Water plan to be reviewed

LUBBOCK — The Llano Estacado Regional Water Management Planning Group will discuss the regional water distribution network at 10 a.m. Dec. 7 at the High Plains Underground Water Conservation District

Chairman A. Wayne Wyatt of Lubbock said mayors, city managers and public utility directors within the Llano Estacado Water Planning Group will attend the session. The group recently reviewed comments from the public, as well as state and federal agencies, about the proposed plan as part of the preliminary steps toward its formal adoption.

"We contacted these entities a few months ago to see if they were interested in participating in a regional water pipeline project as out- source Conservation Commission

lined in the draft water management plan. Of the 46 entities contacted, 42 responded favorably," Wyatt said. The meeting, which is open to the public, will give the planning group an opportunity to discuss the issue before the start of the 77th Texas Legislature in January 2001

Hereford Mayor Bob Josserand is a member of the planning group.

"The Texas Water Development (TWDB) has made their preliminary assessment of the initially-prepared regional water plan document," Wyatt said. "Their review has found some minor elements missing from the draft plan that are necessary to meet statutes, rules or contract requirements of Senate Bill 1 and the TWDB. We are expecting additional input from the Texas Natural Re(TNRCC) and the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department (TPWD) prior to

The planning group also reviewed

public comments received after the water plan was unveiled Sept. 26 at a public hearing in Lubbock. "We received 19 written comments

regarding the content of the regional water plan and have responded to each one," Wyatt said.

The Llano Estacado Regional Water Management Plan must be submitted to the TWDB by Jan. 5, 2001. After the TWDB signs on to the plan, the 16 regional water plans will be incorporated into a comprehensive state plan by January 2002.

The planning group also is developing its agenda for the next plan-

■ Temple revives old art of ornamental ironwork

There was a time when ornamental ironwork was a common as tumbleweeds in the Panhandle. Iron fences and gates, with elaborate patterns, surrounded residences, ornate handrails led up steps to front porches.

However, the availability of less-expensive, pre-fabricated materials soon replaced the more expensive, hand-made ironwork. Still, some artisans continued to make the ornate

handrails and fences. One of those artisans lives and works in Hereford.

Mike Temple owns and operates Battlehammer Iron Works in the former Loerwald Brothers Welding shop at 231 W. 2nd

He moved to Hereford about three years ago and worked as a welder around the area before learning the Loerwald shop was on the market. Since Temple bought the business from Raymond Leub and George Loerwald several months ago, he's made several changes, while allowing the Hereford landmark to retain its old atmosphere.

After he rehabilitated the office and made it more secure, Temple moved in his computer, on which he does drafting and designing.

"There's so much being done back East. There're companies that are sending architects to Italy and France, London and Scotland, so they can learn the old style of metal work," he

"It's been 20 years or more, a doctor came over here from England and built a \$150,000 house in north Monroe (Louisiana). The architect sent one of his drafters over there to

Hampton House and they did an exact drawing, detailed and all, of the fence railing around it, and the gates, and brought it back and said, "That's what I want for my handrails on the front porch."

"Well, that included 6-inch thick sandstone that they had carved in England and sent over here. But there were 4,000 or 5,000 pieces in it that I had to take and beat out a piece at a time and shape. I had to put it together in a forge - I couldn't weld it," Temple said.


He got his start in ornamental iron about 30-35 years ago when some people came to his blacksmith shop and asked him to build durable handrails to help their elderly parents go up and down

After a while, he received orders from customers who wanted brass-molded handrails, which he described as a delicate process. "You can't scar it, you can't scratch it — even calluses on your fingers will scratch polished brass. It'll take at least a half-hour

Harris again poised to certify Fla. vote

The long, labored count drags on George W. Bush clinging to a lead, Al Gore's gains slowing as recounts progress, and the U.S. Supreme Court deciding to step into a White House contest unlike any other.

Amidst the tumult, the state's top elections official served notice she will again attempt to declare a winner, on Sunday evening. "This will be done publicly regardless of the outcome, which is, of course, un-known at this time," Ben McKay, the top aide to Florida Secretary of State

Katherine Harris, said on Friday.

McKay's delicate phrasing - "of in Florida's presidential election, course unknown" - didn't begin to describe the events surrounding an election unsettled 17 days after the nation voted.

The maneuvering churned on against the backdrop of Republican running mate Dick Cheney's release from a Washington hospital. The 59year-old vice presidential candidate said doctors had placed him under "no restrictions" that would interfere with him taking office.

just to take a scratch back out of it. When someone buys a brass handrail at \$60 to \$80 a foot, they sure don't want scratches.

"I've had as many as 10 men move a piece of railing on a 12-step stairway. They'd be wearing cotton gloves to carry it in and set it up, and then we'd polish it before we'd leave," he said.

Since opening his business, Temple said he has had some residents from Amarillo who have asked him to submit bids on ornamental ironwork for houses.

"I've got three bids in now for spiral staircases, and one of them is going to be a real bear because it's 5 feet in diameter," he said. "The other side of it has a brass handrail mold-

He said he believes that ironwork

is making a comeback because people are looking for something that's more durable than aluminum, even if it is more expensive.

"Back in the '80s and early '90s, there was a lot of aluminum metalwork around houses, like columns. Well, a pretty good-size kid on tricycle run into it and it's bent. Kids are always climbing, so aluminum scroll work gets flattened out, and after a few times, that thing just breaks," he said.

One of the ways, Temple is getting the word out about his work is by participating in arts and crafts shows. Last weekend, he set up at a big show in the Amarillo Civic Center. On Dec. 2, he will take some works, including baker's shelves and pastry racks, to a show in Clovis.

Both campaigns said they might not accept that as final, though, and Gore's aides underscored the point during the day.

"We believe we stand on both strong political and legal ground for fighting beyond Sunday," said Ron Klain, a Gore legal adviser, who cited an abrupt decision Wednesday by officials in Miami-Dade County to abandon their recount.

"We need a fair count of the ballots in question and that must include freedom from intimidation." said Gore's running mate, Sen. Joseph Lieberman of Connecticut.

Like everything else the Democrats did or said in Florida, that drew a Republican rebuttal.

"I don't recall Senator Lieberman

protests orchestrated with the AFL-CIO in Palm Beach County," said Bush campaign spokesman Ari Fleischer.

In a letter to the Justice Department, Democratic members of Congress argued that protests that took place earlier in the week in Miami - cited by the canvassing board when it shut down its recount -"could amount to voter intimidation of federal law."

But former Senate Majority Leader Bob Dole shot back: "Members of Congress write letters by the hundreds. Some of them are even read."

The Supreme Court's decision to accept Bush's appeal was a surprise in some quarters because elections are often seen as state business, and an earlier Bush challenge had been turned back to the state by a federal appellate court.

The court set up a breakneck schedule for next week: legal briefs are due on Tuesday.

Study: Fears of wolves are unfounded

AGASSIZ WILDLIFE REFUGE. Minn. (AP) - When two packs of gray wolves migrated back to this 61,500-acre refuge in northwestern Minnesota, neighbors got worried.

Surrounded by agricultural land including 25 ranches, some residents feared for their livestock. Federal biologists had even initially recommended that the area be kept wolf free."

But a new study suggests that worries about livestock kills may have been overblown. According to a sample of wolves, the animals spent most of their time far from humans and their feces showed deer was their overwhelming food source.

"I think people have had this idea that wolves are a wilderness creature," said Andreas Chavez, a wildlife ecology graduate student from Utah State who has studied wolf packs with U.S. Fish and Wildlife officials. "They are very adaptable and opportunistic. They are able to tolerate living near people."

Biologists spotted wolves in the Agassiz area in 1981 for the first time since the 1930s or 1940s. They'd been keeping a curious eye on the packs ever since, but weren't able to track the animals until a grant came through in 1998.

During the spring, summer and fall of 1998 and 1999, they tracked seven radio-collared adult wolves around the clock.

These are much more closely tracked than any before," said Gary Huschle, wildlife biologist at the

Much of the wolf observation was done from a hand-built brown and white blind on the refuge. Chavez spent so much time with the animals that they would respond to his

The animals spent about 70 percent of their time on the refuge and adjacent state Wildlife Management Areas and the rest of the time wandering around neighboring farms

and other areas. In the past decade, local residents have reported 11 wolf attacks on livestock, including five kills during the time of the two-year study. From 1997 to 2000, the number of packs has fluctuated between one and three, with a total of 12 to 21 wolves.

At least seven wolves died of skin disease and 10 were killed either legally or illegally by humans. Five were trapped after livestock kills, four were illegally shot and one was run over by a snowmobiler.

"The Agassiz wolves have for sure taken some of this beating, but despite this they continue to have a foothold," Chavez said.

THE HAGUE, Netherlands (AP) - A U.N. climate conference collapsed without an agreement Saturday, the conference chairman announced after a failed all-night negotiating session on how to cut the pollution that is warming the planet.

We have not reached agreement," Dutch Environment Minister Jan Pronk said. "I am very disappointed."

Pronk's announcement came after an unsuccessful marathon session behind closed doors with delegation leaders representing 180 countries. When that failed, Pronk held a last-minute meeting in his office with government ministers to try to salvage the talks — to no avail. Pronk said he was not closing the conference but would resume it at

a later stage. "We cannot go home just by stating, by confessing, that we did not reach an agreement," he said.

Local economy shows improvement

Hereford Brand Managing Editor After the past three months of sliding, Hereford's economy showed improvement this month, at least by one measurement.

The city's sales tax payment from the Texas Comptroller's Office for November was \$91,222, up 16 percent from the \$78,614 it received last year. The November allocation from the Texas Comptroller's Office also was up from the \$81,849 received in October. For the

year, Hereford has received a total of \$961,014, up 0.2 percent from the \$958,815 for the same period last year.

Deaf Smith County received a rebate of \$31,147, up 21.5 percent from the \$25,636 payment in November 1999. The county's allocation also was up from the \$27,603 it received in October. For the year, the county has received \$335,989, up 2.4 percent from \$328,201 for the same period

The Texas Comptroller's Office distributed \$281.5 million in local sales tax revenue to 1,108 Texas cities and 199 counties. November sales tax rebates are up 15 percent compared to November 1999 Year-to-date, sales tax rebates to cities and counties are up 9.8 percent from 1999.

The sales tax rebates delivered include \$261.4 million to Texas cities, up 14.9 percent compared to November 1999. Texas counties received rebates of \$20.1 million, up 16.7 percent from a year ago.

In addition to city and county sales tax rebates, \$96.2 million went to Texas' six metropolitan transit authorities and two city transit systems, and \$8.9 million was paid to 54 special purpose districts.

November sales tax rebates represent sales taxes collected in September by monthly filers and July-September by quarterly files.

By law, the state collects sales taxes for Texas cities and counties that have local sales taxes.

The state charges a 6.25 percent sales tax and local

sales taxes can be up to 2 percent abo ve that. The city of Hereford levies a 1.5 percent tax, while Deaf Smith County's sales tax is 0.5 per-



WASHINGTON (AP) - Told by doctors his heart condition would not impair his ability to serve as vice president, Dick Cheney left the hospital Friday with a prescription for a blood thinner and advice to take the weekend off before returning to a "full, normal, active life."

Cheney said he and George W. Bush talked by phone and chatted about his health, but spent a lot of time talking about Florida, "which is what we usually talk about."

Asked whether he had given any thought to asking Bush to replace him on the GOP ticket, the 59-year-old Republican vice presidential candidate replied, "No. Not yet."

The presidential election still hinges on the Florida

ballot counting and legal challenges. Appearing relaxed, Cheney called his fourth heart attack in more than 20 years "a reminder of the importance of living a healthy lifestyle and doing all of those things that a

prudent man would do. Cheney said his doctors told him "there are no restrictions" on his future activities, including potentially the vice

"I should be able to return to a full, normal, active life," he said.

Cheney walked out of George Washington University Hospital two days after checking himself in with chest pains. Hospital spokeswoman Lisa Saisselin said that ordi-narily "our patients are wheeled to the door."

Rather than emerge in a wheelchair, Cheney left the hospital walking beside his wife, Lynne, his oldest daughter, Liz, her husband and a granddaughter. From the hospital they went to their home in suburban McLean, Va.

Court's ruling was not final

The plan was set. Two hours after the Florida Supreme Court gave her permission to do so, Katherine Harris, the Florida secretary of state, intended to certify the existing vote totals that would assure George W. Bush the presidency.

Instead, in a decision that creates more confusion than it resolves, the court gave Al Gore enough toys and tools to possibly snare victory from de-

The court didn't bother to order a statewide hand recount, which at least would have assured that all ballots were counted with similar scrutiny. Nor did the court give local election officials in the three Democratic counties uniform standards by which they should count. As University of Chicago law professor Richard Epstein wrote Monday in The Wall Street Journal, such an inequitable finding would mean that "Democratic dimples may count in South Florida, but Republican dimples in the Panhandle will

Most crucial to the final outcome of the election, the court didn't prescribe how to deal with so-called dimpled or pregnant ballots, which in two counties are now being read (or misread) in the hope of divining the intentions of voters. The seven Florida justices appear to be saying that pregnant ballots can bear whatever offspring a cluster of mind readers can deliver.

That is Gore's best, perhaps last, hope. Thus far, recounts have not cut substantially into Bush's 930-vote lead. Gore's lawyers believe they can pick up hundreds of votes in the form of dimpled chads. If that is how Al Gore wins the presidency, he'll have a victory that history may well deride as enthusiastically as Jay Leno and David Letterman certainly will.

The Florida Supreme Court admirably kept its eye on the big picture. It decided unanimously that where there is room for disagreement in interpretation of state laws, the top priority must be to make the best possible effort to count all the votes. That consideration must take precedence over disputed deadlines.



Stealing votes? It's as American as apple pie

lthough the TV talking heads have worked themselves into a frenzy over the still-undecided presidential election, there is no reason for their hysteria.

Perhaps their hysteria is an effort to divert attention from the way the networks blew the whole thing on Election Night by giving Florida to Democrat Al Gore, then taking it away, then giving it to Republican George W. Bush. then taking it away

Granted, the whole exercise over Florida's 25 electoral votes is a tad embarrassing to the United States, which has been so condescending to other nations when it comes to elections. However, the republic is not about to collapse over dimples or chads. After all, the electors — the voters whose votes really count - don't meet until Dec. 18. We certainly will have a winner come out of that election.

Maybe if the talking heads would look at this thing from a historical perspective, or with a sense of humor, they'll see that this presidential election is historic in its closeness, but not unusual in its manipulation of the

In fact, the electoral process in the United States has a long tradition of corruption.

After years of seeing some close local elections swayed by the "wino vote," the Arkansas General Assembly finally passed a law prohibiting liquor sales until after the polls closed.

Louisiana politicians of both major parties have followed the practice of giving money to precinct bosses or other people who would use it to "get out the vote."

During his lifetime, Chicago Mayor Richard Daley, the father of the current Chicago mayor, raised vote theft to an absolute art form, even gaining credit for delivering the White House to John F. Kennedy in 1960.

In Texas, George Parr, the "Duke of Duval," managed to get enough of the Duval County voters into line to vote - in alphabetical order - for Lyndon B. Johnson, giving him a 67vote victory in the 1948 Democratic primary and a seat in the U.S. Senate.

However, one of the more bizarre episodes, or at least one of the more bizarre episodes



that I know about took place in Morris County, Texas, back in the late 1890s.

The county judge at the time was in a very tight race for re-election and he came up with an ingenious plan to find out if he needed to call out the graveyard voters.

The courthouse had a room-size vault just across from the county clerk's office. When the election officials closed the polls for lunch, they locked the ballot boxes inside the vault. So, the county judge had one of his loyal supporters hide in the vault.

When the ballot boxes were locked inside the vault, the judge's man came out of hiding and checked the ballots to see how the voting was going. But the county judge and his man didn't think about one thing — it might have been the size of a room, but it still was a

When the election officials got back from lunch and opened the door to the vault, they found the judge's man passed out on the floor, nearly dead from lack of air.

After the election was over, the judge, who was re-elected, asked the county commissioners for funds to install a barred window installed into the vault, saying it was necessary for "safety reasons."

There's no record in the minutes showing if the judge and county commissioners managed to keep straight faces.

No, I think the thing that has really separated the good of U.S. of A. from most of the world's other countries is the rioting in the streets. We generally reserve that behavior for NCAA basketball championships or Super Bowl victories, not presidential elections.

Whoever wins won't have traditional transition time


y this time in the normal course of events, the vital transition would be well under way - the transition that makes a politician into "Mr. President," a leader accepted even by those Americans who did not want him in the White

Winning the title does not instantly bestow the standing.

Now either George W. Bush or Al Gore will have to try to earn it in an abbreviated interregnum, against a tide of bitterness and divisiveness that is rising, not ebbing.

The transformation from campaign stridency to solemn presidency is one that normally unfolds over the 10 weeks between the division of elections and the unity symbolized by inauguration. A careful step at a time, new presidents prepare for power with overtures to Congress, with courtesy messages to world leaders and, from the wisest winners, gestures to the rivals they have just defeated.

In this tangled, bitter, overtime struggle to determine whether Gov. Bush or Vice Presi-



dent Al Gore will be the 43rd president, that transition is going to be far more difficult than the complicated but customary task of choosing a White House team, nominating a Cabinet, and drafting an agenda for the first chapter of a new administration.

For that, there are precedents, seven transitions from one president to his newly-elected successor since World War II, six of them shifting power from one party to the other. There's even a new guidebook produced by a Brookings Institution team on the appoint-

■Supreme Court's decision to review Florida unexpected

he Supreme Court's decision to intervene in the Florida presidential recount controversy was a surprise to many who have watched the court's recent campaign to tip the federalstate balance of power toward the states.

The decision to hear George W. Bush's appeal "is to open a door to Supreme Court review of state election procedures generally," University of Virginia law professor A.E. Dick Howard said Friday. "The court now holds in its hands the

power to decide this election," Howard said, adding that Al Gore's lawyers "had better throw everything they have into this one." "The odds of prevailing, in terms of both

the constitutional text and statutory text, are with Gov. Bush," added Pepperdine University law professor Douglas Kmiec. Numerous legal ex-

perts had expected the high court to deny review. But the justices said Friday they will hear arguments Dec. 1 on whether the Florida

Supreme Court violated the federal Constitution and federal law when it allowed handcounted ballots to be included in the state's vote totals after a deadline set by state law.

"They will definitively resolve the permissibility of including the hand-counted ballots," said Erwin Chemerinsky, a University of Southern California law professor.

In recent years, the justices have issued a series of 5-4 decisions that have boosted states' power versus that of the federal government.

In one of those cases last year, the court said, "When the federal government asserts authority over a state's most fundamental political processes, it strikes at the heart of the political accountability so essential to our liberty and republican form of government."

Harvard law professor Laurence Tribe, who is expected to argue for the Gore campaign, noted that in asking the court to turn down Bush's appeal, Gore's lawyers argued that "an appropriate view of (the federal-state balance of power) should make it reluctant to intervene."

"Clearly, it overcame that reluctance," Tribe

George Mason University law professor Daniel Polsby said the justices might be thinking "this is an election that isn't going to have the indicia of finality in the public's mind if we don't lick the envelope and seal it."

The role of the nation's highest court is to "be the final arbiter when nobody else can agree," Polsby said.

The justices said they would consider whether the Florida high court's decision to set a Sunday deadline for including the handcounted votes violates the federal Constitution's due-process guarantee and its decree that each state's presidential electors will be chosen "in such manner as the legislature thereof may direct."

Also, the justices will decide whether the state court ruling violated a federal law that requires election disputes to be resolved under laws enacted before Election Day.

But they declined to hear Bush's argument that the manual recount is being conducted in an arbitrary and selective manner.

Gore's best argument before the justices, according to Chemerinsky, may be that "the Florida Supreme Court did not in any way change Florida law and it did what courts always do, interpret federal law."

Kmiec added that Gore's lawyers will argue that it is improper for the Supreme Court to interfere in a state matter.

Bush's lawyers could stress that "the action taken by the Florida Supreme Court cannot possibly be consistent with the will of the legislature," Kmiec said. Florida Secretary of State Katherine Harris

is expected to certify the recounted totals Sunday night, the deadline set by her state's highest court for the final hand-counted votes.

Gore's lawyers already have said that if Bush is declared the winner, they will file a new action contesting Miami-Dade County officials' decision not to finish a hand-recount because there was not enough time.

That could keep the dispute alive, as could other legal issues that are not involved in the case before the Supreme Court, including a lawsuit by Palm Beach County voters who say the ballot used in their county was too confus-

ments that shape a new president's administration.

But not since 1876 has a presidential election been disputed as this one is, and when Rutherford B. Hayes was declared the winner, only two days before inauguration, Democrats said he'd stolen the office. Despite that start to what he had promised would be his single term, it was not a powerless one. He ended Reconstruction, restoring selfrule to the Civil War South, and he began the process that eventually led to reform of the corrupt civil service.

When he was campaigning, Bush often said that when he took his programs to Congress. he'd tell them that he came with a message from the American people. He won't have one, nor would Gore should he win the White House by recount in Florida, for the decisive, and undecided 25 electoral votes that will make a president.

That will have to be done with persuasion and bipartisanship in a Congress so narrowly held by the Republicans that there will have to be compromise to get anything done, whoever is president.

These are the days and weeks for that to be happening — as when Ronald Reagan roamed the corridors of the Capitol, looking in Democratic leaders as well as

the Republican Senate that had come to control on his coattails. He and Nancy already had been to the White House, welcomed by President Carter, the man he had just defeated. "I think you'll like

the place," Carter said. Eight years, ago it was President George Bush's time to swallow defeat and welcome Bill Clinton to the White House for a two-hour post-election talk on world trouble spots and pending problems. They called it warm and informative.

One Clinton task of the weeks between winning and beginning was to ease away from his campaign promise of a middle class tax cut to shift to an economic program designed to deal with deficits he said were worse than he'd been led to believe. Clinton said it would be irresponsible for any president to ignore changing circumstances.

This also is the period in which presidents-elect reach out to the people and groups who had most opposed them, Ronald Reagan, for example, to black leaders, promising suspicious minorities that he would defend their rights "even at the point of a bayonet."

It is a time for symbols of the American way of transferring power - of messages to and from foreign leaders, as in Soviet Premier Nikita S. Khrushchev's to John F. Kennedy on Nov. 9, 1960, to express hope, hollow, as

it turned out, for Cold War steps toward improved relations. Kennedy replied by wire that "a just and lasting peace" would be his major task. All that two years before the brinksmanship of the Cuban missile crisis.

The symbolism can be momentous or minor. President-elect Clinton conferred with Reagan in Los Angeles, and came away with both advice and a jar of jelly

From such episodes are presidents made. Elections determine who the new man will be. The gradual process of coming to power determines how he will be seen by the Americans he has been chosen to lead.

In this incredible season, that gathering of the moral authority of the new leader is on hold while the hostilities of the campaign are waged on in courtrooms and the counting rooms of Florida.

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Child support program improves

AUSTIN — Texas' child support program has improved greatly since the Legislature nearly two years ago.

placed it on probation and demanded a complete overhaul The 75th Legislature placed the division under Sunset Re-

view in 1997 and the commission in 1999 recommended a twoyear probationary period for the program that collects and distributes child support payments in Texas.

The review shows that this year the division exceeded its established goals in five key areas and has improved customer service, upgraded its technology and hired new managers. In 2000, the division collected \$1.02 billion and established paternity for 48,481 children. Just two years ago the division collected only \$757 million and established paternity for 40,173

Computer systems that caused major problems in 1997 and 1998 have been fixed and now operate smoothly, but improvements still are needed, the report found. The report also found that problems still exist in the volume of undistributed payments but the attorney general's office plans to have a new automated system in place by January 2001 to identify and release several categories of the payment holds.

Customer service also has improved over the last two years, according to the report. The 76th Legislature approved an additional 114 staff members to man phone lines and now 95 percent of incoming customer calls are answered, up from only about 15 percent in 1998.

Bush supports black college aid

Gov. George W. Bush last week announced his support of a plan to improve Texas' two historically black state-funded universities, Texas Southern University in Houston and Prairie View A&M University in Hempstead.

The governor wrote a letter to the U.S. Department of Education, which also has signed off on the Priority Plan.

"I am committed to ensuring that minority students in Texas, who choose to pursue a university education, must have the very best opportunities made available to them by our state's higher education system. I endorse the Priority Plan that we have jointly produced and believe that it provides

a blueprint for achieving academic excellence," Gov. Bush said. Officials from the governor's office, the Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board, TSU, Prairie View and community leaders worked 18 months developing the Priority Plan, which still must earn funding in the coming legislative session under both colleges' appropriations requests.

Under the plan, TSU would receive more academic support for first-year students, improved housing and childcare, and a new science building and other renovations.

Prairie View would receive a summer academic support program and a new student development center and new nursing, architecture and juvenile justice facilities. Both colleges also would receive new advanced degree programs and expansion of current programs.

Texas Exile earns conviction

Texas Exile, a crime-control initiative using existing laws to find and punish criminals who illegally carry weapons, added another conviction to its list.

Aaron Robinson, 35, was sentenced to 92 months in federal prison Nov. 16 after a federal court found him guilty of possessing a loaded .38 caliber revolver last March in Fort Worth. Robinson already had three state felony convictions for kidnapping, theft and aggravated assault and a state misde-

meanor for unauthorized possession of a weapon.

Texas Exile is funded by a grant from the Governor's Criminal Justice Division that pays for eight prosecutors stationed throughout Texas. Since its inception in 1999, the program has netted 181 convictions and has confiscated more than 850 guns.

Fifty lending institutions across the state will offer 30-year fixed 6.6 percent loans for qualified buyers. For information, call the Texas First-Time Homebuyer Hotline at 1-800-792-1119.

· Texas Star, the largest bass in captivity in Texas, died this month at Texas Freshwater Fisheries Center in Athens. The 18.82-pound bass was 14 years old and originally was caught in 1996 during a tournament.




It has been three years since Hereford High wrestling coach Mike Dominguez's first dispelled the myth that prep wrestling used raised

"It is exciting to see it go from a minimal program to see it flourish," head wrestling coach Dominguez said. "We (coaches) are able to be technicians, which at this level is what we need to be."

The Hereford High School wrestling team has learned quickly that real wrestling deals with staying mentally stable (unlike "professional" wrestling) while relying on strength and mobility. Dominguez said his team also knows they compete in what could be considered an individualistic sport (unlike football and basketball) and in just three years they have made Hereford High not

Texas sophomore erases poor performances with 43-17 victory

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) - Texas'

young guns are all grown up. In a game of personal and team redemption in an up-and-down season, sophomore Chris Simms remedied unfulfilled expectations

with his best game against the Longhorns' biggest rival.

Simms passed for 383 yards and three touchdowns, all to freshmen receivers, in the No. 12 Longhorns' 43-17 victory over No. 22 Texas A&M on Friday.

Simms was a perfect 8-for-8 passing for 234 yards and threw all of his touchdown passes in an explosive third quarter in which the teams combined for 37 points. It was a dynamic coming-of-age performance for the son of former New York Giants quarterback Phil

After a season in which he bounced in and out of the starting lineup and had more interceptions

than touchdown passes coming into the game, Simms got the start because Major Applewhite was hobbled by a knee injury.

"This year's been ups and downs and bumps and bruises," Simms said. "I knew I had to learn from

said. "I knew I had to learn from everything that was happening. It was part of growing up. Today was a real big redemption."

Simms got his first career start against A&M last year when Applewhite got sick with a stomach virus on game day. Simms led Texas to a 16-6 lead in that game before he was mulled for Applewhite and A&M was pulled for Applewhite and A&M rallied for a 20-16 win.

This time, Simms was in total

Leading 10-7 at halftime, the Longhorns (9-2, 7-1 Big 12) opened the decisive third quarter by driving 71 yards on four plays. Roy Williams capped the drive with a 40-yard TD

run on a reverse.

After forcing the Aggies to punt, Texas quickly struck again when Simms finished an 81-yard drive with a 20-yard scoring strike to Williams that made it 24-7.

We're on the same page in the CRP playbook

y daughter, Jaime, is finishing up the fall semester of her second year as an agriculture development major at Texas A&M University.

Inevitably, as the semester draws toward a close, there are

heavy writing assignments.

The other night, seeking proof-reading and comment, she e-mailed me a treatise on the Conservation Reserve Program that she has been laboring over for weeks for one of her agriculture classes.

Reading through it took some time, but I was glad I got to. I was mighty impressed with what she had come up with. She put together a wide-ranging summary of the pros and cons of the complexities of CRP.

As I read, I found that Jaime and I, though we had not discussed this subject--nor all that much to do with agriculture before--were smack on the same page in our thoughts concerning the benefits of CRP, and the importance of keeping this policy in effect.

Either she listened to me more than I thought a few of those times when I was yakking about such things, or her professors down at A&M are actually filling her head with some useful stuff.

The Conservation Reserve Program was authorized in 1985 under the Food Security Act, ostensibly to reduce soil erosion, improve water quality, and provide wildlife habitat. The rest of the story is that CRP was also enacted to help farmers in a time of over production and depressed commodity prices.

CRP provides financial incentives to farmers to convert marginal and erosion-prone cropland to grassland, wildlife habitat, or tree plantings for periods of 10 to 15 years.

Jaime was even-handed, acknowledging that CRP has hurt some farm businesses and communities that rely on volume sales of farming inputs.

But she also documented how CRP has contributed to saving topsoil. groundwater, improving air quality through reducing blowing soil, and, how CRP has been a boon to wildlife in many instances.

She acknowledged that the Conservation Reserve Program might not ever have come into being, nor have enjoyed extended life, if not for the fact that it has garnered widespread support from wildlife and environmental interests for the dividends it yields for habitat protection and wildlife

Ultimately, CRP became a win-win situation, for farmers, for wildlife, and for the environment...Incredibly, something practical and useful emerged from Washington

Big success stories for CRP in the local area include the reduction of blowing topsoil noted in the spring when grasses began anchoring marginally-productive farmland that was blow-prone. Water official acknowledge that CRP has likely extended the life of the Ogallaia aquifer in

the High Plains region because of its impact in reducing irrigation demand on those formerly-irrigated acres that were converted to CRP.

Pheasants certainly have found more nesting cover in this region since CRP came into being.

Waterfowling enthusiasts can likely thank the Conservation Reserve Program for a turn-around in the nesting fortunes of ducks in the continental U.S. in

According to Ducks Unlimited, duck production in the Prairie Pothole region of the U.S.--Montana, North Dakota, and South Dakota, has soared to new highs the past few years thanks to a series of wet years during the breeding

season--and to the Conservation Reserve Program. Duck nesting success in the Prairie Pothole region of the U.S. is higher even than that logged in Canada in recent years. Waterfowl biologists attribute this success to ideal water conditions and the kind of perfect upland cover that's provided by CRP in then orth-central U.S.

Studies conducted by Ducks Unlimited and the U.S. Fish & Wildlife Service estimate that acres enrolled in the CRP in Montana, North and South Dakota added 10.5 million ducks to the fall flight from 1992 to 1997.

Dr. Bruce Batt, chief biologist for Ducks Unlimited, says CRP plays no small role in this success.

"The increased duck production we have seen is a result of upland habitat provided by the Conservation Reserve Program," says Batt. I've long thought CRP is ducky... Nice to see a paper that tells us our college kid thinks so too.

Duke takes NIT championship game

Carlos Boozer scores 26 points against Temple to lead Blue Devils

NEW YORK (AP) — Carlos Boozer and Jason Williams simply would not let No. 2 Duke lose to unheralded Temple in the championship game of the Preseason NIT.

The two sophomores kept the Blue Devils close and Duke finally prevailed Friday night, beating the tenacious Owls 63-61

Williams hit the 3-pointer that gave Duke the lead for good with 2:05 to play, then scrambled to recover a loose ball for a crucial possession in the final minute. Boozer, who had 13 of his 26 points down the stretch and was named the tournament MVP, then scored the clinching bas-

ket with 17 seconds to play. Temple still had time to tie, but Duke's defense never allowed the Owls a decent chance at the 3-pointer they needed.

Temple's last gasp came as Lynn Greer went to the foul line with 1.6 seconds left. He made the first shot, then de-

liberately missed the second. The ball squirted out of bounds. That gave Temple another chance but Kevin Lyde's wild shot was not close.

Duke won its first Preseason NIT championship since the inaugural event in 1985-86. Temple was making its first appearance in the tourney's title game.

Texas defeated Indiana 70-58 in the consolation game for third place.

Temple stayed with Duke through the first 20 minutes, fighting off the Blue Devils' pressure and applying plenty of its own with a tough match

When Duke opened a seven-point lead at 41-34, Lyde scored four straight points, and a 3-pointer by Alex Wesby tied the score again. Then a goaltending call against Casey Sanders gave Temple the lead with just over 11 minutes to play. Again, Duke went outside for a 3-pointer by Williams that put the Blue Devils back on top. Greer and Ronn Blackshear responded with 3pointers that gave Temple the lead, one the Owls held

the quarter when he pumpfaked on another out pattern and laur shed a 70-yard bomb to B.J. Johnson that made it 37-17.

They're the three best freshmen receivers in the country," Simms said. "I don't think anybody can deny that.'

As the clock wound down in the final minute, Simms turned to the crowd and waived his arms up and down as if all the expectations of him had been fulfilled.

"How does this win stack up? Tonight, it's the biggest I've ever had," Brown said.

"This game was really important to us because I want to win 10 games," Brown said. The Longhorns haven't won 10 games in a season since 1995.

Farris, who had returned to A&M after a stint playing minor league baseball and had been praised by Aggies coaches

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for his poise this season, finished with 290 yards passing and set the Aggies' singleseason record with 2,551 yards.

But he also made two critical turnovers.

His first pass of the game was picked off of by Greg Brown, who returned it 10 yards for a 7-0 Texas lead in the opening minutes.

"On the road, things snowball and we couldn't stop them," Farris said. "We all could have played better."

A&M trailed 10-7 in the second quarter when Farris killed a potential go-ahead drive with a fumble on the Texas 9.

Kris Stockton had field goals of 34, 31 and 30 yards to set a Texas single-season record with 22.

The game was the kind of shootout the 106-year-old ri-

valry needed. State bragging rights were overshadowed last year by the A&M bonfire tragedy. Twelve people were killed and dozens more injured when the log stack for traditional pre-game blaze collapsed.

The rivalry appeared back on track early in the week when the Longhorns defenders said Aggie fullback Ja'Mar Toombs would "fold" if hit hard enough.

Toombs rushed for 126 vards and scored twice against Texas last year. He managed just 53 yards on Friday and

didn't score. Still up in the air are bowl options for both teams. Although Texas can't win the Big 12, the Longhorns haven't yet been released by the Bowl

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Spurs fall to Exel and Denver, 102-92

Denver point guard has 27 points and 13 assists to lead Nuggets past San **Antonio**

DENVER (AP) - Nick Van Exel finishd one rebound shy of a tripledouble as the Denver Nuggets won their fifth straight at

Van Exel had 27 points, 13 assists and nine rebounds and Antonio McDyess added 20 points to lead the Nuggets to a 102-92 victory over the San Antonio Spurs on Friday

"I don't know if we have played any better defense, but it was close," said Denver coach Dan Issel, whose team gives up slightly over 100 points a game. "We played awfully well."

Van Exel was 11-for-17 from the field, including 5-for-6 on 3-pointers. McDyess had 12 of his points in the third quarter when the Nuggets began taking control of the

Tim Duncan led San Antonio with 21 points and 14 rebounds. Derek Anderson had 15 for the Spurs, who lost for only the second time in their last 13 games against the Nuggets.

"Even in the first half, our defense wasn't that bad. We gave up 15 second-chance

points, which was killing us," Issel said. "In the second half we held them to six points on second shots and started making more shots."

Denver shot a season-high 73 percent (16-for-22) in the third quarter to take an 86-73 lead into the fourth. Backto-back baskets by Tariq Abdul-Wahad and Raef LaFrentz increased the Nuggets' lead to 92-78 three minutes into the final quarter.

"We didn't play as a team defensively, and didn't play with discipline or aggressiveness," San Antonio coach Gregg Popovich said. "At the two-minute mark we had two team fouls for the half. I thought we parked it to a degree when we were up by

Duncan's three-point play and two free throws by Malik Rose cut the deficit to 92-80, but the Nuggets responded with a 6-0 run. The Spurs got as close as 99-85 on an inside jumper by Antonio Daniels, but Voshon Lenard's 3-pointer with 1:12 to go put the Nuggets ahead 102-85.

Denver didn't lead until nearly four minutes into the second half when James Posey buried a 3-pointer for a 59-58 lead. They then started breaking away as McDyess began a 9-0 run with a fadeaway

McDyess closed the quarter with eight straight points on four jump shots, giving the Nuggets an 86-71 lead.

"They weren't talking any-

more, and I think a couple of guys even argued," McDyess said of the Spurs in the third quarter. "When you get guys arguing and not helping each other out on defense, you know that things will turn around for you."

San Antonio extended its four-point first quarter lead to 50-35 in the second quarter as Rose buried his first three shots of the period, including a dunk over taller LaFrentz. The Nuggets closed the gap with a 15-2 run in the last 2:36 of the half, with Posey contributing two 3-pointers and Van Exel adding

five points and a steal.



ABC changes its rules for projecting results

NEW YORK (AP) — While ballot recounts continued, ABC News announced guidelines meant to avert the sort of faulty projections it made with other networks giving Al Gore, then George W. Bush, Florida's 25 electoral votes in the presidential race.


Citing Election Night's two blown calls - both of them ultimately retracted - the announcement lists changes that include projecting a winner in a race only after all of the polls in the affected state, rather than just a majority, have closed. It also specifies that ABC's own independent analysis must bear out the data provided by Voter News

Service before a call is made. The internal review was headed by Kerry Marash, vice president of editorial quality, said ABC News president David

"We thought it was our responsibility to move promptly ntly to understand better what happened Elec-tion Night," Westin said, "and to do our very best to make sure it doesn't happen again." Other networks have said they are conducting similar

examinations of what went

ABC reforms also include heightened efforts by on-air personnel to explain that, in Westin's words, "calling a race is not the same as declaring a victor - it's making an informed estimate."





Take Precautions with Night Vision

At night, our eyes become somewhat myopic or nearsighted. Although night myopia is normal, it makes it harder for us to see signs and people along the side of the road, Glare from an approaching vehicle also causes our vision to weaken. To decrease glare, avoid looking directly at the light and get glasses with anti-glare coating from your eye care specialist.

Pupil enlargement also has an effect on night vision. Our pupils widen or dilate when less light is available. This allows light rays to scatter as they pass through the eye tissues to focus on the retina. Scattering diseases visual disability. People with cataracts especially complain of poor vision due to scattering, which worsens with age as the lens of the eyes become cloudier.

To enhance your vision, consult with your eye care specialist for the proper glasses to wear for night driving. Wear tinted glasses in daylight only. Ensure your windshield and headlights are clean. Don't drive when your body and/or eyes are tired. Remember that drugs, alcohol and even some medications. may affect your judgement.




outhouse. built by lawyer John R. Arnold and his family, was built in 1908 with double-walled construction for insulation in both summer and winter. Windows were added

Cattle TB impacts Texas producers

Two options available, both cost millions



The success of recent efforts by state agriculture officials, and the El Paso dairy and cattlemen to curb or eliminate outbreaks of cattle tuberculosis in that area will likely affect dairy and cattle operations around the entire state, including new dairy operations sought by the hereford Economic Development Corporation for location here.

Tuberculosis is a serious bacterial infection affecting the respiratory system of most warm-blooded animals. Cattle TB manifests itself as a chronic wasting disease and may take years to develop classic lesions in the lungs of an infected

The disease can be spread through sneezing, coughing or by breathing in other air born particles. The disease does not threaten dairy consumers because pasteurization kills the bovine TB bacteria.

HEDC executive director Don Cumpton has said none of the contacted dairies are from the El Paso area. The ones being recruited originate from the Stephenville and Brownfield area. Neither herd have been

linked to cattle TB.

Texas Agriculture Commissioner Susan Combs and the Texas Animal Health Commission are working on separate measures, which would either eliminate the disease from Texas or at least allow most of Texas dairy and beef cattle free movement across county and

There are now only two dairy herds — one in Hudspeth County and one in El Paso County - in Texas under federal TB quarantine.

Depopulating the herds would allow Texas to claim a TB-free status at a cost of \$43 million. The other option is to split Texas into TB-free zones and have

quarantined areas tag and test all breeding animals prior to movement.

Combs is urging U.S. Agriculture Secretary Dan Glickman and the Texas congressional delegation to fully restore the recommended funding for the National Bovine Strategic Plan, which was recently cut to \$25.7

ment and Budget.

Dr. Terry Beals, Texas' state veterinarian and head of the TAHC, reports that in the last 15 years, 252 confirmed cases have been in the El Paso area and 204 of those animals were on one badly infected dairy, which was depopulated in the early 1990s. He also noted most quarantined herds have had a low incidence of disease — sometimes as few as one animal - indicating infection was caught early.

'The federal government's own experts within the U.S. Department of Agriculture have recommended that \$43 million is needed to effectively eliminate this disease from El Paso County. Without any factual basis, this amount has been cut to \$25.7 million, which will not accomplish the goal of eradication," Combs said.

With newer and tighter restrictions being placed on producers, Combs fears that without the eradication, producers will face difficulty exporting their livestock as well as hundreds of millions of dollars in herd testing.

USDA and TAHC officials realize both options have numerous drawbacks, and neither option will come cheaply.

The voluntary decision to shut down dairy operations by the El Paso producers was not an easy one," Combs said. "These owners have reluctantly agreed to a buyout for the better interest of the state. The decisions to shut down operations will not only affect their livelihood, but also have a negative economic impact on the entire region.'

"If we don't split the state, every Texas producer will face these restrictions, costing producers up to \$1 billion in the next five years in extra handling costs," Beals said.

Splitting the state will require federal review and approval and is a hot-button political and economic issue for producers left behind the split.

"If the state is split, the El Paso area will have a lower TB eradication status, and producers would have to tag and test breeding stock. If we don't split the state, every Texas producer will face these restrictions," Beals said.

Officials expect to have a final decision on either splitting the state or depopulating the herds by late January 2001.

Simulation reveals possibility of disaster

A foreign animal disease outbreak in Texas could cost government entities more than \$50 million per county, according to estimates tallied up in early November, when livestock health officials simulated an outbreak of foot-and-mouth disease (FMD) in South Texas to test emergency prepared-

Worse yet, the figures compiled by the Hidalgo County emergency management coordinator don't include indemnity payments to pay produc-ers for livestock destroyed to prevent the spread of disease, or lost revenue due to inevitable state and federal quarantines that would restrict livestock and livestock product movement for months, or possibly, years. Marketing opportunities would be restored only when an affected region could prove it is disease-free.

Foot-and-mouth disease, without a doubt, is the most economically important livestock disease, and recent outbreaks around the world make this highly contagious virus a tangible threat to our domestic livestock. This disease also strikes a variety of species, so it was an excellent choice for a test exercise. If we could develop our ability to fight foot-and-mouth disease, we could stop any disease," said Dr. Linda Logan, Texas' state

veterinarian and head of the Texas Animal Health Commission (TAHC), the state's livestock health regula-

tory agency. Logan said was just the initial economic impact on Texas agriculture. Costs were calculated by Hidalgo County Emergency Management Coordinator Charlie Montgomery, who worked with personnel dispatched to the site of the first

"Foot-and-mouth disease outbreaks can devastate an animal agricultural-based economy," said Logan. "In addition to the enormous direct costs of fighting the disease, there are also the lost opportunities for trade. A region's credibiltion and control also could be critically damaged."

> Within the state, Coats said the Texas Emergency Response Team (TERT) practiced working within the state's emergency management system. The system is a network of county and state agencies capable of providing much-needed manpower, equipment and technical support. TERT is a cooperative effort of the TAHC and Texas' U.S. Department of Agriculture's Veterinary Services staff and is prepared to address disease outbreaks or natural disasters affecting ani-

mals. The disastrous scenario began in mid-October, but for purposes of the exercise, was not reported to livestock health officials until the first of No-

vember. On October 15, a South Texas swine producer retrieved food scraps for his animals from a foreign ship docked in Brownsville. He fed the un-

Within a few days, the producer's swine exhibited signs of illness and several litters of piglets had died. The owner finally contacted the TAHC on November 1, but by then, he had sold several pigs from the premise, and more than 1,200 susceptible animals had moved through a nearby livestock market. These ani-mals were exposed to the disease when the virus became airborne.

Organizers also included the very real possibility of catchinga a truck which had hauled contaminated animals, cross country.

"To stop the spread of disease, immediate action is required, to stop animal and livestock vehicle movement. said Ellis. "We needed immediate producer cooperation to stop livestock hauling, close sale barns, rodeos and other events in affected areas."

"We also discovered how quickly TAHC commissioners must impose formal movement restrictions to avoid a massive outbreak," commented Logan.

"The commissioners must also decide when to request a disaster declaration, so that affected and exposed animals can be depopulated and owners can be compensated with government funds.

Thanks to the state's emergency management system, we can draw on staff and equipment needed for a wide variety of tasks, including depopu-

lating sick animals, maintaining movement controls and tracing movement of livestock that may have been exposed to the disease.'

"By the third day of the exercise, we were chasing disease and had not been able to contain infection," commented Ellis. "Hidalgo, Cameron and Willacy Counties were placed under a simulated quarantined to slow the spread of infection. In the exercise, the deer hunting season was suspended.

By the final day of the exercise, TAHC commissioners stopped livestock movement

statewide.

"For more than two years, the TERT team had prepared for a disease outbreak or natural disaster involving animals," said Logan. "Thankfully this was an exercise, and we will continue to fine-tune our plan, sharpen skills and strengthen partnerships with producers, practitioners and other agencies, in order to be ready when a real disease is introduced or a natural disaster hits.

Logan stressed that global travel of humans and livestock has greatly increased the risk of a foreign animal disease outbreak or pest intro-duction. She urged producers to report potential signs of disease to private practitioners, the TAHC area offices or agency headquarters at 1-800-550-8242, or Texas' USDA's Veterinary Services at 1-512-916-5555.

·blistering around the mouth, teats, muzzle or hooves · unusual ticks or maggots

· staggering, falling or central nervous system disorders · severe sudden illness or death loss affecting a high percentage of animals.

"It has been raining on and off for the past 30 days," he said. "Forage conditions have recovered very nicely from the drought that we experienced during the summer. The pastures, particularly wheat, oats and rye grass, are well on their way to providing some excellent grazing for winter

Extension Beef Cattle Specialist Dr. Stephen Hammack of Stephenville said that even though conditions vary, the

"We are in much better

shape, in general, than we were a couple of months ago," he said. "If for no other reason, we have some surface water and we grew some

Hammack said current cattle conditions are dependent on how cattle were managed during dry weather.

"It varies tremendously depending pretty much on how people were stocked during this drought period - whether they sold off or whether they fed to keep cattle in condition," he said. "Those who had the courage to plant small grains when it was so dry are

in good shape now."

Extension Livestock Specialist Dr. Todd Thrift of Overton said pastures in East Texas


rains.

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

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

Then rememeber these hints: Give the price. A newpaper consultant says 70 percent of classified readers won't respond to an add with no price.

 Use key words to describe what you're selling. The key words for a car are make, model, year, body style, color, mileage and price. If it's a house, key words are location, type of construction, number of bedrooms and baths, and condition.. Don't use abbreviations. It's tempting to abbreviate and save money if ads are billed by the line. Brand ads are billed by the words, so spell them out so readers won't be confused trying to figure out abbreviations.

Don't be misleading. Think accurate and factual when you write. Be sure to include a phone number and the best times to reach you.




Combating Harmful Bacteria

(NAPS)-It's an old question: What can you do to get your home clean and keep it that way? Some solutions may surprise you.

A recent study by Dr. Bill Keevil at the Centre for Applied Microbiology & Research (CAMR) found that the highly toxic E. coli O157:H7 strain of bacteria survive for much shorter periods of time on copper and brass surfaces than on stainless steel. This finding has wide-ranging implications for reducing outbreaks from cross contamination of E. coli O157 in the food processing industry.

The work carried out by CAMR team member Dr. Andrew Maule found that at room temperature it takes 34 days for E. coli O157 bacteria to die on stainless steel tiles, 4 days to die on brass tiles, and just 4 hours to die on copper tiles. And even at the chill temperatures typical of food storage, the study found that ten percent of the bacteria were still alive on stainless steel tiles after 34 days, whereas bacteria were completely eradicated on brass tiles within 12 days and on copper tiles in just 14 hours.

Dr. Harold T. Michels of the Copper Development Association in the USA said, "For centuries, man has used copper and copper alloys to inhibit the growth of harmful microbes. Based on our preliminary understanding of the bactericidal benefits of copper determined in

this study, we look forward to practical applications that may spring from it which would control harmful bacteria, particularly related to food hygiene.

He said CDA is currently seeking partners to conduct further investigations on the potential of copper alloys, such as coppernickel, nickel silver and brass, to reduce the occurrence of E. coli O157 cross contamination in the food industry. 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Entertain Hall Jazz Band cooks on intimate home turf

Millions of music lovers know the Preservation Hall Jazz Band from its performances in major concert venues, but PBS invites audiences to experience these terrific musicians on more intimate terms in *Preservation Hall Jazz Band – A Night in New Orleans*, premiering Wednesday, Nov. 29 (check local listings).

Taped in live performance last winter in the band's one-room music hall on St. Peter Street, the hour features personal interviews with the band members interspersed with lively renderings of such favorites as "Basin Street Blues," "Just a Closer Walk With Thee" and "When the Saints Go Marchin' In."

"When you come to Preservation Hall, the band that you hear are musicians that are direct descendants of the originators of New Orleans jazz," says Ben Jaffe, the band's manager and bass player. "Jazz is an art form that is passed from generation to generation.

"The music we play is traditional New Orleans jazz, and it dates back about 100 years. It was created to entertain, and that's something that's never been lost over the years."

Preservation Hall is a very personal matter for Jaffe. In 1960, his honey-mooning parents, Sandra and Allan, attended a jazz session in the hall, which was then an art gallery owned by jazz lover Larry Bornstein.

It was a fortuitous meeting. Bornstein was ready to close his gallery, and the Jaffes, smitten with the French Quarter's charm, happily took over his lease and ran a jazz club in the space.

Allan Jaffe played tuba in the band and managed the club until his death in 1987. Sandra Jaffe took over the management until 1993, when she passed it on to Ben. (Another son, Russell, is a New Orleans lawyer who handles legal issues for the band.)

"People always come up to me saying. 'Hey, you're too young to be in the band,' and maybe I am," Jaffe, who just turned 29 says with a grin. "But it's a great opportunity to learn from the masters. As the youngest member of the

band, if someone wants a cup of coffee at midnight, I'm the guy to do it. It's part of paying the dues."

At the opposite end of the age spectrum is Narvin Kimball, the 92-year-old banjo player who stopped performing not long after this special was taped. Filling in between these two extremes are pianist Rickie Monie, trombonist Frank Demond, clarinetist David Grillier, drummer Joseph Lastie Jr. and dapper trumpeter Wendell Brunious, the band's leader.

Executive producer and director Phillip Byrd, who first produced a show with the band during a Wolf Trap concert 15 years ago, says only current technology – particularly in terms of cameras that are smaller and more adaptable to lower light levels – made it possible to tape in the tiny music hall.

Even at that, Byrd had to "call" his shots from a makeshift control room across a courtyard from where his camera crew was working.

"I just hope people have a really good time when they watch the show," Byrd says.

"It was tough to decide what to include. I hope we've been successful at taking the experience of putting your \$5 in the admission basket and spending an evening there without air conditioning or anything else except seven musicians. We've tried to collapse that into 60 minutes so that people who watch will really have a sense of what it's like to stand in line on St. Peter Street," he says.


