## HRMC

■ Hospital CEO brings hands-on approach to job

James Taylor hasn't run into any real surprises since taking over Hereford Regional Medical Center's chief executive officer.

That's not only because Taylor is a veteran hospital administrator, it's because he had served as HRMC's interim finance director for several months before being picked to run the hospital.

That's not to say there haven't been some unexpected items, Taylor said.

"We are still working through the accounting records. ... We've had some little surprises as we work through it, but these are areas that we haven't had an opportunity to delve into before," he said.

Just before coming to HRMC, Taylor had been working as an independent consultant with Healthcare Financial Management. Before that, he was a senior vice president and chief financial officer for Northwest Texas Healthcare System in Amarillo. He had been with the hospital since 1974, serving in a variety of management and administrative positions.

"One of the concerns (about accepting the HRMC position) that I had initially was: Is there strong support for the hospital in the community?" Taylor said. "I realize we've got to regain some business back, but I have found very support among



## When it won't run, who do you call?

All through the neighborhood, the early morning quiet is shattered as one lawnmower after another roars into life, determined to devour the thick weeds and tall grass.

As if on cue, one mower coughs and chokes and sputters, leaving the lawn only half manicured.

The operator checks the gas, the oil, the spark plug. Everything seems fine. One, two, three quick pulls and still nothing. The mower just sits there, silently laughing at the operator.

There's no hope for it. All the TLC in the world won't make that little motor run again. It's time for some expert maintenance and repair.

Not just anyone can make these temperamental little motors roar back into life. This job takes a special person — someone willing to lay down on the job and take advantage of a good shade tree when needed.

This job requires the talents of Harvey Manion, a local retired farm worker and welder.

"I got into this back in the early '80s, when I realized my Social Se-

curity wasn't going to provide much of a living. I looked around and thought I might like doing this," he said. "It seemed like something an older person could do to keep themselves busy."

After Manion took a course on small engine repair and bought some books, he says he kept himself busy just tinkering with mowers that friends and acquaintances would bring him, but for a while it was just a sideline.

"One day the man I was working for said, 'Harvey, we're going to work cattle today, I know you don't like

working cattle, so you might need to go find something else to do.' That's just what I did. I came home and opened a lawn mower repair business. It's the best thing I've ever done," Manion said.

At 73, Manion said he doesn't know if he could retire. He likes the idea of remaining active and busy.

"Really it only keeps me busy six to seven months out of the year, April through September. The rest of the time I gotta hunt something to do. I can't just sit still," he said.

Like most things, lawn mowers have changed through the years.

Most now have electronic parts and extras that make them a difficult job for the shade-tree mechanic. New mowers use electronic starters rather than the old-fashion points and condensers.

"Some are sorry little setups," he said.

Manion enjoys the work he does, sometimes even convincing his wife to come out in the yard and help a little bit.

His work ranges from simply replacing a spark plug or doing an oil

Traveling down the highway, motorists might get the idea the vehicle they are passing is somewhat out of time or out of place.

The refurbished, century-old buggy, being pulled by an aging sorrel quarter horse and an eye-catching Appaloosa in the prime of his life, makes one wonder just where the buggy driver is going and why.

The where is easy. Terry Lee, from the Hondo Valley region of New Mexico is headed for Washington, D.C. The why is not so easy.

Lee is on a journey which has been more than 20 years in the making. His purpose is to raise the awareness of biogenetic living.

"I'm not anti-meat, or anti-beef. I'm just anti-chemical and hormones that are used in meat and other processed foods as well," Lee said.

"I'm not a purist, by any means, I still have my junk food habits, like most everyone else, but I try to get people to see the harm they are doing to themselves and society by allowing the government to put in all the additives. We don't need them," Lee said.

He calls himself "just a teacher," but his information is for anyone willing to stop and talk for just a few minutes.

"If they see me on the road, they

have to catch me when we stop, 'cause I don't stop until I'm through for the day. I have places to go and things to do. Anyone who wants to come out and help with the horses or just talk is welcome," he said.

And, talk he does. He talks about his younger years when he hitchhiked, looking for that special niche. He talks about his horses, his dogs, his traveling companions. Most of all, he talks about his journey.

"The journey itself is the exciting part. The people I connect with and the things they learn and that I learn are just part of that journey," he said.

On his journey, Lee tries to purchase locally grown produce as part of his belief that the more natural a

food is, the better it is for a person. In the next few days, the buggy will begin pulling a trailer containing a living garden.

"We've got the seeds and the tub. When we get to Amarillo, we will get the rails and then get our garden started," Lee said.

Lee travels with two other men. One drives a motor home, towing a horse trailer; the other drives a pickup and acts as a point man.

"The point man goes on in front of me to let communities know I'm coming to town and why," Lee said.

Lee has a second purpose in mind besides making people aware of natural foods. He carries with him three wreaths which he hopes to place at

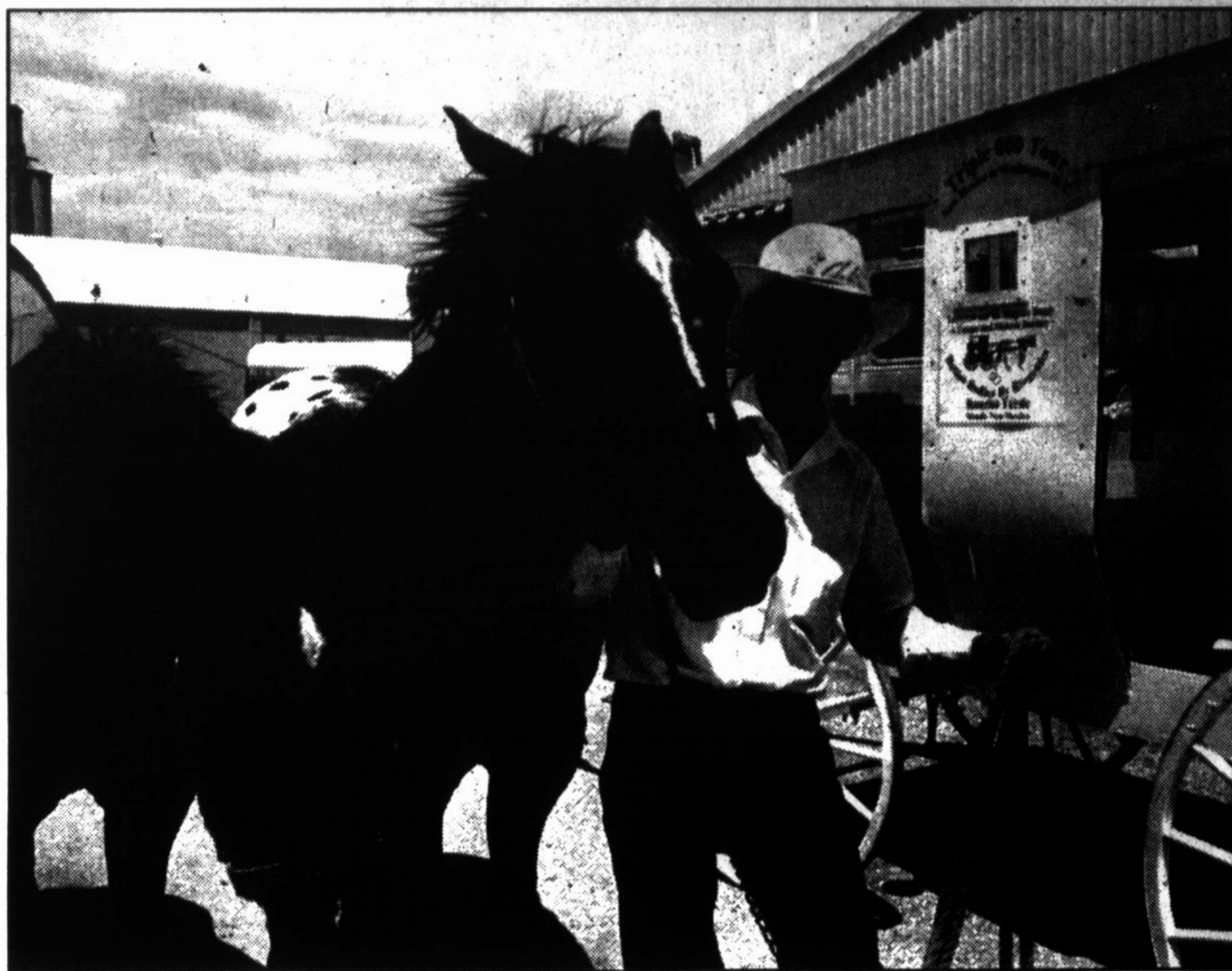

change to completely overhauling riding lawn mower motors.

"The hardest job is when someone tells me they don't want to put much into a repair. Sometimes their idea of not much differs from mine," he said. "The easiest thing is probably putting in a new spark plug."

Manion makes his job as easy as

possible with a work bench that puts push-style mowers at just the right height and a pulley and winch to lift the larger mowers off the ground.

Catching him lying in the cool grass, under a suspended mower, makes his clients understand the term "shade tree mechanic."

Usually he can get simple repairs completed in a day or so, but depending on the availability of parts it may take a few days to a week.

"They're getting harder to work on, but I guess I'll have enough to keep me busy, till I'm ready to quit," Manion said. "But then, I don't know if I could just sit still."

Cigarette makers zapped  
with \$145 billion judgment

MIAMI — Hit with the biggest jury verdict in U.S. history, the nation's top five cigarette makers remained hopeful they won't have to pay the full amount of the staggering \$145 billion penalty to sick Florida smokers.

"There's probably not a country in the world that can withstand a verdict this size," said Philip Morris Inc. attorney Dan Webb, whose company on Friday was ordered to pay \$73.96 billion.

even more important, he said.

"There are certain situations when a patient cannot be transported, so it's essential that this hospital be available. We've had one person who needed immediate surgery. Within 20 minutes, that patient was on the operating table and probably wouldn't have lived to transport. We would not be prepared for these emergencies."

"With the agriculture as it is around here, I think it's imperative that we have emergency medical services available to handle agricultural accidents. I think the community is blessed to have Level IV trauma center here. It's good enough that it's become a training center for other Level IVs in the area," Taylor said.

One of the things that attracted him to the position was the opportunity to be a hands-on administrator, something that he said is needed at HRMC.

"There also seems to be something here that's not tangible, but the employees seem to crave stability in the administration. I sense that strong desire among the employees. I know many of them took a wait-and-see attitude toward me, seeing me as just another face. But this staff wants a return to normalcy in hospital operations," Taylor said.

"Also, there are just a lot of good people here and I'm identifying with them. There are so many really good, really nice people and it heightened my desire to get back in and help this hospital."

"I don't have a magic wand, all I can do is facilitate things and help the staff lead this hospital in a better direction," he said.

As part of his hands-on management style, Taylor, who flipped burgers Thursday at a cookout for the hospital employees, said he regularly meets over coffee with staff members. The staffers are picked randomly and have free rein to air any of their concerns, suggestions or gripes.

"They can tell me whatever they want. They can bring up suggestions to make things work better — anything. It's for us to get to know each other better," he said.

Acknowledging the instability that has plagued the hospital administration in recent years has made the employees wary, Taylor said, "I don't expect them to take me at face value. I can't just walk in and say, 'Trust me.' Trust is something that you have to earn."

"Fairness, honesty and integrity — that's what I think the employees and medical staff should expect of me. ... When employees come to this hospital, they should expect and deserve a place where it's comfortable to work. By that I mean a work environment that makes them want to come to work," he said.

Since taking over earlier this year as CEO, Taylor said the hospital administration has to reduce operating expenses, while increasing volume. Also, he said the hospital needs to regain the confidence of the community, because the taxpayers of Deaf Smith County "own this hospital."

"There is considerable outmigration to Amarillo, Lubbock and even Plainview. But in reality, we provide a fairly broad range of services and I want the people to come back and use their local doctors and the hospital they own," he said.

"There is a core staff that is very, very dedicated to this hospital, have been for many years. We have a good facility here, even if many parts of it are old ... in the scope of providing services, it is very good," he said. "We have a good hospital and almost everyone I have met recognizes how critical this hospital is to the community."

# Gore grilled; Bush challenged

SAGINAW, Mich. (AP) — The gymnasium was stifling, the questions even hotter as Al Gore went looking for good campaign-commercial footage and found, instead, the specter of Green Party candidate Ralph Nader.

At a town-hall meeting in this battleground state, some 200 skeptically undecided voters also forced the vice president to defend his advocacy of the death penalty, his push for free trade with China, even his wife's decades-old drive for parental warning labels on music with obscene lyrics.

"You all are certainly asking easy questions this evening," he joked halfway through the four-hour forum. A film crew had outfitted the un-air-conditioned school gymnasium with studio lights to collect fodder for future campaign or Democratic National Committee TV commercials.

There was praise for the Democratic presidential candidate, sure, but some voter comment wasn't flattering.

One woman sternly admonished: "It has felt to me like the Clinton-Gore administra-

tion gave an awful lot of ground back to the right and I would like to know why I should vote for you and not Ralph Nader. And don't tell me, 'Because I'll split the vote. That's not an answer.'

The question — plus another woman's counsel, "You ought to be acknowledging more that there are more than two candidates in this race." — come at a time when polls suggest that Nader is a growing threat to Gore's support from the left, including in Michigan.

Gil Couillard, a special education teacher and union member, said he could never vote for Bush but was flirting with a vote for Nader.

some of this compassion" he talks about in his presidential campaign.

Doubts about Gary Graham's guilt "gave you a way to show some compassion and love in a way that had not been shown before," the Rev. Joseph Garlic told the presumptive GOP presidential nominee as the two men sat at close quarters during a discussion at a community center in an inner-city neighborhood.

"You and I must differ on the death penalty," Bush quickly replied. Fairly enforced, he said, it saves lives.

ELIZABETH, N.J. (AP) — A religious leader forcefully challenged George W. Bush on Friday for allowing an execution in Texas, saying the governor "missed an opportunity to show

"My job is to uphold the laws of my state and that's what I did."

"This isn't a political decision for me," Bush added.

But Garlic persisted, "While you may say to me it was not a political decision, it was not a moral decision."

The exchange was polite but pointed as the community leader pressed Bush to explain why he had permitted the execution of a black man whose conviction largely hinged on the testimony of one witness.

When Garlic said he was not satisfied with Bush's initial answer, the Texas governor said, "Well, I'm sorry."

Garlic said the issue wasn't whether he favored the death penalty or not but whether "beyond a reasonable doubt."

Bush's reply was similar to his first one: "We just disagree on that case."

Graham's fate also figured in a later Bush appearance at a New York Conservative Party lunch in New York, where he campaigned with Senate candidate Rick Lazio, who is running against first lady Hillary Rodham Clinton.

## Marnell signs pact with Taco John

ROSWELL, N.M. — Melodie Marnell, a Burger King franchisee since 1976, recently signed a five-year agreement with Taco John's to open eight restaurants.

Seven of the eight stores will be located in areas in which Marnell already operates a Burger King. Locations

include two in Roswell, with single units in Clovis, Hobbs, Carlsbad, Artesia and Alamogordo, N.M., and another in Hereford.

A 24-year veteran in the fast-food business, Marnell operates a business that includes 14 units, employs 450 and stretches across southeastern New Mexico into the Texas

Panhandle.

Marnell directed the growth of the business from seven Burger King outlets in 1993 to 14 by 1998. Because the locations are overlapping in several metropolitan areas, Marnell looked at expansion into another sector. Believing the quick-serve Mexican food market was underserved, Marnell began looking at several franchises, deciding on Taco John's after learning other Burger King franchisees had purchased the Mexican food stores.

Since beginning as a small taco stand in Cheyenne, Wyo.,

in 1968, Taco John's now has 439 restaurants in 25 states. It is now the nation's second-largest Mexican fast-food chain, and has created a niche for itself by filling a vacuum between generic Mexican fast food and the emerging "fresh-Mex" category.

Marnell hopes to open her first Taco John's in Roswell by Nov. 1.

### Many people in U.S. lack engagement

In the midst of prosperity, many Americans complain that their lives are lacking. Around us we see fraying institutions, fractured families and broken dreams.

Writers and philosophers have jumped forward to explain how money is not the root of all happiness. Recent efforts include: “Bowling Alone” by Robert Putnam, the theory of time deepening described by professors John P. Robinson and Geoffrey Godbey in their book “Time for Life” and various pleas to return to direct engagement in politics and government has fallen steadily and sharply over the last generation,” Putnam wrote, “despite the fact that average levels of education — the best individual-level predictor of political participation — have risen sharply throughout this period. Every year over the last decade or two, millions more have withdrawn from the affairs of their communities.”

It seems Americans would prefer to watch television, rent a movie, or chat on the Internet rather than get out attendance, participation in the PTA, as well as the polls.

If your excuse is that you don't have enough time, the professors Robinson and Godbey disagree.

As explained in a recent Associated Press account, what makes you think you're in a time famine (although studies show we actually have more spare time on our hands) is something called “time-deepening.” As applied to leisure time, it means you're trying to get more “yield” out of every minute, which means you're speeding up your participation by combining several activities. Do it too much, and it makes leisure feel like work.

Robinson and Godbey explain that “time-deepening” assumes that, under pressure of expanded interest and compulsion, people are capable of higher rates of “doing,” such as visiting a national park without getting out of the car.

Or people may abandon a leisure activity that takes “too much” time and substitute one that takes less time. Or they may engage in more than one activity at the same time, say reading the newspaper and eating while watching TV.

I think this is where I enter a plea of guilty as charged.

Holman used his experience as a missionary to parts of the former Soviet bloc to shed light on our society.

After living in places where even the police are crooks, Holman concluded it was not natural resources and democratic institutions that made the United States great. “It's the foundation of values,” he declared.

Holman is concerned that we as individuals and a society are slipping away from the great “Thou Shalt Not's.” He does not think we can assume that if this trend goes uncorrected that we will continue “to live in a blessed place.”

I found validity in all three of the perspectives. You might want to take a quick, four-question quiz.

- 1.) Are you unhappy with your life?
- 2.) Are you hiding at home, avoiding involvement with church or civic groups and actively working to improve your

Ike's warning has been ignored. In 1961 when he cautioned the nation about the danger of the military-industrial complex, President Eisenhower could not have imagined how prophetic he was in his final address to the nation.

A prime example of the military-industrial complex in action is the latest failure of the anti-missile defense system. Backers of the “Star Wars” system insist it will place an umbrella over the nation to protect it from missile strikes by rogue nations, such as North Korea, China or Iraq.

How has “Star Wars” fared? Abysmally, if it's supposed to knock down incoming ballistic missiles. Marvelously, if it's designed to transfer billions of dollars from the national treasury into the bank accounts of defense contractors.

Even its staunchest proponents admit the anti-missile system would be only 90 percent effective if it were deployed. That means that one of every 10 ballistic missiles launched against this country would strike its target.

Imagine 10 missiles targeting 10 of the largest cities in the United States. Nine of the largest are knocked out, but the one aimed for the Dallas-Fort Worth Metroplex gets through. Would it comfort those millions of Texans if in their last moments before being vaporized to know that the anti-missile defense system is 90 percent effective?

Even though “Star Wars” is a boondoggle, a welfare program for defense contractors, the Pentagon and its lackeys in Congress will forge ahead, ignoring one failure after another.

Why?  
One good reason is the defense contractors

who will be reaping in the tax dollars for this hair-brained scheme have subcontracted the project around the country, with more than 300 of the 435 congressional districts affected. How many of those 300-plus members of Congress will say no to jobs for constituents? Not enough to kill this turkey, I'll bet.

What are some of the other examples of the military-industrial complex that Ike warned us about?

The B-1 bomber, a plane with no real mission and which probably couldn't carry out its mission if it actually had one.

President Carter tried to cancel the B-1, but too many dollars made their way into the pockets of too many members of Congress, and the B-1 survived — to be resurrected almost as soon as Ronald Reagan moved into the White House.

The B-1 was supposed to replace the B-52, which has been around for four decades; however, when the United States needed bombers during the Persian Gulf War, where was the B-1? Sitting on the tarmac at Dyess Air Force Base in Abilene, Texas. The entire B-1 fleet had been grounded.

Billions of dollars have been turned over to the defense contractors to produce this flying lemon. If the B-1 had been an Edsel, it would have disappeared, but because it is a military aircraft, the great minds in Congress keep throwing money at it.

Billions of dollars have been wasted because military strategy and needs have become secondary to economic strategy and political aspirations. Military spending, be it construction projects or weapons, means jobs, so members of Congress who pontificate about budget cuts suddenly fall silent when it comes to the bases or military contractors operating in their districts.

Military spending should be based on the strategic needs of the military, not on the unemployment rate within a congressional district.

The danger of the military-industrial complex had apparently been on Eisenhower's mind throughout his presidency. On April 16, 1953, less than four months after he took office, Ike said:

*“Every gun that is made, every warship launched, every rocket fired, signifies in the final sense a theft from those who hunger and are not fed, those who are cold and are not clothed. This world in arms is not spending money alone. It is spending the sweat of its laborers, the genius of its scientists, the houses of its children.”*

### Texas school districts to get cut of surplus

Two hundred and forty-five of Texas' 1,046 public school districts will get a cut of a \$120 million budget surplus, the chairman of the House Education Committee said last week.

State Rep. Paul Sadler, D-Henderson, said those 245 districts will share in the surplus because they approved homestead exemptions larger than the minimum \$15,000 per home required by the state.

The larger the homestead exemption, the less a homeowner pays in school property taxes.

Debbie Graves Ratcliffe, communications director for the Texas Education Agency, said there are two reasons for the surplus:

- Student enrollment did not increase as much last year and property values went up.
- When the Legislature passed the state budget last year, it was anticipated that enrollment would grow by 70,000 students, but it only grew by 50,000.

State Education Commissioner Jim Nelson said, however, “There is no certainty that a surplus of appropriations will exist in future years and even less likelihood in the first year of a state fiscal biennium.”

#### Future budget surpluses seem unlikely

After major media outlets reported that the Senate Finance Committee anticipated a \$750 budget deficit, Lt. Gov. Rick Perry said there actually is enough money in state coffers to meet current obligations.

“Over and above those obligations, I don't expect much of a budget surplus. We are going to be fiscally conservative,” Perry said last week.

Higher-than-expected tax revenues from this year will be used to cover about \$610 million in cost overruns in the current 2000-2001 budget.

Perry, who presides over the state Senate, and other lawmakers say they don't expect to have much extra money left to roll into the 2002-2003 budget, which begins Sept. 1, 2001.

Looking forward to the next legislative session, when they will adopt the 2002-2003 budget, lawmakers said the state will be able to pay for school, social service and criminal justice programs even as Texas' population grows, but it will not be able to expand those programs.

In the 1999 legislative session, lawmakers raised pay for classroom teachers and approved a health insurance program for uninsured children. Such increases won't be possible in the near future, they speculated.

#### Pipeline to pay \$171,570 fine

Koch Pipeline Industries has agreed to pay a \$171,570 fine to the state for environmental violations at crude oil storage facilities it operates across Texas.

The company self-reported most of the violations listed in the agreed order. The Texas Natural Resource Conservation Commission and the company documented various air quality violations at facilities operated by Koch.

Violations included failure to install seals and vapor recovery equipment on tanks; failure to notify the TNRCC of shutdowns, construction startups or malfunctions of stations; failure to pay air emissions fees; and failure to conduct proper record-keeping and inspections at many facilities.

To date, the company has either replaced or

### Who pays for union workers' benefits?

Unionized workers again have found a reason to go on strike. This time, it is the television commercial actors who are opposed to non-union actors being hired to do a series of commercials. Of course, the bottom line is striking actors want a better pay rate than what they are now getting.

I've heard a lot about unions, but the thing that most frequently catches my attention is the workers walking out because either the pay, the benefits or both are not what they feel is deserved.

That's incredibly interesting. Non-union workers seem to understand that a regular paycheck is better than no paycheck.

More importantly, the number of striking workers show the difference between people who actually want to get paid fairly for their work and those who have way overvalued themselves.

Remember the airline pilots strike, the

baseball players strike, the UPS drivers strike, and a couple of years ago, another actors strike.

Airline pilots frequently claim incomes of more than \$100,000 with benefits that may well double the figure.

Sports figures sign contracts calling for millions of dollars each year, never mind the contracts for commercials and other appearances.

And actors, even the commercial actors rake in more than the average Joe, working a 40-hour week.

As far as the UPS workers go, every one I've ever met makes far more money than many individuals with college degrees.

So my question is this: What do unionized workers really have to gripe about?

I certainly agree that any person should get paid fairly for the job they do.

But apparently today's society places a higher value on an individual who can throw a ball than on the farmers who produce the world's food and fiber.

Imagine the cost of a loaf of bread if the nation's wheat farmers all signed contracts calling for \$3.5 million for their harvested crops. At least the bread serves a very real purpose. All that is left from the purchase of sporting or amusement event is a turn ticket stub. That brings a lot of satisfaction.

Personally I think it's time for some of these high-priced, unionized workers to take a

repaired the tanks in full compliance with state law, taken tanks out of service, or sold tanks to buyers with full notification about necessary corrective action, the TNRCC said.

### Other highlights

- Lower-sulfur and thus cleaner-burning gasoline will be supplied to the Austin area in May 2001. The Texas Natural Resources Conservation Commission said using low-sulfur fuel would be about like taking 60,000 vehicles off the streets. The downside: consumers will be paying higher prices at the pump for less-polluting gasoline.

- Perry expressed regret over a June 28 traffic stop in Dripping Springs, in which he informed a Department of Public Safety trooper,

"If you would just let us go, we'd be better." The DPS released a videotape of the incident to the media. Perry's aide, who was driving, received a warning for speeding.

- Hundreds of Texas college students illegally obtained state agency long-distance access codes, shared them via e-mail and word of mouth and ran up thousands of dollars in long-distance bills, the Department of Public Safety said last week. The Capitol Police, a division of DPS, is consulting with prosecutors.

- Public schools would have to get parental consent for a student to skip class for extracurricular and other activities under a rule recommended last week by the State Board of Education.

# Bush's NAACP trip more signal than a vote search

George W. Bush's trip to the NAACP convention in Baltimore this week was more a signal to swing voters that he's open to all types of Americans than it was a direct bid for black voter support.

"It was a cornerstone of the effort to show he's not a fire-breathing right-winger," said Bruce Buchanan, a political scientist at the University of Texas and a veteran Bush-watcher. "His long term mission is to reposition the Republican Party."

Bush's NAACP trip on Monday, the upcoming Republican convention filled with images of diversity, and campaign stops in between focused on the needs of the poor are all part of that effort to appeal to swing voters.

Republicans in presidential elections routinely get the support of about 10 percent of black voters or slightly more. If Bush pushes that number a bit higher among blacks, the most loyal voter base for

Democrat Al Gore, it still won't be nearly as important to his campaign as the message he sent this week to the broad middle of the American electorate.

"It's really a message to moderate, white, middle-of-the-road Americans who might be afraid that electing a Republican conservative from the South would turn the clock back on civil rights," said political scientist Lance DeHaven Smith of Florida State University.

Bush told those present at the NAACP meeting in Baltimore that he wanted to say "here's where we have fallen short and here's where we will improve."

Gore made his own stop Wednesday and quickly reminded the NAACP of his longstanding commitment.

He was introduced by an NAACP board member as someone who, "unlike a lot of people, has not just discovered the NAACP, has not just discovered the problems of poor people, African-American people and people of color."

Bush's campaign staff said his efforts to reach out for Hispanic and black votes are real, but acknowledged the symbolism of the trip as well.

"Governor Bush is sincere in his efforts to attract minority voters and these events also symbolize the governor's desire to be a unifying force on the national scene," said spokesman Ray Sullivan. "He's serious about ending partisan strife in Washington and bringing people together."

The Bush trip was dismissed as "transparent political posturing" by Doug Hattaway, a Gore spokesman. "He said nothing of substance and has done nothing of substance to appeal to African-American voters."

The trip provided an important image for the campaign that counters the image of Bush at a conservative Christian college in South Carolina during that state's primary campaign, said Kathleen Hall Jamieson, dean of the Annenberg School of Communication at the University of Pennsylvania.

# Parents get tax holiday

Classes within the Hereford Independent School District, as well as across most of Texas, will resume Aug. 14, so parents will be hitting the stores to outfit their youngsters for the year.

The Texas families will have a chance to stretch their clothing dollars Aug. 4-6 during the state's 2<sup>nd</sup> Annual Sales Tax Holiday, according to the Texas Comptroller's Office.

"On the first Friday, Saturday and Sunday of August, no state or local sales tax will be charged on most clothing and footwear priced under \$100," Comptroller Carole Keeton Rylander said.

The time of the sales tax holiday is intended to help parents outfit their children for the new school year.

The tax break is not limited to children's school clothes. Highlights include:

- Most clothing and footwear priced under \$100 is exempt from sales taxes. Consumers may purchase as many tax-exempt items as they wish;
- Clothing and footwear

used primarily for athletics or protective gear, such as golf cleats or football pads, are not tax-exempt. However, athletic clothes that are commonly used as street wear, such as tennis shoes, baseball caps and jogging suits, are eligible for the exemption; and

• Excluded from the tax holiday are accessories, such as jewelry and watches, and items that are carried rather than worn, including handbags, briefcases, wallets and backpacks.

"This year ... customers who put clothes and shoes costing less than \$100 on layaway during the sales tax holiday weekend will be permitted to take those items out of layaway at a later date without paying sales tax," Rylander said. "This will allow hard-working families with limited budgets to pay for their purchases a little bit at a time and still receive the tax break."

In 1999, Texans spent more than \$400 million on tax-exempt clothing and shoes during the three-day sales tax holiday, saving more than \$32 million in sales taxes.

# YOUR EYES

## Beware of July Festivities

Fireworks Eye Safety Month is June 1 to July 4. Every year, about 7,000 people - many of them children - are injured by fireworks. About 2,000 of them have eye injuries. Almost a third of these injuries result in permanent eye damage and a fourth of them end in permanent vision loss or blindness.

Almost one in twenty victims loses all useful vision or requires removal of an injured eye. Three quarters of all fireworks-related eye injuries are to boys between the ages of 13 and 15.

If your child eye is injured, get help immediately, regardless of the extent of the damage. Do not rub the eye, rinse it or apply ointment or other medication. Don't give your child aspirin or ibuprofen, since they can thin the blood and increase bleeding. Shield the eye from pressure. Tape or secure the bottom of a foam cup or similar type of shield against the bones surrounding the eye, and immediately contact your eye care professional or go to the hospital emergency room.

This year's rollback tax rate is the highest tax rate the taxing unit can set before taxpayers can start tax rollback procedures. ## Astros hold off Detroit

■ Pitcher Holt carries team in 8-2 win

DETROIT (AP) — Whatever turnaround the Detroit Tigers have enjoyed lately hasn't included Hideo Nomo.

Nomo gave up eight runs, six earned, in just 4 2-3 innings Friday night as the Tigers fell 8-2 to the Houston Astros.

Nomo (3-8) has won just one of his last six decisions, and his ERA rose to 5.00. He gave up home runs to Lance Berkman and Mitch Meluskey, and the 22 he's allowed for the season is the second-highest total in the American League.

"He's given up a lot," said Tigers manager Phil Garner.

"To me, Houston knows his pitches. He must be he must be tipping his pitches," Garner said. "They've had some pretty good numbers off him in the past."

Nomo agreed only to a point.

"They picked up some (pitches), but location is still the most important thing," Nomo said through an interpreter. "My location was not very great today."

The loss was the Tigers' third in their last five games, but over the longer haul they've won 13 of their last 22. They jumped out to a 2-0 lead in the first inning against

Astros right-hander Chris Holt, but Nomo couldn't hold it.

Holt (4-10) won for the first time since June 3, and Craig Biggio singled, doubled and tripled to pace Houston's 13-hit attack off five Tigers pitchers.

Richard Hidalgo homered in a 3-for-5 night with two RBIs and three runs scored.

Biggio was 3-for-5, scored once and drove in a run. Needing a homer for the cycle in the eighth, he grounded out sharply to third.

"Well, I was just trying to hit the ball hard," Biggio said. "I enjoy hitting in this park. It's built for my top of game, a contact game. There's a lot of space between the outfielders."

Holt, who has a 1.84 ERA in five appearances against AL teams the last two years, also likes Comerica Park's spacious dimensions. Especially compared to cozy Enron Field.

"I like this ballpark. It's very different from Enron," Holt said. "This is more like the Astrodome. You can groove some balls when you're behind in the count and not expect them to go out of the park."

Holt gave up two runs in the first inning but settled down to work six scoreless innings before the Tigers chased him with two in the eighth.

## Texas falls to Diamondbacks, 6-1

■ Arizona's Reynoso limits Rangers to only six hits

PHOENIX (AP) — Armando Reynoso's roller-coaster season reached a high point against the Texas Rangers.

Reynoso pitched a six-hitter for his first complete game in three years, and Steve Finley homered, tripled and drove in four runs as the Arizona Diamondbacks beat the Texas Rangers 6-1 Friday night.

"I just want to finish the game," said Reynoso, who had gone 60 starts since throwing a complete-game shutout against Florida on July 5, 1997. "That wasn't easy."

Reynoso (6-6) struck out five, walked none and at one stretch retired eight straight hitters in pitching his seventh career complete game.

Such a performance would have been hard to predict in April when Reynoso allowed seven runs to the San Francisco Giants and left without retiring a batter. As recently as June 18, Reynoso surrendered nine runs on 10 hits and lasted just two innings against the Colorado Rockies.

"He's someone you like to see good things happen for," Arizona manager Buck Showalter said. "Through thick and thin, he just keeps on chugging."

Reynoso dominated the top of the Rangers' order as the first four hitters were a combined 0-for-16 with four strikeouts.

"That's one of the best hitting teams in baseball," said Showalter, who was booed when we went to the mound to talk to Reynoso with two outs in the ninth. "That puts an extra star on it."

Jay Bell added an RBI double for the Diamondbacks, who snapped a three-game losing

streak against the Rangers.

Royce Clayton hit his 14th homer for Texas.

"Everything was working," Reynoso said. "With the exception of the slider to Clayton, everything was in good spots."

Kenny Rogers (9-7) scattered four hits in the first four innings before running into trouble with two outs in the fifth.

Bell beat out a slow chopper to third for a single and advanced to third on Luis Gonzalez's single.

Rogers walked Matt Williams to load the bases before Finley tripled into the right-field corner, clearing the bases for a 4-1 Diamondbacks lead.

Arizona added an unearned run in the sixth on an error by catcher Ivan Rodriguez.

Damian Miller singled, and one out later, Reynoso laid down a sacrifice bunt. Rodriguez tried for the force

at second but threw high, forcing Clayton to leap high to catch the ball as Miller slid in safely. Reynoso beat Clayton's throw to first and Bell followed with a double, scoring Miller to make it 5-1.

Finley added a solo homer in the seventh, his team-leading 26th, to make it 6-1.

Clayton's third-inning homer just over the left-field fence gave the Rangers a 1-0 lead. The Diamond-

backs tied the game in the bottom of the inning when Tony Womack tripled and Bell hit an RBI grounder.

Rogers allowed six runs — five earned — and 10 hits for his second straight loss. He walked two and matched a season high with seven strikeouts.

"I thought Kenny threw a whole lot better than six runs," Texas manager Johnny Oates said.

The boos showered on Showalter were short-lived. He received a rousing ovation

when he jogged back to the dugout with Reynoso still in the game. Womack's eighth triple tied him with Colorado's Tom Goodwin for the NL lead. Clayton's 14 homers match a career high set last season. Arizona is 18-6 when wearing its traditional white uniform. Rogers recorded his first five outs by strikeout. Rodriguez's error was his second of the season.

# "Migratory Bird Rule" governing isolated waters will be reviewed

A few years ago the Army Corps of Engineers flexed its proverbial muscles and suddenly exerted its influence in the playa lakes country by claiming jurisdiction over isolated waters on the basis of the "migratory bird rule."

Now, that jurisdiction is coming under question as the Supreme Court prepares to review the ability of the Army Corps of Engineers to claim jurisdiction over isolated waters on the basis of the migratory bird rule.

Isolated waters are those, including wetlands, that are not connected by surface waters to interstate or navigable waters. Playa lakes such as those found locally are generally regarded as falling under this heading.

A fairly loose interpretation of the rules has held that playas and other isolated waters fall under Corps of Engineers regulations as "waters of the United States" because the use of these areas by migratory birds establishes the necessary connection to interstate commerce under Corps regulations.

The Supreme Court announced in early July that it has granted a petition for review in the case of Solid Waste Agency of Northern Cook County, Illinois, versus the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers.

This case has important implications for the Section 404 wetlands permitting program that has affected playas and other isolated waters in recent years. Section 404 regulations can apply to modification, dredging, and filling operations in playas and other isolated waters.

The Supreme Court case will involve the Corps of Engineers' denial of a permit for a landfill sought by a group of 23 Illinois municipalities that organized themselves into a municipal corporation entitled the Solid Waste Agency of Northern Cook County, or SWANCC.

SWANCC found a potential site for disposal of nonhazardous solid waste, but utilizing this site would require the filling-in of 17.6 acres of ponds and small lakes (isolated waters). That's a no-no for obtaining a permit under Section 404 rules administered by the Corps of Engineers.

The Corps maintains that the "use, degradation, or destruction of intrastate lakes, streams, and wetlands could affect interstate commerce." Subsequently, the Corps of Engineers asserted jurisdiction over the Illinois site.

SWANCC argued in the lower courts, and in its petition for a review by the Supreme Court, that the migratory bird rule is unconstitutional in light of a recent Supreme Court ruling in United States versus Lopez.

The court held in the Lopez case that a federal statute based on the Commerce Clause must regulate activities that "substantially affect" interstate commerce.

SWANCC contends that filling-in the 17.6 acres would not have a substantial effect on interstate commerce.

This appeal could have major implications for the jurisdiction of the Section 404 program over isolated waters.

Adding urgency and further clouding the issue is the loss of 465 acres of the nation's wetlands every day due to draining, filling, and development. While property and jurisdictional rights may hang in the balance, continued filling and destruction of wetlands means that the future of important wildlife habitat and watersheds does too.

More than half of the nation's original wetlands have already been lost, and U.S. continues to lose more than 170,000 acres of wetlands every year. The country can ill afford this, given that wetlands are important to the recharge of aquifers, the purification of water, and more than 900 wildlife species depend on them for survival.

In the local region, playas, which are seasonal wetlands, are the single greatest contributor to recharge of the Ogallala aquifer.

This matter of applying the migratory bird rule to isolated wetlands may prove to be a complicated issue to settle.

While a realistic interpretation of regulations and an application of rules that isn't overkill is desirable, it's not in the best interests of watersheds, water conservation, and wildlife habitat when destruction of wetlands acres can be allowed to occur every time a landfill is needed in this country, either.

The National Wetlands Coalition and its members are considering filing an amicus curiae (friend of the court) brief with the Supreme Court in order to educate the Court on the impact of the Corps of Engineers regulation, and inform the Court of the views of the regulated community.

In keeping with a legal settlement with the Center for Biological Diversity, the U.S. Fish & Wildlife Service has proposed designating 1,160 river miles and 300 feet of their adjacent riparian zones as critical habitat for the endangered Arkansas River Shiner.

Included in this designation are the Canadian/South Canadian River in Texas, New Mexico, and Oklahoma, the Beaver/North Canadian River in Oklahoma, the Cimarron River in Kansas and Oklahoma, and the Arkansas River in Kansas.

F&WS says the designation will only affect activities requiring a federal permit or license, or receiving federal funding, and claims it will have no impact on private landowners taking action on their lands that do not involve federal funding or permits.

This shiner is native to the Arkansas River drainage in Texas, Oklahoma, New Mexico, Kansas, and Arkansas, and was once abundant in these systems. Allegedly, dams, water diversions, water pumping, and pollution have drastically reduced the population's size and range.

Proposed listing of the species as endangered earlier met with a wary reception in the local area. Many residents were concerned that some effort might be made to limit irrigation from the Ogallala aquifer as part of the recovery plan for the shiner.

# MLB contraction instead of expansion discussed

## Owners discuss future of baseball and economics

NEW YORK (AP) — Baseball's latest economic study committee recommended a vast increase in revenue sharing and possible franchise moves, but it did not say the sport needs a salary cap. To increase competitive balance, the committee on Friday urged baseball to impose a 50 percent luxury tax on payrolls above \$84 million; proposed sharing 40-50 percent of local revenues after ballpark expenses; and recommended that national broadcasting and licensing revenue be distributed unequally to assist low-revenue clubs, provided that they meet a minimum payroll of \$40 million.

The New York Yankees, with a payroll of about \$115 million, would have to pay a tax of about \$15 million, under the committee's proposed formula. Minnesota has the low payroll, about \$20 million. The panel recommended that players born outside the United States be included in the amateur draft, that there be an annual "competitive balance draft," and that baseball relocate franchises "when necessary to address the competitive issues facing the game." No specific cities were mentioned.

The panel said baseball should expand its domestic and international promotion of the sport.

"We do not pretend to believe these changes will be easy or universally popular," said former Senate Majority Leader George Mitchell, one of the panelists. "We do believe them to be a solution to the alarming disparities between baseball's haves and have-nots. We offer them to the commissioner, the ownership of major league baseball, the players and to the fans of the game."

Also on the panel were former Federal Reserve board chairman Paul Volcker, Yale president Richard Levin and political commentator George Will.

Baseball has not moved a team in almost 30 years.

"If an area doesn't want to support a team, that answers itself," Volcker said.

"Clubs that have little likelihood of securing a new ballpark or other revenue-enhancing activities should have the opportunity to relocate," Mitchell said.

For now, the committee opposed eliminating teams.

"We would not look to a contraction except as a last resort," Volcker said. "I don't think that the industry should exclude it."

To support its contention that baseball has a growing revenue disparity, the committee released dozens of economic charts, among them one that showed the Yankees generated the most revenue last season, \$177.9 million, while Montreal generated the least, \$48.8 million.

In 1995, the first year following the strike that wiped out the World Series, the Yankees led baseball with \$97.7 million in revenue, while Montreal had the least, \$27.6 million.

According to the report, only the Yankees (\$64.5 million), Cleveland (\$45.9 million) and Colorado (\$12.4 million) generated an operating profit from 1995-99.

San Francisco had the largest operating loss from 1995-99 (\$97 million). Toronto lost \$87.6 million and Anaheim lost \$83.3 million.

As an industry, baseball had an operating loss of \$212 million last year on revenue of \$2.787 billion.

Before the meeting, owners appeared set to put off the issue of realignment until 2002 and there was talk they might even discuss getting rid of the Montreal Expos and another team.

Colorado owner Jerry McMorris first discussed this so-called "contraction" idea a year ago.

When asked about it last weekend, commissioner Bud Selig said: "I don't want to rule anything out because there's no question that we do have to solve that problem, because (disparity) is getting worse by the day."

While contraction may not be on the agenda, two owners, speaking on the condition they not be identified, said the idea is being given increased attention because of Montreal's inability to get a new ballpark.

"It is being taken more seriously," McMorris said Thursday night. "It's just because of disparity and how do we find our way out of difficult situations."

If baseball decides to shrink, its central fund, which gets money from national broadcasting and licensing contracts, could be used to buy back the Expos along with one other team, one of the

owners said.

"If we disappear, they're going to have to come up with another club that could produce as many Guerreros and Martinezes and Walkers," Expos manager Felipe Alou said, referring to Vladimir Guerrero, Pedro Martinez and Larry Walker, who became stars in Montreal.

While there is no obvious choice for a second team, Florida, Minnesota and Oak-

land have failed to get new ballparks, and Tampa Bay has seen a big drop in attendance.

As for realignment, Texas wants out of the AL West, where it has late TV start times for intradivision road games. The Chicago White

Sox, Kansas City and Minnesota were against the plan to place six teams in the AL Central and just four in the AL East and AL West.

Arizona objected to the plan, under which it would move from the NL West.

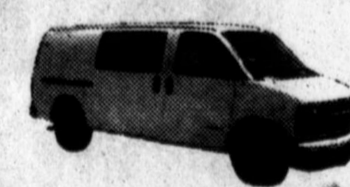

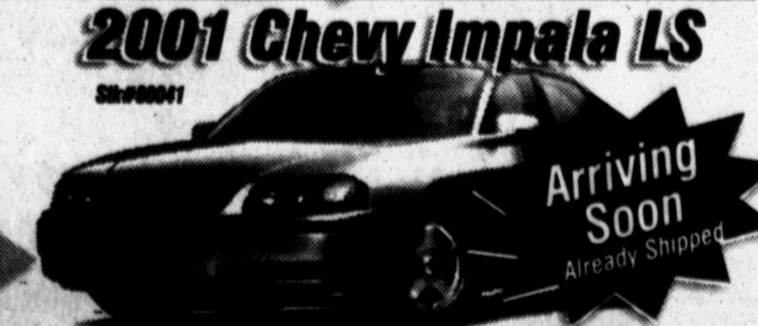

## Cowboys wait to sign picks

### Cowboys may wait until last minute

IRVING, Texas (AP) — Only a few days remain until training camp begins, but the Cowboys have yet to sign a single draft pick to a contract.

Dallas is the only team in the NFL in this predicament. But for them, it's not necessarily unusual.

Typically, the team prefers to postpone negotiations until the week before training camp because it puts pressure on the club and the agent to work out a deal quickly. Last year, for instance, first-round pick Ebenezer Ekuban signed around midnight on the day camp opened.

The Cowboys sent out their initial offers last Friday and they have received counter offers from all of the agents, according to The Dallas Morning News. Owner Jerry Jones and vice president Stephen Jones could not be reached for comment.

Some teams in the NFL, such as Jacksonville, prefer to plan further ahead by signing their draft picks soon after the April draft. Such timing allows them to set market value, and they believe it allows the players to adjust to life in the NFL faster.

Cowboys vice president Stephen Jones is handling the contracts for second-round pick Dwayne Goodrich and fourth-round pick Kareem Larrimore. The team's Jerry Jones Jr. is handling the negotiations for fifth-round pick Michael Wiley, sixth-round pick Mario Edwards and seventh-round pick Orantes Grant, according to The News.

A unique aspect of the contract negotiations is that Dallas wants the rookies to com-

mit to four hours a month of use on the Internet, whether it's submitting to interviews or being available for chat rooms.

"It's interesting, and I haven't had any other clubs try to do that, but it's no big deal," said Harry Henderson, Edwards' agent. "It doesn't

bother Mario."

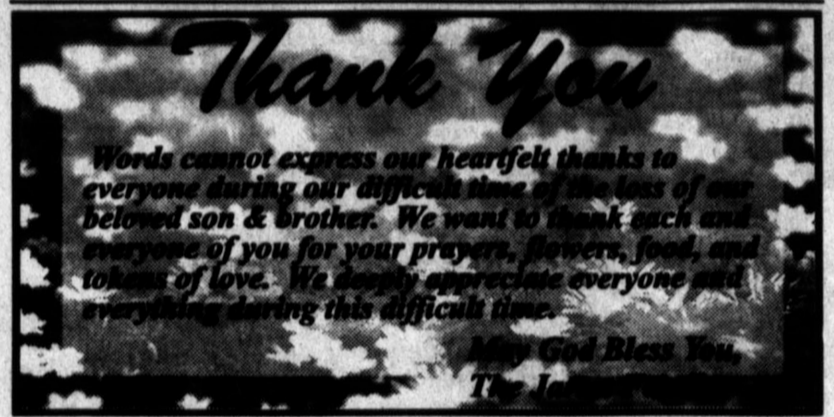

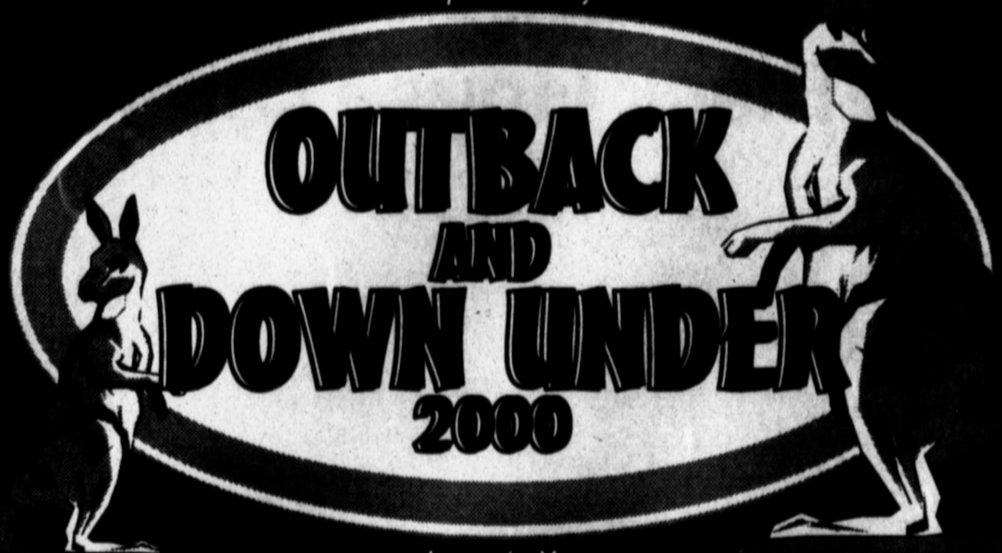

## Mature Marketing: The Baby Boomers are Growing Up (First of Two Parts)

I've watched smart marketers create fortunes by following the life cycle of the baby boomer generation. Boomers are the first generation born after World War II. Officially they span the years from 1946 to 1964. They are growing older, maturing and hitting their peak earning

years. They are a unique generation. For example, they are more likely to have dependent children living at home than families during the Great Depression. More than six million of them are already grandparents, while others are giving birth to their firstborns.

They are still strong individualists with an inward focus. They are skeptical of, and still reject most authority. They are highly educated and own more computers per capita than any other group. They love to spend, use great amounts of credit and are a marketer's dream.

Savvy companies have been reaping the profits from their sheer numbers for more than five decades. It began in the 1940s and 1950s as baby furniture, formula and toy manufacturers hit full production. In the 1950s and 1960s booming industries included rock and roll records, muscle cars -- and automobiles in general -- and illegal drugs. They overcrowded colleges and universities in the 1960s and 1970s and drove up the price of housing in the 1970s and 1980s. They began the technology boom in the 1980s and are still driving it today. Collectively no generation has had more marketing clout.

### It's a numbers game.

Consider this: The number of adults 35 years old or less declined by more than 8 million between 1990 and 2000. In the same time period, adults older than 50 increased by more than 12 million. One third of the U.S. population will be 50 or older by 2010.

If you were marketing successfully to a 50-plus audience in the 1990s, you're going to love the next 20 years. Based solely on population growth trends, if you maintain your market share, you could see sales increases of 30 to 50 percent.

On the other hand, if your products and services are aimed at young adults, a good portion of your market is aging away. You may expect flat or declining sales.

### What's a marketer to do?

If I were building a company today, I'd still bet on the boomers. Though Generation X and Y are both emerging and interesting future markets, the boomers are going to offer fantastic potential for the next two or three decades.

The question may be "what will they be buying?" I'm not certain I can answer this question with complete accuracy because of all of the variables involved, i.e. the economy, global unrest, politics, etc. However, there are some conclusions we can draw. Let's begin this process by examining some growth areas where we can already see trends emerging.

...**Medical.** Boomers are rebelling against the aging process. They'll spend big on health food, exercise, cosmetic surgery and preventive medicine. They plan to enjoy their older years.

...**Technology.** They started with black and white TV's then moved to video games. Now they're surfing the Internet while talking on their cell phones as they check their palm-top computers for e-mail.

...**Education.** Though they're a highly educated generation, many boomers are still learning. They're getting MBA's, Ph.D.'s and specialized training. This trend will continue as long as they're healthy and can learn.

...**Luxury spending.** Boomers are good spenders. As they enter their peak earning years, look for booms in high-end items like motorcycles, cars, homes and technology. Show them the value, they'll spend the money.

## Precision agriculture gains fame

TIFTON, Ga. (AP) — University of Georgia researchers are testing a technologically advanced system designed to change the long tradition of spreading water uniformly throughout a field.

"You're putting water where it is needed at the rate it is needed, and you're not wasting water," said Calvin Perry, an agricultural engineer at the university's Coastal Plain Experiment Station in Tifton. "From our viewpoint, we see water conservation as a pressing issue."

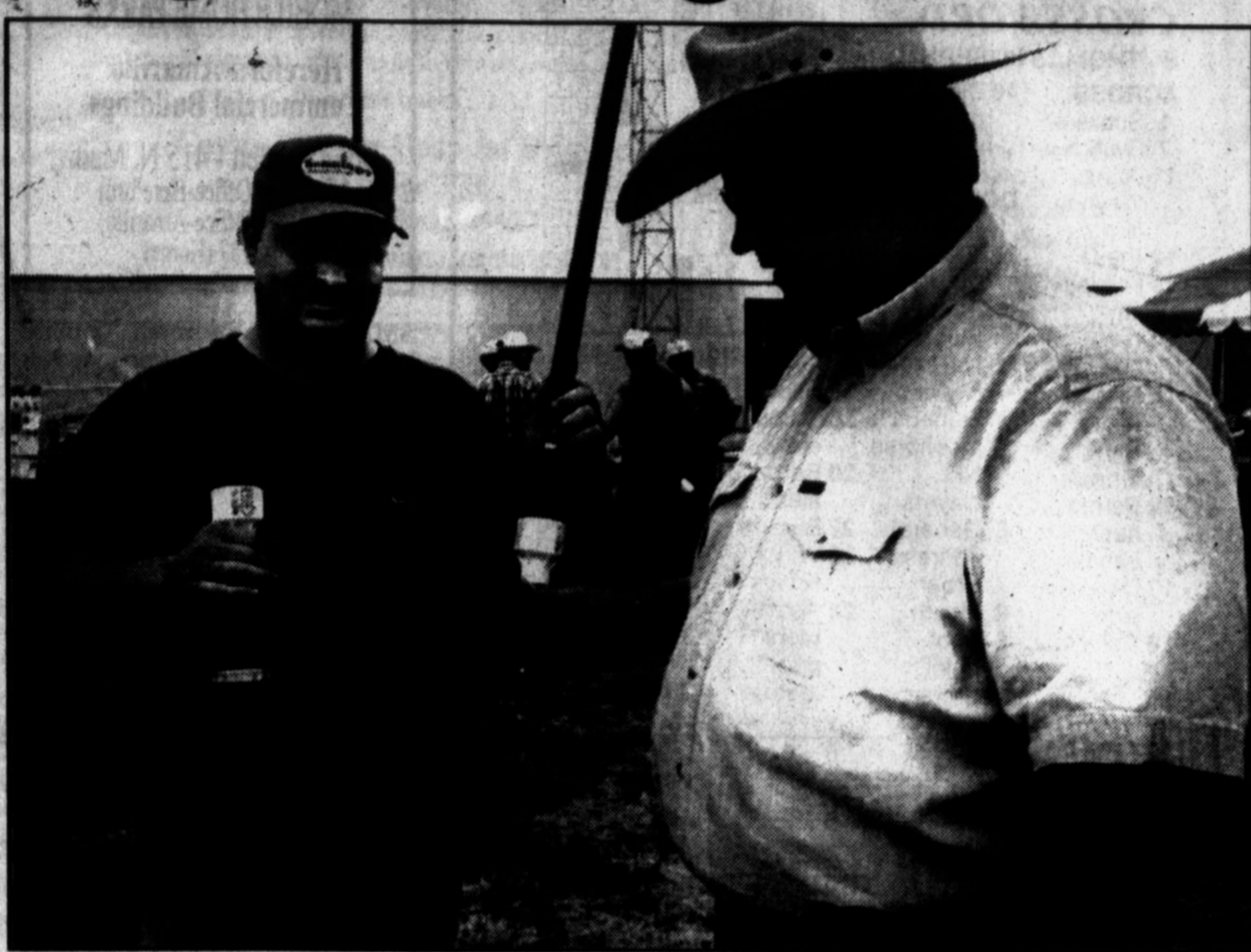
With Southeastern farmers suffering through their third summer of drought, saving water has become a major issue.

Homeowners in Lee County, north of Albany, Ga., blamed farm irrigation when their private wells ran dry last summer. Earlier this year, Georgia lawmakers approved a bill that would pay farmers not to irrigate during periods of extreme drought. A few weeks ago, Georgia State and Albany State universities teamed up to form a think tank to study dwindling water resources in the Flint River basin.

Conventional irrigation systems can spray water only at uniform rates throughout the field, or in varying amounts in pie-shaped areas. Farmers need even more precision, because some portions of their fields are naturally wetter than others due to topography and soil types.

The research model being tested on a 26-acre field near Tifton resembles the fossilized bones of a colossal dinosaur, stretching nearly the length of two football fields over lush peanut and cotton plants.

The system's backbone is a 600-foot pipe, supported by steel ribs. It rides over the field in an arc on rubber

wheels, dispensing water through nozzles that dangle from hoses.

When Perry pushes buttons on a control panel, the behemoth hisses to life as water flows into its pipes. An air compressor drones in the distance and a shower of water spews from its nozzles. Wheels inch forward.

The model would cost about \$50,000, while a normal irrigation system for a field of the same size would cost about \$15,000.

The system made its Georgia

debut last month at a precision agriculture meeting hosted by the university's National Environmentally Sound Production Agriculture Laboratory. It is one of four designed by a graduate student as a thesis project.

Precision irrigation is another tool that may be available in a few years. The test system has global positioning receivers at each end so its electronic controller always knows where it is.

The nozzles are controlled in groups of four, based on

field conditions that have to be entered manually. It can handle 80 different field conditions.

Perry hopes that future irrigation systems will be controlled by geographical information systems — software with information on the type of crop, yields, soil types, weeds and other factors.

The individual nozzles may someday be controlled by moisture sensors in the ground or external sensors that measure crop moisture.

## Farmer's economic outlook pessimistic

DES MOINES, Iowa (AP) — Only about one out of eight Iowa farmers think the overall farm economy will improve in the next five years — the most pessimistic outlook in 18 years, according to Iowa State University Extension.

Just 12 percent of Iowa farmers think the farm economy will get better, according to the annual Iowa Farm and Rural Life Poll, while 64 percent think the economy will get worse and 24 percent expect it to stay about the same.

The previous low point was in 1994, when only 15 percent of respondents expected improvement.

"I think in general it's a shroud of uncertainty and concern that farm prices and the farm economy continues to languish behind the general economy," said Paul Lasley, an Extension sociologist.

A variety of issues, most of them beyond the control of farm families, contribute to the pessimism, including low commodity prices, rising interest rates and fuel costs, Lasley said.

A statewide sample of 4,977 Iowa farmers were sent mail questionnaires in February, with 61 percent responding. The figures represent the latest in a downward trend in optimism, despite a few peaks in 1988 and 1996, Lasley said.

Some of the respondents wrote comments on the questionnaires to highlight the grim situation.

"Individual owner-operators will become extinct very shortly without prompt and favorable government action," a Story County farmer wrote.

Michael Kiernan, spokesman for Iowa Secretary of Agriculture Patty Judge, says the numbers reflect a nationwide trend that can only be remedied by a new national farm policy.

The drought and low commodity prices a year ago contribute to that, Kiernan said, including the lowest corn prices in more than a decade, the lowest soybean prices in 27 years and the lowest hog prices since the Great Depression.

"We must move beyond the annual damage control to a policy that gives farmers the tools they need to thrive, not just basically survive from disaster to disaster," Kiernan said.

John Whitaker, president of the Iowa Farmers Union, says government subsidies farmers receive in bad times are helpful, but not the way they'd prefer it to be.

"Farmers would a lot rather have money from the marketplace and not the mailbox," he said.

In addition to low commodity prices, Whitaker says farmers are dissatisfied with the Freedom to Farm Act, which he calls a failed federal policy, and the large corporate agribusinesses, which farmers perceive as controlling certain segments of the market.

## Combs addresses hay shortages, controls

### Hay hotline still available

Many areas of the Texas have recently received rains which have helped alleviate the drought conditions, but many producers are still in desperate need of hay, pasture land and water for their livestock.

Agriculture Commissioner Susan Combs, earlier this week, reminded farmers and ranchers with available pastureland and water supplies for lease or hay for sale to call the Texas Department of Agriculture's hay and Grazing Hotline at 1-877-429-1998.

"We are still receiving calls from ranchers in the Edwards

Plateau and West Texas who need grazing acreage as well as hay to feed livestock," Combs said. "Some area of the state have not seen rain since early last year and are going

into summer with forecasts calling for above-normal temperatures and below normal rainfall.

"With most of Texas still in moderate to extreme drought and 63 percent of our ranges and pastures rated in fair to very poor condition, the situation is still critical for many producers," she said.

Combs' office also announced the Texas Department of Agriculture is accepting applications through Nov. 15, for the 2000 Family Land Heritage Program.

This program recognizes farms and ranches which have been in continuous agricultural production by the same family for at least 100 years.

Two new categories — a 150-year-old and a 200-year-old honoree levels — have been added to the application.

Applications are available through county judges and

TDA. TDA has good news for area cotton growers and pasture and rangeland managers.

The Environmental Protection agency has issued an exemption allowing farmers to use Intrepid 80 WSP to help control beet army worms in cotton and Confirm 2F Agricultural Insecticide to control beet army worm, fall army worms, Southern Armyworm and yellow-striped army worms on pastures and rangeland in Texas.

Combs reminds producers and applicators that all precautions must be taken and restrictions must be closely followed.

## Texas peach growers expect bumper crop

LONGVIEW, Texas (AP) — After a warm winter threatened to choke off peach production, East Texas growers say a wet spring helped the fickle fuzzy fruit rebound from two years of drought.

Most Camp County orchards are reporting a better crop, whether it is more peaches or better looking fruit, than the last two years. But others watched Mother Nature's vagaries steal peaches off their trees. Growers in Central Texas have also reported a mild winter with a little extra springtime showers.

"Things are much better," grower Sharon Smith told the Longview News-Journal. "We just hired another (employee) yesterday because we couldn't get them picked fast enough."

She estimated that her crop was double the amount of last year.

Down the road on her brother's farm, it was a different story.

"He got wiped out by hail a few weeks ago," she said. "Just right down the road from us and he's finished. It's Mother Nature, you never know."

Last year, growers were hurt by a warm 1998 winter combined with two years of drought that stunted their orchards. Across the county, yields were down 50 to 70 percent from 1998, which was no bumper crop either.

"We haven't had a good crop since '94," said Sandra Eufurd, who runs Eufurd Orchard, south of Pittsburg. "We had about a third of a crop. It's nicer fruit and it's prettier fruit. There just isn't much of it."

Growers may also be helped if late-producing peaches can hold onto spring moisture through the summer until the September harvest.

Like most seasons, the best one is the next one, and growers hope this year's soggy spring ends an orchard strangling drought.

"We should have a good season next year," Eufurd said. "This rain should help get the trees back into a routine. Without rain, they've been under stress and don't produce."

### Showtime bungles tense tale of Atlanta child murders

It premieres Sunday on Showtime.

There's probably a good TV movie to be made about the case of the child murders that gripped Atlanta from 1979 to 1981.

*Who Killed Atlanta's Children?*, premiering Sunday, July 16, on Showtime, is certainly not that movie.

First, a recap: Nearly 30 black males, mostly children, were either reported missing or found murdered during the years in question. In 1982, following a massive manhunt, Wayne Williams was convicted of killing two adult men, after which authorities closed the other cases and declared the terrifying ordeal over.

Many of the parents of the slain and missing children, however, were critical of the investigation and alleged that law authorities were trying to cover up aspects of the racially charged situation.

The Showtime movie opens four years after Williams' conviction, as *Spin* magazine reporter Pat Laughlin (James Belushi) and his editor, Ron Larson (Gregory Hines), arrive in Atlanta to pursue the story at the behest of a local assemblywoman.

Laughlin and Larson secretly meet with an active-duty Atlanta police officer who tips them off to the incompetence and disorganization that allegedly dogged the investigation. The two reporters get an even bigger break when they receive a package from an anonymous sender filled with copies of a secret probe by the Georgia Bureau of Investigation that seems to link the murders to local members of the Ku Klux Klan.

"Wayne Williams may well be guilty of the two murders of which he was convicted," says writer-director Charles Robert Carner. "Our movie doesn't go into the details of his innocence or guilt of those two murders."

"But the secret investigation, which developed evidence that the Klan was

involved in some of these murders, is still valid. Somebody knows the truth, obviously. The question is whether justice ever will catch up with them."

Hines speculates that the GBI may have realized that linking white men

with the murders of black children would have ignited a politically volatile situation.

"That certainly would not have been a good thing in Atlanta, and for Atlanta," he says. "It could have conceivably brought Atlanta to its knees, burned it down, in those days."

Pinning the murders on Williams, a black man, was an easy out, he says.

Sadly, Carner scuttles his own film with an overwritten teleplay and hyperactive direction. While the murder of children is horrifying enough in its own right, Carner needlessly belabors the point by making both his principal characters guilt-ridden fathers who don't spend enough quality time with their children. He even gives Belushi a

nightmare scene in which he finds himself surrounded by the missing children, their eyes glowing supernaturally.

Carner's camera is seldom at rest, needlessly zipping, swirling and swooning in a style that verges on self-parody (some scenes look like outtakes

from the dippy *Naked Gun* movies). The final nail in the movie's coffin is Carner's decision to cast as his Southerners a bunch of Canadian actors whose painfully artificial Dixie drawls wouldn't pass muster in a third-rate bus-and-truck production of *Tobacco Road*.

When someone gets around to making that good movie on this subject, let's hope he learns from the many mistakes in this awful piece of work.

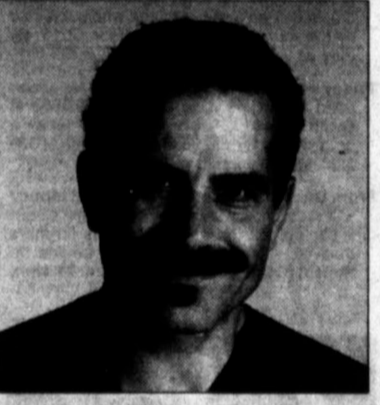
