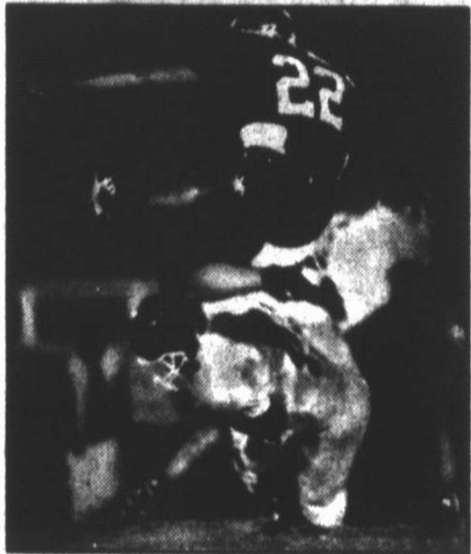

TURNING back
the CLOCK

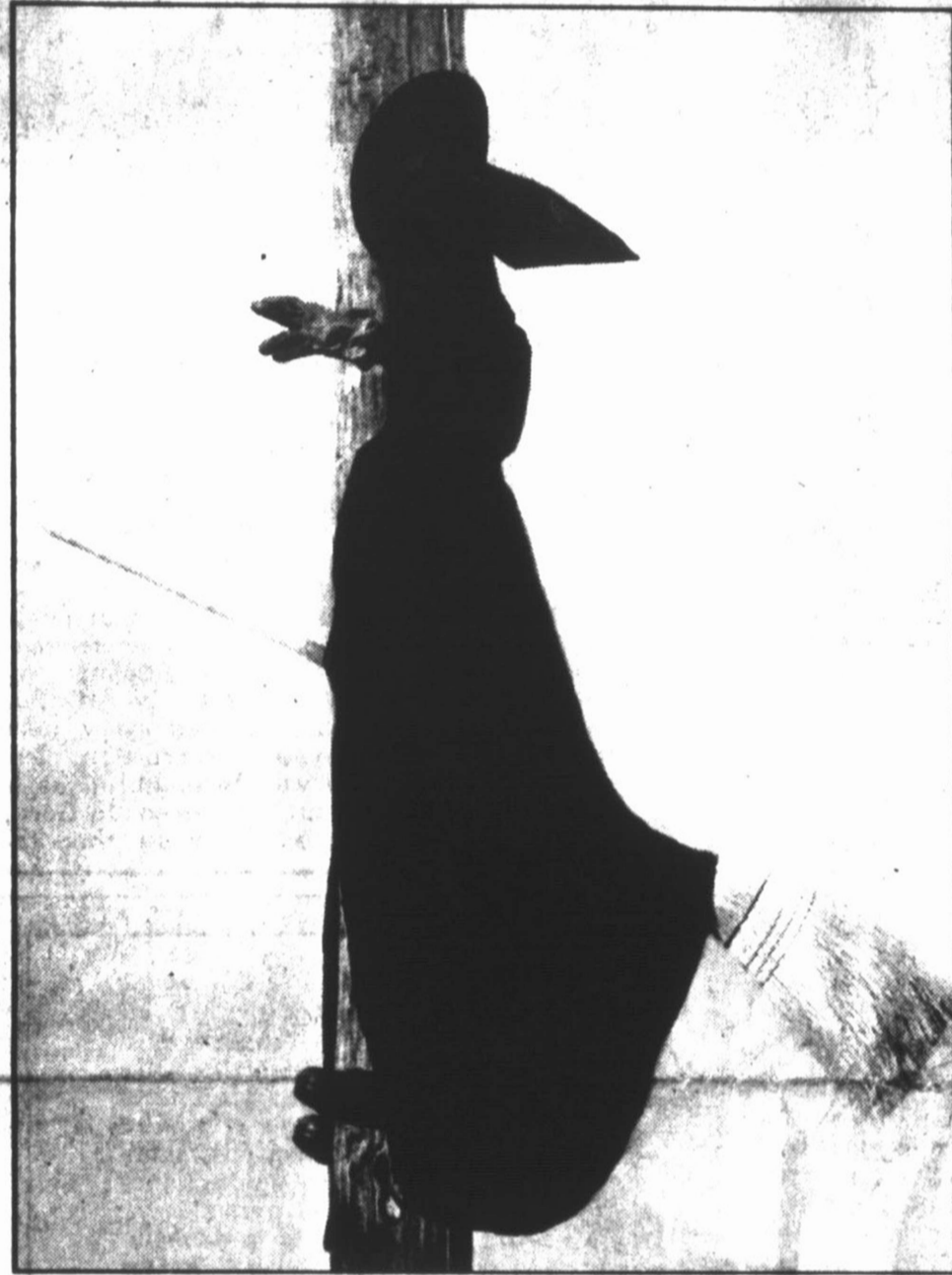
Across the country, people will turn clocks back one hour at 2:00 a.m. on Sunday, Oct. 29, or before they retire Saturday, Oct. 28.

■ Although the practice was first adopted by Congress in 1918 as part of the World War I effort, it was not until 1967 that Congress put into effect the Uniform Time Act, which instituted Daylight Saving Time for the nation, starting at 2:00 a.m. on the last Sunday in April and ending at 2:00 a.m. on the last Sunday in October. In 1986, President Ronald Reagan signed a bill that became effective in 1987 — moving the start of DST to the first Sunday in April, but leaving the end of DST on the last Sunday in October.

■ Set clocks, watches and VCRs back one hour.

■ Because it gets dark even earlier now, remember to discuss curfews and safety tips with young children.

DOWN TO THE WIRE

■ Bush, Gore back to basics, exhorting bases to go to polls

SOUTHFIELD, Mich. (AP) — George W. Bush and Al Gore are getting back to the political basics with 10 days left in their White House campaigns, turning their rallies into get-out-the-vote drives with calls to supporters to try to persuade uncommitted neighbors to cast ballots their way on Nov. 7.

The rivals in a close and increasingly harsh contest sound strikingly alike as Bush urges Republicans to turn up the campaign energy level and Gore says much the same thing to Democrats.

At the same time, the two campaigns are escalating their air war with angry disputes over television advertising and taped telephone messages the Democrats are using in anti-Bush calls to Michigan households. Republican Gov. John Engler told a Bush rally they are "some of the scummiest calls that have ever been made in politics." The Gore campaign defended them.

Bush was campaigning Saturday in Grand Chute, Wis., in a state that has gone Democratic in prior presidential elections but now it's in his sights against Gore, and in Columbia, Mo., before flying home to Austin, Texas.

The vice president sought support in Pennsylvania, another closely contested swing state, appearing in

NOVA SCOTIA: It's another world

Nova Scotia, which means New Scotland, is about as far removed from the plains of the Texas Panhandle as it is possible to get.

There are grass-covered hills and land surrounded by water. There are muscle farms and blueberry farms and Christmas tree farms. There are boats and ships and ferries. And many places of historical interest.

A group of senior citizens from Hereford, including Ruth Knox, had the opportunity to see all of this first hand on a 10-day tour of Nova Scotia and Prince Edward Island in mid-September.

"In trying to come up with some way to describe it, I just keep coming back to the word 'clean,'" Knox said. "The air is clean, the houses all look like they were painted last week, there is no trash on the streets. It's just clean, clean, clean."

The group on the tour was comprised of 30 from Hereford, six from other area towns and 16 from Wisconsin.

They cleared customs in Toronto, then flew to Halifax as the starting point for their bus tour that ultimately covered 1,577 miles.

The fact that a large body of water was always near at hand was one of the most appealing things about the trip to Knox.

"We saw the Bay of Fundy, the Northumberland Strait, the Gulf of Saint Lawrence and the Atlantic Ocean," she said.

In Halifax, they had the opportunity to observe the second largest natural harbor in the world. Of particular interest were submarines and a large ship in dry dock.

The Bay of Fundy is the site, twice daily, of the world's highest tides, 45 feet or more. The force of

the waves is used in a Tidal Power Plant.

To reach the next stop on their tour, the bus crossed the Confederation Bridge which connects Nova Scotia and Prince Edward Island. The bridge was finished in 1992 at a cost \$840 million.

Prince Edward Island, according to Knox, is "all *Anne of Green Gables* country." They saw the home of author Lucy Maud Montgomery and where she is buried.

Leaving P.E.I. required a ride on a ferry as they crossed back to Nova Scotia from the eastern end of the island.

The following day, the tour cov-

ered 185 miles around the perimeter of Cape Breton Island where they took the John Cabot Scenic Tour. The scenic, winding road followed the contour of the land "through lochs and glens originally settled by Highlanders," according to one brochure, and went from sea level into the mountains and back again numerous times.

"We drove on the bus up and down, up and down the hills, then it would come all the way down to the beautiful coast and the huge waves were hitting the coast on the Atlantic side. The view was just spectacular," Knox said.

Another stop which Knox described as a unique experience was

Wilkes-Barre, then was heading back to Washington before flying to Minneapolis for an evening rally.

"The team with the best grass-roots organization is the team that is going to win this campaign," Bush told a roaring, overflow rally at a community college here Friday night. "And we've got the best grass-roots organization ..."

"As we're coming down the stretch, I want to tell those who are on my team, make sure that you start turning out the vote, make sure that you don't ignore independent-minded Democrats," the Texas governor said.

Gore told his supporters "when you encounter an undecided voter, tell them the facts, but then give them the passion in your heart."

The vice president urged young people at a university rally in Pittsburgh "to get out here in the political process and fight for what you believe in." He said Pennsylvania's 23 electoral votes put it among "the handful of states that will genuinely decide the outcome ..."

Bush had been in Pittsburgh a day earlier, saying "we're in combat here in the state of Pennsylvania. Join me in this campaign to turn out a huge vote."

In Charleston, W.Va., another usually Democratic state, where Bush leads in the latest poll, Gore recalled the presidential election of 1960 in which John F. Kennedy beat Richard M. Nixon by 0.8 percent of the vote.

"They say this election is the closest race since that one in 1960, 40 years ago ...," Gore said. He said West Virginia could make a critical difference in 2000.

Dick Cheney, the GOP vice presidential nominee, campaigned in Wierton, W.Va., on Friday, promising that Bush would deal "swiftly and firmly" with cheap steel imports that breach U.S. trade laws, a sensitive issue in that steelmaking area.

Gore, hoarse from his shouted rally speeches, told a rally Friday night in Bethlehem, Pa., that

Kennedy's victory margin was equal to about one vote per precinct nationwide. He asked supporters to go out and get him that one extra vote a week from Tuesday.

At the White House, President Clinton met with about 150 black leaders and tried to stir their support for Gore.

Clinton, whose role in the Democratic campaign has been limited to fund raising except when he appears on behalf of his wife's New York Senate quest, said earlier that he had not disagreed with the Democratic strategy that kept him sidelined until now.

"When you get down to the last week or so, I think the American people expect everybody to get out and kind of mix it up. They want us

all to be out there," the president said. "I just want to get out there and make sure everybody understands what a unique moment it is. But if I have to do it from here, ... I'll stay here until Election Day if I have to."

But he had already made plans to appear Tuesday in Kentucky and New York and at rallies to turn out the vote in Los Angeles and Oakland, Calif., later in the week.

The latest set of national public opinion polls on voter preferences leaned toward Bush, although only one, the CNN/USA Today/Gallup tracking poll, updated every week night, gave the governor a clear lead. It showed Bush ahead as of Thursday with 52 percent to Gore's 39 percent, a lead wider than the

margin of error of plus or minus 4 percentage points.

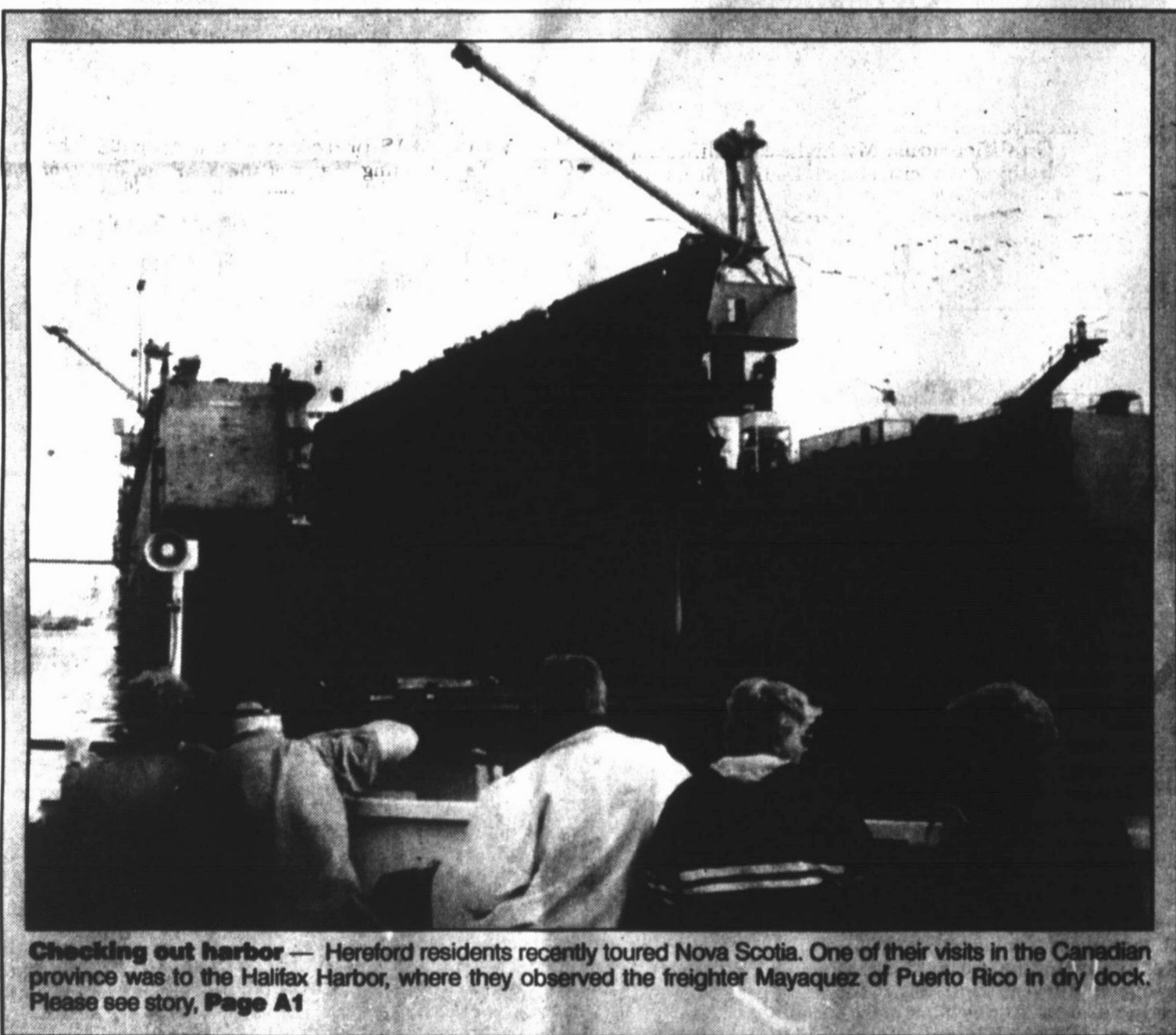
A new poll in swing state Michigan rated Bush narrowly ahead. Gov. Engler said the Gore camp is "so panicked" that it is resorting to telephone campaign tactics a Bush spokesman called despicable.

In one of the taped telephone calls, an Arlington, Texas, widow tells of the death of her husband of neglect in a nursing home after, she says, Bush signed legislation that weakened regulations.

Gore's deputy campaign manager Mark Fabiani said the calls were "completely factual" and would continue.

A disputed television ad will not. It is an independent, originally anonymous, political commercial attacking Gore, patterned on the 1964 ad showing a girl plucking petals from a daisy in what turned out to be a nuclear countdown. The scare ad was broadcast once against Republican presidential nominee Barry Goldwater. The new version uses the same images to accuse the administration of giving away nuclear technology to China.

The ad sponsors canceled it Friday when the Bush campaign asked that it be taken off the air.

Police continue probe of scam

The Hereford Police Department is continuing its investigation into the recent scam conducted by a Hispanic man, who approached local businesses and asked for financial help due to a recent accident which claimed his father's life and has put his mother in the hospital in critical condition.

Larry Maldonado, 36, of Amarillo was arrested Sunday morning at the St. Anthony's Catholic Church after a victim saw him outside the rectory. Maldonado, originally from California, has used the name of Steve Martinez Jr., Stevie Martinez, and Junior Martinez.

Police know the man has approached Kerr's Radio Shack, Marcum Motors, Gayland Ward Seed, Charlie's Tires, St. Anthony's Catholic Church and Brandon & Clark. Most businesses gave the man anywhere between \$200 and \$300 cash. A few gave the man checks, which were immediately cashed.

Brandon & Clark reportedly offered to take up an employee collection, but the man never returned.

Gayland Ward Seed had issued the man a check and before employees brought out the recent scam notices posted in the Hereford Brand and broadcast on the local radio stations, the man had cashed the check. Gayland Ward was unable to stop payment on the check.

All the local banks confirmed that identification is required to cash checks or get cash back. Spokespersons did say some occasions could arise when identification would not be required, but as a general rule, ID is required.

The police department spokesman said the bank tellers had given a description of the car the suspect was driving and impounded the vehicle when it was located. Police notified the owners of the vehicle. When they came to collect the car, they told police the man's real iden-

tity. They had loaned the man the car and did not press unauthorized use charges.

Cpt. Pat Michael said his office will be tele-typing law enforcement agencies in Castro, Farmer and Oldham counties, in the event they are working on similar cases. The Amarillo Police Department is aware of Maldonado's arrest and is waiting to file further charges.

Maldonado is being held in Deaf Smith County Jail in lieu of \$11,000 bond.

Police encourage anyone who may have been a victim of Maldonado's scam to come to the police station and file a report.

Maldonado is approximately 5 feet, 6 inches tall, average weight with slicked-back, graying black shoulder-length hair.

Battle over budget is under way

WASHINGTON (AP) — A nasty budget war between President Clinton and Congress over taxes, education and immigration is forcing lawmakers to endure rare weekend sessions just 10 days from the presidential and congressional elections.

The House voted 339-7 today to approve another one-day bill to keep government agencies from closing and rekindling voters' memories of the 1995-96 shutdowns.

The Senate planned to quickly approve the measure, which was needed because only six of the 13 must-pass spending bills for fiscal 2001, which began Oct. 1, have become law. Congress will have to meet again Sunday to approve another day-long extension.

Budget bargainers also planned to meet both days in hopes of bridging gaps over the remaining pieces of the \$1.8 trillion federal budget. But with members of each party itching to draw partisan distinctions and eager to return home for campaigning, neither side wasted chances to lambast the other.

Senate Majority Leader Trent Lott, R-Miss., said Clinton's insistence on daily votes to keep the government open was "harassment."

Republicans also accused Clinton of playing politics by issuing veto threats on two bills that contain many items Democrats demanded.

"It's a shame that this thing gets sacrificed in the face of politics because there are some really important things the president wanted," said House Speaker Dennis Hastert, R-Ill.

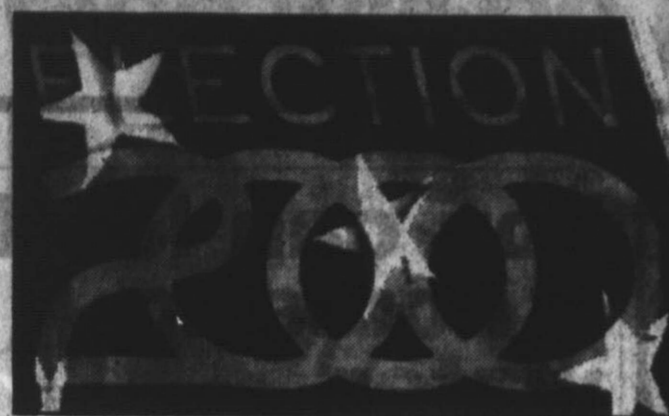

Hopefuls in Deaf Smith County contests tell what they hope to accomplish in office — if they win

Commissioner, Precinct 1

WAYNE BETZEN
Republican

I have lived in Precinct 1 for 45 years. This is my home and I care about what happens in Deaf Smith County.

I am married to Melody, and our two children, Brian and Staci, are both graduates of Hereford High.

The most important challenge I will face will be to maintain a satisfactory level of services for the county residents without levying unreasonable taxes.

I will work for a solution to our escalating juvenile problems and spending. It can be done with a good working relationship with the city and school district, and by exploring all other avenues.

I will continue improving the county roads. During the last four years, 34 miles of all-weather surface was applied to the roads in Precinct 1. I drive on county roads on a daily basis, seeing first hand the problems that need addressing.

Most Important Challenge: The most important challenge I will face if re-elected will be to address the current overcrowding in our jail, while staying within Texas jail standards. Any solution to this problem must not further increase the taxpayers' burden. As the number of inmates continues to increase, we will have to add more beds or place inmates in other county jails. We must search for the most cost-effective solution.

What I Hope to Accomplish: It is important to continue a good working relationship with all area law enforcement agencies to insure the safety of our citizens. I want to continue working the county commissioners to hold the line on spending tax dollars while not jeopardizing citizens' safety. I have done this over the past 17 years since becoming sheriff in 1983. I want to continue the "open door policy" with all citizens. It is important to be approachable to everyone and to hear concerns, so solutions can be reached.

What Changes in How the Office Operates: I feel very good about where our department is at this point. Our jail is running smoothly, although at times it is over capacity; our staff has done an excellent job in meeting state jail standards. Patrol deputies and dispatchers are well-trained professionals and do an excellent job keeping the citizens of this large county safe. New computers are keeping up with technology, while keeping cost to taxpayers in check.

Qualifications: My highest qualification is something the citizens of Deaf Smith County have given me — the 17-year opportunity to serve as your sheriff. I have 29 years of law enforcement experience and currently have my Masters Peace Officers Certificate. I'm a member of the Texas Jail Association, board member of the Panhandle Narcotics Task Force, and past board member of the Texas Sheriffs Association.

Joe Brown has been a resident of Deaf Smith County since 1982. A 12-year veteran of the Hereford Police Department, he has been Deaf Smith County sheriff for 16 years. He has received his master peace officer certificate and is a member of the Texas County Sheriff's Association board, Texas Panhandle Narcotics Task Force board, a Masonic Lodge member. He and his family are active with St. Anthony's Catholic Church. He and his wife, Annie, have two children, Joann Serrano and Westley.

BRENT HARRISON
Republican

The most important challenge facing Deaf Smith County, with regards to the race for sheriff, are crime prevention and crime solvency rates. Crime prevention is one of the most practical methods of proactive law enforcement. In effect, it is stopping crimes before they happen. Attempting to prevent crimes that affect us all, like: burglary, criminal mischief, assault, sexual assault, juvenile crimes, narcotics, and numerous others. In addressing this matter, there would need to be a comprehensive crime prevention program, by first training and having one or more deputies certified as crime prevention officers. Second, creating county watch programs and a higher visibility of the patrol deputies. Third, create public awareness on where offenses are occurring. Lastly, utilizing the Crime Stopper program, by offering rewards for anonymous tips, to aid in solving crimes that have no

physical evidence or leads. Having served as an investigator and past coordinator of Deaf Smith County Crimestoppers, I know how effective these programs can be when utilized properly.

Crime solvency rates, in the county, are currently below the state average (ref. Texas Uniform Crime Reports 1996, 1997, 1998). Training deputies can increase solvency rates by utilizing the latest evidence processing techniques and effective investigations. Having eight years experience in investigations, I'll be able to direct those investigations properly and work effectively with the District Attorney's office to make the best case possible. An effective prevention program does not work without an effective enforcement program.

Goals for the office of sheriff include: A comprehensive crime prevention program, training to give the deputies the skills necessary to do their jobs, decreasing the amount of narcotics in our county, working with the County Judge and Commissioners to keep the budget at a common sense level, and bringing an attitude of understanding and consideration to the office of Sheriff.

My qualifications for the office of sheriff are: Having been a 34-year Hereford and Deaf Smith County resident, 15 years of law enforcement experience with the Hereford Police Department, 8 years experience in criminal investigations, being a graduate of Amarillo College with honors in Criminal Justice Management (AAS), recipient of the Amarillo College "Outstanding Major of the Year" award for academic excellence, being a part-time instructor for Amarillo College (Panhandle Regional Law Enforcement Academy, being certified by T.C.L.E.O.S.E. (Texas Commission on Law Enforcement Officer Standards and Education) as an advanced peace officer and an instructor, and being able to manage money by owning my own computer business (Comp-U-Tech).

Brent Harrison has been a resident of Deaf Smith County for 33 years. He has been working for the Hereford Police Department for 14 years. He received a criminal justice management degree from Amarillo College and is working on his bachelor's degree in criminal justice management from Wayland Baptist. He has received an advanced peace officer certificate, he is a certified TCLEOSE instructor, past coordinator of the Deaf Smith County Crime Stoppers and is certified in kinetic interviewing and advanced blood pattern interpretation. He and his wife, Beverly, have two daughters, Cassie and Alexandria.

TAX ASSESSOR-COLLECTOR

Several issues affecting Deaf Smith County concern me. Some are finding ways to increase revenue for taxing entities by expanding the tax base, having people shop in Hereford so the 1/2-cent sales tax can decrease property taxes and bringing jobs to our area that pay well, which would certainly help our economy.

We are entering a very exciting time. The challenges created by the technological age are great. The Internet provides options that were not possible before. Incorporating these options without compromising customer service is important. The Legislature will pass bills that greatly affect the way we do business

Some of the things I will accomplish are to have great customer service, keep the budget at a minimum and run the office efficiently.

Doing my job and doing it well are important to me. I have worked with many community and civic groups. Working with others is an asset I bring to this office. We have a large Hispanic population with limited use of English. Since I am bilingual in Spanish, I will be able to help everyone effectively.

Congress taking care of surplus

While Al Gore and George W. Bush are running around the nation telling voters how they are going to dispose of the surplus, members of Congress are sitting in Washington making sure there will be very little surplus to dispose of.

Published estimates by both Republicans and Democrats have it that this year's new programs will reduce the surplus over the next 10 years by somewhere between \$800 billion and \$900 billion, roughly a third of the surplus that had been projected. That alone grinds the plans of Gore and Bush into so much baloney, although neither will likely acknowledge as much, seeing as how they would then have to revise their whole campaigns.

There are two points here that ought to cause some discomfort to people in our great democracy. One is that you cannot put money in front of Congress in an election year without it being slurped up like slop in a hog trough. The other is, both of the candidates' major pledges to the voters will have been based on a demonstrably false premise.

If Washington takes in more than it spends, it calls that amount a surplus, which politicians line up to spend or rebate as a tax cut. But by any real-world accounting, most of that "surplus" is an illusion. ...

Auerbach of UC Berkeley, using standard accounting and realistic assumptions, recently refigured that 10-year, \$4.6-trillion surplus Bush and Gore like to talk about, it dwindled to \$1.2 billion. But the candidates continue to pretend otherwise. ...

Saving the surplus today against the demographic storms of tomorrow is the only way to make that challenge less wrenching. Gore promises more goodies than he can prudently deliver, but at least he sees the cloud. Bush would lead the country into the squall without a raincoat or boots.

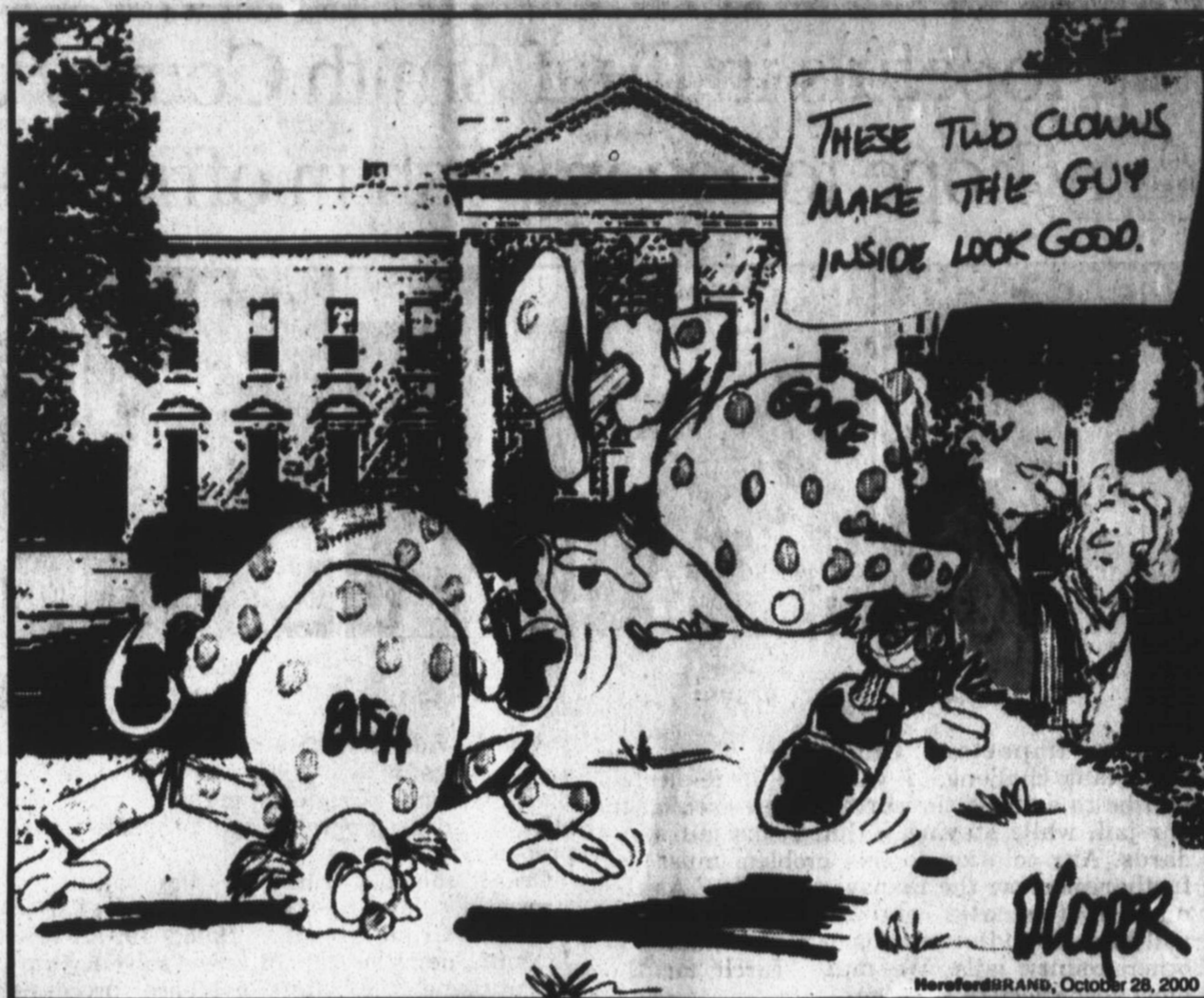

"Why does it tune like a radio?" she asked. She didn't seem to believe John David when he said that would let him tune out everyone but her during class time, so his radio went into her desk drawer for the rest of the day.

The next day, I brought my radio to school, stashing it in my book satchel until game time. During recess, I pulled on my jacket, put the radio in my shirt pocket. I ran the ear

plug cord up the jacket sleeve and sat with my hand cupped over it.

It didn't fool Mrs. Burkhardt, and my radio also went into the desk drawer.

Jimmy Gosnell was the most desperate, even getting himself sent to the principal's office. It seems the principal, Mr. Shaddix, was a big baseball fan and kept a radio in his office so he could listen to the Series.

Even though his behind was a bit tender, Jimmy still was able to sit in the principal's office and listen to the Brooklyn Dodgers beat the New York Yankees in the seventh game to win their first World Series.

When World Series time rolled around the next year, Mrs. Lewis brought her own radio to school and kept it on, with the volume turned down low, and would tell us the score. One morning, she gave us an assignment and told us that if everyone handed it in by the end of the day, she would bring her television to class the next day so we could watch one game.

All of the assignments were handed in on time.

As she promised, Mrs. Lewis brought her television the next day. She put it on a table and plugged it in, fiddled with the rabbit ears and soon we were watching the grainy, black and white images of the Dodgers and Yankees.

It was truly memorable, because the day Mrs. Lewis brought her television to school was the day that Don Larsen pitched the only perfect game in World Series history.

You can lead a horse to water...

Hello, Hereford.

Oil will always be heavier, but no one in Texas, especially West Texas, is questioning that crude's weight and value as a precious resource will continue to pale for southerners while once-plentiful water reserves continue to evaporate.

It has taken declining water tables, changing weather patterns and several severe droughts to finally wake us from the repose of our infuriating southern independence, but the word's finally out there — we're thirsty, and we are going to become more so.

Water, or the lack of it, and the wild scramble to get it eclipsed most of the issues — even feedlot dust, low commodity prices and pesticide use and restrictions — addressed as vital concerns to agriculture producers here in Thursday's town hall meeting with the towering figure of Texas Agriculture Commissioner Susan Combs.

The commissioner confirmed that the Texas' water situation is worsening, largely due to extended drought, but also because of the frenetic growth and sprawl of the state's largest urban areas.

But while she voiced her concerns about the growing practice of water ranching, a new idiom coined to denote the wholesale theft of water caches from one area to serve another with "greater" needs, Combs also wielded an atypical producer's bearing for "getting your share before someone else does."

She advised that Texas cities everywhere were trying to extend their water reach and the breadth of that effort would seriously affect rural areas. She also cautioned farmers and ranchers who might one day consider selling water rights to lease their rights, instead. The commissioner said the demand and price for water in Texas is going to increase.

At the forefront of the issue, however, is the inability of less-populated rural counties to compete fiscally for the right to recapture water which, in great measure, may have already be theirs to begin with. And if Hereford and Deaf Smith County loses water upstream, so do its farmers.

Large, well-financed schemes to buy and transport enormous volumes of water are being procured at an alarming rate by both municipalities and opportunists like T. Boone Pickens.

Some of these water-grabbing schemes have already been realized. Others are either in the mill or frighteningly close to fruition — so close, in fact, that many of the state's loosely-managed water districts may not develop a reasonable understanding of the rules or the impact these ambitions will have on their resources until it is too late.

All of which begs the question of why an abundantly arid state which has always enjoyed pushing its wildcat, entrepreneurial image way past the envelope, is tackling this long-range water problem with a relatively short-term 20 to 30-year fix — ultimately strip-mining the slow recharge of the state's underground resources and parching rural Texas beyond the limits of Mother Nature herself.

The answer comes in one nasty word: money.

It is much cheaper to mine a ready product than it is to refine one.

The technology exists to desalinate ocean water, but it is still considered by many to be too costly.

The Associated Press reported in April that state officials have toyed with the idea of a large-scale effort to rid the Gulf of Mexico of some of its brackish water and turn it into drinking water.

Led by the Lavaca-Navidad River Authority near Victoria, Texas, officials have proposed a desalination plant on Matagorda Bay that would produce up to 3.2 billion gallons of potable water annually — making it about four times bigger than the country's largest current desalination project in Tampa Bay, Fla., a \$95 million plant scheduled for completion in 2002.

"This plant would be a major, major new development for the state of Texas if it is found to be cost effective," said Craig Pedersen, executive director of the Water Development Board, a state agency.

According to the AP story, the Florida project has been studied and is feasible for Texas.

And beyond ample considerations that technology is making desalination cheaper by the day and that our great arid state still has never formalized a water plan, can a proud and strutting Texas ever really hold its head up if it literally allows its rural communities to be bled dry?

The answer may not only surprise West Texans, but will make us all very thirsty in the process.

One will be elected president, but it won't mean hero status

Americans liked Ike before and long after Dwight D. Eisenhower's presidency. They honored the legend of John F. Kennedy's White House Camelot. Even people who opposed Ronald Reagan policies came to admire his leadership style.

But this campaign is lacking in political heroes and, by the polls, in real enthusiasm among independent-minded voters for either Al Gore or George W. Bush.

That may tell why a national survey two weeks from election day found that nearly a quarter of the electorate had yet to decide now to vote Nov. 7, in a campaign rated dead even.

It may also explain the prospect of another low turnout election, with about the same rate of voting as the 49 percent four years ago, according to a specialist on the subject.

That comes with a caveat — forecasts of the closest election in 40 years are no guarantee that it is going to happen.

Still, a Pew Research Center survey suggests that neither Bush nor Gore has been able to break through in pre-election support because of doubts about each man, the Republican governor on experience and confidence on handling the issues, the Democratic vice president on personality and trust.

The Pew poll also found that 45 percent of voters see Gore as a typical politician,

while 29 percent view Bush that way. In an era of cynicism about politicians, being typecast as one is a liability.

Then again, politicians never have been popular; candidates always avoid that job description in favor of positive terms like leadership. And political reputations tend to grow in retrospect, not in the divisiveness of a campaign, and sometimes, not soon afterward.

Political heroes do tend to grow in retrospect. Harry S. Truman left office in low regard and now is one of the most esteemed of modern presidents for his decisiveness in the ending and aftermath of World War II and at the start of the Cold War.

Franklin D. Roosevelt's standing among the greatest presidents was earned on his leadership in the crisis of the Great Depression and in World War II; they made him a heroic figure to most, not all, Americans.

"Nobody is going to be a hero to everybody," said Stephen Hess of the Brookings Institution. "Eisenhower came pretty close."

He entered politics as a national hero, the supreme commander of the armies that defeated Nazi Germany. "To have a hero you usually have to have a war," says Hess, who served in the White House near the end of the Eisenhower presidency. "It has to be a popular war and a just

war."

Eisenhower's standing was as a general, not a career politician.

Kennedy was a wounded, decorated veteran of the war in the Pacific, a senator before he won in 1960 by the narrowest popular margin in history and became the first Roman Catholic president. He brought the style and flourish of a new generation to the White House, after the staid Republican years.

But the achievements of his administration, like his time, were limited. And the Camelot image was created after he was assassinated in 1963, not while he was in the White House.

Reagan's skill as an orator, some said performer, was the trademark of his persuasive leadership style, overcoming the resistance of Democrats and not a few Republicans to his conservative policies. He won the White House with a mandate, a 10-point victory over President Jimmy Carter in a 1980 election the pollsters said was too close to predict.

For all his political arts, President Clinton began his national career with his flaws

and evasions showing. His personal misconduct, scandal and impeachment, heightened cynicism about politicians. No role model there.

"People don't like politics any more," says Curtis Gans of the Committee for the Study of the American Elec-

torate, who expects a Nov. 7 turnout not much different from that in the 1996 election, which was the first time since 1924 that fewer than half the eligible voters had cast ballots in a presidential election.

He sees the rise of consultant-driven messages and campaigns, the intrusiveness of the media and the emphasis on the personal lives of candidates as among the factors that turn people off on politicians.

The nonstop exposure, especially on television, has narrowed the distance between leaders and the led, and eroded the mystique that once led people to hold their small children above the campaign crowds, just to see the man who could be president.

But that hasn't ended American esteem for the man in the White House — even if he has been impeached and people don't think much of him personally. When the Gallup Poll conducts its annual survey of the world figure Americans most admire, it has been the sitting president all but eight times in the past 54 years.

That includes President Clinton in 1999, although he ranked only narrowly ahead of Billy Graham and Pope John Paul II.

Cole attack is reminder of the risks

Last week's bombing of the USS Cole sent home a reminder often overlooked or taken for granted when the United States is not in the middle of a declared war. All over the globe, 24 hours a day, American soldiers, sailors and airmen are fighting for and protecting this great nation.

Seventeen sailors died in what was to be a routine refueling in the Gulf of Aden along the coast of Yemen. It is believed it was a terrorist suicide bombing. But for the grace of God, it could just as easily have been 17 airmen from our own Holloman Air Force Base, performing a routine task, and suffering the ultimate fate.

Everyone who puts on the uniform knows this is a possibility. Yet they march forward and take the risk. They put everything on the line for the rest of us. For their families. For their country. For our way of life. ...

But there's no way to really say "Thank you" for what these men and women do for us. It all seems so arbitrary. Some soldiers can spend more than 20 years in service, fighting in the heat of battle many times, without getting a scratch. Others can spend just a short tenure, during what is supposed to be peacetime, and make the supreme sacrifice.

What drives people to join the service today is not as clear as it was Dec. 8, 1941, the day after Pearl Harbor. But still, every soldier, sailor or airman knows the potential consequences.

It takes every person in our armed forces to provide for the common defense. And we owe every one of them a debt. Our gratitude cannot be expressed.

Swing voters lean to Gore — maybe

Almost one-fourth of voters haven't finally decided on a candidate in this presidential election, polls suggest. That group tends to be more Democratic, more supportive of Al Gore and overwhelmingly of the opinion that he's the most qualified.

These swing voters also are less likely to vote and much less engaged in following the campaign, according to a poll analysis of swing voters done for The Associated Press by the Pew Research Center for the People & the Press.

That means the biggest jobs for both Democrat Gore and Republican George W. Bush in the remaining days of this extraordinarily close campaign are to finally convince a substantial majority of these fickle voters to side with them. Most importantly, they must motivate supporters in this group to show up at the voting booth.

After a campaign of more

than 20 months and tens of millions of dollars, these two sons of famous politicians have not closed the deal beyond their own partisan supporters.

Swing voters drift back and forth from one week to the next, causing frantic changes in campaign travel and sometimes leaving pollsters grin-

ning sheepishly. Swing voters include those who may still change their minds, and are a much larger group than the undecideds, who make up about one in 20 voters.

"They're in a whipsaw over policy vs. personality," Bruce Buchanan, a political scientist at the University of Texas, said of swing voters. "They're drawn to Bush as somebody who makes them feel comfortable, but on alternate days they're drawn to Gore because of his greater experience."

While Gore's seeming appeal among swing voters offers an opportunity for him, it also highlights a vulnerability. These are voters he should have locked up months ago, based on their core beliefs about his level of experience and issue positions.

In fact, both candidates have had trouble making their cases.

Polls suggest Bush is seen

as more honest and more willing to speak his mind, but voters — especially swing voters — doubt whether he is prepared for the job. When swing voters were asked which candidate is more personally qualified to be president, swing voters picked Gore by a 3-to-1 margin.

Gore is seen as very bright, very experienced and having the right positions on top issues from health care to Social Security to the economy. But voters overall are concerned about his honesty and more see him as "a typical politician." Swing voters are about split on those questions.

"We have two candidates that will make above average presidents," said Chicago pollster Nick Panagakis, who got that answer most often about both candidates in a recent poll. "That about sums it up."

More than four in five voters who have firmly made up their minds say they will definitely vote Nov. 7, but only two-thirds of swing voters say they are definitely voting. Twice as many voters who have made a firm decision are following the campaign closely.

"Swing voters are just less with it," said Andrew Kohut, director of the Pew Research Center, noting the challenge for Gore is getting these swing voters who lean toward him to vote.

Sure, some of our lines were not straight, maybe some kids were out of step, maybe somebody missed a note. But the bands receiving Division I also experienced the same mistakes. I wanted to blame the judges and think: "They've just got it in for Hereford!" But I know that's not logical. The judges were not from this part of the state. I thought: "Well, maybe they don't like to see so many kids out on the field!" We had 180 or so on the field. Palo Duro (about 40) and Randall (about 65) had significantly less. Maybe they didn't like our Olympic theme. Maybe they didn't like our uniforms. Maybe they didn't like the look of the band booster pit crew helping push podiums and percussion instruments out onto the field before the performance. Maybe we went over our time limit.

I don't know why we didn't get a I. But I do know one thing: I do know how hard everyone has worked this year — the students marching and learning their music, the Diamond Dancers, the Twirlers, the directors, the boosters, the *Hereford Brand* and the radio stations with the excellent coverage given us. And I guarantee, these kids and their directors are No. 1 with my community and me, no matter what someone else thinks!

Republicans to begin airing a pro-Nader TV spot

WASHINGTON (AP) — Hoping to boost Ralph Nader in states where he is threatening to hurt Al Gore, a Republican group is launching TV ads featuring Nader attacking the vice president.

The ads by the Republican Leadership Council will begin airing Monday in Wisconsin, Oregon and Washington, all states that are part of Gore's base and where Nader is polling well. The group plans to spend more than \$100,000

at first and hopes to raise more over the weekend.

While the ads boost Nader, they are a clear attempt to help Bush.

Gore's supporters fear that Nader, who is more liberal than either Bush or Gore, will throw the election to the Texas governor if voters who might otherwise vote for Gore vote for Nader instead. In a tight national race, one or two states could make the difference in who is elected president.

The ads feature clips of Nader from a National Press Club speech on Tuesday, where he laid into both Bush and Gore, though the ad only includes his criticism of Gore.

"Al Gore is suffering from election year delusion if he thinks his record on the environment is anything to be proud of," Nader says. An announcer interjects: "What's Al Gore's real record?" Nader says: "Eight years of principles betrayed and promises broken."



CANYON — The Development Office at West Texas A&M University will showcase its new LEK

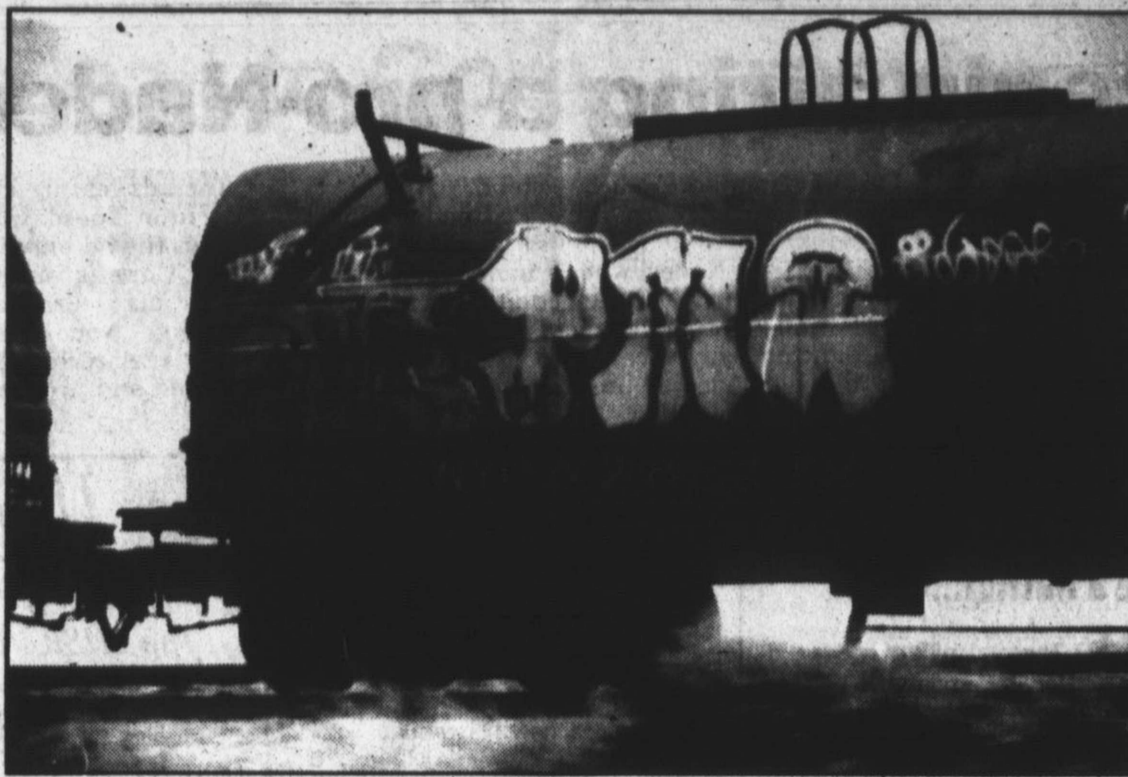

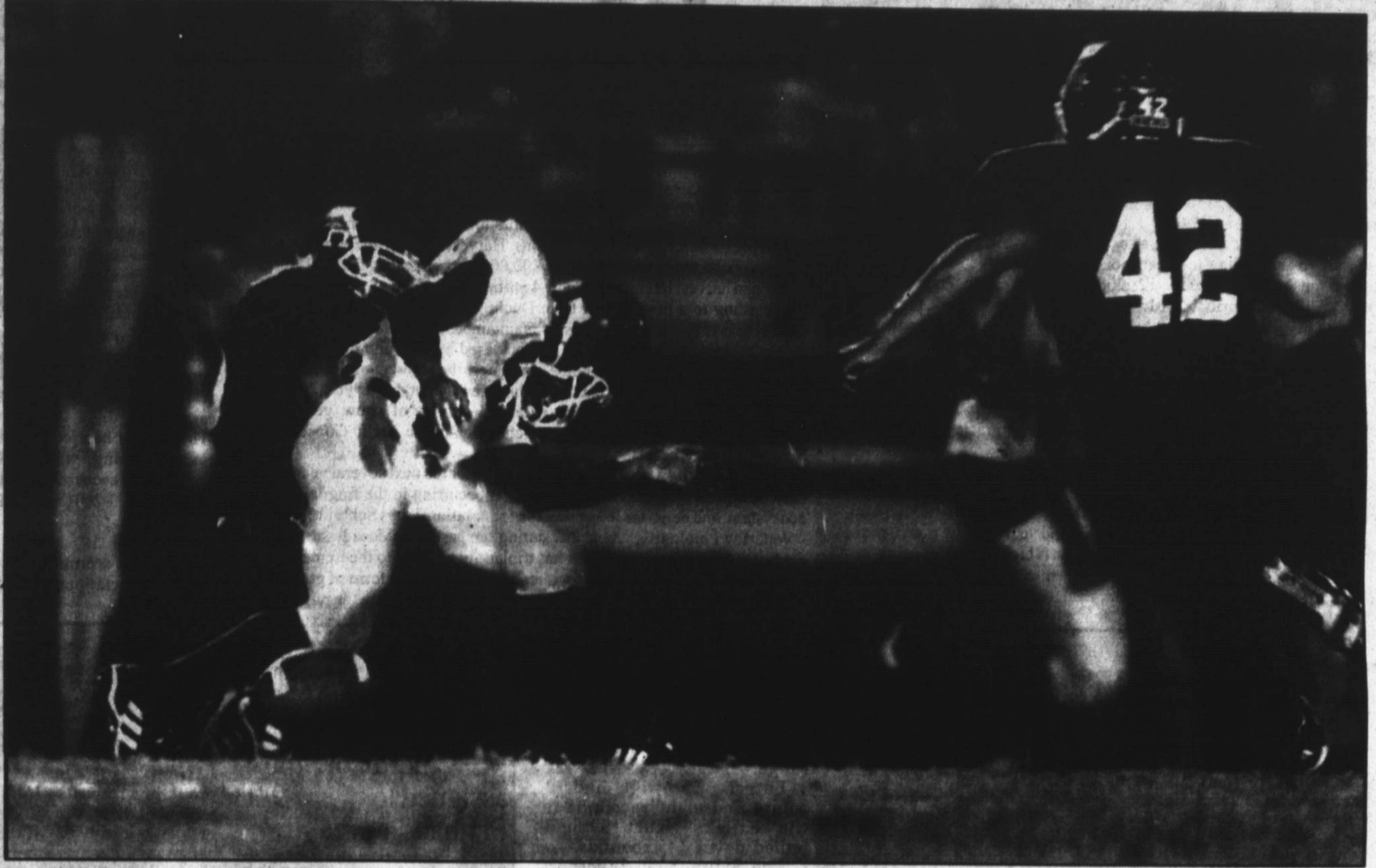

Hereford also utilized its emerging weapon in junior receiver Geoffrey Marquez. The junior had a touchdown reception of his own on a 50-yard toss from C. Hodges. Marquez had five catches for 119 yards during the game.

Subway Series draws low viewership

Ratings down 22.5 percent from last year's World Series

NEW YORK (AP) — This Subway Series drew only token viewership.

Fox Sports' telecasts of the New York Yankees' five-game victory over the cross-city Mets produced the lowest-rated World Series in history, drawing big audiences in the Big Apple but in few other major TV markets.

The games averaged a 12.4 national rating and 21 share, down 22.5 percent from last year and 12 percent from 1998's previous record

low. Both the rating and share are less than half of what they were in 1998, the last time the Mets played in the World Series. Each rating point represents a little more than 1 million television households; share is the percentage of in-use TVs tuned to a program.

"Our research people are going to have to take a look and see if they can come up with some explanations," Fox Sports president Ed Goren said Friday. "I'm guessing maybe there's something wrong with the national Nielsen sampling. This has been a difficult year for a lot of us."

Indeed, The trend of sinking ratings hasn't discriminated much by sport

or network this year. NBC's coverage of the Summer Games drew the lowest ratings for a Summer or Winter Olympics since 1968. The NCAA men's college basketball title game dropped 18 percent from a year ago, which was the previous low since CBS started airing the event in 1982. The All-Star games for the NBA and baseball were the worst-rated ever.

One notable exception is the Super Bowl, which continues to consistently draw ratings above 40.

The World Series' showing, which industry analysts say also could be traced to lengthy games and competition from fall TV season premieres pushed back by the Sydney Olympics, forced Fox to show "make-goods" — "free" commercials

Hereford also continues to win despite their injuries to several starting players. The Whitefaces found out this week that starting nose tackle Kris Hammerbeck would miss 2-3 weeks because of torn cartilage in his knee.

"It's great to be on a team that has a person behind the starter fired up and ready to play," Hernandez said. "We always have a guy that is ready to play."

In Friday's game, C. Hodges stayed in despite pulling a groin muscle on the first play of the

Rainfall brings optimism as waterfowl seasons kick off

Heavy rainfall in scattered portions of the local area during the past week gives hope that there will be at least some plays lakes to offer waterfowl hunting opportunity as the long run of duck and goose season gets underway this weekend.

The High Plains Mallard Management Unit duck season extends from October 28, through January 21, while the regular Western Zone goose season spans the period from October 28 through February 11.

Daily bag limit for ducks in the High Plains area is six. It may include no more than five mallards or Mexican mallards, only two of which may be hens; three scaup either lesser or greater; two wood ducks; two redheads; one mottled duck; one pintail; and one canvasback. Possession limit is twice the daily bag limit.

Bag limit for geese in the Western Zone is five dark geese, to include no more than one white-fronted goose, and 20 light geese. Possession limit is twice the daily bag limit for dark geese, with no possession limit for light geese.

For the third consecutive year, a special light goose conservation season will kick-in following the conclusion of the regular goose season. This late season begins February 12, 2001 in the Western Zone and will continue through April 1, 2001. The 2001 season will mark the first in which hunting date guidelines were put in place well in advance and won't interfere with the full run of the sandhill crane season that spans November 11, 2000 to February 11, 2001 in our own Zone A.

We'll have to wait and see how the flights of migrating ducks and geese pattern out before we have an idea of how the regular duck and goose season will go. Certainly, there's more room for optimism than there was only a week ago.

The special conservation season for snow geese has been a mixed event locally. The initial one in 1999 was a winner hereabouts as many hunters had good success, but the second one this spring played to mixed reviews, primarily because snow geese went around and simply didn't move through this area in any number. Still, interest is high.

The special snow goose seasons were implemented to lower populations of critically over-abundant mid-continent light geese that have been

damaging their fragile habitat in the Arctic.

Preliminary harvest reports by the U.S. Fish & Wildlife Service indicate that hunters in the U.S. bagged 1.3 million light geese during the 1999-2000 regular and conservation seasons. Harvest of light geese in Canada was also expected to total more than 100,000 birds, meaning the total North American harvest likely exceeded 1.4 million geese.

According to a news report from Ducks Unlimited, waterfowl experts predict that if this rate of harvest is maintained, the overall population of mid-continent snow geese could be decreased by half, and provided that heavy harvesting of surplus geese continues, the snow goose population could be cropped to a level that their habitat can support by the year 2008.

"Preliminary figures on the extended harvest of snow geese are encouraging," says Paul Schmidt, co-chairman of the Arctic Goose Joint Venture Management Board.

"If we're able to sustain this level of harvest for the next several years, we may be able to stop the devastation that is occurring in the fragile Arctic ecosystem, and begin the long process of restoration," says Schmidt.

Waterfowl biologists report that during the past three decades the mid-continent light goose population has tripled—in part due to the tremendous food resources available on the wintering grounds in the form of grain left in farm fields after mechanical harvesting operations. Along the migrating

and wintering corridor, the food supply has become virtually unlimited.

However, once flights wing northward to the breeding ground in the spring, they exert tremendous pressure on habitat that can't sustain the massive numbers of geese grazing and grubbing fragile native plant communities. With such excessive pressure, portions of whole ecosystems are being destroyed. In some places, the landscape has been left looking like a moonscape, and scientists believe where this damage has occurred, recovery may take decades, even centuries.

In the face of this ecological crisis, and with the support of a broad spectrum of conservation organizations the Fish & Wildlife Service developed conservation measures allowing 24 states in the Central and Mississippi Flyways to permit use of electronic calls and unplugged shotguns during special light goose seasons. Hunters were allowed to take light geese after March 10, when seasons typically close.

When a legal challenge to the late season surfaced, the F&WS decided in summer 1999 to withdraw the rules and complete an Environmental Impact Statement analyzing the impact of the regulations.

In response, Congress enacted the Arctic Tundra Habitat Emergency Conservation Act, which extends through May 15, 2001. The Act allows states to implement special late season harvest rules while F&WS completes an Environmental Impact Statement.

The initial year of special season harvest failed to hit the 1.4 million mark considered necessary to begin bringing snow goose populations under control. Regular and special seasons combined in the U.S. and Canada yielded a harvest of 1.07 million light geese for the 1998-99 waterfowl season.

The pace of harvest picked up to near the target level for the 1999-2000 season, leaving waterfowl biologists, sportsmen and conservation organizations encouraged that the regular and special late snow goose seasons on tap for 2000-2001 will continue to bring the resource into balance with its habitat.

Brodie recovering slowly

The 65-year-old Brodie's condition was unchanged — serious but stable, hospital spokeswoman Mary Kay Plock said Friday.

Le said Brodie's symptoms first appeared Monday night while he was watching the NFL game on TV.

"His family has remained at his side, and he has received many faxes, visits, flowers and phone calls," Le said. "He is aware of the outpouring of support and is very

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Texas newspapers favor favorite son

It's hardly a surprise. But for the record, Texas newspapers large and small are overwhelmingly endorsing George W. Bush in his run for president.

"Gov. Bush's leadership skills and integrity recommend him for the nation's highest office," the *Houston Chronicle* wrote on its editorial page earlier this month.

The *Austin-American Statesman*, in its endorsement Sunday, wrote that despite some policy disagreements with Bush during his tenure as governor, the newspaper knows and respects him.

"Moreover, we trust him," the editorial said.

The *Herald Democrat* in Sherman-Denison said Gore repeatedly has made statements that cloud his character.

"We will grant that George W. Bush has done nothing to distinguish himself as a scholar, political or otherwise. But scholars do not always make the best presidents. ..."

But what the nation most

needs is "a strong, trustworthy leader with common sense and an ability to put together a strong team of equally trustworthy and even more knowledgeable advisers," the newspaper said.

Texas newspapers praised Bush for his promises to improve military readiness, to let some Americans invest part of their Social Security payroll taxes in private markets and to give back one-fourth of the federal budget surplus to taxpayers.

Through his landslide re-election victory in 1998 helped sweep a slate of fellow Republicans into statewide office, several newspapers noted Bush's record of unifying Democrats and Republicans.

"While the challenge is much greater than it was in Austin, given the extreme bitterness of the Washington political climate, we have no doubt that he can rise to the challenge with grace and good humor," wrote the *Victoria Advocate* in its endorsement of

Bush. The *San Antonio Express-News* also praised Bush for his bipartisan efforts in the Texas Legislature.

"The fact that the late Lt. Gov. Bob Bullock and other Texas Democrats have endorsed him speaks volumes," the *Express-News* wrote.

The *Dallas Morning News* asked: "Does America need continuity for the next four years, or does it need to change the tone and direction of our nation's course?"

"We believe a fundamental shift is needed," the newspaper wrote in its Bush endorse-

ment. Vice President Al Gore is outlining a litany of new federal programs he wants to initiate, while Bush believes in local control and limited government, said the *Fort Worth Star-Telegram* as it endorsed Bush.

Bush understands the frustration of federal mandates and "one-size-fits-all edicts emanating from Washington bureaucrats who seem incapable of grasping the unique distinctions and needs of individual states," the *Star-Telegram* wrote.

The *Amarillo Globe-News* wrote that Bush has become one of the most dynamic chief executives in the 155-year history of Texas.

Low income families pay 14 percent of their annual income on utility bills compared to 3.5 percent for other families. Under

current conditions that percentage is likely to go up, and Panhandle Community Services wants to help drive those bills down by making the home more

energy-efficient.

The nation has proclaimed October 30th as National Weatherization Day to remind us of this Department of Energy Program aimed at helping families like this by working through agencies like PCS.

Having the program is no help unless people seek the assistance however, and it is hoped that the visibility of this event will cause families to call their local PCS office and use the program to lower their bills.

Since this program came into being in 1976, nearly 5 million homes have been weatherized. That's 5 million families now saving on their utility bills, safe with furnaces and appliances that have been checked for dangerous emissions, and that are warmer when those cold Panhandle Northerners blow. Weatherization normally means a 20 percent reduction in energy use, putting money back into the pockets of the family for food and medicine and better living.

Weatherization Day is recognized for a fine program that has done a lot for our communities and the families they've served. Maybe more families will become aware of the program and every day will become "Weatherization Day."

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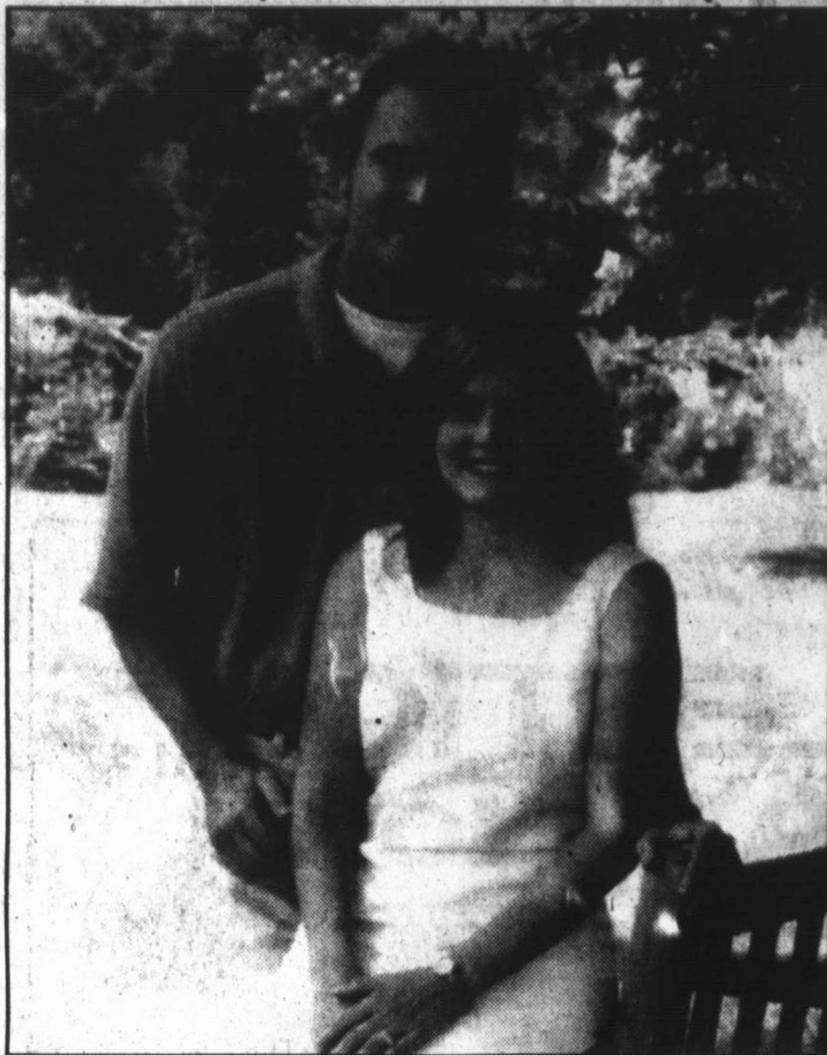

Nutrition Update

"Whole Grains for Healthful Eating"
 Whole Grain Facts:
 1. On the average, Americans consume only 1 serving of whole grain daily.
 2. Whole grain foods give nutritional benefits of the entire grain - vitamins, minerals, dietary fiber, and other natural plant compounds called phytochemicals.

The recently released **USDA Dietary Guidelines for Americans 2000** encourage all Americans to increase their intake of whole grain foods.

The Goodness of Whole Grains
 The whole grains may help reduce the risk of heart disease and certain cancers. Whole grains are made up of all the bran (or fiber-rich outer layer), the endosperm (middle part) and the germ (the nutrient-rich inner part). When grains are milled, or refined, the bran and germ portions are removed, leaving only the endosperm.

By contrast, whole grain foods contain all three layers of the grain. When you eat a variety of whole grain foods, you get the nutritional benefits of the entire grain including the phytochemicals, all of which contribute to whole grains' health

benefits. **Labels Can Help You Get More Whole Grains**

Check out food labels to help you choose more whole grain foods each day. Look at both the **Ingredient List** and the **Nutrition Facts** panel and try to choose foods that list a whole grain as the first ingredient. Some whole grain ingredients to look for include:

- Whole wheat
- Whole barley
- Whole oats
- Cracked wheat
- Graham flour
- Whole cornmeal

Also look for a "whole grain" claim on other parts of the package labels. For qualifying foods, the government has approved a health claim that recognizes the health benefit associated with diets rich in whole grains. This claim makes it easier for you to identify foods that are rich in whole grains. The health claim states: "Diets rich in whole grain foods, and other plant foods, are low in total fat, saturated fat, and cholesterol, may help reduce the risk of heart disease and certain cancers."

Your Best Breakfast Bet is Whole Grain Cereal
 Whole-wheat cereals, including shredded wheat, are an ideal whole grain choice for breakfast.

A breakfast comprised of a bowl of whole-wheat cereal with milk and fruit supplies about six grams of fiber. Health experts recommend that adults eat 20-35 grams of dietary fiber daily, but on average Americans eat only about 15 grams a day. Boost your fiber intake by adding one or two servings of whole-grain foods. **Enjoy Healthy Eating and Snacking with Whole Grains**

The foundation of a nutritious diet begins with grain products - cereal, rice, bread, and pasta - and are typically low in fat, saturated fat, and cholesterol. Grain foods provide carbohydrates the body needs for energy and essential vitamins, minerals, and dietary fiber.

The Food Guide Pyramid recommends that adults eat six to eleven servings of grain daily; several of those servings should be whole grains.

- TIPS:**
- Stock your pantry with staples made from whole grains; cereals, brown rice, low-fat whole-wheat crackers, breads, and rolls.
 - When eating away from home, select a whole grain cereal for breakfast.
 - Make a habit of requesting foods made from whole grains like whole wheat breads and rolls and brown rice as meal accompaniments.

In 1999, Stephen King began to write about his craft, and his life. A widely reported accident midway jeopardized both. **On Writing** is the account of how King's

overwhelming need to write spurred him toward recovery, and brought him back to his life.

The book begins with King's childhood and his early focus on writing to tell a story. A series of vivid memories from adolescence, college, and the struggling years that led up to his first novel, *Carrie*, will give readers a fresh and often very funny perspective on the formation of a writer.

If you are interested in writing as a hobby or

vocation you will be interested in what King calls the basic tools of his trade and how to sharpen and multiply them through use. He takes the reader through crucial aspects of the writer's art and life, offering practical and inspiring advice on everything from plot and character development to work habits and rejection.

History buffs will enjoy Nathaniel Philbrick's **In the Heart of the Sea: The Tragedy of the Whaleship Essex**. This epic story in-

spired the climactic scene in *Herman Melville's Moby Dick*.

In 1819, the 238 ton *Essex* set sail from Nantucket on a routine voyage for whales. Fifteen months later, the unthinkable happened: in the farthest reaches of the South Pacific, the *Essex* was rammed and sunk by an enraged sperm whale. Its 20-man crew, fearing cannibals on the islands to the west, decided instead to sail

their three tiny boats for the distant South American coast. They would eventually travel over 4,500 miles. The next three months tested just how far humans could go in their battle against the sea as, one by one, they succumbed to hunger, thirst, disease, and fear.

Told from the tiny baby's point of view, *Saul* by Rosemary Kay, is the fictional memoir of a child who was born after only twenty-three weeks in the womb. Inspired by the author's experience of giving

birth to her own child at 23 weeks, the result is an unforgettable voice from another world. With astonishing insight and humor, and a distinct personality, the narrator shows himself to be both a vulnerable baby and a wise, somewhat mischievous, little boy with a purpose. Saul himself tells us, "I'm a good learner. That's what I'm here for. I want to learn everything. Not just about tubes and Big Air noises and whizzidy smells - I know there's more to This Living, My Living, than all that. There are Reasons and Answers somewhere out there and I'm going to find them out."

In Patrick Lynch's **Figure of Eight**, Ellen Cusak, Ukrainian-born World Champion figure skater and wife of a Hollywood actor, was a national obsession. She was a fantasy woman living a life of excitement, glamour, and grace. Now, she is the obsession of two men. One is stalking her. The other wants to save her.

Pete Golding is a security specialist. He's made his reputation going after the psychotics who stalk celebrities. Something about the Cusak case disturbs him. It isn't even the

frightening late-night calls promising to change her life forever. It's the darkness he senses beneath the surface of Ellen's life.

While police search for a killer, Golding hunts down a

very different kind of threat. Then a photograph of a young girl in a blue figure-skating dress turns up on the wall of the Cusak home, and what seemed a simple matter of victim and perpetrator becomes something darker, more disturbing, more violent. It is something that forces him to confront the truth about Ellen Cusak and himself.

From Jane Mendelsohn, the author of *I Was Amelia Earhart*, we have *Innocence*.

At the Manhattan private school where Beckett is the new girl, the "beautiful girls" are dying off in suicide pacts. Her boyfriend, Toby, is attacked in the bathroom of a coffee shop and winds up in a coma. Her widowed father takes up with the pretty school nurse, who, Beckett slowly discovers, is not what she seems.

Beckett finds herself in an incomprehensible universe, where the line between reality

and fantasy is razor thin, and where nobody believes her. As she moves from girl to woman, Beckett begins to see beauty and love in a sinister, dangerous world whose values of narcissism and youth threaten to claim her.

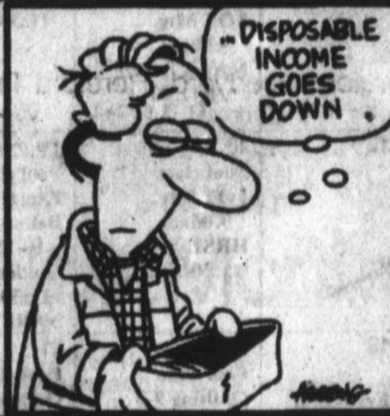

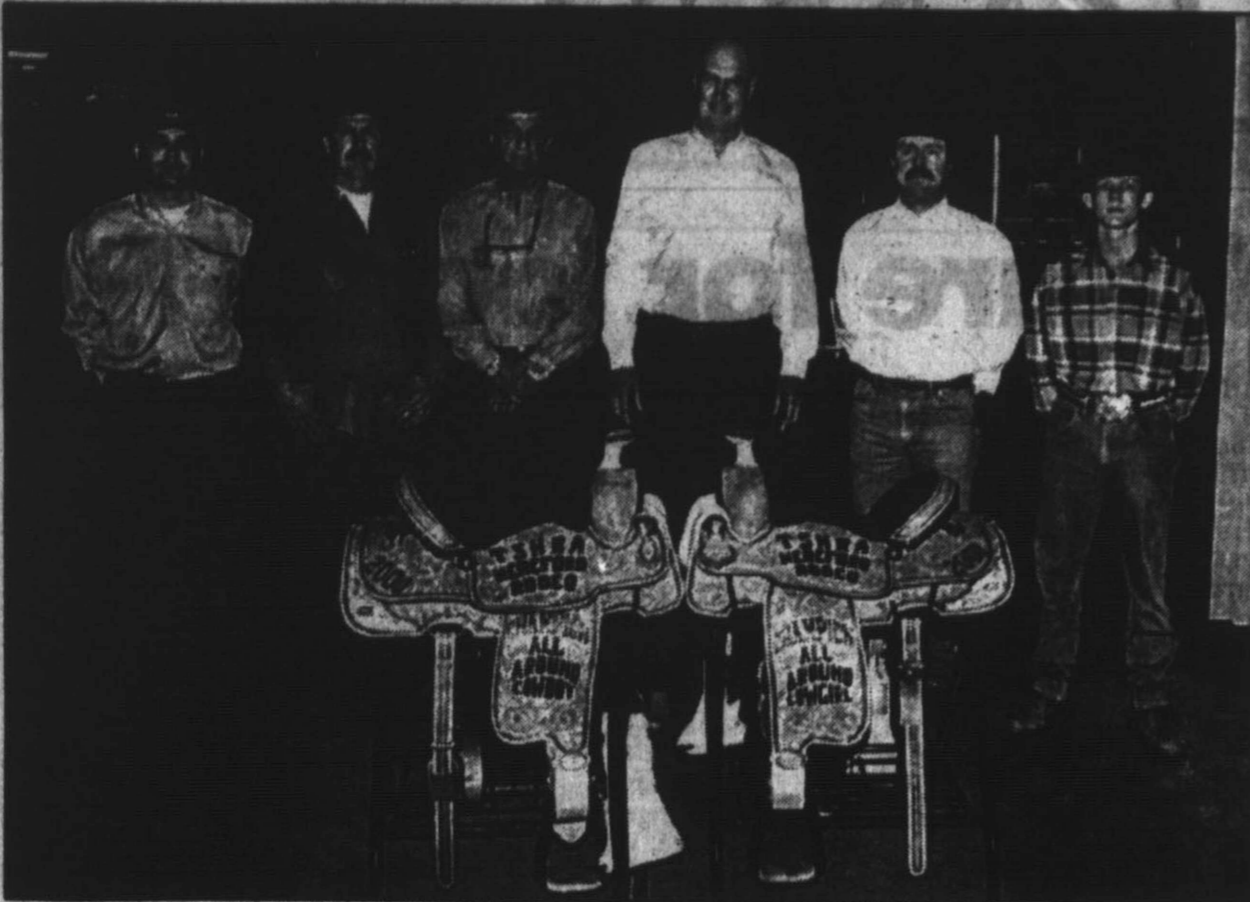

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YOUR EYES

What is Vision Therapy



Vision therapy, also known as visual training, can be equated to physical therapy of the eye. A series of eye exercises can help to eliminate problems such as amblyopia or lazy eye and strabismus or crossed eyes. Vision therapy in conjunction with corrective glasses or, in some cases, surgery can provide the best treatment. The type and length of therapy depends on what is being treated. A seven-year-old with lazy eye syndrome may need therapy for a year or more. A 43-year-old word processor may be treated for several months to alleviate his/her eyestrain.

Although vision therapy is currently an optometric specialty, it is actually an outgrowth of orthoptics. Physicians introduced orthoptics, which means "straightening of the eyes," in the United States in the late 1800's.

Patients undergoing vision therapy come to the doctor's office for a series of weekly or biweekly sessions. They also have exercises to do at home. Each patient receives an individualized therapy program. Careful medical assistance and regular monitoring is required to realize results. When the vision therapy treatments are successfully completed, they will not need to be repeated. Ask your eye care specialist about additional information on vision therapy.

Combs portrays ag future for local FFA

Agriculture depends on maintaining the interests of young farmers

The future of agriculture depends on the young people, age 18-40, staying in the business, the Texas agriculture

commissioner says. Susan Combs, who was in Hereford on Thursday, met with a group of Deaf Smith County FFA members at Hereford Feedyards to address the future of agriculture, "which is in the hands of all the young people who will keep it alive in the coming years."

In an effort to reach as many kids as possible, Combs' office set up booths at the recent State Fair in Dallas.

The booths drew more than one million visitors. She also told the students her office mans booths at job fairs and trade shows to encourage others to become involved with agriculture.

"We have to reach as many kids as we can," Combs said. "Those of you who have grown up with and maintain an interest in agriculture grow fewer every year. This is one industry we cannot let die."

Diversity impacts all areas of agriculture, according to Combs. For that reason, her office has simplified and streamlined the agriculture lending process for young farmers trying to break into agribusiness.

"We are open to suggestions and our purpose is to make it (agriculture) run. Any idea a young person can have related to agriculture, we will do what we can to

make it a reality," Combs said.

"We are going to have to diversify if agriculture is to have a future. We're not going to replace what we have, we're just going to add to it," she said.

Combs told the students agricultural diversity includes some of the newer degree programs which include tourism and alternative money makers for the farmer/rancher, and agribusiness degrees today reach into many fields beyond the traditional crops.

"The public wants stuff we don't know they want. When we find out what is needed the ag-businessman can find a way of meeting those needs," Combs said.

Along with diversification and maintaining an interest in

agriculture, Combs said improving agricultural methods must be the focus of anyone going into the industry.

"We have to find way to do things better. Ways to save labor and mechanize some of the more labor intensive areas. This is where the young people will excel," Combs said. "This generation will be the ones to make the best use of computers, technology, and design and incorporate better methods, which will guarantee a future for farming and ranching."

Combs said it is not enough to get young people interested in agriculture, but ways and means must be provided to keep their interest, so they will come back to rural areas and revitalize them and help build a strong economic base.

Simple steps improve grain handling

PEORIA, Ill. (AP) — Responding to concerns about genetically modified corn reaching the food supply, industry officials say farmers and operators of grain elevators can take steps as simple as improving their communication to keep separate the grain's varied strains.

Such steps could help better serve consumers who demand specific types of a grain and reduce the chances of a situation like the one encountered recently when a prohibited genetically modified variety of corn found its way into food items such as tacos.

Mark Lambert, spokesman for the Illinois Corn Growers Association, said the farming and grain-handling industries are currently evolving as the demand for nongenetically modified and so-called "specialty" grains increases. He said the arrival of genetically modified strains, or GMOs, is taking farming from the days when most producers grew essentially the same thing into new territory where different varieties should be kept separate to maintain their "identity" from field to market.

"We're still learning," he said. "It becomes more important now that the biotech curveball is thrown into the mix."

That was demonstrated in recent weeks when a brand of

genetically modified corn called StarLink, approved as animal feed but not for humans, began turning up in food processing plants. Some StarLink was accidentally delivered to grain elevators and mixed with commercial stocks.

David Bullock, a University of Illinois agriculture professor who published a study on grain-handling just before the StarLink controversy emerged, said the current infrastructure appears up to the task of keeping GMO corn, non-GMO corn and specialty crops separate once they reach the silo.

But there are several ways for crops to become contaminated with other types of corn before they reach grain merchants. For instance, a farmer who harvests a GMO field and does not clean his combine before moving on to a non-GMO field will have both types in truckloads that are supposed to be non-modified.

Bullock said a more pervasive cause is cross-pollination, when pollen from one type of corn fertilizes another type, giving both the same characteristics.

Lambert said farmers are recognizing that with several types of GMO and non-GMO corn on the market, they have to be more careful.

"I think you're going to find people being more religious about using buffer strips to

protect the integrity of what they're growing," he said.

Doug Wilson, who farms near Gridley, said he planted almost exclusively non-GMO corn this year. For convenience sake, he said, many farmers would rather plant GMO products but aren't sure what kind of market they will find.

With his non-GMO and high-oil corn, Wilson said, he can expect a premium in exchange for the work it takes to keep them uncontaminated.

"I've got to clean out the planter, I've got to harvest a buffer area, I've got to clean out the combine," he said. "We're doing everything we can to identify and channel."

Bullock said when grain reaches the elevators, it enters a system that is imperfect, but adapting. Most current elevators were built to lump all corn together, he said, but future facilities will be designed to store several varieties separately.

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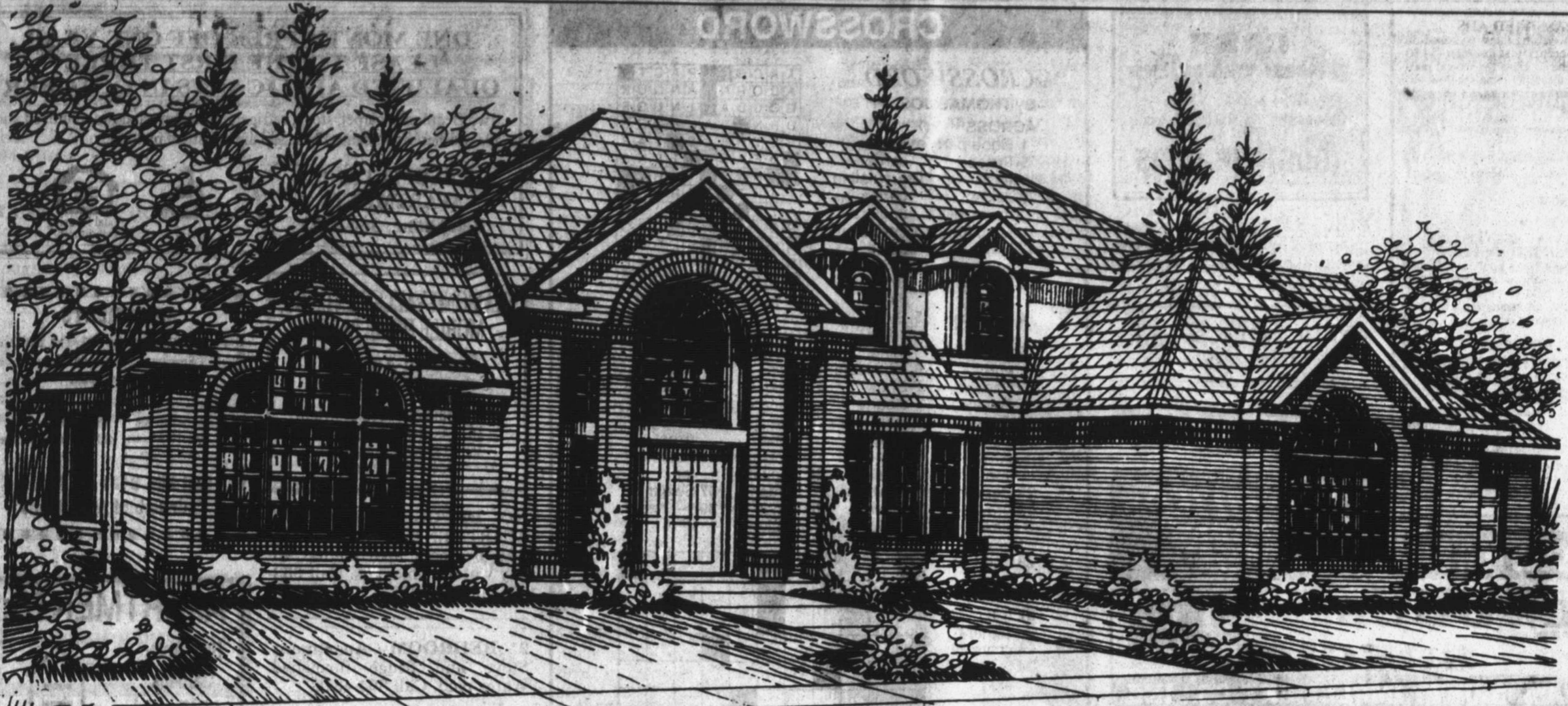

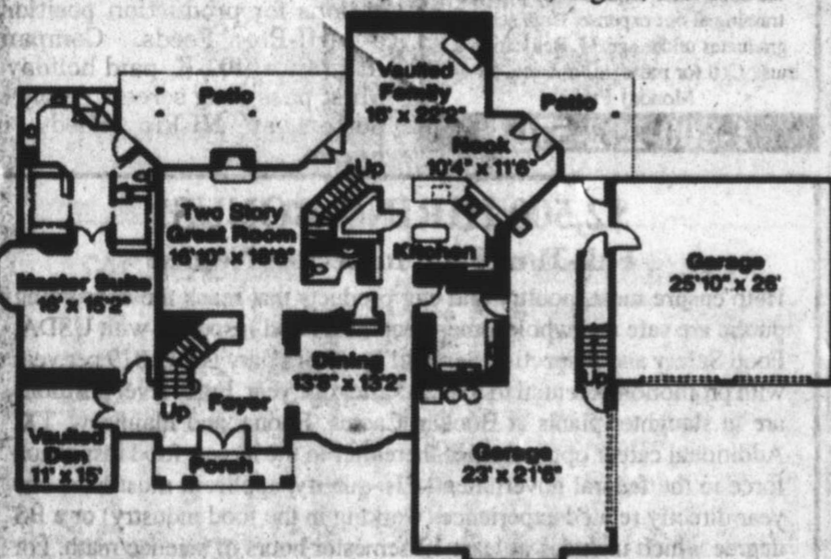

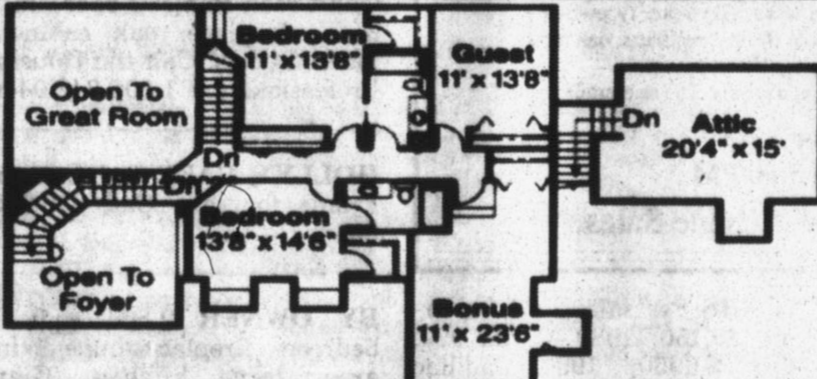

Writing Want Ads that really sell!

Unsure how to write a Classified Ad that will get results? Follow these pointers and you'll soon have an empty space in your storage room and cash in your pocket.
For starters, look at ads which offer the same item/products. Get a sense of going rates and ideas for how to make your ad stand out. Once you're ready to write, begin with exactly what you're selling: "Dining room set, maple, six chairs."
Then remember these hints:
• Give the price: A newspaper columnist says 70 percent of classified readers won't respond to an ad with no price.
• Use key words to describe what you're selling. The key words for a car are make, model, year, body style, color, mileage and price. If it's a house, key words are location, type of construction, number of bedrooms and baths, and condition.
• Don't use abbreviations. It's tempting to abbreviate and save money if ads are billed by the line. Brand ads are billed by the words, so spell them out so readers won't be confused trying to figure out abbreviations.
• Don't be misleading. Think accurate and factual when you write. Be sure to include a phone number and the best times to reach you.

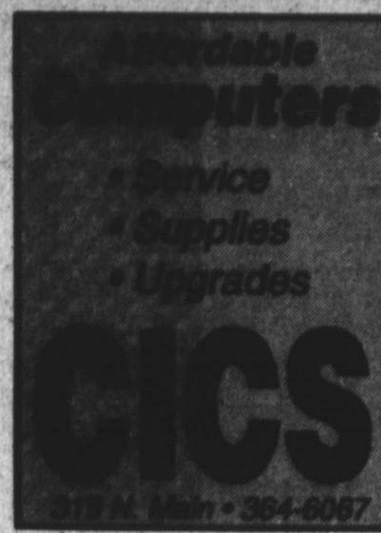

Spiced Recipe Death by Chocolate

Ingredients:
2 pkg. Little Debbie Homestyle Brownie Loaves
1/4 c. Hazelnut Dark Filling
1 1/2 lb. Butter (no substitutions)
24 oz. Semi-sweet Chocolate Chips
1 doz. Eggs
Whipped Topping, Cherries

Directions:
Cut brownie loaves in half, lengthwise, and fill bottom of 9x12 pan. With pastry brush, apply runs to brownie loaves. Melt butter in large pan; remove from heat and add 18 oz. of chocolate chips. Stir until melted; cool slightly. Beat the egg yolks into mixture one at a time until all are incorporated into the chocolate. Beat the egg whites until they form stiff peaks. Fold the whites into the chocolate mixture, and pour into the 9x12 pan. Cover with plastic wrap and chill for at least 6 hours.
Syrup: Melt remaining 6 oz. of chocolate chips in 1 TBSP of oil, stir and let cool.
Frost with whipped topping and decorate with cherries and drizzled syrup.

Gay dad returns to family in Goodman's new Fox sitcom



In the new sitcom *Normal, Ohio*, premiering Wednesday on Fox, single mom Pamela (Joely Fisher) agrees to let brother Butch (John Goodman) move in when he leaves L.A. to return to his Midwestern hometown in hopes of reconciling with his teen-age son. But there is more family for the gay father to contend with, from his puzzled parents to his aerospace ex-wife.

The success of *Providence* and *Ed* may have reinvigorated the appeal of "homecoming" projects, shows about a principal character who exchanges a big-city job for the rustic joy of a hometown.

That genre gets a mild jolt, however, with *Normal, Ohio*, in which a gay divorced man (John Goodman) returns to his small Midwestern hometown to be near his family. The new sitcom, from the creators and executive producers of *3rd Rock From the Sun* and *That '70s Show*, premieres Wednesday, Nov. 1, on Fox.

Goodman plays William "Butch" Gamble, an affable bear of a man who shocked his family four years earlier by coming out of the closet and moving to the more "tolerant" environs of Los Angeles.

As the show opens, however, Butch has returned to Normal, so to speak, and moved in with his sister, Pamela (Joely Fisher), a tough-minded single mom who understands her brother can't very well move in with their difficult parents (Anita Gillette, Orson Bean).

"All my friends' parents are dead," Butch says.

"Yeah, the grass is always greener," Pamela says with a sigh.

Butch's prime motivation in returning now is that his teen-age son, Charlie (Greg Pitts), is leaving for medical school, and Butch wants to mend fences with him — despite the fact that his ex-wife, Elizabeth (a tart Mo'Nique), has a tongue as sharp as any wire cutter.

Relations in every direction are strained, to say the least, but Butch makes it clear he intends to ride it out, especially after Charlie makes a startling announcement of his own.

Normal, Ohio comes to the Fox schedule with a troubled history. The

show originally was conceived as a kind of odd-couple comedy, with Anthony LaPaglia playing Goodman's straight roommate.

The sitcom that has evolved is less about homosexuality than it is about a more conventional topic: family. And, paradoxically, that makes it more interesting, say creators Bonnie and Terry Turner.

"The original pilot was set in L.A., but it's pithier to take the fish further out of the water," Bonnie Turner says. "And it's not even especially about a gay fish. It's about a man who made a choice, left home, came back and is trying to reconnect with his family."

"If you look at the stuff we write — whether it's *Coneheads* or *That '70s Show* — it all really comes down to being about family."

"When one person in a family decides to become honest, it causes other things to happen," Terry Turner adds. "Bonnie says that when the truth comes home, the truth comes out. And this is a family with all sorts of little secrets that they don't talk about."

"One by one, the family members have to come to terms with the fact that Butch is gay and he's there. Later, there will be love interests (for Butch) that the family will have to adjust to as well. It's just a family comedy that is gradually unfolding, some of it silly, some of it more touching."

The first episode contains several really solid laughs, although watching Dan Conner (Goodman's *Roseanne* alter ego) camping it up admittedly takes some getting used to. Decidedly in the plus column are Fisher, a joy as Pamela; droll Mo'Nique as the ex from hell; and veterans Gillette and Bean, although let's hope they evolve from Archie and Edith retreats.

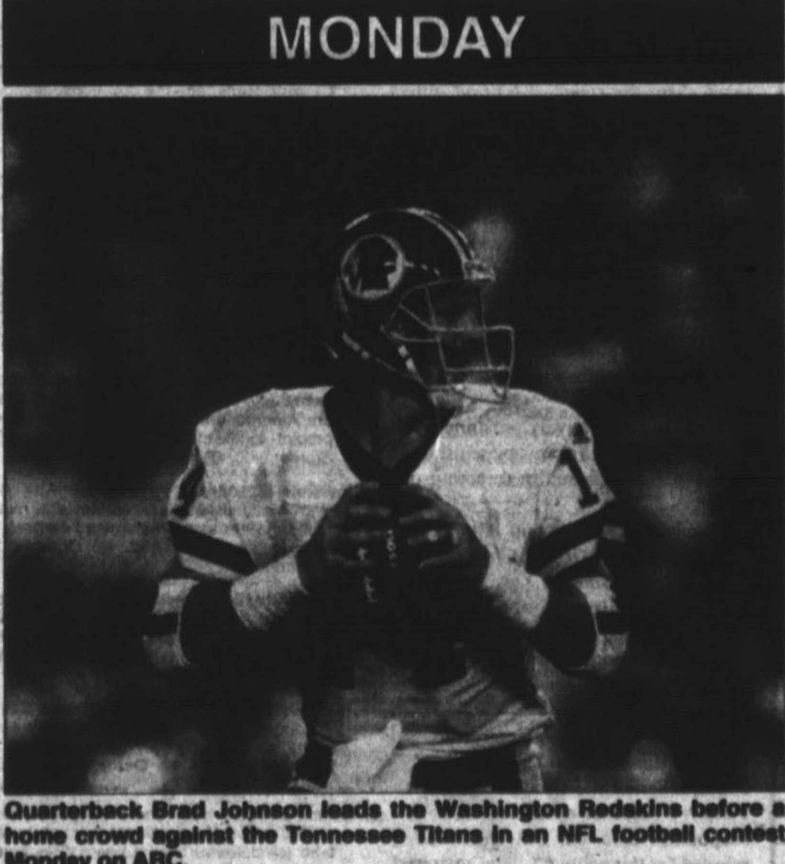

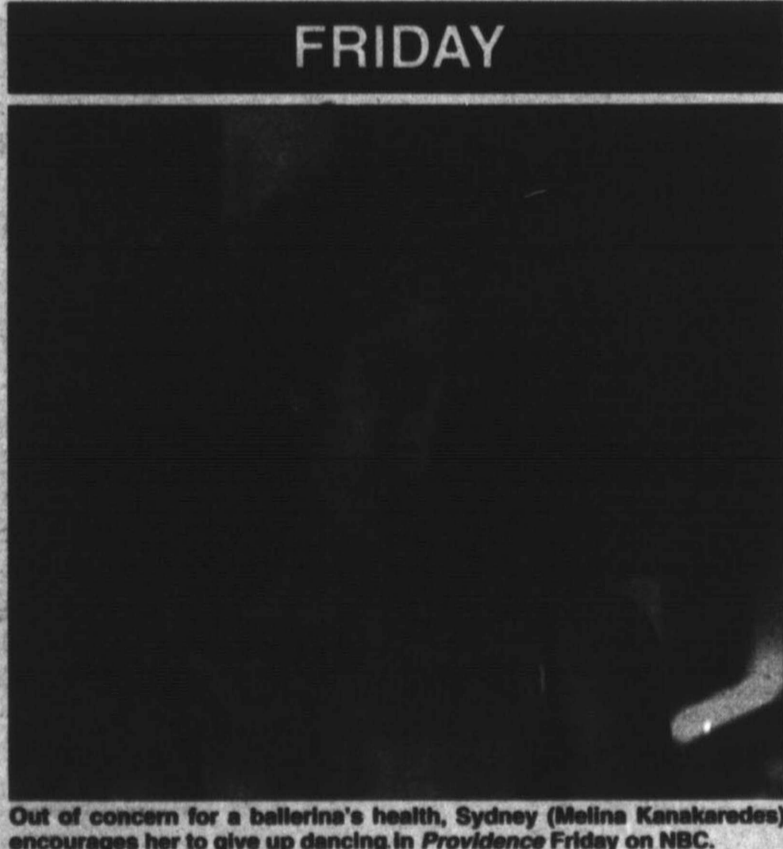

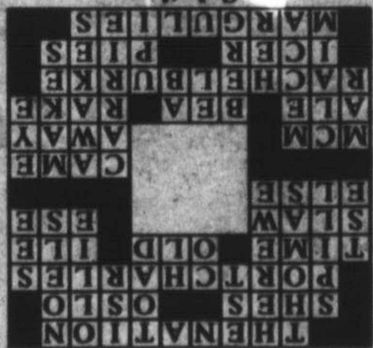
