WASHINGTON (AP) - A nasty budget war between President Clinton and Congress over taxes, education
and immigration is forcing lawmakers to endure rare weekend sessions
just 10 days from the presidential and congressional elections. The House voted $339-7$ today to
approve another one-day bill to keep appornment agencies from closing
and rekindling voters' memories of and rekindling voters'
the 1995-96 shutdowns.
The Senate planned to quickly approve the measure, which was
needed because only six of the 13 must-pass spending bills for fiscal
2001, which began O 2001, which began Oct, 1, have be-
come law. Congress will have to come law. Congress will have to other day-long extension,
Budget bargainers also planned to
meet both days in hopes of bridging meet both days in hopes of bridging gaps over the remaining pieces of
the $\$ 1.8$ trillion federal budget. But with members of each party itching to draw partisan distinctions and ea-

neither side wasted chances to lamneither sice
bast the other.

## Rainfall brings optimism as waterfowl seasons kick off

Heavi rainfall in scatiered portions of the local area during the

lakes to fife waterfowl humting opportunity st lakes to offer waterfowl humting opportunity as the long run The High Plains Mallard Management Unit duck season extends October 28，through January 21，while the regular Westem Zone goose season spans the period from October 28 drrough Feb bruary 11 ． Daily bag fimit for ducks in the High Plains area is six．It may include no more than five mallards or Mexican mallards，only two of which may be hens；three scaup either lesser or greater，two wood ducks；wwo redheads；
one motlled duck；one pintail；and one canvasback．Posession limit is twice the daily bag limit．
Bag limit for geese in the Westem Zone is five dark gesese，to include no more than one white－fronted goose，and 20 light geese．Possession limit is twice the daily bag limit for dark geese，with no possession limilfor light
geese $\underset{\text { For rith }}{\text { gese }}$ For the third consecutive year，a special light goose conservation season
will kick－in following the conclusion of the regular goose season．This late season begins February 12， 2001 in the Western Zone and will continue through April 1,2001 ．The 2001 season will mark the first in which hunting date guidelinesw were put in place well in advance eand won＇t
interfere with the full rum of the sandhill crane season that wans interfere with the full run of the sapdhill crane season that spans
November 11,2000 to Febriary 11.2001 in our own Zone November 11， 2000 to February 11,2001 in our own Zone A． pattern out before we have an idea of how the regular duck and goose season will go．Certainly，here＇s more room for optimism than there was only a week kago．
The special conservation season for snow geese has been a mixed event locally．The initial one in 1999 was a winner hereabouts as many hunters

primarily because snow geese went around and simply didnt＇t move through this area in any number．Still，interest is high．
The special snow goose seasons were implemented to lower populations of critically over－abundant mid－continent light geese that have been


## damaging their fragice habitat in the Arctic．

Preliminary harvest reports by the U．S．Fish \＆Wildlife Service indicate that hunters in the U．S．bagged 1.3 million light geese during the 1999 － 2000 regular and conservation seasons．Harvest of light geese in Canada was also expected to total more than 100,000 birds，meaning the total North American harvest likely exceeded 1.4 million geese．
According to a news report from Ducks Unlimited，waterfowl experts predict that if this rate of harvest is maintained，the overall population of
mid－continent snow geese could be decreased by hali，and provided that heavy harvesting of surplus geese continues，the snow goose population could be cropped to a level that their habitat can support by the year 2008 ． Preliminary figures on the extended harvogt of snow geese are
ouraging．＂says Paul Schmidt，co－chairman of the Arctic Goose Joint Venture Management Board．
＂If we＇re able to sustain this level of harvest for the next several years，we may be able to stop the devastation that is occurring in the fragile Arctic ecosystem，and begin the long process of restoration，＂says Schmidt． Waterfowl biologists report that during the past three decades the mid－
continent light goose population has tripled－in part due to the tremendous continent light goose population has tripled－in part due to the tremendous in farm fields after mechanical harvesting operations．Along the migrating

In the face of this ecological crisis， of conservation organizations the Fish o＇Wildife Service developed conservation measures allowing 24 states in the Central and Missirsippi special light goose seasons．Hunters were allowed to thice light gecse after March 10 ，when seasons typically close． When a legal challenge to the late season surficed，the F\＆WS decided in Statement analyzing the impact of the regulations．
In response，Congress enacted the Aretic Tundra Habitat Emergency Conservation Act，which extends through May 15，2001．The Act allows states to implement special late season harvest rules while F\＆Ws completes an Environmental Impact Statement．
The initial year of special season harvest failed to hit the 1.4 million mark control．Regular and special seasons combined in the U．S．and Canade yielded a harvest of 1.07 million light geese for the 1998－99 waterfowl season．
The pace of harvest picked up to near the target level for the 1999－2000 season，leaving waterfowl biologists，sportsmen and conservation
organizations encouraged that the regular and special late snow goose seasons on tap for $2000-2001$ will continue to bring the resource into balance with its habitat．

cessing plants. Some StarLink was accidentally delivered to grain elevators and mixed with
commercial stocks. David Bullock of Illinois agriculture professor who published a study on grain-handling just before the StarLink controversy emerged,
said the current infrastructure sappears up to the task of

"One by one, the family members have to come to terms with the fact that Butch is gay and he's there. Later, there wiil be love interests (for Butch) that the family wili have to adjust to as well. it's just a family comedy that is gradually unfolding, some of it silly, some of it more touching.
The first episode contains several really solid laughs, although watching Dan Conner (Goodman's Roseanne alter ego) camping it up admittedly takes some getting used to. Decidedly in the plus column are Fisher, a joy as Pamela; droll Gaffney as the ex from hell; and veterans Gillette and Bean, al though let's hope they evolve from Archie and Edith retreads.

Forsyth goes beyond acting in new soap roles By Candece Havens

While he may no longer have a starring role on a daytime series, David Forsyth (Dr. John Hudson, Another World) is still very involved in the soaps.
As co-host of Soap Center on the ca-
ble channel SoapNet, Forsyth gets a chance to keep up with the news and gossip surrounding his pals in the world of daytime.
"It's a great way to keep in touch with what is happening in the industry. Forsyth says. "My co-host, Brook Alexander (Samantha Anderson, As the World Turns), and I have both worker in daytime. Now we see it from a different point of view. I know more about what's going on in the industry than I did when I was acting."
Forsyth tapes Soap Center one day a week, which leaves him time to pursue some of his other interests. Directing daytime dramas is quickly becoming a passion.
