Farmers roll up sleeves, hope for rain

Deaf Smith County farmers are rolling back their sleeves and glancing upward in hopes of rain as they prepare to plant their 1994 sugar beet crop.

Sugar beets, one of the cash-rich crops in the county, is expected to bring local producers \$14 million in

revenue this year compared to \$12.2 million last year.

According to Dennis Printz, a spokesman for Holly Sugar, the county had a late harvest last year because of poor weather conditions and the sugar quality suffered. He expects 35,000 to 40,000 acres to be planted this year by an estimated 420 growers in the county.

"We hope it'll be a good year," said Printz. "The bulk of beets will be planted by the end of March and everything should be finished by April. The harvest will be finished around the end of September if there are no complications."

Although farmers are looking for rain, Dennis Newton, county extension agent-agriculture for the

county, said the weather has to dry up before local farmers will plant their vegetable crops -- potatoes, cabbage, and broccoli. The corn crop will be planted around the first of April.

Newton said one of the major changes in farming locally in the past two years has been in pivot irrigation.

"Farmers are turning to sprinkler irrigation instead of furrow irrigation," said Newton. "This saves them a lot of water and money -- up to 40 per cent savings."

"Sure, there's an initial cost, but it will make the farmer money in the long haul."

The beauty, said Newton, is that sprinkler irrigation lets the farmer regulate how much water he puts onto the crop. The farmer "only has to put in the amount of water he needs," Newton stated.

Another change farmers will be facing this year is tougher worker protection standards adapted by the Environmental Protection Agency.

"The new standards require farmers to keep more records even if they have only one worker," declared Newton. "In the past they needed a certain number of employees before they were forced to adhere to the requirements. Now all that changes."

While Newton believes farm workers have the right to be protected from pesticides and exploitation, he says the government often takes an extreme approach to solving farm problems. As an example, he pulled out a thick supplement the EPA had sent to him called "the Work Protection Standard For Agricultural Pesticides: How To Comply and What Employers Need To Know."

Said Newton, "I haven't even read it yet. It just arrived, but look how thick it is. And that's just one new regulation the farmers face."

The EPA and people like Charlie Thomas, pesticides specialist with the Texas Department of Agriculture in Amarillo, are called upon to enforce the tougher restrictions.

Thomas, a softspoken man, sympathizes with the farmers he must regulate.

"The biggest concern we have is education," said Thomas. "We have to get the necessary information to the farmers so they'll know how to comply."

"It's neither pleasant nor desirable to deal with a problem after it has occurred."

The Department of Agriculture enforces the EPA program under a federal grant. Although the department's workload has increased because of the new regulations, the government hasn't increased their staff to do the work, Thomas added.

Farming is by far the number one income source in the county. Local farmers are expected to receive more than \$353 million for farm products, including wheat, corn, hay, sorghum, beef, sugar beets, and pinto beans this

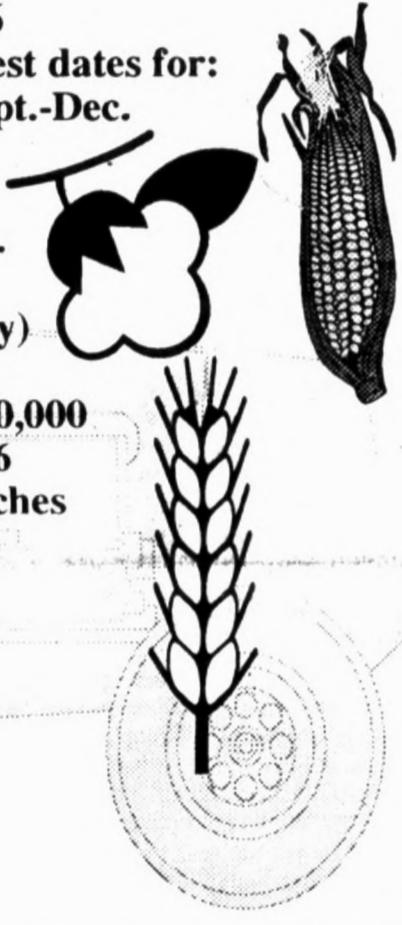

Local officers hope to make difference in gang activities

Bill Murray and company made a popular movie a few years ago called "Ghostbusters." Two Hereford Police officers, concerned about growing gang unrest in the Hereford area, have adopted a nickname that has a similar ring.

Meet Emilio Valdez and Richard Bachus -- the Ghostbusters.

Valdez, 34, and Bachus, 25, recently attended a seminar in Amarillo to learn how to get the community involved in separating young people from gang activities.

They were assigned by Police Chief David Wagner to attend the three-day seminar for a very good reason. Where Hereford once had only one gang operating in the city -- the Latin Kings -- there are now 20

gangs with more than 100 members functioning within the city limits.

Local gangs get involved in numerous anti-social activities, ranging from assault to vandalism. Their graffiti knows no geographical boundaries.

Said Bachus, "Some of these gangs are forming within the school system."

"We know, for example, that there are gangs in Hereford Junior High School. And a growing number of girls are becoming gang members."

According to the officers, one female gang in Hereford is known as BWA -- Bitches With An Attitude.

It's fairly easy to identify a gang member, added Valdez. Just watch for colors and the way they dress.

"Gang members wear blue bandannas, red bandannas, black bandannas, black and silver, a Raider

hat with a silver band, flannel checkered shirts.

"Whatever color their gang represents, they'll wear."

Valdez and Bachus have been informing local citizens, including clubs and community organizations, about the growing gang problem here.

They have spoken to many area clubs as well as the Citizens Police Academy. But they say there is much more to do before the gang problem will be resolved.

"Most of these kids don't have good role models," said Bachus. "They watch a lot of violent TV and see movies like 'Colors' or 'Boyz On The Hood'. These are movies that glamorize gang activity."

Most gang members come from dysfunctional families and often have a history of drug abuse. And many of the gang members who give police and the community trouble are repeat offenders.

Gang members are starting earlier, the officers said. Hereford gang members range in age from 10 to 24 -- and often adult leaders are heavily involved in gang warfare with juveniles, they said.

"Two years ago, a gang from Amarillo, the Payback Crips, drove to Hereford to visit the Latin Kings," stated Valdez.

"Some of the Crips were related to the Latin Kings. They came here to visit, and it ended up in a drive-by shooting."

Two Hereford teens, both 17, were seriously wounded -- one in the leg, the other in the hand from shotgun blasts while they were standing in front of a house.

Police went back and forth between Hereford and Amarillo and arrested four people who were in the car when the shootings occurred. One was an adult.

City, school candidates face Wednesday deadline

Potential candidates for the Hereford City Commission and Hereford Independent School District trustee elections have until Wednesday at 5 p.m. to file for a place on the May 7 ballot.

Four seats on the city commission will be filled in this year's municipal election. Incumbents in all four positions have filed for re-election.

Two vacancies exist on the school board. Neither incumbent had filed for re-election as of Friday afternoon.

Seeking a full city commission term in Place 2, Nancy Griego is running for election to the seat held by Irene Cantu until she resigned last year.

Wayne Winget, Roger Eades and Carey Black also have filed for re-election. Winget holds Place 4 while Black and Eades are both at-large commissioners, Places 5 and 6, respectively.

Holdovers on the commission are Mayor Bob Jossand and Commissioners Silvana Juarez and Dennis Hicks. They were elected last year for two-year terms.

On the school board, President Ron Weishaar in District 1 and Secretary Raymond Schlabs have expiring terms.

As of Friday, the only candidate to file for a spot on the ballot was Randy Tooley, a county farmer who is running for Schlabs' District 3 seat.

Local brothers' appeals turned down by court

Appeals of aggravated assault convictions by two Hereford brothers have been dismissed by the Seventh Court of Appeals in Amarillo.

Edward Martinez, 24, and Joe Martinez, 28, were convicted by a 222nd District Court jury on Oct. 28, 1993, fined \$10,000 and sentenced to three-year prison terms.

The appeals were dismissed because they were not filed within the time frame required for the appellate court, the judgments declare.

The appellate opinions written by Justice Carlton B. Dodson point out that "written notice of appeal" was not filed within 90 days of the conviction of the brothers.

David Martinez, no relation to the defendants, is lawyer for the brothers. They now have 15 days to file a motion for re-hearing in the Court of Appeals.

Edward Martinez and Joe Martinez were tried on charges of attempted murder for their part in a fight in January 1993. Gunshot wounded two persons in the incident.

The 222nd District Court jury found the brothers guilty of the reduced charge of aggravated assault.

Farming is 'natural high' for Morrison

If Mike Morrison hit the Texas lottery and became an instant millionaire, there's no question what he would do with the money: he'd just farm it up.

"I love farming," said Morrison, who works fulltime for Oglesby Equipment as a warehouse foreman and farms on the side.

"It's something I need. Farming is my release."

Morrison, married and father of two children, like other area farmers, appreciates the fact that this is National Agriculture Week.

Along with his farming activities, he worked nearly five years with the Hereford Police Department and six years as a deputy sheriff for Deaf Smith County.

His job forced him to come into contact with drug users. Morrison has never used drugs, but he said farming is just like it -- one of the best highs a person could experience.

"When everything goes wrong at work, I can get out there on my farm and I'm totally content," he declared.

"The best thing is the row. You plant the corn and eight or 10 days later when you see the corn coming up through the ground, it's absolutely unreal."

"It actually sends a chill along my spine."

Morrison, his wife, Evelyn, and children Melanie, 16, and Michael,

14, farm half a section just west of Hereford. They raise corn, wheat, and cattle.

Now 38 years old, Morrison has farmed all of his working life. He farmed with his father and brother until they got "hailed out" two years ago between Dumas and Dalhart.

For a while, he left farming, but he couldn't stay away.

"My day starts around 6 a.m. when I change the water," he said. "I have to be at work at Oglesby at 8 a.m. and work til 6 p.m. I usually finish working on the farm around 10:30 p.m., but sometimes I'm there til 1 or 2 a.m., especially when I have to plow."

He described his farm as a family-run operation and said his son puts in a lot of hours helping, adding quickly, "I couldn't do without him."

Farming is hard on him physically, but the work is satisfying, he said.

"If I'm changing the water, I have to go into the ditches and move the tubes twice a day," he added. "Then there's plowing and running cattle, which I do during the winter."

"We start plowing after we pull the cattle off the land."

Morrison, a former candidate for sheriff, has never been a race car fan and the only woman who interests him is his wife, he said.

"Some people like race cars or fine-looking women," he said, smiling. "To me, farming is the most beautiful thing you'll ever see."

Suit filed against Hereford physician

A lawsuit alleging negligence by a Hereford physician has been filed in 22nd District Court in Hereford.

Defendant is Dr. Jesse I. Perales, who treated Elizabeth B. Blanton prior to her death on Dec. 6, 1992.

Bringing suit against the doctor is Mrs. Blanton's granddaughter, Darilyn Blanton Adkins of Oxford, N.C., identified as independent executrix of the estate of the deceased.

Mrs. Blanton, a resident of King's Manor Methodist home, suffered a broken leg in November 1992 and, after hospital treatment, was returned to King's Manor on Nov. 13, 1992. The suit alleges that her condition began to deteriorate and she developed intestinal tract problems. Such condition was either created, worsened, or expedited by the prescription of various medications by Jesse Perales, M.D. and the inattention of Dr. Perales, the court

document alleges.

The plaintiff claims the physician "failed to exercise" reasonable care by, allegedly, "prescribing a lethal combination of medications, failing to properly and adequately warn" the patient or King's Manor of "potential adverse effects, and failing to properly and timely respond to requests" to address the critical, urgent and life-threatening health needs of Mrs. Blanton.

The death of Mrs. Blanton on Dec. 6, 1992, was "totally unnecessary," the suit alleges because "no significant medical intervention was attempted."

Plaintiff in the lawsuit is seeking damages for "physical pain and suffering of Mrs. Blanton" as well as "mental and emotional anguish and suffering of Mrs. Blanton." The suit also asks for funeral and burial expenses.

Muslims, Croats reach for peace, agree to create Bosnian federation

WASHINGTON (AP) - Reaching toward peace after years of bloodshed, Muslim and Croat leaders signed agreements Friday to create a Bosnian federation. President Clinton prodded resistant Serbs to make it a three-way deal.

Acknowledging the uncertain road ahead, Clinton said peace for the former Yugoslavia "depends less on our words today than on the actions of Muslims, Croats and Serbs on the ground tomorrow and in the days to come."

With the Serbs controlling 70 percent of Bosnian territory, their absence from Friday's signing ceremony spoke to the dimensions of the challenge.

Clinton, trying to build on Friday's agreement, urged the Bosnian Serbs "to join in this effort for a wider peace." And the White House offered immediate benefits for the Muslim and Croat signatories, including the promised opening of an embassy in downtown Sarajevo, perhaps within weeks.

British Prime Minister John Major, in Sarajevo, said the Serbs must come to understand "there are no gains to be made by continuing fighting."

"We just have to continually put pressure on the Serbs to realize that it's going to be necessary to reach a political settlement," he said.

Nonetheless, initial reaction from the Serbs offered no encouragement.

Momcilo Krajisnik, president of the self-proclaimed Bosnian Serb Parliament, told the Belgrade-based Tanjug news agency that the federation was an "unnatural creation" bound to fail.

"They, who destroyed the former Yugoslavia, are today signing an act re-creating Yugoslavia under American pressure and against their own free will," he said.

Texas tops list in many ag statistics

How does Texas rank with the rest of the nation in farming and ranching? At the top of the list, generally exceeding its nearest competitor by far, according to the Texas Agricultural Statistics Service.

"Nobody comes close to Texas in the number of farms and ranches owned, acreage under production, value of all cattle, calf crop, sheep, lambs, and goats," said A.J. Olson, crops statistician for the service, which works closely with the U.S. and Texas Department of Agriculture to compile the facts.

Latest statistics available show Texas leading second-ranked Missouri by far in farms and ranches (183,000 to 107,000); over Montana in farm and ranch land (130,000 to 60,000 acres); over Nebraska in total value of all cattle and calves (\$8.8 billion to \$3.9 billion); over Missouri in the calf crop (5.1 million to 2.1 million head); over Nebraska in all cattle and calves (14.3 million to 5.9 million); over California in total value of all sheep and lambs (\$116 million to \$77.3 million); and over New Mexico in the value of Angora Goats (\$68.6 million to \$4.6 million).

How about wool production? In pounds produced, Texas is by far the leader over second-ranked Wyoming, 17.6 million to 8.4 million pounds.

Neighboring New Mexico ranks fifth on the list for farm and ranch land (44.2 million acres; and eight as far as total value of all sheep and lambs (\$26.7 million).

year, according to Newton.

"The biggest employer we have is the Hereford Unified School District, followed by Holly Sugar, Deaf Smith General Hospital, Arrowhead Mills, and Frito Lay," stated Newton.

Most farmers are generally optimistic about this year's yield. But Newton admits their success depends largely on elements they cannot control, like the amount of rainfall.

"We have had some really dry weather, particularly in the west part of the county," said Newton, now in his 23rd year in the business of farming. He has been extension agent nearly 11 years.

Since 1990, county cash receipts from wheat has climbed from \$10.8 million to \$12.5 million; barley has jumped from \$13.5 million to \$15.5 million; hay has soared from \$1.5 million to \$2 million; and beef cattle has increased from \$229 million to \$240 million per year.

White House officials said the Serbs have been more inclined toward a looser Bosnian union that would contain two separate entities: one Croat-Muslim and the other Serb. How the Bosnian territory would be carved up among the parties remains a key sticking point.

Under sponsorship of the United States and Russia, Croat and Muslim leaders signed two documents Friday: a proposed constitution for the new federation and a statement of

principles to link it to Croatia.

Bosnian President Alija Izetbegovic called it a great day "for those who are opposed to war" and welcomed U.S. promises to help rebuild.

Croatian President Franjo Tudjman, his country struggling to cope with a flood of refugees displaced by the war, cautioned that "determined support is critical to restore a decent standard of living."

Clinton pledged the United States would "contribute to the economic

reconstruction that will bolster these agreements."

Administration officials, speaking on condition of anonymity, said the United States was prepared to open an embassy in Sarajevo, perhaps within weeks, in a battered office building that now is without water or electricity.

One senior administration official said the United States also would be giving Croatia permission to open consulates in New York, Pittsburgh, Cleveland and Los Angeles.

Clinton says plan would draw more doctors to rural America

WASHINGTON (AP) - President Clinton says his health reform plan would attract more doctors to rural areas and eventually give people in the nation's heartland the same quality of care as those in big cities.

In a meeting with regional reporters Friday, Clinton also insisted he wouldn't let the Whitewater affair distract him or Congress from health care, welfare reform, crime and other issues.

"It's going to be difficult for them to use it as an excuse not to act on health care," he said. "All I want to do is stay at it. I just want them to work."

The president, first lady Hillary Rodham Clinton and Health and Human Services Secretary Donna Shalala each appeared for questioning on the plan by reporters from Kansas, Nebraska and Oklahoma.

Associated Press and other news services, Clinton said small businesses' fears about what it will cost them was "the No. 1 sticking point" to passage of his plan. But he said he'd be willing to make "a legal commitment" to small businesses that they would get subsidies to help them cover their workers.

"I think we can work out the debates with the insurance companies, even though the insurance companies are paying for the attacks on the plan," he said. "A lot of the small business people have been spooked unnecessarily."

The media gatherings were arranged by the White House in an effort to counter critics of the proposal, who have helped spur increasing skepticism in public opinion polls and doubt in Congress.

"I think it must be a failure to communicate effectively," Mrs. Clinton said. "We're going to do the best we can to get the real truth out about the Clinton plan."

Two of the biggest issues in rural areas are how health reform will affect the availability of care and whether small businesses might be forced to lay off workers if required to provide them with medical insurance.

Clinton said his plan includes incentives to attract more doctors to rural areas, including a \$1,000-a-month tax credit over five years for physicians who agree to practice there. And new technology allows those doctors to communicate directly with specialists in urban hospitals.

Small businesses - about 30 percent of which have no health plans now - would get discounts on the insurance they buy as an incentive to not lay off workers, Clinton said. The key for the businesses that will assume new costs will be the gradual lowering of the price of health care triggered by universal coverage, he said.

Clinton has promised that small businesses with low-wage workers would pay as little as 3.5 percent of their payroll for insurance. Most companies would pay up to 7.9 percent.

The president acknowledged that younger, healthier workers would likely see higher health care bills to help cover those who are older and sicker.

"We're not talking about a lot more. The only people who will pay a lot more are those who don't pay

anything now," he said.

Another controversial aspect of Clinton's plan is the creation of alliances that will use the purchasing power of groups of businesses and government to provide health coverage, ideally at lower cost. He said this was one way to guarantee equal treatment for rural and urban residents.

Senate Republican leader Bob Dole of Kansas and others have labeled the alliances big bureaucracies that won't work and predicted they will never pass Congress.

"If there are alliances that are big enough, then you can get the small-business people, the farmers and the self-employed the same bargaining power that big business and government have," Clinton said. "This is not a government bureaucracy. This is a buyer's co-op."

Columbia, crew return from two-week journey

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. (AP) - Columbia and its crew returned safely from the second-longest trip in shuttle history Friday, a two-week journey that provided tips for building a better space station.

The research mission ended just an hour short of the longest space shuttle flight, by Columbia last year.

"It would have been nice to get the record, but it was a great flight," shuttle commander John Casper said before heading home to Houston. "We're really pleased with it. I think we did a lot of good things."

Scientists called the mission a success. "We bring home a treasure which I believe is of considerable value," said NASA mission scientist Peter Currier.

The 100-ton shuttle sailed through a clear morning sky and landed right on time at Kennedy Space Center.

Aerial TV views showed Columbia fishtailing on the runway before coming to a stop, unusual but of no concern to shuttle managers. Casper said he was just trying to stay on the center line.

A few objects were seen falling off NASA's oldest shuttle as it rolled down the runway; they turned out to be devices for deploying the drag

chute. An inspection later revealed some missing pieces: six thermal covers from the nose-wheel compartment and one thermal tile from the same area.

"It's not a normal situation that they fly off like that, but it did not endanger the vehicle or the crew," said National Aeronautics and Space Administration spokesman Bruce Buckingham.

Flight director Wayne Hale said neither he nor anyone else in Mission Control considered keeping Columbia up an extra orbit just so the crew could break the shuttle endurance record, especially since the wind was expected to pick up later in the morning.

The 5.8 million-mile mission, which began March 4, featured 11 major science experiments worth nearly \$100 million. Most were commanded by remote control from the ground - a method called telepresence - leaving the astronauts tending to such chores as medical and engineering tests, and rat and plant checks.

Missouri city demonstrates what a bit of bootstrapping can do

STEELEVILLE, Mo.—This is the story of a small city that nearly lost itself only to find how much it had. It is about a nucleus of citizens who made the difference between slow death and a life full of possibility. It is about commitment, hard work and ingenuity.

Most of all, it's about hope. The Census Bureau places Steelville's 1,470 residents at the geographic center of this nation's drifting population. The honor, which came with a commemorative plaque a few years back, provided a nice psychological boost. But the city's renaissance was rooted in something else.

"It's up by our own bootstraps," said John Britton, who owns the local funeral parlor.

Ike Lovan, who owns a jewelry shop and a rooming house known as the White Eagle, added, "We sensed were dying and that no one was going to salvage us. We had to do it ourselves."

About an hour south of St. Louis, the city had some basic raw materials—a local newspaper, a shoe factory, a small machine-tool company, a county courthouse, several churches and the Meramec River, which, along with a ring of wooded hills, was something of a tourist draw.

Phone gamble paid off

The big key to Steelville's success has been the local telephone company, a cooperative that citizen shareholders always had maintained independently. In many ways, it was this bit of historical whimsy that gave the city its first break.

It started a few years ago with a gamble. The telephone company's board risked \$5,000 to buy a shot at a federal lottery for regional cellular-phone rights—and won. Quickly reselling the license to a larger communications company netted a tidy profit of several million dollars.

Welfare plan would drop few people

WASHINGTON (AP)—After five years and \$15 billion in new services for the poor, only a fraction of all parents on welfare would be nudged into the work force under the Clinton administration's draft strategy.

President Clinton raised expectations for sweeping reform when he promised during his campaign to "end welfare as we know it" and require all able-bodied recipients to take a job after two years on the rolls.

His aides, however, have drafted a plan that initially exempts two-thirds of all parents on welfare from any time limits or work requirements, covering only those born after 1972.

And it takes years before significant numbers of welfare recipients are pushed into a private job or a subsidized work program.

At the end of the plan's first five years, just 200,000 of the estimated 1.67 million young families who will be covered by the new welfare system will either leave the rolls because of various reforms in day care, welfare and health care, or have a parent working in a subsidized job.

In 1928, the board of bishops of the Methodist Episcopal Church listed drunkenness, abuse and lack of morals as equivalent to adultery.

A large chunk of that windfall was plowed immediately into a community-development corporation, which since has provided seed money for a number of public projects. For starters, the city invested in state-of-the-art telephone technology.

It was a bargaining chip, something to offer prospective businesses in addition to enterprise-zone incentives such as tax breaks and free property. With a telecommunications system sophisticated enough to compete with those in many major cities, Steelville would be a viable alternative for businesses looking to relocate.

Building on that idea, leaders figured good housing at affordable prices could make their small city only more appealing. So they set to work, designing a family-friendly housing development that also might attract retirees with disposable income. It didn't hurt that with each new installation, the phone company's assets would increase and the overall economy grow.

Enterprising folks

Such enterprises, and the pooling of local resources, have driven a lot of Steelville's best efforts.

Citizens got together to clean up Yadkin Creek, landscaping its banks and stocking it with trout. The Brown Shoe factory, which has grown to 600 employees from 300 while others in the region have been closed, came to the city partly because a corporate executive born there lobbied for it.

A dentist who dreamed of having a country-music show found a group of investors interested in buying an ugly, abandoned car dealership. It now is a motel with a 400-seat auditorium that draws steady summer crowds.

A coalition of churches runs a volunteer food pantry. Another group persuaded Burlington Northern Railroad to donate a vintage caboose. The coalition plans to use it either as an information bureau or a jungle gym for kids. Technology buffs are setting up an interactive video-resource center so citizens can tune in classes at any state university or browse through the Library of Congress.

"In some ways, this community is the model of what this country was like years ago: Life is on an intimate scale," said the Rev. William Geyer Birch, co-pastor with his wife at the local Presbyterian church.

"You still have here everything you have in a city—crime, drugs, domestic troubles. The difference is, people

here have taken the initiative.

"People knew things were changing. And they asked the important question: What are we changing to? Change is threatening. But we all still have to ask ourselves: What kind of people are we becoming?"

Plans for Main Street

The most obvious answer is on Main Street, where the refurbished shops seem to be named for someone: Nancy's Antiques, Sherry's Flowers, bill's General Store, Al's Cafe.

It started several years ago with a dinner at the Golden Echoes retirement home, which in itself embodies the city's entrepreneurial flair. Built with local money, the center includes a reception hall where residents cater evenings, using the profits to subsidize senior meals.

So at this dinner, fancy homemade hors d'oeuvres were served with wines from local vineyards. Merchants were shown an architect's plans for returning Main Street to its historic roots. A local banker offered \$500,000 in loans at 5 percent—half the going rate—to anyone who joined in the renovations. Nineteen shopowners signed on then, and the number soon doubled.

"Everybody wants to be part of something positive," said Ed Leonard, who runs a graphics business and monthly tourism guide.

Of course, there are those who object. They see a self-interested cabal of self-styled community leaders out only for themselves. Most recently, a vocal group of naysayers opposed plans to build a new city pool to replace the decrepit one built in 1953. In a survey taken several years back, 85 percent of residents said the new pool was something they wanted.

David Keymann, proprietor of the Rainbow Hotel, apparently was not among them: "Spend a half million on a swimming pool? For who? Who's going to pay for it?"

When the ballot came up, the group lobbying against won narrowly. The pool was dead, supporters thought. Until a local philanthropist stepped forward. He offered to match whatever funds the community could raise during 1993.

By the end of the year, nearly \$70,000 has been raised, bit by bit. The city raised \$15,000 in one night, which has been added to the proceeds from an antique-doll show, bake sales and other fund drives.

"In this town, if you have a problem and ask a hundred people for help, 80 or 90 will stand up and pitch in, whether it's going to pick up rocks in the park or whatever," said Bob Bell, 30, who grew up in Steelville.

Bell's latest project has been Wildwood Springs. The lodge was ramshackle mess when he and some other family members formed a corporation to buy the place a year or so ago. They'd grown up across the street, watching its 1920s splendor fade along with the sound of the big bands that used to play on Saturday nights.

Buying Wildwood Springs was a bit cockeyed, Bell realizes. But he can see future seasons, hear the laughter of families like his gathered around the big hearth and ambling down the rambling lawn.

"We have a very strong 'take care of yourself' attitude here," said Bell, whose brother is mayor. "It's a family. And the neat this is, there's more than one person pushing the buttons."

"We've got a community here, and to a lot of people, it's worth working for."

Directors of Deaf Smith County Hospital District are facing some tough decisions, which means—at least to me—that citizens have choices to make, also. Hospital trustees emphasized at Tuesday night's board meeting that community input is encouraged.

Directors are wrestling with the questions concerning renovations. Should the hospital continue with piecemeal renovations as funds are available, plan for a major renovation project, or plan for construction of a new hospital? The latter two alternatives would require a bond election and those dreaded words: tax increase.

The board members realize, of course, that citizens must be informed and convinced that major renovations, or a new facility, are necessary. It's doubtful the board would call for a bond election unless they feel there is enough community support of the issue.

We think the board's idea of forming a community fact-finding committee, represented by a wide cross-section of citizens, is good. Once the board comes out with its plan, the fact-finding group could study the plan and perhaps present their findings to an open forum of all interested citizens.

It's a complex issue. Citizens need to know, of course, what kind of tax hike would be needed for major renovations or a new hospital. They need to weigh the needs against the

cost. We believe, without a doubt, that most folks want to make sure we keep our hospital. After talk of the possibility of losing the hospital more than two years ago, the hospital has expanded services, recruited new physicians, and made the facility more attractive. Some board members, as well as doctors, feel it's time to think of a new facility—that continuing renovations of an old building will cost more in the long run.

It's no secret, however, that there are some critics of the current administration. Some believe the hospital is expanding services and personnel too fast, and spending too much money in the process.

It's an important community issue. We suggest you talk to board members, get their opinions, study the alternatives, and let them know what you think we should do.

An AP news analysis After every lash, there's a backlash

WASHINGTON (AP) — After the lash, there's almost always a backlash.

That could be the next turn in Whitewater, unless Republicans come up with fresh ammunition to aim at the White House. Refiring what they've got on President Clinton now — the appearance of White House impropriety, and the suspicion that there's more to it — will soon look like overkill.

Let that happen and political sympathy is likely to shift to the Democrats, who are now on the defensive.

There already are signs of it: suggestions that the news media have overplayed the issue, complaints about rumors as wild as a suspense novel on the evident suicide of White House aide Vincent Foster, polls reporting a widespread belief that the Whitewater controversy stems from politics.

In the circumstances, senior Democrats are wary of the attack tactics of the party chairman, David Wilhelm, who said Clinton's Republican tormenters are themselves ethically tainted.

"I wish he wouldn't," said Sen. George J. Mitchell, D-Maine, the Senate majority leader. "I don't think it contributes to the dialogue."

House Speaker Thomas S. Foley, D-Wash., agreed, and wound up defending Sen. Bob Dole, R-Kan., the Senate Republican leader, when they appeared together on an ABC television interview show.

Dole said Wilhelm should put up, by filing a formal complaint, or shut up on ethics questions about him. But he also said he knows what it's like to be defending a president. "I was chairman of the Republican Party for a while during Watergate, so I know some of the things you have to do," Dole said.

Since Watergate, and in no small measure because of that scandal, defense has become more difficult. At the start of the Watergate case, the prevailing assumption was that the president wouldn't have involved himself. It was too illogical, too petty, for Richard M. Nixon to risk his presidency. But he had, and he lost it.

And the credibility gap that dates from the Vietnam war days of Lyndon B. Johnson became a believability gap that persists two decades later. "There is a culture of disbelief in America," Sen. Mitchell said in a television interview, "a presumption of disbelief if you are an elected official."

Clinton said congressional veterans have told him "how much meaner, and partisan, and negative the national arena is."

A Time Magazine-CNN poll showed that 51 percent of Americans think the Clintons are hiding something in Whitewater, and 33 percent don't. The survey also indicated that trust in Clinton has dipped 5 points, to 35 percent.

"That's the cynicism of the public about its government, reinforced by Watergate, reinforced by Iran-Contra," Lloyd N. Cutler, the new White House counsel, said in an NBC interview. "I don't think it's justified in this case."

Republicans want congressional hearings to publicly prove or disprove the point. Democrats say they should await the findings of a special counsel appointed by the attorney general, a step Republicans demanded in the first place.

That argument does not have the makings of a durable issue. Polls issued over the weekend reflect suspicion, but also confusion. And they had widely differing reports on how many people think the Clintons have done wrong — two-thirds in one survey, one-fifth in another.

"Oh, well, everybody's being hurt by it," Mitchell said on CNN. "There's no doubt about that. This hurts everybody."

The polls reflect its toll on Hillary Rodham Clinton's image. It is a distraction, and no help in the Clinton quest for the health care reform effort she has led for her husband. But Mitchell and Ira Magaziner, the White House specialist on health care, said the controversy hasn't slowed the health reform process so far.

Once wary of criticizing the president's wife, Republicans have done more of it in Whitewater. The ups and downs of the political cycle are nowhere more evident than in Mrs. Clinton's case. Six months ago, she took the Clinton health plan to Congress in a widely applauded series of televised appearances before Senate and House committees. Now the slump, after what Sen. John Breaux called "the constant bombardment of the negative press."

Breaux, a Louisiana Democrat, said Mrs. Clinton will be as popular as ever, "when they find out what really happened, if nothing happened."

An AP news analysis Altman didn't avoid bad call on Whitewater despite experience

WASHINGTON (AP) — He was an insider who was supposed to know how the capital worked. But that didn't keep Roger Altman from making a bad call on Whitewater.

The deputy treasury secretary is under subpoena to appear before a grand jury and his professional trajectory is on pause.

Why? Because Altman, temporary head of the federal savings and loan cleanup agency, arranged a "heads-up" procedural briefing for senior White House officials on an S&L probe related to Whitewater.

No matter that the meeting was approved by the Treasury Department's ethics counsel — a Republican holdover appointed by George Bush — or that Altman has been abjectly contrite about what he terms a stupid decision.

Senate Republican leader Bob Dole last week charged that Altman and departing associate attorney general Webster Hubbell were "up to their ears in misstatements and deception" and said President Clinton should suspend them.

Hubbell resigned days later, but a Treasury official this week dismissed as "total fantasy" a rumor that Altman would follow suit.

Like so many others in this administration, Altman has a golden resume and long-standing ties to Clinton. The two attended

Georgetown University together. Altman went on to an MBA and a stellar investment banking career: managing director at Lehman Brothers and vice chairman of the Blackstone Group.

Now 47, Altman was barely in his 30s when he was named assistant treasury secretary for domestic finance in the Carter administration. During that time he helped manage the bailouts of New York City and Chrysler Corp.

"His reputation was good and it grew as people dealt with him and watched him perform," said former Carter press secretary Jody Powell.

Last year Altman ran the White House "war room" in charge of promoting Clinton's budget and played a lead role in U.S.-Japan trade policy. It's been widely assumed he would succeed Lloyd Bentsen as treasury secretary if and when Bentsen retires.

There was every reason to think that Altman knew Washington's preoccupation with potential conflicts of interest and the need for acute sensitivity not just to substance but to how things appear.

The meeting he arranged last month did not set off any advance alarms. It had been a purely generic session, similar to procedural briefings given to lawmakers and their staffs, went the thinking. Altman himself didn't know substantive

details of any cases, including the Madison Guaranty failure tied to Whitewater and the Clintons.

But Altman's testimony created quite a ripple, particularly since two other questionable White House meetings (unrelated to Altman) had come to light by then.

That was the end of his unsullied reputation and his unimpeded progress toward a cabinet post.

Powell sees Altman as a political victim pure and simple, and has this to say: "Questions of ethics might more properly be directed at people who, based on no information or damn little, are demanding his resignation."

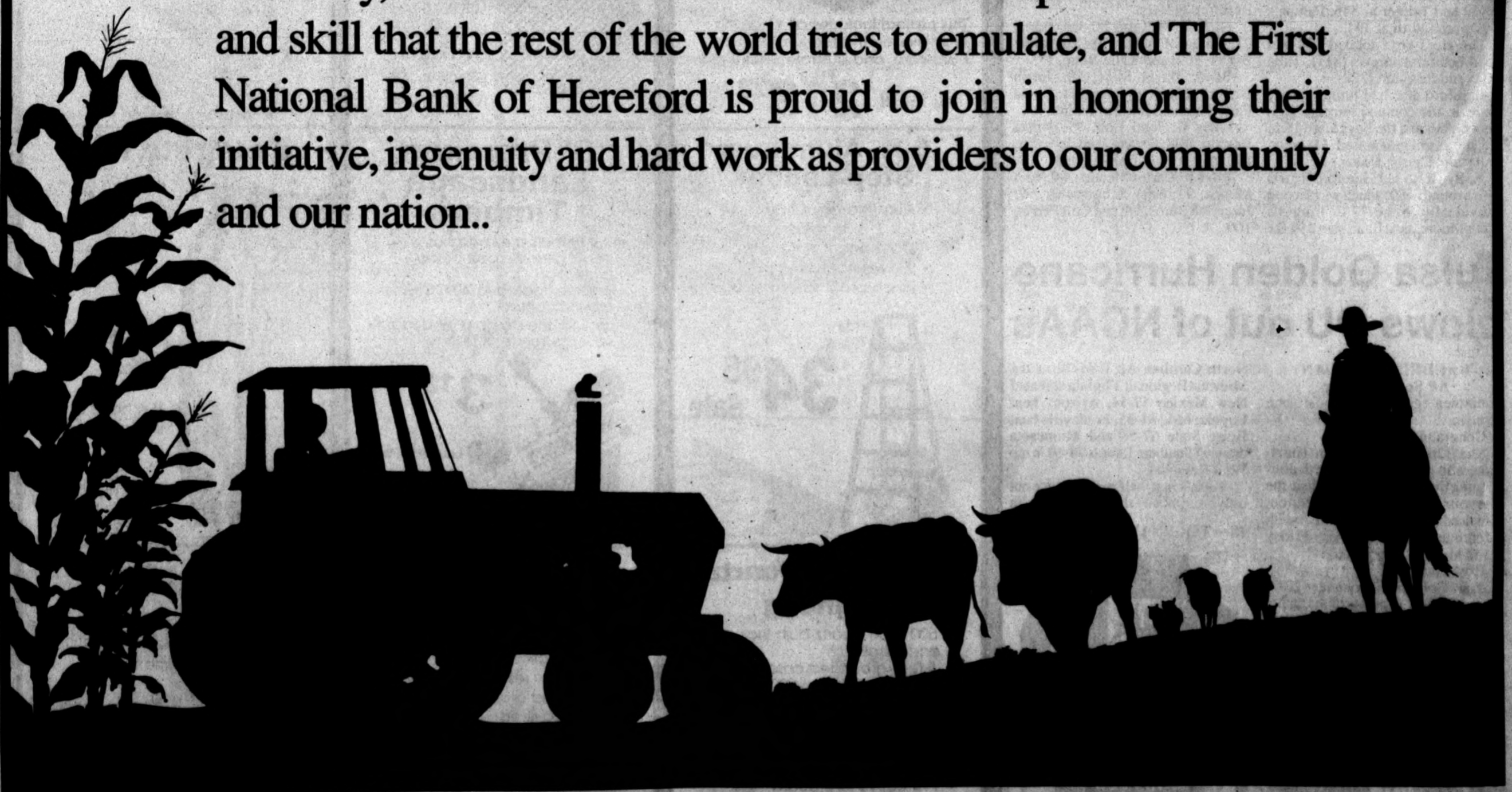
Clinton's plan also calls for limiting the program to the youngest third of the 5 million adults on welfare — those born after 1972. These younger recipients who fail to find jobs would be placed in temporary government-subsidized jobs. The other two-thirds on welfare would not have to meet those requirements. Leaving two-thirds of the welfare recipients out of the reforms does not appear to be what most voters thought of when Clinton said he would "end welfare as we know it." Until a few months ago, administration officials were saying the president's welfare reform package would be enacted in 1994. That is still a worthy goal, but as time slips by it now appears unlikely that any welfare reforms will be enacted this year.

Tulsa Golden Hurricane blows OU out of NAAs

Sixteen games and just one surprise.

Congratulations, Tulsa.

The 12th-seeded Golden Hurricane, who got an at-large berth after winning the regular season title in the Missouri Valley Conference, surprised fourth-seeded UCLA with a dominant 112-102 victory Friday in the Midwest Regional.

How dominant?

The Golden Hurricane (22-7) scored the first 10 points of the game, led 46-17 at one point and wound up ahead 63-38 at the half. Tulsa became only the second team ever to reach 100 points against the Bruins in 92 NCAA tournament games.

"That's why it's called March Madness," UCLA coach Jim Harrick said. "It's crazy. I can't explain it. That's just the way it goes."

In other games, North Carolina beat Liberty 71-51, Boston College edged Washington State 67-64, Temple defeated Drexel 61-39 and Indiana beat Ohio 84-72 in the East Regional; Marquette beat Southwest Louisiana 81-59, Kentucky beat Tennessee State 83-70, Duke defeated Texas Southern 82-70 and Michigan State beat Seton Hall 84-73 in the Southeast Regional.

Oklahoma State downed New Mexico State 65-55, Georgetown beat Illinois 84-77 and Arkansas defeated

North Carolina A&T 94-79 in the Midwest Regional; Virginia defeated New Mexico 57-54, Arizona beat Loyola, Md., 81-55, Louisville beat Boise State 67-58 and Minnesota downed Southern Illinois 74-60 in the West Regional.

Tulsa's first-half performance not only surprised the spectators in

Pistons take third straight road win

Detroit, with one of the NBA's worst records, is on a streak that has the Pistons looking more like the two-time champions of a few years ago.

Although they have just 18 wins this season, the Pistons have consecutive road victories over Sacramento, Seattle and Phoenix following their 114-113 victory Friday night over the Suns.

"We are really playing with poise in these games," Detroit coach Don Chaney said. "We're rushing it, we're not taking bad shots."

Joe Dumars scored a team-high 30 points and gave Detroit its only lead of the game on an 18-foot jumper with 3.6 seconds left.

In other NBA games Friday, Minnesota beat Philadelphia 100-98, Atlanta topped Indiana 81-78, Orlando stopped Cleveland 113-96, Charlotte beat Utah 82-78, Chicago edged Seattle 87-84, Sacramento surprised Denver 115-103, Portland beat Washington 122-104, and New Jersey beat the Los Angeles Lakers 102-90.

Charles Barkley, who scored 31 points to lead the Suns, hit a free-throw to put Phoenix up 113-108 with 1:09 to play.

Then Detroit's Charles Jones hit an eight-footer and teammate Lindsey Hunter made a steal and scored on a layup. After an offensive foul, Dumars took a pass from Hunter and hit his shot.

"I told Terry (Mills) to come

down and screen for me," said Dumars. "It was a good screen by Terry, a good pass by Lindsey and a good shot. I knew it was in when it left my fingers."

Terry Mills added 27 points for the Pistons, Isiah Thomas had 13 points and Hunter finished with 10.

Johnson had 20 points and 11 assists for Phoenix.

The Pistons came into the game tied with Milwaukee and Minnesota with the second-worst record in the NBA. Detroit has now won five of six, its best streak of the season. The win also gave Detroit a split in the two-game season series with the Suns and snapped a string of four straight losses in Phoenix.

Hawks 81, Pacers 78

Danny Manning grabbed a loose ball for a breakaway dunk with 2.9 seconds to play, sealing Atlanta's victory.

The Pacers, shooting for an NBA club record 12th straight home victory, rallied from a 79-74 deficit with 2:40 remaining to close within one point at 79-78. But Indiana missed three field goal attempts, as well as a desperation 3-pointer at the buzzer.

Kevin Willis led the Hawks with 19 points and 16 rebounds. Reggie Miller led the Pacers with 16 points.

Magic 113, Cavaliers 96

Shaquille O'Neal scored 38 points and grabbed 15 rebounds to lead Orlando.

Dennis Scott added a season-high

28 for the Magic, who solidified their hold on the fourth playoff seed in the Eastern Conference.

John Williams, forced to play against O'Neal because the Cavaliers were without injured center Brad Daugherty, had 21 points to lead Cleveland.

Timberwolves 100, 6ers 98

Isiah Rider hit two free throws with 21 seconds left and Stacey King added a season-high 20 points to help Minnesota snap a 14-game road losing streak. Their last road victory came on Jan. 12 against Dallas.

Clarence Weatherspoon had 22 points and 11 rebounds for Philadelphia.

Hornets 82, Jazz 78

Alonzo Mourning scored 21 points, grabbed 11 rebounds and blocked six shots to lead Charlotte to its fourth straight home victory.

Charlotte, a winner of five of its last six, including three straight on this home stand, beat Utah for the first time in six tries in Charlotte.

Mourning, in his sixth game since returning from a calf injury, capped the victory when he blocked Karl Malone's 3-point attempt with 1.9 seconds remaining.

Malone led Utah with 21 points and 13 rebounds for Utah.

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Big Eight resembles one big, happy family

FORT WORTH, Texas - In the Big Eight, folks get along. Five of the six Big Eight states have fewer souls than the Fort Worth-Dallas Metroplex. The long winters bring isolation, and there are few big cities in which to mingle. Big Eighters are glad to see one another.

A Big Eight game brings together folks who use the time to catch up on the kids, the crops and other matters before going home to winter isolation. This leaves the kind of prickliness that dogs the Southwest Conference, where rival alumni encounter each other daily in Texas' cities and rub one another's competitive wounds.

Texas A&M, Texas, Texas Tech and Baylor have joined what is less a conference than a family. Big Eighters feel one another's joys and sadness. When Nebraska lost the Orange Bowl and Kansas the Final Four, other Big Eighters called to console. When golfer Hale Irwin of Colorado won three U.S. Opens, hackers around the Big Eight cheered.

When Pete Incaviglia of Oklahoma State was let go by the Texas Rangers, local Big Eighters were saddened.

This doesn't mean folks don't get sore in the Big Eight. Colorado sulked a few years ago when an Omaha, Neb., newspaper suggested editorially that the Buffalos had misused the memory of a deceased player for inspiration in a big game against Nebraska. Oklahoma partisans bark periodically that the Big Eight erred four decades ago when it admitted Oklahoma State. Iowa State and Kansas State have grumbled about what they consider to be big spending at Nebraska and Oklahoma. Missourians and Kansans occasionally have to be separated near closing time in Kansas City bars.

The Big Eight has always been made up of state schools. Many of its staunchest boosters are people who have never set foot in their classrooms. The result is a democracy among fandom that can be missing at big-state or big-city universities that can afford the luxury of snob appeal.

Make no mistake, the Big Eight is a return to the small town. The biggest Big Eight venues are Lincoln, Neb., and Boulder, Colo., with fewer than 250,000 residents. Most Big Eight stadiums provide views of grain elevators and farm fields from their highest reaches. Big Eight wheeler-dealers do their plunging

more in grain futures than energy or real estate.

All in all, the new Texas members of the Big Eight will feel right at home. The Big Eight, like Texas, is obsessed with the weather. The most famous lyric from the musical "Oklahoma" describes how the "wind comes whipping down the plains." By the time that wind arrives in Oklahoma, it already had made its way through Big Eight territory in Kansas, Colorado, Nebraska, Iowa and Missouri.

In its history, the entire Big Eight region periodically has dried up and blown away, chasing the Joaze of Oklahoma in the process, or been inundated by Noah-like floods. Another musical depicting life in the Big Eight, "The Wizard of Oz," featured a Kansas tornado. Iowa State's team nickname is the Cyclone. A famous Big Eight fight song vows, "We'll all stick together in all kinds of weather at Dear Old Nebraska U."

At Kansas, if you don't have a ticket, you can still see the game free from Mount Oread, upon which generations of penny-pinching Jayhawkers have sat and observed the games without charge.

Missouri has a bargain, too. The school's landmark is a series of Greek columns extending across a campus green. Those columns supported an original campus building that burned to the ground a century ago. Thrifty Missourians merely cleared away the

rubble and declared the standing columns to be sacred, thus diverting alumni money to more serious pursuits.

Don't think that Stillwater, Okla., is backwater. Oklahoma State has turned its horticulturists loose, making its campus the prettiest in the Big Eight.

Oklahomans learned their ground game in the famous land rush of 1889. Nebraska began developing stock for its powerful interior lines about the same time, when railroad promoters populated the prairies by importing tens of thousands of big-boned Germans, Poles and Czechs.

The men who founded what is now the Big Eight in 1907 had, in many cases, come to the prairies in covered wagons. They attracted like-minded athletic pioneers. Dr. James Naismith invented basketball in Springfield, Mass., but he perfected the game at the University of Kansas. Fielding Yost put the University of Michigan's football program on the map, but after he worked out his system at Nebraska and Kansas.

The much-beloved dunk shot in basketball first became an art form in the Big Eight. Wilt Chamberlain of Kansas, known in the 1950s at Kansas as "The Big Dipper," electrified the Big Eight.

The Big Eight can claim the genesis of the modern mania for athletic wear, started 30 years ago by Nebraska fans who took to wearing red to their games.

But the biggest impact on the Big

Eight may have come from the building of the interstate highway system and the invention of the motor home. Those new forms of transportation were to the Big Eight what the subway was to Notre Dame.

Big Eighters, long accustomed to awakening early, now could rise before dawn on the farm or small town, pile into the Winnebago, Fleetwood or Coachman and head down new superhighways in time to make a 1:30 game in Lincoln, Ames, Columbia, Lawrence, Stillwater or Manhattan.

President Dwight D. Eisenhower had proposed the building of the

interstates. Ike grew up in a Big Eight state - Kansas - and understood the urge of Midlanders to roam the prairies. When Ike's four-lane network was completed, Big Eighters could help each other fill their stadiums and field houses.

So when Big Eighters hit the road, they do so with the knowledge that any stranger bearing the decal of a Big Eight school (in the Big Eight, Cowboys mean Oklahoma State, not Dallas) is more than a rival, but a friend welcome in the motor home.

Oklahoma City and viewers on television, it completely shocked UCLA.

"They had a reaction like, 'You guys can actually play,'" said Gary Collier, who led Tulsa with 34 points. "They gave us a little more respect and started playing harder in the second half."

Breast screenings are planned in Hereford

The Don and Sybil Harrington Cancer Center and High Plains Baptist Hospital Mobile Mammography Unit will be in Hereford from 10 a.m. until 2:30 p.m. Friday, April 1, at South Plains Health Care Providers, Inc., 603 E. Park.

The screening program in Hereford is co-sponsored by Hereford Regional Medical Center. Exams are done by appointment only. For information or to schedule an appointment call 1-800-377-HOPE.

The total cost of the screening is \$70. This includes the x-ray, physical breast exam and the radiology fee for reading the mammogram. Funding has been provided by the Texas Department of Health to allow for free breast screenings for women who qualify.

The major goal of the clinic is the early detection of breast cancer. The clinic provides low cost screening which includes a breast exam by a registered nurse trained in breast cancer detection, teaching of breast self-examination and a mammogram.

Currently, the most effective method known to win the battle against breast cancer is early detection. Early detection is best done by following the guidelines recommended by the American Cancer Society for breast cancer screening for women who have no signs or symptoms of breast cancer. The guidelines are:

1. Learn and perform breast self examinations every month.
2. Have a physical examination every year.
3. Have a mammogram according to recommendations by age:

AGE

- 40--one baseline mammogram
- 40-49--a mammogram every 1-2 years
- 50 and over--yearly mammograms

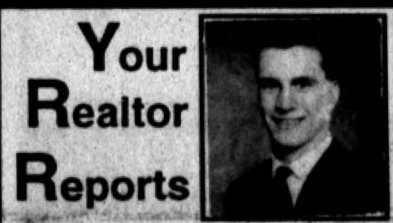

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Hospital has new benefit for expectant parents

"Precious Bundles" is the name of the new program offered by Hereford Regional Medical Center especially designed for expectant parents.

"Precious Bundles", for parents who choose HRMC for their baby's birthplace, offers a 20 percent discount on their hospital bill. "We're trying to encourage young families to stay home in Hereford for this important event in their lives," Ron Rives, chief executive officer of HRMC, said. "Expectant parents can save significant dollars by making all their financial arrangements in advance."

Rives explained that to join the program, the expectant parents are asked to complete a pre-registration form and take it to the Hereford Regional Medical Center business office by the 28-week of the pregnancy. "Our business office personnel will take the insurance information and

estimate the patient's share of the projected cost of a normal delivery," Rives said. "The parents are then asked to begin paying that amount, paying all the estimated costs by the end of the eighth month. These estimated costs will be discounted a full 20 percent. Then any remaining balance on the bill will also be discounted 20 percent and is due 30 days after delivery."

The expectant parents also receive a bundle of gifts from the hospital and from local merchants. "We will provide the parents with a list of those merchants participating in the program at the time of the patients discharge," Rives added.

From the hospital, parents receive free education classes in child birth, parenting, breast feeding, and infant CPR; a baby safety home assessment; a "Precious Bundles" bib; a choice of a candlelight dinner or gift basket while in the hospital; and a visit from a nurse after the baby goes home.

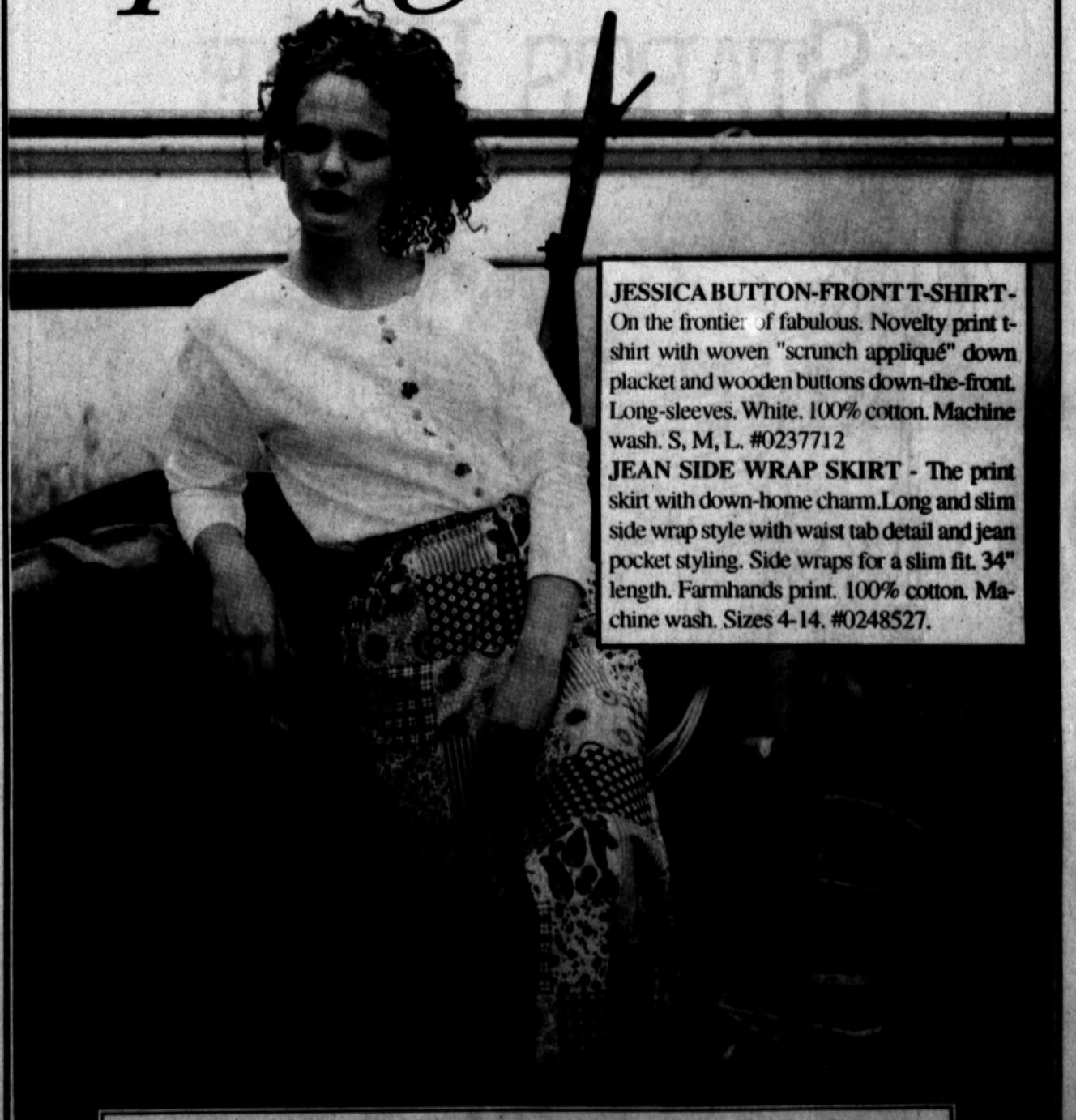

WHAT BLURRED VISION MEANS



Blurred vision should be brought to your optometrist's attention promptly. While blurring may indicate nothing more than a need for corrective lenses -- which the eye doctor can prescribe -- it may be a sign of infection or other illness.

Incidentally, we are apparently a pretty tough bunch to work for, but if you'd like to try, see our ad in the classifieds for details on an opening we have.

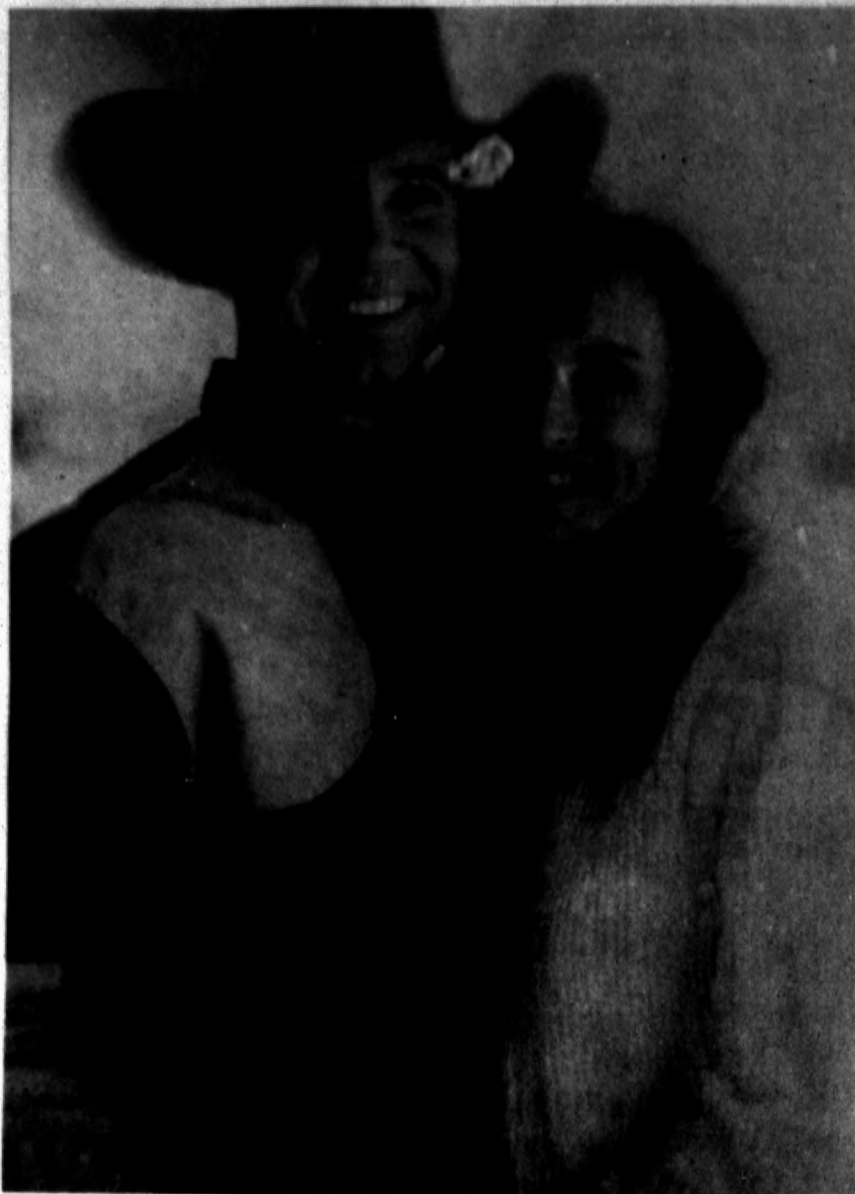

-Wear sunglasses during long periods in bright light, to assist in regaining normal vision at night.

-Allow your eyes to adjust to the darkness before driving at night.

-Do not smoke in the car.

If you wear glasses during the day, you should consider an additional pair for the evening. Your eyes' reaction to darkness may require a different prescription for night driving. And lower your night driving glasses AR coating.

Beef Cook-off entries available until June 1

Texas amateur cooks have until June 1 to enter the National Beef Cook-Off and be selected as one of 15 finalists who will compete for \$45,000 in cash prizes and the title of the nation's top beef cook. Each of the 15 finalists also will receive an all-expense paid trip to the national competition Sept. 22-23 at Little Rock, Ark.

Entries must be postmarked by June 1, 1994, and received by June 7, 1994. Anyone except food professionals is eligible to enter. For more specific rules, contact the National Beef Cook-Off P.O. Box 3240, Chicago, Ill. 60654.

No one from Texas has ever won the National Beef Cook-Off even though it is the nation's largest beef producing state. It's time for that to change, says the Texas CattleWomen, one of the contest's sponsoring organizations.

"We came close to winning it all with a third place finish in the indoor competition at the 1993 national competition," says Texas CattleWomen President Anita Brown of Wheeler. "As thrilling as that was, it now is time to go for the top award. The home kitchens of this state have more original beef recipes than any other state in the nation. Let's get those recipes out and compare them to the best of the other states."

The rules for entries must be followed exactly. A recipe must be original. It must use no more than eight ingredients (excluding salt, black pepper and water). Garnishes must be made from those ingredients. Preparation and cooking times, including marinating time, must be less than 60 minutes. The beef cut selected must be appropriate for the recipe. It must be at least 1 pound and no more than 2 pounds of beef.

Robin Bonifay Hill of Arlington met all those qualifications in 1993 with a sirloin recipe called Calypso Steak. Her recipe received high marks from the judges for its simple preparation, appealing ingredients and convenient cooking method. As a result, Hill won third place—the highest finish for a Texan in the history of the national indoor cook-off competition.

Texas CattleWomen hope that among this year's entries are a few recipes that add enough judge-pleasing qualities to take Texas to the championship. Brown says judges choose recipes that are adapted for contemporary lifestyles. Other characteristics that judges appreciate are healthful ingredients, convenient preparation times, and balanced flavors.

"As one judge says, the key to success is to test the recipe over and over," Brown says. "Get other persons' opinions too, and then send the recipe to BIC. While you're waiting on the

national competition, work on the food's presentation. Judges see the food both as individual portions and on a large platter, so make sure it looks good."

The grand prize "Best of Beef" award will receive \$25,000 second place, \$10,000, and third place, \$5,000. Two honorable mention contestants will receive \$2,500 each.

"Remember that the idea has to be original," says Brown. "But don't overlook sources of ideas for your recipes like cookbooks, magazines and restaurants. Then develop them into recipes with award-winning potential to send to the National Beef Cook-Off. It's time to bring the championship to Texas."

CALYPSO STEAK

Total preparation and cooking time: 35 minutes Marinating time: 20 minutes to 2 hours

1 1/2 pounds boneless beef top sirloin or top round steak, cut 1-inch thick Edible flowers (optional)

Marinade:
1/2 medium onion, cut into quarters
1/4 cup honey
1/4 cup fresh lime juice
1/4 cup soy sauce

10 to 20 quarter-size slices peeled, fresh ginger

(cut from 1" wide x 1 1/2 to 3" long piece)

1 to 2 jalapeno peppers, stems removed, cut in half

3 cloves garlic, peeled

1/2 teaspoon ground allspice

1/2 teaspoon ground paprika

1/2 teaspoon dried thyme leaves

1. Place marinade ingredients in blender or food processor, fitted with steel blade; process until blended. Place beef steak and marinade in plastic bag, turning to coat. Close bag securely and marinate in refrigerator 20 minutes to 2 hours, turning once.

2. Remove steak from marinade; reserve marinade. Place steak on rack in broiler pan so surface of meat is 3 to 4 inches from heat. Broil top sirloin 16 to 21 minutes (top round 15 to 18 minutes) for rare to medium doneness, turning once.

3. Meanwhile in small saucepan, bring reserved marinade to a rolling boil over high heat. Boil 2 minutes; strain and set aside for sauce.

4. Trim fat from steak. Carve steak crosswise into thin slices; arrange on serving platter. Garnish with edible flowers, if desired; serve with sauce. Makes 6 servings.

Dental progress being made

A dentist is asked to treat a child with a genetic disorder that affects tooth development, or an adult with diabetes complicated by severe gum disease. Where can the dentist find information on treatment? How can the patient or family obtain information about appropriate oral health care?

For the first time, there is a central resource for these "special care" patients and the practitioners who treat them: the National Oral Health Information Clearinghouse (NOHIC), a new service of the National Institute of Dental Research, one of the Federal National Institutes of Health.

Special care patients are those who have medical or disabling conditions that lead to oral health problems. Their treatment needs often lie outside of the realm of traditional dental care. Special care patients include people with genetic disorders or systemic diseases that affect oral health, such as cleft lip and/or palate and diabetes mellitus. Special care patients also include people whose medical treatments cause oral problems, such as mouth sores or dry mouth, that often result from chemotherapy or radiation therapy for head and neck cancers, or from a variety of medications. People with mental or physical disabilities, like severe arthritis, that make good oral hygiene or treatment difficult also need special care.

NOHIC offers a variety of services to help patients and professionals find and obtain information. It maintains a computerized catalog that provides descriptions and ordering information for a broad array of publications and other materials. In addition, the clearinghouse collects and maintains information on key organizations and programs involved in special care and the services available from these groups. NOHIC also produces and distributes patient education materials, including fact sheets, brochures and information packets.

PERSISTENCE PAYS

As a small boy, I watched a pile-driving machine at work. The operator pulled a huge weight to the top and turned it loose to come crashing down on the steel column. Though the impact shook the ground under my bare feet, the piling hardly moved at all. I soon tired of watching the machine make noise but apparently accomplish little else.

It was not until some years later that I began to understand and appreciate the pile-driving process. Its results are cumulative. The pile-driver must keep pounding away, even if it isn't making any visible progress. Persistence pays off in the long run.

Take a moment and reflect on some of America's great examples of persistence. Remember Thomas Edison who had hundreds of failures before he lit up lives. Remember Abraham Lincoln who failed in business and lost several elections before becoming President of the United States. Remember Colonel Sanders who was 66 and nearly penniless when he founded Kentucky Fried Chicken.

And, of course, don't forget Tommy Puttzer. Who is he, you ask? Tommy is the guy who only tried a couple of times, then gave up.

Question/Answer

Q: I want to install a new vinyl floor in my bath. My question is, when is it advisable to first take up the existing flooring, or just lay the new floor on top of it?

A: You'll want to first take up your existing flooring if there's an obvious problem, such as water damage, dry rot, or the floor is uneven. Keep in mind though, that laying underlayment is a big job. Not only will you have to scribe all the sheets to fit, you may also need to cut off the bottom of any doors to allow clearance above the now-thicker floor. The cracks between the underlayment panels must be filled and the depressions caused by the numerous nails required to install the panels must also be filled. If these problems don't exist, there's no reason why you can't lay your new vinyl directly on top of the old. In fact, there are several good reasons why you might.

Many resilient flooring and flooring adhesives installed prior to the early 1980s contained asbestos. This asbestos is perfectly safe when left in place, but tearing it up will send some of it airborne, unless precise EPA abatement procedures are followed.

One note of caution in installing vinyl over vinyl: you'll need to do some pretty exacting surface preparation to make the job last.

Q: We are adding a new wing to our home, and the walls will be constructed with gypsum wallboard. What can we do to reduce sound transmission between rooms?

A: The conventional system of framing and finishing affords relatively low resistance to sound transmission. The typical wall, framed with 2x4s and finished with 1/2-inch wallboard, has a sound transmission rating (STC) of only 30 to 34. Filling stud cavities with batt insulation and using thicker wallboard, even doubling the layers of wallboard, will improve the situation.

One of the most effective approaches to the problem, however, is to modify the wall framing method by using lumber for the top and toe plates that is wider than that used for the studs. Studs are then fastened in place on 8-inch centers, with edges alternately aligned with opposite edges of the plates. This reduces the amount of sound-induced vibration that is transmitted from one side of the wall to the other. The STC rating of a wall which uses 2x4 studs set on 2x6 plates, and is finished with double layers of 1/2-inch wallboard, is about 50 to 54 - nearly equal to that of a 7-inch-thick brick cavity wall.

Q: Dark brown spots are appearing in areas of my concrete deck. They don't wash away with soap and water. What causes these spots?

A: The type of discoloration you describe occurs when tricalcium aluminoferrite - the agent that gives portland cement its gray color - has not reacted thoroughly with the other chemicals in the concrete. To remove the dark spots, try pouring on undiluted household vinegar. If that doesn't work, try a solution of one part muriatic acid to 30 parts water.

Roof covering choice has multiple options

When it comes to selecting a covering for your roof, generally speaking, the more durable the roof covering, the more expensive it will be, both in materials and labor costs. Try to select a roof covering with an expected durability of at least 20 years.

Besides cost, making a wise roof covering decision must take into consideration structural factors (heavy roofs such as slate and tile often require more-than-ordinary roof framing), fire resistance and appearance.

Asphalt shingles are the most common roof covering because they are inexpensive and easy to install and repair. Available in many colors and textures, these shingles are relatively durable and provide tight protection from wind and rain.

Roll roofing is another option. This is made from the same material as asphalt shingles, but is manufactured in long rolls. Roll roofing is applied in overlapping layers, giving it a varying lifespan of five to 20 years depending on the amount of overlap.

Roll roofing is inexpensive, easy and quick to apply, but lacks good appearance. Do-it-yourself home builders often consider applying a roll roof initially, then re-roofing with higher quality material later when financing permits. Roll roofing is only partially fire-resistant.

Wood shingles are normally sawn from cedar or redwood and normally come in uniform lengths and thicknesses. When applied, they lie flat and smooth on the roof. Wood shingles add beauty and resale value to a home. However, though easy to install, the process is time-consuming, and the shingles themselves are expensive.

Wood shingles offer no fire-resistance unless treated and are prohibited in some areas. Wood shakes are normally split from logs, rather than sawn, making them somewhat thicker and more irregularly-shaped than shingles.

Resawn shakes - split shakes sawn in half through their thickness - have one smooth side and one rough, so they lie flatter when installed. Shakes may last 40 years or more, and because of their looks and durability, add very high resale value to a home.

Shakes frequently cost twice as much as asphalt shingles, and take much longer to apply. Like wood shingles, they are combustible. Metal roofs, such as terne and copper, can be very expensive.

But most homeowners choosing a metal roof covering, select galvanized steel sheet or aluminum, which comes in 2-foot-wide strips up to 18 feet long. The panels overlap each other along raised crimps through which they are nailed with special nails. Sheet metal roofing, however, costs about the same as asphalt shingles and is easy to apply.

Slate is very expensive and difficult to apply. Slate roofs frequently outlast their houses and add high resale value. Easily broken by falling tree branches, slate is fireproof.

Tile roofs come in traditional clay, which is difficult to apply, and the newer concrete tiles that are much quicker and easier to apply. Tile is beautiful and has a 30- to 60-year lifespan in addition to being fireproof.

But materials and labor expense is high and like slate, tile breaks easily under impact.

Farm and Ranch

Only oil/gas outranks agriculture as top Texas industry

AUSTIN -- Agriculture is big business in Texas. In fact, it is the state's second-largest industry, generating more than \$36 billion in economic activity and providing a paycheck for one out of five Texans. But Agriculture Commissioner Rick Perry says that Texas producers are not about to rest on past laurels as they continue to work hard to make the state a leader in American

agricultural production. "National Agriculture Week is the one time of the year we officially salute these producers who have a significant impact on the Texas economy and help make Texas the leader it is," Perry said. "But we should remember their outstanding efforts and honor the hard work of all our producers every single day." National Agriculture Week is

March 14-20, and Perry points out the tremendous contributions that make Texas the second-largest ag-producing state in the nation. In Texas, an average farm or ranch grossed about \$78,000 in 1992, but after paying expenses of nearly \$59,000 saw a profit of only about \$19,000, according to the latest economic figures, said Perry. "With these figures showing

roughly that for every \$3 spent in production on a Texas farm, only \$1 is netted in profit, it's not hard to understand the frustration farmers and ranchers have with their expenses continue to rise while their earnings drop," added Perry. U.S. and Texas farmers now make up less than two percent of our population but continue to provide for the remaining 98 percent through

technology and increases in efficiency and production, Perry pointed out: The Texas farmer creates one in every five jobs in the state, and agriculture is the second-largest industry in Texas, just behind oil and gas. Each year, Texas agriculture earns about \$12 billion in cash receipts and generates more than \$36 billion in economic activity across the Lone

State. However, at the supermarket farmers earn only about a quarter of every dollar spent. Despite low returns, each Texas farmer continues to feed and clothe and enormous number of people -- 128, 94 domestically and 34 overseas. The state's 185,000 farms and ranches encompass 130 million acres. Each operation averages more than 700 acres.

 -- Upland cotton production totaled 5.1 million bales during 1993, up 59 percent from the previous year's poor crop. Harvested acreage increased 42 percent from 1992 to 5.05 million acres. Statewide yield averaged 485 pounds per acre, 44 pounds more than the previous year.
 Texas leads the nation in Upland cotton production, harvesting 32 percent of the United States crop.
 On the Southern High Plains, production totaled 2.6 million bales, up 93 percent from the 1992 crop. The Southern High Plains harvested more than half of the total Texas crop.
 -- Texas corn production was a record high 212.8 million bushels, up five percent from '92. Harvested acreage totaled 1.85 million acres, a 14 percent increase. Yield averaged 115 bushels per acre, down 10 bushels from the record yield in 1992.

 -- Sorghum production totaled 102.1 million hundredweight, down 35 percent from the '92 crop. Harvested acreage dropped 29 percent from the previous year to 3.2 million acres, while average yield decreased 280 pounds to 3,192 pounds per acre.
 Texas ranks first in production with 32 percent of the U.S. crop.
 -- Winter wheat production during 1993 totaled 118.4 million bushels,

down eight percent from the previous year. Harvested acreage totaled 3.7 million acres, down three percent. Statewide yield averaged 32 bushels per acre, down two bushels.
 Texas ranks fourth in production.
 Texas producers have seeded 5.8 million acres for the 1994 winter wheat crop, five percent less than the 6.1 million acres planted for 1993.
 -- Texas peanut production totaled 559 million pounds, down 18 percent from 1992. Harvested acreage decreased 15 percent to 260,000 acres. Yield averaged 2,150 pounds per acre, down 80 pounds from the previous year's record yield.
 Texas ranks second in production.
 -- Texas rice producers harvested 16.1 million hundredweight, down 21 percent from 1992. Harvested acreage totaled 298,000 acres. Yield averaged 5,400 pounds, down 400 pounds per acre.
 Texas ranks fourth in production.
 -- All hay production totaled 7.51 million tons, down 23 percent from 1992's record crop.
 Texas ranks third in production.
 -- Texas fresh market commercial vegetable production totaled 17.2 million hundredweight with a total value of \$270 million. Texas ranks fourth in production.

Texas accounted for 5.9 percent of the nation's fresh market commercial vegetable harvested acreage; 4.5 percent of production, and four percent of the total value.
Livestock
 -- The Jan. 1, 1994, Texas inventory of all cattle and calves totaled 14.8 million head, up three percent from last year. This is the largest inventory of cattle and calves since 1983. Texas accounts for 15 percent of the total U.S. inventory.
 Texas ranks first.
 -- The inventory of sheep and lambs on Jan. 1 totaled 1.71 million head, a 12 percent decrease from last year. The Texas inventory accounts for almost 19 percent of the total in the U.S.
 Texas ranks first.
 -- The inventory of all goats on Jan. 1 totaled 1.96 million head with Angora goats accounting for 1.49 million head of the total. While the inventory of all goats was unchanged from last year, the Angora goat inventory dropped four percent.
 Texas ranks first in all goats and Angora goats.
 -- The Texas hog and pig inventory totaled 500,000 head on Dec. 1, 1993, down seven percent from the previous year. Texas accounts for less than one percent of the total U.S.

Pesticide applicator training to be offered

Farmers and ranchers who apply or supervise application of restricted use pesticides may take state approved training at a session to be held Wednesday in the Hereford Community Center.

The licensing examination also will be administered at the meeting.

Mandated by state law for those involved with application of pesticides, the training session will be conducted by agents of the Deaf Smith County Agricultural Extension office.

Dennis Newton, agent, reminds that producers who were issued

private applicator certificates in the early 1980s may buy and apply pesticides but use is restricted to the person issued the certificate.

Persons supervising employees applying pesticides must have a private pesticide applicator license.

Continuing education units are required to maintain certificates and licenses.


Study materials in preparation for the course may be purchased for \$14 in the extension office in the Deaf Smith County courthouse. Newton suggests that materials be purchased in advance and studied before the training.

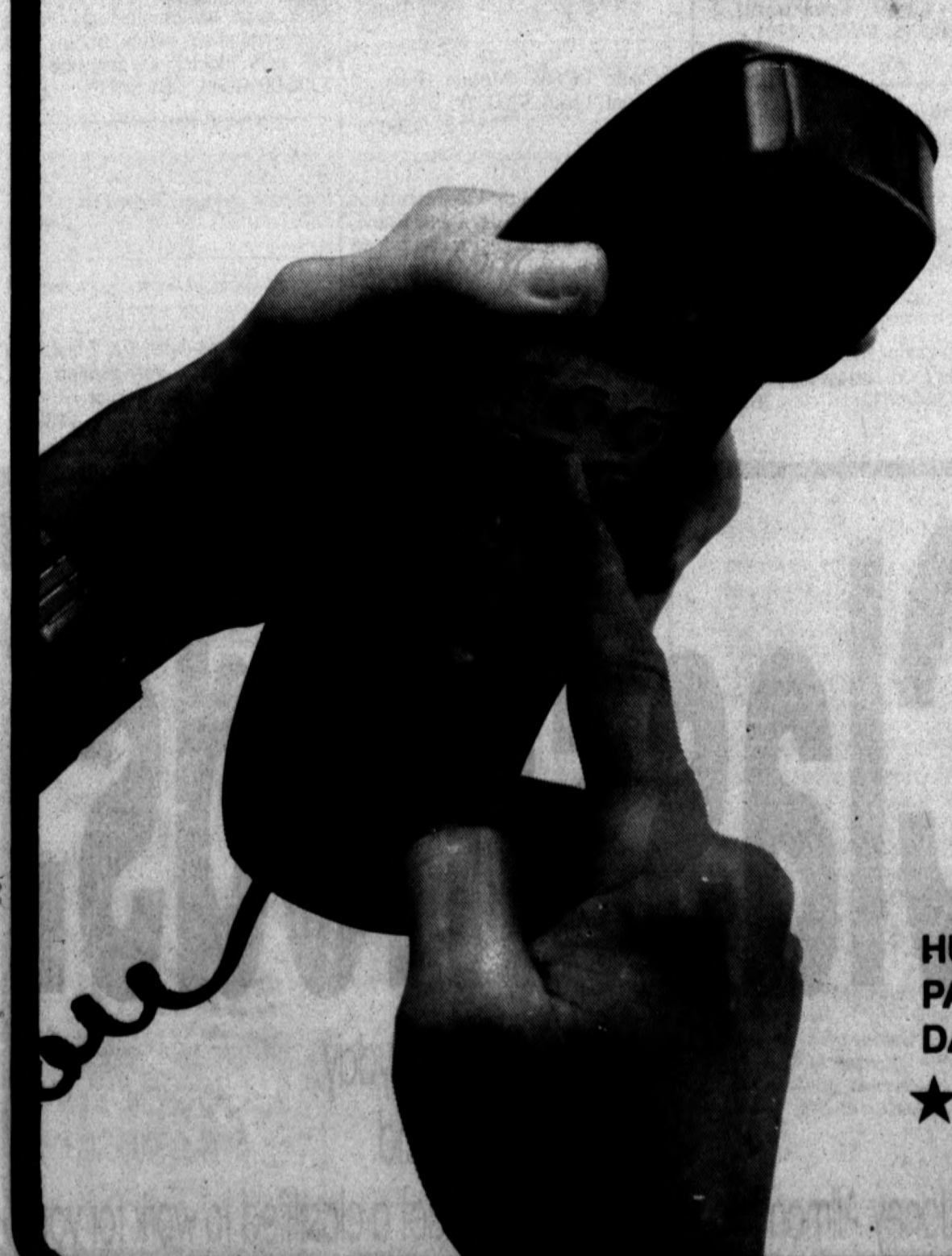

Amarillo man boasts collection of several hundred G.I. Joe dolls

AMARILLO, Texas - Bill Siddens plays host to platoons of soldiers every night.

They crowd into both bedrooms of his home, the living room and foyer.

"It's expanded to every place but the bathroom and the hot tub room," Siddens said.

Siddens, a 38-year-old petroleum engineer at J.M. Huber Corporation in Amarillo, owns more than 800 G.I. Joe figures and 140-plus G.I. Joe vehicles. The collection has an estimated value of more than \$100,000.

Siddens never spent that kind of money.

"I paid \$60 for one of the molded-hair black (Joes) about 10 years ago," he said. "That's about the most I've ever spent on one."

Siddens invested more time and less money by going through garage sales, often buying Joes for a quarter and a bag of fatigues and weapons for 50 cents. But that was a long time ago.

"It's gotten ridiculous," he said. Hard-to-find figures that Siddens owns would cost up to \$1,000 if bought from a collector today.

Some of Siddens' more unusual pieces include Joes in full British regalia and an Oriental Joe from Japan. Not all of them have the G.I. Joe name, but all appeal to Siddens.

Hasbro introduced the G.I. Joe action figure in February of 1964. The toys became an immediate hit.

"It's really unusual in the toy industry to see one brand, one line have the staying power that Joe has," Gary Serby, public relations director for Hasbro, said. "Thirty years is just unheard of."

The market slowed only one time for the G.I. Joe figures, from 1978 to 1982.

"In 1978, the price of oil and petroleum products went way up," Serby said. "That affected the manufacturing of plastic."

But while Hasbro wasn't making the figure in the U.S., Siddens found soldiers in England.

"I went over to London after I graduated (from Texas Tech University)," he said. "A company named Palitoy made him there as

Action Man."

Siddens began to snatch up the figures.

"I started out wanting to collect what I had as a kid," he said.

Siddens got his first Joe for Christmas in 1964. The original Joe didn't last as long as the ones he's bought since.

"The stuff we had as kids didn't survive as well," the childhood resident of Odessa said. "We were able to get outside and bang it up. A lot of kids up north kept theirs nice because they played inside more."

Siddens' idea of trying to rekindle the feeling of that first figure exploded into armies of Joes.

The soldiers span handmade wooden cabinets in a bedroom. Some of the figures spend their inanimate lives shoved in a tank, while others balance on motorcycles. Most stand stoically, with their firearm in an at-ease position.

All of the figures have that same scar across the right cheek.

"I heard that they (designed the face) with a composition of different Medal of Honor winners," Siddens said. "They probably added the scar to make them appear braver in battle."

The name for the figures came from the title of a 1945 movie - "The Story of G.I. Joe." The poster for the

movie hangs in Siddens' bathroom.

In his hallway, Siddens has a collection of the smaller Joe figures made since 1982. Hasbro reentered the action figure market with the 3 1/2-inch G.I. Joes and has since begun to remake the 12-inch version.

"In 1993, we brought back the Hall of Fame line," Serby said. "The commemorative figure will be available in August."

Hasbro is celebrating the 30th anniversary of the G.I. Joe figure with the new figures, as well as a large convention on an aircraft carrier harbored in New York.

"Joe is the preeminent action figure," Serby said. "Baby Boomers remember playing the G.I. Joe 20 to 30 years ago."

Siddens prefers his classic collectibles to the newly produced models.

"If you were a kid, they're not nearly as fun to play with," Siddens said. "They don't move as well."

The commemorative edition Joe is not that exciting either, he said.

"It's going to be a new-style body with an old-style head," Siddens said. Hasbro, he said, doesn't understand what the figures mean to him and his colleagues.

"To them it's just a toy."

ammonia contains soap, so it is a better cleaner for tough dirt and grime but it tends to streak shiny surfaces.

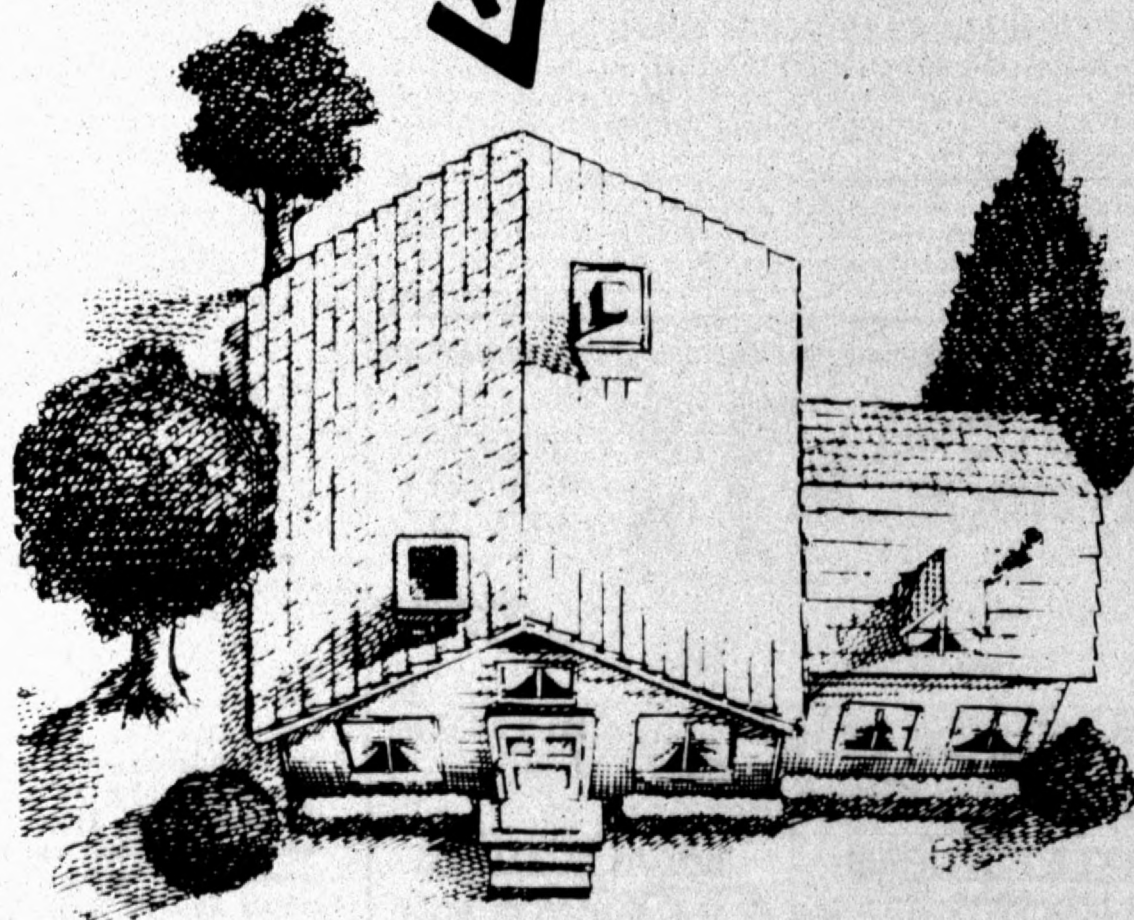
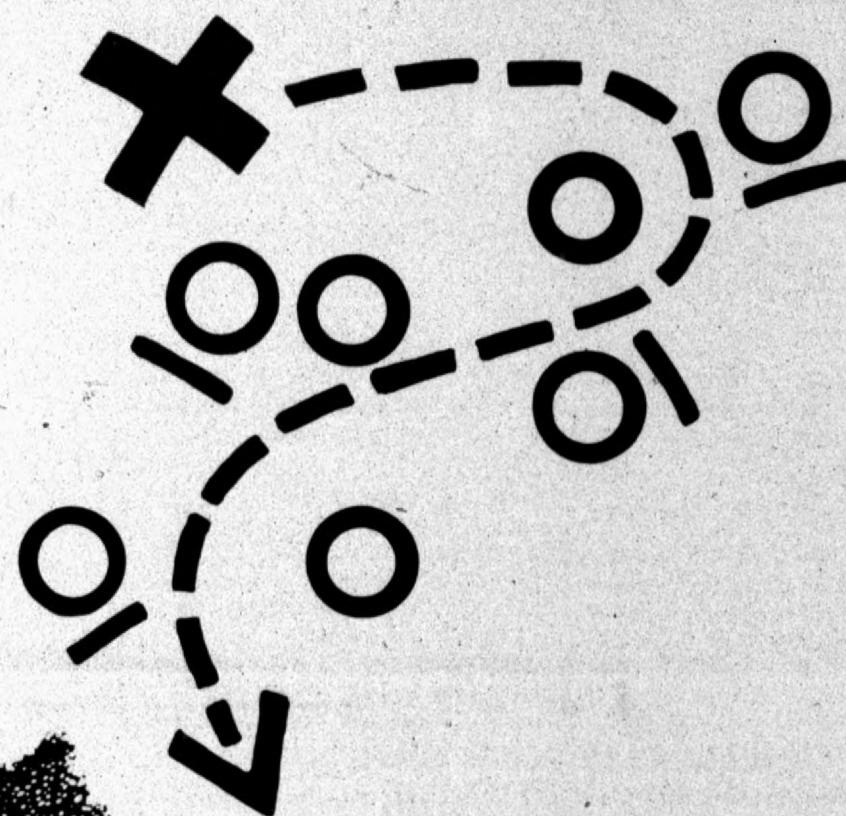

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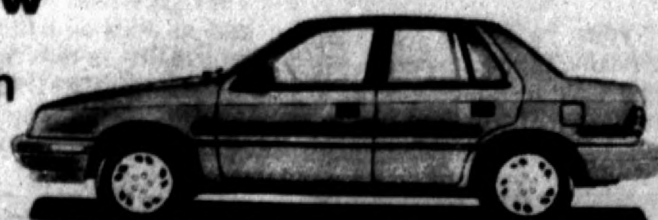

Hollywood hands out Oscars to its favorite, & best films

Hollywood rolls out the hype to honor some of its greatest work with the 66th annual "Academy Awards" presentation on Monday, March 21. It'll be a night of glamour, triumph and heartbreak, as well as a night of politics.

The program, with host Whoopi Goldberg, will be broadcast on ABC.

As usual, politics play an important part in the Academy Awards — politics related to the entertainment industry as well as real-world politics.

For example, in 1991 "Silence of the Lambs" was nominated for a number of awards. But the nominations and victories, including best picture and best director (Jonathan Demme) awards, were met with protests from groups who believed that it portrayed homosexuals in an unfavorable light.

In 1986, Steven Spielberg's "The Color Purple" received 11 nominations but won nothing. Most critics think it was snubbed Spielberg because academy members didn't take him seriously. Which leads to this year.

Was Tom Hanks' nomination for best actor in "Philadelphia," the drama about a man with AIDS directed by Demme, an attempt by the academy to show it has compassion for people with the deadly disease? Although most critics consider Hanks' performance to be good, not many believe it to be Oscar-caliber.

And what of the 12 nominations for Spielberg's "Schindler's List"? Is this the year that the academy will finally recognize him as a serious filmmaker?

Real-world politics, as represented in many of the films in the year's roster, with themes like the Holocaust, the strife in Northern Ireland and AIDS.

This led to suggestions that a news broadcaster, such as Ted Koppel,

would be an appropriate host.

Of course the academy is still capable of surprises. Although generally viewed as playing it safe and remaining in the mainstream, it has broken this tradition. "Silence of the Lambs" was not given much of a chance because it was a violent and suspenseful thriller (the academy usually goes for more feel-good movies). And the mature content of last year's "The Crying Game," as well as its independent status (films from major studios are ordinarily favored), also didn't place it high on predictors' lists, even though it did receive six nominations.

Regardless of the politics, winning an Oscar brings attention and money to some of the best and biggest movies of the year. And it sure looks good on the resume.

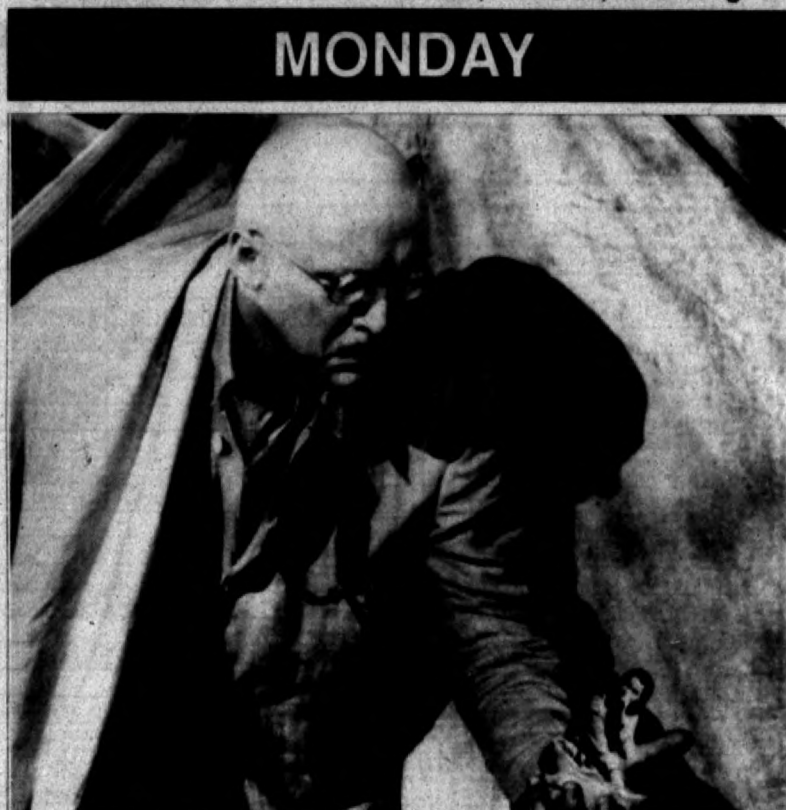

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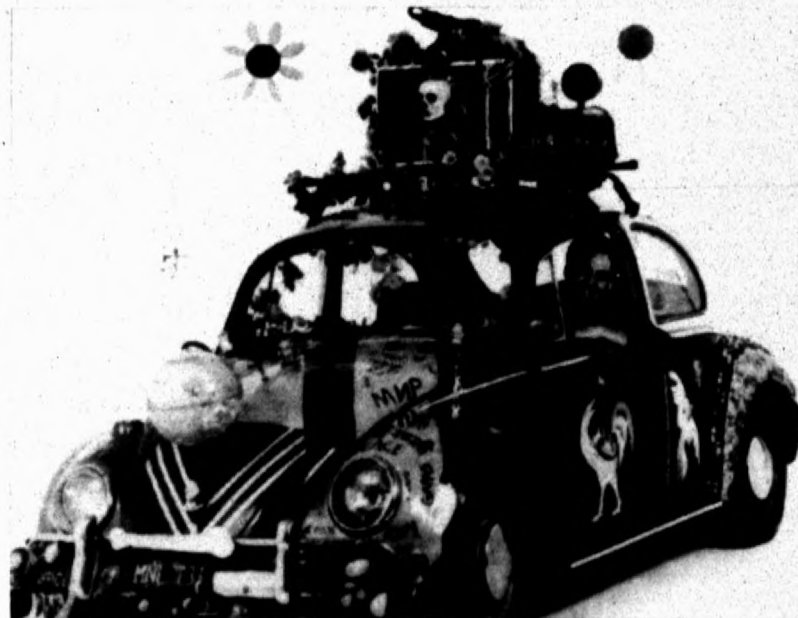

Wonderful 'Wild Wheels' well worth watching

Tired of being ignored on the road? Need a way of expressing your individuality?

Try redecorating your car. No, not a new paint job or bumper sticker. Go all out, or just watch PBS' "Wild Wheels" on Wednesday, March 23 (check local listings), for inspiration.

Filmmaker Harrod Blank, owner-driver of an art car named "Oh My God!," drove his highly decorated Volkswagen Beetle across America in search of other unique vehicles. And he didn't come up short of footage.

The hour-long visit with some of the country's most outrageous car artists says much about American culture. Blank shows viewers automobiles crowded with religious symbols, postcards, buttons, horse statuettes, lights, marbles, wrought iron and grass.

Yes, grass. Gene Pool cultivates a rolling sod farm, if you will, all over his car. Larry Fuente redesigned a motorcycle to sit under a large fuzzy cow frame and calls it "Cowsaki." Gary Seibel created "City Car," its body is painted with a city map as seen

from the air. And a model of the Seattle skyline adorns the roof.

"Each person is motivated by a completely different reason," Blank says. "Some of the people are artists making an artistic vision come true, and then there are other people who did it as a form of catharsis."

Blank rode the colorful highways of America for three years, searching out subjects and collecting stories. In the end, he makes connections between unrelated people and places using their cars as the vehicle (no pun intended).

"In 'Wild Wheels' I never say why I do it," Blank says, in reference to his hobby. "I was raised in a redwood forest, and then when I moved into the city at the age of 17, I didn't fit in at all. I think I started doing my car as a way of demonstrating that I didn't fit in, and that my perception of the world was different. I was doing my car to express my inner self."

Blank is currently working on covering a van in cameras. His message to viewers?

"It's okay to do up your car. It's okay to look at the car as a canvas. It doesn't matter what you do."
