Number of Hispanics to jump by 2020

WASHINGTON (AP) - People of Hispanic origin will make up 40 percent of the Texas population three decades from now, according to government projections.

The projections, released yesterday by the U.S. Census Bureau, indicate that all minority groups except American Indians will constitute increasing percentages of the Texas population by the year 2020.

The state's population as a whole - nearly 18 million in 1993 - is projected to grow to 25.5 million by 2020. The government says Texas will surpass New York as the nation's second most populous state sometime this year. California is projected to surpass the No. 1 spot through 2020.

Whites, who made up 85.2 of the Texas population in 1993, will drop to 81.9 percent by the year 2020, the bureau said.

Meanwhile, people of Hispanic origin are projected to become 40.3 percent of the state population, up from 33.1 percent in 1993.

Highly mobile immigration and rapid population growth are expected to

make Hispanics the largest U.S. minority by 2020, totaling 51.2 million, or 15.7 percent of the population. That's up from 9.7 percent in 1993.

Under Census categories, people of Hispanic origin can be of any race, so many Hispanics are counted as both white and of Hispanic origin.

The projections estimate the state's white population will increase by 5.8 million during the next three decades, while the number of people of Hispanic origin will increase by 5.4 million.

Texas is expected to gain 2.2 million people through international migration between 1990 and 2020.

Blacks are expected to make up 12.6 percent of the Texas population by the year 2020, up from 12.1 percent in 1993.

The percentage of Asians and Pacific Islanders in Texas is projected to move to 4.2 percent from 2.3 percent during the same period.

The bureau said it expected American Indians to drop from 0.4 percent to 0.3 percent during the same time span.

Endeavour back following Earth-watching mission

EDWARD AIR FORCE BASE, Calif. (AP) - Space shuttle Endeavour, equipped with the finest environmental monitoring radar ever built, brought back a wealth of data that will yield detailed 3-D maps of the Earth's surface.

The spaceship and its crew of six landed Wednesday in the Mojave Desert after bad weather at Cape Canaveral, Fla., forced a long journey detour.

During the 11 day flight, the crew used 166 million worth of specially designed radar equipment on the planet and mapped more than 25 million square miles, or about 13 percent, of the Earth's surface, including forests, deserts, mountains and oceans.

The amount of data and quality

of data exceeded the maximum goal we set for the mission," said Manfred Wahl, project manager for one of the radar instruments, the X-Band Synthetic Aperture Radar.

The X-SAR instrument was designed by the German and Italian space agencies to see through clouds and sometimes through barriers such as vegetation, ice and sand.

Endeavour also carried photography and carbon monoxide sensing equipment to measure the distribution of the gas in the lower atmosphere.

The flight had been extended by one day when bad weather prevented a landing in Florida.

NASA prefers to land shuttles in Florida to avoid the expense, risk and delays in having to put the orbiters atop a Boeing 747 and ferry them back to Cape Canaveral.

2-year-old girl dies in accidental shooting

A loaded .380 automatic left beneath the seat of a car resulted in the fatal shooting of a two-year-old Hereford child Wednesday, Hereford Police said.

Police Chief David Wagner identified the victim as Yanette Salazar, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Saul Salazar.

Justice of the Peace Johnnie Turrentine ruled the shooting as accidental and said no autopsy will be ordered.

According to witnesses, the victim and a four-year-old friend were playing in the yard at 221 Bradley Street Wednesday afternoon and found the gun in a parked car. Somehow the weapon discharged, striking the child in the chest. She was pronounced dead at Hereford Regional Medical Center.

Wagner said his department has not yet determined who pulled the trigger and the shooting is still under investigation.

According to the police report, the owner of the gun said he hid the weapon beneath the passenger's seat of the car and forgot about it.

Study shows heart disease treatment equal for similarly-aged men, women

BOSTON (AP) - Do women get second-class treatment for heart disease? The latest evidence suggests not.

Several studies have shown that men often get more aggressive treatment, such as bypass operations, to relieve chest pain. Critics have argued sexism is at play: Doctors take heart disease more seriously when the victim is a man.

However, many cardiologists deny this. And a report published today backs them up.

It concludes there is another explanation for why men and women are treated differently: differences in age and severity of

the disease. Women are typically 10 to 15 years older than men when they develop heart disease.

"When men and women are otherwise the same and the only difference is gender, you find that treatments are very similar," said Dr. Daniel B. Mark of Duke University, who reported the findings in the New England Journal of Medicine.

Doctors are often reluctant to recommend invasive tests to frail, elderly patients who have other health problems besides heart disease.

"You have to compare apples and apples," Mark said. "When you just compare men and women, it's apples and oranges," because of the different ages at which they

develop heart problems.

His work was based on an analysis of data collected for a larger study between 1983 and 1985 - well before the controversy over the apparent unequal treatment emerged.

The researchers attempted to examine the thinking of 15 cardiologists who sent 280 men and 130 women to have exercise tests for suspected heart disease.

All the doctors filled out questionnaires about how long they thought the patients would live and whether they felt angiograms would find blockages.

Angiograms are X-ray movies that are taken by injecting opaque dye into the heart. They are routinely used to check for

blockages and see if patients need surgery or angioplasty, in which a catheter with a balloon at the tip is used to unclog arteries.

In this as in other studies, men were substantially more likely than women to receive angiograms.

Furthermore, on the questionnaires, doctors did just as good a job of predicting the condition of women's hearts as they did men's. If anything, they tended to overestimate the chance that women would be found to have severe heart disease.

Another study in the journal challenges evidence linking heart attack risk with high levels of iron in the body.

"We thought we were dead." That sobering thought came from Bill Watts, a veteran Hereford volunteer firefighter who, along with fellow firefighter J.O. Walls, barely escaped from a wind-driven grass fire that destroyed their fire truck on Tuesday.

Both Watts and Walls had their hair singed and suffered smoke inhalation in the blaze that began in the back seat of a 1988 Oldsmobile and eventually destroyed the car, burned 200 acres of CRP grass near Dawn and gutted a shed and corrals owned by farmer Carl Wimberly.

What began as a small grass fire, said Watts, escalated into a life-threatening situation because of tinder-dry grass conditions and a stiff wind.

"It was the first time in my life I thought I was really going to die," said Walls, a respiratory therapist at Hereford Regional Medical Center. "Never, never again will I say it's only a grass fire."

While working the west side of the blaze, the winds shifted and Walls and Watts found themselves and their truck in the middle of the fire.

Heat and smoke caused the engine on the 1973 vehicle to stall, leaving the men stranded in the middle of the blaze, separated by flames and smoke from other firefighters.

"Bill tried to start the truck several times, but the engine wouldn't kick over," added Walls.

For several minutes the men fought valiantly to save the truck, emptying the last of the 500 gallons of water in their tanker in an attempt to keep the flames away from the truck.

Finally, though, they were forced to run for their lives through flames that leapt as high as 30 feet in the air.

"We really hated to leave the truck. It's like shooting your horse," Walls said.

The men said they ran for some 15 or 20 minutes, changing direction several times to escape the flames before a Dawn Fire Department truck picked them up and carried them to safety.

Watts, Walls, and fireman Chad Kriegshauser were treated at Hereford Regional Medical Center for smoke inhalation and heat exhaustion and released.

At debriefing session Tuesday night, Watts said, Fire Chief David Spain and Fire Marshal Jay Spain agreed that the two men were the best choices to be thrust into such a situation, because between them they have 25 years experience with the department -- experience that may well have saved their lives.

Watts and Walls continued their breathing treatments on Wednesday.

Watts said he has a lingering sensation of burning in his lungs with every breath he takes.


"One good thing that came out of this fire is I quit smoking," Watts said with a laugh as he and Walls headed for the hospital for further treatments.

Medical expenses for the men will be paid by the city's workers' compensation insurance.

Despite their close brush with death, Watts and Walls said they had no intention of leaving the fire department.

"You'd have to shoot us to get us out of here," said Walls, grinning. "It gets in your blood."

In fact, both men wore their red fire department pagers on Wednesday and asserted vehemently that if there (See FIREFIGHTERS, Page 2)

WASHINGTON - President Clinton, saying that Bosnian Serbs "must pay a higher price," waits for NATO allies to threaten an air attack if the Serbs do not withdraw their guns from the battered town of Gorazde and four other Muslim enclaves.

SARAJEVO, Bosnia-Herzegovina - Serbs raked Gorazde with artillery shells, rockets and heavy machine guns while their leaders pledged anew to stop the attacks that left aid workers pleading for help.

WASHINGTON - The South and West will continue to be magnets for America's people over the next quarter-century, but it will be a more varied population, and an older one, than today. 'Violate' prison deal, candidate says

Police chiefs hear Bush stand on concealed weapons

AUSTIN (AP) - Republican gubernatorial candidate George W. Bush says Texas should "violate" a settlement of the long-running prison lawsuit and believes Texans should be allowed to carry concealed handguns.

Speaking to the Texas Police Chiefs Association on Wednesday, Bush said he would have approved a bill that Gov. Ann Richards vetoed last year, which would have let Texans vote on whether they should be allowed to tote handguns.

"I would sign such a bill. I believe certain people ought to be able to carry concealed weapons under strict licensing requirements," Bush said.

On the prison issue, Bush said the state gave away too much in a settlement with inmates in the Ruiz lawsuit.

In December 1992, U.S. District Judge William Wayne Justice of Tyler returned control of the Texas prisons to the state. He had been overseeing sweeping reforms in the state prison system that resulted from a lawsuit filed more than 20 years earlier by David Ruiz and other inmates complaining about crowding and poor living conditions in the lockups.

"I think the state of Texas ought to appeal it, fight it, violate it," Bush said.

The Ruiz settlement "allows a court order to micro-manage our prison system. How can anybody do their job when we're micro-managed by a federal court order?" Bush asked.

By eliminating the Ruiz settle-

ment, he said Texas could use tents to house more than 30,000 inmates backed up in county jails.

Texas Attorney General Dan Morales says tents can now be used on a temporary basis to house inmates.

Morales has warned that if Texas violates the prison settlement, it could be limited in how many inmates could be placed in prisons under construction.

But Bush said if the state challenged the settlement it would win at the federal appellate court level.

Chuck McDonald, a spokesman for Richards' campaign, criticized Bush's positions.

"George W. Bush really does not know what he is talking about," McDonald said.

He said Richards was "proud" to stand with law enforcement groups that urged her to veto the handgun bill.

Additionally, the state would be fined \$800,000 per day if it violated the prison settlement, McDonald said, adding that it should be followed because it ended 20 years of federal court intervention in the prison system.

Plano Police Chief Bruce Glasscock said the Texas Police Chiefs Association opposes legalizing concealed handguns.

"We don't think it's an answer to making the streets any safer, it creates a false impression of safety," he said.

State reports lottery sales of \$1.5 billion

AUSTIN (AP) - Sales of Lotto Texas tickets have reached \$1.5 billion since the numbers game began on Nov. 7, 1992.

Texas Lottery officials said a \$1 ticket was purchased at a Beaumont liquor store at 1:52 p.m. Wednesday to hit the sales milestone.

"We reached our first \$1 billion in lotto sales in a record time of 364 days. But the pace continues to quicken. We've sold this \$500 million worth in just 5-1/2 months," said Zoann Attwood, the lottery's deputy director.

Ms. Attwood attributed the increased rate of sales to unusually high jackpots in February and March, which included a state record \$77.1 million pot on March 16.

Texas broke the all-time first-year sales record for a lotto game on Oct. 23, 1993, when sales reached \$973.6 million and surpassed Florida's previous record of \$960.3 million from April 1989.

Total sales for the Texas Lottery, including instant-win scratch card games and Pick 3, have surpassed \$4 billion.



Texas Tech boosters welcome Bockrath, Dickey

Texas Tech boosters in Hereford welcomed two new faces to Red Raider Day on Wednesday, as athletic director Bob Bockrath and men's basketball coach James Dickey made their first visit to Hereford.

Bockrath and Dickey led a contingent of about a dozen assistant coaches and athletic department personnel, who joined more than 50 boosters from the Hereford area in an afternoon golf scramble and an evening social hour and dinner at Hereford Country Club.

Head football coach Spike Dykes couldn't make it, but he apparently sent some of his legendary style and wit in the form of Ted Unbehagen, the offensive line coach.

"Boy, the defense better play hard," Unbehagen said, referring to the fact that Tech lost virtually all of its offense. "We've got one guy coming back who scored a point, except for the placekicker."

"(The defense) will have to have a pretty good turnover ratio," he said. "Give the ball to us on the five (yardline) going in, and we're going to be a good offensive team."

But seriously, folks, Unbehagen said the Raiders had some good linemen waiting in the wings, had recruited some good running backs, and had three promising quarterbacks battling for a starting job.

"We've got three quarterbacks who have never taken a snap," he said, "but by the time we line up against New Mexico, they'll be ready to go."

"We will move the ball again," he said.

Meanwhile, the defense is ready to take over as the strength of the football team, defensive backfield coach Dean Campbell said.

"We've challenged the defense," Campbell said. "We've said, 'For the last few years the offense has carried the defense. We've lost a lot of those guys who made all the big plays, so we have to rise up on defense.'"

The defense returns more than half

its starters, Campbell said, including three defensive backs, both defensive ends and both inside linebackers. One of those inside linebackers was Zach Thomas of Pampa.

"I don't know if there was a better linebacker in the conference last year than Zach Thomas," Campbell said, "and he was voted the most improved player in the spring."

Dickey was not able to attend last year's Red Raider Day because he was recruiting. This year, with the entire team coming back next year, he apparently had more free time.

Despite two successful seasons at the helm of the men's basketball program, he joked about his status as the second-most successful basketball coach on campus.

"Everywhere I go, people ask 'Why can't you recruit a Sheryl Swoopes? Why can't you coach like Marsha Sharp (the women's coach)?' I got a letter the other day that said 'Marsha Sharp is having a coaching clinic. Why don't you go?'

"When she has it, I'll go," he said. Dickey projected success next year, saying he had signed two good point guards, which was the Red Raiders' weakest position last year. And last year they were one victory over Texas A&M away from playing in the post season.

Bockrath spoke of all of Tech's sports, including baseball and women's golf, both of which are in the midst of successful seasons.

He spoke of the women's basketball program in terms of financial success.

Where most college athletic programs have only one or two revenue-producing sports--football and/or men's basketball--which must support the other less-popular sports, Texas Tech now has three with the women's basketball program.

Bockrath said that five years ago, there were 140 season tickets sold for women's basketball. This year, there were 3,600 season tickets sold, which produced \$236,700 just from season tickets.

"Hilary (Clinton) couldn't do that good, but Marsha could," he said. Bockrath called the move to the Big Eight "an incredible opportunity for Texas Tech," and said that league play in sports other than football could begin soon.

In closing, Bockrath invited everyone to come down to Lubbock, to meet the people and see the facilities and, especially, to see the games.

The winners of the golf scramble were Jeff Yates, Tom Simons, Mike

VcVay and Tommy McVay, who combined to shoot a 58. The second place team of Speedy Nieman, Blair Rogers, Cecil Maddox and former Tech basketball coach Gerald Meyers shot 60.

Cuby Kitchens won the longest drive

competition, and Robert Neely won closest to the pin.

Shaq scores 53 to claim lead in NBA scoring race

How high will Shaquille O'Neal and David Robinson go in their battle for the NBA scoring title?

O'Neal, trailing Robinson by 0.3 points, took 31 shots and scored an NBA season-high 53 points Wednesday night, leading Orlando to a 121-101 victory over Minnesota.

His career-high and franchise-record performance moved O'Neal into first place with a 29.34 average, just .07 ahead of Robinson with two games left for both players.

The close race down the stretch is reminiscent of 1978, when Denver's David Thompson and George Gervin of San Antonio went down to the final day - April 9.

Thompson, trailing Gervin, scored 73 points, the highest in NBA history by a player other than Wilt Chamberlain. But Gervin, playing a later game and knowing exactly how many points he needed, responded with 63 to win the scoring title, 27.22 to Thompson's 27.15.

"Being the leading scorer wasn't one of my goals coming in," said O'Neal, who didn't play the last 9:13 of the blowout. "My shot's been falling. If I get it, good. If not, I understand."

O'Neal made 22 of 31 shots, nine of 13 free throws and had 18 rebounds.

"I wasn't going to run the risk of him getting hurt to get a scoring record," Orlando coach Brian Hill said when asked about taking O'Neal out of the game. "We just told everybody going into the fourth quarter what the situation was: 'Let's get him the ball in good position where he's not going to get doubled and have to give it up. Let's get him in, get the record, get him out, close up and go home.'"

Elsewhere in the NBA, it was Charlotte 117, Washington 111; Indiana 109, Cleveland 98; Milwaukee 103, Detroit 78; Denver 100, the Los Angeles Clippers 85; and Seattle 12, the Los Angeles Lakers 90.

Isaiah Rider led Minnesota with 28 points.

Hornets 117, Bullets 111
Charlotte barely held on to its slim playoff hopes despite trailing visiting Washington by eight points with four minutes left.

The Hornets were behind 109-101 before a free throw by Alonzo Mourning, who had 25 points and 12 rebounds, started the comeback. Two 3-pointers by Dell Curry's made it 109-108 before Muggsy Bogues, who had 14 assists, stole the ball and passed to Curry for a dunk, putting the Hornets ahead 110-109 with 2:40 to go.

Calbert Cheaney responded with a long jumper for Washington, but Larry Johnson and Hersey Hawkins made consecutive baskets for a 114-111 Charlotte lead. Bogues iced the game with two free throws with 15 seconds left.

Tom Gugliotta scored 27 points for the Bullets.

SuperSonics 112, Lakers 90
Seattle swept the season series from Los Angeles for the first time

in 27 years behind Shawn Kemp's 23 points and Ricky Pierce's 22.

The Sonics, who have clinched homecourt throughout the playoffs with a 61-19 mark, went 5-0 against Los Angeles this season and have won 15 of 17 games. Seattle also set a club record with its 25th road victory.

Sedale Threatt finished with 28 points for Los Angeles.

Nuggets 100, Clippers 85

Rodney Rogers scored 12 of his 15 points in the first 7:09 of the fourth quarter and Denver outscored Los Angeles 34-9 in the period.

Cowboys' scouting director under gun

IRVING, Texas (AP) - Jimmy Johnson called him the finest football technician he has ever been around.

At Wichita State, Oklahoma State and Oklahoma, Johnson learned how to judge football talent under this man.

Meet Larry Lacewell, who will be on the hot spot for the Dallas Cowboys in Sunday's NFL draft.

Lacewell, the director of the Cowboys college scouting, will be making recommendations to owner Jerry Jones and new coach Barry Switzer.

It's the first time for all three of them to be in the spotlight.

"We don't know what's going to happen," Lacewell said. "We need

help in the defensive line and at linebacker. But we've lost some free agents so we might have to make a call at another position. It should be interesting."

Perhaps not as interesting as when Johnson, who split with Jones after a personal feud ran too deep, was calling the draft day shots.

Johnson wheeled and dealed, gambled and won, gambled and lost.

But Johnson could recognize talent and, more importantly, an athlete's heart and courage.

Emitt Smith was the prime example. He was passed over by 13 teams because of a too slow, too small label.

"The other teams didn't measure my heart but coach Johnson did," Smith said. "He knows there is more

to football than computer statistics."

While everyone will be wondering what Johnson would have done in this draft, Jones gets his chance to be up front and center.

Jones had been little more than a sideshow in the Cowboys previous drafts. Now, he'll make the calls based on Lacewell's recommendations.

Switzer will be there in name only. "I'll be watching and learning," Switzer said.

"It will be my call based on all of our information," Jones said.

The Cowboys will be taking a long look at defensive linemen like Henry Ford of Arkansas, Sam Adams of Texas A&M, and Joe Johnson of Louisville. Losing tackle Tony Casillas to Kansas City and Jimmie

Jones to the Los Angeles Rams has cut into the Cowboys' depth at the position.

Dallas also could use linebackers and they'll be looking at Rob Fredrickson of Michigan State, Jamir Miller of UCLA and John Thierry of Alcorn State.

"I feel we are better prepared for the draft than any year since I've been here," Jones said. "But there is no such thing as a safe pick. It's a risky business."

And one Jones will have do it without Johnson, his former roommate at the University of Arkansas who had a knack of doing the right thing at the right time on D Day.

Johnson will join Fox

NEW YORK (AP) - Less than a month after his departure from the Dallas Cowboys, Jimmy Johnson is back in football - as an analyst for Fox Sports.

Fox Sports has called a 3 p.m. EDT news conference today at the News Corporation Building to introduce Johnson as a member of its pre-game studio broadcast team, Fox spokesman Vince Wladika said.

Johnson joins Terry Bradshaw and Howie Long on the show, created after Fox won the rights to televise the NFL's NFC games by outbidding CBS with a \$1.58 billion bid for four years.

The former University of Miami coach left the Cowboys on March 29 after leading Dallas to consecutive Super Bowl titles. He had an ongoing feud with Cowboys' owner Jerry Jones during his five years in Dallas. Jones bought out the remaining five years on Johnson's contract for \$2 million and then hired former Oklahoma coach Barry Switzer as his new coach.

During the last month, Johnson returned to his home in Florida and was sought by several clubs for coaching jobs. He still is being mentioned as a possible replacement for Dolphins coach Don Shula.

Browns' play for Harper scratched

BEREA, Ohio (AP) - The Cleveland Browns spoke to the Dallas Cowboys about a possible trade for wide receiver Alvin Harper, but the deal was called off.

The (Cleveland) Plain Dealer reported today that the proposed trade fell through when Cowboys owner Jerry Jones abruptly changed the terms of the deal late Wednesday.

One possible deal would give Dallas the Browns' first-round draft pick - the ninth overall - in exchange for Harper and Dallas' first-round pick, the 28th overall.

The Plain Dealer said three sources confirmed that Jones demanded the Browns include their second-round choice, too.

Harper's agent, Jimmy Sexton, said Harper still wants to play for the Browns. The agent said a deal was so close that travel arrangements to Cleveland had been arranged.

Mike Lombardi, Browns director of player personnel, said the Browns had made plans to create room under their salary cap for Harper.

Chef Bill Belichick refused to say Wednesday whether a deal was done or close to completion.

"We've talked. We talk to everybody," Belichick said.

The Pittsburgh Steelers also are known to be dealing for Harper - apparently offering the Steelers' first-round pick, 17th overall, in Sunday's draft.

Norton completes 49'ers' revamping of linebacking

SANTA CLARA, Calif. (AP) - The addition of Ken Norton completes an offseason of change in the San Francisco 49ers' linebacking corps.

Norton, who earned a trip to the Pro Bowl while helping the Dallas Cowboys win their second straight Super Bowl, was expected to sign a five-year, \$8 million with the 49ers today. He then was to be introduced as the team's newest player during a

news conference at the 49ers' Santa Clara headquarters.

With Norton in the fold, the 49ers have completed a near revamping of their linebacking corps, maligned as the weak link in a defensive unit ranked last against the run in 1993.

Ann Landers

DEAR ANN LANDERS: Our son is 13 years old. His friend, "Brad," is the same age. Brad's parents gave him a .22-caliber revolver as a gift for Christmas.

Brad is a nice boy and comes from a good family. Both parents work, and the child is home alone a lot. We all live in an affluent area in a country setting where there is almost no crime.

Ask Dr. Lamb

DEAR DR. LAMB: For 15 years I suffered from severe headaches that occurred about three or four o'clock in the morning and usually made me throw up. Any medicine I took came back up. Over the years, I went to several different doctors and had all kinds of tests, including MRIs and CT scans. I was told I had nervous tension, migraines, sinus and food sensitivity headaches. Nothing helped me.

One day I was discussing this with my dentist and he asked if I was a coffee drinker and how much I drank. I told him two mugs in the morning and once in awhile a cup in the evening. He suggested that I might be suffering from caffeine withdrawal headaches. So I started drinking a mug of coffee every evening and I no longer had the headaches. Please tell your readers to try this and also to watch the foods they eat, like chocolate, wine, beer and cheese.

DEAR READER: Thank you for your comment, and I am glad you have found relief from your headache. It is true that stopping the intake of caffeine, whether it is in coffee, tea, colas or chocolate, entirely can cause a headache. It is part of the caffeine withdrawal syndrome. It is most often seen in the heavy coffee drinker who stops suddenly. But it can occur in people who drink only a moderate amount of coffee. For the heavy coffee drinker, it is wise to taper off when you quit, perhaps a cup in the morning and another in the afternoon, or just enough to prevent headaches. Then decrease it further.

If you really like the taste and want something to drink, you can gradually switch the same way to decaffeinated coffee.

I am somewhat puzzled by your history because that sudden and that severe a reaction in the early morning is quite unusual, even for caffeine withdrawal. I must entertain the other view that you may indeed have migraine headaches.

My husband and I were horrified to learn Brad has a revolver. We are concerned about our son's safety when he visits in Brad's home. We don't want to jeopardize our son's friendship with the boy. What should we do?—Mequon, Wis.

DEAR MEQUON: Phone Brad's parents and tell them in a low-key, non-confrontational way that since they gave their son a handgun, you are concerned, not only for YOUR son's safety but for theirs as well.

Ask that they get permission from Brad to put the gun away and take it out only when they are at home. If they are offended by your suggestion (and they might be) you must tell your son that he cannot go to Brad's house but that Brad is welcome to come to yours anytime—without the gun, of course.

DEAR ANN LANDERS: I loved your response to "Sad in L.A." She said she was married to a man for four years (there was no "sparks") and was so bored she could scream.

The revealing part of her "boring" marriage was that her husband loved her and was faithful and a good provider. Does that dumb broad have any idea how many women would give their eyeteeth for a man like that?

I married a man 18 years ago, and there were no sparks there either. "Howard" knew it, but he still wanted to marry me and be a father to my children, a girl, 11, and a boy, 8.

I was tired of being alone and having relationships that didn't work out, so I married this man for security.

The first year was hell. I knew I needed professional help. Howard truly

loved me, and I simply had to get my stuff together and make the marriage work. I went to counseling three times a week for several months. My husband never tried to pry or find out what I talked to the doctor about. After a while, I found myself volunteering the information. We worked together on my problem, and when I got my head on straight, I found myself truly loving this wonderful man. Sign me—Thankful in Idaho

DEAR IDA: What an honest woman you are. And what a great love story. Thank you for it.

DEAR ANN LANDERS: My wife and I read with interest the letter from the couple who loaned a close friend \$1,000. The loan was not repaid, and it ruined what was once a very close friendship.





Preschooler immunization is drive goal

Health care providers in Hereford and Deaf Smith County are joining in a state and national drive to encourage immunization of preschool-age children.

Leading the campaign here is the Deaf Smith County Health Care Alliance.

Beginning Monday and continuing through the week, the WIC office, South Plains Health Providers and the Deaf Smith Rural Health Clinic will provide immunizations without charge.

Shirley Wilson of WIC reported that only 27 percent of preschool children have received the immunizations considered necessary.

National Preschool Immunization Week will attempt to impress on parents the need for immunizations for young children.

Parents wishing to take advantage of the free immunizations are asked to present records of previous immunizations so there will be no duplications.

Among immunizations recommended for children are diphtheria-pertussis-tetanus, polio, hepatitis and measles-mumps-rubella.

Texas Stock Index is reflection of economy throughout nation

AUSTIN (AP) - In suffering its biggest monthly drop in more than three years, the Texas Stock Index showed that the state's economy now reflects the nation's economy, analysts say.

The index, which measures the performance of Texas-based companies, was down 7.4 percent and clearly mirrored the steep Wall Street drop, Comptroller John Sharp said Wednesday.

The drop was the largest monthly decline since January 1990. Every sector was affected, even though stocks for some individual Texas companies rose in value.

The Standard and Poor's 500, which tracks a national sampling of stock prices, fell by 4.6 percent during the same period.

"Forces which have little to do with the economy or investor confidence have been at work in the

stock market. It happens from time to time," Sharp said.

The good news, he said, is that stock prices are rising again for Texas companies as well as those nationwide.

"When we update the Texas Stock Index again next month, we expect a rebound," the comptroller said.

In addition, last month's index still stood higher than during the preceding six Marches. The tally was nearly 10 percent higher than in March 1993.

Bernard Weinstein, director of the University of North Texas Center for Economic Development & Research, said the state's once oil-driven economy has diversified to the point where it more closely resembles the nation's as a whole.

"The Texas economy and Texas companies pretty well mirror the structure of the national economy now," Weinstein said.

"We're part of the national economy, like it or not. So if the

national economy is having problems, we're having problems," he said.

But oil patch troubles still hurt, especially in recent months, when oil prices slid before recovering somewhat in April.

"The energy sector has been hit, really for the last six months, as oil prices have fallen," Weinstein said.

"Most of the Texas-based energy companies have been laying off people for the last few months in response to lower earnings, and that's going to affect their stock," he said.

The comptroller's index tracks the value of 60 representative companies in the energy, finance, technology and general business sectors.

The index showed that Texas energy stocks fell the most in March. Stock prices in the sector dropped 9.2 percent.

None of the 10 energy stocks tracked by the comptroller's office gained in value. Halliburton Co. stock was down by almost 7 percent, Mitchell Energy and Development Corp. down by 5.9 percent, Tenneco Inc. fell by more than 5 percent and Maxus Energy Corp. dropped nearly 8 percent, Sharp said.

General business stocks fell for the first time in six months, a decline totaling 8.7 percent. Among those companies, Central & South West Corp. fell by 9.6 percent, Continental Airlines dropped by 21.8 percent, and Brinker International Inc. was down 36.5 percent.

Technology sector stocks dropped 6.5 percent. Only one of the 10 tracked, Austin-based Dell Computer Corp., saw the value of its stock rise. Texas Instruments declined 4.6 percent, Tandy Corp. dropped 12.7 percent and Compaq Computer Corp. slipped 1 percent, even though each had good news to report in March, Sharp said.

Texas finance, insurance and real estate stocks dropped by 3.2 percent, the comptroller's office said.

"It's not a sign that investors lost confidence in Texas companies or anything like that. It's just that Texas companies are following the national trend," said Sheila Clancy, a spokeswoman for Sharp.

Best known as Superman in four movies from 1978 to 1987, Reeve also appeared in "The Remains of the Day," and "Morning Glory."

Witness blurts out guilt, a la Perry Mason show

HOUSTON (AP) - Jay Hileman never dreamed that being a prosecutor could be this easy.

First, Hileman got armed robbery defendant Arthur Hollingsworth, testifying Tuesday in his defense, to admit he was armed and in the Sun Mart convenience store at the time it was robbed Jan. 3.

Then he asked the perfunctory question.

"Mr. Hollingsworth, you're guilty aren't you, and he said: 'No,' Hileman recalls asking. 'I asked him again: 'Mr. Hollingsworth, you're guilty aren't you,' and he said: 'Yeah.'

"I couldn't believe it," the prosecutor said. "I quit after that."

Retired Judge Wendell Odom was equally stunned. He said he'd not seen anything like it in 37 years on the bench.

"They tell you when you're in law school it's not like it is on Perry Mason, that they're not going to jump up and say I did it, but he did," Odom said.

When Hollingsworth's trial resumed Wednesday, he pleaded guilty.

Jurors sentenced Hollingsworth, 18, to five years in prison. They could have given him a life sentence.

DeMornay delightfully demented in 'Getting Out'

There seems to be this aura that surrounds Rebecca De Mornay and everything she does.

It is an aura of darkness, danger and dementia; of delicate natural beauty and smoldering sexual charisma.

As Lana, the runaway prostitute in 1983's "Risky Business," De Mornay left many male viewers reaching for the hyperventilation bags.

As Peyton, the demented, revenge-seeking nanny in 1992's "The Hand That Rocks the Cradle," she took baby-sitters to the same plane as Freddy Krueger, Jason and Pinhead.

What explanation could there be for De Mornay's predilection for these types of roles?

"I'm attracted to characters that don't bore me," the actress says coyly.

There's nothing boring about De Mornay's character in the ABC drama "Getting Out," airing Monday, April 25.

Based on a play by Pulitzer Prize winner Marsha Norman, "Getting Out" is the story of Arlene Holsclaw (De Mornay), a young Georgia woman who is rehabilitated and released from prison after serving time for theft and murder.

What she desires most in the world is a reunion with the son she bore while in prison, who has since been placed in foster care by her mother (Ellen Burstyn).

Valiantly trying to put the pieces of her life together, Arlene faces setback after setback. She is conned out of her prison-release money by a smarmy cosmetics entrepreneur. She finds a job teaching a knitting class, only to become jobless once again when her employer discovers where she spent the last eight years, and her ex-con boyfriend pressures her to come back to the world's oldest profession.

All the while, Arlene struggles to control the base side of her personality, the "Arlie-girl" side, as she unravels the dark secrets of her childhood and the role her mother played in creating those demons.

"I couldn't stop crying when I read it," De Mornay says. "And I just thought, 'I have to do this. I can't believe they're doing this on television.' It was one of the most uncompromising and disturbing scripts I'd ever read."

In Norman's play, Arlene's schizophrenia is manifested in the twin characters of Arlene, who wants to make things right, and the willful Arlie, who simply wants.

"There were two actresses who played the role," says executive producer Linda Welsh. "And the staging, if you saw the play or read the play, was very unique. It took place on two levels.

"Ours, though, has kept the spirit and the character of the play. And thanks to Miss De Mornay, we've captured the two faces of this lady."

De Mornay readily handles both roles, Arlene and Arlie, slipping from one to the next seamlessly. Burstyn also turns in a powerful performance in the pivotal role of Arlene's mother.

Callous, trashy, selfish and petty, Mama Holsclaw is a perfect foil to Arlene's indomitable perseverance.

"One of the people I've been reading a lot this year is Carl Jung," Burstyn says, "who said the task of being a human being is to bring the darkness into the light."

"I don't think we can use our creative talents any better than to fulfill that task."

And if Jung's philosophy holds true, Rebecca De Mornay is performing her task as a human being often and well.

Just so long as she doesn't get bored.



Fan says goodbye to Macdonald Carey

Dear Candace: I was so upset when I heard that Macdonald Carey (Tom Horton, "Days of Our Lives") had passed away. I know it sounds silly, but I have watched him for so long it felt as though someone in my family had died.

I practically grew up watching the Hortons and the Bradys on "Days," and Dr. Tom Horton was always there for his family and friends. My grandmother told me Carey had also been in several movies. Could you please tell me more about him?

I sure will miss my favorite doctor. —J.K. in Alabama.

Dear Reader: Many of Carey's fans share your sentiments: He was like a family member in many homes during his years on "Days." "This is Macdonald Carey, and these are the days of our lives," has been heard by viewers since the beginning of "Days" in November 1965.

Carey won two Emmys as Best Actor in a Daytime Drama for his work on "Days," and he also won six viewer-selected Soap Opera Awards for his role as Dr. Tom Horton on the series.

"The Great Gatsby," "Who Is the Black Dahlia?," "Streets of Laredo," "Let's Make It Legal," "Stranger at My Door" and Alfred Hitchcock's "Shadow of a Doubt" are some of the 60 movies in which Carey appeared before making his way on to the small screen. He also had a successful career in radio and theater. On Broadway, he starred opposite Kitty Carlisle in "Anniversary Waltz" and with Gertrude Lawrence in "Lady in the Dark."

Carey blamed his divorce from actress Betty Heckscher on his alcoholism. He documented the story of his life in the autobiographical "The Days of My Life." He enjoyed writing and went on to pen three volumes of poetry.

In the last decade of his life Carey was a very spiritual man and was active in the Catholic Church. He is survived by six children and six grandchildren.





-As much as possible, avoid roads where traffic is heavy.

-Exercise particular caution at night. Eighty-five percent of the information

needed for safe driving comes through the eyes, and older eyes are often more sensitive to glare, such as from oncoming headlights.

Are the free radicals eating away at you?

These days it seems everybody's taking antioxidant vitamins like C, E and beta-carotene. But the newest free radical fighter is the essential trace mineral zinc.

Free radicals are highly reactive molecules that literally eat away at our cells and genetic material. They are implicated in some 60 age-related diseases, including cancer, heart disease and premature aging.

Free radicals result from exposure to alcohol, tobacco, pesticides, radiation and other pollutants. They are also by-products of normal cell metabolism. If free radicals are produced faster than the body can neutralize them, free radicals become highly toxic.

The body uses antioxidants to detoxify free radicals. The exciting news about zinc is that it not only helps eliminate harmful free radicals, zinc helps prevent them from forming.

Zinc is an essential part of superoxide dismutase (SOD), a powerful antioxidant so important it's the fifth most common protein (of more than 100,000) produced by the body. By preventing oxidation, zinc protects vital bio-molecules called sulphydryl compounds from turning into free radicals. Further, zinc competes with prooxidant metals (iron and copper) for binding sites, decreasing their ability to form free radicals.

Zinc also helps limit the production of free radicals produced naturally by the body. A recent study at the University of California showed that people taking a zinc monomethionine supplement significantly reduced excess levels of superoxide free radicals produced by white blood cells.

Because our bodies contain a mere one to two grams of zinc, there is a very delicate balance between the amount of zinc consumed each day and the amount that can cause symptoms of zinc deficiency. Mild or even marginal zinc deficiencies can affect the quality of hair, skin and nails, sex drive, taste and smell, and perhaps most importantly, immune function.

While the adult RDA for zinc is 12 to 19 milligrams per day, individual requirements can vary depending on age, sex, diet, climate, stress, infection and level of physical activity.

Unfortunately, current healthful recommendations for diet and

exercise can actually deprive the body of zinc. A high-fiber meal can tie up more than 97 percent of the zinc consumed, and aerobic exercise actually increases zinc losses from the body.

Foods rich in bioavailable zinc include meat, liver, nuts, eggs and seafood, especially oysters. Unfortunately these are some of the richest sources of fat and cholesterol. Taking a zinc supplement may be the most prudent and effective way of insuring adequate intake.

Time saving travel tips

It's the night before your long awaited vacation and you're about to begin the dreaded task of packing.

For many travelers, bringing along the comforts of home without overpacking is a challenge.

Here are just a few tips and reminders to help you get organized and ensure a fuss-free getaway.

-Start thinking about packing a few days before your trip. Take the time to make a checklist of items will need. This will eliminate any last minute anxieties.

-Pack only what you can easily carry yourself. Too much luggage slows you down, wears you out and limits where you can go without a porter.



SOCIAL SECURITY QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS

Q: I am 65 years old, retired, and have Medicare hospital and medical insurance. How much will I have to pay in medical expenses before Medicare will start paying health benefits?

A: In 1994, after you have met the Medicare hospital insurance (Part A) deductible of \$696 and the \$100 medical insurance (Part B) deductible, Medicare will begin paying its portion of the approved charges of your hospital and doctor bills.

Q: There have been a number of mail robberies reported in my section of town recently and I receive my Social Security check at my home. This has me concerned. I'm ready to sign up for direct deposit. What do I have to do?

A: You, like many people, are realizing the benefits of direct deposit. It's easy to sign up—just call Social Security's toll-free number any business day between 7 A.M. and 7 P.M. Or you can call the Amarillo office at 376-2241. When you call, the Social Security representative will ask for your Social Security number, your address, and the name of your bank and your account number, so please have the information handy.

Q: I'm a married woman who works and pays Social Security taxes. A friend of mine told me she'll be eligible for Social Security benefits on her husband's record, even though she's never worked or paid Social Security taxes. That doesn't seem fair. Does that mean that the Social Security taxes I'm paying are wasted, since I could get benefits on my husband's record without ever working?

A: The Social Security taxes you are paying are not wasted. As a married woman who works and pays Social Security taxes, you have advantages by being eligible for your own benefit. You may get a higher benefit when you retire than if your benefit was based solely on your husband's earnings. You can retire before your husband, based on your own earnings, even though your husband continues to work. As a working woman, you earn disability protection for you and your dependent children. Also, in the event of your death, your survivors may be eligible for benefits based on your earnings.

Q: Is the SSI payment for an eligible couple twice that of an eligible individual? And if it isn't, why not?

A: The SSI program currently provides a basic Federal payment of \$446 for an eligible individual and \$669 for an eligible couple. The payment for a couple is lower than that made to two individuals because married people living together generally share expenses and live more economically than two people living independently.

Healthy aging update

One out of every 25 Americans, mostly women over age 65, live with a serious health problem known as urinary incontinence or lack of bladder control.

Even though this problem is easy to treat, only one in 12 actually seeks help from a health care professional. Must suffer silently because they are too embarrassed by their condition to talk about it, or believe that it is an unavoidable part of growing older.

The truth could not be further from a myth. "Incontinence itself is not a disease, but a symptom of something else happening in the body," explains Penelope Catterall, director of health programs for the non-profit Alliance for Aging Research. "The condition may result from muscle damage during pregnancy, infections, injury, or it can be brought on by certain medications, as well as caffeine and alcohol." She adds that incontinence may cause a person to become depressed, afraid to leave home, stop seeing family and friends, or disrupt his or her sex life.

If you suffer from incontinence, you can and should do something about it. The first and most important step in getting your life back to normal is to see a doctor or nurse for a complete physical examination. Your medical professional will discuss the problem with you, find out what is causing the incontinence, and help you decide on the best treatment.


For many people, treatment can begin without the use of drugs or surgery. A doctor or nurse may prescribe such simple measures as changing some of the foods you eat or reducing the amount of caffeine and alcohol you drink. A doctor may also want to change the dosage or

eliminate some of your medications.

There are a number of non-surgical and drug-free treatments for incontinence. Bladder training, a simple program over several weeks during which a patient is taught to follow a strict bathroom schedule, is one of the most popular. Another option is a program of pelvic muscle exercises along with biofeedback treatments. In addition, the Food and Drug Administration recently approved the first injectable collagen implant for incontinence, which works by adding bulk to the tissues around the opening from the bladder through which urine passes.

Several prescription medications are also available for incontinence, and in the most serious cases, surgery is sometimes needed to correct the problem. The type of treatment your doctor recommends will depend on what is causing your bladder problems. But you can't be helped unless you take the first step and talk to your doctor or nurse.



Macular degeneration most common cause of vision loss

Many of those past mid-life accept declining vision as a natural consequence of aging, but it also may be caused by a serious disease, such as macular degeneration, the leading cause of vision loss in people over 60 in this country.

Macular degeneration involves problems with the macula, the central part of the retina that provides sharp clear central vision. Even mild cases can impair a person's ability to read, drive a car, recognize a face or perform close work such as sewing.

Millions of Americans are diagnosed with some degree of this disease, and it is the leading cause of "legal blindness" in people over 60.

Macular degeneration cannot be reversed, but a very small percentage of people can be helped with laser treatment. It is important to consult an eye doctor immediately when any vision loss occurs.

Those who have lost detail vision in both eyes should consult a low vision specialist for help in maximizing remaining vision and learning about appropriate vision aids. There are a number of aids available including video magnifiers--called closed circuit televisions. This equipment enlarges type, regulates contrast and reduces glare to help with such routine tasks as reading newspapers and books and writing letters and checks.

macular degeneration should contact their ophthalmologist immediately.

Nutrition Notes

NUTRITION UPDATE 1994 April 1994

A recent seminar was held in Amarillo on NUTRITION AND CARDIOVASCULAR DISEASE with Ronald S. Smith, author of the *Nutrition, Hypertension and Cardiovascular Disease* (2nd Ed., 1989) the instructor. Smith is a member of The College of Nutrition, a charter member of The International Society for the Study of Fatty Acids and Lipids, and was Professor of Chemistry and Nutrition at Gavilan College, for past 16 years has kept current with the biomedical literature on nutrition as it pertains to cardiovascular disease, immunology and neuroscience at the Stanford and Oregon Medical Centers. He has taught Continuing Education seminars for health care professionals for over 13 years. He now devotes full time to research, writing and lecturing nationwide.

In the next few months of Nutrition Update, this dietitian shall review Mr.

Smith's book on several different topics that relate to hypertension and cardiovascular disease. The topic which will be reviewed this month is SODIUM AND HYPERTENSION.

The topic of Sodium intake and hypertension is assumed to be a well established topic and agreed upon by most professionals. The controversy concerning these subjects have more questions than answers. Consider the issue on salt. Sodium is an essential nutrient. Ordinary table salt, sodium chloride, is the most common source of sodium. Fruits, vegetables, grains and natural plant products are normally very low in sodium. Anyone subsisting on plants, without added salt, would consume between 100 mg to 200 mg per day. Sweating, fever, growth, diarrhea, vomiting, and diabetes can greatly increase this minimum requirement.

Animal products contain considerably more sodium than plant products. The average consumption of the

normal Western Diet contains between 1000mg (1 gm) and 2000 mg (2 gm) sodium. (It takes 2.5 grams of table salt to provide 1 gm of sodium.) Add the sodium from industrial processing i.e. bread making, canned goods, potato chips etc. increases the diet to 2000 mg - 4000 mg of sodium consumed per day by the average person before any salt is added at the table or in cooking. If salt or a sodium based spice is added in preparation to eating, the total sodium content could range from 3000 to 7000 mg.

It has been reported that 10% of the sodium intake occurs naturally in foods, 75% is added by manufacturers, and only 15% is discretionary use in cooking or at the table. Even to adhere to 2000mg sodium intake one must use no salt at the table, in cooking and avoid the highly salted foods such as ham, chips, salted nuts and similar snacks. Extremely low sodium diets lower blood pressure in hypertensive and excessive high sodium diets raise blood pressures. In between these extremes, the evidence is much less consistent or convincing.

In order to get below 4000 mg which need major dietary changes; one must avoid dairy products, meats, all processed foods and salt at the table. With these harsh restrictions—who would follow the diet? Moderate cutbacks seem to be in order in most cases. There are other confounding factors necessary for beneficial control of hypertension. Weight reduction necessary when there is an obesity problem is a definite factor in lowering the blood pressure. With the development of effective antihypertensive drugs where the drug was easy to administer and no life style change was needed her in many cases become a more effective method of controlling sodium restrictions.

Some research studies have evaluated the sodium intake in regards as a useful tool in treatment for some hypertensive but do not address sodium as a cause of hypertension. Regardless of the level of salt intake, compliance is a major problem. It is noted that in some cases when sodium restriction is extremely strict the human body develops sodium deficiencies along with multiple nutrient deficiencies in a great many people.

The evidence on sodium is very

conflicting. It probably means sodium restriction isn't the most important factor in hypertension. Severe sodium restriction does reduce blood pressure in many hypertensive, but it is difficult to implement. Moderate restriction is easier to implement and helps some

hypertensive, especially type II diabetics. Some hypertensive are salt sensitive; they should be identified and put on low sodium diets. We Americans do consume much more sodium than is needed and no benefits are claimed for sodium rich diets.



Take charge of health with real solutions
