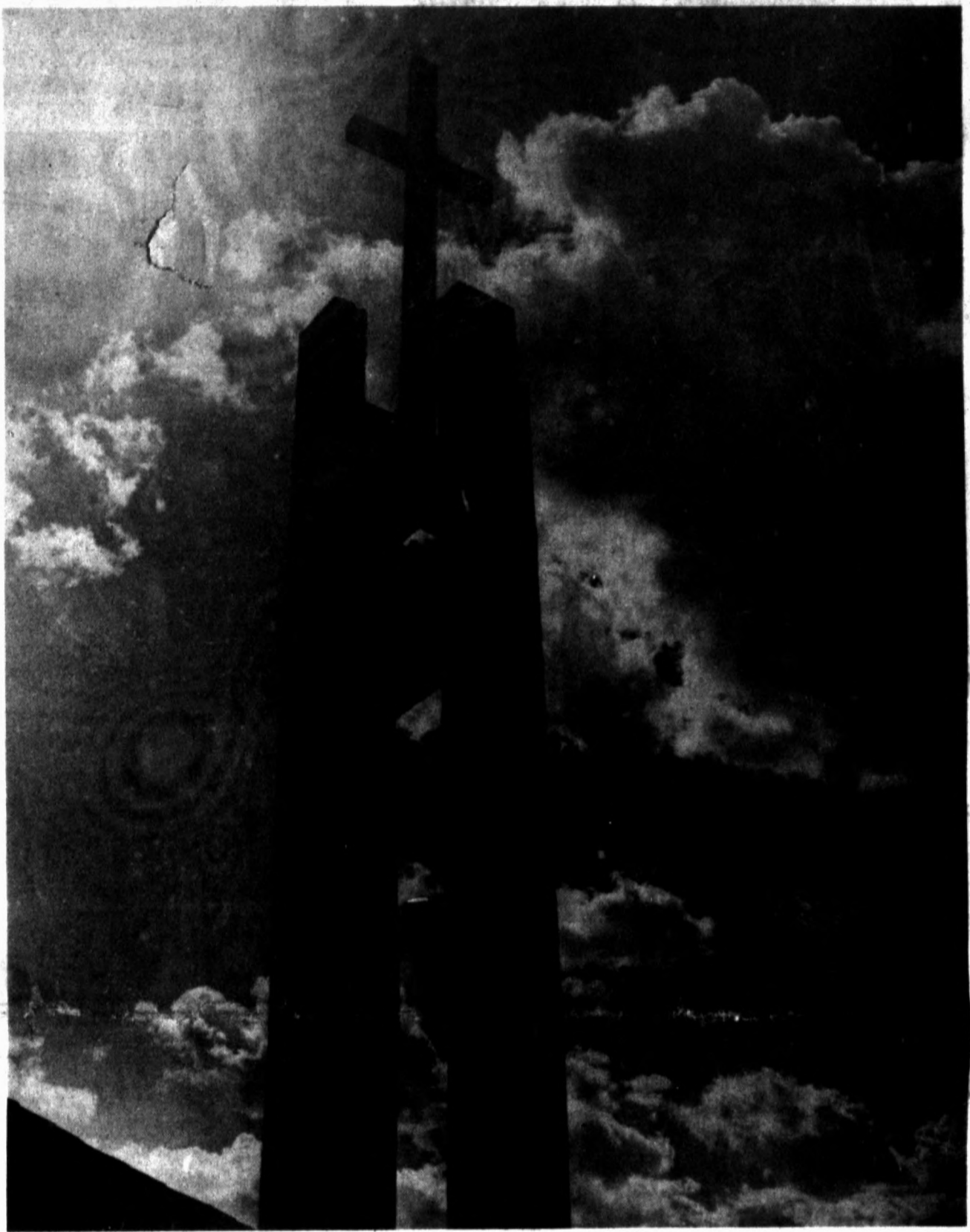

House panel probing high-priced connector

 WASHINGTON (AP) - To the \$600 hammer and the \$2,000 toilet seat, the Pentagon can now add a \$544 spark plug connector.
 That high-priced auto part, used in the engine of an unmanned reconnaissance aircraft, caught the eye of a House panel investigating allegations of price gouging by a defense contractor.
 After whistleblowers, frustrated by their own superiors, alerted lawmakers, the House Armed Services investigations subcommittee found that the Navy was being asked to pay more than \$544 for a simple spark plug connector available at local hardware stores for \$10.77.
 The spark plug connector helps run the motor of the Navy's Pioneer Unmanned Aerial Vehicle, a drone aircraft used to take reconnaissance videotape of battle fronts for ground

troops. The drone was used extensively in the Persian Gulf War.
 "The engine of the Pioneer is not exotic. It's basically a snowmobile engine," said subcommittee chairman Rep. Norman Sisisky, D-Va.
 The subcommittee investigation is not complete, but Sisisky wanted to make it public to thwart possible Navy retribution against the whistleblowers.
 Sisisky said overpricing in the program could add up to millions of lost taxpayer dollars. The Navy says each Pioneer drone costs \$850,000.
 Investigators found several examples of what appeared to be egregious overpricing on spare parts by the contractor, Pioneer UAV Inc. of Hunt Valley, Md. But the connector set off alarms.
 "The contractor price quoted to the government to supply the replacement spark plug connectors was \$544.09 and required a

five-month delivery time," Sisisky said. "One phone call to the original manufacturer of the part provided us the name of a Washington-area retailer. There, the staff bought the identical part for \$10.77, including tax."
 Pioneer UAV Inc. is a joint venture run by Israeli Aircraft Industries, a company based in Israel, and Aircraft Armament Inc., also of Hunt Valley. Officials at Pioneer did not return a phone call Friday seeking comment. AAI officials had the day off and could not be reached.
 A Navy spokesman also declined to comment Friday on the Pioneer.
 Pioneer UAV has argued to both the Navy and the subcommittee that the Navy never paid \$544 for the part. Instead, the connector was included in a "parts package" priced at \$25,000. The committee has not yet completed an item-by-item breakdown.



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Panhandle Transit provides special transportation niche

 Keith Lindell wanted to be useful, to contribute to the community, but he needed some help with transportation to accomplish his purpose.
 Lindell turned to what has been called the "best kept secret in the Panhandle" -- a public transportation system operated by Panhandle Community Services.
 Panhandle Transit operates in Hereford and a dozen other communities, providing low cost transportation to citizens who need the service.
 Lindell, a disabled young man, is a volunteer at the Hereford office of the Texas Department of Human Services.
 He gets to and from the office in a 12-passenger van with a hydraulic lift that will handle his wheelchair. Five days a week, the van transports him.
 The service provides residents with rides within Hereford or to Amarillo for medical purposes.
 Although Panhandle Transit has been in operation for several

years, its existence has not been widely known, or understood, said Celia Serrano, PCS regional manager.
 To re-introduce the program, a special offer is being made.
 Martha Galvan Hereford PCS center coordinator, said free transportation will be offered on Monday, Wednesday and Friday, for trips in Hereford.
 A modest 25 cents will be charged for trips on Tuesday and Thursday. A round trip is 50 cents.
 Persons who need medical attention in Amarillo or must go to the airport or bus station are charged at the rate of 15 cents per mile. Typically, a round trip costs \$15.
 Use of the bus service is not limited to elderly or disabled persons, reminded Serrano.
 "It's available to anyone. If your car is being worked on, we'll take you to work," she added.
 There is at least one proviso, though. For a specific time and day, an appointment must be made at least 24 hours in advance, said

Galvan.
 "Sometimes we can accommodate someone, but we can't promise until we have enough notice," she continued.
 Panhandle Transit operates two mini-vans in Hereford and the 12-passenger bus with the wheelchair lift. Two fulltime employees, Sammie Lance and Taryn Zahodnik, drive the vehicles for PCS.
 Many clients of Panhandle transit either have no car or are unable to drive. The service has been particularly beneficial for those who must keep medical appointments, in both Hereford and Amarillo.
 For Keith Lindell and others, Panhandle Transit responds to a need that has no other solution.
 In Hereford and most of the other Panhandle area towns served by Panhandle Transit, there is no taxi or bus to provide transportation, said PCS officials.
 Panhandle Transit fills the gap, much to the relief of Keith Lindell and many other citizens of the area.

Early voting to start Monday for runoffs

Early voting for the April 12 primary runoff elections will begin Monday and continue through the week, 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. daily, in the office of the Deaf Smith County clerk.
 The Democratic runoff features two races in Deaf Smith County as well as three state contests.
 Precinct 2 voters will choose between Lupo Chavez, incumbent, and Berbie Griego for the nomination for commissioner. The winner will face a Republican, Conny Whitehorn, in the November general election.
 Two candidates, Nan Rogers and Lois Jones, are seeking the county treasurer's position. There is no Republican candidate for the office. Longtime treasurer Vesta Mae Nunley is retiring at the end of this term.
 The hotly-contested state race for the Democratic nomination for U.S. Senator will be decided in the runoff. Either Richard Fisher or Jim Mattox will run in November against Senator Kay Bailey Hutchison.
 Texas Republicans have two statewide races to decide in the runoff. There are no county contests on the ballot.
 Persons who voted in the March primary elections are eligible to vote in the runoffs but may not change parties, reminded Deaf Smith County Clerk David Ruland who also is chief election officer for the county. Those who did not vote in primaries may vote in the runoff of their choice, he said.

Chimayo pilgrims walk for variety of reasons

CHIMAYO, N.M. (AP) - It is not yet mid-morning, but the sun is high and it's already warm enough to make pilgrims shed their jackets.

The twisting two-lane road is clogged with walkers marking the miles to the Santuario de Chimayo.

Past apple orchards and fields ready for planting, budding globe willows and huge old cottonwoods, the Good Friday pilgrims stride on.

By Easter Sunday, tens of thousands of people will have made the trek to this tiny village in hilly northern New Mexico.

For almost two centuries, they have come: drawn by the promise of healing power in dirt scooped from the floor of the tiny Roman Catholic

church.

They enter the dimly lit adobe sanctuary built in 1813, to pray, or perhaps light a candle, and scoop up a handful of the healing earth from a hole in the floor.

"I've been doing it since I was a little girl," said Molly Chavez.

For the past three decades, Chavez has made the pilgrimage with a group of her Santa Fe friends and neighbors. Now fit fiftysomethings, some are retired and some, like Chavez, still work for the state.

"When we first started off, it was to show our children the tradition," said Judy Basham, the state's personnel director, who joined Chavez and their friends for 7 a.m. coffee and a car pool.

"Usually, I walk in thanksgiving

for the year's blessings. Also, that whatever comes in our life we may be able to accept," Basham said.

The group drives to Santa Cruz, near Espanola, to begin the three-hour pilgrimage. Others begin the trek earlier in the week, departing from as far away as Albuquerque, 80 miles to the south.

The walking pace is steady and the stops are few and brief - to pray at a tiny roadside chapel; to accept an orange from a soldier at one of the National Guard aid stations; to inspect an apricot tree's buds, shrivelled by recent snow.

There is time to meditate, to gossip, to sing "Amazing Grace," to remark on a new fence or a remodeled house, to marvel at the snowcapped Truchas Peaks in the distance.

"What I think has kept us doing this is that we do it for special intentions, and over the years our special intentions have been fulfilled," said Betty Sena, another member of Chavez' group.

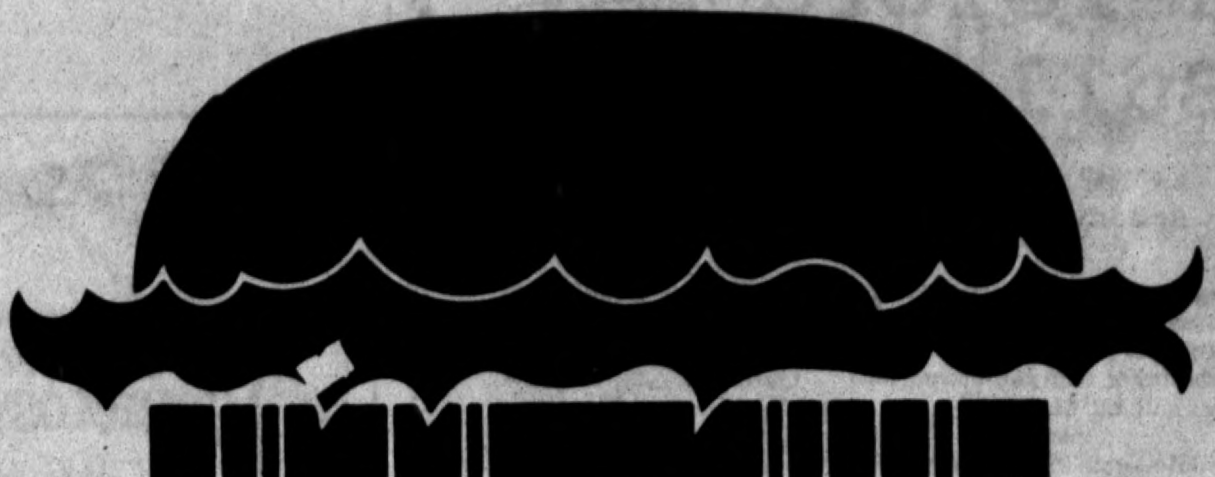
As far as the eye can see there are pilgrims, hugging the roadside, dodging the cars.

Most are walkers, but there are joggers, too, and bicyclists and babies in carriages. A trio of older men play stringed instruments and sing as they walk.

There may be as many reasons for making this pilgrimage as there are pilgrims.

On the crowded plaza in front of the Santuario, Anastacio Zamora clasps his 9-month-old son and a 4-1/2-foot plywood cross. The machine operator and his family walked 15 miles lugging the cross, which bears the names of all the family members.

It's a display of faith, and a way to thank God that their grandfather survived a stroke, Zamora said.

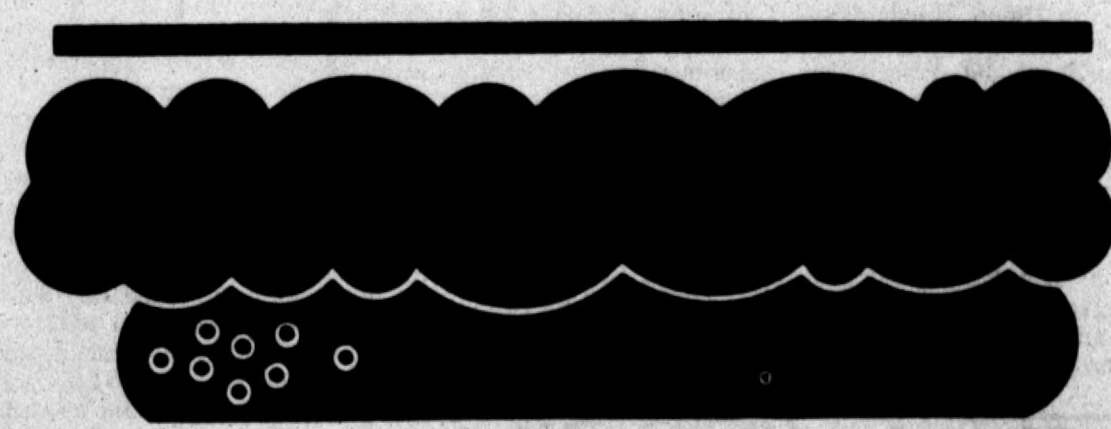

Focus on Your City

Spring has arrived and with it several activities being carried on by the City of Hereford. I think probably a couple of the most exciting activities, if you haven't seen them, would be the construction going forward on the new million-gallon water storage tank directly behind the Community Center, the pipeline being laid from the present landfill into the city and drilling of a Santa Rosa well at the landfill site.

These improvements definitely will mean that there will be additional water available for the residents of Hereford when we get to that time of year when everyone uses so much water. If you haven't looked at the hole in the ground for the storage tank, it's worth a quick drive by just to see how big it is!

Probably the thing that will impact you and your city the most in the next few months will be the closure of our Type I landfill and, consequently, the hauling of our city garbage to the landfill in Amarillo or Canyon. The city will maintain a Type IV landfill at the existing site, but Type IV can only take such items as grass clippings, tree limbs, concrete and those things which do not deteriorate as household garbage.

The reason I say this will probably impact you as a citizen is our request that you help us financially by placing only household garbage in the dumpsters and that you place grass clippings, branches, etc., in the alley behind your house so that we may pick them up with city trucks and dispose of them at the Type IV landfill.

If we don't do this, first of all our costs to haul all waste to Amarillo will accelerate greatly; and, secondly, we do not have adequate trucks, so our garbage collection would be much slower. Please do cooperate with us by placing only your household garbage in the dumpsters for all our best interests.

In recent months, I had the opportunity to meet with some of our Hispanic citizens to find out if, in fact, we as a city are communicating with them. The answer to that was simply "no." In many cases the best solution to reach them would be through the radio station's Hispanic program broadcast every evening. Consequently, on April 5, your Mayor and City Commissioners are starting a twice-a-month informational session with KPAN, aimed directly at our Hispanic citizens. We all hope that we can do a better job in telling our citizens what's going on in

Hereford. Let me suggest that you might want to tune in at 7 p.m. on the First and third Tuesdays of each month for this broadcast.

For those of you anxiously awaiting the construction of our new aquatic center, we will kick off the major construction phase later in April and will be in full swing by May. All of us are excited about the prospects, as I'm sure you are. In my visits around the area, I can't tell you the number of people who have said to me, "Boy, it's great that Hereford is getting a new swimming center and from the plans we have heard, it should be one of the top aquatic centers in the Panhandle." We're going to make it that way with your help.

Look forward to another breakfast with the mayor about the middle of April. Will keep you informed as to the date.

Come see us at our City Commission meetings, which are held the first and third Mondays of each month at 7:30 p.m. We welcome you and I'm delighted to tell you that we continue to have a few more citizens attend our sessions. As always, I'm glad to hear from our citizens.

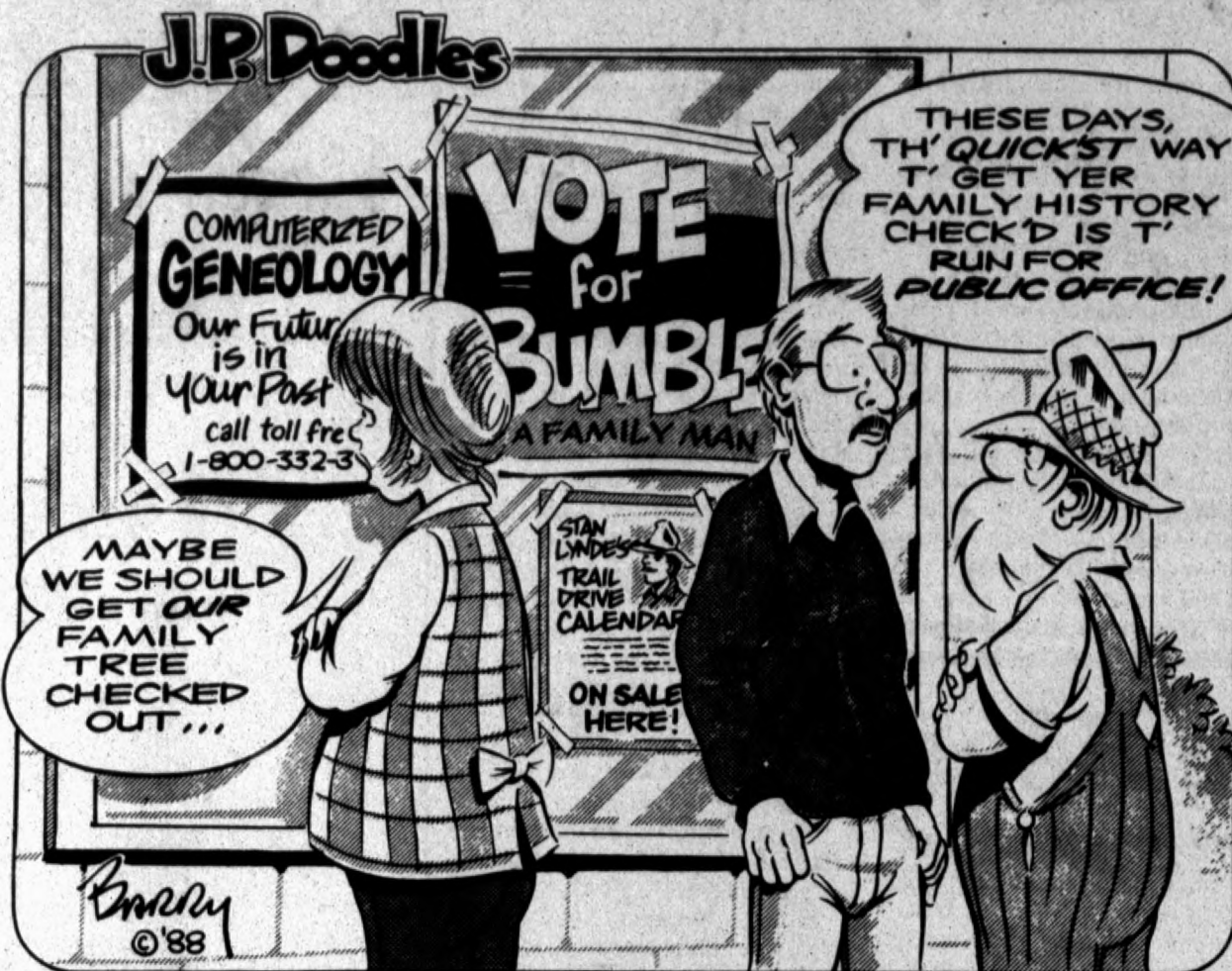

An open letter to President Clinton

A sea of grass. It was an applicable description of this area when Coronado came this way in 1541. His men used huge mounds of buffalo chips to mark their paths. Sometimes they had to wait until the sun was setting to tell directions. In the evening, the camp would start big fires to help guide the men back to camp.

The Indians, however, knew their way through this sea of grass. They hunted buffalo, deer and antelope on the land where we live today. The Tierra Blanca Creek was used as a highway by the Indians. There were no trees anywhere, not even along the Creek. Those trees were brought back from the Palo Duro Canyon and planted by XIT cowboys. There were no weeds, mesquite or cactus. The seeds for these plants came on the hooves and in the stomachs of the cattle that were brought up the trail from south Texas and New Mexico.

The 1880 census shows the total

population of Deaf Smith County to be 39 residents. These people came from 13 states, Scotland and Ireland. Only seven were women. Several occupations were listed. One man was a stockman, one a bookkeeper, one a hotel keeper and another was listed as a huckster (peddler). Most of the men's occupations were listed as herders, which probably meant sheep herders. However, change was quickly taking place in the 1880s. The western half of this county became a part of the XIT Ranch, and sheep range started to become range for cattle. Nutritious grasses that once fed sheep and buffalo now became pasture for thousands of cattle. This continues today.

We would like to invite you to visit the Deaf Smith County Museum to see some of the artifacts and information about these times. Bring your children and grandchildren; the museum may be the only place where you know more than they do.

NEW YORK (AP) - Charles Osgood is stepping into Charles Kuralt's shoes as anchor of CBS' "Sunday Morning," but he doesn't expect to fill them.

"Although I'm succeeding Charles Kuralt, I know that I cannot replace him. Nobody could," Osgood said after Friday's announcement.

Osgood, known as CBS' "poet in residence" for his occasional light verse and "The Osgood File," his droll CBS Radio feature, takes over on Sunday, April 10. He'll continue "The Osgood File."

"Charles Osgood is the ideal choice," the one we were all hoping for," said Kuralt, whose final broadcast is Easter Sunday. He retires May 1 after 37 years with CBS News.

"Sunday Morning" will be in the care of a sensitive and thoughtful old friend. The lovely thing about this is that the broadcast won't miss a beat," Kuralt said.

"We knew that the person who replaced Charles Kuralt would have to share Charles' vision of the

broadcast as well as his love of music, the arts and Americana," CBS News President Eric Ober said. "We are proud and honored to have this special person come from within the CBS family."

Osgood joined CBS News as a New York-based correspondent in 1971 following a six-year stint at WCBS radio in New York City. He won Peabody awards for broadcast excellence in 1985 and 1986.

Before joining CBS, Osgood spent four years on general assignment for ABC News. He previously worked as general manager for WHCT radio in Hartford, Conn., and program director and general manager for WGMS radio in Washington, D.C.

Osgood is the author of four books. "Nothing Could Be Finer than a Crisis that is Minor in the Morning" and "There's Nothing I Wouldn't Do If You Would Be My POSSLO," are compilations of his best radio broadcasts.

The "Sunday Morning" format will not change, Ober said.

Girls' golf team hangs onto second

The Hereford girls' golf team shot its best round of the year during a district round Friday at Pitman Municipal Golf Course in Hereford. The effort kept the team in second place in District 1-4A through four of the six district rounds. The Hereford girls shot 368 on Friday for a four-round total of 1,558. They gained six strokes on district leader Berger, which shot 374 for a total of 1,518. The 368 was the Herd's best total

of the year, coach Stacey Bixler said, and it isn't entirely due to the fact that it was shot at Hereford's home course; the team shot 371 during the Hereford Invitational held two weeks ago. As well as Hereford played, third-place Pampa kept the pressure on with round of 372 for a four-round total of 1,573. Pampa is only 15 strokes behind Hereford for the second of District 1-4A's two regional berths, and one of the

remaining district rounds will be played in Pampa. "I would like for it to be more strokes, but it's really been like that since we started," Bixler said. "With where we are in experience, with Kelly (Kelso) the only one with any experience, you've got to feel good you're in second, in the hunt." Kelso led Hereford by shooting an 82. That kept her in third in the medalist competition with a four-round total of 351. She trails Dumas' Jamie McInturff (79--326) and Berger's Sarah Moore (79--333). Hereford's other girls were: Karen Manchee, 90; Jami Bell, 98; Kristin Calkins, 98; and Stephanie Bixler, 99. Ballpark at Arlington receives rave reviews

ARLINGTON, Texas (AP) - Nolan Ryan, now in retirement, threw out the first pitch in Friday's official unveiling of The Ballpark in Arlington, and it was enough to make him wish he were in uniform again. "I didn't miss spring training, but I would have liked to have been in uniform," Ryan said before an exhibition game between the Texas Rangers and the New York Mets that drew 45,236 - the largest crowd in franchise history. Ryan called the majesty of the ballpark awe-inspiring. "It's breathtaking. It's got a touch of the old ballparks with such a fresh look to it. The fans here get the convenience of new parks with the old look to it," Ryan said.

"This park should have a positive effect on the team." The stadium harkens back to yesteryear with its short right field porch and corners and angles. It's 334 down the left field line and 325 to right. It has a lot of the old-fashioned features of Camden Yards in Baltimore. "This is an awesome place," said Texas manager Kevin Kennedy. "We had 25,000 fans here on Thursday just for a workout. This is beautiful. Pure splendor." Managing partner George W Bush said, "We had been thinking about this place for five years. We dreamed a big dream. But we came through. Now, we've got to get a championship pennant to go with it. This is a new era for the Rangers."

"Nolan took us to a new level. This ballpark takes us to a higher level. This is day one of 75 years of baseball here. This stadium will stand the test of time," Bush added. "You get excited just walking into this place," said Texas slugger Jose Canseco. "I've been in a lot of

stadiums. But nothing compared to this one." Restaurants and executive suites ranging from \$30,000 to \$200,000 in price ring the outfield. "It's like a butterfly coming out

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Cowboys deal S Everett; Casillas headed to Chiefs

IRVING, Texas (AP) - Pro Bowl safety Thomas Everett and defensive tackle Tony Casillas - two key members of the Dallas Cowboys' back-to-back Super Bowl championship teams - will play for other clubs next season.

The Cowboys traded Everett to the Tampa Bay Buccaneers on Friday for a fourth-round draft pick this year, plus a fourth-round pick in 1995 if Everett makes the Pro Bowl this season.

Casillas, a 6-foot-3, 273-pound lineman, told the Fort Worth Star-Telegram Friday night that he will accept a four-year offer from the Kansas City Chiefs worth almost \$6 million. He made \$775,000 last year.

Dallas owner Jerry Jones said trading Everett helps the Cowboys in two ways.

"It provides us an additional draft pick, and it loosens up money for us

to use in signing up draft choices. I think Thomas Everett will be great in Tampa, and we should be grateful that he came in here and contributed to two Super Bowl teams with Pro Bowl-type performances," Jones said.

Casillas and Everett join a growing list of Cowboys who have left the club for a variety of reasons in recent weeks.

-National Guard members monitor known and suspected drug-smuggling routes and report suspicious actions to law enforcement entities.

-National Guard high-tech equipment such as night-vision goggles are lent to law enforcement agencies for use in counter drug operations.

-Guard personnel help train law enforcement officers.

-Helicopters transport spotters who identify marijuana growing on public land.

-Troops assist police in cutting and burning confiscated marijuana.

-Guardmembers conduct youth programs to encourage children and teenagers to stay in school and remain drug free.

Hereford Toastmasters represents diverse background

You can't mention Hereford Toastmasters without saying the name of Doc Adams.

Christened Milton Clem Adams, Doc, who was born in Sweetwater, Nolan County, Texas on May 16, 1918, will be 76 years old on his next birthday. He is also the oldest and longest standing member of the local Toastmasters club.

He proudly points to the fact that Preston Smith of Lubbock was a Toastmaster before he became

Governor of Texas. Former Toastmaster Waggoner Carr, also of Lubbock, later became Attorney General of the state. And two former governors of Oklahoma were Toastmasters, he said.

Adams has been an optometrist in Hereford since 1946. His business is up for sale, but until somebody buys it, he will continue to serve the community from his building at 335 N. Miles where he works with his receptionist Christina Lozoya.

Hereford Toastmasters was first organized by Club 211 in Amarillo

in June 1950. The first president was Robert E. Thompson.

Over the years, the club's membership fluctuated and the Toastmasters ceased functioning as a group in the 1980s when the membership fell to around four.

The club reorganized and today has more than 30 members who meet each Thursday at 6:30 a.m. at the Ranch House. The group recently started a Thursday night meeting at 7 p.m. at the Siroloin Stockade for members who aren't early risers, said Adams.

When he is asked why he likes Toastmasters so much, the optometrist has a ready answer.

"I joined Toastmasters originally because of the diverse background of the members," said Adams. "Being a Toastmaster exposes you to a liberal education."

"You don't want everybody to be alike. You want to learn from people."

He also said he had a desire to be able to speak and listen better.

"It's funny when you're a Toastmaster," he said. "After two or three years of hearing people give speeches, you get into the habit of counting everybody's ah's and pauses that interrupt."

Doc chuckled as he recalled how the local club used to have a bean can operator who would drop a bean into the can every time he heard an "Ah" or similar speech interruption.

"That can would just go plunk...plunk...plunk," said Doc.

Hereford Toastmasters compete in area speech contests in a number of communities -- Amarillo, Borger, Plainview, and Tulia. Division competition is held in north-central and south Texas. Regional contests are held in Nebraska, Louisiana, Kansas, Colorado, Oklahoma, Arkansas, New Mexico and Texas. And international competition can be held just about anywhere.

"Toastmasters International has

more than 130,000 members all over the world," Doc declared. "We're represented in Hong Kong, New Zealand, South America, and Mexico, for example."

"We were the first club to go behind the Iron Curtain. Right now we have a club in Moscow."

Top speakers are honored with a trophy, title, and sometimes travel expenses, but no cash, said Doc.

One of the more popular competitions sponsored by Toastmasters is the Tall Tale Contest. Recently Ed Gilbert of Hereford, a supervisor for Holly Sugar, placed first in a Tall Tale contest in Plainview and will advance to other competitions.

Linda Minchew, treasurer of the Hereford Club, won the international speech contest at Plainview and will compete in the division contest in Amarillo April 9 at Amarillo Public Library.

Rick Jackson is president of the Hereford Toastmasters and Wayne Winget and Margaret Del Toro are vice presidents. Joe Weaver of Hereford is area governor and Dee Hamilton is secretary.

Besides being involved in the

Lions Club, Boy Scouts, and American Legion, Doc Adams is a stamp collector and amateur photographer. He and his wife, Virginia, recently celebrated their 53rd wedding anniversary. They have one son, Bryan, of San Angelo, Texas who works in sales for a food processing company.

Doc Adams served as second governor for Area One for the state of Texas and was provisional governor for District 44, which "covers everything west of the 108th parallel in the state of Texas," he said. He also served as international director from

District 44 from 1962-64.

One of the best Toastmasters meetings he ever attended was in Waco, he said. Ted McCoy was one of the speakers.

"Ted, an international director, was called on to introduce 250 people in the room," said Doc. "He had the gift of total recall and not only introduced them by name, he told where they were from."

"Incredibly, he made only one mistake."

Anyone who wants to join the local group can contact any Toastmaster. Dues are \$28 every six months.

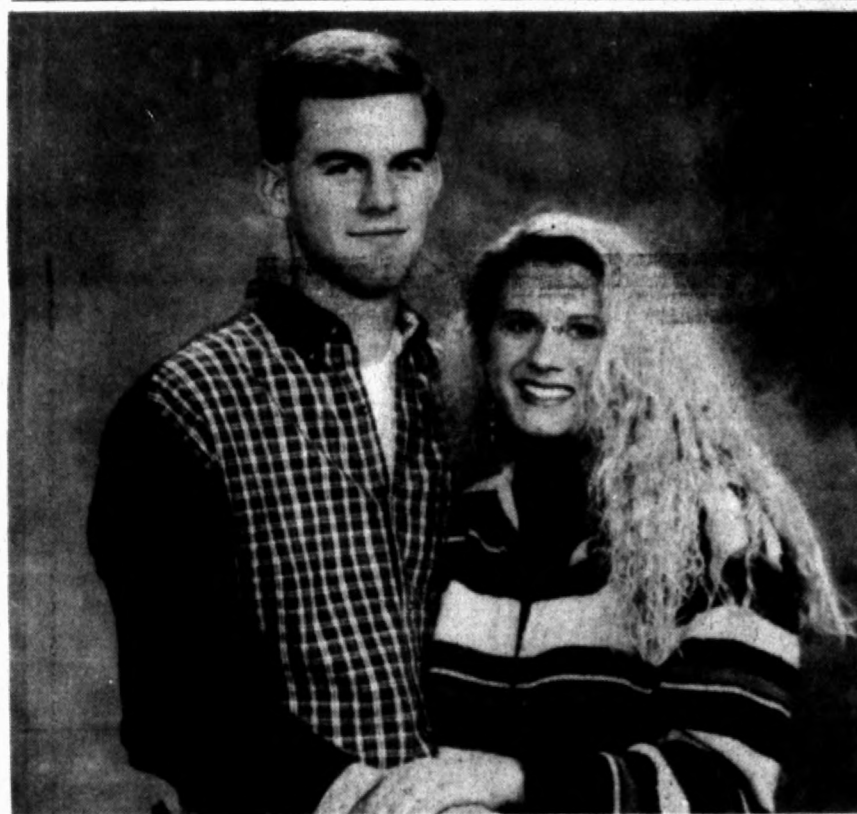

Between The Covers

It's a little late to mention it now, I guess, and about everything that can be said has been, but we're going to miss Lewis Grizzard. One nice thing about writers though—even after they're gone we can continue to enjoy them through the works they have completed. I'm not sure I would have liked Grizzard face-to-face, but I sure enjoy reading his material.

The library by the way, has a number of his books, and I would be very surprised if his publisher does not continue to release stuff from now on. First, they'll collect the existing books into "memorial packages." Then, they'll dig out the old columns that were not deemed worthy for inclusion in a book to begin with. Finally they'll begin mixing columns from various collections into collections with a different title. Don't be surprised, in a few months, if you see a "new" Grizzard collection with a title something like *Don't Bend Over in the Garden*, *Kathy Sue Loudermilk*, *'Cause Elvis is Dead* and *a Shetland Pony is a Quart Low Son of a Gun*...well, you get the idea.

If you haven't yet, I recommend you read an article in this month's *Reader's Digest* titled "How Stupid Can We Get?" that emphasizes the importance of public libraries. Many libraries across the country are curtailing services or cutting materials due to lack of funds. No library is immune to budget cuts but our county commission has been generally supportive of the library. You might mention to your commissioner how much you appreciate an open-minded attitude towards the library.

I can get discouraged sometimes about how much a library is taken for

granted. We offer programs, we try to keep the latest books, as well as a good collection of reference material. We provide meeting areas for clubs and tutors. We're safe, we're free, we're open late two nights a week and half a day on Saturday. We make an honest effort to help all who request it, and some who don't. We have books in Spanish as well as English, and even one in French! We have "Talking Books" (books on tape) for those who can't see, or are too busy to read. Some librarians maintain that libraries should leave videos alone, but we have those, too. The not-to-distant future may see a public access personal computer with access to the much vaunted "information highway." The information now available on CD-ROM is phenomenal. The sky is the limit as far as vision is concerned, but financial limits are much more constraining. As a fiscally conservative taxpayer, I understand, and sympathize with, those who must decide how limited public funds will be spent. I don't envy them.

Enough of that soapbox, you want to know about this week's books.

Do you like to collect money? So do I—but maybe "accumulate" would be a better word. If your interests lie in coin-collecting or currency-collecting (I started to say "bill collecting," but that's a different field altogether, isn't it), we have a couple of books that may assist you. *Standard Catalog of United States Paper Money and Coins & Prices*, while not comprehensive, are a good starting place for an amateur collector.

Biographies are usually a big hit. This week we're putting out two and a half. Art Buchwald's poignant memoir about his upbringing, *Leaving Home*, has been in demand for several weeks. Patti Lewis tells about her 36 years of marriage to Jerry Lewis in *I Luffed Till*

Frank Peretti's *Prophet* has been out for a couple of years, but the library just recently acquired a copy. Peretti set the fiction world on its ear a few years ago with a couple of sci-fi-fantasy type of books about warfare in the spiritual realm. *Prophet* is along the same lines, so expect it to be as good as *This Present Darkness* and *Piercing the Darkness* (Peretti has also written a series for pre-adolescents called *The Cooper Family Adventures*).

Former resident joins bank

Former Hereford resident Aubrey Richburg has joined the American Bank of Commerce in Lubbock as assistant vice president of installment lending at the 50th Street Branch, it was announced this week.

Richburg is a graduate of Hereford High School, where he was an outstanding football player with the Whitefaces. His father, Jerry Richburg, is a former HHS coach.

A former Texas Tech offensive lineman, Richburg moves to Lubbock from Temple, where he was a lending officer at a bank there.

A semiconductor, smaller and only slightly thicker than a postage stamp, has been developed that will help make electrical cars practical and might even lead to lower electric bills. Experts call the invention, by Dr. Victor A.K. Temple, a scientist at Harris Corporation, one of the technology breakthroughs needed to make practical electric cars available in time to meet mandated deadlines.

Drinkers virtually identical

Despite the popular notion that what you drink depends on your economic status, there is no one drink of working people or of the middle class, market research indicates.

More than 100 million adult Americans drink beverage alcohol. Thirty-eight percent of spirits drinkers and 39 percent of beer drinkers come from households in which the annual income is below \$30,000, according to Simmons Market Research Bureau, an independent research firm that interviews 22,000 people a year on consumer preferences. Another 37 percent of spirits drinkers and 38 percent of beer drinkers come from households earning \$30,000 to \$60,000 Simmons reports.

Although more men drink beer than distilled spirits, more women drink spirits than beer. And 76 percent of beer drinkers also drink spirits.

This data reveals that the demographics of beer and spirits drinkers are virtually identical for all income classes. There is no one drink of the middle class or of working people.

For this reason, the federal excise tax on spirits hits the middle class especially hard. The tax on a typical serving of spirits (1- 1/4 ounces of liquor in a mixed drink) is twice that on a typical serving of beer (12 ounces) even though both contain the same amount of alcohol.

The federal tax on a mixed drink is 10.5 cents, while the tax on beer is only 5.4 cents per serving.

Flood attends recent Air Force Academy Assembly

Recently, Tracy Flood, a student at West Texas A&M University, attended the 36th Air Force Academy Assembly at the United States Air Force Academy in Colorado Springs, Colo. During the event, delegates stayed in housing at the Air Force Academy.

The Assembly was founded in 1950 by Dwight D. Eisenhower to allow university delegates to address timely and important issues. The objectives of the Assembly are to give college students the opportunity to study and discuss major issues of international and national importance, an understanding of the difficulty of coming to a group consensus on these issues, and an appreciation for an international community.

This year's Assembly was attended by 140 delegates from colleges representing the United States, Canada and Asia. The delegates were divided into groups of 15 and each group was assigned a different topic pertaining to U.S. Japan and Asia. The conference produced a final report which reflected the group's consensus on the topic.

Flood's group was assigned the topic "Security Policy Toward North Korea." The group outlined a plan for the present situation between the United States and North Korea. The leader of the group was Karl Spence Richardson, a member of the State Department. He spent most of his career on political-military and Asian affairs. The final draft of the Assembly, which consists of 10 sections, is being edited and will be published.

Flood is a senior at WTAMU majoring in political science and planning to teach high school government upon graduation.

Hints from Heloise

Dear Readers: In this age of electrical gadgets and appliances designed to make our lives easier, sometimes we use things without giving them a second thought! However, many of them could be quite harmful if not used correctly. Have you read an appliance manual lately?

I'd just like to pass on a few little reminders for those of you who own trash compactors.

First and foremost, never throw aerosol cans, lighted cigarettes or other hot or burning items in the compactors. Highly flammable substances such as paint thinner, starter fluid or anything that is poisonous or toxic should be disposed of separately.

Be very careful when compacting glass. You don't want to overload the bag, possibly causing it to rip. It's best to put glass in the middle of the bag so there is no chance it will break through. And, when removing the bag, don't lift it by the sides. If a piece of glass or sharp object is lodged in the side, it could cause injury.

According to a leading manufacturer, you should never use or store flammable items around or in the compactor. Things like dry-cleaning solvents, gasoline and kerosene give off vapors that could cause an explosion or fire hazard.

Always read the directions before operating any appliance you are not familiar with. And remember, much of the trash you are compacting could be recycled or composted. — Heloise

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MINDING YOUR OWN BUSINESS

Don Taylor

"KNOW YOURSELF"

Not everyone is cut out to be an entrepreneur. For a person considering starting a business, one of the toughest questions is "Do I really have what it takes?" Frequently, we are asked about common personal characteristics that separate the winners from the also-rans.

A lot of research has been done on this subject. However, the complexity of human personality and the hundreds of external factors that affect entrepreneurial success make it difficult to draw accurate conclusions.

Successful entrepreneurs can come from backgrounds of poverty or wealth, popularity or social rejection, broken homes or close family ties. They can be old or young, regular folks or real odd-balls. Before starting a business, they may have been retired or unemployed, and ventured off in a direction entirely different from previous careers or experience.

Common Success Factors

One of the most common success traits of entrepreneurs is the intense desire to succeed. They want to win. They work long, hard hours and maintain a high level of energy throughout the long days. They start early and are self-starters. They are doers, not talkers. Even when they worked for someone else, they had a reputation of getting the job done.

This intensity is woven through every activity. They live and breathe their businesses. They are over-achievers and are reluctant to accept defeat. Perseverance is another word often used in describing the typical entrepreneur.

Another common success trait seems to be restlessness. Entrepreneurs are frequently bored with repetitive tasks. They constantly seek new challenges. They love competition and seek activities that stimulate personal growth and development.

The easily bored entrepreneur should not be confused with the person who never finishes what he or she starts. The restless entrepreneur usually finishes a task but will not be happy doing it again and again.

Good Communicators

Communication is a factor that weighs heavily in the success factor scale. There is no substitute for the ability to express ideas and opinions well. This is true in the political and corporate world, as well as in the small business arena. Strong communication skills also include the ability to think and listen. Many entrepreneurs become successful after listening to their customers. They utilize customer input to modify business practices. These modifications to operating procedures bring business owners closer to the customer and place them in a better position to satisfy needs and wants.

In addition, most successful business people have a strong self-

image. They feel good about who they are. They like other people and tend to get along well with a variety of friends. They tend to be independent but truly adaptable. They are often characterized as enthusiastic and optimistic. Even when things are tough, they believe that tomorrow will be a better day.

While possession of these characteristics is no guarantee of success, it can serve as an indicator. Any person considering the entrepreneurial challenge should carefully examine himself or herself. An honest evaluation of your personality, attitude and motivation will guide you in the appropriate business direction.

We have profiled a number of these traits in a "just for fun" business personality test that we use in our start-up seminars at the Small Business Development Center. We call it the "Entrepreneurial Success Quotient Test."

We ask participants to answer 25 questions pertaining to the areas of personality, attitude, skills and experience. When the answers are tabulated, the would-be entrepreneur has some idea of the correlation their personality to that of successful entrepreneurs.

Two shows take constructive path on tough urban issues



The difficulties associated with raising children in the low-income, high-crime section of Los Angeles is the basis of "South Central," a lighthearted drama premiering Tuesday on Fox. Tina Lifford stars as a single mother whose love and fear often lead to rules that her son, played by Larenz Tate, cannot accept.

Face it.

The power of television is often wasted on simplifying and exploiting important issues. This week, however, NBC and Fox make attempts to use television to educate and enlighten. By focusing on the reality of some complex matters, they will hopefully encourage understanding and compassion.

The topic of gangs and their associated violence in East Los Angeles is covered by NBC with the broadcast of "Lives in Hazard" on Friday, April 8.

The documentary, directed and produced by Susan and Andrew Todd, is based on the making of Edward James Olmos' 1992 film "American Me." Olmos is executive producer of "Lives in Hazard," which he also narrates.

Instead of sensationalizing gang violence or merely presenting an "isn't this terrible?" point of view, "Lives in Hazard" has a constructive message; and even offers solutions.

"In ('Lives in Hazard') you actually really start to realize that it's not an idea of trying to break up the gangs," Olmos says. "It's an idea of trying to work with them, to redirect the energy levels that are being produced by them."

"They are there for a reason," he adds. "They believe in the familial bondings that have driven them together. It's like saying 'Hey, man, . . . I'm not going to leave the people who know and love me.' And you can tell them 'No, they're bad, they're a bad influence on you,' but what you're really saying to them is you've got to stop being that way."

Olmos explains that acceptance may come from broadening the definition of a gang.

"Five kids dressed in the same sneakers, same pants, same shirts, same hats, go off to play basketball. Are they a gang?" he asks.

He adds that even clubs and religious groups can be considered gangs, and that sometimes even these respected

groups move toward harmful activities. But working with a group or gang can lead to peace and productivity.

Associate producer Danny Haro explains that this philosophy has already led to success in many communities, proving that "a big part of why a lot of people are involved in certain activities is because they have no jobs, they have no training."

"There's a sense of hopelessness in the community because there's nothing really to offer alternatives for them." "So we say, very strongly, that part of it is that if you can provide education, training, and job placement, that's going to redirect a lot of these kids' efforts."

Fox takes a different approach toward enlightenment with the premiere of "South Central" on Tuesday, April 5. The show is based on a single mother, played by Tina Lifford, who struggles to raise her children in the low income, high-crime neighborhood of South Central Los Angeles.

Ridding society of poverty, violence and ignorance is not as simple as changing channels. Hopefully shows like these will help America move toward solutions by building support and understanding, while avoiding condemnation or complacency.

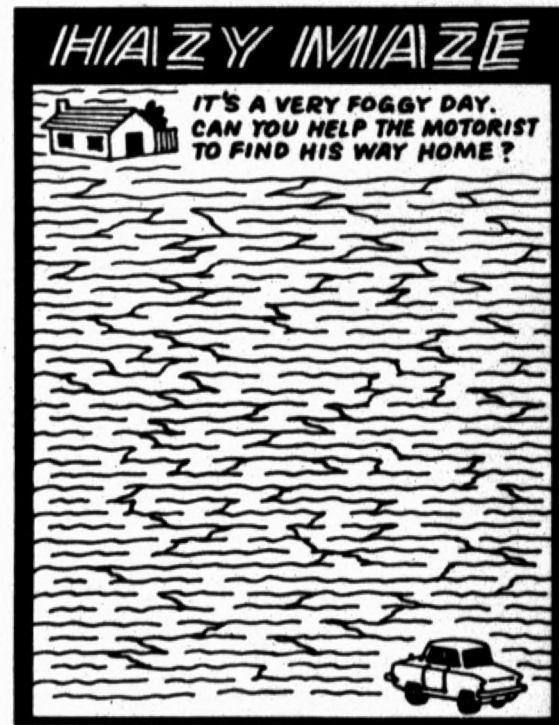
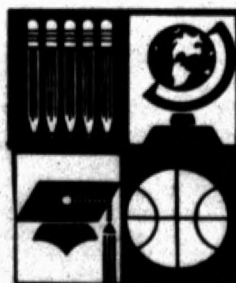

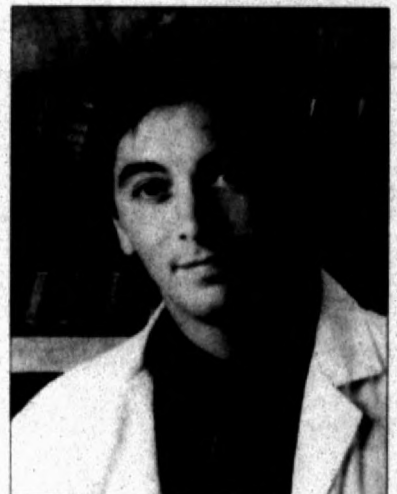
Make Everyday Earthday

- **Spread the word:** Encourage your friends and family to be environmentally responsible.



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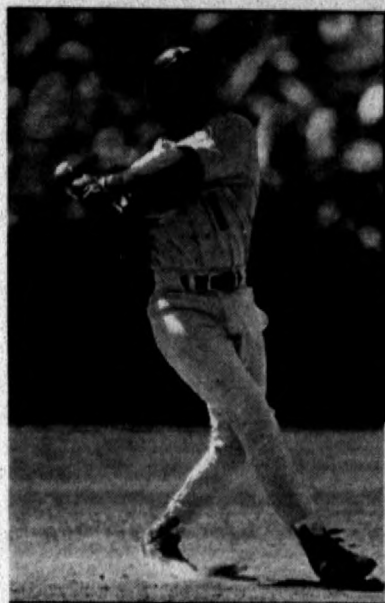

Belushi's 'Royce' definitely not a Rolls; biblical holiday epics abound; 'Christy' comes to CBS

Perhaps Jim Belushi's newest film, "Royce," premiering on Showtime Easter Sunday, April 3, should be retitled "The Least-Believable Action Hero."

In this lifeless thriller, Belushi plays Shane Royce, a covert (in title only) operative for the CIA, who spends much of his time telling children he's a secret agent, or muttering pseudo-humorous asides to himself.

On screen, Belushi often seems to have no idea what his emotions should be for a given scene. For example, Royce shows little remorse when a fellow agent is gunned down answering the door to his apartment. Nor is he particularly convincing delivering a "your daddy loves you" speech to the kidnapped son of the senator who shut down Royce's division of the agency.

The plot is hackneyed. The characters resemble cardboard cut-outs. (Mercifully, Miguel Ferrer gives an acceptable performance as Royce's nemesis, Gribbon). Nevertheless, what

"Royce" lacks in imagination and authenticity, it makes up for in dullness. The action scenes aren't merely lacking, they're downright laughable.

But the glue that holds this travesty together is Belushi's utter lack of anything resembling charisma. Belushi meanders across the screen with an aura suggesting a cuddly, fraudulent Steven Seagal, minus the macho.

Easter Sunday also delivers Cecil B. DeMille's 1956 biblical masterpiece "The Ten Commandments" on ABC. TNT unveils a new Old Testament film, "Abraham," starring Richard Harris and Barbara Hershey. The four-hour epic concludes Monday. Kellie Martin portrays a young teacher at a missionary school in pre-World War I Tennessee in the two-hour premiere of "Christy" on CBS.

Monday, April 4, brings "The Counterfeit Contessa" to Fox. Tea Loeni stars as a working-class girl who gets swept up into the glitz and glamour of New York high society when she is mistaken for an Italian countess.

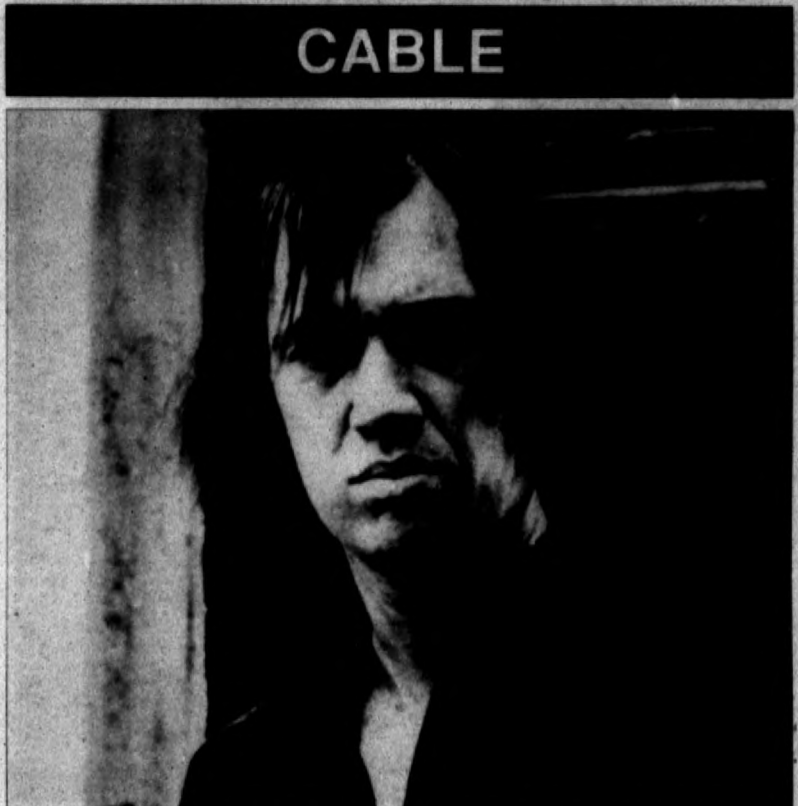

Marlon Brando has promised to appear in Francis Ford Coppola's upcoming "Don Juan DeMarco and the Centerfold," a big-screen effort starring Johnny Depp. Brando and Coppola worked together in 1979's "Apocalypse Now," though the actor nearly backed out of the central role of Col. Kurtz. This time out, Coppola will produce, Jeremy Leven will direct and Brando will play a psychiatrist whose young patient (Depp) believes he's the legendary lover.

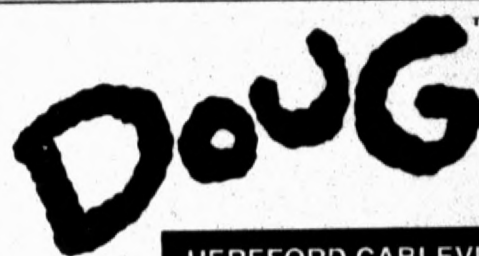

Harris misses the mark dramatically in 'Abraham'

Richard Harris' performance in the title role of TNT's "Abraham" is indicative of the entire film.

Both are, in a word, schizophrenic. The four-hour biblical epic premieres on TNT in two parts beginning Easter Sunday, April 3, and concluding Monday, April 4.

Harris, an actor known for handling larger-than-life roles, such as King Arthur in "Camelot," seems over-matched in this film as the man who fathered the concept of a single god.

Perhaps much of the film's problems stem from Harris' attempts to do too much with the character. Like a jeweler trying to cut too many facets into a stone, the actor seems to lose some of the rugged internal beauty of the character by trying to give him too many sides.

And jokingly, of course, this film could be referred to as "A Man Called Hoarse."

As Abraham, Harris' weather-beaten voice is raspy enough to go from being a distraction in some scenes to being downright annoying in others.

As the tortured leader of a persecuted people, Abraham's pleas to the pharaoh come across as thin, whiny and melodramatic.

And in scenes showing his piety, like when he is speaking with God or being visited by angels, Harris' croaking and warbling is simply bothersome.

Viewers not familiar with the Old Testament may find themselves confused, or worse yet, bored by the first part of "Abraham." The story seems to wade through one plot line after another, without ever pulling the viewer in.

But for those with the tenacity to stick it out, the second portion picks up. The city of Sodom is obliterated (although the effects in this scene aren't very special). And the part of the story of Abraham that is the most well-known, specifically Abraham's attempted sacrifice of his son, Isaac, finally gets to the screen.

Visually, the film is a success, with stunning photography shot in and around Morocco's Atlas Mountains. The music is at times fitting and at times forced -- not unlike the rest of the movie.
