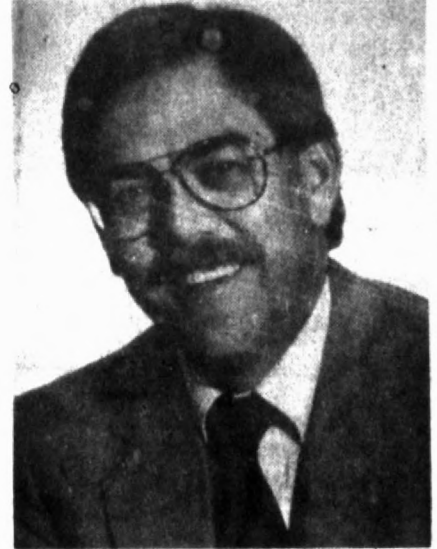

County primary campaigns winding down

 Office-seekers are making their last campaign rounds before voters go to the polls Tuesday in both Democratic and Republican primaries.
 Polls will open at 7 a.m. and close at 7 p.m. (See "Where to Vote" with this article.)
 By late Friday afternoon, when early voting for the elections ended, more than 1,200 persons had cast ballots in the two election. The number of Democrats voting reached approximately 1,100. About 100 Republicans had marked ballots before the 5 p.m. deadline for early voting.

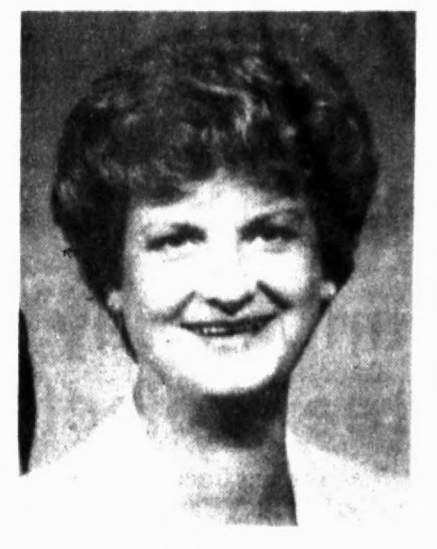
A slate of political party nominees for Deaf Smith County offices as well as statewide will be decided in the primaries. General election voters in November will choose between nominees of the two political parties.
 Six county contests are on the Democratic ballot. A possibility of a runoff looms in two races with three candidates each. A runoff is required if no candidate receives a majority of votes cast. The runoff must be between the two receiving the most votes.
 The Precinct 2 Commissioners' Court seat, now held by Lupe Chavez, is the object of a race by the incumbent and two challengers, Armando Alaniz and Bernie Griego.
 A contest for Deaf Smith County treasurer also could result in a runoff. With longtime Treasurer Vesta Mae Nunley retiring, three candidates are seeking her position. They are Nan Rogers, Joyce Skelton and Lois Jones.

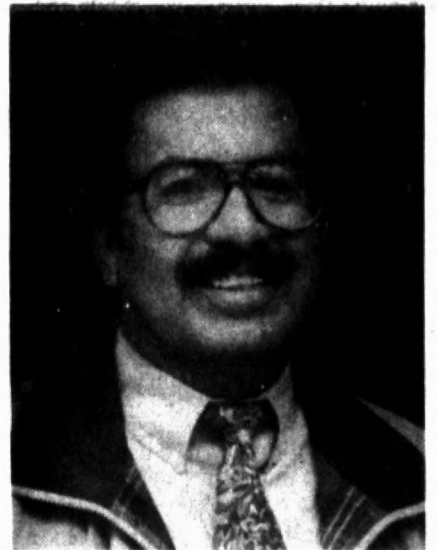
Incumbents facing opponents in the Democratic primary are Judge Tom Simons, County Clerk David Ruland, Justice of the Peace Johnnie Turrentine and Commissioner Johnny Latham of Precinct 4.
 Running against Simons is Trini Gamez. Ruland's opponent is Elizabeth Rodriguez.
 Opposing Turrentine for the justice of the peace post is John Arsola and Edward Maldonado is seeking the Precinct 4 post held by Latham.
 Candidates unopposed for reelection are 222nd District Judge David Wesley Gully, Criminal District Attorney Roland Saul, District Clerk Lola Faye Veazey and County Surveyor Kenneth Hagar.
 Only two Deaf Smith County candidates are running for Republican nominations. Dan Hall is the Republican candidate for justice of the peace in the November general election and Conny Whitehorn will run against the Democratic winner of the Precinct 2 commissioner race.
 At the top of both party ballots are races for governor, lieutenant governor, U.S. Senator, state attorney general and other state and judicial positions.

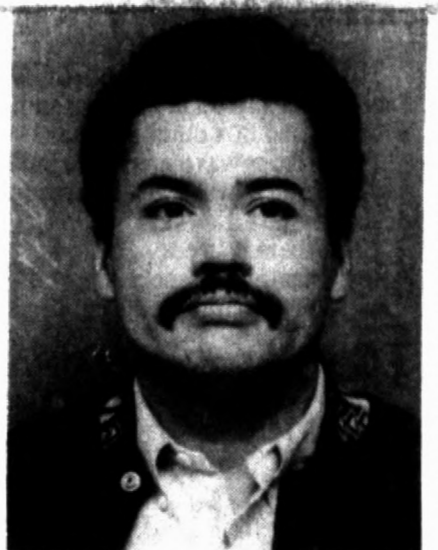

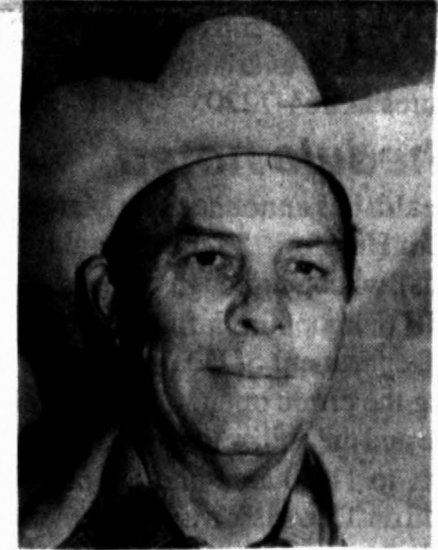

Trustees extend contract

 Hereford Independent School District trustees emerged from a 45-minute closed session Friday where they evaluated Superintendent Charles W. Greenawalt and voted 6-1 to extend his contract one more year.
 Trustee James Marsh, who voted against the extension, hastened to explain to Greenawalt that he was not voting against the superintendent, but against the premise of a three-year contract for the district's top administrator.
 "I don't really agree with a three-year running contract -- whoever it is," Marsh said. "Overall I don't have any problem with Charles."
 Marsh questioned how a three-year contract for the superintendent benefits the children enrolled in the district, adding that he would support a multi-year contract for a new superintendent who has to work on a specific program of work, but does not favor one for a veteran official.
 The board met in special session to evaluate Greenawalt's performance and approve or reject a one-year contract extension.
 At their regular monthly meeting last month, trustees extended the contracts of all other district administrators one year, but waited until all trustees had filled out written evaluations before considering Greenawalt's contract.

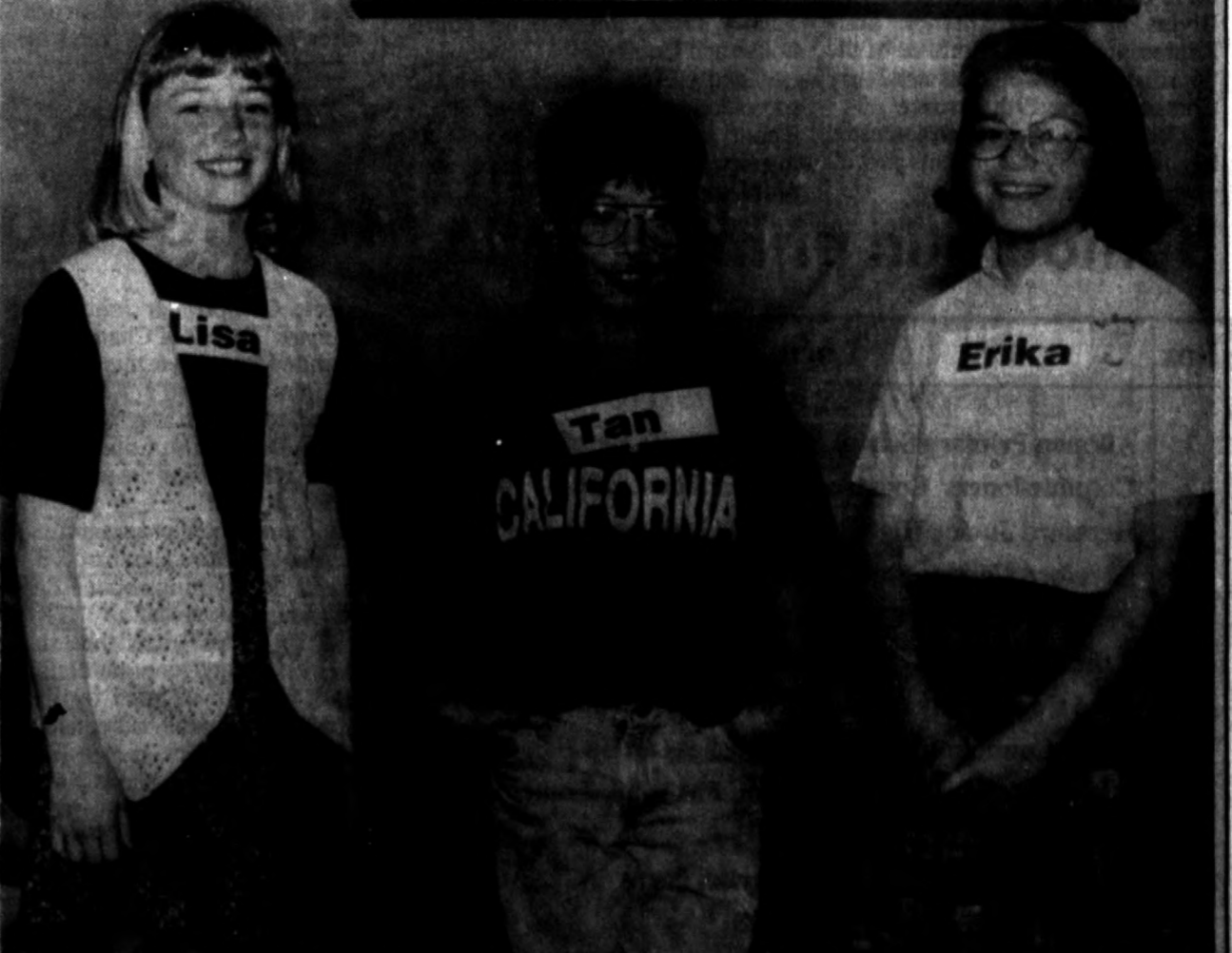
Tan Nguyen rides 'indexically' to Bee victory

Tan Nguyen, a sixth-grader at West Central School, outlasted 13 other students here Friday afternoon to claim the Deaf Smith County Spelling Bee championship.
 Tan, 12, won in the 18th round of words when he correctly spelled "minimization" and then the next word, "indexically." Runnerup Lisa Coneway, also a sixth-grader at West Central, tripped up by placing an "a" in the word "minimization."
 Tan is the son of Day and Sang Nguyen, owners of Hunan Restaurant. His brother, Bao, was county champion in 1992 as an eighth grader and went on to finish second at the Regional Bee.
 Lisa, 12, is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Tom Coneway. Erika DelaCerde, a sixth-grader at St. Anthony's won a spell-off for third place over Carey Lyles, a seventh-grader at Hereford Junior High.
 Tan received a \$100 award as champion and advances to the Regional Bee on April 9. First National Bank donated a \$50 savings bond and Deaf Smith REC donated a \$50 savings bond.
 As runnerup, Lisa received a \$25 share account from Hereford Texas Federal Credit Union and a \$25 check from The Hereford Brand. Third place was a \$25

bond from West Texas Rural Telephone. Riley Hall, representing Nazarene Christian Academy, was fifth and Melissa Reyna of Walcott was sixth. There were 14 spellers in the finals.
 Speedy Nieman, county bee director, presented the awards on behalf of local sponsors. Bern Boyd was the pronouncer for the annual event, and judges were Jane Coplen and Lavon Nieman.

Top speller is fascinated by the power of words

 If the Olympics had a gold medal for best speller, Tan Nguyen would be right up there with the top contenders.
 Tan, 12-year-old son of Sang and Day Nguyen of Hereford, won the Deaf Smith County Spelling Bee Friday at the county library.
 By winning, he will advance to the Regional Bee at West Texas A&M University on April 9. Winner of that event will be awarded a trip for two to Washington D.C. He received a \$100 award for Friday's victory.
 The Vietnamese youngster has been reading English ever since he started attending kindergarten, his mother said.
 Like his older brother, Bao, who won the county championship two years ago and placed second at the Regional Bee, Tan is fascinated by the power of words.
 "My mom and brother wanted me to read," said Tan, a student at West Central Intermediate School. "They thought I would know more."
 After going through all the Dr. Seuss books he could find in his school library, Tan graduated to heavier reading. Today he reads fiction, mostly adventures.
 His parents, who own the Hunan Chinese Restaurant, 149 N. 25 Mile Ave., plan to put the savings bond away toward his college education.
 Tan is an above average student at West Central, receiving mostly A's on his report card. His sister, Vu, 17, is a junior at Hereford (See NGUYEN, Page 2A)

Immunization schedule noted

He told the superintendent during the meeting that a plan will be devised to deal with specific performance concerns trustees expressed in their evaluations.

Before the executive session began, trustees took action on bids for re-roofing a portion of the high school.

Four bids were received for the 16,000 square feet of roof over the oldest part of the building that recently had a new heating and air conditioning system installed.

Of the four, trustees voted

unanimously to accept one for \$28,970 from Clark Roofing of Amarillo to install a modified bitumen roof.

Leaway Roofing of Hereford had submitted a bid of \$32,000 for the job.

Other bidders were Mayfield Roofing of Amarillo, \$49,525, and T&D Roofing of Dimmitt, \$36,319.60.

Construction will begin at the start of spring break, with crews removing the existing tar and gravel roof while students are out of school.

Weishaar reported on a work session the board had last week in

which they met for two days with Bob Thompson of Lamar University working on board procedures and guidelines.

Trustees agreed Friday to implement a suggestion of Thompson's to go to a consent agenda for their meetings, which includes a place for "information items," which trustees would like to suggest for possible discussion.

If trustees come to a consensus on further discussion of an information item, it would be placed on the next month's agenda as a "discussion item," with background information gathered by the district staff.

Then, if trustees decide to take action on the item, it would be placed on a third month's agenda as an "action item" and put forth for a vote by the board.

Comptroller's study to highlight KPAN

State Comptroller John Sharp's landmark "Forces of Change" study, scheduled for release this week, will highlight Hereford's KPAN radio station and suggest that "the sound of radio in Deaf Smith County" set the standards for serving the surrounding community.

"No automated programming for the radio station in Hereford," Sharp writes. "Everything about KPAN is live and homegrown."

Sharp notes that the station eschews canned commercials and music formats dictated by distant management teams and consultants in big city ad agencies.

"The emphasis on staying involved in the community speaks to one of the main messages of 'Forces of Change,' that there are practical steps we can take today to secure our future prosperity in the emerging world," Sharp says.

"Forces of Change" takes an unprecedented and sweeping look at the economic, demographic and social undercurrents that are likely to shape Texas between now and the year 2025.

Sharp maps out the major forces of change, then offers both an economic forecast and a blueprint to

help Texas take advantage of these changes over the next generation.

In a section of the study called "A Waltz Across Texas," the comptroller focuses on some of the particular challenges faced by Texas cities, including Hereford.

"The forces of change are already evident in many Texas communities," Sharp writes. "To get a better understanding of how they're playing out across the state, we fanned out to take a snapshot of ourselves at this historic turning pint in Texas history."

"Forces of Change: Shaping the Future of Texas" is available by writing the Comptroller of Public Accounts, P.O. Box 13528, Austin, TX. 78711-9831, or by calling 1-800-531-5441, extension 3-4900. The report is \$5 for printing, shipping and handling.

In addition, supporting materials have been published in two sections. Part I contains economic and population forecasts, plus a review of past and present critical issues facing the state. The 700-page volume costs \$10. Part II profiles many of Texas' most important industries. The 300-page volume costs \$5.

Combest calls for seniors to be interns

WASHINGTON -- U.S. Rep. Larry Combest, R-Texas, is seeking senior citizen applicants for a one-week government study program to be held May 14-21 in Washington D.C.

Seniors from the 19th District have traveled to the nation's capital to participate in discussions with members of Congress and administration officials for the past six years.

"As citizens, this is likely to be their first opportunity to experience first-hand the legislative process," said Combest. "I especially enjoy having them as guests in my office, which gives them an in-depth look at how a congressional office operates. It is my wish that when they return home, they will share what they learned about representative government while in Washington."

Seniors applying must be at least 60 years of age; in good health; active in local senior citizen projects; a resident of the 19th District; and willing to share what they learn with others.

Since the program is funded without taxpayer money, interns are responsible for their own round-trip transportation to Washington.

They also pay a \$908 double-occupancy fee that covers hotel, meals, transportation to events, and other miscellaneous costs. Single-occupancy rate is \$1,183.

Interns may raise funds for the fee through sponsorship or donations in the community.

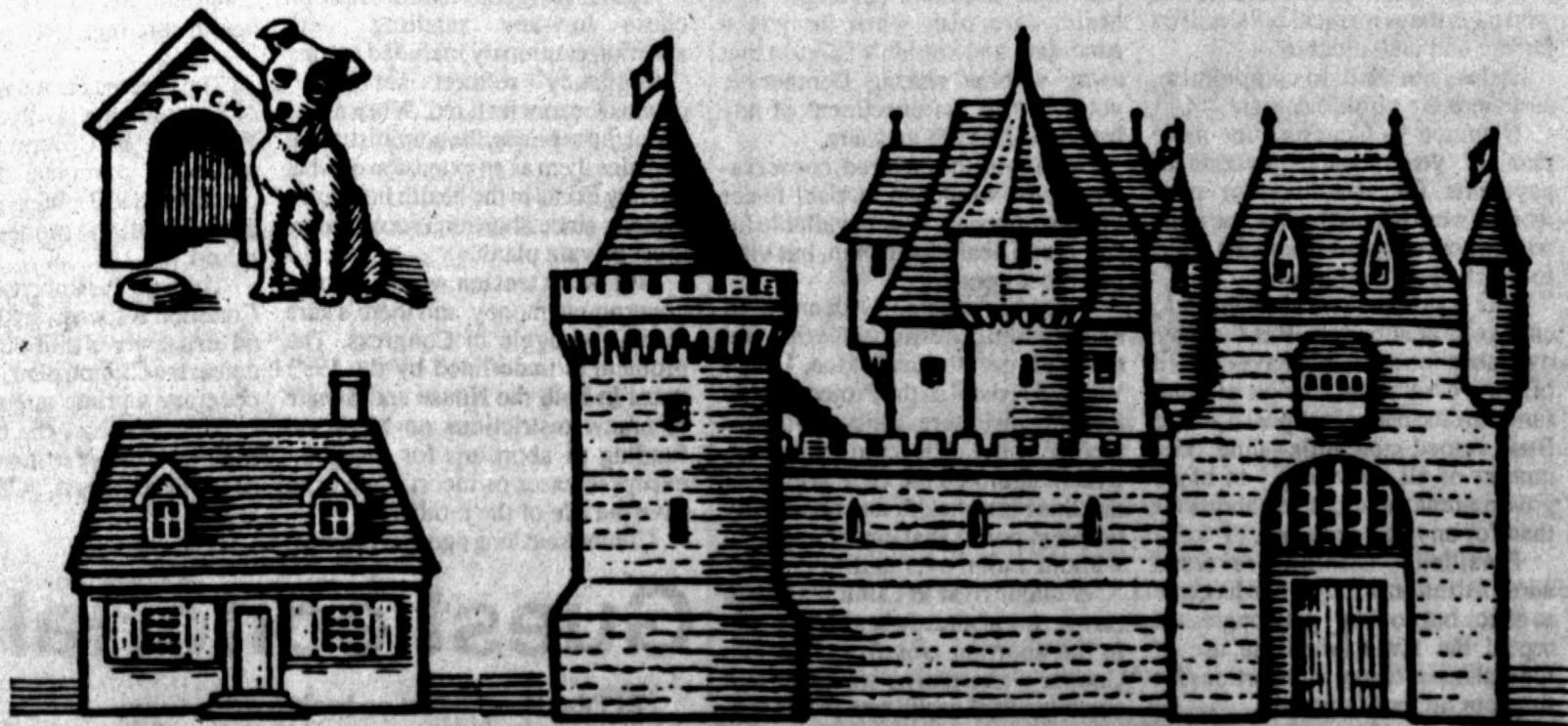

That feller on Tierra Blanca Creek says all you have to do to get the world to beat a path to your door is to lie down for a nap.

A guy at the coffee shop says he always gets in the last words during a discussion with his wife, and everything works out just fine. "I listen and simply say, "Yes, dear!"

Parents never fully appreciate teachers until it rains all weekend.

The Chamber Banquet here Thursday night was a big hit with the audience. State Comptroller John Sharp was very entertaining, and the music by the Chamber Singers was great. And, the presentation of the Citizen of the Year award to Shirley Garrison was a popular choice.

The attendance was down a little, and some folks missed a top-notch banquet. If some folks thought a politician's talk would be dull, they were wrong.

There was an interesting article in Thursday's Brand concerning a poll made on attitudes of different races on prejudices. The survey showed that all races still have an uphill battle to change their negative stereotypes about each other.

"Whites and people of color are divided by a vast perceptual gap," the National Conference said in releasing the poll this past week. The survey makes it apparent that many people in each race sees the world through very different eyes.

Two out of three minority group members questioned in the poll agreed with the assertion that whites are insensitive to other people, have a long history of bigotry and believe they can boss other people around.

At the same time, minorities in the poll were even more likely than whites to agree with negative attitudes about other minorities.

Eighty percent of blacks and 60 percent of Hispanics are convinced that opportunities are unequal, the poll found. On the other hand, whites are much more likely than non-whites

to see opportunities as equal for minorities, the poll found.

The research firm used minority interviewers for minorities and told the 2,755 people surveyed by telephone that they were being asked about "some statements reflecting common attitudes." Sanford Cloud Jr., who became the conference's first black president this past week, said "There's a lot of work that needs to be done within communities of color regarding their feelings toward each other."

When you see prejudices arise even within families, you wonder how we've ever going to solve the differences between neighbors, people of one race, and between one race and others.

When queried further, it was admitted that with direction from administrative assistant Nena Veazey, they had copied the language from Texas Education Association material.

Texas is listed in my substantial research material on OBE as having only partially implemented this program in public education--that part being primarily the grading system. Also, the staff at Shirley has apparently not even heard the phrase of Outcome Based Education, or its many evils.

What they have implemented at Shirley is virtually word for word from OBE material. Let me make it clear they have not implemented the terrible instructional material which comprises the balance of OBE. In fact, they have gone the other way in that respect by putting more emphasis on phonics in reading and test scores have shown the improvement.

In brief, the fracas began when I wrote my 100 percent accurate letter discussing what OBE is. Shirley staff...did not realize it was from OBE material provided indirectly through the state. It is my hope the staff will do some research on the perils of OBE and decide to move back to Carnegie units and real grades.

I am sorry for all of the confusion and hurt feelings.

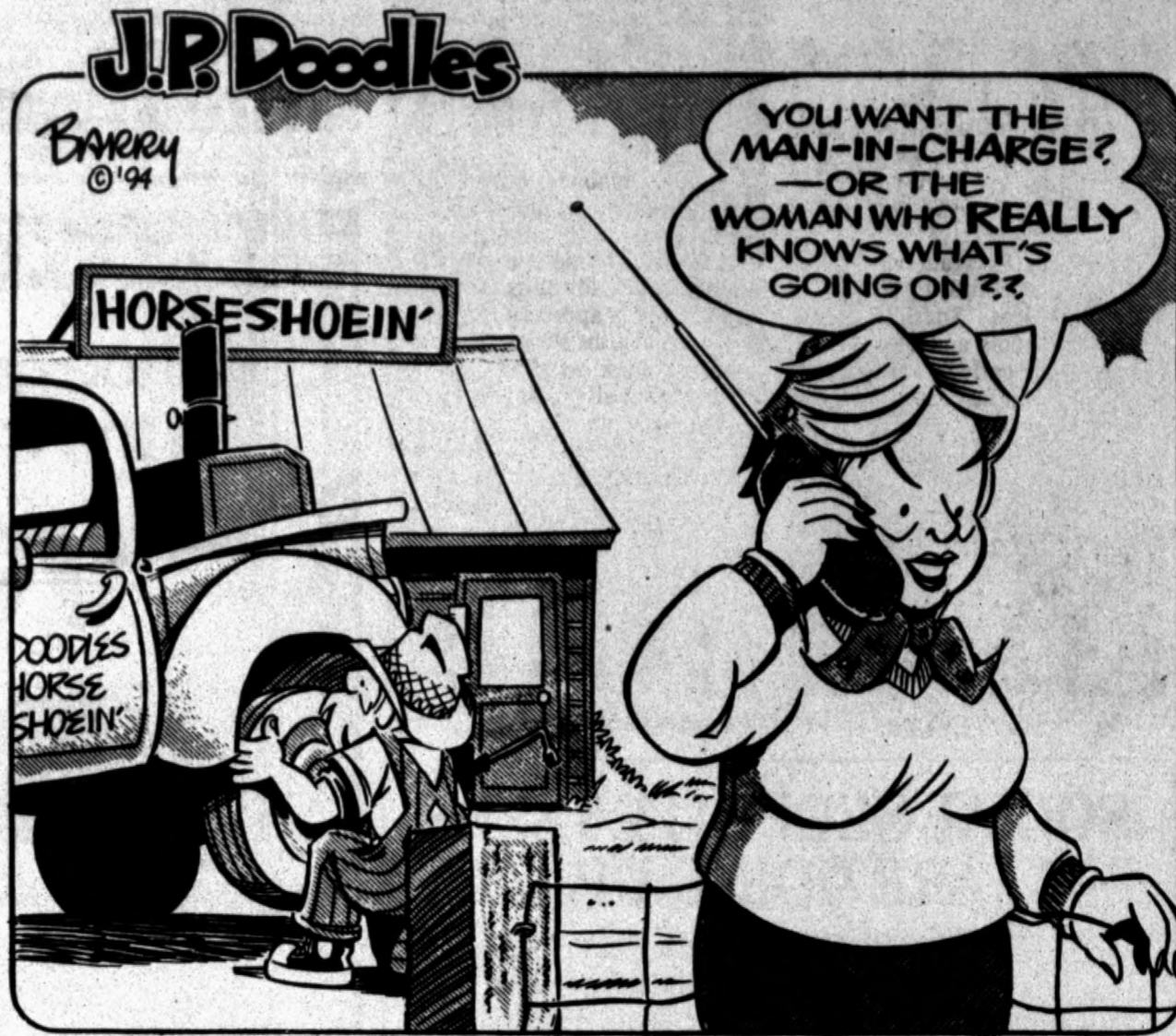

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OUT OF THE BLUE By Garry Wesner

Are we seeing more signs of an administration that is foundering on the rocks of political ruin, as more and more top officials run afoul of policy, innuendo -- even the law?

Top White House aides are resigning at an astonishing pace, subpoenas are being issued to department heads, policy makers and other top officials and now even the aide of another top Clinton staffer (and friend) is being questioned, with criminal undertones.

I mean, here it is less than 1-1/2 years into President Clinton's term of office and he has had to replace one Cabinet official and was nearly unable to get another one in at all because of scandal.

Then, deputy White House Counsel Vince Foster (a long-time Clinton buddy) committed what appeared at first was suicide, but now is being questioned.

This week, more evidence of political instability in the Clinton Administration.

First, the FBI on Friday served subpoenas on the White House (how do you subpoena a building?) and six top Clinton aides for their roles in possibly improper discussions of the Whitewater S&L investigation.

Then, one of those aides, White House Counsel Bernard Nussbaum, was expected to resign this weekend, in part because of his office's handling of sensitive Whitewater

Not only will this set off a flurry of activity within the Senate's Democratic leadership to replace him, there is also the possibility that Mitchell, as well as several other Democratic Senators, could lose their seats to Republicans this year.

And, with a slim 56-44 majority in the Senate, significant party losses could shift the balance of power back to the Republicans for the first time since 1980 and give a Republican Senate Majority Leader.

Having a majority of the Senate Republican would certainly scuttle Clinton's efforts to shove health care and welfare "reform" legislation through without any chance for real debate and reform at all.

Somehow I think a lot of these problems stem from the old story that Clinton entered the White House unprepared for reality.

He thought he and Hillary could

waltz in, seize the Congress and mold them to fit his own socialistic, anti-America, anti-family image.

Reality -- having already sunk in with the gays in the military fiasco, the "Nannygate" debacle and all his questionable appointments (including a lesbian "fair housing" head and a surgeon general who favors legalized drugs) -- is probably becoming a real pain in the butt for Clinton.

Speaking of politics, don't forget the primary election on Tuesday.

There is a whole slate of candidates on both sides to choose from, from U.S. Senate and House seats to county offices.

Abortion a major pothole in Clinton's drive for reform of health care system

WASHINGTON (AP) - Among the potholes in the path of health care change, the question of abortion, and who pays those medical bills, will be jarring and unavoidable.

It does not yield to compromise, and there are no safe detours. Disputed in Congress for more than 17 years, since government payments for abortions for poor women were banned by law, the issue will be no less intractable in the effort to overhaul of health care.

It is a side matter, not central to changing health care. But disputes over abortion spending have snarled bills as diverse as foreign aid and funds for the nation's capital. George Bush vetoed more bills - nine, one-quarter of all his vetoes - to block government payment for abortions than for any other reason.

President Clinton reversed administration policy when he came to office but couldn't get Congress to repeal the law against the use of federal funds to pay for abortions for the poor under Medicaid.

His proposal for guaranteed health insurance for every American would include abortion coverage, but the administration isn't advertising that. It is divisive when the current objective is consensus, even at the cost of concessions, on a health care plan.

"The president has his bottom line, he's made that clear," Press

Secretary Dee Dee Myers says. "It's guaranteed private insurance for everyone; it's not negotiable."

Other points are. But Clinton promised abortion coverage in a health care plan when he was a candidate and couldn't bargain that away without risking Democratic votes key to the enactment of any broad health care measure.

With abortion covered, conservative votes would be at risk, fewer because there are fewer available for any broad health care plan, but vital in a close count.

"One big problem with any kind of minimum benefits plan is that you have to get to that issue," said William Kristol of the Project for the Republican Future, which advocates more selective changes in health care. Kristol authored the GOP argument that there is no health care crisis, only problem points that can be repaired without a total overhaul.

A major rival to Clinton's health care proposal already has been caught in the abortion crossfire. Rep. Jim Cooper's alternative would have a commission of health care professionals decide what should be covered as basic benefits, with the proviso that everything "medically appropriate" would be included.

The Cooper measure has been criticized by abortion rights groups because it does not specifically cover abortion - and by anti-abortion organizations because it might, Cooper, a Tennessee Democrat,

insisted that his bill "is neutral on the subject." But to the competing interest groups, neutrality is not an option.

That's why the administration chose low-key handling, with abortion cautiously included among "pregnancy related services," covered but not featured. When asked about the services, the administration explains them as an extension of what already exists in the health insurance system, since abortion is covered by most private plans.

But the extension would involve government money, and there's sure to be a struggle in Congress. The problem is underlined by the 1993 votes in both the House and Senate to renew restrictions on Medicaid funding of abortions for the poor, except in cases of incest, rape or to save the life of the mother.

Clinton said long ago that the issue

could be a political minefield for health care change.

Interest groups on both sides are readying their lobbying campaigns as congressional panels begin drafting health care legislation this month.

The Planned Parenthood Federation of America says it will campaign and lobby for the Clinton program and universal coverage of abortions, promising a \$10 million national effort, although all the money hasn't been raised.

The Rev. Pat Robertson's Christian Coalition is spending \$1.4 million on advertisements and other efforts to defeat the Clinton plan, with abortion coverage a prime target.

"It will probably become a political football because so many people feel so strongly about it," Clinton said last fall.

It is.

It has been a while since I have written about City Happenings; maybe it's time for an update.

Like it or not, Spring and its attendant SPRING CLEANING are just around the corner. The City and Hereford Beautification Alliance are working together to help cleanup up Hereford.

To that end, the City is offering a service to Hereford residents that allows the use of city equipment to assist in their clean-up efforts. The plan, which beings in April, works this way:

You call City Hall during the week. On Friday we deliver a suitable vehicle to your designated site. You fill it with your Spring cleaning and on Monday morning we pick up the vehicle and deliver the refuse to the landfill. NO CHARGE.

The existing landfill will close permanently on or before April 8, 1994. In its place will be a Type IV landfill that will handle only rubbish such as limbs, leaves, grass clippings, furniture and other non-putrescible materials.

The City will commence hauling dumpster material to the Amarillo landfill on or about that same date. The cost to deliver the trash to Amarillo will be about \$15 to \$17 per ton.

Please help us keep your costs down by delivering the Type IV material to the landfill or placing it behind your property in the alley so

City crews will be able to collect it. Construction on the new water storage tank located behind the Community Center is expected to begin almost any day. We anticipate holding a groundbreaking ceremony very soon. Along with that project is the development of two new water wells. Drilling should also begin on the wells very shortly.

A Parks and Recreation Board has been appointed jointly by the City of Hereford, Deaf Smith County, Hereford Schools and the YMCA. The board currently is working on a budget that will incorporate a lot of activities previously not available to our citizens, except sporadically.

It is anticipated that the Parks and Recreation Department will be operational, beginning Oct. 1, 1994. Members of the board are Dennis Hicks, Dave Hopper, Troy Don Moore, Joe Flood and Steve Bigham. Construction on the new Hereford

Lady Sandies advance to 5A title game

AUSTIN (AP) - Tracie Swayden led a polished Amarillo offense with 21 points and plenty of no-look passes as the Sandies dismantled League City Clear Creek 58-37 Friday and moved closer to defending their Class 5A state title. Amarillo (35-1), which has nearly its entire team back from last year, was to face Conroe (33-1) in Saturday

night's championship game. Conroe squeaked by San Antonio East Central 49-46 behind 25 points from Tracy Bougere, earning its first trip to the state finals since a runner-up finish in Class 3A in 1974.

Hemphill (30-4) and Tuscola Jim Ned (33-2) were to meet in the 2A final, after Hemphill edged Bloomington 50-47 and Jim Ned whipped Rogers 51-40.

Clear Creek was making its seventh tournament appearance and finished the year 29-8. East Central ended the season at 35-2 after playing in its first ever state tournament.

The Sandies are 95-9 since Swayden, Stefanie Andrus and Kim Linder became starters three years ago as sophomores and Friday night they showed why. They anticipated each other's every move, threading passes through defenders and helping shut down Clear Creek's offense with a suffocating press and switching 2-3 zone.

Swayden and Andrus each had five steals and Amarillo was able to put the game away early by punishing Clear Creek for its mistakes. The Sandies turned 28 turnovers by the Lady Wildcats into 32 points.

Cara Gibbs and Meshia Tisdell were the bright spots for Clear Creek. Gibbs, a 6-2 junior, was strong in the lane while collecting 17 points and

Tisdell added 11 for the Lady Wildcats.

Kenya Lister and Linder each added nine points for Amarillo, which led 33-19 at intermission and opened up a 26-point lead in the second half.

In the other 5A semifinal, Conroe won a battle of nerves down the stretch thanks to Bougere, who hit six 3-pointers, tying the girls state tournament record shared by three others.

Tristese Ervin led East Central with 22 points and 10 rebounds.

There were four lead changes in the fourth quarter and East Central set up to take the winning shot, trailing 47-46.

But the Lady Hornets were flustered out of their offense and Ervin hurried an off-balance shot that fell off the rim with 20 seconds left.

Conroe grabbed the rebound and Bougere was fouled with 14.8 seconds remaining. She hit both ends

of the one-and-one, giving the Lady Tigers a 49-46 advantage.

East Central scrambled down court and Shellie Dugger launched a 3-pointer that missed everything with four seconds left. Conroe grabbed the ball and ran out the clock.

East Central missed all six of its field goal attempts and four free throws in the final 4:57. East Central was five of 18 from the free throw line for the game.

Every time Conroe fell behind, Bougere bailed her team out with a 3-pointer.

After East Central built a 19-14 lead with 5:20 left in the second quarter, Bougere reeled off 12 consecutive points, including three 3-pointers. Her six 3-pointers tied the girls state tournament record shared by three others.

Nici Johnson had 11 points and Tiffany Moore added 19 rebounds for Conroe.

For a kid growing up in South Texas - or any other part of the state - Southwest Conference football was center stage, as popular then as the pros are now.

The Humble Network was the window to big time college football for fans in small towns throughout the state and Frank Fallon, now the voice of Baylor athletics, was an announcer on those broadcasts.

"It was a great era while it lasted," Fallon said. "Crowds of 50,000 and 60,000 weren't uncommon when Texas or A&M played in Rice Stadium."

Fallon remembers the feel of those times. The SWC was important.

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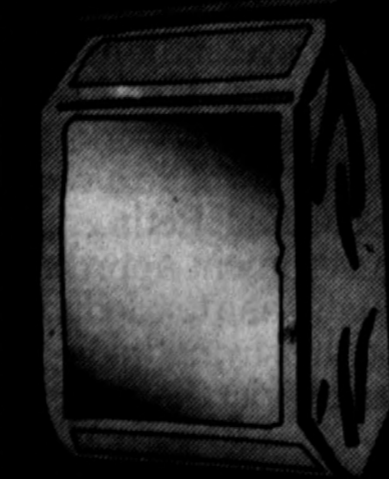
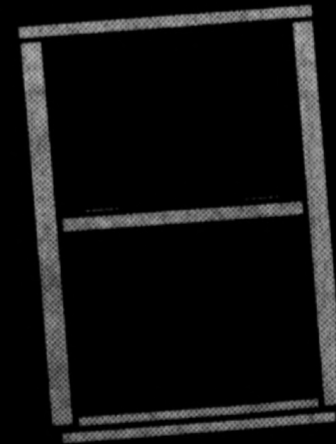
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When older drivers, have auto accidents, the reason is often what they can - or can't - see. A recent study found that older drivers with a restricted useful field of vision (UFOV) are three to four times more likely to have auto accidents - and 15 times more likely to have accidents in intersections.

The UFOV is the visual space in which a person can respond quickly to visual stimuli, such as an oncoming car. Researchers measured the subjects' UFOV with a visual attention analyzer, a computerized instrument that tests how fast the person sees something and reacts to it. The screening accurately identified risk and nonrisk drivers in nearly 85 percent of cases.

Interesting result: many of the subjects who had "failed" the UFOV test had no record of reported accidents. Researchers suggest that older drivers with vision problems modify their driving habits, avoiding heavy traffic, night driving and such.

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Texas produces long line of great golfers

DALLAS (AP)—OK, go ahead and stick out your chest. Curtsy for the camera. Intoxicate yourself again with another swig of that Texas pride, of that Lone Star nationalism. Self-indulge, for they say if it's fact, it ain't braggin'.

And this is fact: Texas has produced more great golfers than any other place.

"You'd think California might have more great players, but they don't even come close to Texas," said Austin's Tom Kite, leading money-winner in PGA Tour history. You know the names, from B to Z, from Burke to Zaharias. But how about these numbers.

The prestigious World Golf Hall of Fame has 64 inductees, and, remarkably, nine are Texans—Harry Cooper, Jimmy Demaret, Ralph Guldahl, Ben Hogan, Byron Nelson, Betsy Rawls, Lee Trevino, Kathy Whitworth and Babe Didrikson Zaharias. Plus, Jackie Burke Jr. and Lloyd Mangrum are in the related PGA Hall of Fame.

The strict LPGA Hall of Fame has only 13 members, five of them Texans: Sandra Haynie, Betty Jameson, Rawls, Whitworth and Zaharias.

"Unbelievable," said Curt Sampson, the author and former golf professional.

Sampson, who lives in Ennis, wrote the book on it, released a year ago and called "Texas Golf Legends."

"It's so self-evident that Texas has

been the greatest producer of top-level golfers in the country," Sampson said. "In a way, you can look at Texas as a successor to England. The three great golf breeding grounds have been Scotland, England and Texas."

Besides the names already mentioned, the 70-member Texas Golf Hall of Fame includes many more of the sports most celebrated players. Among them: active PGA Tour players Ben Crenshaw, Bruce Lietzke, John Mahaffey and Scott Verplank; seniors Miller Barber, Charles Coody, Jacky Cupit, Jay Hebert, Don January, Billy Maxwell and Doug Sanders, plus Dave Marr, Bill Rogers, Sandra Palmer, Harvey Penick, Henry Ransom and Dave Williams.

Add it up and you get enough major championship trophies to fill a chain of hardware stores.

"It's a fantastic legacy," said Austin's Crenshaw, champion and historian. "As a state, I don't think anyone has approached us."

The question then is, why? Why has the state spawned so many great golfers, especially from the 1930s through the 1970s? Perhaps it is as inexplicable as the divine fact Nelson and Hogan grew up in the same Fort Worth caddie yard, but those in the know point to 10 major theories. From the home office in Waxahachie, they are:

1. Weather and course conditions. They prepare a player for anything, from hot to cold, from calm to windy. Playing on bad turf in bad weather helps create a player who can really

excel in immaculate conditions.

2. Length of season. Golfers can play almost all year.

3. Role models. Great players keep setting examples, keep inspiring others, from Hogan and Nelson, to Kite and Crenshaw, to Houston's Dave Williams building the best college program ever, down to the country's leading amateur, Justin Leonard, today. Call it an echo effect.

4. Competition. Recheck those Hall of Fame lists and you'll see that, to win, the best had to be beaten.

5. Face it, it's a big state.

6. Partly because Texas had no professional team sports for so long, golf was important.

7. That inbred Texas pioneer toughness and pride. Hey, not many generations ago did hearty types beat the Indians when settling here.

8. Good teachers. Start, but don't stop, with Austin's Penick. Hall of Fame players Burke, Whitworth, Haynie, Rogers and Maxwell are among those in the lesson business.

9. Tournaments, tournaments, tournaments. There are some for everyone and everywhere.

10. Sports state of mind. "There's not a more sports-minded state or one that accentuates the individual more," former touring pro Don Cherry said in "Texas Golf Legends." "And golf is the most individual game, so we were bound to get great players."

The state doesn't produce as many stars now as it did in the '30s through the '70s. States like Florida and California and colleges such as Arizona State and Oklahoma State could be considered No. 1 now. But Texas isn't

quite frowning yet. Among colleges, Houston and Texas have 17 current PGA Tour players between them, more than any two schools from any other state.

And more excellence is on the way. Besides 1992 U.S. Amateur champion Leonard, the potential star list includes nationally ranked juniors Jeff Fahrenbruch of Plano and Kelli Kuehne of Highland Park, plus young standouts Brad Elder of Plano and the Loar brothers, Edward and Nicklaus, of Rockwall.

The two decades from the mid-1930s to the mid-1950s set the tone. Just examine the major championships. In 1937-56, Texans won nine of the 17 Masters tournaments—Nelson in '37 and '42, Guldahl in '39, Demaret in '40, '47 and '50, Hogan in '51 and '53. Moreover, Texans won eight of the 13 U.S. Opens in 1937-53.

Of the reasons cited for success through the years, Texas golf leaders point to four in particular: conditions, the role-model domino theory, competition and the fighting Texas spirit.

"It's not one thing," the 82-year-old Nelson said from his ranch in Roanoke. "It's a combination of all these things." Starting with weather (read: wind) and turf (read: hard).

"A lot of us started in little-bitty cities, on skateboard things that were poorly conditioned," said Burke, owner of Houston's Champions Golf Club, winner of four straight tournaments in 1952 and winner of the Masters and PGA in '56. "After learning on that, when I went east and

got on greens with no grain, I felt I could kick putts in with my foot." Austin's Kite knows that feeling, too.

"It's not like California, where it's 75 every day and the wind never blows and it's cushy, cushy, cushy," Kite said. "In Texas you have to learn how to play in flash floods, high winds, on hard greens. If there's a condition around that makes golf hard, Texas has it."

"Once you learn to play in those, you have a tremendous advantage when you go play elsewhere. You learn to play all kinds of different shots, and you tend to hang in there when others might lay down."

That mindset, Kite said, helped him win the 1992 U.S. Open in unusually windy conditions at Pebble Beach.

"No question about it," he said. "I've always been a good bad-weather player. Harvey Penick encouraged us to go play and practice in bad weather. I remember practicing in the rain hearing (Austin Country Club) members saying, 'Are you the stupidest kid around?'"

Back in 1940, when Burke turned pro as a 17-year-old, competition especially drove players.

"Most of us were trying to get a job," Burke said. "We competed not just in golf or in schools but in everyday life. It ain't easy in Lubbock, man. Competing just to get out brings out a good competitor."

As it happened, such competition spawned wonderful role models—Hogan, Nelson, Demaret, Mangrum, Guldahl and more.

"That really encourages you and shows you great things that can be done," Kite said.

"All of those players have had a great influence on Texas golf," Crenshaw said. "And juniors know them. It becomes embedded in a junior's mind and they know what to shoot for."

And, like in the Wild West, they learn how to shoot. They learn a spirit.

"Whatever you think you're big enough to handle, you take it," said Trophy Club's Whitworth, winner of 88 LPGA victories, most in history. "It's a western attitude."

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Remembering:
Kern Tips, in his distinctive style, painting a word picture of a running back failing to get outside: "Oh, there's a malfunction at the junction!"

There was a malfunction in the 1954 Cotton Bowl when Alabama's Tommy Lewis leaped off the bench and tackled a startled Dickie Maegle of Rice as he sprinted down the sidelines. Maegle was awarded a 95-yard touchdown and Rice won the game 28-6.

Maegle carries that and many other memories of the SWC into the new era.

"I just can't believe this is happening after 80 years," Maegle said. "I'm really kind of shattered by it, but I do understand that money and television talk and everybody else listens and that's the name of the game."

Remembering:
Being in Lubbock in 1965 when the Red Raiders had their best season since joining the SWC in 1956 and watching Donnie Anderson's heroics and a scary flight to Arkansas and a disappointing loss to the Razorbacks.

Being in Houston when the Cougars were admitted to the SWC and when they won the 1976 SWC championship in their first season to compete for the football title.

Being in Albuquerque, N.M., in 1983 and seeing the frozen look of disbelief on Hakeem Olajuwon's face when a last second shot by North Carolina State took the NCAA basketball championship away from

the Phi Slama Jamma Houston Cougars.

Remembering:
The enticing glamour of the pros, when the Cowboys emerged in Dallas and the Oilers came to Houston in the 1960s to compete for and win the sports fans' attention.

Maegle remembers trying to convince Rice coach Jess Neely to endorse a pro exhibition game in Rice Stadium in 1956 between the San Francisco 49ers and Detroit Lions.

Neely knew the danger of helping the pros and Maegle remembers the conversation, imitating Neely's soft Southern drawl.

"That would make a wonderful attraction," Neely admitted. "But as long as I'm here at Rice, there will never be a pro football game competing with Rice's fan appeal."

"But coach, they'll pay you \$25,000," Maegle said.

Neely shot back: "I don't care if it's \$550,000, they ain't playing in my stadium."

Remembering, based on imperfect recall:
The predatory aura of Texas linebacker Tommy Nobis; the legendary status in West Texas of Texas Tech's

E.J. The 1970 Cotton Bowl when Texas beat the Fighting Irish 21-17 and calling Mom and Dad back home to see if they knew where the Notre Dame Kid could be found.

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Apathy reigns in waning days of primary campaigning

AUSTIN (AP) - Democrats and Republicans will be choosing nominees for every top state office, the Legislature, Congress and the U.S. Senate on Tuesday.

But for the majority of Texans, it's a yawn.
Although a record 9 million people have registered to vote, turnout is forecast at only 16.5 percent, or about 1.5 million.

Secretary of State John Hannah says he's disheartened by the raging apathy.
"I continue to be amazed and dismayed that many ... will pass up the opportunity to cast their ballots," Hannah said.

Hannah blames the widespread lack of interest on a lack of hotly contested races.

"When you have red-hot races at the top of the ballot which generate a lot of media attention, people notice. Otherwise, many voters will wait until the November general election to join the fray," he said.

Dr. Jerry Yeric, associate professor of political science at the University of North Texas, says several factors may be contributing - a national trend toward non-participation, no candidates who captured the public's interest, and frustration over the failure to solve such problems as crime and schools.

"When you look at the list of candidates, most of them have been around politics a long time or their names are recognized with politics," he said. "On top of that, there's kind of a general feeling with the public across the nation right now and there's not a high energy toward participation."

The hottest race has been for the Democratic Senate nomination. But even one of the leading candidates says it has been tough to spark interest.

"The most important news that's taking place right now is that it looks like we're going to have a record-breaking low turnout in the state for both the Democratic and Republican primaries," said Democrat Jim Mattox.

Although Mattox, a two-time attorney general, figures a low turnout helps a well-established name like his, he also said he would prefer that more people show up.

"I'd like for everybody to get out and vote. I just think it's better for democracy if that happens," he said.

Mattox's race against Houston Congressman Mike Andrews and Dallas financier Richard Fisher has been the most energetic in a generally lethargic election year.

The three, along with Lyndon LaRouche follower Evelyn Lantz of Houston, are seeking to challenge Republican Sen. Kay Bailey Hutchison.

Mattox and Andrews accused Fisher, a millionaire and former adviser to independent presidential candidate Ross Perot of pulling a Perot and spending part of his own fortune on the race. He did the same

in last year's special election.
"I don't think any wealthy individual ought to just be able to come in and buy this election," Mattox said.

"Before this election is over, Fisher will have spent more than \$4 million running for this seat. Like his mentor Ross Perot and Clayton Williams, he believes the election should go to the candidate with the deepest pockets," added Andrews.

In response, Fisher branded both as career politicians and cast himself as the independent-minded outsider. He has referred to his opponents as "Tweedle-dum" and "Tweedle-dee."
"I am not a professional politi-

cian," Fisher said. "I hope this campaign will lead the Democratic Party into a new era of prosperity, of victory and hope, rather than defeat and despair."

If there's no outright winner Tuesday, the top two finishers advance to the April 12 runoff.

Mrs. Hutchison, recently found innocent of state ethics charges she claimed were a Democratic ploy, faces only token opposition from six other Republicans. Weeks before the election, GOP Chairman Fred Meyer already was mailing out letters saying she would top the Republican ticket in November.

Neither Democratic Gov. Ann Richards nor Republican hopeful

George W. Bush faced serious opposition for their gubernatorial nominations. Richards was challenged by newcomer Gary Espinosa of Palestine, while Bush faced Abilene demolition contractor Ray Hollis.

One of the most interesting statewide races is for treasurer.

Incumbent Democrat Martha Whitehead, the former Longview mayor appointed by Richards last year to succeed Mrs. Hutchison, wants to abolish the job by merging it into the comptroller's office, which already collects state taxes.

Neither her Democratic opponent, Tyler high school teacher Grady Yarborough, nor the two Republicans, Austin banker David Hartman and Houston high school student Mike Wolfe, agree.

"The people of the state are truly

desperate to see this kind of reform happen," Mrs. Whitehead said.

"I don't believe being on the job six months qualifies her to make a judgment about an office that has been in operation 117 years," said Yarborough, a former Republican.

Democratic Attorney General Dan Morales drew no primary opponent in his bid for a second term. Four Republicans want the nomination to challenge him: Tony Garza, Cameron County judge; Pat Lykos, a state district judge in Houston; John Marshall, a state district judge in Dallas, and Don Wittig, a state district judge in Houston.

Results of the primaries for four of the top seven statewide offices already are known.

Only one candidate from each party filed for lieutenant governor, comptroller, land commissioner and

agriculture commissioner. Those eight candidates automatically advance to the November general election.

State Comptroller John Sharp, a Democrat, will face Austin businesswoman Teresa Doggett, a Republican. Democratic Lt. Gov. Bob Bullock will be challenged by Republican Tex Lezar. Republican Marta Greytok, former Public Utility commissioner, will face three-term Democratic Land Commissioner Garry Mauro. And Republican Agriculture Commissioner Rick Perry will face Sulphur Springs dairy farmer Marvin Gregory.

Also up for election are two seats on the Railroad Commission; three seats each on the Texas Supreme Court and Court of Criminal Appeals; all 31 Texas Senate seats and all 150 Texas House seats, plus the state's 30 U.S. House seats.

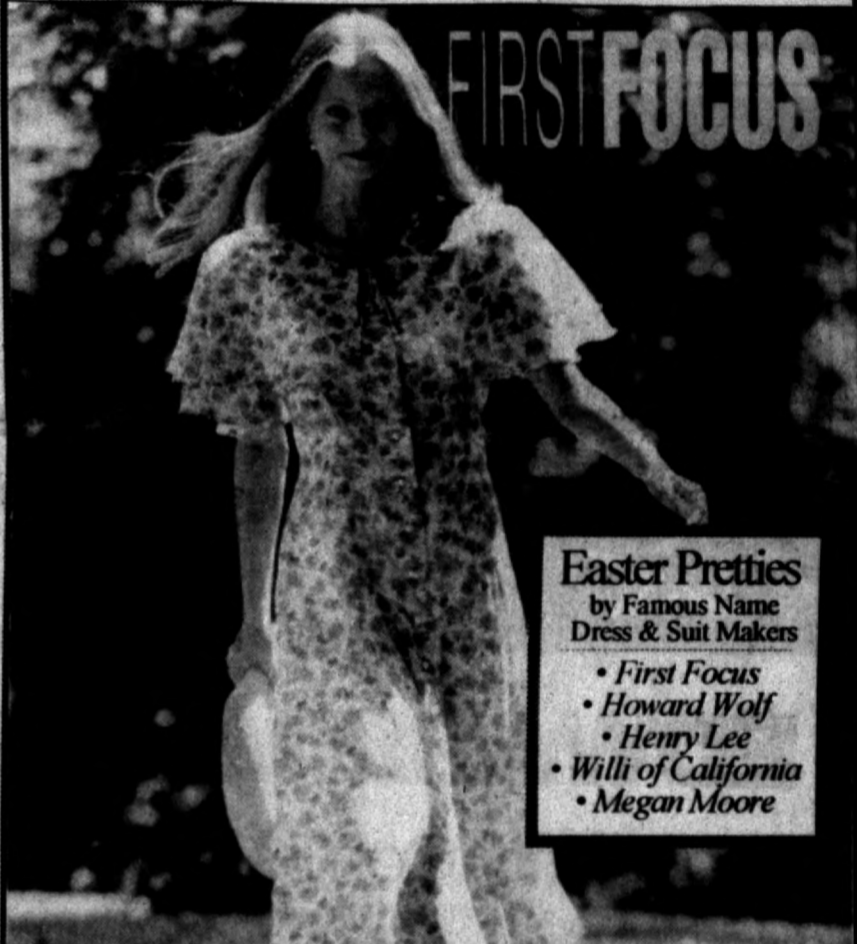

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Extension News

By BEVERLY HARDER CARING FOR CHRONICALLY ILL CHILDREN

Being a parent is tough enough when children are healthy and suffer only from the usual childhood illnesses and ailments, but parents of chronically ill children face even greater challenges.

Parents who care for a chronically ill child, whether for a short or long term period, need support and assistance. Recognizing the potential for stress and its effects is the first step. Parents experiencing stress may needlessly feel guilty or incompetent. Instead of letting these negative feelings take control, admitting the real frustrations of the situation and getting assistance may reduce family tension and improve personal health.

Caregivers who experience stress are not alone. A recent study by the National Institutes of Health surveyed families who provided care at home for children with chronic conditions such as cystic fibrosis, multiple birth defects and injuries. Results of the survey showed that more than half of the mothers and more than two-thirds of the fathers reported serious distress symptoms.

The parents in the survey experienced depression, anxiety and disturbed eating and sleeping habits. Some felt "trapped" by the responsibility of care. Others feared for the family's economic well-being. Marital problems arose due to the overwhelming stress. Overall family tension increased for all family members.

Parents who care for a chronically ill child have places to turn for support

and assistance. For example, staff members of the Texas Respite Resource Network (TRNN), a state clearinghouse for information, link families with services available in Texas. TRNN, located in San Antonio, can be reached by calling (210) 228-2794.

Family caregivers also find help through local offices of health and mental health departments or community organizations like the United Way. State agencies, such as the Texas Department of Human Services and Texas Department of Health, offer programs that specifically address concerns of family caregivers. Local county Extension offices have educational materials and can offer suggestions for finding assistance.

Getting support is vital to families with chronically ill children at home. Caregivers who take advantage of available services improve life for all family members faced with this stressful situation.

"Educational programs of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service are open to all citizens without regard to race, color, sex, disability, religion, age or national origin."


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

Between The Covers

"Does anybody read Robert Louis Stevenson anymore?" That question was posed by a writer in last week's Parade magazine. The answer, as I see it, is: probably not, and that's too bad. RLS was a great author, and his books continue to be entertaining to this day. *Kidnapped!* was a real cliff-hanger for me, though I must admit I had to brush up my English-Scotch history a bit. *Treasure Island*, of course, is a great pirate tale, but it has fallen the way of most stories under the Hollywood treatment—folks who have seen the movie think they know the story, and don't bother reading the book. *The Strange Case of Dr. Jekyll and Mr. Hyde* suffers the same fate, with an unusual twist. Most remakes interpret Hyde as some sort of a monster. The truth is really quite different, though not as horrific as modern versions. Just for the heck of it, pick up a "classic" to read. They're probably a lot different than what you remember from high school literature class.

New month, new displays. Norman Lusk is allowing us to show his wood carvings. Norm has been at this hobby for about eight years, and his carvings range from Donald Duck to portraiture. He uses no machines at all, relying mostly on knives he has made himself. They are stained with leather dye and finished with paste floor wax. He has a variety of flats, bas relief, sculpture, and even a novelty or two. He has sold some on occasion, but this motivation is that it's fun. Other displays were not in at press time.

Danielle Steel's new book *Accident* is out, the story of "lives forever changed, love that never dies, and people of remarkable courage." Sounds a little hokey to me, but as this is Steel's 32nd novel, who am I to argue with her success?

Dana Fuller Ross has another installment in the "Holts-An American Dynasty" series. *Pacific Destiny* starts with the battleship *Maine* being sunk in Havana Harbor. I'll leave it to the reader to discover what that has to do with the Pacific. Speaking of Ross...we discovered that Ross is one of the many pen names of Noel Bertram Gerson, a prolific writer of all kinds of books. He died in 1988, aged 74 years, but I don't know whether works recently released under his name are actually written by him, or merely exploit the name.

Murder by Sacrilege is another of D.R. Meredith's mysteries set in the Texas Panhandle. Here is the scenario: a preacher murders his truck-stop waitress bride and sets her up in a Christmas nativity scene. The best lawyer in West Texas is brought in to defend his client against Amarillo's

best assistant D.A. (And I thought Steel's book sounded hokey?)

I haven't been to a live concert (except for Community Concerts) in years now. The prices sort of outclassed me, plus I figure I can watch those guys on TV and save my money and wear-and-tear on my hind end. I must confess, however, that once concert stands out in my memory—the Roy Clark Show. In my opinion, Roy—guitarist, banjo picker, comedian—is absolutely one of the best entertainers ever. Country music fans will want to pick up his autobiography *My Life—In Spite of Myself!* (Incidentally, he is not only a fine

performer, but an astute businessman. He was the first "big name" to establish his own club in Branson, Missouri!)

Any town, I guess, has its share of little-told stories. Hereford, though, has a real prize in Hester Moore, and many of you may know of her years as a missionary in China, and her capture and imprisonment by the Japanese. Whether you do or not, though, you will want to read *Kept In His Care*, the story in Hester's own words.

Spring isn't far away. Remember the library can fix you up with a book to help you landscape, build a project, plan a trip, or just escape!

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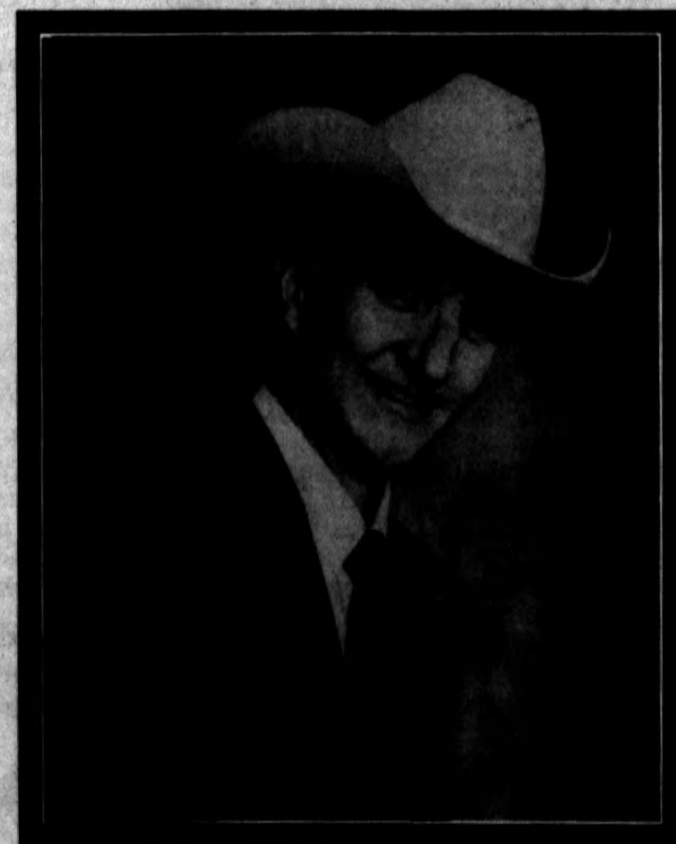

Hints from Heloise

Q. Help! How do I get those awful coffee stains out of my coffee mugs? I've used all kinds of cleaners, but to no avail. We have very hard water.

A. You don't say if they are plastic or ceramic, but this should help. Sprinkle some baking soda onto a damp cloth or sponge and rub it into the stained areas. Leave it for a while and if necessary rub again until the stains are removed.

Giving those coffee mugs a baking soda scrub every once in a while should keep them stain-free.

Ag farm price index shows no change

WASHINGTON (AP) - The Agriculture Department's index that measures movements in prices farmers receive for the goods they sell was unchanged in February from January.

The department reported Monday that producers received higher prices for cotton, hogs, lettuce and strawberries in February, but they received lower prices for cattle, milk, tomatoes and sweet corn.

Prices were 5 percent higher than in February 1993. Increases for corn, milk, onions and soybeans offset declines for cattle, celery, lettuce and sweet corn.

Despite the stable index, there

were some changes for crops grown in the 1993 disaster areas.

Soybean prices dropped 8 cents in February, to \$6.64 a bushel, largely on news of improved crop prospects in South America, but were up from \$5.56 a year earlier. The index of all oilseeds, including soybeans, was 17 percent higher than a year earlier.

Corn prices rose by 3 cents, to \$2.73 a bushel, compared with \$2 a year earlier.

Durum wheat, used to make pasta, rose 26 cents, to \$5.23 a bushel. It sold for \$3.08 a year ago.

Some of the prices paid to farmers in February:

-- Upland cotton was reported at

66.2 cents a pound in February, up from 63.7 cents in January. A year earlier, cotton was 53.8 cents a pound.

-- Hogs averaged \$47.30 a hundredweight, up from \$43.50 in January and \$44 a year earlier.

-- Lettuce was \$10.70 a hundredweight, up from \$8.03 in January but down from \$18.80 a year earlier.

-- Strawberries were \$1.01 a pound, compared with 80.1 cents in January and 93.6 cents in February 1993.

-- Cattle were \$69.10 a hundredweight, down from \$70 in January and \$75.80 a year earlier.

-- Milk was \$13.50 a hundred-

weight, down from \$13.70 in January but up from \$12.30 the previous year.

-- Tomatoes were \$23.50 a hundredweight, down from \$41.10 in January but up from \$21.90 in February 1993. Increased supplies from Florida and Mexico combined with lighter demand to push down prices.

-- Sweet corn was \$20.40 a hundredweight, down from \$26.40 in January and from \$36.80 the previous February.

-- Celery was \$9.75 a hundredweight, down from \$11.90 in January and \$35.50 a year earlier.

-- Onions were \$34.10 a hundredweight, up from \$31.70 in January and \$14 in February 1993.

Accident incidence high with livestock

AUSTIN -- Accidents involving domestic livestock cause thousands of farm injuries annually, ranking second only to machinery in total numbers, reminds the Texas Agriculture Commissioner, Rick Perry.

In a five-state study conducted by the National Safety Council, animals were a factor in one of eight farm injuries and in fewer than 100 deaths. Farm family members were victims more than 90 percent of the time.

Though generally less severe than those caused by machinery, animal-related injuries involve considerable loss of time, money and productivity.

"Living and working around livestock can pose special dangers for producers and their families," Perry said. "As simple as it sounds, taking precautions when caring for and handling animals will cut the risk of accidents dramatically."

Safety Considerations vary according to the type of livestock. Beef cattle, for example, can startle easily, inflicting injury on anyone in their way. They are sensitive to sudden or unexpected loud noises and are upset by small animals, such as dogs. Since cattle can overwhelm a person with their size and weight, it is important to leave an "out" when trying to corner or work with them.

Hogs can bite with great force and are large enough to knock people over. To avoid startling them, make your presence known gently and quietly. Knocking on the pen enclosure door or rattling the handle usually will suffice.

Sheep also should be approached and handled carefully. Being butted by a ram can cause serious injury to a child or elderly person. Ewes will

protect their young and may turn aggressive if they feel threatened.

Many people are injured -- and some are killed -- riding horses. Children are at special risk. Make sure they can ride and handle a horse before allowing them to ride alone. Encourage young riders to enroll in 4-H or other equestrian programs.

Perry listed some safety precautions that will reduce risk of accident:

-- Use adequate restraining and handling facilities.

-- Provide good footing for handling operations by keeping floors and ramps clean and be careful when slippery conditions are unavoidable.

-- Wear protective footwear and headgear.

-- Entrust livestock handling jobs to persons with adequate strength and experience.

-- Ensure that children moderate play around animals.

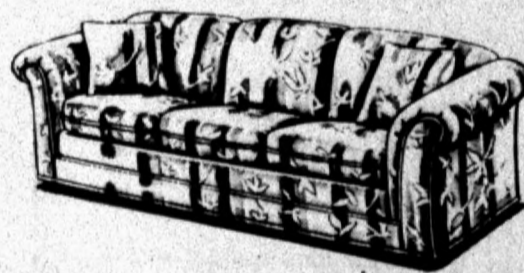

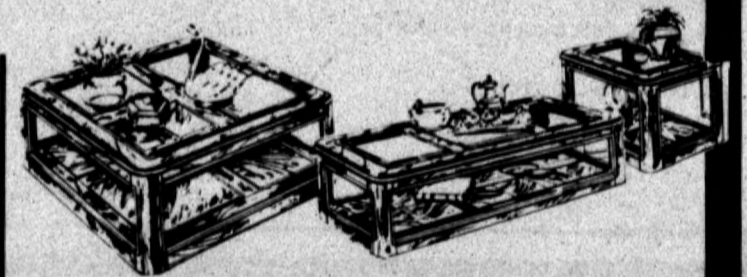

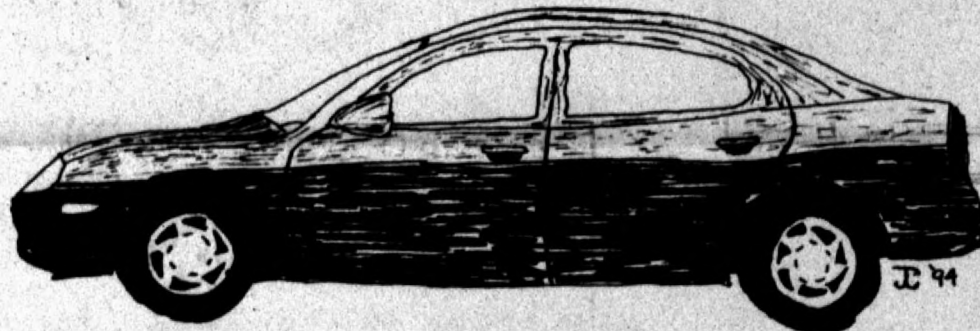
3. Agree or disagree and explain why: Gang activity in Hereford is minimal and is not a significant factor in crimes being committed around schools.

'X-Files' offers enough fear and fun to fill a flying saucer



Special Agents Dana Scully and Fox Mulder (Gillian Anderson and David Duchovny) try to solve strange mysteries on Fox's eerie and frightening "The X-Files," which airs Fridays. Their search for the truth takes them on cases of alien abductions, paranormal activity and other unexplainable phenomena.

Belief in extraterrestrials, telepaths and ghosts isn't needed to enjoy Fox's "The X-Files." Even the stars don't fully believe.

"I believe in the paranormal," David Duchovny says, "but not necessarily, specifically, what we go after in the show." Duchovny plays FBI Special Agent Fox Mulder.

His co-star, Gillian Anderson, who plays the more skeptical Special Agent Dana Scully, agrees with him. "It's somewhat obvious that some things are more far-fetched than others, and especially working from this end of it and knowing the techniques in making something look scarier than it actually is. But in general, I have a pretty open mind about those kinds of things."

The Friday series follows the two agents as they explore the unexplainable, such as powerful parasites, gender-shifting murderers and people who spontaneously create fire. Agent Mulder usually attributes these mysteries to aliens or humans with extraordinary abilities while agent Scully tries to find logical and rational explanations, like weather balloons and mirages.

The intended result, according to Anderson, is not just to scare viewers.

"It's also out to intrigue people and to get people's minds working," she says. "I think that it inspires a lot of discussion about what is real and what is not real, and so I think it's intellectually stimulating. But it's certainly a mystery and certainly captivates audiences and I think it's one of the strong points of the show."

One of the concepts that appeals to Duchovny is the idea that the government might fear an extraterrestrial and attempt a cover-up.

"The government plays the part of the parents of the population," he says, "and it's not only the point that (an

alien is) a dangerous being on the Earth, but that people can't handle truth, that everybody would go crazy if we actually thought we were in danger of being contacted from the sky. So the government is kind of the overprotective parent in the show, and I'm kind of the son who wants the truth to be known; who comes to the dinner table saying 'Mom's an alcoholic!'"

In addition to scaring viewers and presenting ideas that deserve thought and discussion, there's also some fun, especially from Duchovny's character.

"They (the writers) know that it's something that I like to do and something that I think is important for the show, so I think everybody's kind of aware that we should go light occasionally, or bring out the irony."

Duchovny even jokes that "originally the show was pitched to another network and the character's name was NBC Mulder."

The show pays homage to its peers occasionally; horror and science fiction films such as "The Thing" and "Silence of the Lambs."

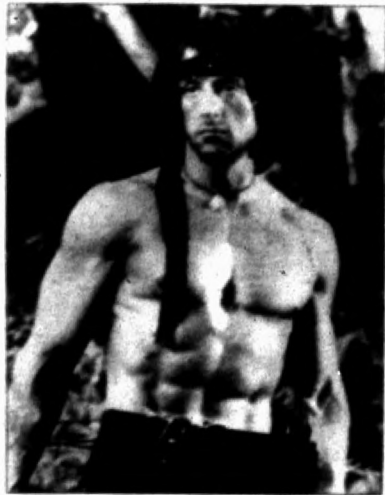
But the show's sense of horror is still boss. The fear is often created not only from special effects, but from genuine suspense, mystery and unique plots, such as an episode dealing with an Amish-like community made up of hive-dwelling aliens who change between male and female.

"What's funny is when I talk to interviewers, or whatever, I sometimes catch myself (describing an episode) as if it's completely natural, talking about everyday experiences," Anderson says. "But this is what it's about."

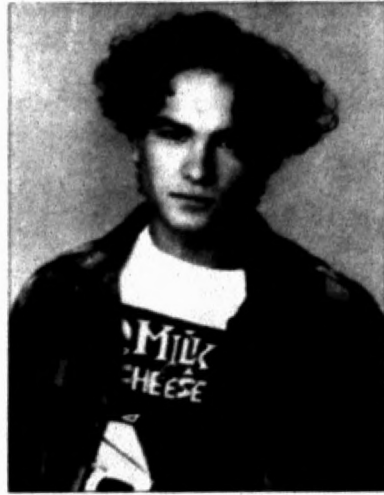
Perhaps the days of lions and tigers and bears are over. Now fear and mystery are the domain of aliens, telepaths and "The X-Files."

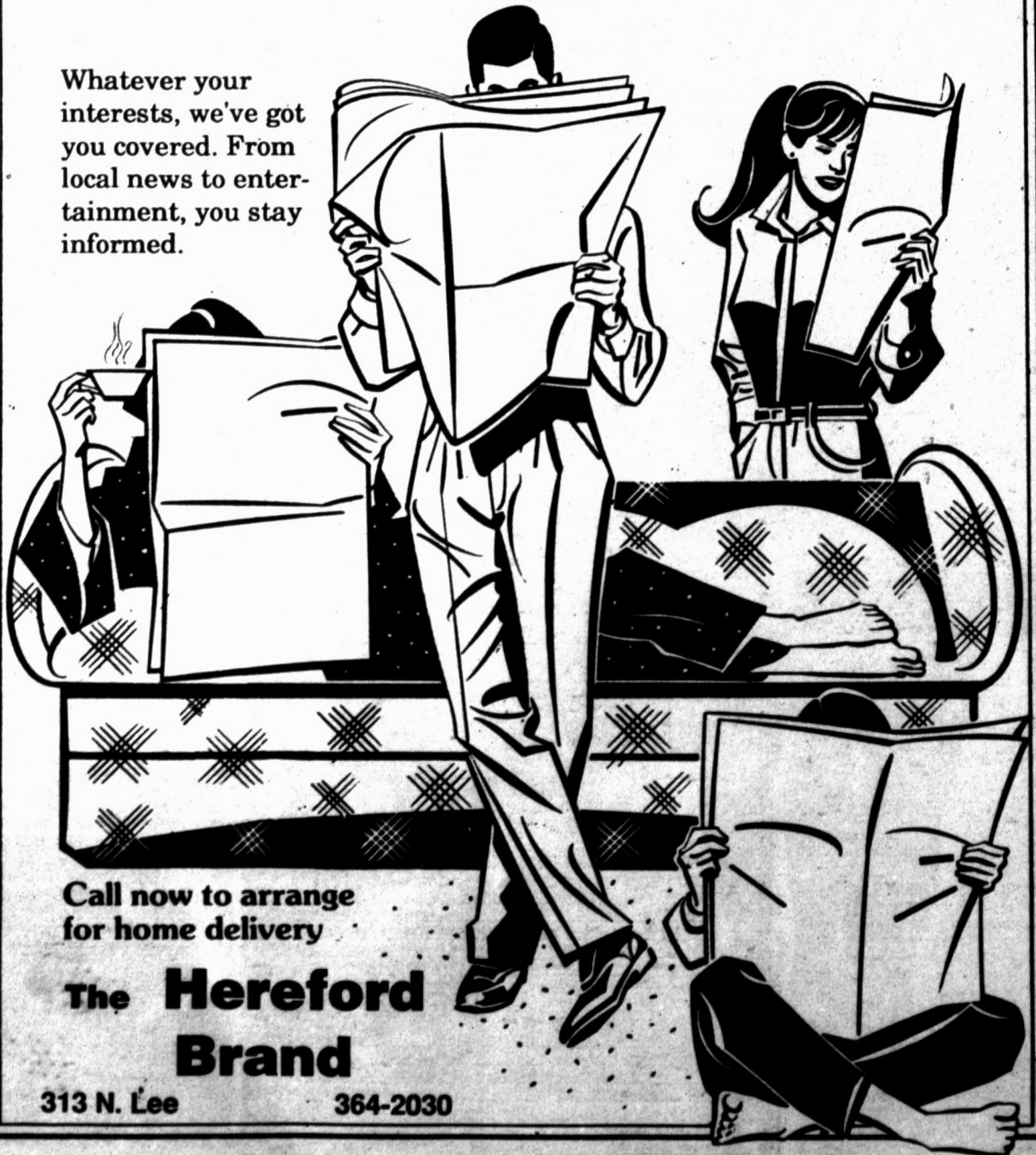

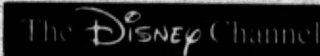

Cable TV hears viewer concerns, responds with Voices Against Violence

Voices Against Violence was launched by the National Cable Television Association last month.

Endorsed by basic and premium services from the Vision Interfaith Satellite Network to the Playboy Entertainment Group, the industry-wide anti-violence campaign has three goals:

To give viewers more information and control over program choices through advisories and technology; to reduce gratuitous violence through the use of standards and practices policies, responsible scheduling and promotional ads suitable to air time; and to devote industry resources to viewer education and awareness efforts aimed at reducing violence in society.

None of this, however, is an admission of guilt; it is an attempt to avert threats of legislation and censorship. In a January press conference, HBO chairman Michael Fuchs repeated the widely held belief that television is an easy target for Congress.

"This is a friction-free issue for most legislators," Fuchs said. "Violence has no constituency."

"When there is a substantive problem in this country, there is a tendency to attack the media instead of attack the problem. ... Television has not caused the problem in this country. There was violence long before television existed."

"But we have contributed. There is gratuitous violence. ... (At) HBO, we do show a lot of theatrical movies that

fall within this category. We don't show the consequences of violence, which I think is very dangerous."

For this reason, Fuchs has participated in talks with Sen. Paul Simon (D-Illinois), and HBO endorses use of the so-called V chip, a television implant that would block reception of violent programming.

But, says Fuchs, "Let's not be as hypocritical as the Colombians, who have passed laws to ban violence on the airwaves. I do not believe that that is the prime cause for the trouble in Colombia, or they're watching some awfully powerful television."

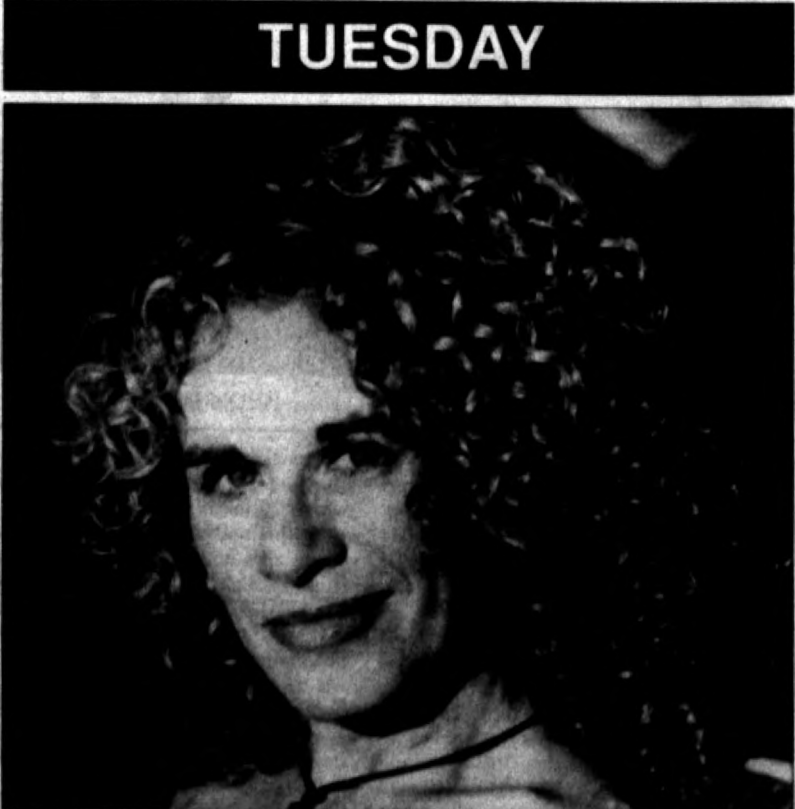

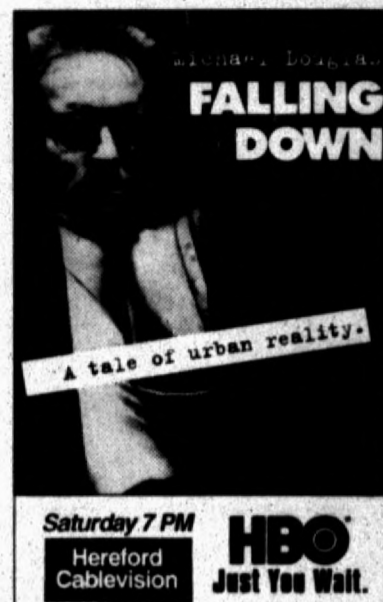

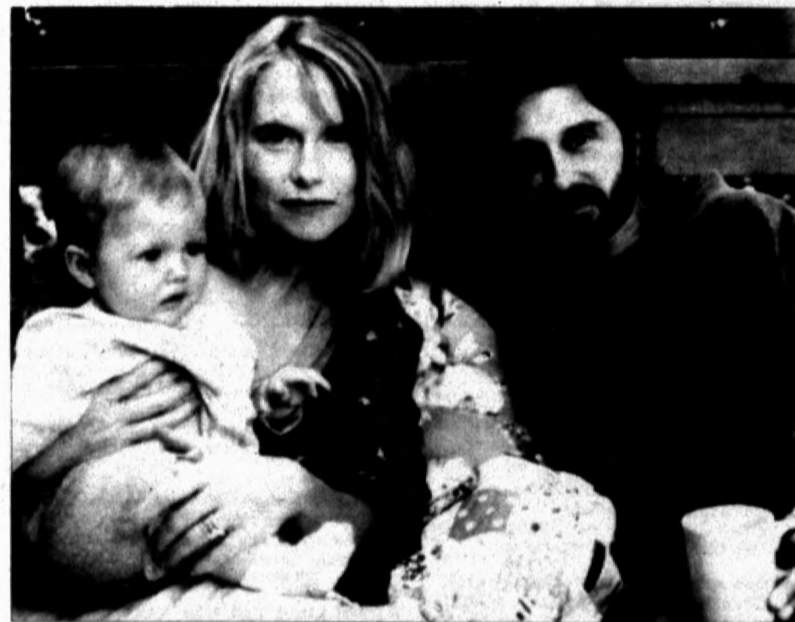

AIDS drama on Lifetime is a quiet piece of perfection

While the Oscar-nominated "Philadelphia" continues to make waves in movie theaters with its story of a victim of AIDS discrimination, a little made-for-Lifetime TV movie slips in the back door and gets everything right. That's right. Everything.

It would be hard to over-praise "And Then There Was One," the fact-based drama that premieres Wednesday, March 9, on the cable channel. The richly nuanced teleplay by Rama Laurie Stagner somehow manages to hit all the key points in a story about living with AIDS, without turning into a shrill video pamphlet on the subject.

Comedy writers Roxy and Vinnie Ventola ("The Powers That Be") tried for more than six years to conceive a child before Roxy gave birth to Miranda Rose. Four months later, Miranda was diagnosed as HIV-positive. So were her parents.

Vinnie and Miranda died in November 1991, within a week of one another. The feisty Roxy, who redefines the word "survivor," today splits her time between being an AIDS

activist, screenwriter and wife (she remarried in 1993).

Amy Madigan ("Field of Dreams"), a smart, aggressively unsentimental actress, gives an award-caliber performance as Roxy, deftly assisted by Dennis Boutsikaris ("The Jackie Thomas Show") as Vinnie.

While the Lifetime movie is commendable on a number of fronts, perhaps none is more significant than the way it treats an issue that continues to have an appalling fascination for too many people. Watch for a beautifully subtle restaurant scene in which the Ventolas decide to reveal their illness to two sets of their friends.

"How?" asks the husband of Roxy's best friend.

"You know," replies Madigan's Roxy, her eyes flashing, "with tuberculosis, or hepatitis, or even a cold, nobody asks you 'how?' Mark, how could you say that? Better that I got it from a blood transfusion than by having sex? I mean, it's not like there's 'good AIDS,' is there?"

No. And there are precious few truly exceptional dramas on the subject. This is one of them.
