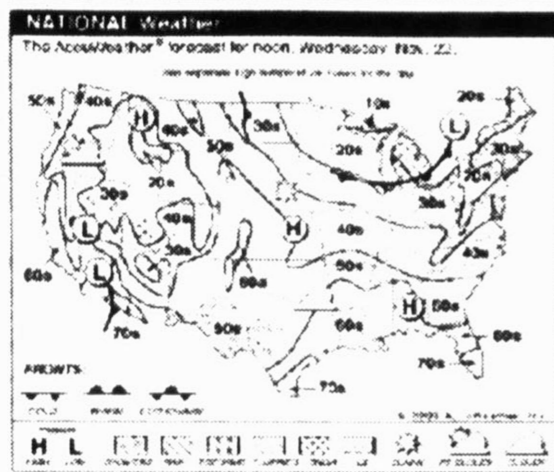

Water plan closer to OK

LUBBOCK — The Llano Estacado Regional Water Management Plan moved one step closer to final adoption when the planning group members recently reviewed comments from federal and state agencies and the public.

Hereford Mayor Bob Josserrand is a member of the planning group.

"The Texas Water Development (TWDB) has made their preliminary assessment of the initially-prepared regional water plan document," chairman A. Wayne Wyatt of Lubbock said. "Their review has found some minor elements missing from the draft plan that are necessary to meet statutes, rules or contract requirements of Senate Bill 1 and the TWDB. We are expecting additional input from the Texas Natural Resource Conservation Commission (TNRCC) and the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department (TPWD) prior to Dec. 5."

The planning group also reviewed public comments received after the water plan was unveiled Sept. 26 at a public hearing in Lubbock.

"We received 19 written comments regarding the content of the regional water plan and have responded to each one," Wyatt said.

The Llano Estacado Regional Water Management Plan must be submitted to the TWDB by Jan. 5, 2001. After the TWDB signs on to the plan, the 16 regional water plans will be incorporated into a comprehensive state plan by January 2002.

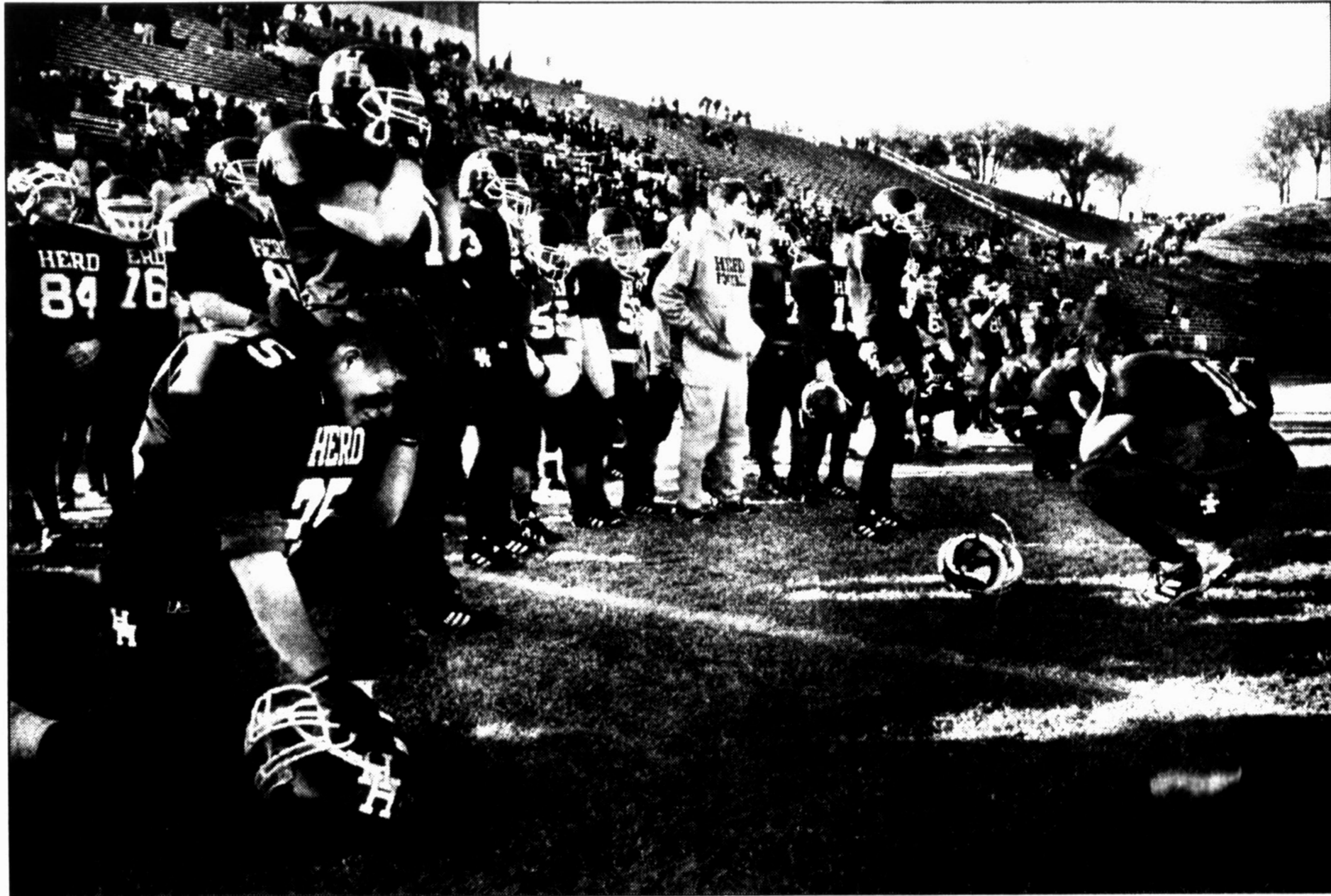
The planning group also is developing its agenda for the next planning cycle, which begins in 2001. The agenda also will be submitted to the TWDB.

Among the items that are being considered are:

- Revision/Updating of the region's basic water data base;
- Water demand projections;
- Population totals based upon the 2000 Census;
- Improving data collection to determine irrigation pumpage estimates to reflect historic and future water demands;
- More accurate determination of the yields of area surface water reservoirs;
- Determining the specific yield of the

Frenship kills Hereford's title dream

The third-ranked Hereford Whitefaces' quest for a state football championship ended Saturday when they ran into No. 9-ranked Frenship for the second time this year.

The Herd fell in a thrilling 43-36 clash featuring arguably the two best teams in Class 4A football. Earlier in the season, Hereford defeated the Tigers 48-28, but Frenship proved how difficult it can be to beat a team twice in a year jumping out to a 14-0 lead and never looking back.

"We took the ball early hoping we could get the lead and offensively we couldn't do anything those first two series," senior

quarterback Cody Hodges said. "They got out to a 14-0 lead and that is hard, because they're just like us."

"They can put as many points on the board as they want," Hodges said.

The two early Frenship scores in the first quarter were the difference in the game, making it the only quarter in which Frenship outscored the Herd. The scores came on two pass plays after the Tigers kept the ball on the ground for much of the scoring drives.

The game proved to be an offensive battle with the two teams racking up a total of 79 points and 856 combined yards of offense. Hereford spent most the afternoon playing catchup to the Tigers, a big difference from the first encounter with Frenship.

"When they have a 14-point lead, it is hard enough to catch them," Hodges said. "Once we did catch them, they still kept making big plays."

Whiteface Coach Craig Yenser said he knew the game would come down to which defense would come through because both teams are so dangerous offensively.

"We had a hard time slowing them down," Yenser said. "I thought our kids played hard, but it was just one of those great ball games that somebody had to lose."

Frenship senior quarterback Kendal Briles terrorized the Herd defense all afternoon, throwing for four touchdowns and running

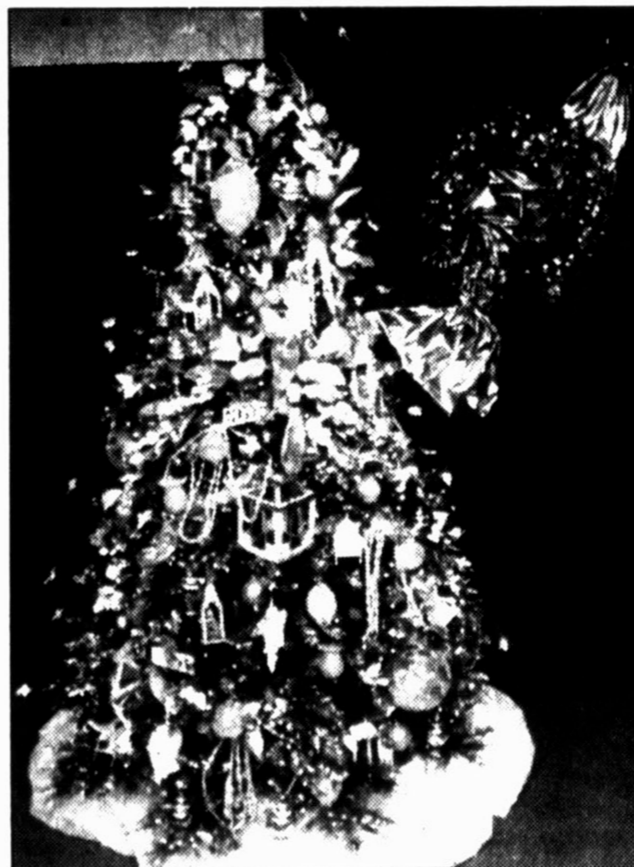
Bush, Gore wait for Florida court

Two unforgettable weeks after Election Day, George W. Bush and Al Gore are sweating out a ruling from the Florida Supreme Court and manual recounts in three Democratic counties as they wait to learn who will sit in the White House.

"The court is certainly aware of the historic nature of this session," Florida Chief Justice Charles T. Wells said Monday as he presided over 2½ hours of nationally televised legal arguments on the state's contested election. The

■ Annual Christmas tree auction nets \$37,150

A Christmas tree titled "Heavenly Garden" was the top-selling tree at the 11th Annual Festival of Trees auction held Friday night at Hereford Senior Citizens Center.

The tree was purchased by Jim and Zula Arney for \$3,000. It was decorated by Sharon Bodner and Hereford Senior Citizens Association and was donated by First National Bank.

The auction raised an all-time high total of \$37,150 to benefit the Senior Center, surpassing last year's total of \$32,000 and topping the previous high of \$36,000 raised in 1998.

"We had some items other than trees that did very well in this year's auction," Margie Daniels, executive director of Hereford Senior Citizens Association, said. "A

Short agenda gets even shorter

Hereford's city commissioners didn't set a record in doing their business Monday night, but it could have been.

The commissioners had a short agenda that was made even shorter when Alamosa PCS withdrew its request for an agreement with the city allowing it to place cellular antennas on the elevated storage tank at 13th Street and Avenue G. The request will be considered later.

The only other item of regular business on the agenda was the monthly report from Don

Cumpton, executive director of the Hereford Economic Development Corp. Cumpton also was brief, reporting he has spent considerable time on dairy projects, which he believes "are progressing slowly but surely."

Cumpton also said he has been in contact with a manufacturing prospect, but he doesn't expect any more information until after the first of the year.

During the public comments segment, Hereford Mayor Bob Josserrand reported the annual Christmas tree lighting ceremony will begin at 7 p.m. Dec. 4 in Mothers Park.

The ceremony also will feature a visit by

Santa Claus, horse-and-buggy rides up and down Main Street and late shopping, with downtown merchants remaining open after the lighting ceremony.

Also, the Pilot Club will serve hot chocolate and coffee at the ceremony.

Josserrand also praised City Manager Chester Nolen for his work on a committee that negotiated a natural gas rate agreement with Energas. Although Hereford was one of the cities that approved the agreement, which called for a \$3.016 million rate hike for the

• **Mayor arraigned, second time** •

BATON ROUGE, La. (AP) — Former Houston Mayor Fred Hofheinz is scheduled to appear in federal court Tuesday, and his lawyer hinted he might change his innocent plea in a case of alleged extortion.

The 1 p.m. hearing before U.S. District Judge Frank Polozola is for Hofheinz's arraignment on charges of extorting payoffs from Texas businessmen interested in seeking state contracts in Louisiana.

Kent Schaffer, Hofheinz's lawyer, declined comment on whether his client had reached a deal in return for a guilty plea.

But when asked if Hofheinz would change the plea of innocent he entered last December, Schaffer responded, "That's usually what arraignment means."

Hofheinz and Eunice cattleman Cecil Brown, a close confidant of former Gov. Edwin Edwards, are charged with extortion and bribery. Prosecutors contend Hofheinz and Brown tried to shake down people seeking state contracts, including one for a proposed juvenile prison in Jena.

• **Allies seek to spare murderer** •

WASHINGTON (AP) — A group of President Clinton's allies are asking him to declare a moratorium on federal executions and spare a Texas man convicted of three murders committed in 1990 and 1991 while he was the boss of a marijuana importing ring.

"Unless you take action, executions will begin at a time when your own attorney general has expressed concern about racial and other disparities in the federal death penalty process," the group said in the letter to Clinton on Monday.

Juan Raul Garza of Brownsville, Texas, is scheduled to be executed Dec. 12. That would make him the first person since 1963 to be put to death under federal criminal statutes prescribing capital punishment.

Garza, who is Hispanic, asked Clinton in September to commute his sentence to life in prison because of "long-standing racial bias" in capital punishment sentencing. The president already has postponed his execution once.

A White House spokeswoman on Monday could not confirm Clinton had seen the letter.

Among the 40 people signing the moratorium letter were U.S. Civil Rights Commission Chairwoman Mary Frances Berry, Cardinal Roger Mahony of Los Angeles, NAACP Chairman Julian Bond, civil rights leader Jesse Jackson, former Notre Dame President Theodore Hesburgh and entertainers Barbara Streisand and Jack Lemmon.

• **County plans second recount** •

BROWNSVILLE, Texas (AP) — A weekend recount of votes in one South Texas precinct resulted in a 679 vote discrepancy in the race for county commissioner, leaving officials suspicious enough to schedule a second recount.

"You just don't lose 679 votes," Cameron County commissioner Democratic candidate David A. Garza, said in Tuesday's editions of The Brownsville Herald. "If you lose something, you have to look for it until you find it."

Garza's votes decreased in the first recount by 317 votes. He still has the edge over Republican opponent Melanie McCormick, who's vote count also decreased in the first recount. The majority of the missing votes came in the form of early votes.

"Some of the precincts might have been left out of the process by some of the (recount) teams," said County Collections Administrator Robert Mendoza. "I think it's worth making sure that all the ballots have been counted for that particular race so that everyone is comfortable with the results."

School board names CT director

Less than six months after appointing Pat Diggs as the new director of Career Technology, the school board had to name her replacement.

The search ended Monday night when the Hereford Independent School District trustees picked Vita Sotelo, the assistant principal at Northwest Primary, to direct the C-T center.

Sotelo will assume his new duties on Jan. 5.

Diggs resigned last month, saying only that personal problems would prevent her from continuing in what she had hoped would be strong beginning for the new career and technology buildings.

The board also agreed to hire Rusty Phares as an English teacher, beginning Jan. 5. Phares is just finishing his student teaching at Borger High School and has a double

major in English and social studies.

HISD superintendent Beth Abernethy said Phares will relieve some of the crowded conditions which now exist in the English department.

The board will consider Sotelo's replacement at a later date.

HISD board accepted the campus proposals for the Placement Review Committee, the Attendance Committee and the Textbook Committee.

The placement review committee consists of teachers and staff on each campus who meet when a teacher refuses to have a student in their class due to discipline problems.

Each campus has chosen one administrator, two teachers and an alternate to staff these committees.

The attendance committee, composed of the assistant principal of each campus plus one grade level advisor, meets only

if there is a question regarding a student's receiving credits for a course because of missed days.

Deputy superintendent Nena Mankin briefly presented the campus improvement plans, saying there were some common threads in all plans.

"There are very common components in all the plans, with each campus using unique strategies to address these special situations. All the campuses listed ways of addressing attendance and parental involvement," Mankin said. "Our high school staff are particularly concerned with the dropout rate and are working to keep students before they dropout."

Terry Russell, assistant superintendent of support services, said the activity bus, which was returned to the manufacturer because of mechanical failure, has been returned to the Hereford bus

barn. Russell said the company could not determine what the problem was or what had caused the problems to begin with and had replaced the defective motor with a rebuilt engine.

In other business, the board accepted a request for an attendance waiver for freshmen, junior and senior students who have passed the TAAS test. Exempt students will report to class no later than noon on testing days.

Board members are scheduled to meet for board training Dec. 4, and for the next regular meeting on Dec. 19.

Northwest reporters strike for better pay

SEATTLE (AP) — The city's two daily newspapers prepared for a strike early Tuesday after the union representing hundreds of editorial, advertising and circulation workers voted for a walkout.

The Pacific Northwest Newspaper Guild, which represents 1,000 employees, has been without a labor contract since July 22. Union members voted for the strike action after a long meeting late Monday night.

"The members overwhelmingly voted to turn down the federal mediator's proposal to hold off for two days," said Larry Hatfield, administrative officer of the Guild.

The union last struck the Seattle Post-Intelligencer in 1936 and The Seattle Times

in 1953.

The two papers, which negotiate under a joint operating agreement, said they have hired temporary employees and would count on non-union members and managers to publish during a strike.

"There are no winners in a strike," Times President Mason Sizemore said. "The newspaper suffers, the readers suffer and the employees suffer."

The Times began boarding up its main downtown building Monday and removed newspaper boxes out front. Suburban newspapers planned to publish additional copies if there was a strike.

The strike deadline was timed for the advertising-rich holiday period from Thanksgiving to Christmas. The

Times put some advertising inserts planned for Thanksgiving editions in Monday papers.

The 104-year-old Times and the 137-year-old Post-Intelligencer have been in an increasingly heated circulation war since the Times switched to morning distribution in March. The Times, a Blethen family enterprise that is 49.5 percent owned by Knight Ridder, publishes 225,700 copies daily. Its Hearst-owned competitor has a daily circulation of 175,800.

Currently, the average minimum wage for a Guild-member reporter with six years' experience is \$844.88 per week, or \$21.12 per hour.

The Guild had sought a three-year contract with an overall raise of \$6.15 per hour. But the union lowered its demand to \$3.25 over three years, Hatfield said.

Otto Olson celebrated his 105th birthday at a party Saturday afternoon in the Lamar Room of King's Manor Methodist Home with family and friends in attendance.

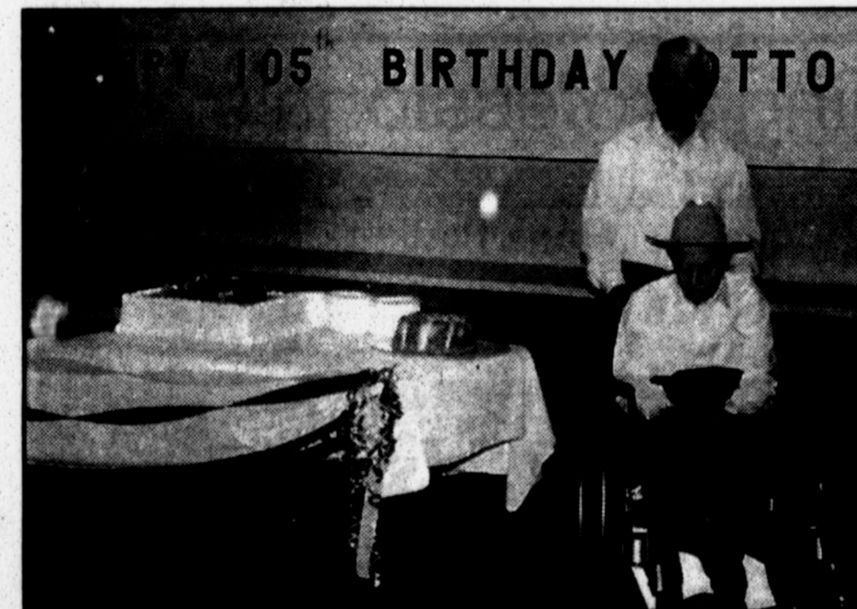
Mr. Olson was born Nov. 20, 1895, to Ole and Louisa Olson, whose families settled around Gilman, Iowa, from Norway.

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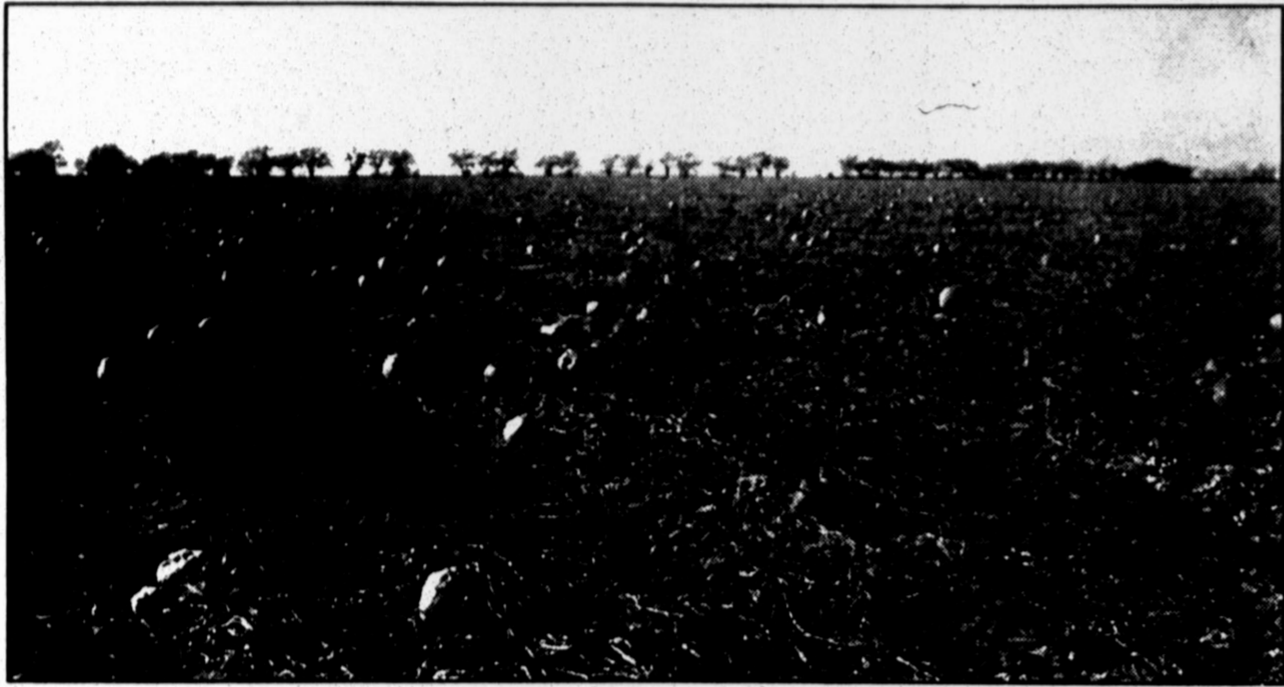

Orange orbs sign of season

WASHINGTON, D.C. — 'Tis the season of the great orange orb! From the fields and gardens come pumpkins of all shapes and sizes—some big and prized, others small and cherished, still others are down right funny looking. Looking at a sea of orange at the local farm stand can be overwhelming—but like love at first sight—you know the right pumpkin when you see it.

Members of Historic Hotels of America offer ideas, tips and recipes for using pumpkins throughout the fall season.

Executive Chef Jim Boyan of the Jekyll Island Club Hotel in Jekyll Island, Ga., offers hints for selecting the perfect pumpkin. First, determine the purpose. If you are choosing a pumpkin for cooking, select a smaller "sweet" or "pie" pumpkin. The flesh is much sweeter and the water content is less. Boyan adds that regardless of how the pumpkin will be used, choose one that has a stem at least 2-3 inches long. Anything less means quicker decay.

Chef Garde-Manger Walter Dickerson and Lead Cook Garde-Manger Jon Nyholm from The Brown Palace Hotel in Denver, share a creative idea for carving. Make a butternut squash bud vase for a fall centerpiece. Slice part of the base (largest part) of this bell-shaped squash off at the bottom to allow it to stand sturdily. Then slice off the stem top. Using a small melon baller, scoop out the center of the squash, keeping the hole narrow and in the center. Arrange fresh or dried flowers inside and arrange on a table with miniature pumpkins and other gourds.

Almond Raisin Pumpkin Bread

From the kitchen of: Chef Josef Zimmerman, The Pfister Hotel, Milwaukee, Wis.

Number of servings: One loaf

- Ingredients:**
 1 1/2 cup sugar
 1/2 cup applesauce
 1/2 cup water
 2 eggs
 3 ounces raisins
 2 ounces roasted almonds
 1 cup canned pumpkin
 1 2/3 cups flour "sifted"
 1 teaspoon cinnamon
 3/4 teaspoon salt

- 1/2 teaspoon baking powder
 1/4 teaspoon nutmeg
 1/4 teaspoon cloves

Instructions:

Combine the first seven ingredients in a small bowl and beat well. In a separate bowl, combine remaining ingredients and mix well. Gradually add pumpkin mixture and beat well. Use a non-stick pan. (The best is a 9" X 5" loaf pan). Bake at 350 degrees for 60 to 65 minutes or until toothpick inserted in the middle comes out clean. Let cool for at least 30 minutes. Chef's Tip: Day old pumpkin bread makes delicious French toast.

Tossed Mixed Greens with Pumpkin Seed Oil and Pumpkin Chips

From the kitchen of: The Chefs from the Renaissance Vinoy Resort and Golf Club, St. Petersburg, Fla.

Number of servings: 4

Ingredients:

- 3 1/2 ounces selection of fresh mixed greens
 3 ounces pumpkin seed oil*
 1/4 ounce pumpkin chips**
 1 cup medium diced tomatoes
 To taste Kosher salt and freshly ground black pepper
 1/2 cup toasted pumpkin seeds

Instructions:

Place mixed greens in mixing bowl. Drizzle with 2 ounces pumpkin seed oil, Kosher salt, fresh ground black pepper and toss lightly. Divide tossed greens onto four chilled plates. Place equal amounts of diced tomatoes and drizzle remaining pumpkin seed oil around mixed greens. Garnish with pumpkin chips and toasted pumpkin seeds. Serve immediately.

*Pumpkin Seed Oil

Add 1 cup of toasted pumpkin seeds, coarsely chopped mixed with 1 1/2 cups of canola oil. Place on stove and heat to approximately 120 degrees and let steep for one hour. Cool and place into refrigerator for 12 hours. Then remove from refrigerator, strain through fine mesh strainer. Pumpkin seed oil can also be found at specialty food markets.

**Pumpkin Chips

Cut 6 inch long piece of fresh pumpkin without the rind. Slice length wise approximately 1/4 inch thick. Heat oil to 300 degrees Fahrenheit, lightly dust sliced pumpkin with seasoned rice

flour, shake off any excess flour, and place into hot oil and fry until golden brown. Remove from oil, drain on paper towels and season with salt and pepper. Place chips into airtight container.

An Excellent Pumpkin Pie
 From the kitchen of: David Wolf, Executive Chef Park Hyatt Philadelphia at the Bellevue, Philadelphia

Number of servings: 1 pie serves 8

Ingredients for the Pastry:

- 1 1/2 cups flour
 1/4 teaspoon salt
 1/2 cup vegetable shortening (chilled)
 Ice water as needed

Instructions for the Pastry:

Sift flour and salt together. Cut in shortening with a pastry cutter until mixture resembles coarse meal.

Add 1 tablespoon of ice water at a time, up to 5 tablespoons, as needed, mixing until dough holds together. Form into a ball, wrap in plastic wrap and refrigerate for 1 hour.

Roll out dough into a 12" round on a floured surface then ease into a 9" pie pan. Trim edges allowing a 1/2" overhang. Then fold edge under the crimp of flute.

Ingredients for the Filling:

- 3/4 cup granulated sugar
 1 tablespoon packed golden sugar
 1 tablespoon cornstarch
 2 teaspoon fresh ground cinnamon
 3/4 teaspoon fresh ground ginger
 1/4 teaspoon salt
 3/4 cup sour cream
 3/4 cup whipping cream
 3 large beaten eggs
 16 ounces solid pack pumpkin (can) or (18 ounces fresh roasted pumpkin puree)

Instructions for the Filling:

Using a whisk, mix first 6 ingredients in a bowl until no lumps remain. Blend in pumpkin, whipping cream, sour cream and eggs. Add to pie crust and bake for 20 minutes at 400 degrees, then reduce heat to 350 degrees and continue baking until filling is set (approximately 30 minutes). Cool before serving. Cut the pie into 8 sections. Place in the center of a 10" plate with fall theme colors. Pipe a rosette of cinnamon whipped cream atop the pie and sprinkle with chopped hazelnut praline and drizzle with maple caramel.

2000 Herd performed with pride

The 2000 season is over, but the excitement the Hostile Herd shared with the community through a District 3-4A championship and playoff run this year will always be remembered by their die-hard fans and faithful Hereford bleacher creatures.

If the Whiteface football players have any doubts about whether or not the town is proud of them, they need only flash back to Saturday's game in Canyon where the home side at the Buffalo Bowl was almost entirely full. Yes, the Hereford faithful would have liked to have seen their Whitefaces prevail in the bi-district playoff, but they are proud of their favorite team regardless of the outcome.

I felt like it was a great and successful year for the Herd. Being a first time Hereford Whiteface fan was truly a unique experience by getting to know several of the players and coaches while covering games during 2000 season. It was challenging to cover a Game 1 loss to Tascosa in September for my first story, but it helped that the loss quickly turned into a catapult for the Whitefaces who would eventually go on to win nine straight football games before falling in a dazzling 43-36 heartbreaker to Wolforth Frenship in Canyon that killed the hopes for a state championship.

After losing to the Rebels, the 2000 Hostile Herd beat Big Spring, Frenship and, despite several injuries to key players, swept District 3-4A to complete the comeback while also making the difficult game of football look so easy.

During my first interviews with players and coaches, it did not take long for me to realize the Herd not only would go out on Fridays and play hard, but would also show their character on the field, where they left everything, including pieces of their hearts, with every game.

Several Hereford seniors demonstrated the kind of heart the team was made of. Fans got to see an injury-plagued senior quarterback, Cody Hodges, play with a pulled groin for three games, a bad shoulder on his throwing arm and even a concussion against Borger. Senior noseguard Kris Hammerbeck came back to play against Frenship despite missing three games from a banged-up knee that had to be scoped to repair torn cartilage. Hereford senior Ramiro Zambrano strained several knee ligaments against Borger but came back in time for the end of the district season and playoffs.

I am sure many other players had other nagging bumps and bruises, but I think these three seniors showed the courage and determination it takes to help their team win no matter the cost.

Hereford also witnessed the emergence of many other young Hereford weapons, including junior receiver Geoffrey Marquez, junior cornerback and receiver Cody Marsh, sophomore linebacker Derek Mendoza, junior cornerback Juan Ayala, junior offensive guard Andrew Carnahan, and junior tailback Juan DeSantiago. Season-ending injuries to DeSantiago (broken leg) and Mendoza (broken collarbone) hurt the Herd, but the two juniors will be back next year to make the 2001 Hereford Whitefaces proud.

Despite the Saturday's loss and unfulfilled hopes, Hereford should be proud of its team and their seniors.

for another. Briles broke free for a 63-yard score in the second quarter on a fourth-

down option play to put the Tigers up 29-14 and dishearten the Whitefaces.

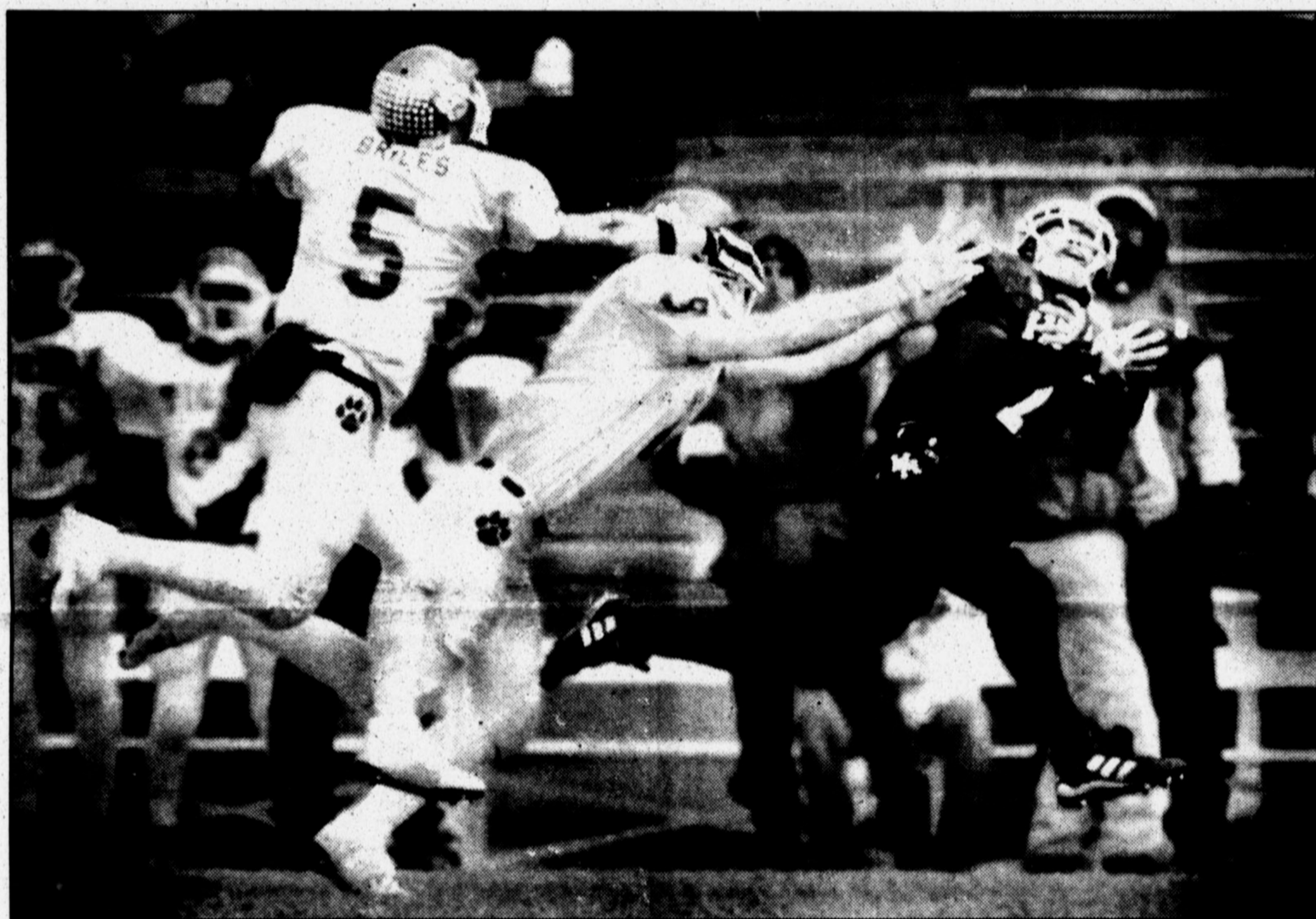

Hereford senior Landon

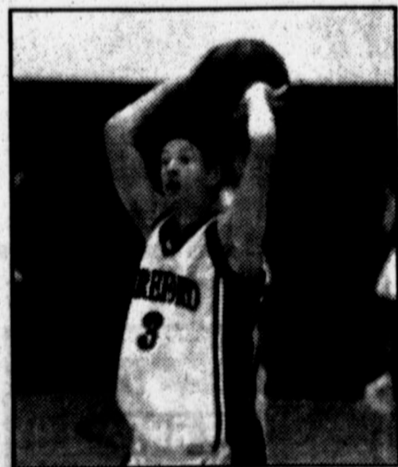
Noland led the Hereford team with 16 points on the evening, followed by sophomore Wade McNutt who scored seven points to help Hereford's cause.

The varsity squad is playing without many of last year's returning lettermen, but Dean will get many of them back

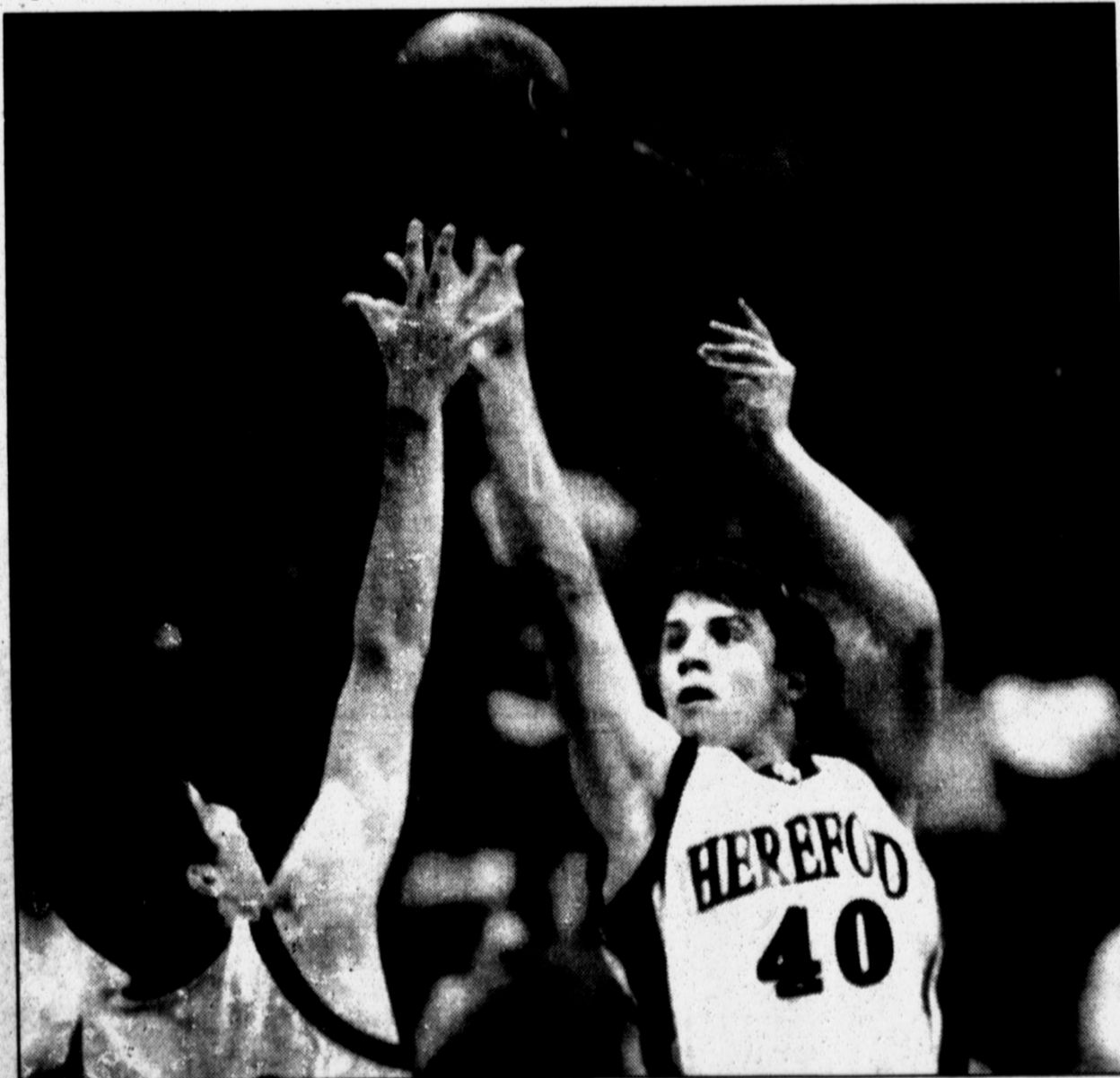
now that the football season has run its course. Dean said he is proud of the way his team has been playing though.

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Sixers reach 11-0 Arizona still tops in college poll

Philadelphia wins by 24 points to take down celtics 114-90

PHILADELPHIA (AP)—The Philadelphia 76ers didn't have much difficulty improving to 10-0.

They led by 15 at halftime, by 23 in the third and won by 24.

"Everybody wants to be the first team to beat us now," Allen Iverson said after scoring 26 points to help Philadelphia extend its best-ever start with a 114-90 victory over Boston. "When you start breaking franchise records, everybody wants to beat you."

Iverson added eight assists and Eric Snow had 12, and Theo Ratliff scored 21 points for the Sixers, whose previous best start was 8-0 in 1979-80.

"I don't get caught up in wins and losses," coach Larry Brown said. "It's nice to get some in the bank, though."

Eric Williams had 22 points for Boston, which never got closer than 11 in the second half.

"Tough day at the office," center Tony Battie shrugged as he left the locker room following his 15-point, 12-rebound performance.

In other games, Charlotte crushed Toronto 100-64, Dallas downed Utah 107-98, Denver edged Vancouver 95-92 and New Jersey beat the Los Angeles Clippers 86-85.

Celtics coach Rick Pitino said his team played its worst

game of the season. "No one knows the 3-point shot (like me). I've lived with it since its inception," Pitino said after his team shot just 5-of-25 from 3-point range. "It can be a weapon, but it can also be your enemy."

Aaron McKie scored 16 of his 17 points in the second quarter — eight of them in a row as the Sixers mounted a 10-0 run that helped open a 59-44 halftime lead. Philadelphia, which rallied from third-quarter deficits with 18-0 runs in each of its two previous games, then scored 10 of the first 12 points in the second half to open a 23-point lead, 69-46.

Hornets 100, Raptors 64
At Toronto, Jamal Mashburn scored 25 points and Charlotte held Toronto to the lowest point total in franchise history.

The Raptors shot a franchise-worst 27 percent from the field. Vince Carter made just seven of 22 shots, finishing with a team-high 20 points.

P.J. Brown had 14 points and nine rebounds, while Charlotte rookie Jamaal Magloire — a Toronto native — had 16 points and eight rebounds.

The Hornets, who shot 52 percent, have won two straight after losing their previous five.

Mavericks 107, Jazz 98
At Salt Lake City, Michael Finley scored 29 points and Steve Nash had 17 points and a career-high 17 assists.

Former Jazz guard Howard

Eisley, who signed as a free agent with Dallas, made two free throws with 50.5 seconds remaining and Nash added two more with 32.8 seconds left to preserve the victory.

Dirk Nowitzki added 20 points for the Mavericks.

Bryon Russell led the Jazz with 17 points and Jacque Vaughn came off the bench for 15 points. John Stockton scored 14 and Karl Malone was held to 13 points, the third time in the past four games he has been held to 15 or less.

Nuggets 95, Grizzlies 92
At Vancouver, Antonio McDyess scored 21 points and grabbed 10 rebounds while Nick Van Exel had 20 points and a season-high 14 assists as Denver won on the road for the first time this season.

Vancouver had a chance to tie it, but a 3-pointer by Shareef Abdur-Rahim hit the rim at the buzzer. The Nuggets moved one game over .500 (6-5) for the first time since they were 17-16 last season on Jan. 10.

The Grizzlies were led by Abdur-Rahim's 19 points and 14 rebounds. Mike Bibby had 18 points. Bryant Reeves had 11 of his season-high rebounds in the first half.

Nets 86, Clippers 85
At Los Angeles, Stephon Marbury scored 28 points and rookie Kenyon Martin had 19 points and 15 rebounds as New Jersey gained its third straight victory.

Lamar Odom led the Clippers with 24 points, including

a 3-pointer that sliced New Jersey's lead to one with 2.1 seconds to play. Johnny Newman missed both free throws at the other end, but the Clippers — who committed 21 turnovers following a 30-turnover debacle in Saturday's loss to Seattle 1/8 had no timeouts left and couldn't get off a final shot.

Marbury reached the 20-point mark for the ninth consecutive game.

Wildcats lead over Duke slims to only one point

ARIZONA (AP)—It's as close as it can be at the top of the Associated Press college basketball poll.

Arizona, one of only three ranked teams not to have played in the opening 11 days of the season, was still No. 1 in the Top 25 on Monday, but the Wildcats' lead over Duke was down to one point.

Duke (2-0), which beat Princeton and Villanova to advance to the semifinals of the Preseason NIT, was 16 points behind in the first poll of the regular season.

The Wildcats went into Monday's opening-round game of the Maui Invitational against Chaminade without 7-foot-1 senior center Loren Woods. The preseason All-America was suspended for six games for an undisclosed violation of NCAA rules and didn't make the trip to Hawaii.

Arizona received 33 first-place votes and 1,654 points from the national media panel, while Duke was No. 1 on 30 ballots. Last week Arizona had 35 first-place votes, 14 more than Duke.

Kansas (3-0), which beat North Dakota 92-61 in its only game last week, moved up one place to third, while Michigan State (1-0), which opened its season Sunday with a 97-61 victory over Oakland, Mich., dropped one spot to fourth. The Spartans, the defending national champions, received four first-place votes.

Maryland was the only other team to get a first-place vote.

From Page A1 Ogallala Aquifer within the region;

Examining ground water quality for all uses in the region; Continuing public awareness about the regional water planning effort; and Developing specific information about a proposed regional water distribution pipeline network to transport water from Hartley and/or Roberts County to towns, cities and industries in the Llano Estacado Water Planning region. Wyatt said mayors, city managers and public utility directors within the Llano Estacado Water Planning Group will discuss the regional water distribution network at 10 a.m. Dec. 7 at the High Plains Underground Water Conservation District office in Lubbock.

"We contacted these entities a few months ago to see if they were interested in participating in a regional water pipeline project as outlined in the draft water management plan. Of the 46 entities contacted, 42 responded favorably," Wyatt said. The meeting, which is open to the public, will give the planning group an opportunity to discuss the issue before the start of the 77th Texas Legislature in January 2001.



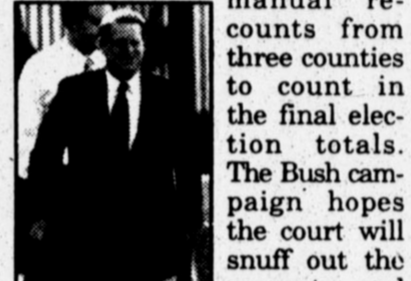

From Page A1 justices, he added, are "aware that this is a matter of utmost and vital importance to our nation our state and our world."

There was no disputing that, given that the winner of the battle for Florida's 25 electoral votes, either the Republican governor of Texas or the Democratic vice president, stands to become the nation's 43rd president on Jan. 20.

Neither Wells nor any of the other six high court justices gave any indication of when the court might issue a ruling on whether to allow manual recounts from three counties to count in the final election totals.



Al Gore the court will give them a legal imprimatur, and provide a standard for recount officials to employ.

The justices worked under one timetable as canvassing boards in Broward, Palm Beach and Miami-Dade counties labored on their own schedules to conduct the hand counts the Gore campaign wants.

Palm Beach County resumed its count Tuesday; Broward and Miami-Dade are, too. Bush's official lead stands at 930 votes in statewide results that Secretary of State Katherine Harris has been barred from certifying. Gore picked up 166 votes in manual recounts conducted Monday, which if accepted would reduce Bush's margin to 764.

Gore hopes to overtake his rival in the three heavily Democratic counties where he has propelled the recounts forward.

When the counting stopped Monday evening the situation looked like this: Miami-Dade County: With 67 of 614 precincts recounted, Gore had gained 46 votes over last week's official vote totals.

Broward County: With 544 of 609 precincts recounted plus 139 absentee ballots, Gore had gained 117 votes.

Palm Beach County: With 103 of 531 precincts recounted by hand, Gore had gained three votes.

That represented a net gain of 166 votes for Gore if the recounts are valid.

Developments in the counting rooms bordered on chaotic at times, a sharp contrast to the crisp proceedings that Wells conducted in the high court in Tallahassee.

All seven justices peppered lawyers with questions about a deadline in the state law for certifying results as well as contradictory directives.

company, several other cities, including Lubbock, contested the agreement. The Texas Railroad Commission recently set a rate increase of \$4.4 million, which those cities that did not settle will have to pay.

"I think the mayor of Lubbock could have taken some lessons from Chester," Josseland said. Although the Hereford High School football and volleyball squads were knocked out of the playoff picture, Josseland said he believed the city should make a gesture of appreciation for this year's athletic accomplishments.

Josseland suggested meeting with school superintendent Beth Abernethy to see if a time could be set aside for an assembly. The city would present certificates to the two squads "to express our appreciation to the kids for how they performed all year."

He asked for a consensus from the commissioners on pursuing the idea. There was no dissent.

Cumpton, a former Hereford High School football coach, noted the attendance at Saturday's bi-district football game in Canyon. Cumpton said the Hereford side at Kimbrough Stadium was nearly full, while there were only about 1,000 fans on the Wolforth Frenship side.

"The people in Hereford don't really know how much that (support) means to those young folks. We need to also thank the people of Hereford for their support. It's above and beyond," Cumpton said.

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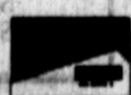
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
