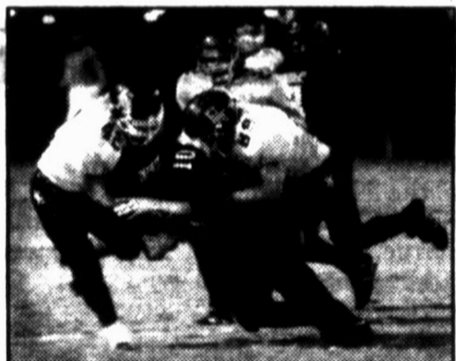

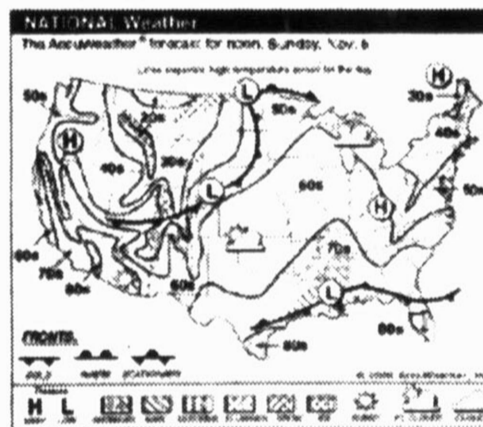

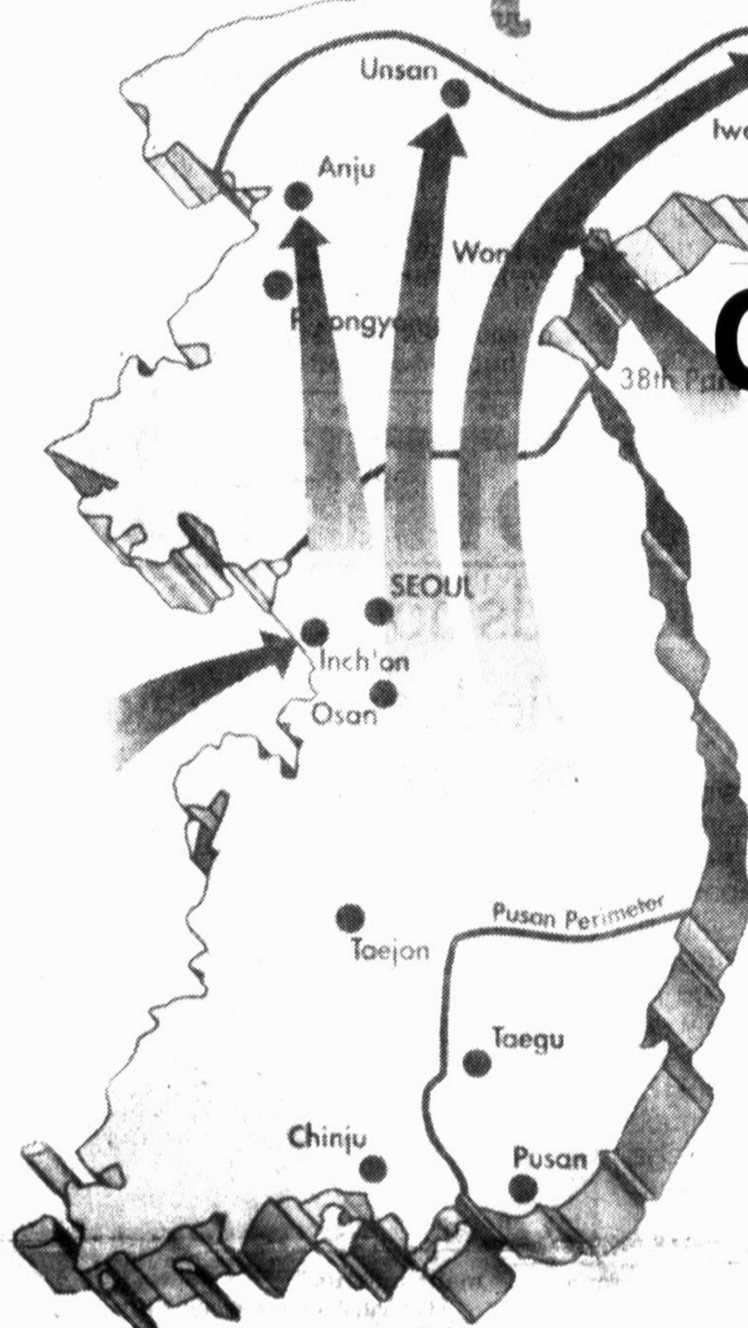

The Forgotten War



KOREA: China's entry changed nature of war

The second phase of the Korean War, the United Nations Offensive (which began Sept. 15, 1950), was a story of military success against the North Korean People's Army. However, the capture of a Chinese soldier on Oct. 25, 1950, marked a fundamental change in the nature of the conflict.

As UN troops marched into North Korea and headed toward the Yalu River — the border between China and North Korea — more than 100,000 experienced Chinese soldiers were slipping across the river.

During this time of Chinese intervention, referred to as the third phase of the conflict, more area men were inducted into the military and served in Korea.

James Hutson

Hutson was a private first class in the Army from Jan. 18, 1951, to Oct. 17, 1952. During his Korean service, he was in Battery C, 92 Armored Artillery Battalion, 9th

Corps. He was in the largest group from the Hereford area to be inducted at the same time for the Korean conflict.

He entered Korea on June 24, 1951, from the port at Inchon. Hutson explained that artillery batteries supported the infantry. They moved behind whichever infantry they were assigned to at the time.

Hutson left Korea on May 12, 1952.

Nile Richard "Dick" Ellis

Ellis was a quartermaster 3rd class in the Navy from Jan. 15, 1951, to Dec. 3, 1954.

Part of Ellis' service was on board the LST 802 which transferred Chinese prisoners of war to Koge Do, an island southwest of Pusan.

One memorial experience for Ellis was a trip into Wonsan Harbor where they picked up a trapped British Marine unit of 100 to 150 men. Ellis was on the helm that night and it was a tense time because they knew the harbor was mined and they had to move in and out very carefully.

Ellis was awarded the National Defense Medal, Good Conduct Medal and the Korean Service medal with four stars.

Lloyd J. Olson

A first lieutenant, he served in World War II and was called back to active duty in June of 1951 and went to Korea in January of 1952 where he served along the 38th Parallel.

He received the Combat Infantry Badge, among other ribbons and awards.

Carl Dean Kleman

A corporal in the field artillery, Dixie Division 55 from Feb. 14, 1951, to Feb. 14, 1953, stationed at Fort Jackson in Columbia, S.C.

Kleman was a truck driver in the artillery motor pool, pulling a 105 howitzer from station to station.

Edward J. Ramaekers

A staff sergeant, Ramaekers served in the U.S. Army Field Artillery, 213th Battalion from Feb. 15, 1951, to Feb. 10, 1953.

He served in Korea for four months in the war zone as chief of section of a 155-mm howitzer. His section fired on White Horse Mountain. They also dug in near the Chosin

When the Marines called, Breeding went

Glenn Breeding got his induction notice in the spring of 1951. After taking his physical, he was given a six-month deferment before he was called up again.

However, instead of going into the Army, Glenn, my brother, chose to join the Marines, so he was shipped to Camp Pendleton, near San Diego, Calif., for basic training. After basic training, he was given a 10-day leave to visit home before reporting to Camp Townsend, Wash. After eight

months of duty in Washington, he volunteered for duty in Korea and was sent back to Camp Pendleton for more training.

Before leaving for Korea, Dad, stepmother and I visited him at Camp Pendleton. On Nov. 19, 1952, he left Camp Pendleton, arriving in Japan 14 days later for a short stop before going to Korea.

He was with the 1st Marines of the 1st Division. He would write home that although his unit was only a short distance from the front, things seemed very quiet. Most of the fighting took place at night. Although the

weather was cold, the clothes and heat they were provided kept them fairly comfortable. He mentioned they had passed over part of the country where the hardest fighting had been, so he was surprised to see the land was cultivated again and turned back into rice paddies.

All of the old buildings were in ruins, but the people built up shacks and at least had a place to live, so it looked like they were recovering pretty fast. Glenn never expected to see anything like that when he got there.

He thought that the whole country

looked very much like the States and not at all like a battlefield. The land and stars and weather were the same.

One day Glenn requested some big Christmas candles and maybe some fruit cake. Candles were always a premium, and they were always hungry for something, and he was hungry most of all for some fruit cake. By saying they were hungry, it wasn't that they didn't get enough to eat, because they got plenty, and it was good, but they still appreciated the

■ Mental health agency to hear from residents

Texas Panhandle Mental Health Mental Retardation (TPMHMR) will hold a public forum at 7 p.m. Monday in the Hereford Community Center Banquet Room, 100 Avenue C.

The purpose of this forum is to inform community members of the services being offered by the agency, as well as to hear comments regarding satisfaction with these services and to address any unmet needs identified by the residents of Oldham and Deaf Smith counties.

Texas Panhandle Mental Health Authority merged with the Amarillo State Center on Sept. 1, resulting in the newly formed Texas Panhandle Mental Health Retardation. Residents of Oldham and Deaf Smith counties are served by a regional satellite office that offers mental health services, as well as the Hereford workshop, which provides services to individuals with mental retardation.

The local outpatient psychiatric clinic offers mental health services to adults who suffer from severe mental health illness and to children and adolescents in need of mental health intervention.

This clinic has helped to maintain the stable emotional and behavioral functioning of chronically mentally ill people, reducing homelessness, harmful behavior, court commitments, and hospitalizations that are costly to the community.

Services in the Hereford workshop include vocational training at the workshop and job coaching in community jobs. Support is also provided in the areas of nursing, psychology and service coordination. All of the above services aid in building self-esteem and improving the quality of lives for individuals with mental retardation.

TPMHMR would like to encourage all residents with an interest in the issues of mental health and mental retardation to attend this forum, which is expected to last approximately one hour.

finer things of life. Things at that time were still pretty quiet, and they were not having much action of any kind. Once and a while there was a little skirmish between the lines, but never on the lines. So they weren't having much contact at all.

One night he was called out on watch just after he began to write a letter, and stayed out until one, and slept until eight-thirty and was back on watch for a while. He was busy doing nothing.

Then he had to get down to the mess hall, about a mile away and get his nice hot meal. It was the only one they got a day, but they served from 11:30 a.m. to 2:30 p.m., so they all had a chance to go. They also got C rations and candy to supplement the other two meals, so they had plenty to eat all the time.

Glenn was wounded on March 26, 1953. At the time, he was with other Marines on patrol and crouched in a trench. As he stood up to fire his weapon, a bullet caught him in the mouth.

He could not have lived had the bullet not been nearly spent when it reached him. After crawling about 300 yards and walking a mile, Glenn was picked up by a helicopter.

He received emergency treatment and was transferred to the Danish hospital ship Jutlanta, where he received good care.

After five days and nights of sleep on the hospital ship, he woke up. He didn't know where he was and was surrounded by people dressed in white and whose language he didn't understand.

Later, after he was able to recover his sense of humor,

Glenn quipped: "Like Superman, I stop bullets with my teeth."

He credited a Danish nurse with saving his life by her constant good care. He was special to her — they corresponded for many years.

After three weeks, he was flown to a U.S. naval hospital in Oakland, Calif., via Japan and Hawaii. He was sent from Oakland to Washington State and then back to Oakland where he underwent surgery, which included the implanting of a metal plate on the right side of his face.

When Glenn came home on leave in August, his face was disfigured, swollen and scarred and some of his teeth were missing.

His cardboard box shipped from Korea was addressed to Dad. When Doma accepted the package, the postman was somber. She told him that Glenn had returned to the states and was going to be all right. The postman brightened.

I watched Glenn open the box. It was a somber time for us.

The old dirty, dirty wash cloth indicated that there was not much water available for cleaning. And a few clothes. And he had a pack of letters.

In October 1953, Glenn was asked if he wanted to re-enlist in the Marines. He chose to return to Texas and work with his father laying brick.

On April 19, 1954, he married Paul Ruth Fleming in Amarillo. They had three sons, Lesli, Marshall and David.

Glenn died of complications from lung cancer on Nov. 6, 1986. He was buried with full military honors.

grabs and Bush is running strong. "I'm getting the message," Gore told 4,000 backers at an airport rally on arrival Friday. "The message I'm getting from you is on Tuesday, we're going to carry Tennessee."

For his part, Bush was explaining away his drunken-driving arrest in Kennebunkport, Maine, saying he has long conceded personal turmoil earlier in his life.

"It's become clear to America over the course of this campaign that I've made mistakes in my life," the Texas governor said. "But I'm proud to tell you I've learned from my mistakes."

"Most Americans are coming to the conclusion this is dirty politics," he said.

An ABC News poll suggested that many voters say it doesn't raise questions in their mind about whether he is qualified to be president. Only 15 percent said it raised questions about Bush's fitness for the job, while more than eight in 10 said it did not. About the same number among the 697 likely voters polled Friday said they felt the 1976 arrest was not relevant to the presidential race.

Gore's campaign denied any involvement with the disclosure. "We categorically deny any involvement," said Gore chairman William Daley. "Charges to the contrary are irresponsible."

Gore declined to be drawn into the matter, saying: "I have no com-

ment on this."

His surrogates were not so shy. "The issue is not drunken driving, the issue is credibility," said Sen. Tom Harkin, D-Iowa. "What else hasn't he told us about?"

A core argument Gore's campaign makes is that Bush isn't up to the job, and Gore seized on a Bush misstep to hammer that point.

Defending his Social Security proposal, Bush said critics "want the federal government running Social Security like it was some kind of federal program." Aides said Bush misspoke, and understood the federal government ran the system.

Gore quickly moved, launching a new television ad on the issue, and ridiculing Bush on the stump.

"Do you want to entrust the Oval Office to someone who doesn't even know Social Security is a federal program?" he said.

Bush, meantime, was seeking to link Gore with President Clinton, suggesting that Gore follows questionable Clinton campaign tactics. "The shadow is back," he said.

He also noted that Gore was campaigning in Tennessee, while Clinton was appearing in his home state of Arkansas. "You know that if we've got President Clinton back in Arkansas and Vice President Gore back in Tennessee, we must be doing something right," Bush said in Grand Rapids, Mich.

Some county voters to see change

Election Day is almost here.

When Deaf Smith County voters go to the polls Tuesday, they will find some changes. Precincts 3 and 8 have been consolidated. Precinct 8 is in the sparsely populated western portion of the county and the number of registered voters has dropped to 59, with fewer than 25 casting ballots in elections.

In seeking U.S. Justice Department permission to consolidate the precincts, County Clerk David Ruland contended the expense of opening the Precinct 8 polling place in Walcott School cannot be justified by the normal turnout. With the Justice Department's OK, the voters in former Precinct 8 will cast ballots at Hereford Junior High School, the Precinct 3 polling station.

Although turnout nationwide is expected to be lower than anytime in the last 40 years, a record number of Deaf Smith County voters went to the polls during the early voting period that ended Friday.

According to Ruland, 2,453 voters cast in-person ballots at the courthouse. With the addition of the mail-in ballots, the early voting will be close to the record of 2,649, which was set in 1992.

Although it is a certainty that Texas Gov. George W. Bush will easily sweep Deaf Smith County and Texas, there are some local races that are not foregone conclusions.

In Deaf Smith County, there are three contested races:

• Incumbent Wayne Betzen, who narrowly survived a challenge in the Republican primary, is facing Democrat Armando Gonzalez in the race for Precinct 1 commissioner.

In the March primary, Betzen eked out a one-vote victory over former Precinct 1 foreman Alfred Ortiz. On the Democratic side, Gonzalez defeated Joe Henry in a runoff to earn a spot on the Nov. 7 ballot.

• Incumbent Sheriff Joe Brown, a Democrat, will face the challenge of Republican Brent Harrison, a sergeant on the Hereford Police Department.

• Democrat Teresa Garth and Republican Jeannine Zimmerman are vying for county tax assessor/collector.

Although no Democrat in the 19th Congressional District stepped forward to challenge incumbent Larry Combett, the Lubbock Republican won't have a completely free ride to re-election. His opponent is Libertarian John Turnlow, a Lubbock physician.

Other than Democratic presidential nominee Al Gore, only three other Democrats are on the statewide ballot.

Perennial candidate Gene Kelly of San Antonio is challenging incumbent Republican Kay Bailey Hutchison for the U.S. Senate; Bill Vance is challenging Republican Sharon Keller for the Supreme Court, Place 3 seat; and William R. Barr is facing Barbara Parker Hervey for the Place 2 seat on the Court of Criminal Appeals.

The polls will be open 7 a.m.-7 p.m. Tuesday.

Raymond Lueb

A corporal, Lueb entered the service on Jan. 18, 1951, and received his discharge on Oct. 18, 1952. He was in the 92nd Field Artillery Armored Division.

Lueb recalls crossing the International Dateline on his way to Korea on May 31, 1951. He was in the Seoul area after the Chinese entered the war and in Korea for a total of nine months.

Lueb commented that American people who were never in the war zone did not understand the way soldiers sometimes dealt with Koreans. He said that the North Koreans would betray their own troops and that the GIs could not tell by their appearance or actions if the people they were meeting on the road were friend or foe.

Duane B. Williams

A private first class, Williams was in the Army from December 1949 until January 1951.

After basic training at Camp Cooke in California, he was sent to Japan and then to Korea, where he handled appointments and calls for the adjutant general.

Don R. Alley

Alley was a sergeant in the Medical Company, 106 Infantry Regiment, 40th Division from Oct. 3, 1950, to Sept. 23, 1952.

He arrived in Korea on Jan. 11, 1952, and returned to the United States on Sept. 23, 1952.

Alley received the Combat Medical Badge, an award reserved for medical aidmen, while in Korea.

Billy D. Acton

A tech sergeant, Acton was in the Marine Corps from Feb. 2, 1949, to July 31, 1951. He was in D Company, 2nd Battalion, 5th Marine Corps and was one of the first Marines in action at the Pusan Perimeter.

Acton received three Purple Hearts for his service on Aug. 7, 1950, when he was wounded three times, about two hours apart, with the final injury sending him across the Korea Strait to a Tokyo hospital. He was paralyzed for six months and underwent numerous surgeries in Osaka. After a year in various hospitals in Japan, he was transferred to the Oakland (Calif.) naval hospital.

Carroll S. Webb

A boatswain's mate 2nd class, Webb served a little more than 7½ years in the Navy. From 1950 to 1952, he was on the crew of a troop ship, in charge of the care of all below deck compartments in Division 1, forward of the superstructure.

A CLASSIC CHOICE

Gore, Bush offer distinct philosophies

Beyond George W. Bush's "compassionate conservatism" and Al Gore's own roots in centrist politics, clear and classic choices are being offered in the presidential election.

Such choices used to fall broadly under the names liberal and conservative. The labels have changed, or taken on some adornment, but underlying philosophies are pretty much intact.

Democrat Gore and Republican Bush agree on most of the ends: better schools, a stronger military, health care for more Americans and more money for retirement.

They differ significantly on the means.

Simply put, Gore invests more faith in the federal government's ability to take care of national problems, offering through programs — or selective tax breaks that resemble programs — to help Americans save for their advanced years, put kids through university or make the environment cleaner with energy-efficient dishwashers, cars and homes.

Bush uses broad tax cuts, money to state governments, a reliance on a less-fettered marketplace and individual oomph to tackle many of the same problems, while offering, as he hardly ever fails to mention, a safety net.

Boost retirement income? You bet, says Gore: by keeping Social Security as it is and layering on top of it a new entitlement matching the money that people put into their retirement investments.

Absolutely, says Bush: by letting people divert some of their Social Security taxes into the market, in what promises to be the most profound change in the program's history.

Help the elderly buy prescription drugs?

Yes, says Gore: by sweetening Medicare.

Yes, says Bush: by giving money to states to look after the elderly poor while setting up a system that uses both the private market and Medicare to give people choices in plans.

Conservation?

Yes again, from Gore, who'd spend billions to add parkland.

Yes, too, from Bush, but with an emphasis on private land management.

There is a lot of "Yes" in this campaign.

The huge budget surpluses projected for years to come, a unique feature for today's Americans, are being treated as a gold mine for expensive ambitions.

Gore would use them to advance a largely Clinton-plus agenda: extending reasonably priced health insurance to more children and lower-income adults, turning preschool into a universally affordable program, plowing billions into school construction and teachers' pay raises. He'd sprinkle tax breaks here and there through the middle class to promote popular social goals like college or job training.

Bush would use the surpluses to cut tax rates for everyone from the working poor to the fabulously rich, while going further than Republicans usually do to spend money on social needs.

While their basic approaches are much in the mold of their party traditions, Bush and Gore also provide some surprising policy twists learned from the councils of moderate political thinking.

Bush comes from the ranks of governors, a largely pragmatic lot with little fealty to old ideological labels.

In contrast with Republicans in Congress who wanted to shut the Education Department until recently, Bush has an elaborate federal program to toughen school standards, reward or penalize states for doing better or worse in education and plow billions more into college scholarships.

Gore comes from conservative Tennessee, from the ranks of the centrist Democratic Leadership Council and from the side of Bill Clinton, who talked about a "third way" between left and right.

A hawk in some respects, Gore is proposing to use twice as much of the surplus to boost military spending as

Bush would.

And while both candidates have tapped hungrily into the surplus to finance their plans, it is Gore the Democrat who, at least on paper, sets aside \$300 billion of it to help pay off the debt, or for a rainy day.

Bush, on one hand, is in a hurry to build a national missile defense system far more pricey than the limited one Gore is considering. On the other hand, it's the Republican, not the Democrat, who has talked about possible unilateral cuts in U.S. nuclear arms.

All from a policy-laden campaign in which every conceivable mainstream notion seems to be getting heard.

Except the notion of "No."

Local voters push typical poll initiative

Americans go to the polls Tuesday and if everything goes as political observers are predicting, there will be fewer citizens choosing to exercise their right to vote.

Only 49.1 percent of the eligible voters cast ballots in the 1996 presidential election. With the exception of the 1992 election, which saw the percentage of eligible voters rise, the trend for the past three decades has been downward. Some political scientists are expecting this year's turnout to be the lowest ever.

It is a shame that the world's oldest republic is seeing fewer and fewer of its citizens participate in the selection of its government. It is a shame that while citizens of other countries are fighting and dying for free elections, Americans are demonstrating such a cavalier attitude toward their most important right — the right to vote.

Apathy, it seems, is unfortunately becoming more the rule than the exception for an over-indulged American public. We want wealth without work, prosperity without investment, freedom without sacrifice, education without study and government without personal participation.

There has been at least one notable exception, however, in this otherwise gloomy picture as Election Day approaches. In Deaf Smith County, voters are making it to the polls, and possibly in record numbers. As early voting ended Friday, 2,453 voters went to the courthouse to cast ballots. We can't think of any greater accomplishment for a community.

With every right comes a responsibility. Americans have the right to vote, which also means they have a responsibility as citizens to go to the polls and participate in the business of the republic.

This great nation was not born upon painless prosperity and effortless democracy, nor is it likely to survive as it has unless more of this nation's people renew their ownership of it — just like Deaf Smith County proudly did.

If you haven't yet cast your vote, don't miss your final chance to do so Tuesday. Earn you citizenship!

Grandpa and the GOP

There were two things Grandpa didn't like: preachers and Republicans. And, of the two, he disliked Republicans more.

Grandpa cast his first vote in a presidential election in 1904, when he voted against Teddy Roosevelt. In 1968, he cast his last ballot in a presidential election, when he voted against Richard Nixon.

He took his voting seriously. He believed that the right to vote carries with it the responsibility to vote. When the polls were open, Grandpa was there to vote — for a Democrat.

During most of Grandpa's lifetime, he didn't have to even think about the Republican candidate for state and local offices because the Democratic Party was so entrenched in Arkansas that the GOP didn't field any candidates for county offices, few for state offices and frequently none even bothered to run for Congress.

So, the winner in the Democratic primary election would, barring death, be the winner in November.

Grandpa developed his animosity toward the Grand Old Party in the late 19th century because of its close ties (some would say its control by) the railroads and banks. Like many farmers, Grandpa felt the effects of the often heavy-handed actions of railroads and banks.

Although farmers, especially in the Midwest, were among the party's most loyal voters. Grandpa could never understand how a farmer could vote Republican.

"A farmer voting for a Republican is like a hog voting for a butcher," he said, with no hint of a smile.

"Even a bad Democrat is better than good Republican," he said, adding that "a bad Democrat can do more good for plain folks by

accident than a good Republican will intentionally."

Now, Grandpa wasn't always fond of the Democrats he supported.

He said he held his nose and voted for Al Smith in 1928, a vote that grew less odoriferous after the stock market crash in 1929 led to the Depression.

Although he was firmly convinced of Franklin D. Roosevelt's greatness, Grandpa was only mild about Harry S. Truman.

He liked Ike, but not enough to vote for the World War II general, instead casting his ballots for Adlai Stevenson.

Like many Arkansas Democrats, Grandpa was not enthusiastic about John F. Kennedy, but he was certain that he preferred the Catholic Democrat over the Republican Nixon.

He always thought Lyndon Johnson was a scoundrel, but he figured a Democratic scoundrel would be better than anything the GOP could put on the ballot.

"Grandpa, has there ever been a Republican you might have voted for?" I asked him once.

He mullied it over for several minutes before replying.

"Probably Teddy Roosevelt," he said. "He turned out to be a pretty good president." Then he smiled and added, "And, he got out of that party, too."

Grandpa died in 1970 — before he saw his children start voting for Republicans.

Candidates leave words unspoken

Whether it is President Gore or President Bush, this is certain: Neither will be able to keep all the promises that have been issued — even guaranteed — in the

White House marathon. While a close campaign doesn't guarantee a close election — Ronald Reagan won his first term by an unforeseen landslide — this one, and the narrow edge either party can expect in the next Congress, especially the House, point to another four years of closely divided and contested government.

So for all his promises that he can mend gridlock with a new era of cooperation and bipartisanship, Bush would all but certainly be stalled if not stopped in trying to meet his pledge of a \$1.3 trillion, 10-year tax cut.

Just as Gore would be sending his promised first bill for campaign finance reform to a Congress that has resisted overhauls for 25 years and will not suddenly shift to enacting one soon.

A Bush administration would have an edge should Republicans hold their control of Congress, but the margin of control is virtually certain to be so close as to enable Democrats to slow what they don't want, and block it outright in the Senate. There, for practical purposes, it takes 60 votes to enforce real control, because without that strength, the opposition can block measures by staging or threatening filibusters.

And that means compromises, concessions, and probably more than a few favors for the votes the president will need to deliver on his agenda.

Presidential campaigners always promise more than they can deliver, the candidates seldom reminding their rallies that almost everything they seek would be subject to the increasingly rigorous route through the House and Senate.

John F. Kennedy is said to have remarked as president that there were a lot of things he'd like to do if only the government would let him.

Jimmy Carter's central campaign promise was "I will never lie to you," and while he could keep that one, he couldn't deliver on more specific pledges, such as his commitment to scrap the complex federal tax code he called a disgrace to the human race. "You can count on it," he said, but it actually got more complicated because of the tax advantages written in to encourage conservation when oil and energy became a crisis.

President George Bush won in 1988 on a campaign slogan of "Read my lips, no new taxes," and broke the promise, to his disadvantage in the 1992 election he lost to Clinton.

President Clinton promised a middle class tax cut in that campaign, but reversed field to concentrate on a deficit reduction plan that actually increased taxes instead, with Gore casting the tie breaking vote to get it through the deadlocked Senate.

Gov. Bush went one up on his father on tax pledges during the primary campaign, declaring that his vow was not just no new taxes, it was "tax cuts, so help me God."

Gore is now on the record with an absolute promise that as president "I will not add to the number of people doing work for the federal government, not even one new position." That is his antidote to Bush's argument that the vice president's election would lead to a bigger, more intrusive federal government. That not-one-job pledge would be hard to keep, or police, for any president, especially when Congress tends to produce programs that do produce jobs.

And the no extra bureaucrats pledge would seem to collide with Gore's proposal to add prescription drug benefits to Medicare, a new and complex process somebody would propose to do, a hedge that goes unspoken.

Bush says that as president he would go to Congress to say that he wasn't coming there alone but was carrying a message from the American people. But a close election would deliver no compelling mandate, except that winning the White House, whatever the margin, is itself a mandate to do the job.

He likens his proposed tax cut to Reagan's, which he credits in part for the prospering economy.

Reagan campaigned for a one-third cut in income taxes, and got most of it, pushing it through a Democratic House. But Reagan did have a mandate — a 10-point margin over President Carter, and an election in which Republicans took over the Senate and gained 30 seats in the House.

He was the last president with election coattails, and swing-district Democrats in Congress were wary of crossing him on his 1981 proposals.

No president since has been in that position. Not the last one, and all but certainly not the next one.

Regulations do more harm than good

Dear Editor:
The environmental regulations imposed on the forests of the western states resulted in hampering the firefighters and devastated more than 6.6 million acres. Apparently the federal regulations are in accord with the United Nations Biodiversity Treaty. The treaty has not been ratified, yet President Clinton has determined to implement UN treaties even though not approved by the Senate.
Supposedly imposed to protect the wildlife and the ecological balance, the closing of roads, allowing wilderness buildup and prohibiting standard, proven methods of forest preservation resulted in the horrendous fires.
The firefighters had to parachute into some areas, were prevented from using stream water to protect the fish, and generally had to fight the fires without adequate support. The result was the destruction of the wildlife habitat and the deaths of the "protected" animals and fish. By not using the stream water to fight the fires, the fires sucked the water out of the streams and killed the fish anyway. Hundreds of private homes were destroyed. Hopefully, the wildlife was not more important than the people.
When western state governors testified before the congressional hearing on the fires, they were hoping the federal "gubmint" would permit harvesting of the burnt timber by cutting the time of the issuing of permits. The governor of New Mexico said the timber was worth more than \$12 million in his state, but would be worthless if it could not be harvested before the year it might take to get federal permits.
It is time for the federal government to use modern methods of forest control or butt out of its interferences. Private enterprise has demonstrated responsible care of the environment while protecting the wildlife and providing employment to taxpaying workers. The tree huggers need to wake up to the damage ill-advised regulations do to the environment.



CLINTON ROLE:

Gore staffers, White House disagree on what president should be doing to help out during the final days of race

WASHINGTON — Bill Clinton took his most active role in the presidential campaign to date, visiting a crucial state Thursday and pronouncing Al Gore "the next best thing" to electing Clinton himself to a third term.

It was not the image the vice president had in mind during months of arguing that he's campaigning as his own man.

Gore allies complained to the White House that the president had once again undermined their efforts to distance the vice president from him. It was further evidence, they said, that Clinton would best help the Democratic ticket by staying out of Gore's limelight.

The president's "next best thing" comment — his way of saying, Stay the course and keep the economy booming with Gore — reopened the debate over what to do with the president, just five days before the election.

Democrats are divided over the answer.

"He's a lot of help. He's a lot of hurt. He's the double-edged sword of American poli-

tics," said Democratic pollster Steve Mitchell of Michigan.

Clinton is eager to jump in the fray on behalf of Gore and congressional candidates, knowing a strong Democratic showing Tuesday might help his political legacy.

Gore has resisted the help, saying it's time to stand on his own two feet. Associates call it a stubbornness born out of the same desire that prompts teen-agers to leave home early. "I had kids. I know what this is about," said Missouri Democrat Gene Bushman.

More than that, Gore's stance is a result of the cold, hard realities of post-impeachment politics.

His pollsters have convinced Gore that swing voters — particularly older voters and women — are reminded each time they see Clinton of why it might be time for a change in the White House.

Presidential allies dismiss that concern, or say it shouldn't outweigh the benefits Clinton offers. They say he is better than Gore at explaining why Americans should keep Democrats in charge amid times of peace and prosperity.

Clinton also is popular among core party voters — minorities and union members.

Gore, given virtual veto control over Clinton's political schedule, has tried to have it both ways. He is allowing presidential events that might rally the uninspired Democratic base, while trying to limit Clinton's access to swing voters.

And so the president campaigned in Kentucky, a state all but written off by Gore, before heading Thursday to California, where he is especially popular.

So far, Clinton has agreed to stay out of Michigan, Pennsylvania and other battleground states.

Mitchell says that's a smart idea.

Mitchell released a poll Thursday showing Gore ahead in Michigan and suggesting it's because of gains among women listening to Democratic attacks on Bush's Social Security plan. "Those same women would leave Gore in droves if Clinton showed up in town," Mitchell said.

But in Pennsylvania, another battleground state, state Rep. T.J. Rooney said Clinton would be welcomed in his

swing district 60 miles northwest of Philadelphia. "We have got to make sure people understand what's at stake," he said.

Rooney and others have lobbied for a Clinton visit, but Gore's campaign is cool to the idea.

It could get complicated trying to keep Clinton away from swing voters: Some local Democrats want Clinton to visit Pennsylvania, but only to address core Democrats and only after evening TV and newspaper deadlines.


Ed Sarpolus, an independent pollster in Michigan, said Gore might want to have Clinton address core Democrats by satellite but keep him out of the state to avoid media coverage that would reach swing voters.

He said Gore might as well find ways to use Clinton because "you can't run and hide from the president." There was no better evidence of this than Clinton's interview Thursday with an ABC radio show targeted to blacks. Amid cheers of "Four more years," host Tom Joyner told Clinton that "it would be nice if we could get four more years from you. It's been a good eight years for us."

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'Payday' lenders convicted

AUSTIN — The state of Texas won cases against two "payday" lenders in Hidalgo County that made loans without a license and charged interest rates as high as 780 percent.

A jury found the businesses EZ Cash and Quick Cash and owners George Moreno and Anna Gaytan guilty and ordered them to pay \$250,000 and \$17,500, respectively, to restore interest overpayments by unsuspecting customers. Combined civil penalties were \$12,000 and state's attorneys fees total \$36,000.

The jury also found the defendants used threats or coercion to collect money from customers, including the threat of filing criminal charges when customers had not violated any laws.

Businesses that engage in payday loan arrangements typically lend small amounts to customers who face short-term financial difficulties and often live paycheck to paycheck, with little access to mainstream forms of credit.

Texas flu shot supply remains limited

The Texas Department of Health has received only 35,000 of the 366,000 doses of flu vaccine it ordered and the balance should be shipped periodically through December.

Most of the shipment will go to public health facilities. The agency is asking doctors to disperse their vaccines to the elderly and other high-risk groups first until an adequate supply is available.

"What we're trying to avoid is a well-protected low-risk population at the expense of an unprotected high-risk population," said Sharilyn Stanley, M.D., the agency's associate commissioner for disease control and prevention.

High-risk groups include people age 65 and older, nursing home residents, asthmatics and people with diabetes, kidney or heart problems. Children on long-term aspirin therapy and pregnant women in the second or third trimester as well as health care workers also are high-risk.

TNRCC report finds 42 changes

The Texas Natural Resource Conservation Commission would continue to operate for the next 12 years and would gain greater flexibility over its own budget under changes proposed in the first in-depth performance review of the 7-year-old agency.

The Sunset Advisory Commission completed a yearlong review of the environmental agency and found that TNRCC's current funding structure does not adequately support its activities and that the agency lacks strategic direction and innovation in its regulatory structure.

The report also found that the public's interest is not represented in environmental issues as well as it is in electric utility and insurance regulation, and that the agency limits the collection and use of public input into its compliance efforts.

The commission turned its report and 42 recommended changes over to the Legislature for consideration.


Other highlights

- Secretary of State Elton Bomer announced the results

of his "Why My Parents Should Vote" essay contest that drew 3,000 entries from schoolchildren statewide. First-place winners are Andrew Cole, Stroman Memorial High School in Victoria, Matthew Cole, Howell Middle School in Victoria and Morgan Redus, Bremond Elementary in Bremond.

The first 29 people graduated from the Comptroller's Texas IT Academy, a public-private partnership to help fill high-tech state jobs. Students are college graduates who earn an entry-level salary while in the program and agree to work for the state for at least two years after they graduate.

Herd casts Demons down

After holding the Demons to only 10 points at the half including two big defensive stands by the Herd, Hereford High went on to win their annual football match up with the Dumas Demons 32-22 at Demon Stadium.

The Whitefaces (8-1, 6-0) were up 12-10 with 2:47 left in the second quarter when Dumas threatened to take the lead into the locker room, but the Demons missed a field goal to give the ball back to

the Whitefaces.

The next play was a 74-yard touchdown pass from senior Cody Hodges to junior receiver Cody Marsh to crush Dumas' hopes of keeping it close.

"We just kept on going at them," senior defensive end Michael Barba said. "They had a bunch of yards, but we just tried to keep them out of the endzone."

Barba made a key play on Dumas' final drive of the half sacking Demon quarterback Derek Skipworth while time expired in the half.

"It is a great feeling to get a

sack," Barba said. "I stunted, and they didn't block me."

Head coach Craig Yenser said he felt the end of the first half was the turning point of the game. The coach also said he did not want his players and staff to overlook Dumas.

"They got within 12-10 and really had us back on our heels," Yenser said. "I was worried going into the game, because I did not want to underestimate Dumas."

The Whitefaces nailed the coffin shut at the start of the third quarter when they opened the quarter with a 73-yard scoring drive capped by senior fullback Kyle Artho's 8-yard run to make the score 26-10. Yenser said the scoring drive helped the Herd take the momentum after halftime. The Herd then scored again on their second possession after the half to put the game away 32-10.

"I thought that really hurt them," Yenser said. "You have to give them credit though, because they did not let up."

The loss knocked the Demons (5-4, 2-4) out of the playoffs. Yenser said he knew the entire game would be tough.

"They (Dumas) had a lot of character," Yenser said. "They had to win tonight and those seniors weren't about to give up."

On offense, the Hostile Herd gained 469 total yards including five touchdowns.

Hereford's running game was alive Friday picking up 206 yards on the ground while getting in the endzone three times. Hereford senior Ramiro Zambrano said he is beginning to get back to his old self since his knee injury against Borger on Sept. 29.

"I feel a lot better," Zambrano said. "I don't know if I'm 100 percent yet, but I feel better."

Zambrano accounted for two of the Herd's touchdowns including a 1-yard score to finish off a 99-yard scoring drive by the Whitefaces in the fourth, and he caught a 16-yard pass from Hodges in the second. Artho accounted for two more touchdowns to solidify the running attack.

"Kyle and I were psyched," Zambrano said. "The line blocked good for us."

Hodges played the game with a groin pull but again led the Whitefaces with 263 yards passing while rushing for 27 more yards. Hodges looked more mobile than he did last week by running the option

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For election day: Some unsettling thoughts on the Second Amendment

Tuesday marks the opportunity to cast your ballot for the person who will be at the helm of the country over the next four years, and potentially, the course that they will set. Plenty of local folks have already participated in the process in early voting. That's good. Lots more need to take care of this civic duty on November 7.

Hunters and shooters and supporters of the right to keep and bear arms under the Second Amendment are among those who have to be particularly concerned about the direction this presidential election takes. Here's a little something to consider as you head to the polls.

Framers of the Constitution and the Bill of Rights saw the Second Amendment as a measure necessary to preserve something vital to the nation.

Samuel Adams: "The Constitution shall never be construed to prevent the people of the United States who are peaceable citizens from keeping their own arms."

Thomas Jefferson: "The constitutions of most of our states assert, that all power is inherent in the people...that it is their right and duty to be at all times armed...No free man shall be debarred the use of arms within his own land. The strongest reason for the people to retain the right to keep and bear arms is, as a last resort, to protect themselves against tyranny in government."

George Mason: "I ask sir, what is the militia? It is the whole people...To disarm the people is the best and most effectual way to enslave them..."

James Madison: "The Constitution preserves the advantage of being armed which Americans possess over the people of almost every other nation...[where] the governments are afraid to trust the people with arms."

Thomas Paine: "...arms discourage and keep the invader and plunderer in awe, and preserve order in the world as well as property...Horrid mischief would ensue were [the law-abiding] deprived of the use of them."

Noah Webster: "The supreme power in America cannot enforce unjust laws by the sword, because the whole body of the people are armed, and

constitute a force superior to any band of regular troops."

For almost eight years, now, those who love hunting or shooting sports, who support the constitutional right of private gun ownership, who have stood up to defend those rights, have ceaselessly been painted by the Clinton administration, its second-in-command, and its assorted appointees and cronies as evil wackos. In never-ending rhetoric, Clintonites have heaped aspersions upon gun ownership, sport hunting, and any-and-all NRA members. The Clinton administration and its Justice Department have gone so far as to attempt to dictate which individual rights are guaranteed by the Constitution.

As recently as August, the Clinton administration's Justice Department showed that it has no qualms about dismissing the constitutional rights of individual citizens when they are deemed out-of-step with the "politically correct" thinking of an imperial presidency.

Last summer U.S. District Court Judge Sam Cummings of Texas dismissed a federal indictment against an individual in a divorce case on Second Amendment grounds, saying the government can't routinely take away someone's constitutional rights when there's no finding of a reason to do so.

The Clinton administration couldn't stand to let such a pro-Second Amendment ruling stand. Government lawyers promptly appealed the verdict to the U.S. Court of Appeals for the Fifth Circuit in New Orleans.

Before senior Judge Will Garwood, U.S. attorney William Mateja argued that the Second Amendment is consistent with the position that the government can take guns away from the public, and can prevent ownership of rifles, pistols, and shotguns by the American people.

The Justice Department attorney further argued before the Fifth Circuit that persons in the U.S. who are not in the National Guard are afforded no protection of the right to keep and bear arms under the Second Amendment.

In a letter from the Office of Solicitor General of the U.S. Department of Justice dated August 22, 2000 concerning the case, Seth P. Waxman of Clinton's Justice Department confirmed the argument made before the Fifth Circuit Court...the United States believes "that it could 'take guns away from the public,' and 'restrict ownership of rifles, pistols, and shotguns from all people...You ask whether the response of the attorney for the United States accurately reflects the position of the Department of Justice and whether it is indeed the government's position "that the Second Amendment of the Constitution does not extend to the people as an individual right." ...Counsel for the United States in United States v. Emerson, Assistant U.S. attorney William Mateja, did indeed take the position that the Second Amendment does not extend an individual right to keep and bear arms...In light of the constitutional history, it must be considered as settled that there is no personal constitutional right under the Second Amendment, to own or use a gun."

The Clinton administration has tried to strip law-abiding Americans of one of the most vital of their rights, and its hoped-for successor will continue on this course...Wonder how long the cherished First Amendment will continue to stand, once the Second is gone? Remember, these elitists consider the issue of killing the Second Amendment as settled.

That's mighty unsettling to the millions of us who still consider the right to keep and bear arms as constitutionally guaranteed. Don't forget to vote.

Tiger stays close

Duval and Woods paired for today's match

ATLANTA (AP) — David Duval was right where he wanted to be — healthy, leading the Tour Championship and primed for another matchup with Tiger Woods.

Perhaps this time, the duel will meet expectations.

Duval turned potential disaster into an unlikely birdie and had a 2-under 68 on Friday, giving him a one-stroke lead in the Tour Championship and another pairing with the No. 1 player in the world.

"He's the standard right now by which you're comparing your golf," Duval said. "I want to go out and play good golf, and show him I can play, too."

Playing in the same tournament with Woods for the first time since the British Open, Duval finished his two trips around East Lake Golf Club at 7-under 133, one stroke ahead of Woods (66) and Chris Perry (65).

Woods took a bogey from the bunker on the par-3 sixth and was 2 over for the day when he said to his caddie, "Enough is enough." He birdied three of the next five holes, and shot himself into contention with a 20-foot eagle putt on No. 15.

"I'm right back in the tournament," said Woods, who is trying to join Byron Nelson, Ben Hogan and Sam Snead as the only players to win at least 10 times on tour in one season.

Perry, who last week moved into 30th on the money list to qualify for the Tour Championship, was tied for the lead until making a bogey from the bunker on the 18th. That put Woods and Duval in the last pairing.

And just like that, a \$5 million tournament with no season-ending awards on the line suddenly got some excitement.

Woods and Duval are the only players who have been ranked No. 1 in the world over the last three years. They have played together only five times in their careers, with Woods shooting a lower score on four of those occasions.

Saturday will be only the second time they have been paired in the final group.

The first time came at St. Andrews, when Woods took a six-stroke lead into the final round and became the youngest player, at 24, to complete the Grand Slam.

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Duval was struggling that week with a bad back, barely able to bend over to stick a tee in the ground. He eventually was forced out of golf for 10 weeks.

"The only regret I have about that week is something I can't change," he said. "I wish I could have played without a back injury. I dare say that had I not been injured... things might have been different."

After winning the Buick Challenge in his first tournament back, and playing close to the form that made him No. 1 for four months in 1999, Duval relished the opportunity to go toe-to-toe with Woods.

"I think I have a great shot this week," he said.

Woods and Duval have developed a good relationship off the course. Woods selected Duval as his partner for the World Cup next month in Argentina.

"It'll be fun to play with my partner," Woods said.

The fun began not long after Duval finished his round when he said, "I hope he gets used to hitting first" from the fairway.

"I can't hit the ball as far as Tiger. There's no two ways about that," Duval said later. "I hit it plenty far, so it's not a big deal."

Duval cautioned, however, that beating Woods does not guarantee victory at East Lake. Just last week, Steve Flesch was paired with Woods for the last two rounds at Disney, kept his one-stroke margin and ended up finishing second to Duffy Waldorf.

"I don't come here thinking that I have to just beat Tiger," he said. "If you get

caught up competing against one player, you're not going to win golf tournaments that you maybe should."

A day of bad lies and bizarre shots resulted in four changes on the leaderboard, and 10 players within four shots of the lead when the second round was over.

Masters champion Vijay Singh and Paul Azinger each had a 66 and were at 5-under 135. Another stroke back was David Toms (67), Phil Mickelson (69) and Ernie Els (72).

Mickelson and Els each had the lead at one point on a warm, breezy day, and both found trouble — either on one hole (Mickelson) or all 18 holes (Els).

Els began the day with a one-stroke lead and failed to make a single birdie.

"Sometimes, it's hard when you go for a great score to go out there and find it again," said Els, who was eight strokes worse than his opening round.

Mickelson was at 7 under and leading the tournament until his approach to the 16th found the deep rough framing a bunker. He tried a flop shot, but his sand wedge slid under the ball and moved only far enough to trickle into the bunker. He wound up with a double bogey.

Duval appeared to be headed to a similar fate on the par-5 15th when his ball was caked with mud after landing in the soft fairway.

the Whitefaces their only regular season loss last year, and Yenzler said he knows the game will be big for his team.

"Hereford vs. Canyon has been around for a long time," Yenzler said. "It is going to be a fun week."

Orlando must decide about Hill

■ Celtics, Knicks, Hornets, Nets and Sixers victorious

PHILADELPHIA (AP)—Grant Hill played 36 minutes in Orlando's loss to Philadelphia, hobbling through the last few on his surgically repaired left ankle and missing six of his last seven shots.

If Hill is unable to play Saturday night in Atlanta, his next stop may be the injured list.

"As the game progressed I got worse and worse ... It's not good not being yourself," the five-time All-Star said after the Magic lost 87-80 to the 76ers. "The time of the game I enjoy most, the fourth quarter, the time of the game when games are won and lost, I didn't feel like I could do the things that I know I can do. That was pretty frustrating."

And that's bad news to the Magic, who were counting on a new start behind their two biggest offseason additions — Hill and Tracy McGrady.

McGrady was ejected against Philadelphia for slapping Eric Snow of the Sixers. Allen Iverson scored 29

points, seven of them after McGrady was ejected midway through the fourth quarter as the 76ers outscored the Magic 19-8 the rest of the way to overcome a 72-68 deficit.

In other games, Charlotte beat Miami 83-79, New York beat Washington 80-76, Boston beat Toronto 93-91, New Jersey beat Chicago 92-82 and Sacramento beat Detroit 100-93.

Magic coach Doc Rivers said before the game that he planned to use Orlando's games against the 76ers and Atlanta to determine if Hill should rest for perhaps as much as a month to give the ankle a chance to heal.

"If he shows any signs of just being really sore, I think we have to do something," Rivers said. "He could play these two games and look great, and then the discussion's over. That's what I'm hoping for."

Hill played 33 minutes in Orlando's season-opening win over Washington on Tuesday and had nine points, 10 assists and five blocks. But Hill wasn't available for action the next night in Miami, where the Magic lost by 26.

"I've just never seen a guy

get healthy by playing," Rivers said. "I've never seen it."

Hornets 83, Heat 79
At Charlotte, Jamal Mashburn, one of the nine players involved in an offseason trade between the teams, scored 30 points — five of which came in the fourth quarter at opportune moments.

Brian Grant led Miami with 33 points and 16 rebounds. Eddie Jones, who said he expected Charlotte fans to welcome him, was booed during team introductions and throughout the entire game.

"I guess I respected things a little too much," he said. "I thought they knew something about basketball, I thought they knew something about the business side of it. I mean, how many times have they let free agents slip away?"

Jones finished with 11 points on 4-of-13 shooting. Anthony Mason, one of the players Charlotte sent to Miami, was ejectioned during his introduction. He finished 0-for-7 from the field with three points. P.J. Brown had only two points for Charlotte and fouled out with four minutes to play.

Knicks 80, Wizards 76
At Washington, Marcus

Camby scored 20 points and carried the Knicks through the first half. Allan Houston scored 12 of his 18 in the second half, and the Knicks' defense compensated for the team's 39 percent shooting.

"When you shoot as bad as our main guys are shooting right now, that's OK if you play defense like that and compete that hard," coach Jeff Van Gundy said. "And we really competed hard."

Mitch Richmond led the Wizards with 18 points. Howard had 15 points and 12 rebounds. And, notably, the effort under new coach Leonard Hamilton was enough to keep the usual boos and hisses from the home fans to a minimum.

Celtics 93, Raptors 91
At Boston, Paul Pierce scored 30 points and Antoine Walker added 20 as Boston sent the Raptors to their third consecutive loss.

Vince Carter scored 33 points and had a chance for some late-game heroics, but his late 3-point attempt hit the front of the rim. Tony Battie rebounded the ball,

then Randy Brown drew a foul and sank both free throws to make it 93-88 with 2.8 seconds left. Morris Peterson hit a 3-pointer at the buzzer.

Marbury scored 33 points in New Jersey's first victory in Chicago after 10 straight losses. Rookie coach Byron Scott got the game ball afterward.

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Why Do I Hear, But Not Understand?

Study by University of Cambridge in England Reveals Key Answer.

CAMBRIDGE, ENGLAND--Until recently, there was no practical way to identify dead regions of hearing cells in the ear. However, a new British-developed procedure using standard test equipment now allows for identification of dead hearing cell regions.

The study suggests that the presence or absence of dead regions may have serious implications in the fitting of hearing aids.

This research reveals that amplifying dead cells is a mistake which will result in poorer speech understanding in noise. A new type of digitally programmable microcircuit is now being released that can be programmed to bypass the dead cells. As a result, the patient's usable hearing cells receive amplification, thereby

improving speech understanding in noise.

"We are employing a like method in our diagnostic sound booths using sound field speech noise with each patient," said Richard Davila, II, of Livingston Audiology & Hearing Aid Centers. "This test simulates hearing in a noisy crowd. We are able to determine maximum speech understanding by frequency shaping this new hearing aid."



Texan plans to step down as head of ethics panel

WASHINGTON (AP) — Rep. Lamar Smith is stepping down as chairman of the House ethics panel, saying that during his tenure he emphasized "maintaining and perhaps even enhancing the integrity of the institution."

The San Antonio Republican said that during his tenure the House Committee on Standards of Official Conduct "took a lot of preventative steps," such as advising members who had questions about whether particular activities were legal and ethical, the *Austin American-Statesman* reported Friday.

However, government watchdog groups contended Smith and the ethics panel have ignored questionable activities by lawmakers, particularly committee chairmen and chairwomen.

"We need a leader in that position who will not be soft on corruption," said Gary Ruskin, director of the Congressional Accountability Project. The project was founded by Ralph Nader, the consumer activist and Green Party presidential candidate.

Smith said he had told House Speaker

Dennis Hastert that he would serve just one two-year term as chairman of the ethics committee.

The ethics committee and its staff enforce House ethics rules and advise members on how to comply with federal laws and House rules regarding gifts, meals, trips and such. The committee has five Republicans and five Democrats.

The toughest action taken by the committee under Smith was an Oct. 4 "letter of reproof" against Rep. Bud Shuster, R-Pa., chairman of the House Transportation and Infrastructure Committee.

The letter told Shuster that he "brought discredit to the House of Representatives" and "engaged in serious official misconduct." It criticized him for "blame-shifting about and trivializing" his violations of ethics rules.

Those violations involved Shuster's relations with highway lobbyist Ann Eppard, his former chief of staff, and "hundreds of thousands of dollars" of questionable campaign expenses, among other things.

THIRD-PARTY BOOM: Minor candidates are crowding the ballot

With Ralph Nader as inspiration, Green Party candidates and those from other third parties are crowding onto ballots nationwide in the highest numbers since the 1930s.

The big prizes are out of their reach. But scores of candidates have a real chance in races for school boards, city councils and state legislatures.

More important, they could form the foundation for a viable third-party movement.

"It's a slow, deliberate process to build credible candidates," said Mike Feinstein, a Green and a member of the Santa Monica City Council. "We not only have good ideas but can govern."

This year, 264 Green Party candidates are running for office, double the number that ran in 1998, and three times the 80 that ran during the



Green Party nominee Ralph Nader and running mate Winona LaDuke are leading the way to a surge of third-party candidacies.

last presidential election.

Libertarians boast even bigger numbers, with an estimated 1,420 candidates, up from 836 in 1998. There are also candidates for the Reform Party, the Natural Law Party, the Constitution Party and at least a half-dozen more.

"There's no doubt that it's the most we've seen since the Great Depression," said David Gillespie, a political science professor at Presbyterian College in South Carolina who specializes in third parties.

Nader is drawing enough support to affect a tight presidential race. Supporters hope he will get 5 percent on Nov. 7 so that he can qualify for federal funds for money that could help build the party.

2004 — The Greens now hold 72 elected offices in 17 states, all local seats. The Libertarians hold 176 elected offices. The Reform Party claims 40 elected offices. Other parties hold a smattering, if any.

Among the top seats, Jesse Ventura won the Minnesota governor's office with the Independence Party, and Maine's Gov. Angus King is an independent.

Still, not one third-party member is in Congress. As for state legislatures, the lone Libertarian lawmaker is running as a Republican in Vermont, and the Greens' only legislator in California quit the party to run as an independent. (Vermont also has four Progressive state lawmakers, and 14 independents are scattered around the country).

This year could bring a higher profile. Greens are running 81 legislative candidates, four times as many as in the last election. Libertarians predict a dozen competitive legislative races, particularly in Nevada, Colorado and Connecticut.

Supporters say the time is

ripe for a third-party movement. The reason: growing numbers of independents, low turnout at each election, and the tight race for president. The two parties fail to answer the electorate's desires, they say.

"If a party could unify the disparate voices out there, the Reform, the Natural Law, the Greens, I believe you'd have the makings for a powerful new generation of politics," said Bob Roth, director of communications for the Natural Law Party.

He envisions a new coalition party that forces the Republicans and Democrats to merge.

Gillespie sees an influential third party of the "militant center" that combines the Republicans' fiscal demands and the Democrats' social views.

Others say third-party advocates are overreaching.

The economy is too strong and no third party has made enough significant gains yet, said Cal Jillson, chairman of political science at Southern Methodist University in Dallas.

The last successful third party, he said, was the Republicans, who built on the rift over slavery, then won a series of elections before Abraham Lincoln's victory in 1860.

"It's very difficult," Jillson said. "You need a constellation of events, a galvanizing personality, and then you need a lightning strike of genius. The whole system is built to forestall that from happening."

Alec Baldwin
WHITE PLAINS, N.Y. — Alec Baldwin is asking county lawmakers for at least \$50,000 to help fund a project that tests baby teeth for levels of a radioactive isotope.

The actor made his request Thursday before a committee of the Westchester County Legislature.

"This contamination is the result of a government program and therefore the government should pay for the research to determine the level of contamination in the community," he said.

The Tooth Fairy Project tests baby teeth for strontium-90, known as a byproduct of nuclear explosions. Baldwin's organization, the Radiation and Public Health Project, believes the isotope is being emitted at dangerous levels from nuclear power plants, including Indian Point plants in Westchester.

They say studies show the higher the level of strontium-90 in baby teeth, the greater their risk of developing cancer before age 5.

The nuclear industry and some scientists dispute the claims.

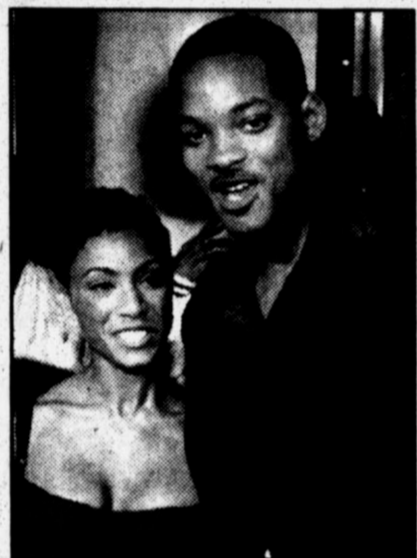
"We know that there isn't enough strontium released from plants to do the sort of things that they're talking about," said Carl Patrick, spokesman for the state Power Authority, which operates one of the Indian Point plants. "We also know that strontium in people's teeth comes basically from dairy products."

NEW YORK — "Live with Regis" is apparently a Kathie Lee-free zone.

Executives at the syndicated talk show have banned Kathie Lee Gifford, who is promoting a new album, from appearing and even advertising on the show she co-starred on for 15 years until July.

Their explanation is they want to give the guest hosts who have been working with Regis Philbin the chance to make an impression without the distraction of Gifford.

"We need to gain some physical and commercial separation from Kathie Lee during the search for her re-

"The Duke of York's visit will consolidate and extend links between the United Kingdom and Southern California in the fields of business and commerce," said British Consul-General Paul Dimond in Los Angeles.


Also on the royal itinerary: a tour of the seismology lab at the California Institute of Technology in Pasadena, a visit to Edwards Air Force Base and a trip to the Getty Center, which is currently featuring an exhibit of Raphael drawings from the Windsor Castle collection.

Mystery staffer has secure job

HOUSTON (AP) — A former homeless man hired by the Texas Department of Health to study the effects of lack of love on juvenile delinquents has finished his task — and now has more job security.

Andre Eleazer passed his six-month probation Thursday and the state no longer can fire him at will but must come up with substantial justifications if they want to dismiss him, the *Houston Chronicle* reported Friday.

Eleazer has no resume,

never filled out a state application and officials aren't sure what he can do, but he has a promise of a \$38,000 job with the department.

Eleazer was hired May 2 to interview juvenile offenders after the former top adviser to former Health Commissioner William "Reyn" Archer III befriended the man, who several years ago was homeless on the streets of Washington. The *Chronicle's* Austin bureau reported officials waived a rule requiring his job to be posted, saying he was uniquely quali-

fied. Gerald Campbell, former special adviser to Archer, resigned two weeks ago when details of Eleazer's hiring were published in the newspaper. A week later, Archer resigned over an unrelated dispute about an inappropriate conversation with a high-ranking black female employee.

Department spokesman Doug McBride didn't know if Eleazer graduated from high school, attended college or passed a basic background check.

Commissioners to take up engineering accord

Hereford city commissioners are expected to consider an engineering agreement on the design of a new wastewater treatment facility when they meet at 6:30 p.m. Monday in the commission chambers at City Hall, 224 N. Lee.

The city's wastewater treatment plant does not meet state standards, and the commissioners voted May 15 to build an aerated lagoon system to treat wastewater. At the same time, the commissioners directed Oller Engineering Inc. to begin designing the facility, which will be built at the city farm.

The aerated lagoon method will require about 34 acres of land. There would be three aerators in each lagoon that would treat the effluent.

This system would require

the installation of pumps and motors, as well as electricity. While much more efficient than the facultative system, the aerated method also is more expensive to operate and requires personnel on site.

Construction of the aerated lagoon system will cost an estimated \$4 million.

OEI developed recommendations to bring the plant up to the Texas Natural Resource Conservation Commission standards. The recommendations ranged from adding new treatment units, renovating the treatment units or building a new plant.

In other business, the commissioners will consider a resolution relating to the issuance of obligations by the Panhandle-Plains Higher Education Authority Inc.

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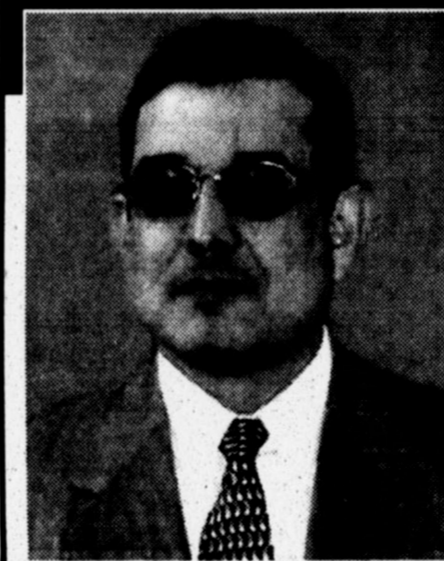

Unique instrument will be featured in dedication service

When Joyce Jones performs the Organ Dedication Concert at First United Methodist Church at 7:30 p.m. Nov. 12, she will be playing an instrument that is unique in Hereford — a digital pipe organ.

Existing pipework at the church was reworked and some new pipes were added and interfaced with a new Rodgers digital organ.

"The old organs that I had been familiar with in this area were electronic with the exception of the pipe organ that was here that had been installed in 1927," Tommie Stevens, organist for First United Methodist Church, said.

"It really didn't lend itself

to the contemporary praise music because that is done with synthesizers, keyboards, brass and stringed instruments. Even if the old organ could have been repaired, it would not have had the capabilities that this organ has," she added.

According to Stevens, the organ is capable of producing 1,500 sounds if programmed properly.

"The organ has a cursor on it. You move the cursor in the area where you are going to program, such as for a flute. Then you program which manual (keyboard) it will be, the volume, range and tones and save this information on a memory card," Stevens said.

Joyce Jones, who will be guest organist for the dedication concert, is an organ virtuoso who will demonstrate the full capabilities of the digital pipe organ which Stevens feels it will take her two years to fully learn.

"The people of this church are to be commended for having the foresight to install this instrument. When it was determined that a new organ

was necessary, they accepted the recommendations of the sales representatives and persisted until they felt they had the best that was available and it should service the church for years to come," Stevens said.

The dedication concert is open to the public and everyone is invited to come hear Jones' performance.

She is a musician with a wide range of accomplishments and holder of four earned degrees. She is professor of organ and organist-in-residence at Baylor University.

According to press releases, Jones' "phenomenal technique and great personal charm make her a favorite with audiences and she provides an incomparable evening of entertainment."

The fact that she will be playing such a technically advanced instrument should only add to her performance.

"If you know how to work this organ and know how to program it, it's really neat," Stevens said. "It's really wonderful. It's just a fun, fun instrument to play."

Sjogren's Dry Eye Syndrome



Sjogren's syndrome is an incurable, autoimmune disorder that annually strikes two to four million Americans, many of whom go undiagnosed. Nine out of ten individuals with Sjogren's are women. In Sjogren's syndrome, the body's immune system mistakes its own moisture producing glands for foreign invaders. The immune system then attacks and destroys these glands, causing the main symptoms of dry eyes and dry mouth. Some people may only experience the mild symptoms of dry eyes and dry mouth, while others go through cycles of good health followed by severe disease.

Since the symptoms of Sjogren's syndrome can mimic other diseases, identification may prove difficult. If you have any of these symptoms be sure to discuss them with your eyecare professional.

Since there is no cure, many people must learn to cope with such symptom's as blurred vision, eye discomfort, recurrent mouth infections, hoarseness and difficulty in swallowing and eating. Others treat their problems symptomatically. Moisture replacement therapies can ease the symptoms of dryness. Nonsteroidal anti-inflammatory drugs, steroids and disease modifying drugs are often used for treatment. For individuals with severe complications, more aggressive treatments may be necessary.

MINDING YOUR OWN BUSINESS

A Little Added Value From Your Newspaper

The price of a good newspaper is usually around a dollar. The value of a good idea may be thousands or even millions of dollars. Most newspapers contain good ideas if you're looking for them.

Part of my job as a columnist is to increase the value of your newspaper. I do this by coming up with useful information packaged in such a manner to make it interesting reading.

Therefore, I offer you a very special value in today's column: 10 good ideas. Their exact value will depend on how you use them,

but any of them could easily pay for a lifetime supply of newspapers.

Ten valuable ideas

- **You can measure the quality of your customer service by how often you have to say you're sorry.** This assumes that you do apologize when you make mistakes or fail to meet your customers' expectations. Outstanding service means never having to apologize. Anytime you have to say, "I'm sorry," note the reason. Then focus on eliminating the cause of apologies.
- **Become a problem solver.** There are three kinds of people in business: Those who cause problems and know it, those who cause problems and don't know it and those who are more concerned with solving problems than determining who caused them. You will increase your value to others by becoming a problem solver. Focus your energy and efforts on finding answers and solutions, not on assigning blame.
- **Assume that you have no job security.** Even if you're self-employed, your customers can fire you by taking their business elsewhere. Life is not a probationary period where you can mess up continually. The best long-term security is an ongoing series of short-term successes.
- **Be thankful for your success and happiness.** Despite what you may see on television, most of life's problems cannot be solved in 30 minutes. All stories do not have happy endings. In real life, people lose jobs, get sick, and have big problems. If life is going well for you, rejoice and be grateful. Being thankful can lower your stress level and help you live a healthier, happier life.
- **Work toward simplicity.** Divide complex projects, into smaller,

less difficult tasks. Write short sentences and paragraphs. Avoid using voluminous, polysyllabic, metaphorical discourse when small, common words will convey the same meaning.

- **Be courteous.** I often observe rude, ungrateful people. However, I've never met a truly successful person who wasn't courteous. Courtesy is a mark of class, and an important factor in building a profitable business or career.
- **Read junk mail only when you're looking for directmarketing ideas.** Once in a while you may find a good idea you can use or adapt to your marketing efforts. Remember that most junk mail is junk, so filter ideas carefully.
- **Get the job done.** Many people use the lack of resources as an excuse for not accomplishing anything. Find ways when there are no ways. You increase your value to others when you develop a reputation of getting the job done *anyway*. If you work for yourself, doing more with less will help you make more money and can keep you profitable when others are failing.
- **Wherever you go, whatever you do, try to look your best.** Your appearance is important. Sloppiness may cost you dearly in both credibility and money. Shine your shoes and iron your clothes.
- **Allow time for thinking.** If your schedule keeps you too busy to think, you're too busy. Everyone needs some time to "sort things out." Thinking is the source of creativity and innovation. Careful thought often solves little problems before they become big, highly visible ones.

I'm back! Did you miss me, or did you even know I was gone? The trip to South America was great. I visited Barranquilla, Cartagana and Bogata, Columbia as well as Campinas, Brazil. Traveling with someone who has lived there a while assures you a unique tour.

I had always wondered just how a missionary Nurse Practitioner conducted a mobile health clinic. Now, I have not only seen it I have experienced it. Jeni Hester and Joy Watson were the American missionaries that worked with three Colombian Health Promoters.

The Health Promoters set up the day, time and place. When Jeni, Joy and I arrived the Promoters directed us to the house where the clinic would be conducted. We would drive in as far as the rough roads would allow then walk in carrying the needed medications and supplies.

While Jeni and Joy arranged the clinic, the Health Promoters organized the people coming to see the doctor by filling out a information card on each patient. I took pictures and practiced my limited Spanish.

I was impressed with the kindness and respect that the Colombians have for each other, the Health Promoters, and the missionaries. Many of them waited patiently for hours before they were able to talk to the doctor.

Each family was required to pay 23 cents. That money would be used to purchase the supplies the Health Promoters needed to organize the clinic. The family that

made their house available for the clinic was always concerned about the others in their community that were worse off than themselves.

One clinic was held in a house with concrete floors, three rooms and a bathroom located just outside the back door. The furniture consisted of hammocks for sleeping, one dining table made of plastic, two chairs and a couch. They had electricity and in the kitchen running water, a small refrigerator and a very small stove.

There was just enough room in the kitchen for me, or two Colombians. I did not see one overweight Colombian in either of the two barrios we visited.

Jeni reported that one time the infant mortality rate was very high. Now cases of extreme malnutrition in children are seen only among the newer residents that have just moved in.

The wellness clinics have been very effective in teaching the mothers how to make their living conditions more sanitary and how to recognize when their children need a better diet. While our children receive protein three times a day, Colombian children are lucky to get in two to three times a week. They know the program works because instead of losing a baby a week they only lost two babies last year due to malnutrition.

This was quite an experience for me and one that I will remember forever. Everyone

should do this at least once in their life.

Now for the new books coming out this week. **Even Steven** by John Gilstrap is about a young married couple, Bobby and Susan Martin. Bobby and Susan have tried to have children but Susan has not been able to carry a child to term.

In an effort to get away from the stress and pressure of careers and to become reacquainted with each other, the Martins go on a camping trip. The tiny, filthy, freezing young boy that dashes out of the woods near their campsite changes their lives forever. The boy had been kidnaped and the kidnapers are coming after him.

The Martins are struggling to stay one step ahead of the vicious crime ring. They are unable to go to the police because the police appear to be responsible for killing one of their own officers. Even if Bobby and Susan are unable to survive the ordeal will they be able to surrender the child to its real parents.

Steven has brought the Martins together as a family and couple in ways they never thought possible. Both Susan and Bobby fear how this story will end.

Temptation by Jude Deveraux begins in the year 1909. Temperance O'Neil, a woman ahead of her time, is a woman's rights activist devoted to helping single mothers on the streets of New York.

At the age of 29, Temperance finds her inheritance under the control of her new stepfather. Angus McCain insists Temperance become a respectable woman by living under the guidance of her parents, and demands she move into his house in Edinburgh.

Given no other choice Temperance moves to Scotland with the determination to make life

Thunder from Jerusalem by Badie and Brock Thoenes is the second of the Lion Legacy series.

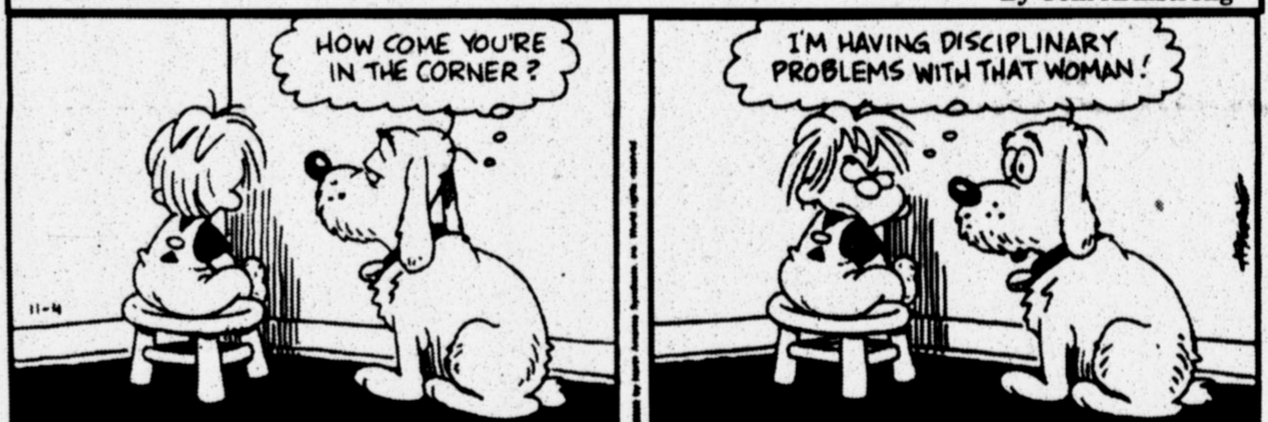

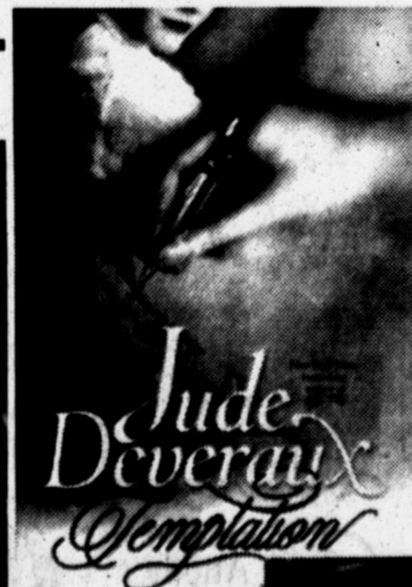
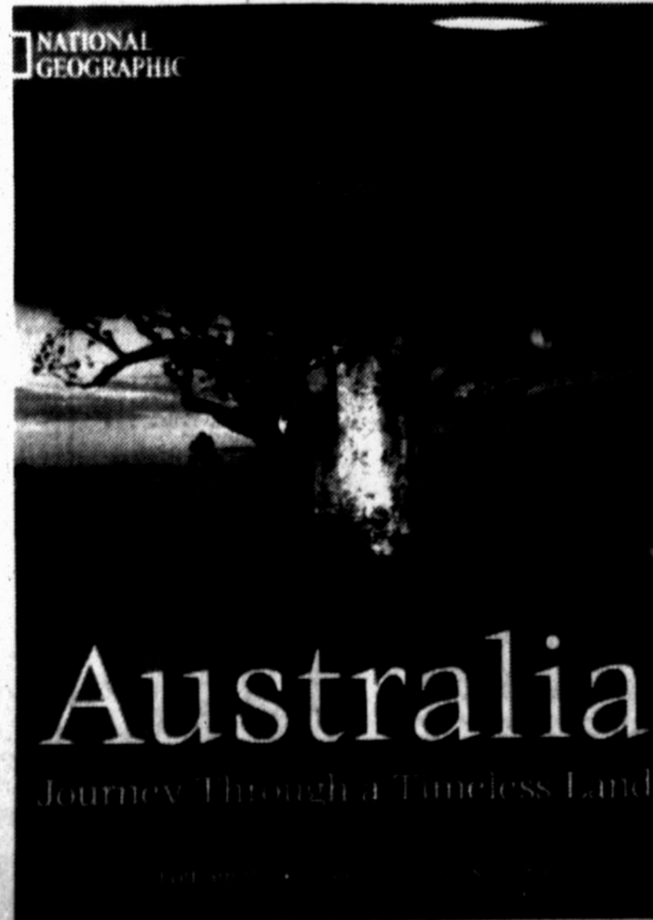

Primary feed costs dearly

Feeders go farther in search

As winter sets in, Texas dairyman and cattle feeders alike are feeling the pinch resulting from the results of the 2000 drought on supplies of alfalfa and hay.

Most local producers have contracted with numerous growers and are assured of having the quantities they need, but they have had to contract with more growers and at a greater distance than in past years.

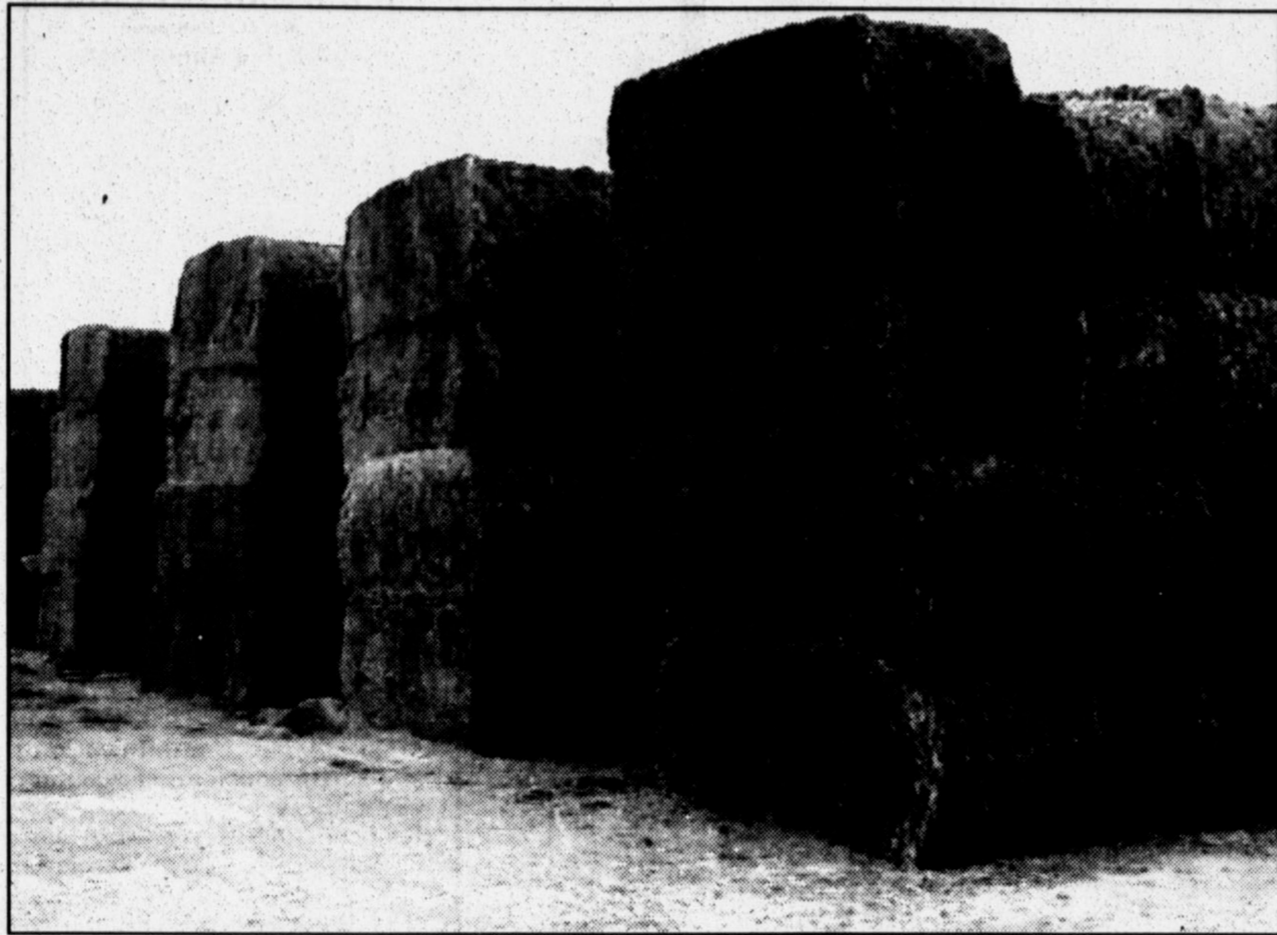
Scott Smith, the comptroller for Beef Tech and an independent alfalfa grower, said most local growers can't come close to supplying the needs of feed yards or dairies.

"We've got most of our hay from Kansas, but we're having to pay more for it," Smith said. "In the last 90 days, the cost of alfalfa has increased \$45 per ton."

Dairyman Dean Norton said, "It's out there, but you're gonna pay more for it than last year. A lot of fields just didn't make the quantity or the quality that we're used to seeing."

Unlike other feeds, alfalfa is the one food item for which feeders have a hard time finding acceptable substitutes.

"We have substitutes for everything except alfalfa. The nutrient value of alfalfa is far superior to anything else we can feed. Not only is it a near perfect ration, but it is easy to feed and handle. It can be fed as pellets, ground and chopped, mixed with

other foods or fed straight from the bale," Smith said.

Growers who had stockpiled hay from as far back as 1998 have been able to sell the old stocks for new crop prices, according to Smith. "It just can't be replaced."

Alfalfa has the distinction of providing beef and dairy animals with the highest total digestible nutrient value and proteins of any other single food source. Other hay type feeds, such as cane hay, also provide high nutrient values, but are still second to

the quality of alfalfa.

The nutrient value of alfalfa in the dairy cattle diet is unmatched by any other food. Beef cattle have different needs and feeders can work around alfalfa supplies. To be efficient milk producers, dairy cattle need the combined nutrients available only from alfalfa.

Alfalfa, a legume, is one of the most temperamental crops grown and will only thrive within a narrow range of conditions. Extremes of temperature, moisture and available

soil nutrients, even for short time periods, can effect the number of cuttings and the quality of the alfalfa.

This year, alfalfa crops throughout the South and Midwest have suffered extremes brought on by heat, drought and flooding.

The Texas agricultural commissioner's office has set up a hay hotline for producers and growers alike. Growers with available supplies and producers in need of hay can connect at www.agr.state.tx.us.

FSA survey indicates massive ag losses

COLLEGE STATION — A drought report developed from a statewide survey of Farm Service Agency county offices reveals extensive row crop, pasture/hayland and livestock losses in all Texas counties. Extended periods of extreme heat compounded losses in 223 counties.

Crop year 2000 marks the fourth consecutive drought year for much of Texas. The report reflects areas of the state hit harder than others, but no single region was unaffected by or immune to the effects of the drought.

"Although recent rain has been received throughout the state, the damage done by the drought is irreversible. Predicted above average rainfall for fall 2000 will not alleviate the current precipitation deficit," Shurley said.

Crop condition data received by FSA indicated 53 percent of Texas wheat acres, 42 percent of cotton, 35 percent of sorghum, 4.9 percent of corn and 81 percent of the peanuts failed.

Statewide, corn was the only exception to the widespread losses. Texas' corn acres were either harvested or matured to the extent

that dry conditions did not adversely impact the crop.

Livestock and pasture losses were recorded in 207 counties, with

man y counties indicating higher than normal culling and in some cases, liquidation of entire operations.

"The resulting economic hardship felt by Texas farmers and ranchers has been devastating," Shurley said. "FSA's report showed approximately 136,000 producers with 30 percent or greater losses and 15,000 producers who will have difficulty meeting their financial needs through commercial lenders. USDA and FSA are doing all we can to provide programs and lending opportunities to

producers in an attempt to lift some of the financial strain inflicted by the drought."

To date, 24 counties have received primary disaster declarations for the 2000 drought and an additional 39 counties have received contiguous declarations.

"Although these numbers are substantial, I do not feel the list is complete or adequately mirrors the needs of counties that have not yet received disaster declarations," Shurley said.

Damage assessment reports have been requested from 44 additional counties and are pending review for eligibility for Secretarial Disaster Designation. Disaster declarations provide farmers and ranchers with low interest emergency loan assistance. This year, the declarations will be a key factor for providing assistance to livestock producers who suffered grazing losses.

FSA's survey also indicated 39 counties where agricultural businesses are feeling the effects of the lack of production and depressed commodity prices, a statistic that is vital considering ag-

riculture is the second largest industry in Texas. Losses suffered by the state's farmers and ranchers have a severe impact on Texas' entire economy.

President Clinton recently signed the farm spending bill for 2001 which provides for approximately \$3.5 billion in disaster aid for agriculture losses nationwide.

Texas producers will benefit from provisions that specifically allocate funds for crop loss payments, dairy market loss, and livestock assistance.

California leads in biotech crop research

Midwest uses far more genetically engineered crops

DAVIS, Calif. (AP) — California researchers are in the forefront of agricultural biotechnology, but the commercial use of genetically modified crops is sparse in the state compared with the widespread use in the Midwest.

"That's kind of the paradox," said Kent Bradford, director of the seed biotechnology center at the University of California, Davis.

California's agriculture covers more than 250 crops, as opposed to the Midwest's reliance on corn and soybeans, said Judith Kjelstrom, associate director of the biotechnology center at UC Davis.

UC Davis officials estimate

that within the nine-campus system there are 200 invention disclosures, the first step toward a patent, on agricultural biotechnology. About half of those are from UC Davis, said school spokeswoman Pat Bailey.

The international environmental group Greenpeace warned last week that if California farmers jump into genetically modified crops, it could harm the state's \$26.8 billion agriculture economy.

Greenpeace looked at six of the state's agricultural products — rice, walnuts, grapes, lettuce, strawberries and tomatoes — that amount to \$1.1 billion a year in exports to Japan, Canada, South Korea, Hong Kong and Britain.

Consumers in those countries are reluctant to buy genetically engineered products, with some governments requiring labeling and others banning import altogether, said Jim Tischer, director of the

Davis-based Community Alliance with Family Farmers.

The result, Tischer said, would be a glut of genetically modified products with no place to sell them.

California has a reputation for organic growing, which comprises a good portion of that \$6.6 billion industry nationwide, he said.

While scientists are testing genetically modified strains of those crops, commercial use of the science in California is limited to cotton and a small percentage of corn, said Bradford, a professor of vegetable crops at UC Davis.

"We're behind the curve, since the companies mainly targeted the big crops like corn and soybean in the Midwest," he said.

Most of the crops that scientists have tinkered with are geared to making life easier for farmers, not consumers, Kjelstrom said.

"There are advances in her-

bicide-tolerant lettuce, but the industry isn't real excited about that," she said. "They were hoping for something like golden rice that has increased vitamin A — a poster child for biotechnology."

Golden rice, genetically modified to contain extra beta carotene, is advertised as a way to reduce blindness brought on by a vitamin A deficiency, a condition that affects millions in Third World countries.

Kjelstrom said biotechnology is not only safe, but it has the potential to feed the world as the planet's population grows.

"We'll have to be able to grow on less-than-desirable land," she said. "We're going to have to have new crops that can grow in salty or drought-stricken soil. We have to think of the future."

Bradford believes the use of genetic modification in most crops is inevitable.

"Commercialization is still a few years off. All the industries involved want to make sure the public will accept it," he said. "The problem now is marketing."

State CRP contracts pay \$159 million

COLLEGE STATION — United States Dept. of Agriculture's State Executive Director A. Wayland Shurley has announced \$159 million to be paid on 23,149 Conservation Reserve Program (CRP) contracts in Texas.

"The Conservation Reserve Program is the USDA's largest conservation program and is a voluntary program that offers landowners annual rental payments and cost-share assistance as incentives to convert cropland to approved permanent cover for a contract period of 10-15 years," Shurley said.

To date, USDA has administered 23 CRP sign-up periods

spanning 15 years. The program began with the Food Security Act of 1985.

Recent data for Texas indicates program enrollment of approximately 4 million CRP acres. Rental payments for program year 2000 averaged \$35 per acre and \$7,000 per farm for Texas landowners and operators.

Nationally, the CRP program boasts 32.5 million acres and FY 2000 payments will top \$1.4 billion, making the national average payment per farm \$4,833, with an average per acre payment of \$45.17. Approximately 293,857 farms are enrolled in more than 462,855 CRP contracts across

the nation.

"The substantial CRP acreage enrollment in Texas is a direct reflection of Texas Agriculture producers' natural resource stewardship," Shurley said. Farmers voluntarily agree to take environmentally sensitive land out of production when they enroll in CRP."

Land enrolled in the program must be highly erodible, contribute to a serious water quality problem or provide substantial environmental benefits if devoted to specific conservation uses.

Mineral coating lowers chemical use

KEARNEYSVILLE, W.Va. (AP) — Orchards, vineyards and even row crops someday could take on a ghostly appearance that would help protect from insects, diseases, sunburn and heat stress.

Agriculture Research Service scientists have covered fruit trees, vines and vegetable crops with a white, reflective coating of a specially processed

type of clay called kaolin that protects the plants at the Appalachian Fruit Research Station in Kearneysville, according to the U.S. Agriculture Department's Agriculture Research magazine.

The research is being conducted by the agency and Engelhard Corp. of Iselin, N.J. The cooperative "is producing kaolin-based products that

could turn out to be among the most versatile agricultural products ever to hit the market," said Agriculture Research Service Administrator Floyd P. Horn.

Soil scientist Michael Glenn, and co-inventor Gary Puterka said they see the potential for kaolin as a carrier for just about any chemical used on the farm.

Writing Want Ads that really sell!

Unsure how to write a Classified Ad that will get results? Follow these pointers and you'll soon have an empty space in your storage room and cash in your pocket. - Use key words to describe what you're selling. The key words for a car are make, model, year, body style, color, mileage and price. If it's a house, key words are location, type of construction, number of bedrooms and baths, and condition.
- Don't use abbreviations. It's tempting to abbreviate and save money if ads are billed by the line. Brand ads are billed by the words, so spell them out so readers won't be confused trying to figure out abbreviations.

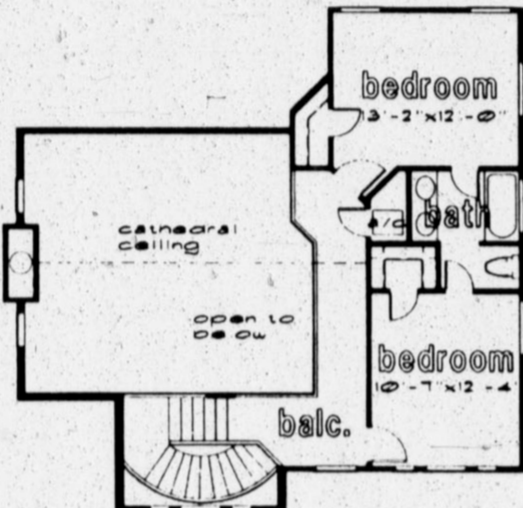

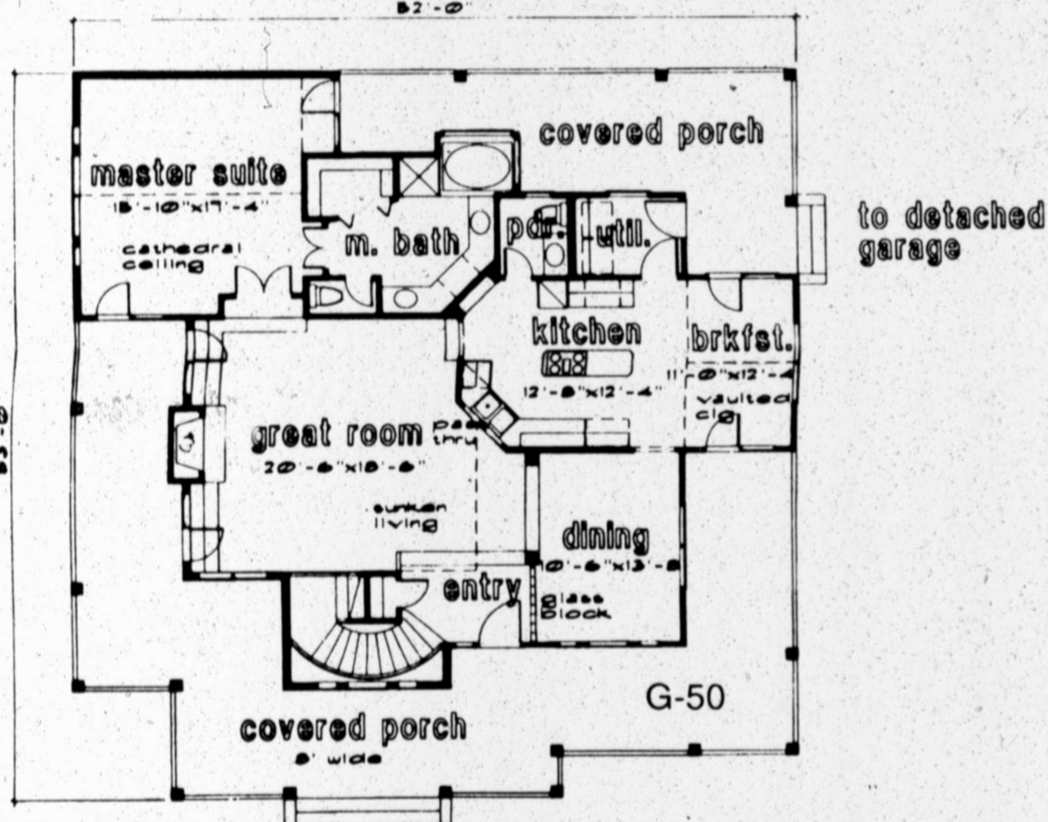

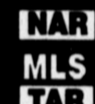

Elaborately decorated trees adorn

What would Christmas be without a tree?

What would pre-Christmas festivities in Hereford be without a plethora of elaborately decorated trees at the Festival of Trees?

Again this year, the annual Hereford Senior Citizens Association fund-raiser will feature an array of decorated trees, the Lionel train display, the Festival Gala and the Festival Auction.

The 11th annual Festival of Trees will be held Nov. 15-19 at the Hereford Senior Citizens Center, 426 Ranger.

The five-day festival agenda will follow basically the same time schedule as in the past years.

Continuous festival activities and children's programs will begin at 8:30 a.m. Wednesday, Nov. 15.

A preview of this year's trees is scheduled for 5-8 p.m. on Wednesday, providing extra viewing time for anyone interested in bidding on one of the ornate, seven-foot trees.

The Festival Gala is set to begin at 6 p.m. on Friday, Nov. 17, followed by the Festival Auction at 7:30 p.m.

The auction will include 26 beautifully decorated Christmas trees, plus other interesting items, such as a Spiral, a small silver tree decorated with Coca Cola items, a handcrafted porcelain doll, hand quilted wall hangings and quilt, and a 48" prelit, decorated wreath.

Another special item of particular interest to Coca Cola collectors is a Coca Cola 10-cent bottle machine, dating from the 1950s. The vending machine is 65.5" X 32" and takes only nickels and dimes. It has adjustable shelves for different sizes of bottles. The machine is in mint condition and in working order. There will be a minimum bid on this item, which will be announced later.

Last year's auction of trees and other items, such as oversized lighted wreaths, brought in about \$32,000.

Contributing to the total were the three top selling trees which brought \$2,600, \$2,500 and \$2,100, respectively.

The trees are provided by the Senior Center, are sponsored by local and area businesses and are decorated by individuals, businesses, school groups and service clubs.

Decorators determine what theme will be used for each tree and the variety of theme ideas is limited only by the

imagination of the decorators.

The Memorial Tree, offered for the first time in 1994, will be featured again this year.

The lighted, wooden Christmas tree serves as a tribute where people may honor loved ones through monetary contributions.

Green Light - \$10-\$99

Blue Light - \$100-\$249

Red Light - \$250-\$499

proceeds benefit the Hereford Senior Citizens Association which offers

services to area senior citizens that include congregating and home-bound meals, transportation and a modern and multi-functional senior center.

According to the Hereford Senior Citizens Association, more than 2,000 senior citizens were assisted in 1999.

Once again, this year's festival will include a melodrama, "Showdown on the Showboat or Don't Throw Your Garbage in the River." The play will be presented at 7 p.m. on Thursday, Nov. 16 and on Saturday, Nov. 18.

Finger foods will be served

with the Thursday performance at a cost of \$10 per person. The Saturday presentation will include a full dinner at a cost of \$15 per person.

Advance tickets are required for the melodrama due to limited seating. For reservations, call 364-5681 or go by the Hereford Senior Citizens Center.

Another continuous festival activity, the Holiday Bazaar, offers visitors a chance to browse at their leisure and shop for Christmas

The bazaar is known for

its holiday gift baskets which are assembled, filled and wrapped by members of the senior citizens. Each basket contains an assortment of items built around a central theme and each basket is unique.

The Lionel train display, popular with the young and the young-at-heart, features numerous trains on tracks which pass through village after village, all unique and different each year.

The train display will open Nov. 15 and continue through

January 2001.

Area school children will perform at the Senior Center on Wednesday, Thursday and Friday of the festival. After each group performs, they will receive a tour of the Lionel train display and of the decorated trees.

Children will have a special hour with Santa from 11 a.m. to noon on Saturday, Nov. 18.

The final day of activities will include a Holiday Turkey Buffet from noon-2 p.m. on Sunday followed by a one-hour concert by the gospel music group, Calvary.

Cost of the turkey buffet is \$7.50 for adults and \$3.50 for children 12 and under.

Lionel Train Display

The Henson family has had a love affair with trains for 40 years. In fact, Mr. Henson presented a train as a gift to his young son many years ago, and thus began his life-long interest in trains. As his family increased, the project of building trains did likewise. While the trains actually belong to the elder Hensons, most of the buildings and accessories belong to one daughter and her husband. This trend began upon her marriage in 1988,

when one wedding gift was a building.

Therefore, not only did the trains grow, but also the buildings and accessories multiplied, making up the scenic parts – and soon another daughter and her husband began building the mountains for the display.

The total exhibit to date takes the whole family and lots of helpers approximately 250 man-hours to set up. The biggest, bottom board is 10'x20' and contains six trains, two trollies and several animated pieces, such as a Nativity scene, waterfall, skating rink, fire station and service station.

There are about 200 buildings and 1,000 accessory pieces, including people figures, trees and animals. There is an animated Ford Motor Company with cars moving around the building. This year, for the first time, there is a football field and animated bumper cars.

The second layer is a 4'x12' board, and the next layer a 4'x8' board, upon which the mountain, being about 5' high, sits. The top of the mountain holds Santa's house and depicts Santa and his reindeer going around the light-

house.

On the smaller 5'x9' board, the one referred to as "Santa Land," there are animated pieces, such as a merry-go-round, ferris wheel, scene where Santa takes photos, trolley, Santa's loading dock, swing, hot air balloon, crowds of people, elves, reindeer and penguins.

On a yet smaller board, 4'x4' and 3½' high, is Santa's ski slope.

In tearing down the exhibit, every single item is wrapped and packaged in its own box, again involving hundreds of man-hours.

In spite of the detailed work involved, this is the 11th year the Hensons have displayed this train exhibit at Hereford Senior Citizens, becoming a traditional and major part of the Festival of Trees.

This novelty is on display from mid-November until the end of January 2001.

Everyone is encouraged to come view this phenomenal train exhibit. It is a gratifying experience to view it – and gratification is received by the Henson family upon seeing the profound sense of delight and joy on faces, children and adults alike.

Applicants must provide personal identification and proof of Deaf Smith County residence. If applicants are asking for help with utilities, they must bring water, gas, and electric bills. If medical help is sought, an invoice or bill, complete with account numbers, must be provided.

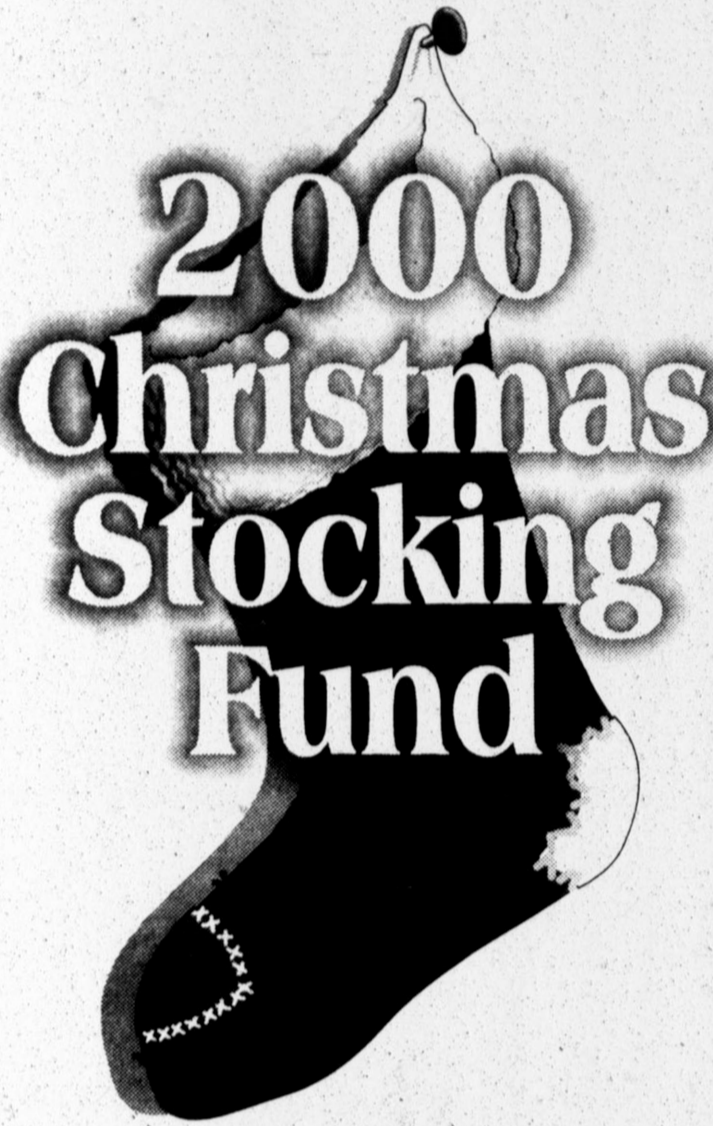
Caring and sharing local residents will be addressing some

of the needs of the community's less-fortunate once again as the Christmas Stocking Fund, a home-grown holiday charity, kicks off its 21st season of operation in Hereford and Deaf Smith County this year. Traditionally, the fund-raising drive begins at Thanksgiving and continues through December.

The 2000 fund raising campaign marks the 15th season of grass-roots operation within the community following restructuring of CSF in 1986. CSF was originally organized by several local businessmen in 1980. These businessmen operated the charity on their own through 1985, then decided to end their effort due to legal concerns. A core group of concerned anonymous Hereford residents then came forward to salvage the program. Operating procedures adopted at that time have been refined through the years to shape the program in its present-day form.

The Christmas Stocking Fund continues to be run by a committee of anonymous volunteers representing a broad cross-section of the community.

CSF is a holiday charity based strictly on the generosity of the residents of Hereford and Deaf Smith County. It is not affiliated with any governmental entity, nor with any other organization. CSF volunteers screen applications and make the tough calls on assistance to be extended, keeping in mind that they must operate within a budget that is dictated by the sum of dona-



tions. Priority is given to the needs of children and the elderly.

The local charity assists with food, clothing, utility and medical expenses, and other special needs. CSF is funded strictly by the caring and sharing of the local community.

The Hereford Brand serves as the official collection point for CSF funds, and periodically publishes listings of CSF donors. The Brand will begin accepting donations immediately after Thanksgiving.

Donations may be made in person at The Brand at 313 Lee Avenue, or they may be mailed to CSF in care of The Brand at Box 673, Hereford.

Donors wishing to remain anonymous should notify The Brand at the time that they give their gift. The Brand will maintain a running tally of CSF contributions.

CSF made the holiday a little

brighter for 576 individuals in Hereford and Deaf Smith County during its record-setting campaign in 1999. Contributions to CSF hit a new high as of December 28, 1999, totaling \$22,620.62. That eclipsed the old record of \$21,772 that was set in 1997.

During the 1999 effort CSF helped 238 adults and 338 children under the age of 17. A total of 56 senior citizens and six disabled persons were assisted. CSF spent \$2,500 on food staples, laundry supplies, and personal care items. The charity provided vouchers -- redeemable with local merchants -- totaling \$8,345 for children's clothing and shoes. Clothing vouchers for \$1,250 were disbursed to local

nursing homes for 25 elderly patients. Medical bills of \$1,950 for the sick and elderly were defrayed. Needy families got assistance totaling \$2,976 on utility bills.

By unofficial tally, all-time giving to CSF since its inception in 1980 now stands at \$302,147. That total includes a gift of \$8,000 from the Ruby Hill estate at the start of the 1999 campaign. A total of \$258,419.62 of the all-time amount has been given since CSF was reorganized in 1986.

"The numbers involved are much more than statistics. They represent help for homes in our community that would have gone without some basic necessities if not for the Stocking Fund. We're confident that Hereford and Deaf Smith County will respond in their typically-generous manner again this holiday season," said a spokeswoman for the charity.

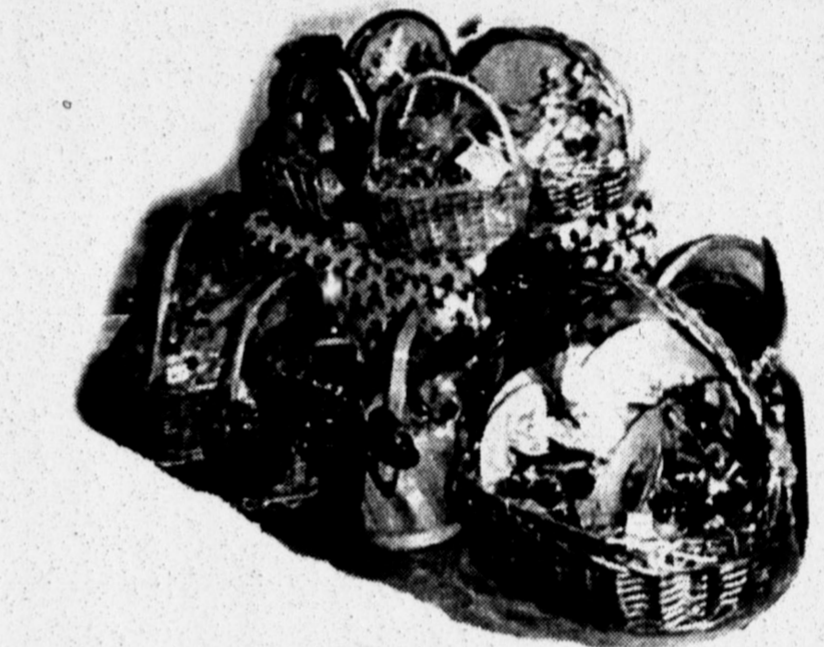

Project Christmas Card continues to send greetings to friends while aiding HRMC

Why is a fund-raising campaign that doesn't involve sending Christmas cards called "Project Christmas Card"?

Because the project is an alternative to sending individual Christmas greetings to local friends.

L'Allegra Study Club sponsors Project Christmas Card which offers individuals a way to make monetary contributions in the amount they would typically spend on Christmas cards and stamps.

The club provides envelopes on which contributors are asked to print their name as they would like it to appear in the newspaper, then deposit the envelopes in canisters which have been placed with numerous area businesses.

The names of contributors will be printed in a full page ad appearing in the Christmas Eve edition of the *Hereford Brand*. Everyone listed in the ad is sending a collective greeting to the whole community. They are also being recognized for their contribution which will be used to benefit Hereford Regional Medical Center.

The proceeds from this year's Project Christmas Card will go toward purchasing hearing screening equipment for the OB department at HRMC. Recent legislation

mandates all facilities enrolled in Medicaid funding and counties with less than 50,000 residents to provide services for screening the hearing of all newborns or providing them with a referral to a facility that provides this service. This screening equipment will allow HRMC to provide this service without referring patients out of Hereford.

The project for sending the collective greeting was started in 1956 by a group of doctors' and dentists' spouses who wanted to offer local residents an opportunity to support specific needs of the local medical community.

L'Allegra Study Club has sponsored the project since 1986, collecting a total of more than \$69,000 which has benefitted Hereford's hospital.

Proceeds raised by the project have been used to purchase a non-invasive blood pressure machine, serum electrophoresis lab equipment, oxygen monitor and blood pressure monitor for obstetrics, fetal monitor, cardiac enzyme monitor, gazebo, mammography grid, colposcope for rape examination, renovation of obstetrics waiting room, anesthesia multiple monitor and smartscale digital baby scale.

Bandera man lassos visitors to Lone Star State

SAN ANTONIO (AP) — It doesn't take a rope and a whip to get foreigners to visit Texas, but they sure help.

The traditional tools of cowboys are, public relations devices in the gifted hands of Kevin Fitzpatrick, a trick roper who serves as an international ambassador for the Lone Star State.

The 42-year-old Bandera resident this year has cracked bullwhips at Canadians and lassoed Swiss conventioners on trips arranged by the San Antonio Convention and Visitors Bureau and the Texas Department of Economic Development.

And the word is that Fitzpatrick's friendly demeanor and playful antics have only enhanced the international love affair with the American cowboy.

"He really ropes them in," quipped Gwen Spain, of the state economic development agency.

And Gerlinde VanWerdt of the convention and visitors bureau said there's more to Fitzpatrick than fancy tricks and cowboy looks.

"People really like him," she said. "He's very personable. He smiles and talks to everybody."

She keeps a camera handy to provide keepsakes for those subjected to Fitzpatrick's hands-on roping style.

"Usually you can tell who to rope, and there's ways of roping someone where you can be polite," he said.

But, he added, "You have

to be careful about who you rope. Women are very touchy about their hair, and people with glasses."

Fitzpatrick said he loves meeting new people and promoting Texas, a job for which he isn't paid. Only his expenses are covered.

While on duty, he doesn't develop a thick drawl, feign having bowlegs or put on other airs to fulfill expectations of

the cowboy image.

"I'm always myself," he said. "I've always been a polite person and had manners. I don't dip or chew or smoke or cuss."

It doesn't hurt that he comes from the Hill Country city that bills itself as "The Cowboy Capital of the World." And folks here are happy to call him one of their own.

"Kevin is not just a show cowboy. He's a real cowboy.

He keeps his horses, he ropes on his range and he's got cattle," said Patricia Moore, of the Bandera County Convention and Visitors Bureau.

Fitzpatrick honed his skills working at festivals, rodeos, dude ranches and parties around Texas over the past two decades.

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

His horse, Wet, is a big part of his local act, but doesn't make the out-of-country tours.

"I can get on a horse seven different ways, like they do in the movies," Fitzpatrick said in a rare display of self-promotion.

He's impressive nonetheless performing solo, whether jumping through roomy lassos, rolling lassos across his shoulders or dancing as lassos whirl around his feet.

On Monday, he and some roping friends gathered at the Dixie Dude Ranch, where Fitzpatrick was hired as a ranch hand in 1980 and still appears regularly.

Joining Fitzpatrick for a little friendly competition was trick roper Fred Schneider, a native of Germany.

Also on hand was Nathalie Menu, a trick roper on vacation from France, where she recently began teaching the Texas two-step at her dance studio.

Schneider and Fitzpatrick competed last year in Munich to see who could do the most Texas skips in one minute. They tied, each jumping back and forth 79 times through a spinning lasso.

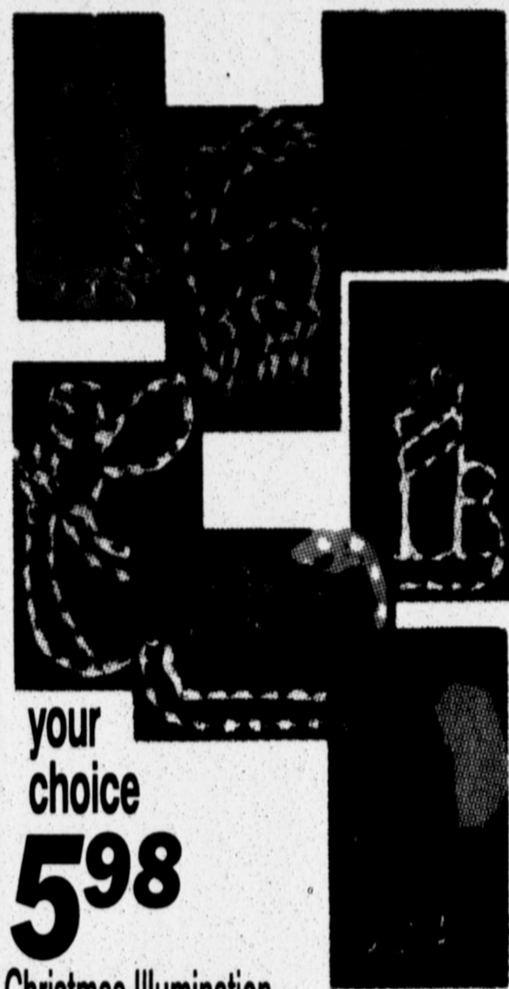
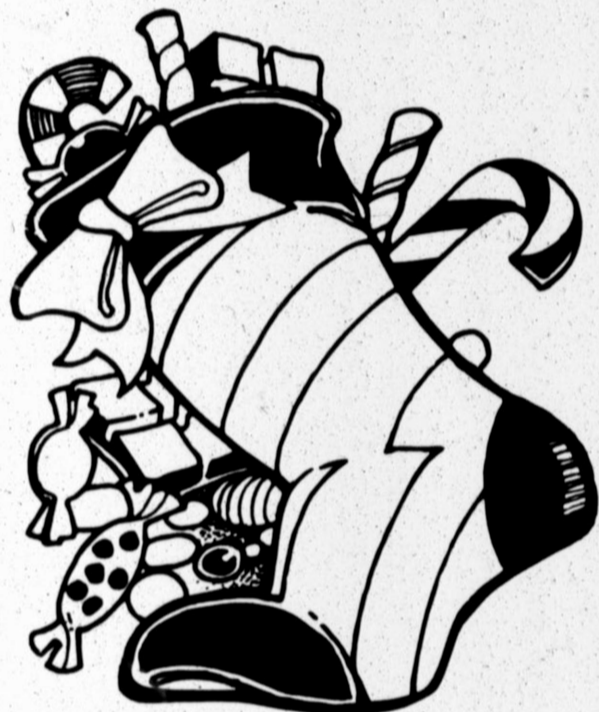
Unlike Fitzpatrick, who has made a living from his roping for a decade, Schneider has a real job and does rope tricks for fun.

"If you see me on a horse, I look silly," said Schneider, 45. "If you see Kevin on a horse, he looks homogeneous. The horse, the rope and Kevin are one."

Clay Conoly, the dude ranch's manager, called Fitzpatrick a natural choice for cowboy ambassador.

"He even drinks Lone Star Beer. God help him," he said.

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PBS devotes more than enough time to Napoleon

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Napoleon was so famous that 180 years after his death, most schoolchildren can tell you who he was, though most people think of him as that 'short guy wearing an odd hat with his hand stuck in his vest.

Of course, anyone who fought his way to emperor and had 3 million soldiers die to bring him glory, not to mention anyone who continues to spark controversy centuries after his conquests, is a complicated man worthy of study. A new two-part, four-hour documentary, *Napoleon*, airing Wednesdays, Nov. 8 and 15, on PBS (check local listings), attempts to put his life in perspective.

On that extremely ambitious goal, David Grubin's film meets its mark. It's a wonderful program for Francophiles, or for those who have a report due on Napoleon. It is, however, slow.

Perhaps there's no other way to present history. Professors who may leave students spellbound can also leave viewers snoring. Learned French historians, speaking in French as English translations are simultaneously given, may bore some. And to illustrate certain points, the documentary frequently uses live shots, so when narrator David McCullough talks about Napoleon leading troops through rain, the image is of rain; when he talks of gardens, the image is of bees on flowers. All of this contributes to why this program, important as it is, is too long.

There is also excellent use of exquisite art. Napoleon certainly understood good press and frequently brought along painters to capture his heroics. Paintings by Jean-Auguste-Dominique Ingres, Francisco Jose de Goya y Lucientes and Jacques-Louis David are among those used to illustrate battles.

What shines through is what a force of nature Napoleon was. Born in 1769

to Corsican parents, Napoleon spent his childhood hating the French for taking over his impoverished native island. His father, whom he always held in disregard, studied law and served in the Corsican parliament. But his parents realized there was little future for their children in Corsica, and his father secured young Napoleon a scholarship at a military school in France.

The child did not speak French, was sallow and had never been in cold weather. Making matters more glum, he had no holidays or visits home for five years. These formative years were spent with the children of nobility who made fun of him. Napoleon learned to rely on himself, a trait that would serve him well when he later decided to march on neighboring lands and declare himself emperor for life.

Though most people know his final defeat was at Waterloo, few likely know he was an apprentice soldier at 16 and longed to be a writer. The well-researched documentary quotes often from Napoleon. Among his memorable lines: "I love power the way a musician loves music."

He proved this repeatedly because when vanquished, he simply regrouped. When he returned to Corsica at age 23 and was rebuffed by its leader, he headed back to strife-torn France.

Napoleon was a marvel. Besides his incredible bravery on the battlefield, he set in place a strong French government, built roads, canals, libraries, and improved schools. Imagine a politician today achieving so much. "He oversaw the codification of a new system of laws," McCullough says. "Bonaparte's civil code remains the basis of French law today."

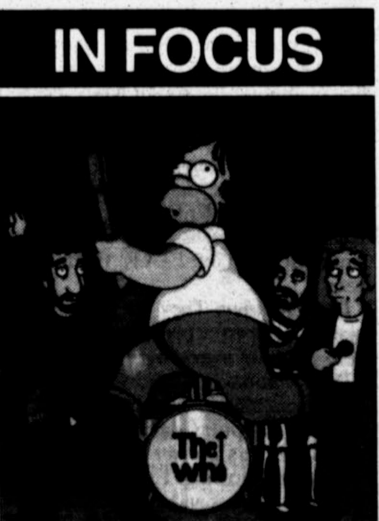

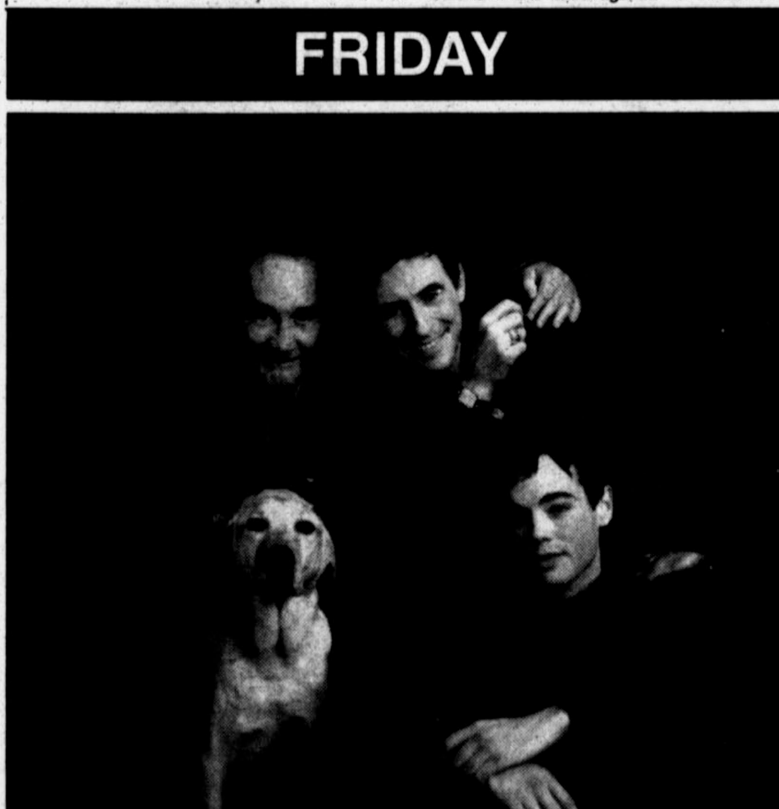
