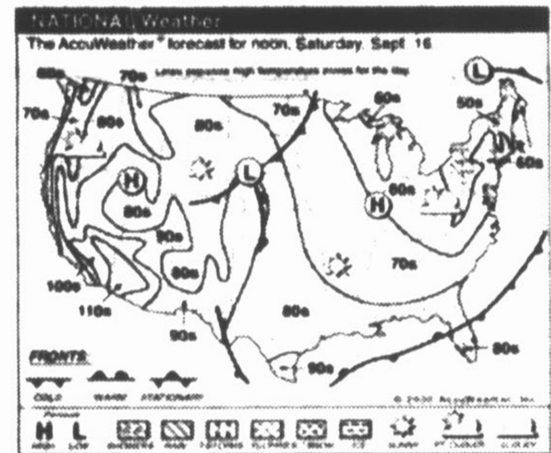

Scattered showers will move across the Northeast and northern mid-Atlantic states Saturday and it will be cool across the eastern Midwest. Scattered thunderstorms are expected over South Florida, but the rest of the nation will be warm and dry.

• Texas to get relief from heat; cool front arrives

Milder temperatures were in store for much of Texas today as a cool front moved into the state, according to Associated Press reports.

The front stretched along a line from Texarkana through Denton and Midland to Marfa. Skies south of the front were cloudy, spreading into South Texas and the Big Bend.

Isolated showers fell from the Del Rio area southeastward to the lower Rio Grande Valley, with rain falling at Alice overnight. Storms also lingered around Corpus Christi and the Rio Grande Plains between Eagle Pass and Uvalde.

Early-morning temperatures ranged from the 60s to 80s. It was 71 at Burnet and College Station; 72 degrees at McGregor; 75 at Childress; 79 at Laredo, Alice and Galveston; and 81 degrees at Dallas Love Field.

Winds were mostly northerly at 6 to 14 mph north of the front along the Red River and westerly at 5 to 10 mph in the Dallas-Fort Worth area, with variable conditions south of the system and gusts in mountain passes.

Afternoon temperatures were expected to warm to the 80s and mid-90s over northern sections of the state to near 105 in the Big Bend valleys through Saturday, with upper 70s in the Guadalupe Mountains.

A slight chance of showers and thunderstorms was forecast for western parts of the state, including the Big Bend.

Winds should shift to the north as the frontal zone moves southward, with wind speeds from 10 to 20 mph.

Lows should be in the lower 60s to the mid-70s, with 50s in the mountains.

■ Safety is always first in Nall's approach to teaching how to weld

With hoods and gloves in place, oxygen and acetylene gauges checked, a group of students tentatively attempt the fine art of welding.

The bead has to be just right to make a perfect weld. Too heavy and the welded seam appears cumbersome and tacky; too light and the seam will never hold.

For many of the students in Don Nall's welding class at Hereford High School, the equipment, protective gear and the movements to operate them properly is awkward, but most gradually become accustomed to the heavy ironworking instruments.

The students don't just walk in and start welding. For the first few weeks of class, students spend time learning what each item in the shop is, what it can do and the best way to use it. Even then, operating the welding machine remains a few days off. Students have to pass a safety test and a measurement exam before they are allowed in the metal shop.

"Some of these kids have never seen some of this stuff," instructor Don Nall said. "For the first few days, I'm kept busy just telling them what each item is. Then another week is spent telling them what it is used for."

When the students finally get into shop, Nall takes his time

The Forgotten War

Inch'on breakout to be highlighted

The weekend edition of the *Hereford Brand* will feature the second in a series of articles commemorating the major events of the Korean War on its 50th anniversary. The series began on June 25 with a commemoration of the start of the conflict, which occurred on June 25, 1950. The second article in the series centers around Sept. 16, 1950, when United Nation forces broke out of the Inch'on Perimeter and began the march to the north. Along with the summary of this historic event will be a brief biography of some of the service people involved in the Korean conflict — veterans who live or have lived in Hereford and the surrounding areas or who have relatives here. With the printing of this issue, 36 biographies of area Korean veterans will have been published. All of them were in service by January 1951. This is a project of Los Ciboleros Chapter NSDAR of Hereford, in connection with the U.S. Defense Department.

BARELY ONLINE Governments lag behind in their use of the 'Net

WASHINGTON (AP) — Federal and state governments still have a long way to go in exploiting the power of the Internet, with few offering user-friendly Web sites to help people do business with governments online, a survey found.

Among the states, Texas ranked first and Rhode Island last in efficient use of the Internet, Brown University researchers said. The White House Web site ranked near the bottom among federal Internet destinations.

"Most of these sites are struggling just to get one service online," said Darrell M. West, the Brown political science professor who led the effort.

Texas barely edged out the rest of the sites, offering 51 percent of the customer features researchers were looking for, which included government publications and forms, databases, services and disability access. Rhode Island only had 19 percent of those features, on average.

Many of the sites also lacked privacy and security statements, and the policies that were posted were so fraught with loopholes and dense speech as to be meaningless, he said.

Brown University researchers checked more than 1,800 Web sites, ranking major federal agencies and

all 50 states to see how the governments were using the technology.

They found that 78 percent of the sites delivered no online services at all, such as allowing citizens to file a complaint, order publications or renew their vehicle registrations. Many sites didn't even offer contact information such as a phone number or mailing address.

"Well-run, efficiently organized Web sites that offer useful services to citizens may have a significant positive effect on public spirit and the attitude of citizens toward government," West said. "That potential certainly exists. We found, however, that e-government is still in its early stages."

Larger states tended to do better in the 50-state rankings, with Minnesota, New York, Pennsylvania and Illinois leading the list after Texas. States with small populations, such as Nevada, South Dakota, New Hampshire, Delaware and Rhode Island, lacked large enough economies to offer such services and came in last.

West also talked to the state technology heads to see what services they wanted to put on their site. Most wished for vehicle registration renewal, which only seven states offer now.

• Test oranges found on beaches •

GALVESTON, Texas (AP) — Tons of oranges were a surprise for beachcombers this week among the usual driftwood and other flotsam moving onto Galveston Island with the tide.

The floating fruit was part of an oil spill cleanup exercise, but residents along the Texas coast assumed instead that it was cargo lost from a ship.

The spill cleanup exercise from Monday to Wednesday was designed to test new equipment and methods, the U.S. Coast Guard said.

After dumping the oranges, crew members of a ship owned by National Response Inc. and based on Pelican Island laid a line of containment booms around the oranges in a simulated oil slick.

"When you have a group of them, they behave like an oil spill," Ken Bitting of the Coast Guard's Groton, Conn.-based research and development unit told The Galveston County Daily News in Friday's editions. "They have about the same density, they move at about the same speed and escape from the booms at about the same rate."

Plant faces federal fines

TYLER, Texas (AP) — The Occupational Safety and Health Administration, which was not notified by an East Texas glue manufacturing plant's operators of an explosion that injured seven workers, is considering sanctions against the facility.

Four workers of National Casein Co. remained hospitalized Friday at the burn unit of Dallas' Parkland Memorial Hospital, five days after the chemical flash fire which heavily damaged National Casein Co. near Winona.

Federal regulators began their investigation after hearing about the blast and fire from news reports.

Kathryn Delaney, area director for OSHA's Dallas office, told the Tyler Morning Telegraph in Friday's editions that the agency must be notified within eight hours of an industrial accident involving a death or three or more injuries.

Texas faces highway funding cuts

State laws fail to meet federal standards

AUSTIN (AP) — Texas leads the nation in alcohol-related traffic deaths and will lose \$96 million in federal highway construction funds over the next two years because state law is not tough enough on drunken drivers, a state official says.

Mark Cross, a spokesman for the Texas Department of Transportation, said federal law requires the state to divert the money from construction to traffic-safety efforts because Texas doesn't ban open containers of alcohol in vehicles or automatically jail repeat drunken drivers.

"It's money that we would have used for construction and traffic congestion and mobility" projects, Cross told The Dallas Morning News in Thursday's editions.

State Rep. Fred Hill, R-Richardson, who has tried five times to pass legislation ban-

ning open containers in vehicles, said he would try again when the Legislature convenes in January. But it won't be easy to overcome what he called traditional opposition from the liquor industry and from lawyers who defend people charged in drunken driving.

"We have an element in the Legislature that thinks it is an inalienable right of a Texan to drink a beer on the way home from work and throw the empty in the back of a pickup truck," Hill said. "Every time the Texas Legislature fails to pass this, people die."

Fifteen other states also will lose some of their federal highway construction funds by Oct. 1 under a 1998 federal law that holds back the money unless states ban open containers of alcohol and strongly punish people who are convicted of drunken driving more than once.

Texas will lose the most, however, at \$48 million a year and the federal penalty soon will escalate to \$80 million a year, Hill said.

Instead of road construction,

the money can still be used for road-safety projects such as widening intersections.

"It doesn't mean the money won't go to the state of Texas," Hill said. "It means that we will be capable of developing the best billboard campaign against drunk driving in the world. But we will not be addressing the problem of getting drunk drivers off the road."

Texas leads the nation in alcohol-related traffic deaths.

In 1999, Texas had 1,734 alcohol-related traffic fatalities, about half of all driving deaths in the state that year, according to figures from the U.S. Department of Transportation.

California, a more populous state, was second with 1,351 alcohol-related driving fatalities, representing about 38 percent of all driving deaths in that state.

Nationwide, about 38 percent of all traffic deaths are alcohol-related, according to federal figures.

"Texas is way above the curve and has been that way for years," said Bill Lewis, legislative analyst for the Texas chapter of Mothers Against

Drunk Driving.

"Texas is not just a bit worse, it's a lot worse."

Lewis said MADD will make passage of an open container ban one of its top priorities in the next legislative session.

Under Texas law, police can cite drivers for possessing an open container of alcohol only if they witness the driver drinking from it.

With regard to repeat drunken-driving offenders, state law provides for up to a year in jail, fines up to \$4,000 and suspension of a license for 180 days to two years.

The federal standard for a repeat offender requires a driver's license to be suspended for not less than one year and imprisonment for at least five days or at least 30 hours of community service.

In 1999, lawmakers did pass one measure cracking down on drunken driving by lowering the legal blood alcohol limit from 0.10 to 0.08. That move brought the state a total of \$23 million in extra highway construction funds for this year and last, state officials said.

Rottweilers named deadliest dogs

ATLANTA (AP) — Rottweilers have passed pit bulls as America's deadliest dog breed, according to a study released Friday.

The large dogs were involved in 33 fatal attacks on humans between 1991 and 1998, the American Veterinary Medical Association said.

Pit bulls, which had been responsible for more deaths than any other breed, were involved in 21 fatal attacks over the same period.

Rottweilers, first bred in Germany, surged in popularity during the 1990s as more people sought them for protection, said Jeffrey J. Sacks, an epidemiologist with the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention.

"People are more in fear of crime and violence, and this has led to a selection of bigger dogs," he said. "If you start selecting bigger dogs, you'll get bigger bites."

EEOC sues oil companies

HOUSTON (AP) — Three Houston oil companies have been sued by the Equal Employment Opportunity Commission on allegations they forced six employees to retire because they were older than 50.

According to the age discrimination lawsuit filed Thursday, the six employees were retired from B.P. Huddleston & Co., Peter Paul Petroleum Co. and the Continental Operating Co., the Houston Chronicle reported in Friday's editions.

During an Oct. 8, 1998 meeting, chairman B.P.

The study's authors, using data from the Humane Society of the United States and media accounts of dog maulings, reported 27 people — 19 of them children — died from dog attacks in 1997 and 1998.

The numbers highlight widespread mistreatment of dogs and a growing public ignorance of how to behave around them, researchers said. They blamed adults for not teaching children to stay away from unfamiliar dogs.

"It's not a Rottweiler problem or a pit bull problem," said Randall Lockwood, the Humane Society's vice president for research and educational outreach. "It's a people problem."

The annual number of reported fatal attacks has not varied widely in the past 20 years, the study said. But overall attacks are on the rise — likely because families are busier, leaving them less time

to train their dogs and watch their children.

"A dog has to have its behavior monitored and consequences put in place," Sacks said. "People don't seem to have a lot of time in their lives for that."

Pit bulls led all breeds for fatal attacks between 1979 and 1998, with at least one pit bull involved in 66 mauling deaths, the study said. Rottweilers

were blamed for 37 — most of those in the 1990s — followed by German shepherds with 17 and huskies with 15.

Researchers cautioned the breakdown does not necessarily indicate which dogs provide the highest risk of fatal attacks because incomplete registration of dogs and mixed breeds make it hard to determine how many of each type of dog Americans own.

Bring on the Steers

■ Head coach Yenzler said he hopes last week's loss motivates Herd against Big Spring

Get back on track. That is what the Hereford Whitefaces hope to do tonight when they host Big Spring at Whiteface Stadium at 7:30 p.m. Boys Athletic Director and head football coach Craig Yenzler said he has faith in his team and wants them to focus on the game at hand against the Steers.

"I still feel like we're a good football team, and we are going to get better and better," Yenzler said. "We are going to work on taking care of business and not get discouraged."

The Hostile Herd (0-1,0-0) fell to Amarillo Tascosa in their season opener last week 27-26. The team now faces their second non-district game against a tough Big Spring team. The Steers (1-0,0-0) feature an I-formation offense with two six-foot running

backs, and a defense with senior defensive tackles Nick Valencia (5-10, 220) and Justin Nichols (6-2, 270).

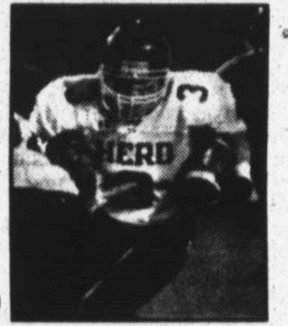

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'Prime Time' ready for Cowboys

Sanders knows Monday night game against Dallas big step for Redskins

WASHINGTON (AP) — Monday night's game means too much to Deion Sanders to let the Washington Redskins suffer a letdown against his former team, the winless Dallas Cowboys. He's thus vowed to be inspirational.

"When I was a Cowboy, we really believed we could beat the Redskins," he said at Redskins Park on Thursday. "I'm going to address my teammates here and let them know the Cowboys always believed that. We've got to believe that inside this locker room, because you're not going to see an 0-2 team come to play. You're going to see a football team play like they haven't played this year."

Monday, Sanders will face for the first time the team he played for from 1995 until last year — a team he helped win a Super Bowl in 1996 and represented four times in the Pro Bowl. Sanders was released in June when he became too expensive.

"Monday night is always special," Sanders said. "You have the center stage for the whole country to see you do your

thing. Since I've been a child I've been in the spotlight, and everyone's been taking shots at me."

Sanders took shots in the spotlight last week, but it didn't turn out so well for him. His performance at cornerback in a 15-10 loss to Detroit was the worst of his 12-year career, he said. Lions quarterback Charlie Batch threw Sanders' way often, and often with success, prompting a public confession.

"For me, it was a bad day," he said. "For most corners, it was an average day. ... They just moved the ball with short curls all day, particularly on me. But that will be corrected this week, I assure you of that."

Sanders is a dangerous Monday night player. In 15 games, he's scored three touchdowns, two from punt returns and the other on an interception. He also has five interceptions and 16 receptions.

Sanders has said for some time he's looking forward to the showdown.

"I can't say it's just another game," he said, "because I have so many wonderful relationships with my past teammates in Dallas, Darren Woodson, Alonzo Spellman, just to name a few."

It's a critical game for both NFC East teams. With the Redskins at 1-1 and the Cow-

boys 0-2, a loss could hurt playoff hopes.

When Sanders wore the blue and silver, the Cowboys beat the Redskins six of 10 games, including the last five. But he didn't feel the same intensity in the rivalry that

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team has already formed, but he said he wants his team to do them better.

"We are not going to change what we do, but how we do it," Yenger said. "They (the players) need to understand that we are going to pick up and move on."

Another concept the coach said he hopes his players can do is start doing the little things right. Yenger said it may be something as simple as a player keeping his locker neat. The coach said if a player takes initiative in a little thing like that, other issues will fall into place.

"It is just one of those little things we need to take pride in," Yenger said. "We need to increase our intensity level and do what's right."

The team's saying for the week is, "Do what is right." Yenger said the players need to make themselves do the right thing during practice and especially during games. The coach said his team is disappointed in their execution of this principal last Friday.

"We are not ashamed of what we did," Yenger said. "We are ashamed of how we did it."

The coach said he does not want his team to get down about last week's loss, and he does not think that will happen. Yenger said he just wants his team to bounce back and show what they are made of.

"If we don't get discouraged we'll be alright," Yenger said. "A key deal is to keep composure and intensity when maybe things aren't going the way you want."

"The easy thing to do is hope we are successful from the very start, but how many of us are?" Yenger said.

Yenger also said he thinks the loss can do nothing but help the team. He said he believes the team will only work harder to win.

"The only thing that we have hurt right now is our pride," Yenger said. "That was the only injury we had Friday night."

"There is nothing like getting a little mud thrown in your face to motivate you," Yenger said.

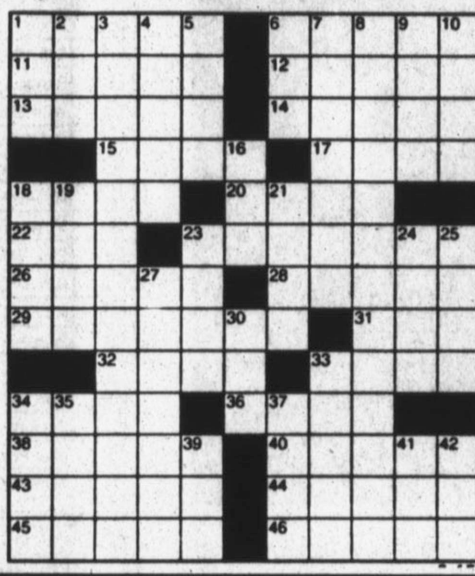

with the students, showing them just how to move the equipment, how to line up the separate pieces of metal and how to tack it together before starting the true welding.

"Everything is hands-on work," Nall said. "I spend as little time in the classroom as possible, because welding is just something you have to do to be able to get it right."

From start to finish, the students' projects are of their own making. They do the drawings and measurements and then Nall explains the best way to proceed.

Bird cages, chairs, tables, candle holders and shelves all come together under the students' welding torches. Each student has a different reason for taking the class; each one gets something different from completing the class.

"Sometimes I get a kid in here that is something of a surprise — one you would expect to be taking algebra and higher computer courses. But most come in here and want to learn to do something with their hands," Nall said.

Jose Velasquez, a second-year student has notions of designing an all-metal house. Steven Aguilar became infatuated with it after seeing his stepfather weld. Nicky Rodriguez explained that it is a class that most boys think "real girls" would never take.

Nall said students learn to turn welding into a trade, a hobby or something just to keep their hands busy, but most enjoy the class and leave knowing they can weld and the fun they can have with it.

"It's all about learning to do something with their hands. They can turn it into art or a career. The big thing is they learn something from the class," Nall said.

Product Safety Commission, Internal Revenue Service and the Treasury Department had the best sites, and the White House, U.S. Trade Representative and the National Security Council had the worst, according to the survey.

West said there were "glaring omissions" in the recently redesigned White House site, which had 42 percent of the features researchers looked for. There's a privacy statement, but no security statement, and there are no databases, services or access for people with disabilities.

"It's surprising when they redesigned it they didn't add a lot of features," he said. "The site looks good, but there's not a whole lot there."

The survey found that of the federal and state Web sites examined, only 5 percent told users that information sent to the site was secured, and only 7 percent had a privacy policy. A federal Office of Management and Budget directive requires federal sites to disclose their privacy standards, but some still do not. West said many of the privacy statements are deficient too.

"There's a lot of weasel language in the statements," he said. "Sometimes even when they're giving lip service to privacy, there's not a lot of substance behind it."

Overall, the researchers said the federal government generally is more advanced than the states when it comes to Web sites, with many more federal sites having databases and offering services than the states. Only 39 percent of state sites offered a database of any kind, compared with 94 percent of federal sites. No state site had a consistent or standard design across its Web sites, although three states — Washington, Indiana and Connecticut — had a common navigation system.

Many sites lacked the basics, such as how to contact the government agency. Several sites had no phone number or address, and many more had no e-mail address.

European protesters end fuel blockades

LONDON — Fuel-starved Britain was slowly getting back to normal today after most fuel-tax protesters called off their pickets of depots and refineries. Truckers in Belgium also began to lift their blockades of highways, fuel depots and city streets late Thursday. Protests against high fuel prices, however, appeared set to begin in other European countries, including Spain, Hungary and Poland. Pickets in Britain began to come down Thursday morning and most of the blockades that have choked off Britain's fuel supply over the past week had been removed by early Friday with tankers once again rolling to gas stations. Shell said 20 percent of its pumps would be full by the weekend.

Ford won't make final bid for Daewoo Motor

SEOUL, South Korea — Ford Motor Co. announced Friday that it will not make a final bid for the South Korea's debt-laden Daewoo Motor Co., casting doubt on the country's efforts to restructure its debt-ridden industries. Then in another blow to the South Korean conglomerate, government regulators said that Daewoo Group, which includes Daewoo Motor, had falsified its financial books to conceal debts totaling \$20.6 billion.

Dissident breaks her house arrest in Myanmar

YANGON, Myanmar — Myanmar pro-democracy leader Aung San Suu Kyi left her residence Friday after two weeks of virtual house arrest and dared the military government to stop her plans to travel outside the capital. Accompanied by other leaders of her National League for Democracy, Suu Kyi entered her party headquarters in downtown Yangon. The office had been sealed off by authorities on Sept. 2. "We are a legal political party and they have no right to raid our party," Suu Kyi told a press conference at the headquarters. Suu Kyi, who won the 1991 Nobel Peace Prize for her peaceful struggle for democracy in Myanmar — also known as Burma — did not say where she planned to travel to, but challenged the military authorities: "Stop us if you dare."

Hopkins to be honored at Virginia film festival

CHARLOTTESVILLE, Va. — Anthony Hopkins will be given the Virginia Film Award at the state's annual film festival next month. Hopkins, who won an Academy Award for his performance as serial killer Hannibal Lecter in "The Silence of the Lambs," will be presented with the award Oct. 28. The theme for this year's festival is "Animal Attractions," with an emphasis on images of human-animal hybrids such as werewolves and vampires. Hopkins recently was in Richmond to film a portion of "Hannibal," the sequel to "The Silence of the Lambs."
