

Temperatures on Thursday included 81 in Austin, 79 in Port Arthur, 79 in Corpus Christi and 81 in McAllen.



# Gasoline, heating oil fuel wholesale price increase

WASHINGTON (AP) - Wholesale prices February. Car prices posted their biggest increase in five years and food costs rose for the first time in five months.

The seasonally adjusted advance in the Producer Price Index came after wholesale prices fell in August, the first decline in four months, the Labor Department reported today.

Retail sales rose a stronger-than-expected 0.9 percent in September mostly reflecting strong car sales, which went up by 1.4 percent. Still, excluding automobiles, retail sales rose a brisk 0.7 percent.

In the first 90 minutes of trading on Wall Street, stocks were reclaiming some of Thursday's big losses. The Dow Jones industrial average was up 97 points and the Nasdaq index had gained 71 points.

September's report on wholesale prices was a worse showing on inflation than the 0.5 percent rise many analysts were anticipating.

The 0.9 percent increase marked the biggest one-month gain since a 1.1 percent spike in wholesale prices in February.

Much of September's jolt came from a 9.3 percent increase in gasoline prices, the largest increase since June, and a 13.4 percent increase in heating oil, the biggest rise since

naled that further rate increases were possible because of rising energy prices. So far this year, wholesale prices have been rising at an annual rate of 4.1 percent, compared with a 3 percent gain for all of 1999. The pickup in this year's wholesale prices

largely reflects rising energy costs. In September, energy prices soared by 3.7 percent, the largest gain in three months, after falling by 0.2 percent in August.

Crude-oil prices have risen sharply this year as the Organization of Petroleum Exporting Countries limited production and U.S. supplies shrank. In September, prices hit a 10year high of \$37.80 a barrel.

Prices had moderated in recent weeks after President Clinton ordered the release of oil from the government's emergency reserves.

# Officials at plans

## ■ Engineers, architects discuss ideas for county's secure juvenile center

Hereford Brand Staff Writer The work moves on.

Engineers, architects, school district and city officials discussed preliminary plans for a Deaf Smith County secure juvenile detention center Thursday at the Hereford Independent School District Administration Build

Architects and designers pre for an 88-bed facility, which would be house in a 56,000-square-foot building.

Robert Jennings, senior vice president of the Public Facilities Investment Corp., said the planned facility would require about 7 acres, which would allow for future growth, parking and the peripheral grounds.

The facility, should the community decide to build it, will provide individual cells rather than dormitory-style housing, classrooms, detention cells, minor medical care facilities and areas for visitors and court hearings

When questioned about individual locking cells as compared to dormitory-style housing, Jennings explained dorms are much cheaper to build, but dorms would not meet Texas Youth Commission guidelines and would eliminate a number of possible high-paying con-

The big question centered around the cost of building and operating the facility, as well as the probability of attracting contracts from

"This facility cannot be built for \$100 square foot," said Curtiss J. Farde, the arch tect who has designed the plans. "Mainly because this is an I3 facility with many security features which will drive up the costs."

I3 facilities fall under the guidelines for secure juvenile facilities, which protect inmates from other inmates and add to the rehabilitation of those incarcerated.

"We will release a report next week with all the numbers," Jennings said. "First, we wanted to get your opinion on the plans and see where we would need to go from here."

"At this time, we didn't even want to put out figures until we knew which size facility the county would be looking at," Jennings

In the final report, Jennings will present the cost of building a 44-bed unit, a 72-bed unit or the 88-bed unit which would go with the plans presented.

At full capacity, the facility would have between 30 and 35 full-time employees, with the probability of a few more part-timers.

As far as keeping the facility full or nearly so, Deaf Smith County Juvenile Probation Officer Lou Serrano said he is sure that would not create a problem because so many juvenile facilities throughout the state are at capacity and counties are always looking for another place for their juvenile offenders.

## ■ Death toll in bombing of U.S. ship at 17; explosion jolts British Embassy

ADEN, Yemen (AP) — The presumed death toll in the bombing of the U.S. Navy warship in Yemen rose to 17 on Friday, while an explosion rocked the British Embassy 200 miles away in the Yemeni

Windows shattered but nobody was hurt at the embassy in San'a. Britain's foreign secretary said a bomb may have been flung into

embassy grounds. Authorities were investigating. The new attack came as American military planes evacuated 22 of the 35 sailors injured in Thursday's blast to Germany for medical treatment.

## Cheney: Attack means military needs more money

ST. LOUIS (AP) — The apparent terrorist bombing of a U.S. warship near Yemen has provided Dick Cheney with a potent anecdote in calling for a stronger national defense and highlighted his experience in dealing with military threats.

While careful not to assign blame in Thursday's attack on a Navy ship, which killed six sailors and injured 35, Cheney, former defense secretary in the Bush administration, said the incident is a reminder that "it's still a hostile and dangerous world out

"It's relatively easy to sit back and say look, the Cold War is over with, nothing to worry about, why should we spend any time concerned about the U.S. military today," Cheney said at an American Legion hall in Ohio. "And then something happens such as happened this morning and we lose sailors.

With less than four weeks to go before the election, voters must decide, Cheney said, "which team offers the best prospects in doing what needs to be done to make sure we have

the pre-eminent military in the world" - the GOP ticket of Texas Gov. George W. Bush and Cheney, who helped plan the successful 1991 Persian Gulf War, or the Democratic pairing of Vice President Al Gore and Joseph Lieberman.

News of the ship bombing came as Cheney embarked on a rambling bus tour through west central Ohio, where he stopped at a

# Millions not receiving supp

## Census reports child support not being paid

WASHINGTON (AP) ing children without a father in the home in 1997 failed to get any child support payments owed them by the absentee parent, the Census Bureau reported.

Advocacy groups contend that number alone highlights glaring weaknesses of a child support system in transition. in spite of other census figures that show more custodial parents were getting full-time jobs and leaving public assistance programs.

Of the 6.3 million U.S. mothers owed child support from absentee fathers in 1997, roughly 30 percent or 1.99 million women, did not receive any payments, according to the Census data released Friday. In 1993, 1.72 million women owed support, or 29 percent, did not receive payments.

**About 42 percent**, or 289,000

of the 674,000 fathers owed child support in 1997 from absentee mothers did not receive any payments. That was down from 353,000 deadbeat mothers, or 45 percent, in 1993. in the same category.

The Census survey, taken every two years, is the nation's Nearly 2 million mothers rais- only estimate of all child support paid and owed across the country, including private agreements between parents. The Department of Health and Human Services has more recent figures, but only tracks cases that go through government collections systems.

"There have been some improvements in child support enforcement but it hasn't done enough," said Debbi Weinstein of the Children's Defense Fund.

"When you look at the figures of how much families with child support get, that can mean the difference between safe neighborhood or dangerous neighborhood, when it's collected," she said.

Child support enforcement was overhauled in 1996 as part of welfare reform. Since then there have been other new outreach initiatives such as helping fathers who cannot afford to pay child support find jobs — that improved the situation, HHS spokesman Michael Kharfen said. The full effects of reform

won't be seen until results from the 1999 survey come out next year since many states took years to make necessary changes, Kharfen said. "It shows early efforts to

improving the child support system," he said. "But this is still very encouraging news which is consistent with what we're seeing."

"How much time are we supposed to give it, though?" countered Bordy Brilling of Phoenix, who has been divorced since 1992 and has custody of two teen-age daughters. "It's been a constant battle through the years" getting child support from her husband in Georgia. He is now battling cancer.

"We don't know how it all works, and that's part of our frustration," said Philene O'Keefe, of Indian Hills, Nev. Since divorcing in 1998 and gaining custody of her 3-yearold daughter, O'Keefe says she received a child support check this week, the first one since January.

The report also said:

-45 percent of mothers living in poverty who were owed child support in 1997 received no payments, compared with 35 percent of impoverished mothers owed support in 1993.

-51.3 percent of all custodial parents had year-round, full-time jobs in 1997, up from 45.6 percent in 1993.

-the percentage of all custodial parents participating in at least one public assistance program such as food stamps or Medicaid fell to 34 percent in 1997, from 40.6 percent in

the proportion of all custodial parents receiving all the payments they were due increased from 34.1 percent in 1993 to 40.8 percent in 1997.

Sherry Steisel, human services director for the National Conference of State Legislatures, attributed the positive numbers to the good economy, and efforts to improve child support on the state level that began even before the 1996 reforms.

"We see the participation in public programs declining, and an increase in the number of agreements which is the first step in getting child support acknowledged," she said.

# Texas college enrollment lags

DALLAS (AP) -- Texas universities, despite record enrollments, still lag behind almost every other state in college-participation rates, according to a new report.

Postsecondary Education Opportunity, the nonpartisan group that tracks college entrance rates, says Texas ranks 45th out of 50 states in the percentage of 19-year-olds attending a postsecondary institution, with 31.3 percent. The national average is 39 percent, with North Dakota's 59.4 percent participation rate leading the states.

"The numbers we've looked at, by virtue of any measure, 19-year-olds, 15- to 34-yearolds, we still have fewer students participating in higher education when we compare ourselves to the most populous states," David Gardner, assistant commissioner for planning and information re- for enrollments on the 12th sources for the Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board, told The Dallas Morning News.

The college tracking group said California ranked 39th with 34.5 percent of 19-yearolds going to postsecondary institutions.

Total enrollment at Texas' public, four-year universities this fall has reached 415,417 students in a 2.1-percent increase over the year-ago period and a new record, beating the old total of 410,706 in 1992, the Coordinating Board said Thursday.

At all higher education institutions in the state, enrollment is up 3.1 percent this year at 990,403 students - an increase of 29,622 students compared to last fall.

The preliminary numbers were collected by the Higher Education Coordinating Board enrollment was 44,081.



NEW YORK (AP) — Allen Iverson will take steps to eliminate offensive lyrics from the final version of his rap album, NBA commissioner David Stern said Thursday after

meeting with Iverson at league headquarters.
Stern declined to fine or suspend Iverson but issued a strongly worded statement critical of the Philadelpois guard whose Philadelpnia guard, whose controversial rap recording contains violent references and derogatory terms about gays, women and blacks.

"It was a good meeting. I'm glad we had it. I'm glad he called me in," Iverson said prior to the 76ers' exhibition game against the Knicks. "It's important for me to be a professional about the whole thing I've got to play a season. My rap album is over. At this point, the only thing you can do is handle it like a man."

If Iverson did indeed agree to eliminate any of the lyrics, it would be a departure from his earlier stance. After a meeting with civil rights groups earlier this week, Iverson

Stern released a four-paragraph statement.

The lyrics that have been attributed to Allen Iverson's soon to be released rap CD are coarse, offensive and antisocial. However, I have come to understand, unfortunately, that certain rap artists regularly spew such lyrics to a wide audience at great profit to some of America's most successful entertainment companies.

"Notwithstanding the music's wide popularity, Allen, by even recording his lyrics, has done a disservice to himself, the Philadelphia 76ers, his teammates and perhaps all NBA players. However I do not believe that the NBA should be in the business of regulating artistic expression, no matter how repugnant, Stern said.

Iverson did not confirm whether he agreed to elimi-

nate any lyrics. A union official who accompanied Iverson to the meeting was not immediately available for comment. Stern's statement said Iverson had made a commitment to eliminate the offensive lyrics.

"If he doesn't follow through on that commitment, then he, along with the 76ers and the NBA, will merit whatever criticism may be leveled at us."



Gore then met for 30 minutes with President Clinton in the Oval Office, the first time Gore had been at the White House since June.

The Democratic presidential candidate resumed campaigning today in Iowa and Michi-

While Gore and Bush focused on high-minded policy

disputes, strategists continued to hammer away at misstate-ments from their second debate Wednesday night.

"The governor did make, in our opinion, serious errors," said Gore campaign chairman William Daley. "His record in Texas is squarely on the table for the public."

Bush's camp pointed to overnight surveys showing most thought Bush performed better in the debate as evidence that the Gore camp was grow-

ing desperate.
Gore aides jumped on Bush's comment about three Texans convicted in the dragging death of James Byrd. Bush said all three got the death penalty. In fact, only two were sentenced to death; the other, life imprisonment.

The Gore campaign also distributed a statement from Harvard law professor Laurence Tribe, who suggested the convictions could be "vulnerable to state and federal challenge" as a result.

Gore campaign spokesman Chris Lehane said the issue would be driven home.





NEW YORK (AP) — U.S. markets moved higher today, shaking off worries about esca lating tensions in the Middle East, high oil prices and a new economic report indicating that wholesale prices are rising faster than expected.

European markets were mixed, while Asian markets closed mostly lower.

After 45 minutes of trading, the Dow Jones industrial average rose 94.06 points to 10,128.66. The day before, the Dow fell nearly 380 points, its

fifth-biggest point loss ever, though the 3.6 percent decline did not even approach the top 25 percentage losses. Broader indicators were also

higher. The Standard & Poor's 500 index rose 19 points to 1,348.78. The Nasdaq composite index was up 90.92 points at 3,147.05, after closing at its lowest level of the year Thurs-

The move higher came even as the Labor Department reported that the producer price index shot up 0.9 percent in

September led by big jumps in the costs of gasoline and heating oil. While U.S. markets initially moved lower on the news, they quickly headed into positive territory as investors

began bargain-hunting.

Markets overseas for the most part opened lower following Thursday's developments, which included an apparent ter-rorist attack on a U.S. warship in Yemen and Israeli combat helicopters rocketing Palestinian positions in response to the killing of Israeli solders.

# **Budget bargainers narrow differences**

WASHINGTON (AP) - Budget bargainers have whittled their differences to three overdue spending bills, but fights over federal school aid, immigration and other hot political issues will keep Congress working at least into next week.

Four more spending bills for the new fiscal year worth more than \$160 billion won Senate approval Thursday, as lawmakers provided extra money for everything from the Internal Revenue Service to public housing. Easing passage were hundreds of millions of dollars in projects for legislators' home districts, a highly sought prize less than a month from Elec-

With President Clinton having signed three of the 13 spending measures and three more all but complete, three other bills remained that were still causing headaches. Senate Majority Leader Trent Lott. R-. be finished by next Thursday so Congress could adjourn and lawmakers could focus on reelection campaigns.

"At some point, everybody's got to get ambitious to complete the work and leave." Lott told reporters.

Democrats, however, chose to focus on education, a big issue in this year's presidential campaign. Clinton wants nearly \$3 billion to help communities hire teachers and rebuild schools, but Republicans want to give local officials freedom to use the money for which-ever educational needs they have.

"This is something that is needed and desired by voters all across this country," said House Minority Leader Dick Gephardt, D-Mo. "Let's do the one thing that most helps."

Twelve days after the start of fiscal 2001, the Senate gave

lion for the Treasury Department, \$2.5 billion for Congress' own operations, and a phaseout of the 3 percent federal tax on telephones. Senate passage was by 58-37, and Clinton's signature was expected.

The measure would also let members of Congress get a \$3,800 pay raise in January to \$145,100.

By 87-8, the Senate also ap-

proved two other bills that were combined: a \$107 billion measure financing veterans, housing, environment and science programs and a \$23.6 billion bill for energy and water projects. House passage was expected next week, and Clinton will sign the measure.

The three remaining bills cover six Cabinet departments, dozens of other agencies and foreign aid. Besides schools, they also carry disputes over Central American immigration, expanding hate crimes laws, hot-button issues.


Yet amid the parties' fingerpointing, their bargainers worked hand-in-hand to deliver projects for lawmakers from all

over the country.

The veterans-housing bill bore roughly \$900 million in homedistrict projects, including water and sewage grants, eco-nomic development aid and NASA research projects for universities.

These included \$35 million for drinking water/wastewater projects for rural Alaska, home of Senate Appropriations Committee Chairman Ted Stevens. Sen. Slade Gorton, R-Wash., who faces a tough re-election fight, took credit for \$8 million in projects. And North Dakota's congressional delegation won more than \$60 million for water and community development projects, including \$1.5 million to build a visitors' center in Williston, with exhibits on the Lewis and Clark expedition.

# Mideast leaders try to arrange sum

JERUSALEM (AP) - Clubwielding Israeli police beat back young Palestinians today outside the Jerusalem mosque that has been a flashpoint for recent clashes, while Israeli and Palestinian leaders were trying to arrange a weekend summit in Egypt.

Mediators are seeking to caim two weeks of fighting that escalated Thursday when two Israeli soldiers were mutilated by a mob of enraged Palestinians. Israel responded with combat helicopters that fired rockets at Palestinian targets — including the residential compound of Palestinian leader Yasser Arafat.

Israel and the Palestinians were close to arranging a summit for Saturday or Sunday that would include the United States, Egypt, Jordan and the United Nations, senior Palestinian officials said, speaking on condition of anonymity.

As a condition for attending, the Palestinians demanded that Israel withdraw its troops from the outskirts of Palestinian cities and lift its siege of Palestinian communities in the West Bank.

Prime Minister Ehud Barak's spokesman, Gadi Baltiansky, confirmed that negotiations on a summit were underway but said nothing had been decided.

Asked about the possibility of such a gathering, Arafat said, "The most important thing before a summit is to stop the aggression against

our people."

The Palestinian leader was asked if his security forces would attempt to arrest those responsible for killing the Is-raeli soldiers. "You know that we are making very serious investigation," he said. Israeli helicopters returned

to the Gaza Strip on Friday, hovering briefly over the port in Gaza City, though they did not fire. From the shore, Israeli gunboats were visible in the Mediterranean Sea.

Palestinians declared Friday a "day of rage," and scuffles broke out between police and young Palestinian men in Jerusalem's Old City as Muslims arrived for midday prayers at the Noble Sanctuary compound.

came from an external source, bolstering the contention that it was a terrorist attack. The ship was refueling in Yemen at

Western diplomats in Yemen said the explosion seemed to be the work of a well-organized group with good connections in the port of Aden who might have provided the bombers with some logistical support.

The diplomats, insisting on anonymity, said the boat used by the suicide bombers was similar to boats used by port authorities to guide vessels into port or facilitate ships with refueling.

Seven soldiers have been confirmed dead and the families of 10 who remain missing are being notified that they are presumed to have died, U.S. Navy spokeswoman Lt. Cmdr. Cate Mueller said in Washington. Efforts to recover their remains were continuing, she said.

Thursday's blast tore a hole 20 feet to 40 feet in diameter. U.S. officials say suicide bombers blew up a small boat next to the 9,100-ton destroyer.

The French Defense Ministry said Friday its army planes had taken 11 of the injured overnight to Bouffard military hospital in Djibouti, where six underwent surgery. Lt. Terrence Dudley, a U.S. Navy spokesman, said 22 others were evacuated Friday to Germany. Two, apparently less seriously hurt, remained in Aden.

In Germany, officials at the Ramstein Air Base said they were expecting bodies of the dead sailors to begin arriving later today and the injured late Friday or early Saturday. The injured were to be taken to the Landstuhl Regional Medical Center, a U.S. military facility.

Dudley said some of the injured USS Cole sailors were in serious condition and others were stable. He did not elaborate.

American investigators as well as U.S. Marines and soldiers filled Aden, bringing in equipment to search for clues beneath the water near the USS Cole. Sniffer dogs also were seen being brought to the area.

Dudley said investigators may keep working at the site another two days. The USS Cole, one of the world's most advanced warships, was left slightly tilted in Aden harbor.

"The ship took (in) some water and we are trying to dewater it. But, generally, it is seaworthy and we will tow it to the United States," said Dudley, of the Bahrain-based U.S.

5th Fleet.

The Cole is a \$1 billion guided missile destroyer homeported at Norfolk, Virginia. It was heading with a crew of
about 350 to the Gulf for maritime intercept operations in
support of the U.N. embargo against Iraq.
U.S. embassies in the Middle East said Friday they had
been ordered by the State Department to close public operations until Monday in light of developments in Yemen and
escalating violence in the West Bank and Gaza Strip.
