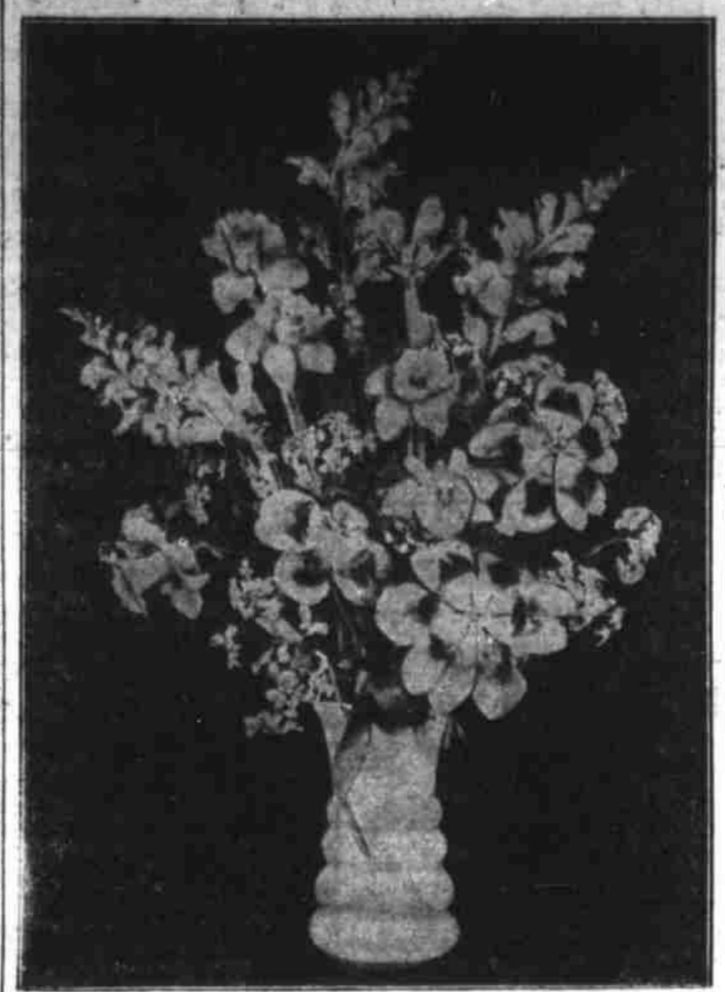

The second was the order issued by Dr. Townsend instructing his lieutenants to follow his example and refuse testimony.

Two Fail To Appear

The third was the failure of Wunder and Klefer to appear for examination either Tuesday or Wednesday as ordered in subpoenas served on them.

The committee made no mention of Sheridan Downey, Townsend's personal counsel, who advised the committee yesterday "I shall not honor your subpoenas."

"Like Dr. Townsend," said Downey, "I challenge you to punitive action, for the unholly record of this investigation is a shield that will protect us."
