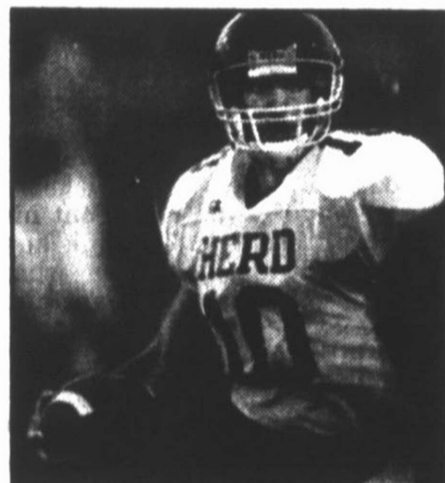

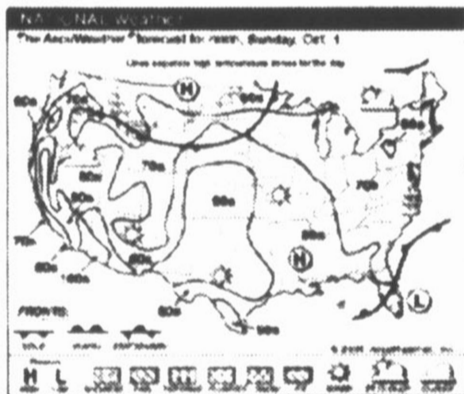

■ Semi-retired construction worker switches his attention to the building of ornate mailboxes, not buildings

If your neighbor has a new, elaborate mailbox, there's a good chance it was made by Virgil Maxwell.

A semi-retired construction worker, Maxwell and his wife, Peggy, operate Maxwell's Sawdust Shop, 104 Clement, where he uses old and new lumber to fashion mailboxes, planters, toys, picnic tables or just about anything that can be fashioned from wood.

"I made my first mailbox about six or eight years ago," Maxwell said. "I made one for the Senior Citizens (Association) that was auctioned off. I really got started for the first time on a regular basis in the first part of the year."

Auto dealer Jerry Stevens

was one of Maxwell's first customers, requesting a mailbox with a Southwest motif. Maxwell said he checked out a birdhouse book and got his idea for the mailbox. "Later, I made one for the pastor of Trinity Fellowship," he said.

Maxwell has been self-employed for the past eight or nine years, renovating or remodeling houses.

Although he has been a construction worker for more than 40 years, he said he has left the field on occasion, only to return. "I would get out for a while, but I didn't like what I would be doing, so I'd go back to it," he said.

When Maxwell starts working on a custom mailbox, he said it usually takes about three days to build it.

"Sometimes customers specify what they want. Sometimes they bring a picture or a pattern for a birdhouse. I have to modify the birdhouse to accommodate the mailbox."

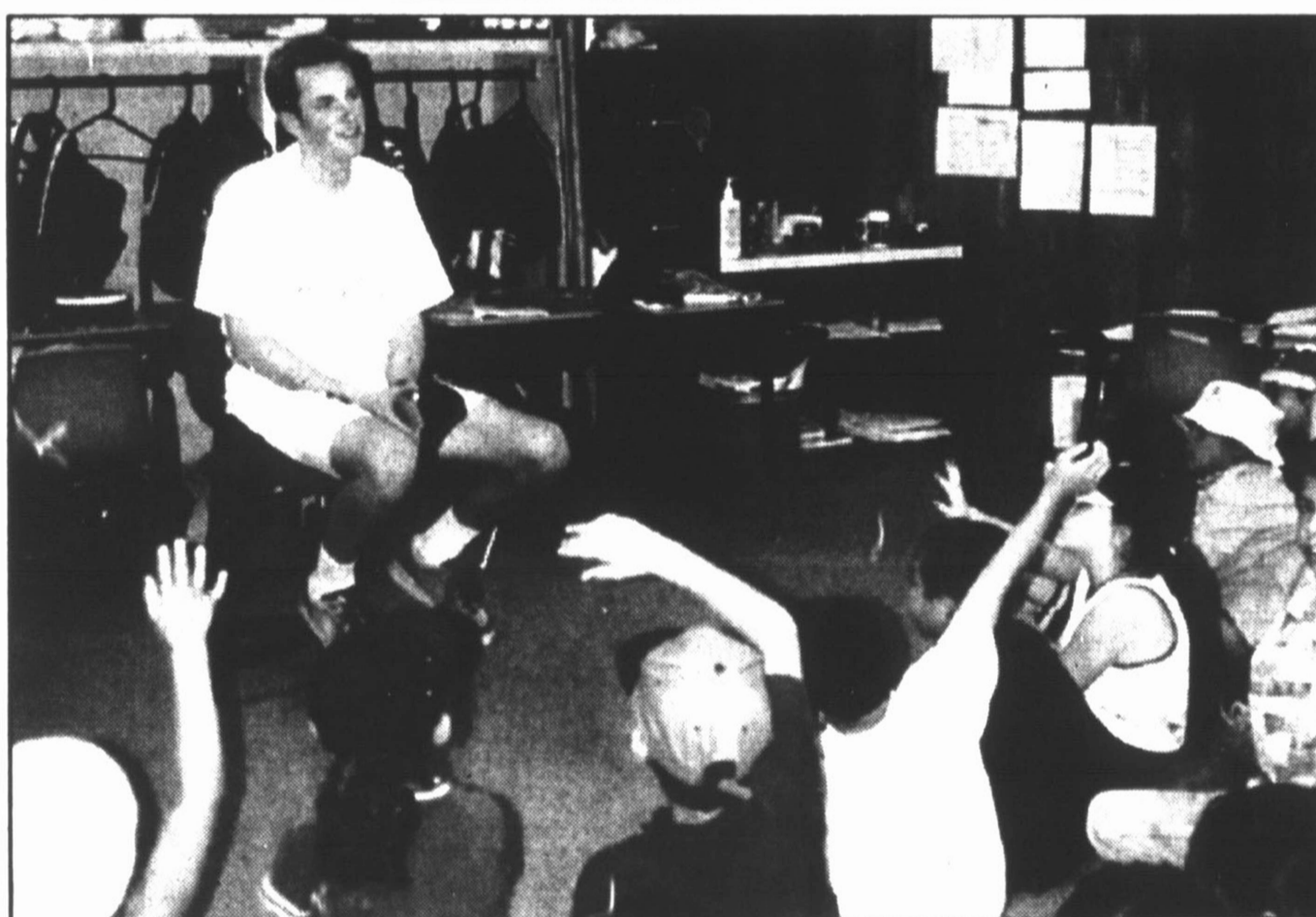

Aussie enjoys time here

It's a long way from Down Under to Hereford. However, for one young Australian, the 20-plus-hour flight has been time well spent.

Richard Andersen, 19, has spent the last two weeks familiarizing himself with the common sights, sounds and smells of the Hereford area.

He arrived just as the Olympics got started in Sydney and will return to his homeland sometime Monday.

Andersen got the idea of coming to Hereford after a group of young people traveled to Australia on a mission trip this summer.

Jana Price, a fourth-grade teacher at West Central, and her husband, Lee, youth minister at the church, accompanied the local teen-agers. Anderson's church was the group's operating base.

"I was involved with the group who came down to visit," he says in his ear-catching Australian accent. "So, I kind of knew what to expect. The company I work for took some time off, so I used the time to come and see what Hereford was like."

For nearly two weeks, his local hosts, the Prices, Greg and Karen Conn, and Jeff and Mary Matsler, have kept him seeing the sights. He's visited Palo Duro Canyon, White Sands of New Mexico and some caverns, mostly due to Price's organization.

Anderson has been here about a week and a half when he visited with the students who were able to ask questions after he read an Australian tale called "And the Kangaroo Played His

 would face
 stiff queries

Al Gore and George W. Bush would face some blunt questions about truthfulness if average Americans were doing the asking in the debate Tuesday night. But the dominant topics would be the issues the candidates argue about every campaign day.

People want to know in detail what the presidential nominees would do to preserve Social Security, provide prescription drug benefits to seniors, improve health care and education, control energy costs and either cut taxes or pay down the national debt.

They also would ask about honesty and whether campaign promises really count, a thread of cynicism that led some people to say they had nothing to ask because it wouldn't make any difference.

"Will you keep your promises?" Jeri Peters, 32, a hair stylist from St. Clair Shores, Mich., said she'd ask. "Because the candidates will say anything to get your votes, but then what happens?"

"Are you really telling the truth?" asked Florence Barnes, 50, a teaching assistant in Louisville, Ky. "The main thing in my mind is trust and truth."

"What would make the promises that they're making any different than all the rest of the promises other politicians have made throughout the years?" Berwin Cooley, 52, an electrician in Tucson, Ariz., asked. "And how would they see it that they come to fruition?"

Melissa Volker, 37, of Boston, where the first of the three Gore-Bush debates will be held Tuesday night, said she'd want them to "tell me how you're different...."

"You seem to have meshed into one ambiguous animal," said Volker, who described herself as an independent. "Tell me what

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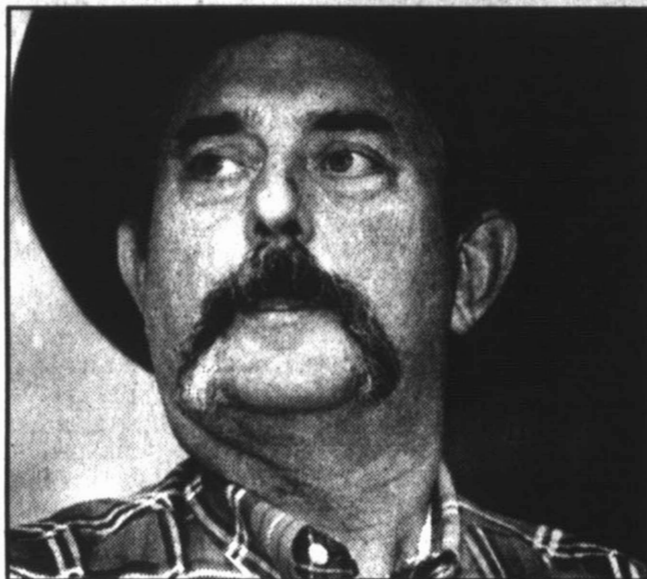

Violence erupts in Jerusalem

JERUSALEM (AP) — Thousands of Palestinians clashed with Israeli soldiers across the West Bank, Gaza Strip and Jerusalem today in what Palestinian leaders said was a religious war over a Jerusalem shrine bitterly contested in Mideast peace talks. Scores of Palestinians were injured by Israeli army fire, including rubber-coated steel pellets and live rounds, Palestinian hospital officials said. The Palestinian Authority put the number of injured at 216, but that could not be confirmed independently. The number of Palestinians killed in confrontations with Israeli troops on Friday rose to six, after hospitals did confirm an additional death.

• NHTSA opens probe into another tire •
WASHINGTON — The National Highway Traffic Safety Administration has received more than 160 complaints about another Firestone brand of tires. They reportedly have been involved in accidents in which two people died and a dozen were injured. "The majority of the complaints occurred at highway speeds and allege a blowout, tread separation or other major failure," NHTSA said in its investigation report about the Steeltex R4S and A/T light truck tires. Those tires are original equipment on Ford F250 and F350 pickups, the Ford Excursion, General Motors'

Suburban and G Van, a commercial vehicle. Similar reports led Bridgestone/Firestone Inc. to issue its recall of 6.5 million Firestone ATX, ATX II and Wilderness AT tires last month.

• Students stunned by death •

WASHINGTON — People who knew Gallaudet University freshman Eric Franklin Plunkett say he had no enemies. That's why the beating death of Plunkett, 19, who was deaf, had cerebral palsy and was a leader of a gay campus group, is that much harder to accept. "The biggest question here now is, 'Why?'" Chester Virnig, Plunkett's mentor and a math teacher at the Minnesota State Academy for the Deaf, Smithsonian Institution Press. Plunkett, of Burnsville, Minn., was found in his dormitory room Thursday night.

• Smithsonian tells how bananas changed U.S. •

WASHINGTON — Americans went bananas a century ago and the tropical fruit has been as American as apple pie ever since. So American, in fact, that the venerable Smithsonian Institution has published a 210-page book telling the story of the banana's role in U.S. history — everything from banana splits to banana republics. Written by Virginia Scott Jenkins, "Bananas, An American History," published by Smithsonian University Press, names 62 popular songs about bananas, including Rosemary Clooney's "A Bunch of Bananas," Carmen Miranda's "I Made My Money with Bananas" and the 1923 hit, "Yes! We Have No Bananas."

Didgeridoo." Like most newcomers, Andersen was surprised by a few things.

"The canyon we went to see was not at all like the ones at home — all brown and nothing much to look at. It was very green and pretty down there," Andersen said.

Of course, the number of cattle caught him by surprise.

"We have nowhere near this number of cattle. The smell really caught me off guard when we were driving in. But, the people seem to be cool.

They seem more relaxed than people at home," he said.

When he's not busy getting to know his way around, Andersen has taken time to stop at the elementary and primary schools, read a book to the students and answer some of their questions.

His soft accent seems to throw the students for a loop, because many want to know what the main language is or what language it is he speaks.

Andersen told the kids about his

school, explaining Australia schools are primary (first through sixth grades) and high school (seventh through 12th).

He told the students not nearly as many Australians go to college as American students. After he left high school after the 11th grade, he went to work as a carpenter.

Andersen said he hasn't missed the Olympics and the chance to get to visit Hereford has been a good experience, but it is time to go home.

you're passionate about." Those were among the questions people framed when Associated Press reporters asked what they would ask the candidates if they had one question at the debates.

After Tuesday's opening in Boston, Bush and Gore meet again in Winston-Salem, N.C., on Oct. 11, and in St. Louis on Oct. 17, the last in a town hall setting in which the questions will come from an audience of voters who say they are undecided between the two candidates.

In the AP interviews, the specific issue raised most often was that of health care and prescription drug benefits.

Melissa Heminway, 46, a part time pier manager in Cape Porpoise, Maine, said she'd want to know what the candidates would do for ailing elderly people and those who care for them, as she does for her 75-year-old mother. "I'm kind of curious how things could be simplified," she said. "The paperwork is ridiculous."

Another frequent question was about the future of Social Security, with younger working people wanting to know whether they can count on getting benefits when they retire.

"Are they going to keep putting enough money into Social Security so that those of us who've been paying into it since we were kids get something back?" asked Dave Meyer, 36, a Realtor from Albuquerque.

Education, what the nominees would do to improve schools and help parents pay for college, was another frequent entry. "I would ask just what improvements they plan in making in the public education system," said Caroline Castaneda of Phoenix, 25, a senior at the University of Arizona. "Bush seems to think that we're in an education recession right now."

Virginia Wentz, 55, of Riverton, N.J., put a Bush question a bit more gently. "I would ask Bush about his competence," she said. "I think he's not competent enough, from what I've heard, from how I've heard him speak."

Art museum featuring 3 new exhibits

AMARILLO — Three new art exhibitions will be shown through Nov. 5 at the Amarillo Museum of Art, 2200 S. Van Buren.

Texart 2000

"Texart 2000" is a survey of professionally trained artists who are working in some of the largest artistic centers in Texas.

Different media, including painting, sculpture and photography, and styles, ranging from realism to minimalism, will be featured. Artists in the exhibition include J. Hall of Houston, Otis Jones of Dallas, Ken Dixon of Lubbock, Jack Gilson of Austin and John Pomara of Dallas.

Much of the work reflects the recent shift toward abstract painting, which is often influenced by images and processes related to electronic technology.

Works by Women Artists

The Amarillo Museum of Art's first acquisition was of a woman artist, Electra Waggoner Biggs, in 1972. This little-known fact serves as the touchstone to this exhibition of work by women artists in the museum's permanent collection.

Over the past 28 years, many works by women artists have been donated to the museum and many are notable in their contributions to American art.

Louise Nevelson, Bernice Abbott, Georgia O'Keeffe and Dorothea Lange will represent the early and mid-20th cen-

tury. Such national recognized artists as Melissa Miller, Linda Connor and Joan Brown will be among the artists representing the last quarter of the 20th century.

The museum also will show works by European women artists, including Camilla Friedlander (19th century) and Marguerite Gerard (18th century).

Modernist Traditions

This exhibition will feature American painters from the mid-20th century, such as Larry Bill, Elaine de Kooning and Nevelson. It will be dominated by abstraction, both in painting and drawings, and will feature both East and West Coast schools of artists.

The museum's earliest patrons were often collectors and enthusiasts of modern American art of the 1950s and 1960s. They most often were drawn to the vibrant New York art scene as a source for both information and acquisition. This circumstance directed the Amarillo museum's collection toward art of that period and the region continues to enjoy a surprising number of private collections focusing on what was the mid-20th century's cutting edge.

The Amarillo Museum of Art's hours are 10 a.m.-5 p.m. Tuesday-Friday, and 1-5 p.m. Saturday and Sunday, except for exhibition installation weeks. It is located at 2200 S. Van Buren on the northeast side of Amarillo College's Washington Street Campus. There is no admission fee. Information: 371-5050.

P-PHM highlights works by Bugbee

CANYON — A retrospective of Southwestern artist H.D. Bugbee's work will be on display through Feb. 18, 2001, at the Panhandle-Plains Historical Museum. As part of the celebration of the 100th anniversary of Bugbee's birth, the museum has brought together 100 of Bugbee's finest works in oil, watercolor, pen-and-ink, and sculpture.

Bugbee portrayed historic and then-contemporary Southern Plains life, including cowboys, American Indians, and flora and fauna of the region.

At the suggestion of his cousin, cattleman T.S. Bugbee, Harold Dow Bugbee came to the Texas Panhandle from Lexington, Mass., in 1914 with his parents. He studied at Texas A & M College in 1917 and the Cumming School of Art in Des Moines, Iowa, in 1920.

Advised by cattlemen Frank Collinson and Charlie Goodnight, Bugbee rendered the landscape and wildlife of the Texas Panhandle, as well

as nostalgic paintings of Indians and cowboys. Until the late 1930s, the artist traveled each fall to Taos to paint with his fellow artists "Buck" Dunton, Frank Hoffman, Leon Gaspard, and Ralph Meyers, often packing into the mountains to paint with either Meyers or Dunton.

By the mid-1920s, galleries in Denver, Chicago, Kansas City and New York handled Bugbee's work. With the Depression and decreasing picture sales, Bugbee turned to magazine illustration, a practice he maintained for some eighteen years. He did pen-and-ink illustrations for a variety of magazines, including "Ranch Romances," "Western Stories," "Country Gentleman," and "Field and Stream." Additionally, Bugbee also illustrated a number of significant books on Western history including J. Evetts Haley's "Charles Goodnight: Cowman and Plainsman," Willie N. Lewis's "Between Sun and Sod," and S. Omar Barker's "Songs of the Saddleman."

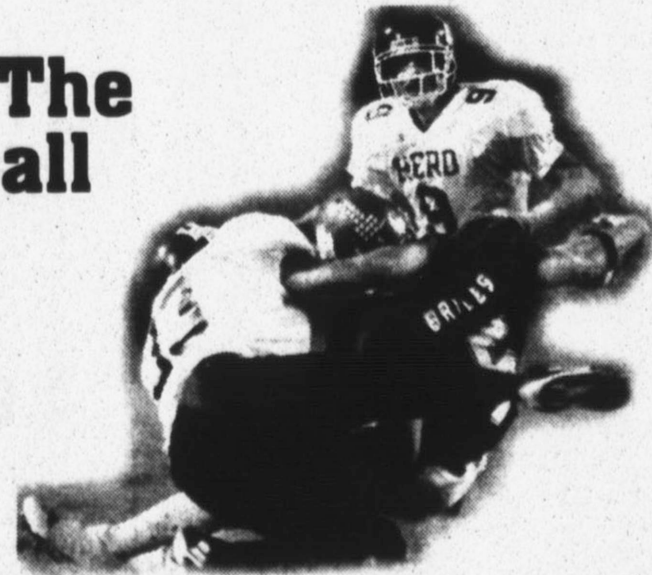

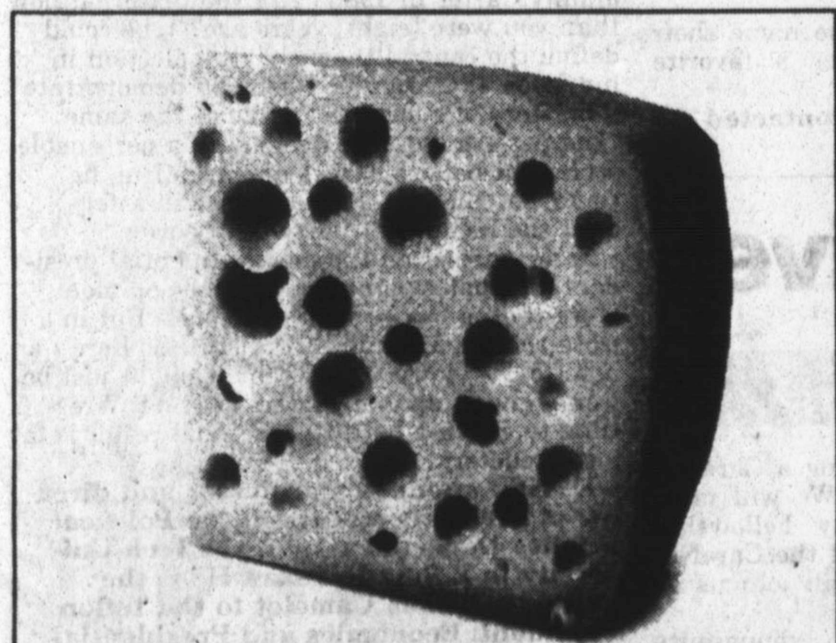

Censors not at work here

The Deaf Smith County Public Library has avoided a problem that has given headaches to librarians around the nation.

Book banning.

While school and public libraries have had to deal with complaints of censors, many of them well-meaning, the Deaf Smith County Public Library has not received any challenges to the books on its shelves.



The books that have been targeted by the would-be censors have included literary classics and popular children's books.

The 10 books that have been most frequently challenged in school and public libraries during the 1990s, with author and some reasons for objections, are:

- "Scary Story" series, Alvin Schwartz, violence, occultism, cannibalism.
- "Daddy's Roommate," Michael Willhoite, reportedly promotes an ungodly lifestyle.
- "I Know Why the Caged Bird Sings," Maya Angelou, portrayal of whites.
- "The Chocolate War," Robert Cormier, profanity, sexual situations and encourages disrespectful behavior.
- "The Adventures of Huckleberry Finn," Mark Twain, racist language.
- "Of Mice and Men," John Steinbeck, offensive and racist language.
- "Forever," Judy Blume, glamorizes sex.
- "Bridge to Terabithia," Katherine Patterson, profanity and disrespectful of adults.
- "Heather Has Two Mommies," Leslea Newton, promotes lesbianism/homosexuality.
- "The Catcher in the Rye," J.D. Salinger, profanity and sexual references.

According to the American Library Association, "sexually explicit" was the most common objection raised about books at libraries, followed by "unsuited to age group" and "occult theme."

About 5 percent of the complaints also lead to the banning of a book.

That there have been no challenges about books at the Deaf Smith Public Library is a compliment to the county's reading public. The Deaf Smith County reading public is demonstrating an awareness that censorship, once initiated, takes on a life of its own, not stopping until all books have been removed from the shelves.

You gotta love the Irwins

Television proves the validity of the law of diminishing returns: The more channels we have to choose from, the less we have to watch.

That's how Annette and I discovered "The Crocodile Hunter."

We'd surfed through all of the cable channels, finding little that could hold our attention — until we hit on the Animal Planet channel and found Steve Irwin, the "Crocodile Hunter" of Queensland, Australia.

Now, we are devoted viewers of wildlife adventures of Steve and his wife, Terri, and their efforts to preserve and protect wildlife — not only in Australia, but around the world.

Steve is director of the Australia Zoo, which was started by his parents, Bob and Lyn Irwin, both of whom were renowned naturalists.

Debates could be must-see TV

Presidential debates are not quite the events they used to be. Forty years ago, when television was still new and cynicism had not yet metastasized in the body politic, the Kennedy-Nixon debates captured the sort of ratings that are now reserved for shows with names like "Who Wants to Be a Millionaire Survivor's Big Brother?"

When George W. Bush and Al Gore face off, their audience share will fall well below the standard established in 1960. This should not surprise anyone. Televised debates are no longer a novelty. More importantly, television viewers have choices available to them today that would have been unimaginable even 20 years ago, let alone at the end of the 1950s. Nevertheless, the 2000 presidential debates may prove to be the most consequential in years.

We know from scholarly research that debates have their greatest impact when candidate support is soft and when voters have lingering doubts about the nominees. Obviously, such is not always the case.

The entire country, for example, could have been forced, "Clockwork Orange"-style, to watch the Clinton-Dole debates four years ago, and they wouldn't have changed enough minds to reallocate Delaware's three electoral votes. In 1996, the electorate had pretty much decided to re-elect President Clinton even before the parties' summer conventions. By contrast, the wild swings that have occurred in the public opinion polls this year underscore the fact that neither candidate has yet closed the deal.

George W. Bush is a relative newcomer to the national political stage. People seem to like him, but they also have doubts about his preparation for the presidency and his seriousness of purpose. In addition, while most Americans are intrigued with the idea of "compassionate conservatism," they would like to see the Texas governor provide a little more substantive definition to the phrase.

More to the point, they want to make sure that the moderate tone of the GOP convention will not be replaced come January by the right-wing politics of last spring's South Carolina primary.

For his part, Al Gore has spent most of the last few weeks attempting to persuade his fellow citizens that he is not Bill Clinton. That point, if it was ever really in doubt, has surely been made by now.

It is time, therefore, for the vice president to turn to the task of explaining who Al Gore is, and to answer the \$64,000 (actually, 270-electoral-vote) question: Does he have the strength and leadership skills to preserve the economic gains of the Clinton years without succumbing to ideological excess?

Bush and Gore are clearly not the first candidates to have the opportunity to use debates to address voters' concerns. In 1960, John F. Kennedy had a task not unlike that of Gov. Bush. Given his youth, his relative inexperience, and the long shadow cast by a dominant father, Kennedy needed to demonstrate his own strength and substance. His polished performance against Richard Nixon helped him settle those doubts and win a very close election. Twenty years later, Ronald Reagan's calm, genial debating style helped to answer fears that he was a dangerous ideologue whose Cold War anti-communism might drive the country to the brink of nuclear war. And in 1988, a lightly regarded vice president, George Bush the elder, used the debates to persuade voters that he was up to the job of building on his predecessor's popular record (are you listening, Mr. Gore?).

It is far too early to say that the outcome of the 2000 presidential election will be influenced by this year's debates. But if Al Gore can focus voters on the now-famous question asked by Ronald Reagan in his debate with Jimmy Carter in 1980 ("Are you better off now than you were [eight] years ago?"), he could define the central theme of the election in his favor. If George W. Bush can demonstrate a mastery of substance, while at the same time performing, like Reagan, in a personable style that belies charges of extremism, he could convince voters that they can safely eject the incumbent party from power.

To be sure, even the most influential presidential debates rarely move public opinion more than a few percentage points. But in a close race, that could be decisive. So here's a note to TV viewers: this year it might just be worth giving up a few hours of WWF Wrestling to watch a battle whose final result is far less predetermined.

Access to healthcare for those living in rural communities all across the country is in grave jeopardy. Rural and community hospitals are on the verge of financial collapse because of the federal government's reduction in payments for Medicare services.

Cold War vets recognized

For more than four decades, hundreds of thousands of young Americans served their country in a war that was not a war, in a cold war.

In an era when the veterans of the "forgotten war" in Korea are finally getting recognition for their service, where thousands of people daily stop and reflect at the Vietnam War Memorial in Washington, D.C., the veterans of the Cold War also are receiving notice from their country.

In 1998, the U.S. defense secretary approved awarding Cold War Recognition Certificates to all members of the armed forces, including the National Guard and reserves, and qualified government civilian personnel who served the nation during the Cold War era, Sept. 2, 1945-Dec. 26, 1991.

The applicants must certify their service was "faithful and honorable," and they also must provide documentation that shows they served during the Cold War era. For deceased veterans, the certificate may be awarded to relatives who apply.

The certificate may be requested by use of U.S. or

international forms found at the Army's Cold War webpage, <http://coldwar.army.mil>. It is a secure site, but anyone who doesn't feel comfortable providing a Social Security number online can obtain the form by mail.

A request must contain the words "I certify that my service was honorable and faithful," or it will be rejected.

Supporting documentation, which must be submitted with the request, includes military service number, foreign service number or Social Security number, a copy of a DD-214, which is the military service record, or a DD-215, which is a corrected version of that document. National Guard members should provide the statement of service equivalent, NGB Form 22.

Aggies look to avenge 1999 loss

■ Teams fired up for Texas showdown

COLLEGE STATION, Texas (AP) — Texas A&M is starting to understand just how fired up Texas Tech gets for their annual encounter. A&M coach R.C. Slocum is glad to hear it.

The Red Raiders have beaten the Aggies four out of the last five times, including 21-19 last year after Texas A&M visited Lubbock with a No. 5 ranking.

"I cried after that game," A&M linebacker Jason Glenn said. "I've never cried after a game, but I cried after that one."

Texas Tech (4-0) hopes for more Aggie tears Saturday when it faces Texas A&M (2-1) at Kyle Field. The Aggies have not lost a home game since Tech beat them 13-10 in 1996.

The Red Raiders' recent success has intensified the rivalry between the schools and prompted some realizations in Aggieland.

"Those guys really hate us," Glenn said. "Most of them say if they just win this game and lose the rest of them, they would still think they had a good season."

Slocum said it's about time his team understood what this game has meant for the Red Raiders.

"That's what I want," he said. "It's been a little frustrating for me that we've played this team every year, and it seems like one of those ho-hum kind of games. I think it's high time we recognize they get fired up for games, and they play to win."

"We need to have the same kind of resolve when we go out there," Slocum said.

The Aggies, who traditionally rely on strong defense and a running game, have been achieving better balance offensively in recent contests. Texas A&M is averaging 172 yards per game on the ground and 214 passing.

If Tech's success against the Aggies the last few years isn't enough to fire up Texas A&M, it can look to its 51-6 loss to Oklahoma last year. Mike Leach — the Red Raiders' first-year coach — was the Oklahoma assistant who drew up the successful of

Defense saves Herd

■ Whitefaces' offense gets redemption shot after Borger penalty

While Hereford's high octane offense sputtered, the Whitefaces' defense took control of the District 3-4A match up to defeat the Bulldogs 14-7 in Borger.

After getting banged up on the offensive side of the ball and falling behind 7-0, the Hostile Herd (3-1, 1-0) fought back to score twice and sneak away with their first district win.

"We came out real flat tonight," senior quarterback Cody Hodges said. "We got the job done though and that is all that matters."

Hereford's defense kept the offense in the game limiting Borger (2-2, 0-1) to only 119 total yards and recovering three of four Bulldog turnovers. The Herd's defense also only allowed Borger's star running back Eron Hanes to see the endzone only one time limiting him to 131 yards on the ground. Senior defensive end Michael Barba said he thought Hereford's defense came out in the second half and outplayed their opponents.

"The defense was unbelievable the second half," Barba said. "We are all stepping up and making big plays."

"We knew the defense was going to have to win the game, and we just committed ourselves to stopping them and winning the game," Barba said.

"The defense kept us alive tonight," Boys Athletic Director and head football coach Craig Yenzler said.

Borger's defense kept their own team in the ballgame too holding the Whitefaces to 300 total yards and stopping the Herd twice inside the 5-yard line in the first half. The Whitefaces were able to tie the game though on a 12-yard fade pass from Hodges to senior receiver Slade Hodges to tie the game 7-7 with 5:15 left in the second quarter, and then they scored with 59 seconds remaining by C. Hodges' 1-yard touchdown run to come away winners.

Yenzler said his team showed their integrity and determination by coming back to beat the Bulldogs on their own turf.

"Their kids played great, and our kids played great," Yenzler said. "The key was our kids having a little bit more character and wanting it more tonight."

The key offensive play of the game came surprisingly on a penalty late in the fourth quarter. After Hereford failed to get the ball out of their own territory Hodges was hit hard by two Borger players during a punt which caused the Bulldogs to be called for rough-

ing the kicker. The penalty was the back breaker for Borger as they stood and watched Hereford pull a few tricks out of the bag and go on to win. After throwing an incomplete pass, C. Hodges caught the ball on a reverse pass from brother S. Hodges threw the ball to C. Hodges for an 18-yard gain putting the Whitefaces deep in Borger territory.

The Whitefaces then called another unusual play giving the ball to senior fullback Kyle Artho, who pounded the ball 27 yards for a first down at Borger's 1-yard line.

Artho said he was glad to be able to make the play count when the offense needed it.

"It (the play call) was really unexpected that late in the game," Artho said. "I am still confused on why he called that play, but it worked out

Ticks, fleas, and mosquitos can be far more than just a nuisance. Hunters, campers, and hikers are at risk of exposure to diseases carried by these critters.

A few aches and pains just seem to go with the territory for those who vigorously participate in outdoor sports. Flu-like symptoms such as body aches, headache, chills and fever can be early indicators that quickly give way to severe symptoms of some of the diseases carried by assorted ticks, fleas, and mosquitos.

Deer, quail, and squirrel hunters, and those who camp in heavily-vegetated areas have to beware of Lyme disease, the most frequently diagnosed tick-borne problem in the U.S. Lyme disease may be indicated by early symptoms of skin lesions or rashes. Left untreated, it can cause severe damage to the heart, nervous system, and joints.

Infected ticks can also spread Rocky Mountain spotted fever and human ehrlichiosis, that create a measles-like rash, and can prove fatal if not treated promptly.

If you've recently been bitten by a tick and begin noticing flu-like symptoms, or a red bulls-eye rash around the bite, get medical help immediately. Lyme disease isn't a malady to take lightly, and yes, it does occur in Texas. If Lyme disease isn't diagnosed early, victims can face life-threatening illness, heart problem, possibly even paralysis.

Check yourself over for ticks when you've been out in the deer woods, or camping in tick country. Should you find that a tick has attached itself, remove it carefully, gripping it with a tweezers or other instrument as close to the head as possible, and pull it straight out. Don't squeeze the tick while pulling it. This could force toxins into your bloodstream.

Lots of young hunters get their start pursuing rabbits. Handling carcasses of wild rabbits can mean exposure to the bacteria that causes tularemia, another tick-borne disease.

Numerous folks of all ages hunt prairie dogs in this region. Plague,

common in the wild rodent populations of West Texas, is transmitted to humans by fleas, or by direct contact with infected animals such as prairie dogs, squirrels, cats, rats, and mice. Unfortunate people stricken with plague can suffer painful, swollen lymph nodes, and unless adequate medical treatment is swiftly sought, death can result.

An infection of the central nervous system known as encephalitis may be caused by several mosquito-borne viruses. The local region has battled potential encephalitis problems periodically through the years. Victims who contract more severe forms of the disease may be stricken with severe headache, high fever, nausea, muscle tenderness, partial or nearly-complete unconsciousness, and even coma.

Hunters, hikers and campers are advised to protect themselves from insect bites as a defense against these diseases.

Insect repellents containing DEET or permethrin that are used according to package directions are especially effective. Some individuals are sensitive to DEET, so proceed cautiously in using these products. Stay on trails, and avoid areas of overgrown brush and tall grasses.

Wear protective clothing including a hat, long-sleeved shirt, and long pants that are tucked into your boots or socks. Wearing light-colored clothing will help you to spot ticks more easily.

If you are in an area with ticks—and even the Panhandle has more of them than it once did—check your body carefully for them every few hours. Because they're small, ticks can be easy to miss. Look carefully. Ticks are opportunists, and will attach to any body part from head to toe.

Outdoor hobbies such as hunting, camping and hiking can also increase the likelihood of exposure to hantavirus, an infection spread to people by infected rodents such as mice and rats. Early symptoms of hantavirus are also flu-like. Hantavirus can quickly lead to extreme difficulty in breathing, possibly even followed by death. Antibiotics will not cure a hantavirus infection. Prevention is the best treatment.

A rodent may have hantavirus in its droppings, urine, and saliva, and a human can become infected just by breathing dust that contains the virus. When cleaning cabins, sheds, or barns, it's a good idea to wear a dust mask. Chances of contracting hantavirus are increased if you don't.

Discriminating deer and feral hog hunters shouldn't tackle the job of field dressing their game without donning latex gloves. Deer can carry the bacterium that causes anthrax in humans. Feral hogs are a carrier of brucellosis. The gloves are not only a protection against disease, but keep you a lot neater in performing this work and simplify your clean-up.

In many parts of Texas, rabies is another deadly disease shared by humans and animals. This viral infection of the nervous system can impact almost any warm-blooded animal.

Rabies is present in many wild animal populations in Texas, and is especially prevalent among skunks, bats, raccoons, coyotes, and foxes.

Humans usually are infected by a bite by a rabid animal. Avoiding touching dead animals or attempting to assist injured wild animals is also advised.

Outdoor enthusiasts who might potentially contract diseases caused by contact with the above-mentioned insect and animal sources might want to consider carrying a Medical Alert card. The card can be used to advise doctors that it might be wise to check them for maladies related to insect or animal-borne diseases. Such a card can be carried in a fan-folded card/photo holder in a billfold.

Taking a few precautions to protect against contact with critter-borne diseases can make for a much more enjoyable and worry-free fall of outdoor activities as hunting seasons get underway and more Texans are in the fields and woods.

Slay settles for silver

American grapplers both place second after surging into freestyle finals

SYDNEY, Australia (AP) — Americans Brandon Slay and Sammie Henson each were denied gold medals in the freestyle wrestling finals. Slay fell 4-0 to Alexander Leipold of Germany in a 167 1/2 pound-match; Henson lost 4-3 to Namig Abdullayev of Azerbaijan at 119 pounds. Four other Americans are still alive in the tournament, having reached the quarterfinals of their divisions.

Wanted gold, got bronze. Sound familiar?

Lance Armstrong's Olympic dream ended Saturday just the way Marion Jones' did the night before — with a medal of the wrong color. Then, Jones wound up with yet another third-place finish.

As some big U.S. stars faltered, it was left to other Americans to earn gold at the Sydney Games on a day when a whopping 41 events were decided.

The favored men's 400-meter relay team, anchored by Maurice Greene, won going away. In sailing, Mark

Reynolds rallied to victory.

Armstrong came to the Sydney Games in search of the gold medal that eluded him in Atlanta four years ago, a time when he had undiagnosed testicular cancer.

The star cyclist recovered from the disease, resumed racing and won the Tour de France in 1999 and 2000. But he couldn't catch his Tour teammate from the U.S. Postal Service squad, Russian Viacheslav Ekimov, in the Olympic time trial Saturday. Ekimov finished the 33-mile course in 57 minutes, 40 seconds.

Armstrong was third in

58:14. He also competed in the road race Wednesday, finishing 13th.

Jones settled for bronze in the women's long jump Friday, ending her bid for five track and field golds at a single Olympics.

She won the 100 and 200 meters earlier this week, but missed another opportunity for gold in the 400 relay Saturday.

The United States had two bad passes, including one from Nanceen Perry to Jones, who anchored the team. She caught the French anchor down the final stretch to put the Americans in third, but

ran out of room before she could move up further.

Jones also was the anchor for the women's 1,600 relay, one of Saturday's last events.

— **TRACK AND FIELD:** The U.S. men's 400-relay team was ready for its close-up after blasting around the track in 37.61 seconds, several strides ahead of second-place Brazil. Wearing American flags like capes and bandanas, 100-meter champ Greene and his teammates posed like rock stars for photographers and the sellout Olympic Stadium crowd.

The women's 1,500 meters wasn't so much fun for the

United States.

Suzi Favor Hamilton led in the last lap but slowed and crashed down on the track. She got up and crossed the line last, then needed a wheelchair to get off the track.

— **CANOE-KAYAK:** The U.S. four-man kayak team made the finals of the 1,000-meter race for the first time, but that was as good as it got for the Americans.

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Giambi leads A's past Texas

Oakland in front of Seattle

OAKLAND, Calif. (AP) — Jason Giambi hit his 42nd homer and the Oakland Athletics see-sawed past Seattle into the AL West lead with a 7-5 victory Friday night over the Texas Rangers.

Randy Velarde's go-ahead, two-run single in the sixth inning sent the A's to a half-game edge over the Mariners, who lost to Anaheim 9-3. Cleveland is one game behind Seattle for the wild card spot.

Velarde singled off Francisco Cordero (1-2) to break a 3-all tie. In the same inning, Matt Stairs scored when Giambi's grounder was misplayed by third baseman Mike Lamb.

Giambi hit a solo homer in the fourth. He has 12 home runs, and 29 RBIs so far in September.

Jim Mecir (10-3) pitched two innings for the win. Jason Istringhausen worked the ninth for his 32nd save.

Texas closed to 6-5 in the eighth when Royce Clayton singled home a run and Chad Curtis had his third RBI groundout of the game. The A's got a run in the bottom half when third baseman Scott Sheldon made an error on Stairs' grounder.

The Athletics are hoping to gain some playoff ground against the AL's worst second-half team and avoid a trip to Tampa Bay for a makeup game Monday.

Olmedo Saenz hit an RBI single in the fifth to give the A's a 3-2 lead. But the Rangers tied it in the sixth on Curtis' RBI grounder.

Texas starter Kenny Rogers got a no-decision, leaving intact his streak at the Coliseum.

Rogers, formerly with the A's, has won his last 17 decisions at the Coliseum, last losing on Aug. 7, 1994. It is the longest streak for a pitcher in a single ballpark since Minnesota's Frank Viola won 19 in a row at the Metrodome from May 27, 1987 to July 22, 1988.

Rogers went 4 1-3 innings, allowing three runs on five hits.

Curtis' grounder in the first inning was bobbled by shortstop Miguel Tejada and scored a run. Tejada had not made an error in a career-high 29 games.

Lamb scored on Sheldon's sacrifice fly in the fourth. Giambi homered to start the bottom half and Tejada scored on Eric Chavez's grounder.

Saenz's RBI single off Rogers in the fifth inning scored Velarde, who also singled. Velarde was 3-for-4.

Notes: Rangers pitching coach

Dick Bosman will not be back with the team next season, manager Johnny Oates said. Bosman, the Rangers' pitching coach for the past six years, was not with the team in Oakland for their three-game series against the Athletics. ... Luis Alicea walked to lead off the game, then left because of a strained left calf.

■ Estrada leads Brewers to win

HOUSTON (AP) — After beating the Houston Astros for the second time this year, Milwaukee's Horacio Estrada is trying to make a lasting impression on Brewers management.

Estrada (3-0) allowed three runs on five hits and five walks in 5 1-3 innings, helping the Brewers beat the Astros 13-3 Friday night.

Estrada was making his first appearance in the majors since May 21. Before being sent down to Triple-A Indianapolis for three months and going 1-4 there, he picked up a victory in two innings of relief against the Astros on May 16.

"I had a good season in Triple A and I showed people down there that I can do it up here," Estrada said. "I hope this will give me a big chance next year to make this team."

"I'm going home to Venezuela and I'll be ready when spring training comes."

Estrada didn't allow a home run to the Astros, who set a National League record with 245.

"I had good command through the fifth inning," he said. "I made the correct pitches in some tough situations."

"I kept the ball down. That's what you have to do in this ballpark because the ball can go out so easy."

"I also had good defense behind me. In a game like this you just have to keep throwing strikes."

Manager Davey Lopes knew his rookie pitcher was excited.

"He did OK," Lopes said. "He was up early, then he settled down. It was OK for his first start in quite a while."

The Astros could do nothing right in losing their 90th game.

"It begins and ends with pitching," manager Larry Dierker said. "If we were able to protect leads, we'd be in a lot better shape."








ALLENDE: Chilean author wants U.S. to disclose fully its relationship with the brutal Pinochet regime

SAUSALITO, Calif. — At the wheel of her car and under the cover of darkness, Isabel Allende risked her life over and over again, maneuvering in the shadows of foreign embassies, becoming so familiar with the getaway routes that she knew exactly when and where to slow down so her passengers could jump out.

So many times, she watched with relief as they scaled the walls to freedom. She was fearful of her own fate but strongly believed that democratic rule would be restored in Chile. And she never really expected that one day, she, too, would have to escape the brutal dictatorship of Augusto Pinochet.

"I felt fear many times — a terrible fear," she says. "But I never asked myself if it was worthwhile. Of course, it was worthwhile. It was a country that had been the strongest democracy in Latin America and was at that moment un-

der a regime of terror, under a horrible military dictatorship."

The best-selling author of such books as "The House of the Spirits" and "Of Love and Shadows" thinks it's time that the United States fully disclose the relationship it had with the regime that terrorized her country for 17 years, leaving nearly 3,200 people dead or missing.

"We cannot build the future ignoring the mistakes of the past," says Allende in an interview at her office in Sausalito. "It is not about vengeance. ... It is about honoring those who died."

Under pressure from Congress, the Central Intelligence Agency recently posted on its Web site what is considered to be its most revealing document so far chronicling covert activities following the 1973 military coup in Chile.

In the report, the CIA admits its involvement with coup plotters, false propagandists

and assassins. It also describes efforts to influence news media against the author's cousin, Salvador Allende, a Marxist who in 1970 became the first socialist president to win a democratic election in Chile.

Allende blames the United States for trying to sabotage her cousin's leadership because "if they could destroy the Chilean experiment they would be able to stop the dream of a socialist government in Latin America."

"The foreign policy of the U.S. has been one of many disasters. ... They have supported dictatorships that they would never tolerate in this territory," Allende says. "It's like if, for example, in Chile we decide that we don't like the American government, so we create a program to sabo-

tage it and if it doesn't work we kill their president. That is what happened in Chile."

In 1973, the year of Pinochet's coup, Allende was a journalist, a wife and a mother of two young children. When she realized the unjustified actions of the army were not going to stop, she joined a group of friends and clergy members who wanted to restore a Democratic government to Chile.

Allende helped keep lists of the names of "desaparecidos" — the disappeared — and forwarded those lists to Amnesty International and other humanitarian organizations so they could try to find them. She also sent information about the locations of torture centers and the names of death squad soldiers.

"Many people gathered that information" and some paid for it with their lives," she said.

"Of Love and Shadows," translated into English in 1987, is based on the discovery in 1978 of 15 corpses in an abandoned mine near Santiago. The bodies were peasants who disappeared in police custody shortly after the coup.

Allende remembers hiding fugitives in her house and then helping plot their escapes. During one family's escape, she hid a baby between vegetables in a diplomat's car. The safest routes, she discovered, were over embassy walls,

after night fell and when security forces changed shifts.

"When the 'carabineros' were distracted or when there was change of guards we would pass with our cars as close as possible to the embassy. We already knew which embassies' walls were easier to jump," she recalls.

She had to make her own getaway in 1975, when she was blacklisted.

Robertson cautioning GOP not to take group for granted

WASHINGTON (AP) — A last-minute decision by George W. Bush to address the Christian Coalition — albeit from a movie-screen monitor — failed to mollify the organization's founder, who cautioned the Republican presidential nominee against taking his group of conservatives for granted.

The Texas governor initially wasn't scheduled to address the several thousand members attending this weekend's conference because he needed to prepare for the first presidential debate Tuesday, his aides said. But Bush now has decided to speak to the crowd today — from Texas.

Coalition president and founder Pat Robertson said Bush "thinks that he has the Christian base all locked up" and wants to focus on winning undecided voters in battleground states.

"I'm sophisticated enough to understand the strategy here, and it's a very deliberate and delicate strategy," Robertson said in an interview Friday.

"Whether that will do the job, I don't know." Bush, whose campaign kept the coalition in the background at the Republican National Convention this summer, has focused on moderates and swing voters, as opposed to Republicans in past years who counted on the Christian Coalition to help get out the vote.

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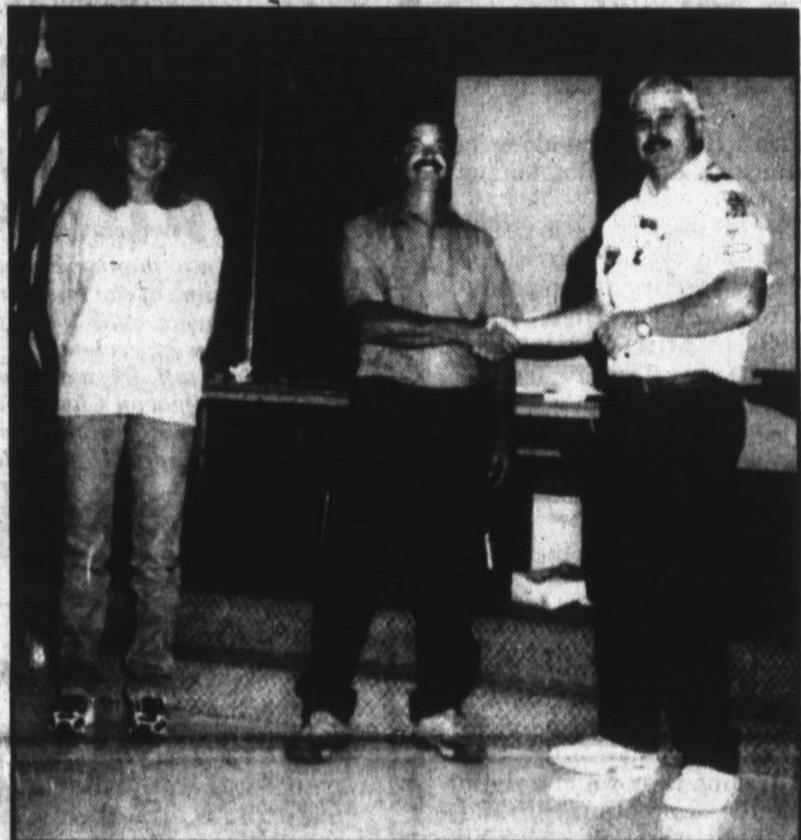

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YOUR EYES

Vitamin C Reduces Risk of Cataracts

A growing number of studies indicate that vitamin C is useful in preventing cataracts. Cataracts, a clouding of all or part of the lens of the eye, cause blurred or dimmed vision. They can result from injury, exposure to heat or radiation, or inherited factors. However, most appear to be part of the aging process. About 13 million Americans age 40 and older have cataracts.

The main role of vitamin C is in the manufacture of collagen. This protein forms the basis of connective tissue, the most abundant tissue in the body, and acts as a cementing substance between cells. It helps support and protect blood vessels, bones, joints, organs and muscles, and forms a sizable proportion of skin, tendons, the cornea of the eye, ligaments, cartilage, teeth and bone. Collagen forms a protective barrier against infection and disease, and promotes healing of wounds, fractures and bruises.

Approximately a dozen studies have shown that taking 300 milligrams or more of ascorbic acid daily decreases the risk of developing age-related cataracts. The typical American gets only 110 milligrams a day. People at risk of a cataract should be taking vitamin C supplements or eating significant amounts of foods that contain ascorbic acid. Good sources are fresh fruits and vegetables, including citrus fruits, tomatoes, brussels sprouts, spinach and other dark leafy green vegetables.

As I sat in his office, he made a startling announcement. "I'm going to do something this fall I've never done before," he said. As I looked at this successful small-business owner, I couldn't help but wonder what it was he'd never done. Was he taking his wife on an ocean cruise? Was he traveling to New England to see the fall color? Or, was he taking up mountain climbing?

Finally, another visitor in his office asked, "What are you going to do?"

"I'm going to vote in the presidential election," he stated proudly. Then he went on to say that always before he had reasoned that his one vote was too little to matter. It wouldn't make any difference in the big picture. This year he felt differently. There was too big a difference in the candidates running for president to ignore. He would register, and he would vote.

Frankly, I was shocked that this successful, bright and articulate businessman was a non-voter. It made me wonder how many other business folks do not vote because they feel the same way. Maybe some of you reading this column today aren't registered to vote. If your excuse is that your vote doesn't matter, think again.

I remember something that Benjamin Franklin wrote that proves how seemingly unimportant things do make a big difference in life. Franklin's adage goes like this: "For the want of a nail the shoe was lost, For the want of a shoe the horse was lost, For the want of a horse a rider was lost, For the want of a rider the battle was lost, For the want of a battle the kingdom was lost. And all for the want of a horse-shoe nail."

For Want of a Vote

Your vote is important. Use it wisely, use it often, but most important use it. Don't worry that another person's vote might cancel yours. If you don't vote, the other person might just swing the election.

One vote does matter. Let me share a little history with you. In 1649, one vote caused Charles I of England to be

executed. In 1875, one vote changed France from a monarchy to a democracy. In 1876, one vote gave Rutherford B. Hayes the presidency of the United States. In 1923, one vote gave Adolph Hitler leadership of the Nazi Party. In 1941, one vote saved Selective Service just weeks before the attack on Pearl Harbor. In 1960, John F. Kennedy would have lost the election to Nixon if Nixon had received just one more vote per precinct in Illinois and three more votes per precinct in Missouri and New Jersey. In 1993, one vote gave the United States the largest tax increase in the history of the World. Every vote matters.

Between the Covers

We're coming down to the wire now. It's getting serious. The cabling is strung and the electrical work is done. A FedEx truck has just delivered two boxes of our Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation Grant computers, with more on the way. It's almost like Christmas! Almost...

What may not be obvious to the general public, and what was not at first obvious to library staff, is all the accompanying adjustments that must be made. Some of the necessary adjustments will not be immediately apparent. We are in process of revising our Internet Policy to reflect changing technology, increased responsibility, and patron demand.

Probably the biggest change will be the use of Internet by children. We will now require a personally signed parental permission form for any child under the age of 18. Children in sixth grade or below will be required to have a parent sitting with them to be able to use the Internet. While it may seem somewhat restrictive, this policy is not unusual throughout the country, and is comparable to policies of the Hereford Independent School District. It is for the protection of our children as well as the Deaf Smith County Library. It is our conviction that, as it is with print material, supervision of access to electronic materials should be the responsibility of parents.

As with any change, the transition to this policy will not be without its inconveniences. Parents will have to come in the library to sign the forms for the kiddos to use the Internet. We will also be imposing a one hour time limit for computer use. For a while, until patrons and staff are trained and adjusted, it may be troublesome, but with time and experience everything should level out to a workable and beneficial system for everyone.

A representative of the Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation will be here to set up the new equipment and staff on Oct. 5-6. The library will be closed on those days to allow staff to concentrate on learning to manage all the new technology. This means that students will need to plan ahead to get needed research material before these days.

We are also planning an Open House on Thursday, Oct. 5, so that you may ask the Gates representative all the things we have forgotten to ask. We'll let you know for sure when the plans are finalized.

The software that is coming with these computers is phenomenal. They won't be just for Internet. We will have Encarta Encyclopedia, World Atlas, and Research Organizer (which helps with writing

research papers), as well as word processing, spreadsheet, and database programs.

The children's software includes 14 children's books (Magic School Bus, Dr. Seuss, Mercer Mayer, and others) and math, science, and reading tutorials.

One of our Gates computers has been pre-loaded with Spanish software. Word processing, database, spreadsheet, Encarta Encyclopedia, Encarta Atlas Mundial, four children's books, and Windows NT 4.0 are all provided for the Spanish speaker, or rather Spanish reader.

It is exciting new territory which we will explore together. We appreciate the cooperation of the best bunch of supporters a library ever had—the citizens of Deaf Smith County, Texas.

Rebecca and I heard a little bit of library trivia at the Texas Panhandle Library System meeting. Did you know that there are more libraries in the world than there are McDonald's restaurants? Amazing! There are more library cards than Visa credit cards. Libraries are pretty big stuff!

At your Deaf Smith County Library this week, these are among the new books available:

The Chief: The Life of William Randolph Hearst by David Nasaw is largely based on private and business paper and interviews that were unavailable to previous biographers. Newly released documentation of Hearst's interactions with Hitler, Mussolini, Churchill and every American President from Grover Cleveland to Franklin Roosevelt, as well as with movie giants Louis B. Mayer, Jack Warner, and Irving Thalberg, completes the picture of this colossal American.

Did you ever wonder what happened to Gary Burghoff (Radar O'Reilly of *M*A*S*H*)? Remember how Radar had a pet orphanage populated by a menagerie of Korean War refugee animals? There may have been more of Gary Burghoff in Radar than we thought. Burghoff has a new book out, *The Wonderful Thing About Pets*.

This is a collection and celebration documenting the surprising and wonderful ways animals have expressed their love for the people and other animals in their lives. You will read about the hamster who consistently outpicks the pros at football pools and the dog who is more miserly than Ebenezer Scrooge. From the heroic iguana who saved its owner's life to the rabbit who acts as a "Seeing Eye Dog" to another rabbit, it looks like this one is a real heart warmer.

Helen Hath No Fury is the new Amanda Pepper Mystery by Gillian Roberts. In the stately 19th-century homes on Philadelphia's Delancy Street, the wilder passions scarcely ruffle the peace. Murder is unimaginable, particularly a murder involving an upscale book discussion group. Of which school-teacher Amanda Pepper is a devoted member.

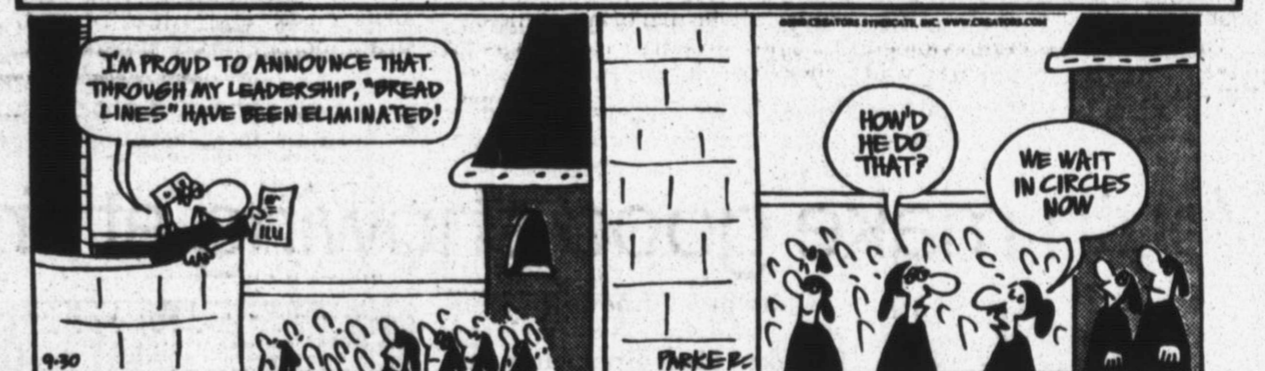

run out. Murder is only the first complication as Marti and Vik are left with more questions than answers.

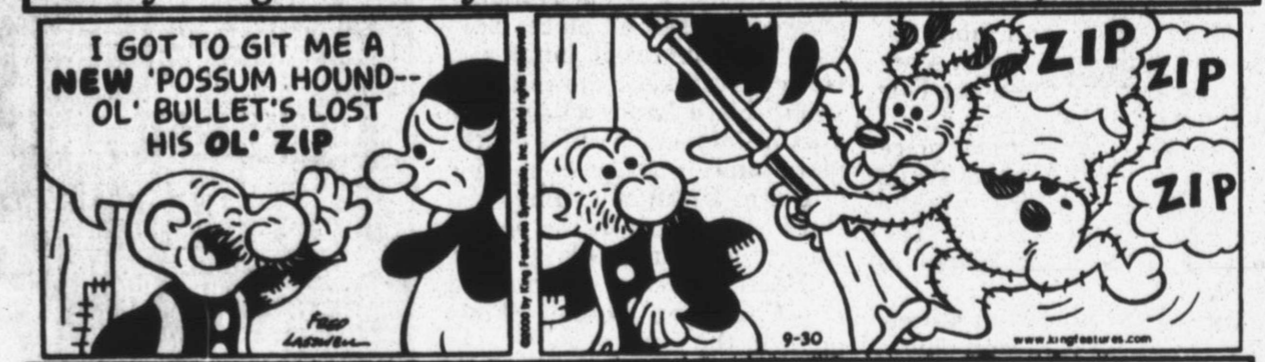

Local grain harvest complete

Yields fall way below last year's bumper crop

Only stubble remains in the fields. Birds settle in the dusty furrows to consume the scattered grains and local elevators are weighing the year's take.

This year's take is a good news-bad news situation, Dale Artho, a member of the National Grains Sorghum Producers board, said.

"The good news is the local elevators have room to take all the local harvest," he said. "The bad news is there isn't much sorghum. Some of the elevators may have some left over from last year, but not even all the irrigated sorghum survived the drought. There won't be much sorghum going to the elevators and there isn't going to be much sorghum silage."

Artho said the harvest in the northern growing regions may be producing a high yield, but full reports have not yet come in to his office.

Local elevator reports confirm what the National Board from Abernathy has already stated: heavy test weights, good quality, low yield.

The USDA estimates this year's sorghum harvest will be 62 million bushels less than last year. Exports and ending stocks are also expected to decrease.

Texas Agricultural Extension Service director Scott Durham of San Angelo said most of the sorghum crop has been harvested, but most crops failed due to the drought.

Corn news is a little better, at least as far as the quantity.

By mid-week, Hereford Grain manager Joe Artho reported local corn harvest was about 98 percent complete.

"The tests weight was excellent and so was the quality, but we only had about 50 percent of last year's crop," he said. "It was a little dry, which causes it to crack and problems handling the grain, but it's not bad."

Cark King, president of the Texas Corn Growers Association, agreed with

Artho, but he added there will problems in the future if the price of corn does not rise.

"We saw a lot less corn planted this year, maybe 50 percent as much as last year, and we're going to see less and less planted if the prices don't come up. We need to do something

about the prices and the cost of fuel," King said.

The apparent shortage of grain could possibly cause large cattle feeders to look farther afield for adequate supplies of cattle feed, but some feeders say they will be able to get what they need within a 150-mile radius.

"We should be able to get all the grain we need between here and Dalhart," Jeff Matsler, manager at Great Plains Feeders, said. "Most of it will come through the two new terminals in Hereford and we'll buy some from the farmers, but mostly we'll get it from the area elevators."

Matsler said his operation brings in about 180 loads of corn month, which is about 8 million to 9 million pounds.

Matsler and other feed yard managers are less worried about the price of the grain than they are about the price of transporting the grain to the lots.

"The cost of transport is really affecting us because of the cost of diesel," Matsler said.

While some feeders will be able to meet their needs locally, others will be turning to the Midwest where a bumper crop of corn can be purchased and transported cheaper than the feeds locally.

"The grain from the Midwest is so much cheaper it can nearly be brought in with less expense than the local feeds," said Guy Walker, owner of Dawn Cattle Feeders.

Regardless of where the feeders get their grain, Joe Artho isn't worried about being left with a great supply.

"We couldn't even supply one feedlot with what they need for a year," he said. "We'll sell all our grain and be ready to store any that needs to come in."

Corn storage at Hereford Grain is nearing capacity. Administrators of Farmland Industries and ADM would not comment on the quantity of grain being held in storage.

Tierra Blanca SWCD office holds elections

An election of a soil and water conservation district director to serve in Zone 4 of the Tierra Blanca Soil and Water Conservation District is scheduled for 8-11 a.m., October 11 at 815 W. Third, announced chairman of the board Jerry Homfeld.

State law decrees voters must own agricultural land within the district where the election is being held, live in the county served by the district and must be at least 18-years-old.

Candidates must own land in the zone they represent, be 18 years old, live in the county served by the district and be actively engaged in farming and ranching. Directors will serve four year terms.

Zone 4 consists of the portion of Deaf Smith County within the following boundaries: beginning at the northeast corner of section 25, block K-3; thence west to

the northwest corner of section 8, TWP 3 N, Range 3E; thence south to the Farmer County line to a point south of the Southeast corner of section 63, block M-7 on the Castro County line; thence north to the point of origin.

Current members of the board are Homfeld, chairman; Carl Kleuskens, vice chairman; David L. Wagner, secretary; and members, Bill Walden and Nick Yosen.

The purpose of the Tierra Blanca Soil and Water Conservation District is to promote sound soil and water conservation programs on agricultural lands within the district and to serve as a voice for farmers, ranchers and local community entities on conservation matters.

All conservation programs managed by the district are of a voluntary nature to the landowner, operator or other potential users of the SWCD's Programs.

Weevil eradication progressing

ABILENE, Texas (AP) — An aggressive boll weevil eradication has wiped out the problem in the San Angelo area and made drastic gains in attacking the problem in other parts of the state's primary cotton areas, officials of the Texas Boll Weevil Eradication Foundation said Monday.

During last spring's planting season, traps were placed in fields to allow employees of the foundation to monitor weevil activity in fields more precisely and to make treatment decisions based on the information obtained.

As the growing season progressed, only the portions of fields with sufficient weevil activity were treated, resulting

in preservation of beneficial insects that prey on other cotton pests, officials said.

The areas east and south of the Odessa-Midland area have reported few if any boll weevils this year, and the reduction in South Texas is 93 percent from 1996 levels.

Reductions of weevil numbers in excess of 90 percent from 1996 levels have been reported in other cotton-growing areas of Texas.

The eradication foundation said it will be aggressive in treating for weevils this fall to reduce the number of weevils that hibernate for the winter, meaning fewer weevils would emerge to be dealt with in the spring.

Youth make good showing at Tri-State Fair

The senior Deaf Smith County 4-H livestock judging team composed of Seth Hoelscher, Jerad Johnson, Joanna Olson and Justin Johnson, captured first place in three areas and had the highest-ranking overall score last week at the Tri-State Fair in Amarillo.

The team won first place honors in judging beef, swine and reasons, racking up the highest overall score. The team claimed third place in sheep judging.

In overall individual scores, Hoelscher was second high, Jerad Johnson was fourth, Olson placed 11th and Justin Johnson was 12th. Jerad Johnson was first in swine, second in reasons and third in beef; Hoelscher scored third in swine, fifth in sheep, and sixth in beef and reasons. Olson garnered a fifth place in beef and eighth in swine and reasons. Justin Johnson was eighth in beef and 10th in reasons.

A second senior team, composed of Josh Hicks, Jordan Hicks and Gary Brown, placed eighth in overall scores.

Junior judging team, made of Chelsea Campbell, Ryan Buchanan, Brandon Beavers, Kelly Schlabs, and Katie Skarke, placed second high score overall.

Campbell won third high individual, first in swine and third in beef. Ryan Buchanan placed sixth overall and won first in sheep judging and 11th in swine.

Deaf Smith County youth showing animals at the fair also did well.

Champion finewool lamb was shown by Kristen Huffaker. Macy Brannon placed fifth. Amanda Smith claimed fifth place in the second class of Southdowns. Trent Huffaker showed the second place, class five, medium wool lamb and Holly Huffaker showed the fourth place lamb, followed by Justin Johnson with the fifth place lamb.

Deiter Brannon claimed the third place lamb in the eighth class of medium wools.

Jared Johnson was named the Champion Senior Showman in the lamb show.

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Switchgrass replaces coal for electricity

MILLERTON, Iowa (AP) — Growing switchgrass, a native prairie grass, for its environmental benefits also could produce profits for farmers if it is burned instead of coal to produce electricity.

If test burns at Alliant Energy's generating plant in Ottumwa succeed, the future for switchgrass could be bright.

Replacing 5 percent of the Wyoming coal now burned at the plant would require 200,000 tons of switchgrass a year.

Other issues being investigated include the economics and agronomics of growing switchgrass as well as the environmental benefits, said John Sellers Jr., who coordinates the Chariton Valley Biomass Project.

Modern design cloaked in rustic beauty

Handsome square columns and decorative roof supports draw eyes to the Heartford's vaulted entry.

cabinets are in plentiful supply. The handy work island and large walk-in pantry add yet more useful space.

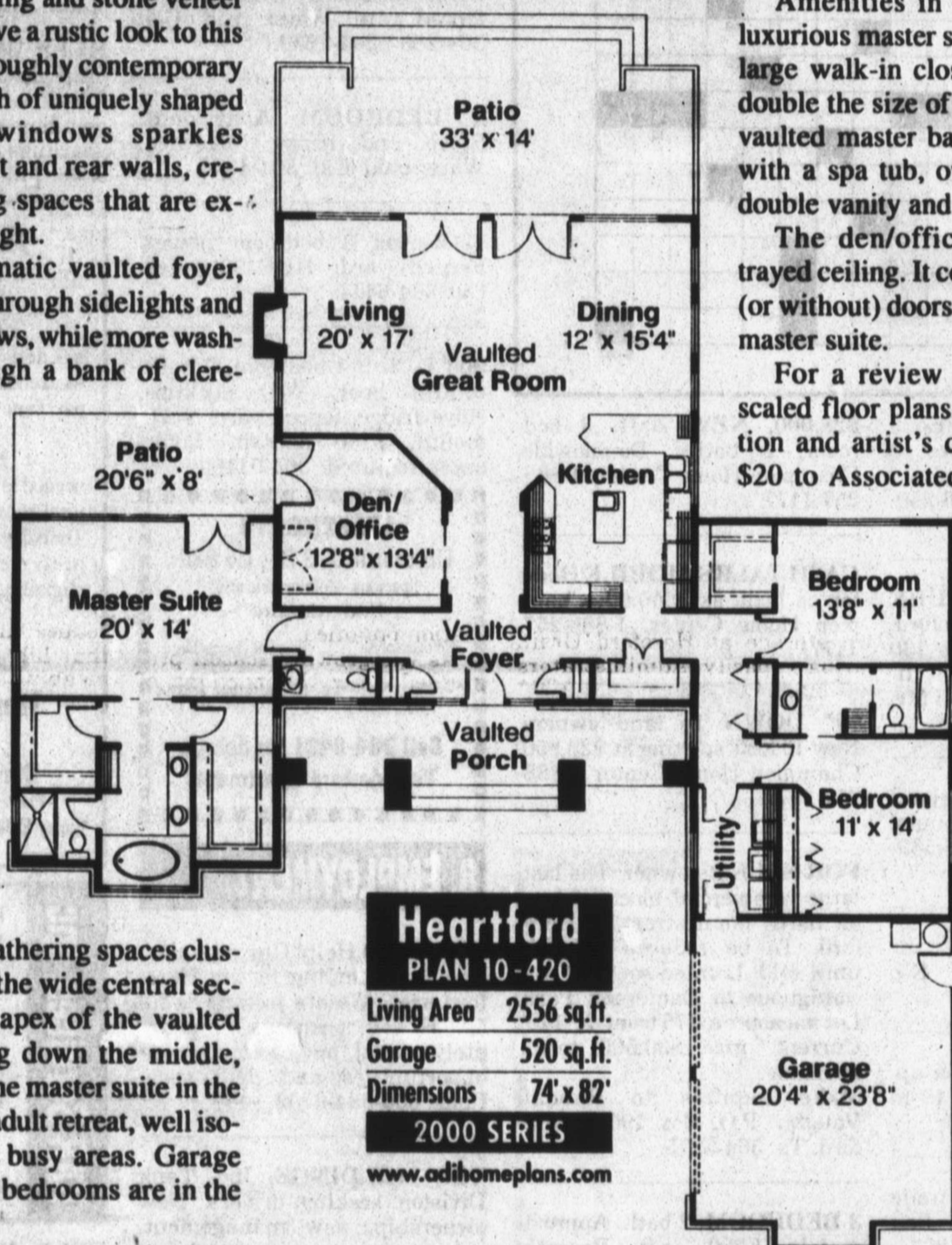
Utilities are in a passthrough room that connects to the garage.

Pentecostal author makes case for women in pulpit

CISCO, Texas — Thelma Hostetter has news for anyone claiming the Bible prohibits women from preaching: And its Good News.

Hostetter, a Cisco Pentecostal evangelist, has just published a book on the subject titled "Pentecostal Daughters...They Shall Prophesy." The book is subtitled "Women in Preaching Ministry."

For every Bible verse that the Southern Baptist Convention, or anyone else, can toss out claiming proof against women preachers, Hostetter can top them. In fact, she claims in her book that approximately 100 scriptures support women ministers as opposed to the two most cited by opponents: 1 Corinthians 14:34 and 1 Timothy 2:8-9.

For further proof that

women can indeed be effective ministers, Hostetter just looks in the mirror. Now 69, Hostetter began preaching the night she was invited to a Christmas play at an Assembly of God Church in Odessa at age 15.

Like all people who profess to be Pentecostals, Hostetter received "baptism by the Holy Spirit" or the gift of speaking in tongues. She preached her

first sermon at the church after the Christmas service.

"The power came within me and I preached Jesus that night," Hostetter said. "I've been preaching ever since. I never stopped."

Many women received that same power in Pentecostalism dating back to the beginning of the denomination in the late 1800s and early 1900s. Where women are often kept

from the pulpit in other denominations, they've found a welcome mat in Pentecostalism, which takes its name from the Day of Pentecost.

According to scripture, Jesus' disciples received the Holy Spirit that day, which falls 50 days after Easter.

As Pentecostals see it, women are just as qualified as men to spread the gospel of

Jesus Christ from the pulpit. "They've always given women the freedom to preach," Hostetter said.

How do you even start to describe a show like NBC's new *Titans*?

The network itself, making a virtue of necessity, is using the phrase "guilty pleasure" to describe the new Aaron Spelling series, which premieres Wednesday, Oct. 4.

That's a neat enough tag, but it really doesn't even begin to convey the high-calorie excesses of a show aimed at viewers who believe that too much of a good thing is wonderful.

Like Spelling's earlier hit *Dynasty*, *Titans* is set among the rich, beautiful and messed up. As the story opens, dashing fighter pilot Chandler Williams (Casper Van Dien) returns home to Beverly Hills and finds his wealthy adoptive father, Richard (Perry King), about to marry a much younger woman, to the disgust of ex-wife Gwen (Victoria Principal), a trendy club owner whose mansion is directly across the street from Richard's.

Chandler is shocked to discover that Dad's bride-to-be is none other than Heather (Yasmine Bleeth), a scheming young beauty who was dancing the horizontal hula with Chandler in Hawaii just a few months earlier. Also eyeing the impending nuptials suspiciously are Chandler's conniving brother, Mason (John Barrowman), who would love to take over the family business, and sisters Jenny and Laurie (Elizabeth Bogush, Josie Davis), one a recovering alcoholic, the other a take-charge control freak.

Complications ensue, especially in the final scene when Heather makes a devastating revelation to Chandler just as he walks her down the aisle. (Let's just say that when it comes to "carrying something new," Heather doesn't mess around.)

The above synopsis can't even hint at the jaw-dropping audaciousness of *Titans*, a show so wildly over the top that

it makes those old Ross Hunter-produced Lana Turner melodramas look positively austere by comparison.

The cast manages the frequently ludicrous dialogue with varying degrees of finesse, and two players actually triumph: Both Bleeth and Barrowman clearly understand and embrace the cheese surrounding them, and they play their scenes with a smart comic gusto. Bleeth seems to have studied Carol Burnett's hilarious *Sunset Boulevard* parodies for inspiration, while Barrowman makes Mason — a charming, frequently tipsy fop on the surface — the most dangerous character on the show.

Having spent years as a victim on *Dallas*, Principal makes a strong-willed Gwen, but alas, the humor seems to escape her. Bogush and Davis show promise in parts that are, respectively, trite and underwritten in the premiere, and King's character reportedly is being written out after a few episodes.

That leaves Van Dien, a handsome slab of mahogany who simply doesn't have the acting chops to make his wooden character interesting. His Chandler seems to exist only as an object of male beauty, and he's even filmed in the kind of carefully placed lighting that screen divas such as Dietrich and Garbo used to receive.

Will viewers take a shine to *Titans*? Maybe, although the home of *Law & Order* and *The West Wing* seems an odd address for this style-over-substance material.

But while many viewers will greet this show with understandable shock if not outright horror, others will find that it goes so far into terrible that it comes out irresistible. *Titans* is a perfectly awful show in the very best sense of that phrase.

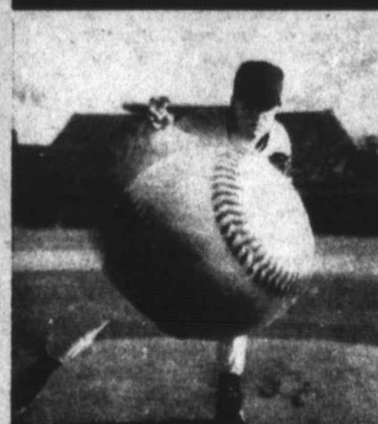
