He also observed incidents in a polling place that resulted in a poll watcher being asked to leave the premises. Another poll watcher did not present proper documention and was not permitted in the polls, Richardson reported. A third poll watcher carried out the assignment without incident.

Richardson reported proper procedure was followed when a voter presented a receipt for registration but the name was not found on the poll list of eligible voters. The person was allowed to vote under the challenged voter provision.

On a checklist of 29 items the inspector observed at the three voting boxes he visited, Richardson was critical of procedure on only two

State law requires that two officials help voters needing assistance, but only one performed the function, the inspector observed.

In the same category, Richardson observed that an oath of assistance was not administered by the election

Ruland said he was pleased with the inspector's report. The two items about voter assistance, he said, were overlooking the requirements because they were very busy or were short-

The vote inspector spent election day at Voting Precincts One, at Aikman School; Two, at the county courthouse, and Three, at the Community Center.

The Secretary of State was requested by a group of Deaf Smith County citizens to send an inspector for the election.

One reason given by the group was related to the possibility that voters would be turned away if they had no registration certificates. No such incident was observed by the

inspector. The request for an inspector also cited the possibility of computer error with no listing of the voter on the poll

The only such incident reported on March 8 was addressed by the inspector who noted the challenged

Ruland expressed satisfaction that the conduct of the election was given a high mark by the vote inspector.

# Hereford, Deaf Smith County receive April tax rebate funds

State Comptroller John Sharp has mailed out April sales tax rebate checks to 979 Texas cities and 111 counties -- including Hereford and Deaf Smith County, which both received checks in excess of the

The amount reflects an increase of 3.4 percent over the \$43,764.08 received in April 1993.

For the year to date, the city ha received \$227,702.74, which is 5.61 percent over the \$215,600.62 paid for the same period last year.

Deaf Smith County, which collects a one-half percent sales tax on county sales, received a check for \$24,180.88 for April, which is up 5.87 percent over the \$22,839.00 last year.

For the year to date, the county has received checks totaling \$117,002.19, up 4.33 percent from last year's \$112,137.37.

Overall, the state rebate checks reflected a total of \$101.9 million, which sharp said is "an impressive 14 percent increase above last year's \$89.3 million," while the \$11.4 million in rebates to Texas counties is "an equally encouraging 18.1 percent increase over the \$9.6 million payments in April 1993."

This month's sales tax rebates include local sales taxes collected in years' probation and fined \$1,500 in

February and reported by businesses filing monthly tax returns in March.

Other area towns and counties received their rebate checks as well. Those include the following towns and counties, with figures reflecting the April check, percent difference from April 1993 and the amount of

the April 1993 check.

### Probation revocation nets man term in state prison

with terms of probation Monday received two seven-year sentences in the state prison system. Judge David Wesley Gulley of

222nd District Court revoked the probated sentences of Jose Lara Flores, 21, who previously was convicted of aggravated sexual assault of a child and taking a controlled substance in jail.

On a no contest plea, another defendant was assessed a 40-year term in prison. Jose DeLaLuz Esparza, 27, also was given a twoyear sentence on a guilty plea of bail jumping and failure to appear.

A third defendant, Alford Ray Guess, 41, was sentenced to 10 years in prison after pleading guilty to a drug charge.

Flores was sentenced to eight

A defendant who failed to comply September 1990 on the sexual assault conviction. He was given an eightyear sentence on the drug charge in May 1991. On completion of a term in the alternative incarceration program, he was placed on shock probation. Both probated sentences were revoked by Judge Gulley.

The defendant will serve the two sentences concurrently in the Texas Department of Criminal Justice institutional division.

Esparza previously was convicted on a charge of aggravated sexual assault of a child and sentenced to 40 years in prison. The sentences imposed Monday will be served concurrently with the earlier conviction.

Guess, charged with possession of a controlled substance, cocaine, was denied probation by Judge Gulley.

# Tan Nguyen places second in regional spelling contest



Tan Nguyen was runnerup in the Regional Spelling Bee Saturday in Canyon, going 52 rounds before being edged by three-time champion David Urban of Amarillo.

Nguyen slipped an erroneous "o" into the spelling of "fremitus," which is defined as the sensation felt by the hand when placed on a part of the body that vibrates during speech. Urban, who placed second in the national bee last year, correctly spelled the word, then spelled "ovularian," meaning resembling an egg, to take the title.

Tan, a 12-year-old sixth grader at West Central School, and Urban both said they realized Nguven's TAN NGUYEN mistake after he spelled the word. A field of 34 competitors quickly dwindled to eight students by round 10 during the bee at Mary Moody Northern Recital Hall at West Texas A&M University.

Both spellers breathed a sigh of relief as the two-hour contest came

to an end. Tan bowed his head slightly when he missed, while Urban congratulated him on "doing a real good job." Tan, son of Day and Sang Nguyen, operators of Hunan Chinese Restaurant, won a 32-volume set of the New Encyclopaedia Britannica, awarded by

the publishing company, and a watch donated by the Amarillo Globe-News. Urban, the regional champ, earned two airline tickets to Washington, D.C., where he will compete again in the national spelling bee in June.

He also received a plaque, a dictionary, a \$50 savings bond and a watch. Tanner Whatley of Canyon finished third in the contest. Other finalists included: 4. Sarah Boone of Elida, N.M.; 5. Michelle Ehrlich of Perryton; 6. Jacque Fowler of Hooker, OK.; 7. Gwen McEntire of San Jon, N.M.;

and 8. Bertha Juarez of Plainview. NASA astronaut Dr. Jan Davis gave all spellers a few words of encouragement during the luncheon preceding the bee. Davis told contestants they were already champions and advised them to try again next year if they didn't win.

Davis said she knew firsthand now persistence pays off. She began working for NASA in 1979 and tried unsuccessfuly to become an astronaut in 1984. She continued her education and training and became a mission specialist in 1987, and has participated in two shuttle missions since then.

Tan's older brother, Bao, also claimed runnerup honors in the 1992 regional bee. He also was edged by Urban, who now has won for three straight years.

The spelling bee is sponsored by the Amarillo Globe-News and West Texas A&M University. Speedy Nieman is director of the Deaf Smith County Bee, sponsored locally by The Hereford Brand.

### World/Nation

WASHINGTON - Bosnia's Serbs face the threat of U.S.-led air attacks in five other Muslim enclaves as the Clinton administration prepares to extend its NATO role in the military defense of Gorazde's embattled civilians to other "safe areas" in Bosnia.

SARAJEVO, Bosnia-Herzegovina - Bosnian Serbs intensified their pounding of the Muslim enclave of Gorazde after NATO's second air strike in as many days, but the shelling stopped shortly after the U.N. commander in Bosnia threatened to send NATO jets in again.

KIGALI, Rwanda - U.N. efforts to broker a cease-fire between the rebels and the army in failed again in Rwanda, as grisly reports of vicious massacres and rampant lawlessness continue to pour out of the Central

African country. SAN FRANCISCO - Scientists have developed a vaccine that they say dramatically reduces the recurrence of the deadliest form of skin cancer. The approach may one day be used against other forms of cancer.

WASHINGTON - The Clintons' underpayment of their 1980 taxes, which is costing them \$14,615 in back taxes and interest, is the latest installment in the confused account of Hillary Rodham Clinton's adventures

in commodities trading. WASHINGTON - Benjamin Chavis and his bosses at the NAACP are embroiled in a tug of war over whether the nation's foremost civil rights group will go right or left on the road to rejuvenation.

### State

AUSTIN - Democratic Senate hopefuls Jim Mattox and Richard Fisher were racing the clock to talk to voters before today's runoff election. A poll by The Dallas Morning News and Houston Chronicle published over the weekend showed Mattox with 48 percent and Fisher at 46 percent. The survey had a +argin of error of 4 percentage points.

WASHINGTON - The State Department's refusal to allow the exhibition of an F-16 fighter at a major Latin American air show is "shortsighted," says Texas Gov. Ann Richards.

# Sharp says meat plant guaranteed to waste tax dollars

million meat processing plant proposed in Amarillo for prison inmates is "guaranteed to waste taxpayers' money," according to a comptroller's report.

That prediction came last week in State Comptroller John Sharp's report on the Texas Department of Criminal Justice. The audit included a look at the state's 30 prison agricultural operations on more than 140,000

Prison system spokesman Charles Brown said officials have not set a start-up date for the meat plant because state auditors want to study it again.

Farms and food-processing facilities at prisons aren't as efficient as TDCJ has depicted, according to the Sharp report.

"In fiscal 1992, the agency's agriculture operations actually lost \$7 million, although they reported to the (prison) board a net profit of \$5.6

million," he said. But prison board member Jerry Hodge of Amarillo says auditors failed to take into consideration the savings gained when inmates grow their own food.

Auditors found inefficient accounting methods, Sharp said. And overhead costs for salaries, farm shops, the cannery and a packing plant were not counted against the agricultural operations, the report said.

Moreover, Sharp's audit said the prison system sells its produce back to itself at prices higher than supermarket costs. Hamburger bought from the agriculture division for \$1.10 per pound, for instance, could have been purchased from commerdomestic violence was reported in the cial suppliers for 77 cents per pound, according to the report.

"If food service had purchased all --Officers issued 16 traffic the ground beef supplied by the packing plant in fiscal 1993 (2.2 million pounds) at the open-market rate ... it would have saved \$730,-000," the report said. "Clearly, the cows are not the only ones getting trimmed.'

> But Hodge, who oversees the ricultural operations for the prison board, said major meat suppliers refuse to sell directly to TDCJ, because the state is slow to pay its

Hodge called the report's conclusions "off base." Prison farm operations are efficient, he said, and they teach job skills and a work ethic to inmates.

"Even if they're just chopping weeds out in the pasture, that is a lot better than if they're sitting around doing nothing," Hodge said.

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


Watts' second inning double plated Chris Vallejo, who had walked and stolen second base. Hereford led 5-0.



AUGUSTA, Ga. (AP) - In the American version of golfing hell, there will be no sandwiches, no second-place money and every approach into every green will demand a bump-and-run shot.

Which explains in part why, for the sixth time in the last seven years and ninth since 1980, a European won the Masters.

dations. According to the audit, the beds could be added by moving minimum security prisoners to older prison units, moving maximum security prisoners to newer, more secure units, and by double-bunking

some cells and all trusty camps. Sharp recommended some 200 operational policy changes that he said would save about \$175 million in the next five years. Those changes would cut waste and correct management flaws found in the present system, he said.

Judge Rins Ren

But state District Judge Scott McCown, who acted as a liaison in the audit for Gov. Ann Richards, said the report was "full of inaccuracies, mischaracterizations and oversimplification of complex processes."

In a letter to Richards, McCown said that increasing the prison capacity as Sharp recommends would violate court agreements.

Sharp responded: "He (Mc-Cown) is not the state's attorney general. If he wants to be the state's lawyer, he should run for the office."

Lt. Gov. Bob Bullock and House Speaker Pete Laney said Sharp's recommendations might lead to the reopening of the Ruiz case, a lengthy federal case in which a prisoner claimed his constitutional rights were being violated by the overcrowded conditions in the Texas prison system.

Richards said the audit was helpful, but stressed the importance of the state maintaining control of its prisons.

George W. Bush, Richards' GOP opponent in the November general election, said the audit highlights the governor's ineffectiveness.

Governor's Tax Return

Gov. Richards' 1993 federal income tax return shows she owes \$27,639 in taxes on income never knew were there. Hereford of \$110,645. Her income was brand, 313 N. Lee. 24757 composed of \$94,086 in salary. \$4,520 in interest on savings and \$12,039 from mutual funds, her campaign said last week.

Meanwhile, Lt. Gov. Bullock has appointed an interim committee to explore state government's role in paying for public school facilities. Bullock said the committee is needed because of Judge McCown's

order requiring the Legislature to address inequities in funding. Bullock picked Sen. Teel Bivins, R-Amarillo, to chair the committee. Other members are Sens. John Montford, D-Lubbock, and Bill

Ratliff, R-Mount Pleasant. The committee will issue a final report by December. The Legislature convenes in January.
