HOW TO GET THERE

It's about 8 miles from Dallas Love Field, where flights from Amarillo will land, to Texas Stadium, where the Hereford Whitefaces will meet Texas City in the Class 4A state championship game.

For those Hereford fans who will fly to the game and rent automobiles to go to the stadium, the drive should take about 20 minutes.

■ Leaving Love Field, turn right onto Cedar Springs Road, then right onto West Mockingbird Lane, then right on Harry Hines Boulevard/Texas 354 Loop North before turning left onto Empire

■ Then, turn right onto East John W. Carpenter Freeway, make a slight left to take the Texas 183 West ramp and merge onto Texas 183.

■ Proceed for 2.3 miles and take the Texas 12 Loop South exit towards the University of Dallas, keeping right at the fork in the ramp and merge onto Texas 12 Loop South, then take the exit towards Grauwyler Road.

■ Merge onto Walton Walker Boulevard North/ Texas 12 Loop North and take the Texas 12 Loop North ramp.

■ Merge onto Texas 12 Loop North and take the exit towards Dallas (Texas 183 East) and then merge onto Walton Walker Boulevard North/Texas 12 Loop North before turning right onto East Airport Freeway, which will lead to the stadium.

Workers hope pace picks up **ECONOMY**

ith only about two weeks to go until its initial deliveries of assistance will be made, volunteers working on the 1999 campaign of Hereford's holiday charity, the Christmas Stocking Fund, are hoping that the pace of giving by local residents will soon pick up.

Approximately \$16,000 will be needed to address the numerous requests for help that have been thus far been screened by volunteers representing a broad cross section of the community.

Although a hefty list of potential recipients has been approved, help is extended only so far as donated funding allows.

Among those in need of help this holiday season is a 12-year-old child afflicted with MS, who is confined to a nursing home. The child's mother is in Mexico, but she currently receives no help



from her family, and Child Protective Services currently does not have conservatorship in her case. The child receives a small amount in Medicaid funds each month that are paid directly to the care facility to cover the cost of her room and board, but that leaves no funds for anything else. A request has been made for help with clothing for this girl.

The anonymous committee of volunteers administering CSF give the needs of the young and the elderly a high priority in their decisions on assistance.

You can help CSF to extend maximum help to as many of the less fortunate members of the community as possible this holiday through your generous gift.

CSF extends assistance in numerous forms including help with food, utilities, medical and pharmacy bills, and clothing. All assistance, with the exception of food, is via vouchers payable to the merchants, utilities, or medical facilities cooperating with CSF. Food assistance is in the form of staple goods that are boxed and delivered.

Study links drug, alcohol abuse, teen sex

Researchers unsure which comes first

WASHINGTON (AP) -Teens who drink or take drugs are much more likely to have sex and at a younger age, as well as have several partners than teens who don't use alcohol or drugs, according to a study released today.

Teens who are 14 and younger and drink are twice as likely to have sex than those who don't in the same age group. The risk is doubled

for 14-year-old teens using drugs, said the report from the Center on Addiction and Substance Abuse at Columbia University.

Older teens who drink are seven times as likely to have intercourse than non-drinking teens, and are twice as likely to have it with four or more partners. Drug-using older teens are five times as likely to have sex than nonusers, and three times as likely to have it with four or more part-

"While it's clear that teens who drink and use drugs are

likelier to have sexual intercourse at earlier ages and with many partners, it is not clear which starts first - sexual intercourse or drinking and drug abuse," said Joseph A. Califano Jr., president of the of the Center on Addition and Substance Abuse at Columbia University.

The CASA findings are based on national data of more than 34,000 teen-agers.

All in all, 63 percent of teen-agers who use alcohol have had sex, compared with 26 percent of teens who don't drink. About 72 percent of

teens who use drugs have had sex compared with 36 percent who don't use drugs.

Young people in general have more sex today than 30 years ago. In a study from 1970, less than 5 percent of the 15-year-old girls ques-tioned had engaged in sex. In 1972 the number for boys the same age was 20 percent.



According to Cantu, conditions are very different in the Mexican prison from those in the United States.

"If a father is put in jail and there is no one to care for the children, then they stay in jail with their father," Cantu said.

The prison ministry for which Cantu works is accepting toys, clothes, Bibles or monetary contributions for these children.

"The deadline for collecting these things is Dec. 10 because we (a group of concerned individuals in the Panhandle)

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Hereford resident Raymond will load a truck immediately after that date and leave for Juarez," Cantu said.

been a fairy tale," Yenzer said.


For Yenzer, the fairy tale

Things didn't look so good early in the season as Zambrano experienced pain in his stomach at the start of two-a-day workouts. He had


middle of August and didn't suit up until Sept. 17 against











Carter caught a touchdown pass for a seventh straight game, tying a Vikings record set last year by Randy Moss. But with Minnesota trailing 24-14, all George could produce was Gary Anderson's 34-yard field goal with 5:50 remaining.

Donnie Abraham scored on a 55-yard interception return for Tampa Bay, which forced four turnovers, including a fourth-quarter fumble on a punt return that set up King's 1-yard TD pass to Moore for a 10-point lead.

George finished 26-of-44 for 271 yards, one touchdown and two interceptions. He moved the Vikings from his own 30 to the Tampa Bay 25 before the drive fizzled.

King was 11-of-19 for 93 yards, two TDs, an interception and a fumble.

Snowfall gives Storm farmers relief

sight from dry conditions, some Panhandle residents welcomed their first snowfall this weekend and the news that more is on the way later this

"By and large, we are just thankful for the moisture," said Bill Boone, who got caught in the dark Saturday when the storm cut off electricity to some Amarillo residents. "We have just been so dry these past few months. We can stand a few more of these, especially if we get moisture from it."

Meterologist Jose Garcia with the National Weather Service in Amarillo said the area hasn't received any meaningful precipitation since Oc-

"We're going on a month-and-a-half without any significant moisture. It is very much welcome," he said. "The nice thing about snow is once it's on the ground like this, it will slowly percolate into the ground. It's not like a heavy rainfall where all that rain will run off."

The sight of white flakes wasn't universally heralded. High winds associated with the winter storm created blizzard-like conditions in parts of the Panhandle over the weekend. That paralyzed thou-sands of motorists after blowing snow on Saturday reduced visibility and forced officials to close parts of Interstate 40 and three other highways.

North Texans also felt a chill in the air as the region

LUBBOCK, (AP) — After experienced its first hard-months of looking at brown freeze of the season after the fields with no sign of relief in sun went down Sunday. Most of Texas, except for the lower Rio Grande Valley and coastal areas, experienced freezing temperatures, said Skip Ely, a meteorologist with the National Weather Service's Fort Worth office.

Early Monday, temperatures in the low to mid-20s were recorded in Dallas, Fort Worth, Midland, San Angelo, Childress, Dalhart and Junc-

A warming trend should make for higher temperatures across Texas until Wednesday when another possible system is expected to begin its trek through the state. The system should bring more snow to the Panhandle and rain to the rest of Texas.

On Saturday, Pampa was the hardest-hit area, receiving about 10 inches of snow. Amarillo received about five inches with snow drifts that caused as much as seven inches to accumulate in some areas. Lubbock saw snow flurries.

"Ten inches is a pretty extraordinary snow for us to have. We're used to four or five," said Anthony Gallegos, assistant store director of a United Super Market in Pampa. "It is supposed to be 60 today and melt a lot of this mess out of the way. It will get all cleared up and then hit us again."

In a number of areas that experienced accumulation, temperatures might not be warm enough to melt all the snow before the next system hits, Garcia said.

today.
NWS meteorologist Tabatha Seymore said the winds with the coming front are not ex-pected to be has high as last weekend's.

"We really need some warm weather and sun to melt all this snow before the next snow comes along. It's really gonna be rough with new snow pil-ing up on these 5-foot snow drifts. People just don't realize how deep some of these drifts are," Hammock said.

"We're gonna try to push snow off the piles because we've plowed the snow so high on either side of the road in some areas that when the next snow comes along and piles on top of those already high piles that will make for some almost impossible plowing conditions. Hope for some sunny warm weather to get this snow melted," Conn said.

Emergency crews answered numerous calls this weekend, but reported injuries were considered minor, Deaf Smith County Fire Marshal Jay Spain said.

policy-makers is Dec. 21. The third-quarter gain in productivity was the biggest since the last three months of 1992, when productivity rose at a 7.4 percent annual rate. It followed a small 0.6 percent gain in the second quarter of 1999 and a 2.7 percent rise in the first quar-

The slight drop in unit la-bor costs from July through September of this year followed a 4.2 percent rise in the second quarter and a 1.4 percent increase in the first.

Commissioners give OK to permit for used car lot

Hereford city commissioners whipped through a short agenda with very little discussion Monday night, tying up one loose end that's been hanging around for several weeks, adopting a no-new-land annexation plan, and accepting a roofing bid.

The commissioners approved a special-use permit that would allow Ronnie Hathaway to operate a used car lot at 615 E. Park Ave.

In September, Hathaway purchased the property, which formerly had been a service station and auto detail shop. The property was zoned local retail, which did not allow for the sale of used automobiles, so Hathaway asked that it be rezoned to central business dis-

trict, accommodating his business. The request was denied by the city Planning & Zon-ing Commission. The item later was tabled by the City Commission.

After discussion, the com-mission recommended that Hathaway seek a special-use permit, a request that was approved by the planning commission.

The special-use permit will remain in effect only as long as the property is used for a used-car lot. If another use is planned, the permit will become invalid.

The commissioners voted unanimously to approve the

The commissioners also approved an annexation plan for the city. The action was man-dated by Senate Bill 89, which was approved by the 76th Texas Legislature. The city's annexation plan states there is no plan to annex any property during the next three years; however, the city reserved the right to amend the plan should the situation change.

In other business, the commissioners accepted a bid of \$20,717.19 from Brownlow Brothers Inc. of Hereford to re-roof the banquet room area of the Hereford Community Center.

During a snow storm ear-lier in the fall, there were leaks in the banquet room, which caused ceiling tiles to fall. The city staff requested proposals for repairs and/or changes to the roof to eliminate future leaks. The Brownlow Bros. bid was recommended by the staff.

GOP hopefuls ask questions

PHOENIX (AP) — After selling themselves through commercials and sparring via the media, the Republican presidential candidates finally got a chance to question one

And George W. Bush got a sharper answer to one question than he expected.

Mostly the candidates' questions prompted each other to launch into stump speech recitations during their debate Monday night. But when the Texas governor asked Sen. Orrin Hatch of Utah a question, it boomeranged on him.

Bush, participating in a debate the Arizona Republican Party arranged on his behalf after the governor skipped an earlier candidate meeting, cited his work to reach out to minority voters and asked Hatch about his own efforts.

Hatch complimented Bush, but then offered his view of the candidates' comparative levels of experience.

"My only problem with you, Governor, is you've only had four, and you're going into your fifth year of governorship in a constitutionally weak governorship. And, frankly, I really believe that you need more experience before you become president of the United States. That's why I'm thinking of you as a vice presidential candidate," the senator said.

As the audience of 1,300 at bureaucrats.

the Orpheum Theater — once the stage for vaudeville acts burst out in laughter, Hatch poured it on.

"Just think, Ronald Reagan picked your father because he had foreign policy experience," the senator said, referring to former President Bush. "Somebody suggested the other day that you should pick me because I have foreign policy expermence. They got it all wrong. I should be president; you should have eight years with me and boy, you'd make a heck of a president after eight years.'

Bush laughed himself as the audience again erupted.

The candidate questions were one of the few novelties in the group's second debate in four days. Another was the participation of home state Sen. John McCain, who ap-peared via satellite TV from Boston because of a busy campaign schedule.

The session lasted about 15 minutes more than its allotted hour. During that time, the candidates promised safer schools, lower taxes and a more disciplined foreign policy for Americans if they seize the White House from Democrats.

'My plan says less power to Washington, not more," Bush said.

WASHINGTON — President Clinton and some members of Congress are putting together plans they hope will reduce the medical mistakes that a recent report said kills tens of thousands of Ameri-

cans each year. Clinton is directing federal agencies that administer health plans to find ways to identify and tighten parts of the medi-cal system that leave room for error. On Capitol Hill, Sen. Edward Kennedy, D-Mass., is working on legislation with a

Both efforts track sugges-tions last week from the In-stitute of Medicine, which advises Congress on scientific matters, on ways to reduce the room for error.

"I believe we can have a strong bipartisan bill in the next session," Kennedy, senior Democrat on the Senate Health, Education, Labor and Pension Committee, told reporters Monday. He said Republican senators, including the committee's chairman, Sen. James Jeffords, R-Vt., and Sen. Bill Frist, a heart surgeon from Tennessee, were interested in holding hearings on the matter.

A senior White House official who spoke on condition of anonymity late Monday said Clinton planned to meet today with officials from the Institute of Medicine, health care

providers and hospitals to discuss initiatives.

victims' relatives MIAMI — Gwendolyn Marks, who lost her son in the 1996 ValuJet tragedy, a jury's decision to convict the airline's repair contractor of nine out of 23 criminal charges for the crash was not nearly enough.

"I take it as a dag-ger in the heart," Mrs. Marks said of Monday's mixed verdict against SabreTech. "I am angry. I'm very angry."

In the first criminal case of its kind in the United States, SabreTech was convicted of recklessly supplying the hazardous oxygen generators blamed for the cargo hold fire that caused the Everglades crash 11 minutes after takeoff, killing all 110 people aboard May 11, 1996.

Two former SabreTech employees, Daniel Gonzalez, a vice president of maintenance, and mechanic Eugene Florence, were acquitted of con-spiracy and falsifying paperwork on tasks performed months before the crash.

SabreTech attorney Ken Quinn said the guilty verdicts, which carry a possible
