Texans can expect hotter temperatures this week

Highs were expected to push the century mark across parts of Texas by the week-end, with only scattered to isolated thunderstorms in the forecast, according to Associated Press reports.

Storms developed Tuesday night between Del Rio and Laredo, but have since dissipated.

Mostly clear skies greeted Texans in central and northeast parts of the state Wednesday. Some high clouds covered the region between Childress and Wichita Falls.

Fog shrouded parts of Southeast Texas. Early-morning temperatures ranged from the 50s to 80s.

It was 59 degrees at Marfa, 69 at Alliance Airport near Fort Worth, 70 at New Braunfels, 77 at Odessa, 76 at Abilene, 80 at Dallas Love Field and 81 at Laredo and the Naval Air Station at Corpus Christi.

Winds were variable from easterly to southerly at 5 to 10 mph in the Panhandle and South Plains, with calm to light conditions in the far west.

A slight chance of thunderstorms was expected through Friday in North and South Texas, the Permian Basin and Guadalupe Mountains.

Daytime highs should range from the upper 80s to near 105 along the Rio Grande.

Lows overnight should be in the mid-50s to upper 60s and mid-70s.

Indicators hint U.S. economy cooling down

NEW YORK (AP) — An important gauge of future economic activity remained unchanged in June, the latest indication that the U.S. economy may be cooling down, a private industry group said Wednesday.

The Index of Leading Economic Indicators held steady at 106, forecasting a break from rapid economic growth for the rest of 2000, the Conference Board said. The results met economists' expectations.

The index stood at 100 in 1996, its base year. It dropped 0.1 point in May after holding steady in April.

The numbers released Wednesday may play a role in whether the Federal Reserve decides to hike interest rates when it meets Aug. 22. Concerns about too-rapid economic expansion and fears of inflation have prompted the Fed to raise interest rates six times since last summer.

The central bank left rates unchanged at its most recent meeting in June, but left the door open to another rate hike at its next meeting.

Stocks were generally higher following the report's release, with the Dow Jones industrial average up 67 points to 10,674 and the Nasdaq composite index up 25 points to 3,710.

"The Leading Indicators are cooling off from the rapid pace registered at the end of last year," said Ken Goldstein, an economist for the New York-based board. "This is not the kind of performance to be expected when gross domestic product grows by 5.2 percent, as it did in the second quarter of 2000."

Scott drops plans for Sears store

A local businessman has abandoned his effort to open a Sears retail store here, curtailing attempts begun in September 1999 by the Deaf Smith County Chamber of Commerce and Sears marketing representatives to locate a potential owner for an operation in Hereford.

Dinky Scott, a longtime Hereford businessman, said Tuesday afternoon he believes Hereford would get a Sears store, but he decided he isn't the right person to do it.

Scott's opening of the new business was reportedly "a done deal" when the business

opening was first announced in May. The projected opening of the Sears outlet was to be this month.

"I talked with Sears this week and have officially informed them my interests in putting in a store have changed," Scott said. "I am no longer considering the investment into a Sears store."

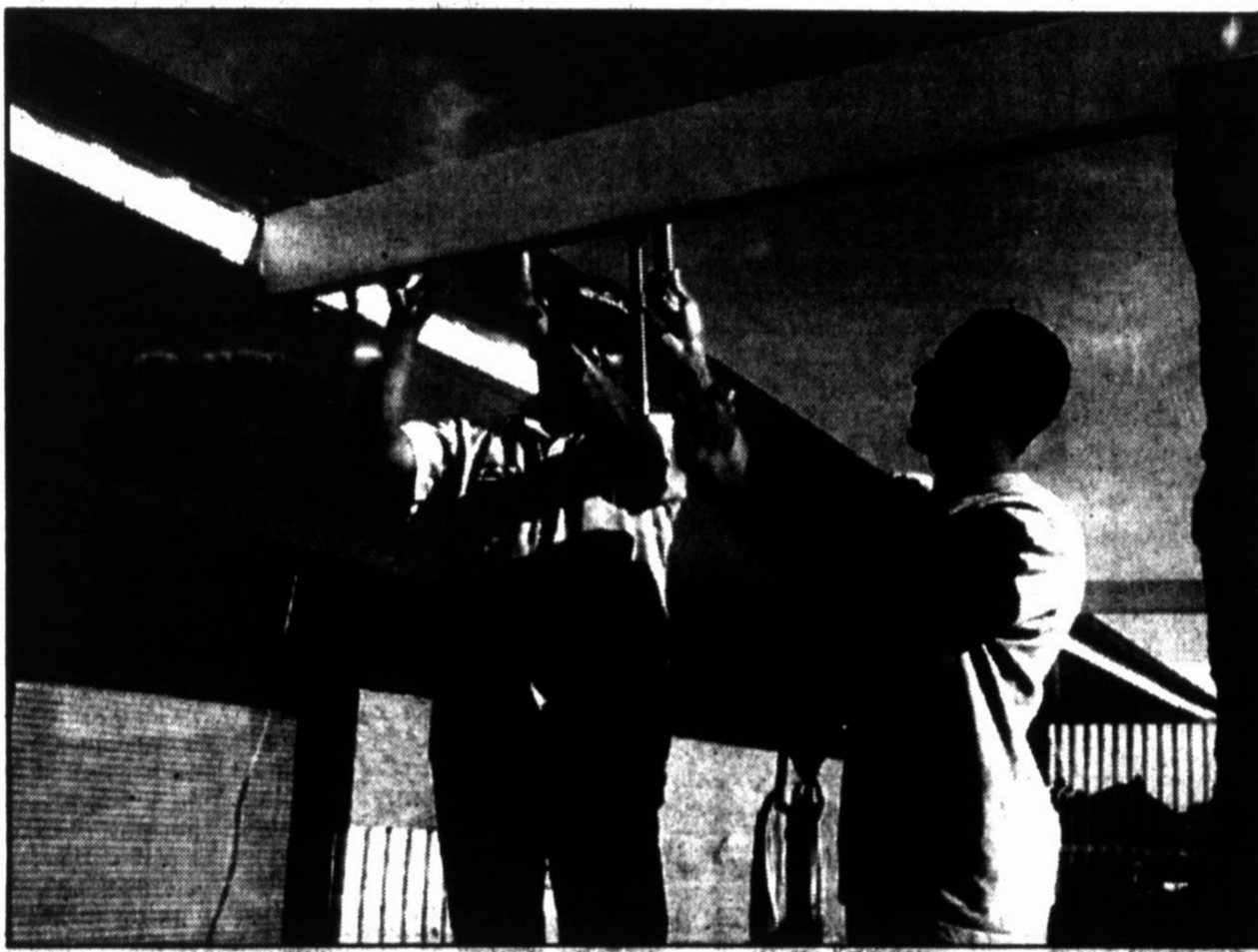
"I don't want anyone to misunderstand. I backed out of the deal because I decided it seemed better suited for a younger person, not because I didn't believe a Sears store would not do well here," Scott said. "I got very close, but in the end I decided I was too old to step into a business deal like that."

Scott originally announced to the chamber

that he had formally entered into an agreement with Sears to open an 11,000-square-foot retail store.

Projections then called for the store to be located between the Family Dollar and E-Z Pawn stores on West Park Avenue. Construction and renovation at the location was to have begun in May, with a targeted opening date sometime this month.

"I think Hereford is going to get its Sears store, I truly do. It's a great business opportunity for a younger person," Scott said. "And, while I'm no longer interested in making the investment, I told Sears I would continue to try to help locate someone who is."

Medicare changes mean higher costs for patients

Some Medicare patients receiving treatment at Hereford Regional Medical Center will be in for a rude surprise when they receive their bills.

Thanks to changes in the way the Medicare program pays for most hospital outpatient services, Medicare patients who don't have supplemental insurance will be liable for more out-of-pocket expenses.

The changes, which went into effect Tuesday, were implemented by the Health Care Financing Administration, the government agency that administers the Medicare program, and will affect Medicare recipients and hospitals throughout the nation.

The changes are contained in the Medicare's

new Outpatient Prospective Payment System, and were subject of protests from hospital organizations and the American Medical Association, and the HCFA pushed back the implementation date from July 1 to Aug. 1.

"I had hoped the HCFA would grant us a reprieve, but I have not received any fax or other communication that would indicate one," HRMC chief executive officer James Taylor said. "I'm afraid ... beneficiaries don't know how it will affect them. I'm also concerned that they will think the hospital raised rates, but the hospital is not setting the new rates. We were given a list of payments set by HCFA."

Taylor said the changes affect the method of payment for 451 ambulatory procedures

PHILADELPHIA (AP) — A key player in the U.S. military victory over Iraq. A 10-year member of the House. A globe-trotting executive for a giant oil-services company. Dick Cheney has led many lives.

His latest challenge: helping George W. Bush win the White House and then serving as vice president, a voice of experience and top adviser, just as he was as secretary of defense for Bush's father when the nation went to war.

GOP party watchers say Bush's choice of Cheney as his running mate complements the Texas governor's energy and exuberance with the quiet wisdom of a seasoned behind-the-scenes player in business, foreign policy and national politics.

Cheney will accept the Republican Party's nomination for vice president Wednesday night, and speak to a nationwide television audience

TAX HIKE

■ HISD board told rising costs, falling state funds to make increase necessary

Tough issues, increasing costs and declining state aid mean nothing to individuals who have little understanding of the complexities of public school finance, but to school officials and board members they are the foundation for their worst nightmares.

The Hereford Independent School District, which confronted a fiscal nightmare last fall in putting together the Fiscal 2000 budget, is struggling to contain costs while still maintaining quality education and facilities.

That means tax increase.

Last fall, the HISD board raised the tax rate by a nickel to \$1.43 per \$100 assessed valuation. This year, the trustees are looking at another increase — to \$1.50 in an effort to cover the rising costs of salaries and local funding.

The HISD budget planners got some help from the Deaf Smith County Appraisal District, which reported the district's certified tax base values increased by \$21 million over last year. Chief appraiser Danny Jones said the commercial and industrial tax increased \$7 million, personal property increased \$15 million, residential taxes were up by \$9 million and exemptions increased by \$3 million. The only decrease was for agricultural values, which fell by \$7 million.

At the same time, the numbers which determine state aid — the average daily attendance — decreased by more than 125 students, meaning a decline of at least \$400,000 state aid coming to the district.

"This is a very hard concept for most people to grasp," Superintendent Beth Abernethy said. "Most people don't understand when appraisal values go up and daily attendance goes down, so does our state aid."

HISD business manager Randy McDowell said the two main drivers of school funding is the average daily attendance (ADA) values and the local tax rate. Each year for the last several years, the district has seen a decline in attendance.

School districts receive extra funding, known as weighted average daily attendance (WADA), for children in special programs such as special education, bilingual, at-risk students, ca-

said Richard Katula, professor of communications at Northeastern University in Boston.

UT seeks tuition control

HOUSTON (AP) — With backing of powerful alumni, University of Texas System officials want state lawmakers to give them the right to set tuition and eventually boost rates at The University of Texas at Austin.

"There's a great demand for that institution and it's becoming more expensive to provide excellent service," UT Interim Chancellor Dan Burck told the Texas Journal of The Wall Street Journal in Wednesday's editions.

University System officials contend that the current tuition of \$600 a semester at UT Austin is not enough to provide high-quality education. The Legislature currently sets tuition rates.

But, as the country's largest public university campus with more than 37,000 undergraduate students, some key legislators argue that UT Austin is responsible for providing low income Texans with a high-caliber education.

Lawyer provides prayer guidelines

Attorney clarifies Supreme Court ruling for schools

HOUSTON (AP) — The attorney for a former high school student threatened with punishment by the Santa Fe school district for leading a pre-football game prayer is sending a new set of legal guidelines to all 1,200 Texas school districts, offering ways for schools to comply with a June U.S. Supreme Court ruling barring such prayers.

Kelly Coghlan, who represents former Santa Fe High School student Marian Ward in a pending federal court case, said Tuesday he is undertaking the mailing to stimulate discussion of the issue and to resolve what he calls

confusion about the court's ruling.

"Part of the problem with the new Supreme Court case is that many of the more liberal groups have tried to put their spin on the case, have tried to tell school boards that they must prohibit religious speech when similar secular speech is allowed," Coghlan said.

The case decided by the Supreme Court, Santa Fe Independent School District v. Doe, was brought by four students and their parents who sued the district in 1995 over its policy of letting students elect a "chaplain" to lead prayers at graduation ceremonies and home football games.

In a 6-3 decision, the Supreme Court ruled prayer before football games violated the constitutionally mandated separation of church and state.

The lawyer who wrote the winning brief in the Santa Fe case said if schools provide facilities for student-chosen speeches, they must ensure that such one type of speech does not appear more than

they jump through," said Douglas Laycock, a University of Texas law professor. "The schools are still forcing others to attend someone else's prayer service."

Coghlan argues that as long as schools do not prescribe or limit what students say during a school-sponsored forum, the content can include prayer or any subject matter.

That's the argument he is making in Ward's case, which contends public schools cannot discriminate against a religious message when other students are free to give secular messages in the same forum.

Ward won a federal injunction barring the Santa Fe Independent School District from threatening or punishing her for leading a prayer before football games last year.

"They've got to be neutral policies; the school can't say that kids can't give prayers and invocations," Coghlan said. "It's not the prayer. It's the fact that the government has programmed, endorsed and

strongly suggested what the students should talk about."

Coghlan, who filed an amici brief with the Supreme Court on behalf of 159 Santa Fe students and parents who support pregame prayers, provides model policies in his letter.

The mailing urges schools to review their policies allowing for student speakers to be sure they do not include any language such as prayer, invocation, benediction or solemnization, which would suggest the government favored a type of religious speech.

School districts also should make the selection of student speakers either by lot or by neutral criteria, such as a position as valedictorian or team captain, Coghlan said.

The Supreme Court agreed that Santa Fe's policy of allowing students to vote for a speaker was unconstitutional, because a majority vote inherently favored the Baptist-majority student body at the expense of other students of other denominations.

Ex-cons benefit from economy

AUSTIN (AP) — A booming economy and unemployment levels just above 4 percent statewide are sending some employers behind bars — to find employees.

"We have seen, given the shortage of labor, an increase in employers willing to give ex-offenders a second chance," said Burt Ellison, head of Project RIO, the largest program in Texas and in the nation that links businesses with the inmate population.

"Before when our people made cold calls they would hear, 'I'm not interested.' Now they say 'Send them over,'" Ellison said. About 30,000 businesses across the state and 30 percent of Texas' released inmates take part in the program each year, Ellison said.

From Sept. 1997 to Aug. 1998, 14,517, or 74 percent of the 19,120 inmates enrolled in the project's programs got jobs.

From Sept. 1999 through June, 13,755 or 82 percent of the 16,675 inmates enrolled in the project got jobs.

"We have been real tight. We are in a historically low labor period and employers have to go to nontraditional sources of labor," said Larry Jones, a spokesman for the Texas Workforce Commission. As of June the unemployment rate in Texas was 4.4 percent.

Most of the former inmates find jobs in areas other job seekers are reluctant to enter such as construction and retail and service jobs, said James Turpin, a spokesman for the American Correctional Association, the professional association for employees at more than 20,000 correctional facilities across the country.

"A lot of it is just dependent on the economy. The entry-level jobs or jobs the inmates would be best suited for are the toughest ones to fill on the outside," Turpin said.

Better inmate education programs and bimonthly job fairs that bring employers into correctional facilities also have helped former inmates find jobs, he said.

"They don't make license plates any more," Turpin said. Despite good times for ex-convicts today, some officials remain cautious.

"What we always tell ex-offenders and inmates is that if you have \$15-an-hour skills, you will get a \$15-an-hour job," Ellison said.

Dear Ann Landers: A column you wrote in 1992 changed my life in a small but important way. I hope you will run it again for others who

are suffering with acne. — Nameless in Charlotte, N.C.

Dear Charlotte: I'm pleased that column helped you. Here it is for others who suffer with the same problem.

Dear Ann Landers: In 1969, I started my first year as a university student. Soon after, I developed a severe case of acne, and I am sure stress had a lot to do with it. I went to three doctors and spent hundreds of dollars on medicine that was totally ineffective.

Vallejo shines in All-Star game

■ Hereford player makes winning grab for North team during game while QB Mock wins game MVP

HOUSTON (AP) — L.J. Vallejo wasn't really expected to play a major role in the game plan, nor did he come into Tuesday's Southwestern Bell All-Star Football Game with much notoriety.

But the Hereford standout left Rice Stadium with the satisfaction of knowing his touchdown was the highlight of a game that had very few of them.

Vallejo's touchdown catch off a tipped pass by The Woodlands' Chance Mock provided the North with the winning score in their 17-13 victory over the South.

"It just happened," said Vallejo, who will play defensive back at West Texas A&M next fall. "I just jumped up and grabbed it."

Vallejo, listed at 5-foot-9-inches, 175 pounds, was overlooked by most of the bigger universities because of a serious knee injury that kept him out of his school's playoff run to the Class 4A Division 1 state finals.

"It was kind of redemption for me," Vallejo said. "I was really nervous coming here. All of these guys are great athletes and they're going to Division 1 colleges. It was just awesome to be able to play again."

The game, which showcases 70 prep football standouts from across Texas, was held in conjunction with the 68th annual Texas High School Coaches Association coaching school. The school ends Wednesday.

Both teams combined for only 345 total yards, but it

was the big-play ability of the North that catapulted them to a win.

Texarkana's Nathan Vasher caught the other Mock touchdown throw on a 36-yard bomb down the sideline with 6:20 remaining in the third quarter, which pulled the North within three points.

Mock, who will attend the University of Texas this fall, only completed five of his 15 passing attempts, but it was his two touchdowns tosses which earned him offensive

player of the game honors.

"I got the MVP, but this is an award for the team," said Mock, whose father Mike was named the game's most valuable offensive player in 1974. "It's a great feeling to be given this honor, but I had some great receivers."

Post's Billy Crawford, a Baylor signee, was named the most valuable defensive player of the game. Crawford had four tackles, two of them for 18 yards in losses.

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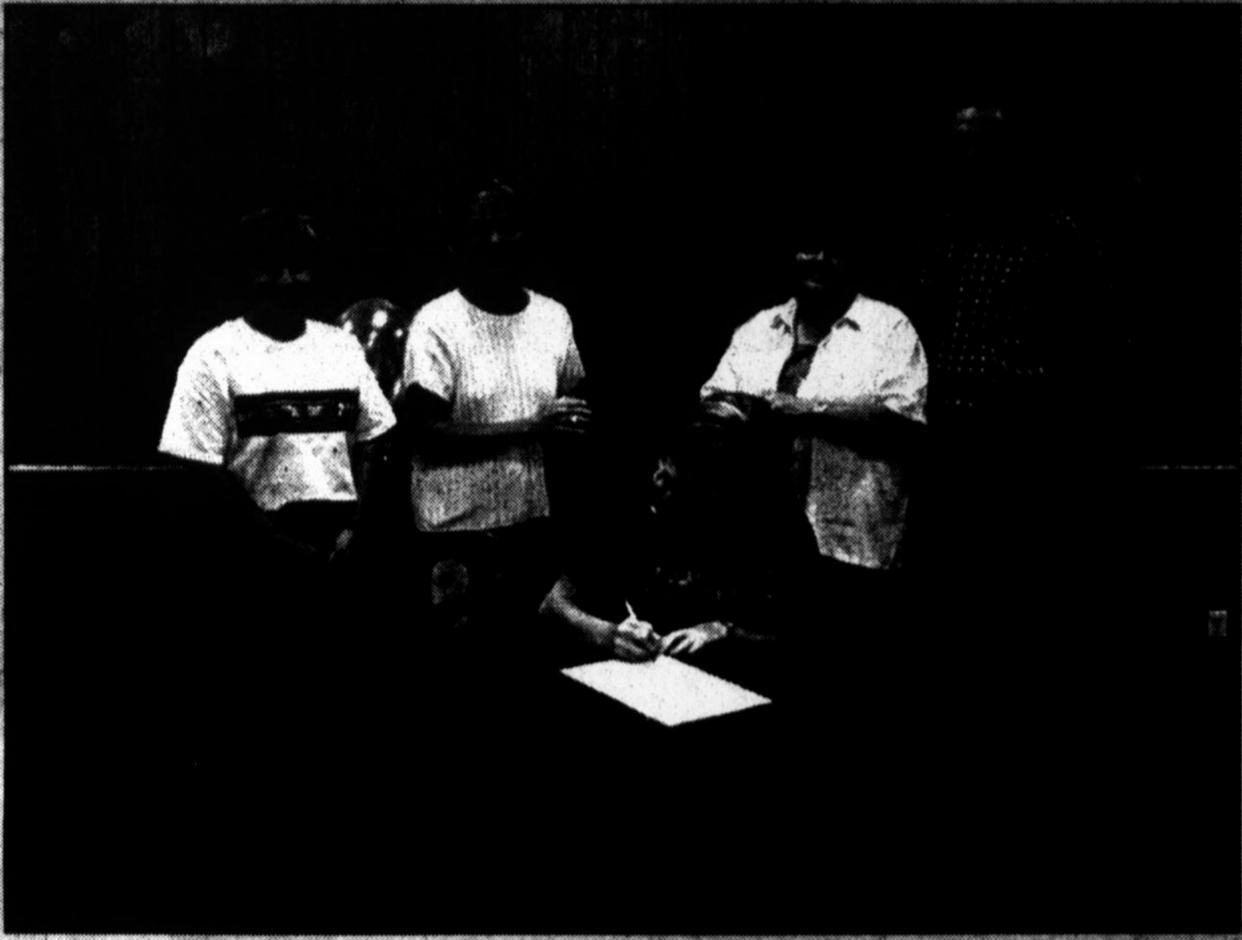

Underwood settles down

■ Cowboys' risk looking good so far

IRVING, Texas (AP) — With a sack and two tackles in his most extensive action since 1997, Dimitrius Underwood finally showed why NFL teams have been willing to focus on his potential and not his off-field problems.

Underwood played 30 snaps Sunday night in the Dallas Cowboys' preseason opener against the Pittsburgh Steelers. It was quite a milestone for a guy whose career ended after one day in Minnesota and whose life nearly ended while with Miami.

"I've come a long way," Underwood said. "At one point, I didn't know what direction I was going, didn't know where I would be. I'm just thankful to God that I'm here and had a pretty good night."

Cowboys coach Dave Campo singled out Underwood's performance.

"I was very pleased with what I saw with Dimitrius," Campo said. "He made some progress. It gives me great hope that he's got a chance to be a player for us."

Underwood missed his senior year at Michigan State because of an ankle injury, but was impressive enough as a junior that the Vikings drafted him in the first round last summer.

The ensuing months were bizarre. Underwood left training camp saying he was torn between football and ministry work. The Vikings cut him and he wound up signing for far less money from the Dolphins. He was hurt on about

his seventh play in his first preseason game, then a month later tried killing himself.

Miami cut him in December and in March he signed an even cheaper contract with Dallas. By then, Underwood had been diagnosed with bipolar disorder, a mental illness that triggers irrational behavior, and was controlling it with medication.

Underwood picked the Cowboys because last season they rescued the career of Alonzo Spellman after he went through a similar ordeal. Dallas was interested in Underwood because he's only 23 and is only a year removed from being a first-rounder.

Underwood has a long way to go before becoming a vital member of the Cowboys' defensive line. His emotional problems aside, Underwood has enough to deal with just com-

ing back from such a long layoff. Add in the jump from college to the pros and it's understandable why coaches are trying to downplay their expectations.

Dallas' plan, though, is to use Underwood a lot in the preseason to find out how much he can offer and how far he still has to go.

"I feel good, but I know I've got a lot of work to do," he said. "I started a little slow, then in the middle I got a feel for it. Toward the end I went down a little bit — but not too much."

Underwood's first tackle stopped Jerome Bettis after a 4-yard gain in the first quarter. His sack came in the second quarter when he knocked down Kent Graham for a loss of six yards. Underwood also made a tackle on a punt return.

■ Win comes at a price for Astros

MIAMI (AP) — The last-place Houston Astros have suffered another huge loss.

The Astros lost second baseman Craig Biggio for the season when he tore the anterior cruciate and medial collateral ligaments in his left knee, in a collision with Florida's Preston Wilson on Tuesday night.

"Winning isn't much fun on a night like this," Astros manager Larry Dierker said after a 4-3 victory. "You always like to win, but this really takes away from it."

Houston won its second straight game against the Marlins behind Scott Elarton's strong performance.

Biggio was injured when Wilson slid into second in an attempt to break up a double play in the seventh.

Biggio landed hard on his left leg and left under his own power. However, X-rays revealed torn ligaments.

Houston general manager

Gerry Hunsicker said Biggio will have an MRI on Friday in Houston, but he wasn't sure when surgery would take place.

"It's been that kind of year for us," said Hunsicker, whose club is in last place after winning the division three straight years.

"It seems like there has been one thing after another. It has been a year to forget, and this just adds to it," Hunsicker said.

The Astros won behind another strong game from Elarton (11-4), who won for the seventh time in eight starts.

Elarton worked 8 1-3 innings, allowing six hits and three runs while striking out seven.

"Even though I didn't have my best stuff, I was able to bear down on each hitter and each situation and throw the right pitch," Elarton said. "That's the one thing I've been able to do lately."

Elarton was locked in a

pitchers' duel with Chuck Smith, who lost a no-hit bid — and the game — in the sixth inning.

Smith retired the first 13 batters and 16 of the first 18 before running into trouble in the sixth.

Raul Chavez foiled Smith's no-hitter with a sharp single. With two outs, Smith (1-4) walked Julio Lugo, and Biggio reached on a throwing error by catcher Ramon Castro.

Biggio hit a tapper in front of the box, and Castro's throw hit Biggio in the back on his way to first. That loaded the bases and kept the inning alive, and Smith then walked Jeff Bagwell and Lance Berkman for the first two runs.

Moises Alou then delivered what proved to be the game-winning hit, a single to left that drove home Biggio and Bagwell, putting the Astros ahead 4-0.

'Crossing Over': It's a show with a difference

LOS ANGELES — "Crossing Over With John Edward" is a talk show with a difference: The studio audience is live but the guests are goss. Outta here and into the hereafter.

In other words, dead. Host Edward is on hand to act as go-between. He's a grown-up version of the boy in "The Sixth Sense," if the melancholy kid eventually figured out how to make a career out of making eye contact with the dearly departed.

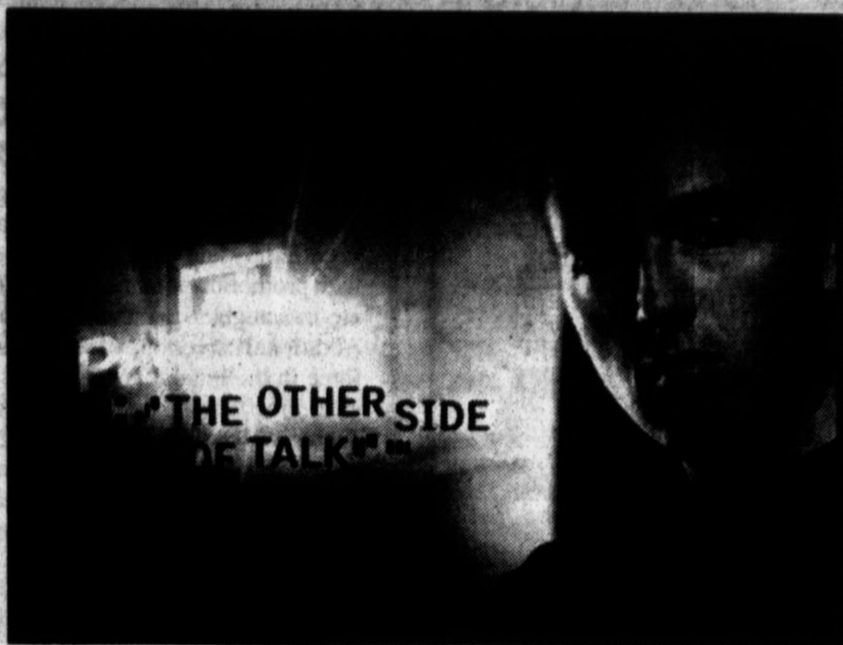
"What you are about to see is real" we are told at the beginning of the new Sci Fi cable channel series, showing at 10 p.m. CDT Sunday through Thursday (with repeats at 3 p.m. CDT the following day).

"Crossing Over" may be better than real. With other talk shows, there have been instances in which guests start out alive and end up otherwise; at least here the division is clear.

For that reason alone we'll take Edward over Jerry Springer or Jenny Jones. And there's a reassuring feeling about post-mortem family relations as envisioned by the self-described psychic medium.

There are no recriminations for cheating out on the casket, no admonishments for blowing the inheritance. There also aren't any towering insights about the meaning of it all, at least none that Edward is willing to share.

Instead, he crisply leads New York audience members and celebrities including Linda

Dano and Carmen Electra through heavenly exchanges with late relatives or friends. (No fireside chats so far; as Edward puts it, he has yet to field a complaint about the heat.)

The host tells one woman that a man, apparently her late husband, is reaching out to her. She is unnerved when Edward relates details of a trip she took to Niagara Falls with the couple's daughter.

"Did you find a feather there? And did you tell your daughter that was her daddy?" Edward asks the woman, who nods, weeping.

He can also be blunt.

"Is there a husband or brother for you that's passed?" he asks another woman in the same episode. "Yes," she replies.

"This has got to be an ex-husband we're talking about, because he's removing himself from you," Edward says. "He wants to be known as the ex; that's how he's coming across."

Edward compares his visions of the dead to daydreams in which information is delivered by sight, sound and feeling.

Is it real? Fake? Who are we to say? (As one thoughtful friend advised, there may be peril in cynicism; antagonize

Edward and you could find yourself without a very long-distance carrier someday.)

Edward definitely seems to be a man of his time. He is not the gaudy brand of psychic played by Whoopi Goldberg in "Ghost." This medium eschews both light tricks and flamboyant wardrobe. Think Armani sleek, not turban geek.

The Long Island, N.Y., na-

tive also knows how to disarm with humor. Describing an image of a dog, Edward asks a woman if her family has a new pet. Yes, she says, a goldfish.

"Nah, not doing fish," he responds.

Edward, also an author ("One Last Time") and frequent radio guest, is unconcerned about those who might dismiss him as a charlatan.

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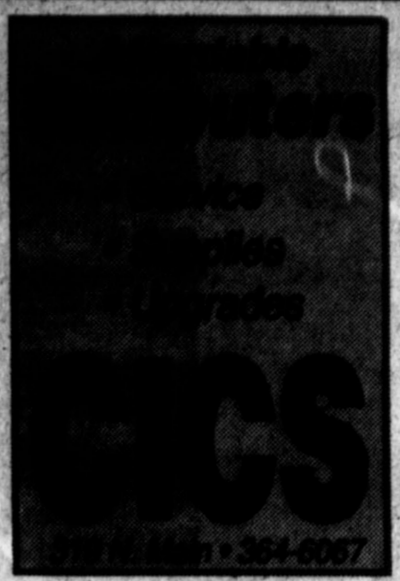

very reassuring to people."
Since he was named to the GOP ticket last week, Democrats have focused on his conservative voting record as a Wyoming congressman in the late 1970s and '80s.
Cheney, 59, has spent the past week addressing some of those votes: against bans on "cop-killer" bullets and plastic handguns, and an embargo against South Africa aimed at freeing Nelson Mandela and ending apartheid.
"I might find a couple (votes) I would do differently" today, he said.
Former President Ford, who plucked Cheney from relative obscurity in 1975 by making him history's youngest White House chief of staff at age 34, defended his former aide's congressional record.
"I served 25 years in the House so I know that a member of the House, to get re-elected, has to reflect the views of his constituents," Ford said this week on CNN. "And, Wyoming is a conservative state. ... Dick Cheney was following the mandates of his own constituents and that is a very legitimate role for a member of the House to play."
Cheney offers no apologies for his virtually 100 percent voting record against abortion rights — a party principle that Republican delegates here reaffirmed this week and an issue that solidifies support from the party's conservative base.
After stinking out of Yale in 1962, Cheney returned to Wyoming and got his bachelor's and master's degrees while picking up four Vietnam War-era student deferments, which Democrats also have criticized.
He renewed a relationship with high school sweetheart Lynne Anne Vincent and they married in 1964. Four years later, politics lured them to Washington, where Cheney became a protégé of Illinois Republican Rep. Donald Rumsfeld, a close friend of Ford.

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Bush arrives in Philly, to claim prize



PHILADELPHIA (AP) — George W. Bush promised to stick to a positive campaign message as he joined the convention celebration Wednesday, but his father served notice that Bush can "dish it out if he has to."
Bush's first stop after an airport welcome was a Hispanic rally where the GOP candidate alternated between English and Spanish as he told a crowd of more than 1,000, "There's a better day for America, there's a better day for all. ... Together we can make sure every child can read in America."
A day earlier, Bush had admitting to being "riled up" by President Clinton's increasingly personal attacks. But the GOP nominee pledged Wednesday to keep his campaign "hopeful and optimistic."
Bush's father, the former president, told a breakfast for farm groups that his son is disciplined enough to "stick to

the message" despite goading from the opposition.
"He can dish it out if he has to, but he's going to stay on his message," the elder Bush said of his son. "You don't believe me? Ask Ann Richards." Richards is the Democrat whom George W. Bush ousted from the Texas governor's office, and who is remembered for deriding the elder Bush at the Democratic convention in 1988 for being born with a silver foot in his mouth.
"Well, she may have been right about that, but anyway, they cheered like hell and then George came along two years later and showed her what she could do with that silver foot," the former president said. "He did it by staying on the message."
On Tuesday, George W. said it was "amazing" that Clinton "would spend time trying to be a political pundit. He's so desperate to have his legacy intact

by getting Al Gore elected, he'll say anything, just like Gore will."
Clinton has belittled the Texas governor's campaign, saying one reason he was in the running was because his "daddy was president." The elder Bush, who was defeated by Clinton in 1992, responded by threatening to go public with his true feelings about the president "as a human being and as a person." If Clinton doesn't back off, he said, the family might unleash former first lady Barbara Bush.
Indeed, the candidate's mother jumped in — in comments on ABC's "Good Morning America," taped Tuesday — speaking of "the disappointment" about disrespect brought upon the White House since Clinton defeated her husband in 1992.
Asked if Gore would not restore such respect, she said, "It would be very difficult, I think, because of some of the things he's done."

Texas delegates pray during gay congressman's speech

PHILADELPHIA (AP) — Texas delegates who opposed the speech delivered by a gay Arizona congressman wanted to send George W. Bush a message about his convention speaker choice.
At least a dozen delegates, who are seated directly in front of the podium at the convention hall, removed their straw cowboy hats Tuesday night, bowed their heads and prayed while U.S. Rep. Jim Kolbe spoke.
Earlier some delegates had talked of a more visible protest, possibly walking out, said Sharon Emmert, an alternate delegate from

Tyler. But they decided on the more subtle approach.
"We don't want to embarrass the governor," said Pat Carlson of Grapevine.
Bush was to arrive in Philadelphia Wednesday morning and accept the party's nomination for president Thursday night. He has portrayed himself as a "compassionate conservative."
But he has opposed adoptions by homosexuals and stated his disagreement with same-sex marriages.
Texas' 124-member delegation is dominated by religious conservatives.

Evolution candidates backed

TOPEKA, Kan.— Sending a strong signal in the debate over how to teach about the origin of life, voters chose three candidates for the Kansas Board of Education who promised to back science standards with a greater emphasis on evolution.

Two incumbents and another candidate who support the state's current standards that play down the importance of evolution were defeated in Republican primaries Tuesday.

The lone incumbent survivor, Steve Abrams, helped write the standards.

The elections pave the way for a potential reversal of the board's 6-4 vote last year that put the standards in place. In the Nov. 7 election, the four primary winners will face Democrats who also want to scrap the guidelines.

Rain helps firefighters

RIDGECREST, Calif. — A bit of moisture helped firefighters make headway against a persistent Sierra Nevada wildfire, but scores of lightning strikes elsewhere ignited more blazes across already scorched Western states.

Forty-two large fires were burning close to 660,000 acres in Arizona, California, Idaho, Montana, Nevada, New Mexico, Texas, Utah and Wyoming, according to the Na-

tional Interagency Fire Center in Boise, Idaho.

In California's Sequoia National Forest, firefighters aided by rain increased the containment level of a 67,000-acre blaze — one of the region's most destructive — from 15 percent to 40 percent.

Levy quits position

JERUSALEM — Israeli Foreign Minister David Levy submitted his resignation Wednesday over the government's peace policies, serving another blow to Prime Minister Ehud Barak's unraveling coalition.

As Levy made the announcement, parliament began debate on legislation to call early elections. It was expected to pass an initial reading Wednesday but needs three more readings in sessions that won't take place until the Knesset reconvenes.

reer and technology, and the gifted and talented programs, but this does not make up for what is lost from the declining student population. The school district must make up the difference with funds from local taxes.

This only partly explains why the administrators contend the tax hike is necessary.

McDowell said the 2000-2001 school year is the benchmark year to set the "District Enrichment & Facilities Tax Rate" for the next legislative biennium (Fiscal 2002 and 2003). Waiting until 2001-2002 school year to raise the tax rate would only increase local revenues, but would not increase the state contribution until FY 2004.

Although the board isn't confronting the unknown prob-

lems of last year, they are having to deal with issues surrounding competitive salaries and maintenance on existing facilities and assets.

A major expense for the district is the rising salary costs, an expense which Abernethy expects little help from the coming legislative session.

"Amarillo schools are already starting beginning teachers at \$30,000. Canyon is nearing that point. If we are to maintain our quality, then we must be able to guarantee competitive wages," Abernethy said.

Because of the decreasing number of students, McDowell said HISD would have to set a tax rate of \$1.4433 just to generate the same amount of revenue as last year, but this would not cover the cost of employee pay raises.

The district absorbed at least 45 positions including 22 teaching positions, six nurses or counselors and at least 10 paraprofessional positions. Even with these staff reductions, the salary step increases will reach approximately \$350,000.

Abernethy and McDowell emphasized the proposed budget is based on a \$1.50 tax rate and would provide an additional \$3,920,000 to be added to the general fund.

The proposed budget calls for \$22,383,634 expenditure and \$22,386,554 revenue.

A public hearing on the proposed tax rate will be held at 6 p.m. Aug. 22 prior to the regular board meeting.

In other business, the board authorized Abernethy to advertise for sealed bids on the old Central School property.

vided by hospitals.

"This change in the method of payment for outpatient services will have the most profound effect on Medicare beneficiaries and hospitals since ... passage of the Tax Equity and Fiscal Responsibility Act of 1982," Taylor said.

Although the Medicare program has changed the way it pays for most hospital outpatient services, Taylor said physical therapy, laboratory, ambulance and the Hereford Health Clinic services will not be affected.

Medicare patients who receive outpatient services have generally been responsible for a fee that the Medicare program doesn't cover. The "coinsurance" fee has historically been set at 20 percent of allowable charges.

Under the changes that went into effect Tuesday, the coinsurance may increase or decrease, depending upon the service received.

"Under Medicare's new system, hospitals do not determine how much they will be paid for providing a service — the government does," Taylor said. "For Medicare beneficiaries with supplemental insurance (Medigap) coverage, out-of-pocket expenses will remain unchanged under the new system. However, increases may occur in supplemental insurance coverage premiums."

He urged Medicare beneficiaries with supplemental coverage to check with their insurance agents or carriers about possible changes.

Of the 451 services affected by the changes, six will keep the patients' co-insurance amounts at the traditional 20 percent level; 265 will require the patients to pay co-insurance amounts above 20 percent and ranging to 96.83 percent of allowable charges; 47 will see co-insurance of less than 20 percent; and payment rates have not been deter-

mined for 133 services.

Taylor said the financial effect of the changes on the hospital are not clear.

"We have no projection yet. The auditing firm (Durbin & Associates of Lubbock) has done some preliminary work, but at this point, it's anybody's guess," he said.

"Patients are going to see a greater expense if they don't have supplemental insurance. I'm concerned patients will see it as a change implemented by the hospital, but that's not the case if it was handed down," Taylor said, adding the hospital will continue to provide the services the community needs.
