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



WORKING CHUTE

Holt's road to hospital was winding

eorge W. Bush and Al Gore probably wish they could get a promotion as easily and as quickly as Ray Holt.

In June 1998, Holt was hired as a respiratory therapist at Hereford Regional Medical Center. After one day on the job, he was promoted to manager of the department.

"If hindsight is 20-20, I don't know if their eyesight was in focus," Holt said with a laugh.

As department manager Holt said the staff is too small to call him a director — Holt oversees the work of one other fulltime and five part-time therapists. The other full-time therapist is John Sappington.

"I'm pretty new as a respiratory therapist — I've only been in it since 1989," Holt said. "Before that, I managed a fertilizer company, and before that I was in farming and ranching in southwest Kansas. Before that, I was a teacher in Rochester, N.Y. Who

knows? My career may be different a year from now.

He is originally from Moscow, a small town of about 200 in southwestern Kansas. He earned his bachelor's degree in biology, with a secondary degree in education, from Ottawa University and "got a job teaching right out of college in Rochester, N.Y.'

He taught special education for

two years in Rochester before moving back to Kansas, where he was in farming and ranching for 14 years.

"After I got through teaching school in Rochester, I came back to southwest Kansas — to homefolk, that's where I was born and raised - and stayed in farming and ranching for 14 years until the banker said enough is enough," he said.

"After taking a battery of tests, I

learned I should take something in the health field or go back to farming and ranching. I walked into the junior college there in Liberal and the director of respiratory therapy was the first guy to catch me, so ...," Holt said.

Although he's no longer in the farming and ranching business, Holt still enjoys that life, and tells a story about one of his first patients at St. Anthony's (now Baptist St. Anthony) in Amarillo.

When he saw his patient, Holt said he "noticed he was wearing an old pair of cowboy boots that looked like they lived in the corral, all cracked and green, and he was nervous. When I drew out that needle (to draw blood for blood gas test), he kinda looked at it and I said, 'Well, it's all right, I learned my bedside manner in a working chute. If he could have flown, he would have gone out that fourth-floor window.'

"Anytime that I get somebody I know is involved in farming and ranching, that's one of the things I bring up, you know, that I learned my bedside manner in a working chute," he said.

In looking at his job at HRMC, Holt said his department's one drawback is lack of a backup. However, that is outweighed by the advantage to the patients.

"In my department, if you need

■ Dimmitt police search for man seen carrying a gun near school campus

DIMMITT - Dimmitt school officials ordered an all-school lockdown about 8:30 a.m. Friday after the school nurse at Dimmit Middle School reported seeing a man carry-

ing a gun across from the campus. According to the Castro County emergency dispatcher, the caller identified the man as a light-complexioned Hispanic, about 5-9 and weighing 250 pounds. He was wearing a red baseball cap, black jacket and blue jeans and was carrying rifle.



No shots were ever fired and dispatcher said there were no reports of the man even pointing the

gun towards the school. School officials closed and locked all exterior doors as well as the internal doors. Parents were allowed to pick up students, but they were required to wait in their cars while law enforcement officers and school officials verified the adults were authorized to take the children. Cars lined the city streets, sometimes as many as 50 cars deep. Children who were not picked up remained in school and were later escorted to school buses for transportation to their homes.

Castro County Sheriff's personnel. Dimmitt police officers and Texas Department of Public Safety troopers responded to the call and cordoned off the area surrounding all Dimmitt campuses.

School officials said that classes will resume on Monday. Officers will be on hand to form a perimeter around all campuses.

As of 10 a.m. today, law enforcement departments were still looking for the suspect. Anyone with information regarding the suspect is asked to call the Dimmitt Police Department at 64-4545.

Bosnians vote is seen as showdown with nationalists

SARAJEVO, Bosnia-Herzegovina-Bosnians chose national and regional leaders Saturday in an electoral showdown between reformers and the hard-line, ethnically based parties that led the country to war eight years ago. After Balkan neighbors Yugoslavia and Croatia shed their war-time leaderships, international administrators have been urging Bosnians to follow suit and elect pro-democracy candidates the officials hope will mend the nation's ethnic divisions. Bosnia's Serbs, Muslims and Croats started lining up before the 3,600 polling stations around the country opened at 7 a.m. The first official results were expected Sunday. There are 2.5 million registered voters. Final, official results could take weeks. The main issue is whether Bosnians will turn to new leaders or cling to ethnically oriented parties that have held power since the start of a 31/2-year war in

Five Palestinians, Israeli killed in Mideast violence

JERUSALEM- Violent clashes in the West Bank and the Gaza Strip claimed the lives of five Palestinians and an Israeli soldier, as Palestinian leader Yasser Arafat pressed his bid for U.N. protection for his people, despite U.S. and Israeli opposition. Fears of an escalation in the fighting hung over preparations for talks Sunday between President Clinton and Israeli Prime Minister Ehud Barak at the White House.

Rebels, government agree to Sierra Leone cease-fire

ABUJA, Nigeria — A cease-fire reached in Sierra Leone was in doubt Saturday after a rebel leader said that the deal was no guarantee of an end to the West African nation's nine-year civil war. Sierra Leone's government and leaders of the brutal rebel movement agreed Friday to a 30-day cease-fire, and for U.N. peacekeepers to deploy in rebel territory, including lucrative diamond mines.

Dems hope some electors will bolt

NEW YORK (AP) — In elections date," said Pennsylvania Democratic past, the occasional renegade in the Electoral College broke with his state and voted his desire - George Wallace got a vote that way in 1968. Ronald Reagan did in 1976, even Lloyd Bentsen got one in '88.

This time, with the final electoral margin potentially just a few votes, a so-called "faithless elector" or three

could swing the election. So some Democrats are speaking out to encourage Bush-pledged electors to switch their votes in the Electoral College to the nation's apparent popular-vote winner, Al Gore. "Do what's right for the country,

and not what's right for a candi-

state Rep. T.J. Rooney. "The process is arcane, it's not based upon the premise our country is founded on."

In Florida, especially, electors should re-examine the will of the people considering the problems that have surfaced, said Wisconsin Democratic state Sen. Bob Jauch.

But despite strong words from these and other Democrats, none said they are actively seeking out GOP electors to change their vote.

"I would hope others are out there doing God's work," said Rooney, who worked on behalf of Gore in Pennsylvania.

The Gore campaign in Nashville

said it was closing for the Veterans Day holiday and couldn't answer questions. And a prominent Florida Democrat said in no uncertain terms that party leaders were not encouraging renegades.

Republicans scoff at the sugges-

"It's a real sham," said Cindy Costa, a Republican elector from South Carolina. "It's not going to happen. (Republicans) elect people they know are very committed to the philosophy and ideology of the Republican Party."

The political parties each choose a slate of electors - a total of 538, one for each senator and for each

House member, so bigger states get more (like Florida, with 25 electors) and smaller ones less (like South Carolina, with eight).

When one candidate wins that w state's popular vote, their party's electors are then certified. (Except for Maine and Nebraska, which allocate electors depending on the overall popular vote and votes within congressional districts).

On Dec. 18, the electors will gather in their individual states and cast their votes. Only 26 states require electors to vote for the candidate they're pledged to - the other 24 and the District of Columbia could, in theory, switch.

The normal respiratory problems that accompany the flu season are aggravated by the air pollution emanating from the feedyards that sur-round Hereford.

"That (feedyard pollution) is a never-ending problem for a commu-nity like Hereford. You have the pollution from the dust and the dirt. It's certainly a negative for our community, I think. But you try to

take care of it as best you can," Holt said. "It's hard to keep that balance when you know that all

that economy is coming from the feedlots and then look at the negativity of the air pollution ...'

The feedyard pollution is particularly severe among children and the elderly, "especially if they have something else going on, like they're long-term smokers,' he said.

"My major goal when I came here, and that thankfully I have reached, was to bring respiratory skills and respiratory therapists that have the skills to operate in multi-faceted situation, which is a small hospital,"

Holt said. "We do OB, we do cardiac, we do ventilator, we do floor therapy anything that has to do with breathing. From trauma on down, we're involved with it.

"It's been good for my career that I was doing other things before I got into the medical field. It gives you an idea that you're part of a team and not just there to carry out orders. You have input and that's what I try to emphasize with my fellow staffers. Their knowledge and information is valuable for the care of the patients," he sa d.

Cold War vets get recognition

At a time when the veterans of the "forgotten war" in Korea are finally getting rec-ognition for their service, where thousands of people daily stop and reflect at the Vietnam War Memorial in Washington, D.C., the veter-ans of the Cold War also are receiving notice from their country.

In 1998, the U.S. defense secretary approved awarding Cold War Recognition Certificates to all members of the armed forces, including the National Guard and reserves, and qualified government civilian personnel who served the nation during the Cold War era, Sept. 2, 1945-Dec. 26, 1991.

The applicants must certify their service was "faithful and honorable," and they also must provide documentation that shows they served during the Cold War era. For deceased veterans, the certificate may be awarded to relatives who

apply.

The certificate may be requested by use of U.S. or international forms found at the Army's Cold War webpage, http://coldwar.army.mil, It is a secure site, but anyone who doesn't feel comfortable providing a Social Security number online can obtain the form by mail.

A request must contain the words "I certify that my service was honorable and faithful," or it will be rejected.

Supporting documentation, which must be submitted with the request, includes military service number, foreign ser-



vice number or Social Security number, a copy of a DD-214, which is the military service record, or a DD-215, which is a corrected version of that document. National Guard members should provide the statement of service equivalent, NGB Form 22.



Networks stumbled

Getting there "fustest with the mostest." as Confederate Gen. Nathan Bedford Forrest said, might be a good idea for battle, but it's not always a good idea for television networks.

The TV networks found this out to their chagrin Tuesday night when they announced Florida had gone for Democrat Al Gore in the presidential election, only to have to pull back that projection and declare the race too close to call.

The networks would later announce that Republican George W. Bush had won Florida — only to have to back off again and declare the race undecided.

The mistakes by the networks, which make their projections based on exit polls conducted by Voter News Service, are largely their own fault.

We've all seen the TV spots, where an anchor person announces his or her network (or local station) was the first to report a breaking news story. This desire to always be first is driven by ratings, which determine advertising revenue.

In striving to always be first, the media are failing to adhere to the first rule of journalism, which says to be sure of your facts before going with a story.

Sometimes it's better to be second with the correct information than to be first and have to eat crow.

System still works

We predict that Texas Gov. George W. Bush will rightly assume his place as the 43rd president of the United States when 6 million Florida ballots and absentee votes are canvassed for the final time, certified and announced to the nation no later than Nov. 17, according to the most recent estimates afforded by the state's election officials.

By Friday, fewer than 400 votes separated Bush and Vice President Al Gore from 25 electoral votes needed to secure the presidency — the furor over which has heightened the nation's interest in this Election 2000 race and further honed the timeless idiom that "every vote counts".

That a recount was made necessary in this stunningly close race between Bush and Gore, is a shining example of the world's oldest democracy in progress and also a telling statement for two candidates who, for whatever reasons, had difficulty in assimilating sweeping favor with the nation's electorate.

Neither candidate will enjoy an absolute mandate, no matter who wins the presidency. Ironically, Gore may win the popular vote, but his harvest of electoral votes didn't include any from his own home state of Tennessee. Bush is wearing a shiner, too, sweating out the electoral vote from a state that should have been delivered to him on a silver platter by his brother, Florida Gov. Jeb Bush.

But while it is certainly the candidates' right to ask for recounts in states where voting margins were inordinately slight, both candidates should be prepared to endorse and abide by the results of those recounts without challenge of the integrity of state election codes, or the united voice represented by the Electoral College.

To do otherwise would only erode confidence in an election system that, despite some imperfections, has withstood all the just and legal tests thrown before it.

The loser is Republican nominee George W. Bush, who will be moving into the White House through the back door.

Bush, who will become the first son of a president since John Quincy Adams in 1824 to be elected president, lost the popular vote to Democratic nominee Al Gore, although he becomes president because of his narrow victory in the Electoral College.

When he takes office Jan. 20, 2001, Bush will find himself in a weak position politically because he was not the voters' first choice for president. This is ironic because Republicans have been contending for eight years that Democrat Bill Clinton lacked the "man-

date" to govern because he failed to capture a majority vote in 1992 and 1996, although Clinton did win landslides in the Electoral College.

Bush also is a loser because his name on the ballot didn't help out Republican candidates in the U.S. House and Senate. Although the Republicans retained control of the House, their narrow majority grew even more slim. In the Senate, the GOP saw a 54-46 margin erased, with both parties holding 50 seats.

What this means is Bush will not be able to point to a popular vote victory or a convincing Electoral College victory in persuading members of Congress to accept his agenda instead of theirs.

And, he will have to govern under the shadow of Al Gore, the choice of the most voters. However, Gore can come out a big loser if he takes his campaign into the

Before this election, the Electoral College failed on only two occasions to produce a winner. When this happens, the Constitution dictates that the election of the president be decided by the House of Representatives.

tives. In 1800, neither Thomas Jefferson nor

Aaron Burr received a majority in the Electoral College and the House elected Jefferson president.

The House also decided the election of 1824. Although Andrew Jackson won the popular vote and the electoral vote, he did not have a majority, so it was thrown into the House, which elected John Quincy Adams.

In 1876, Republican nominee Rutherford B. Hayes thought he had lost the election to Democrat Samuel Tilden. However, some of the Southern states, among them Florida, submitted two sets of electoral votes. An electoral commission, appointed by Congress and consisting of eight Republicans and seven Democrats, awarded all disputed votes to Hayes, allowing him to become president by an electoral vote.

In 1888, President Grover Cleveland lost re-election to Republican challenger Benjamin Harrison, even though his popular vote total was larger. Cleveland did revenge in 1892, when he defeated Harrison, both in the popular vote and in the Electoral Col-

So, while the process might be messy, it worked and produced a clear winner: the U.S. Constitution, which established the procedures that ensure a smooth transition of power from one administration to another.

Campaign started, driven by the polls

eorge W. Bush says he got the idea to run for president after an aide told him in the summer of 1997 that he was leading in the polls.

More than three years later, he was briefly — and prematurely — named the winner early Wednesday based on the TV networks' interpretation of exit polls. They later withdrew the projections as Florida announced a recount of its very close vote.

In between, there was a steady avalanche of polls, and no matter whether Republican Bush or Democrat Al Gore is the eventual winner, this presidential campaign and much of the media coverage of it was heavily influenced by that flood of polls.

"The campaign coverage was very poll-driven," said Tom Rosenstiel, director of the Project for Excellence in Journalism, noting that is often the case in presidential elections.

"The press sees everything through the prism of who's ahead or who's behind," he said. "The polls create the entire context. If a candidate is ahead and his plane gets a flat tire then it's not a story, if you're behind and your plane gets a flat tire it becomes a metaphor for your predicament."

For much of 2000, Bush could do no wrong

For much of 2000, Bush could do no wrong in the polls. The public saw him as a stronger leader than Gore, more likable, with new ideas and strong on issues that Gore thought would be his strong points like education and even the economy.

even the economy.

Gore struggled in the polls and in the media coverage, which alternately described him both as too stiff and too flexible, saying he frequently changed his style — both personally and on the campaign trail.

"The polls set the stage for who's ahead and who's behind and that's where all the coverage fits in," said Stephen Hess of the Brookings Institution.

One of the frequent complaints from poll-

ters is how reporters use selected poll results

to highlight a story angle, rather than looking more broadly at a poll's findings in context. With the high number of polls this year, it wasn't hard to find a poll number to support almost any argument.

Andrew Kohut, director of the Pew Research Center for the People & the Press, argues the problem is not with the polls, but with the way they're used by the media. He says polls are less often used to show how people feel, but are used to develop a story line in what he calls a "tabloid form of reporting politics."

After the Democratic National Convention, Gore kissed his wife passionately, was described by friends and family as a solid citizen and gave a thorough speech explaining his stand on the issues.

He increased his standing in the polls and the coverage of Gore for the next month seemed to focus on his positives. Suddenly the Democrat was described as more likable and more of a leader. Bush, who was squabbling about different debate formats and was caught making uncomplimentary comments about a reporter, couldn't seem to do anything right—at least as far as the news coverage indicated.

at least as far as the news coverage indicated.

Then the candidates participated in the three debates and Gore modified his personality — first being too aggressive to suit many people, then too passive and finally "just right" — in the Goldilocks analogy used by Gore.

The attention given to numerous tracking polls that started in September and early October began to dominate the coverage, and some complain that they drowned out more thorough polls that examine why people support the candidates and what they want in the campaign.

Rosenstiel said some of the tracking polls are "quick and dirty polls done each night that usually don't ask underlying questions about

why people are voting the way they are."

"They ask who you are, are you a likely voter and which way are you leaning?" he

The agony of 'what ifs'

or Al Gore or George W. Bush, the agony of "what ifs," of second-guessers and hindsight await the loser in the presidential election so narrow that any of dozens of campaign calculations could have been the one that cost the White House. So it was for Richard M. Nixon and Hubert

H. Humphrey after their close defeats.

If, for example, Nixon hadn't worn himself out keeping an unwise pledge to campaign in all 50 states in 1960, while John F. Kennedy went where the electoral votes were. It was a mistake Nixon did not repeat when he won night years letter.

eight years later.

And for Humphrey, if he had found a way as vice president to declare independence from President Johnson in 1968 to avoid being overridden when he suggested he might part, even slightly, with the administration's war policy in Vietnam.

Both men reflected on their defeats in their memoirs, in words that etched the pain of losing so narrowly.

With the 2000 election hanging on a recount of the frail thread of votes by which Bush leads in Florida, where 25 electoral votes will elect a president, and with Gore narrowly leading in the national popular vote, the second guessing isn't awaiting the outcome.

Bush's spokeswoman Karen Hughes, asked Wednesday whether he now wishes he had spent more time campaigning in Florida, she said, "I'm sure there is plenty of time for that."

In Gore's case, the chorus of television talkers was appraising why he lost early Wednesday, before their networks decided that maybe he hadn't lost at all, that Florida was too close not to rescind the call they already had made for Bush.

Nixon, who defeated Humphrey in 1968, recounted some of his own second guessing in his campaign diary of 1972 — an election he won by a landslide for the term he had to resign in Watergate.

"If we had known then as much about how to campaign, etc., as we know now, we probably would have won in 1960," he wrote. In his memoirs, Nixon recounted his ver-

In his memoirs, Nixon recounted his version of the day after Kennedy beat him by about 0.2 percent of the popular vote, of being told of "massive vote frauds in Chicago and Texas."

"We had made a serious mistake in not

having taken precautions against such a situation and it was too late now," he wrote. He said a full recount could have taken up to half a year. "I could not subject the country to such a situation," he said.

Besides, what if he lost anyhow? "Charges

of sore loser would follow me through history and remove any possibility of a further political career."

Nixon said he had underestimated the new power of television in the 1960 campaign, complained that the national press had been slanted against him, and said that "I should have anticipated what was coming" in Kennedy campaign hard ball, which he called dirty tricks.

"I vowed that I would never again enter an election at a disadvantage by being vulnerable to them — or anyone — on the level of political tactics," he wrote.

He kept that vow. The dirty tricks of 1972 were the work of his people.

That was Nixon's landslide year. His close

call was over Humphrey, by 0.7 percent of the vote, in 1968, making it Humphrey's turn to reflect on what almost was.

"We have come so far so fast," Humphrey

wrote of his election day musing in his memoir, "The Education of a Public Man."

"No, we aren't," he said he'd told himself.
"Stop thinking that. I am so tired again."

And later that day:
"Vietnam is a mess ... Wonder why Johnson shot me down when I said that troops would be withdrawn in 1969. Ruined my credibility. Made me look like a damn fool. ..."

Later still. "I wonder if I should have blown the whistle on Anna Chennault and Nixon." That was the allegation that Nixon knew his allies were telling the South Vietnamese to hold tough about peace talks until after the election because they'd be in better bargaining shape with a Republican president.

shape with a Republican president.

Then the vote. "We're losing. We're losing. It's gone."

The morning after. Conceding. "Congratulations, Dick. Mr. President. ... He's gracious. That's about it. To lose to Nixon. Ye Gods. ... "We could have won it. We should have won

"We could have won it. We should have won it... There are some who didn't produce ... Got to hide the bitterness."

Humphrey got past it, returning in 1970 to the Senate, where he served until his death in 1978. He campaigned, futilely, for the 1972 Democratic presidential nomination.

After the unyielding intensity of a presidential campaign, the scars of the loser do not soon fade. And the scars never cut deeper than when the loss is so narrow as this one.

Texas turnout put at 51 percent

AUSTIN — Fifty-one percent of registered voters turned out Nov. 7 to cast ballots in the general election. Nearly 6.4 million Texans voted on election day and another 2.5 million cast ballots

during the early voting period. Terry County had the highest turnout with 76 percent or 6,209 of the 8,123 registered voters casting ballots. Loving County followed with 74 percent or 156 voters out of 211 registered.

The lowest turnout was in Dimmitt County, which trailed the rest of the state but nearly 12 percent. Only 19 percent of that county's 8,311 registered voters voted in the election.

In the presidential election Gov. George W. Bush captured 59 percent of the vote statewide to Vice President Al Gore's 38 percent. Green Party candidate Ralph Nader gar-nered nearly 2 percent of the Texas vote.

Texans overwhelming reelected Republican U.S. Sen. Kay Bailey Hutchison. She received 65 percent of the vote to Democratic challenger Gene Kelly's 32 percent.

Democrats came out on top in Texas' 30 congressional district races with all incumbents of both parties winning re-election. Texas has 17 Democrats and 13 Republicans in the U.S. House of Representatives.

Republicans retained two of the three seats on the Texas Railroad Commission. Commissioner Charles R. Matthews was re-elected and voters affirmed Gov. Bush appointee Chairman Michael L. Williams, who stepped into the position in December 1998 to fill the unexpired term of Carole Keeton Rylander, who vacated to become comptrol-

The three Republican incumbent Texas Supreme Court Justices Nathan Hecht, Priscilla Owen and Al Gonzales also kept their seats on the nine-member court.

Two Republicans, incumbent David Bradley and newcomer Cynthia A. Thornton, were elected to District 7 and District 10 respectively on the State Board of Education. District 10 Democrat Will Davis did not seek re-election. When the new term begins in January 2001, the board will be controlled by 10 Republicans and five Democrats.

The makeup of the Texas with the state. State Farm Senate remained the same with all incumbents winning

re-election. In the Texas House of Representatives, Republicans gained one seat, District 11.

In District 18, which covers part of East Texas, Democratic incumbent Rep. Dan Ellis earned 51 percent of the vote to fend off Republican challenger Ben Bius. The longtime Democratic district became a hotly contested race in Polk County. Only a week before the election, a state judge cleared the way for a group of recreational vehicle owners to vote in Polk County. The predominantly Republican RV owners live part of the year near Lake Livingston and claim their vehicles as residences.

State Farm, the nation's largest auto insurance provider, has agreed to refund an estimated \$3.1 million to insured drivers in Texas.



Veteran CNN anchorman reports he will leave network

NEW YORK (AP) — Bernard Shaw, chief anchorman for most major stories during CNN's 20-year history, said Friday he will leave the network early next year to write books and spend more time with his family.

Shaw, 60, planned to tell viewers his decision Friday at the end of "Inside Politics," the daily show he anchors with Judy Woodruff.

Along with Larry King and Christiane Amanpour, Shaw is the most visible face on the cable news network. He's been there since the beginning, leaving a job as reporter for ABC News to join CNN in 1980 when it was an idea, not a network.

"Harder than entering this business is leaving it and leaving CNN," he said. "But you know, some roses are so fragrant. And as a gardener, I want to grow and smell them more, when I'm not writing."

Shaw's reports from Baghdad at the beginning of

the Gulf War in 1991, with bombs bursting outside his hotel window, were arguably the pivotal moment in establishing CNN as a network many Americans turn to during major sto-

He was the last of the remaining chief on-air recloud after the retracted

Tailwind story, which accused the U.S. military of using nerve gas on Vietnam Warera defectors, and John Holliman died in a car crash in 1998.

As a moderator of a 1988

presidential debate between George Bush and Michael Dukakis, Shaw grabbed headlines with his opening ques-tion: "Governor, if Kitty Dukakis were raped and murdered, would you favor an irrevocable death penalty for the killer?" Dukakis' unemotional response was widely criticized.

Shaw will leave when his contract expires Feb. 28, 2001. He said he may be enticed into occasional on-air work, and network founder Ted Turner said Shaw "will alv ays have a home at CNN."

"Bernie Shaw is one of a handful of CNN 'founders' who helped take 24-hour news from an exciting concept 20 years ago to a fact of life for one billion people around the globe today," Turner said.

Many of his colleagues "thought I was crazy" for leaving ABC to work at CNN, he said. "I thought it was the last frontier in network television news."

He grew up in Chicago and wanted to be a journalist since he was 13. Shaw set a goal of working for CBS News by age 30, and missed it by a year. He was a CBS correspondent in Washington from 1971 to 1977 before leaving for ABC.

"Bernie brought credibility," said Tom Johnson, chairman of the CNN News Group.



Our love was brand new then, but in the spring, My habit is greeting it with a type Of verse like the nightingale begins to sing In summer, but in the fall stops her pipe.


Not that the summers are less pleasant now Than the times her mournful hymns hush in the night But provides profuse music on every bough, When done so much and loses dear delight





Crowd big factor for **Aggies**

■ Texas A&M hosting nation's number one team this afternoon

COLLEGE STATION, Texas (AP) - Texas A&M fans will attempt to set a world record for stadium sound volume when No. 1 Oklahoma comes to town Saturday.

It is up to the Aggies to give them something to cheer about. "It's kind of hard to hold the

emotions down right now," said fullback Ja'Mar Toombs, who admits he might be inclined to yell a little himself.

Come kickoff, Toombs and the rest of the 23rd-ranked Aggies won't be holding anything back. Neither will the mega-loud Kyle Field faithful, who are expected to number 86,000-plus, becoming the largest crowd ever to see a football game in Texas.

Mile High Stadium in Denver claims the record of 128.7 decibels during a game between the Denver Broncos and New England Patriots on Oct. 1.

Oklahoma coach Bob Stoops plans on being ready for everything, even the Aggies' fans. The Sooners practiced all week to the blare of Aggie

"I don't know what they are, but I'll know by the end of the week," Stoops said.

The Aggies will turn up the heat as high as possible. It's their chance to shine on a national stage against a team that handed them their third worst loss in school history, 51-6 last year.

A victory would keep the Aggies (7-2, 5-1) in the race for the Big 12 championship.

The Sooners (8-0, 5-0) have even bigger stakes. They are trying to win their first national championship since 1985 and help quarterback Josh Heupel take another step toward the Heisman Trophy.


"We've proven, I believe, through this year's play that we're not a fragile team, that we've been able to handle the difficult situations," Stoops said. "There's no way that A&M can be more motivated than us. We've got a lot here on the line."

Heupel, who directed the win over the Aggies in Norman last year, has been unstoppable this season. He ranks fourth nationally in passing and total offense and the Sooners offense leads the nation in scoring at 45.9 points per game.
"Pressure is being 0-8," Heupel

said. "That's pressure. It better be fun. Noise after a certain level is just noise. There comes a point when you can't hear, whether that's 50,000 fans or 80,000 fans."

The Aggies' Wrecking Crew defense expects to do better than a

Fall Flight Index being dropped over accuracy, misuse problems

hile duck hunting has been much-improved the last couple of seasons, it still hasn't equaled the salad days of the late 1960s and early 1970s for some time, on the local scene or nation-wide. The Fall Flight Index issued by the U.S. Fish & Wildlife

Service for 2000 projected 90 million ducks, down 13 percent from a projection of 105 million in 1999

In spite of predictions for a record fall flight for the 1999-200 season, duck harvest dropped seven percent last year from the 1998-99 season, and duck harvest was 15,117,208, down from the record level in 1998 of 16,360,528.

U.S. duck hunters spent an average of nine days in the field last season and averaged harvesting 10 ducks for the season, down eight percent from the previous season.

The Delta Waterfowl Foundation, a non-profit organization that works toward a goal of a sustainable North American waterfowl population for the use and enjoyment of future generations, has long maintained that the Fall Flight Index prompts false hope among duck hunting enthusiasts who tend to believe the duck numbers are much higher than they actually are.

Evidently, Delta struck a nerve with the F&WS. The Service has announced that it will be discontinuing the use of the current Fall Flight Index, admitting that its usefulness has been called into question.

Delta has pointed out, particularly in the past few seasons when duck numbers were thought to be high, but hunter success wasn't, that the Fall Flight Index is merely that--a comparison of one year to another, and not an estimate of actual duck numbers.

The usefulness of this number, Delta has maintained, is only in its measure of relative change.

Says Delta: "Don't look for 90 million ducks to darken the skies, they don't exist. If we look to the spring breeding number of 41.8 million, the result of an actual count, and apply a reasonable growth rate, it reflects that the fall flight of ducks in actual numbers is in the 50-60 million range.

" High hunter expectations from misuse of the Fall Flight Index are creating tension and causing loss of credibility of waterfowl management. Look to see fewer ducks this year than what you would have seen in 1999."

Delta urged the Fish & Wildlife Service to come up with "a more biologically-based and reliable way to give duck hunters an idea of what to expect."

Lloyd Jones, vice president of Delta Waterfowl, says the Fall Flight Index was being "grossly misrepresented, even by some in the waterfowling community," and he hails the F&WS decision to abandon the Fall Flight Index as "a bold and

important move on behalf of duck hunters by committing to change the current forecast process."

According to Jones, there currently are not 105 million, or even 90 million ducks, and the Fall Flight Index "was misleading duck hunters, creating expectations that were unrealistic and eroding duck hunter confidence in waterfowl managers...and needed to be changed."

The Fish & Wildlife Service is now working on alternatives to the Fall Flight Index. Among the possibilities is an annual production forecast.

Last season was certainly one of mixed results for local waterfowl hunters, who had some early chances at ducks and geese, but who were disappointed by the lack of waterfowl late in the season, despite available water.

Nation-wide, mallards were the top duck in the bag of sportsmen for the 1999-2000 season, with a take of just over 5.5 million. Mallards were followed in order by greenwing teal, gadwall, wood ducks, bluewing teal, widgeon, shovelers, pintail, and ringnecks.

For the 1999-2000 season the Canada goose harvest was down a bit from the previous year at just-under 1.9 million, which ranked it the fourth-highest harvest of Canada geese on record.

Snow and blue goose harvest during the regular season was 957,332, the second-highest on record.

The 1999 duck harvest ranked the fifth-highest since 1961.

IRS changes tax code

Changes protect farmers, ranchers

DES MOINES, Iowa (AP) — The Internal Revenue Service has agreed to a change in the tax code that will help protect farmers and ranchers from paying a higher tax rate than other taxpayers, says Sen. Chuck Grassley,

The change appears in the new IRS Publication 225. "Farmers Tax Guide," which says farmers and ranchers will be able to average their losses and gains over a three-year period.

Farm and ranch income can vary greatly year to year. Without the ability to average income over a period of time, Grassley said, farmers and ranchers can be forced to pay an "unfair, higher effective tax rate than other taxpayers who earn the same, but at a steady, consistent rate."

Grassley said he saw the need to seek an administrative change by the IRS after the government proposed new regulations for averaging farm income in 1999 that failed to make clear that "taxable income" in the farm

income averaging formula could be a negative number.

He said farmers will be able to amend their tax returns for 1998 and 1999 to take advantage of the new rules.

Commodity yields down; harvests record-breaking

WASHINGTON (AP) - The government lowered its estimates of this fall's harvest of corn and soybeans, but the crops will still be the largest on record, which will continue to hold down commodity prices.

The corn harvest, which was largely complete at the beginning of November, was expected to total 10.05 billion bushels, 1 percent below last month's forecast but 7 percent above the 1999 crop, the Agriculture Department said Thurs-

day.
Yields are smaller than USDA had expected. They have been averaging 137.7 bushels per acre, which is down 1.9 bushels from the October forecast. The estimates are based on USDA's monthly survey of farm conditions.

The nation's soybean crop was estimated at 2.78 billion bushels, down 2 percent from October but 5 percent higher

than last year's harvest. Farmers have been getting about 38 bushels per acre, slightly less than USDA expected last month but about 1.4 bushels per acre more than they harvested in 1999.

Because the corn crop is a little smaller than expected, USDA said prices paid to farmers would rise about 5 cents to \$1.90 a bushel.

But that is changing.

In the past three years, 14 dairy operations with an average of 1,500 cows have moved to Nebraska from other states.

Randy Newsome, who moved his dairy operation from California's San Joaquin Valley to near Seward in 1995, said he got the idea to relocate when he visited a Nebraska booth at a dairy trade show in California.

"Nebraska offers a lot of wide open spaces and good source of feed and a good milk market," he said.

The movement is not without growing pains. State officials met Oct. 18 with farmers and dairy indus-

dary that has cropped up in the recruitment process. "The dairy people say we need more processors for their products and the processors say we need more dairy pro-ducers," said Merlyn Carlson, the director of the Nebraska

Department of Agriculture. Nebraska now produces about 150 million gallons of milk each year.

While a large dairy operation is good for economic development, some communities are concerned about environmental and quality-of-life issues when a large livestock operation wants to move into a community.

The 700 dairy operations in the state today average more than 100 cows each, and many have several thousand.

Jeff Keown, a dairy specialist with the University of Nebraska-Lincoln, said Nebraska is not simply opening up its arms to large dairy operations without concern about the environment.

"I don't want anyone to get the impression that our environmental regulations are any more lenient than California's or any place else," he said. "In fact, they are much more stringent."

Keown said the state has the potential to eventually have as many as 200,000 dairy

And the economic impact would be substan-

He said each dairy cow is fed \$1,000 worth of feed per year, meaning a 1,000-head operation would buy \$1 million worth of feed each

Dairy cows also are fed corn gluten — a byproduct of the ethanol industry, he said.

Each dairy operation will invest about \$3,000 per cow in buildings and equipment, he said, meaning a new, 1,000-cow dairy will invest \$3 million to get up and running.



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Winter storms strand cattle

PLENTYWOOD, Mont. (AP) - As many as 5,000 cattle may be stranded in the 8foot snowdrifts that have clogged northeastern Montana and North Dakota since last week.

The area near the Canadian border was pelted by an ice-and-snow storm a week ago. A second storm Tuesday kept utility crews from re-storing electricity lost when the fierce earlier storm snapped about 500 power poles in a four-county area.

About 200 residents remained without electricity after crews restored power to many of the 1,200 residents who lost electricity after the first storm.

Weather forecasts called for record-low temperatures and more snow.

Terry Angvick, Sheridan County agriculture agent, estimated as much as 5,000 head of cattle could be stranded in the county.
Russell Torgerson spent

Wednesday plowing through 8-foot snowdrifts to reach his cattle, feed and water them and try to herd them closer to home. He has 360 cows, calves and yearlings stranded on his ranch

"I'm sure glad I've got a 'dozer on my tractor,"
Torgerson said. "As much
snow as we've got, I'd have
never got to them today."

Torgerson said the early arrival of a big snowstorm caught him off guard. "We've lived here for 22 years, and I've never seen a snowdrift out in front of the yard here like it is right now," he said.



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Hillary calls for an end to the Electoral College

Beginning a victory tour of upstate New York, the first lady said she would support legislation for a constitutional amendment that would provide for the direct election of the president.

At the moment, Americans are waiting to see who wins Florida's 25 electoral votes and thus becomes the next president. Vice President Al Gore leads Republican George W. Bush in the popular vote nationwide.

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
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


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

Crime in the streets. Gangs taking over neighborhoods. Drugs, sex, peer pressure and lack of stability within their own homes threaten to destroy teens' lives even as they look forward to life as an adult.

Harsh realities of society and culture seem to have an uncanny knack of dragging susceptible youths into the dirtiest gutters.

All is not lost. Just as Christheld out the importance of coming as a child, churches today are reaching out for the children pulling them away from the dangerous fringes of sex, drugs, gang violence and other destructive pursuits.

Most churches today prominently feature teen youth ministries designed to appeal to youth between the ages of 12-20, who might otherwise choose some of the more destructive lifestyles.

"It's a fact, that most decisions to follow Christ are made between the ages of 15-24," said Cory Campbell, teen minister at the First United Methodist Church. "If we can catch the kids in that age bracket, we can have a better chance of helping them make positive choices that will affect the rest of their lives."

"If we can connect with these kids at this age we can help them make some life changing decisions and find a better way to face the problems of their world," said Lee Price, teen minister at First Baptist Church.

It's not a matter of dragging teens and younger kids to church to sit through a boring sermon, but instead the youth and teen ministers use the buildings, the programs and fun events much like a baited hook attracts a hungry catfish.

"That's why we bait a hook - to catch a fish. We use our programs, buildings, our people and our love to catch the at risk, the on fringe or the forgotten kids," said Carol Haile, kids minister at the Hereford Church of the Nazarene. "Our programs are only a hook, just a tool we use to get the opportunity to tell the Good News to kids who might never hear it any other way."

"The biggest hook for these at risk or on the edge kids is the love. They are all looking for love and acceptance," Price said. "Some of these kids need lots and lots of love to make up for the lack of it elsewhere in their lives. That is what we have to offer these kids."

Teen ministers realize the prospect of an evening of fun, games and pizza draw a huge number of kids – both the very affluent and the kids from the meanest poverty ridden neighborhoods. They also know many of the kids will be lost between the ages of 12 and 14, when peer pressure and other

cultural evils claim so much of their attention. "What we are trying to offer these kids is a safe alternative to the outside pressures," Campbell said. "We go out of the way to meet the teens' needs, especially their social needs. We build a place where the kids can come have fun and not worry about gangs, drugs. Someplace where they can find things they can't get anywhere else in town. That gives us an in into their lives and a chance of reaching them.'

We try to catch the kids early enough so we can lead them to a Christ-like lifestyle. When they have a true heart change they have a better chance of getting through the pressures of today's teens," Price said.

Getting the kids -- even superficially -- involved in the church events may very well prove to be the easiest part of the youth ministers jobs. The hard part comes when they have to walk a walk of faith with youngsters who have seen the hard realities of today's world and have no other safety net. Sometimes the harder walk is for the teens who have

experienced all the benefits of American affluence and see no need for faith in God.

"We try to give the kids from all walks of life solutions to the real life situations which they are going to face," Haile said. "It's not always easy, especially when the kids go home to less than Christian homes and have to make some hard choices."

Many churches use special outreach programs, such as bus transportation, peanut butter and jelly get togethers, youth hotlines, sporting events or even Main Street parties to reach youngsters.

Main Street 2000, sponsored by the First United Methodist Church and joined by numerous others, attracted more than 460 teens. The Church of the Nazarene's Hallelujah Night drew more than 700 kids and their parents. Other churches host ski trips, Christian athletic tournaments and ministry work for teens.

"We have to get the kids involved in some kind of ministry that reaches them, then they can reach out to others. Sometimes they use our programs as a basis for that outreach," Price said.

"Events like these let us reach the kids, and ultimately the entire family," Campbell said. "As youth ministers we don't really care where the kids are going, we just want them involved in a church, hearing the word and having a basis for


Campbell and Haile both see the need for youth of all lifestyles to fit in somewhere. While dealing with the adolescents and teens, youth ministers will work to try get the kids in a group where they feel comfortable. Sometimes that means contacting other youth ministers and doing follow-up work to help a kid find their niche.

"We as Christians can't afford to lose a generation of kids," Haile said. "We hope that at some point our programs will provide them with something they can take home and share with their families and maybe draw some of the adults back to

"Ultimately we of course want to have a family based ministry, but we have to start somewhere and the teens and youth are the ones who are most negatively influenced. That's where we have to start to draw them back. If we get them as kids, be with them as teens, then we'll be able to keep more of them as they go into their adult lives, and hopefully break some of the cycles of broken families and violence which so many of them have experienced," Haile said.

"This is not about some goody-goody church thing. This is about giving them options and directions, based on the word of God and the love of Jesus Christ. Without that, all we have is just a bunch of high priced programs and buildings that make us feel good. As Christians, we are told to come as children, so the least we can do is reach out to all the children and share with them our Hope," Haile said. "This is what all the churches are trying to do when we build our kids churches, and our teen ministries."

Regardless of the denomination or beliefs, most churches now reach out to the community youth. "It's not about denomination. It's about Christian based choices, love, and the only way out of the worldly horrors," Haile said. "We reach the kids with what they can relate to. Sometimes it's a puppet show. Sometimes it's high-tech electronics. Where ever the kids are at emotionally is where the teen ministries have to go to meet and catch them."



Think Outside the box, but...

ecently, an old friend and business associate came by to see my new office. While we were visiting he threw out this little gem of wisdom. He said, "I know you've got to think outside the box, but somebody has to stay in the box or it will blow away."

Every year I work with business owners who become so enamored with new ideas that they forget to take care of the customers who are paying the bills. Now, I believe in forward thinking, and I certainly believe in thinking outside the box. However, if you forget to guard your box it may blow away or a competitor may take it from

you.

Small-business owners seem to struggle with this concept. Some know they must change, but are reluctant to. Others spend so much time creating change that they create nothing of value. Both types are likely to go broke in today's environment.

When I think of resistance to change I remember a little story regarding former U.S. President Martin Van Buren. Seven years before he became president, Van Buren wrote a letter to then president Andrew Jackson complaining that the new-fangled railroads were threatening the canal system of the states. Van Buren pointed out that if railroads replaced its canals, serious unemployment would result and America would lose its ability to

Van Buren wrote this paragraph in fierce resistance to this technological change: "As you may well know, railroad carriages are pulled at the enormous speed of 15 miles per hour by engines, which in addition to endangering life and limb of passengers, roar and snort their way through the countryside. The Almighty certainly never intended that people should travel at such breakneck speed."

Ah, Mr. President, if you could only see us now. Hurtling through space at the speed of sound. Yes, the times are still changing.

Change is positive

Change is positive, but needs balance to succeed. We can still stand in our box while we're thinking outside it.

The best possible attitude you can take toward change is to embrace it. Don't try to resist change, because you can no more stop it than you can hold back a river by standing in it. The water will pass you by. So it is with change. You may advance your business by learning to swim with the current. Use change to get ahead, accomplish more and travel faster.

Your objective must be to master change. Learning about life and life's lessons, gives you a real competitive advantage. Since change is the only constant in life, we will benefit if we learn more about it.

Sometimes the familiar stories are the most difficult to tell. After all, everyone knows the ending, and comparisons are unavoidable. Yet if the story is compelling enough, a retelling is inevitable.

Thankfully, The Miracle Worker, airing on Sunday, Nov. 12, on ABC, lives up to its legacy. It is the story of Helen Keller, who became blind and deaf when she was 18 months old. Her frustrations and outbursts ruled her genteel Southern family until a teacher changed everything. Annie Sullivan did not allow Keller to simply grunt, eat from everyone's plate with her fingers, and pitch tantrums when she didn't get her way. Rather, Sullivan expected Keller to behave civilly and gave her a great gift: communication.

The most famous filmed version of the story is the 1962 movie for which Patty Duke and Anne Bancroft, playing Keller and Sullivan respectively, both won Oscars. They had performed the roles on Broadway for more than a year as well. Earlier, there had been a *Playhouse 90* rendition, and in 1979, the story was remade with Duke in the role of Sullivan.

The themes of a mother refusing to give up on her daughter, a teacher's unwillingness to lower her standards and a little girl trapped in a world where she can't communicate certainly withstand time.

Hallie Kate Eisenberg, best known as the curly-haired girl in the Pepsi commercials, plays Keller in the ABC version. Alison Elliott (*The Spitfire Grill*) co-stars as the indefatigable Sullivan, and David Strathairn (*L.A. Confidential*) portrays Keller's desperate father.

Elliott does a masterful job, starting with Sullivan's accent. "I wanted it to

be reflective of who Annie Sullivan actually is," Elliott says. "Her parents were Irish, and she grew up in the system of poor, rural Massachusetts. ... I was told by several dialect coaches I was creating more work for myself, but I really wanted to do it."

Elliott unearthed the only known recording of Sullivan's voice and read every book she could find. She and Eisenberg also learned the manual alphabet, which Sullivan used to teach Keller by spelling words into her palm.

Elliott hadn't seen the 1962 version when she was approached about the project, and she asked the executives, "Why don't you just get the rights and reshow the original?" After viewing it, however, she took the part. "Because this was so dear to so many people's hearts, I did pay homage to it. Of course, in watching it, I became tremendously envious that they had the years to do the stage."

Still, she and Eisenberg are quite natural together. In one very physical scene, Elliott accidentally hit Eisenberg under the eye, and a welt rose as the scene continued. Eisenberg never broke character.

Before this movie, Eisenberg says all she knew about Keller was a quotation: "The best and the most beautiful cannot be seen and touched. They must be felt with the heart." Once landing the role, she read many books, watched videos and observed schools for disabled children. "I saw children my age and how they act, and that's where I got all the noises and where to put my hands and everything."

If viewers are to glean a message from the movie, the 8-year-old says, it is, "Everyone has something to overcome in life."
