Holly plant receives award from giant baby-food firm

The Holly Sugar plant here was recipient of a special plaque of recognition on Friday as representatives of Gerber Products Company named the plant a "Certified Supplier."

A plaque denoting the honor was presented at a luncheon meeting at the Hereford Country Club that was attended by Mark Setterbo, purchasing manager for Gerber's Fort Smith, Ark., plant.

The plant manufactures more than 200 baby food products for distribution in the Western United States.

A delegation of six Gerber

representatives were on hand for the presentation, as was Bob Baldwin, national accounts manager for Imperial Holly Co. in Sugarland and a representative from Holly Sugar's corporate headquarters in Colorado Springs, Colo.

In addition, Holly Sugar was represented by Dave Duncan, district manager at the Hereford Plant, as well as other officials and department representatives. Also attending was Bill Clevenger, president of the Texas and New Mexico Beet Growers Association.

Setterbo said the award is a very

rare honor given to Gerber suppliers.

It is, he said, the result of a "certification process we go through with some of our select suppliers ... to develop a good relationship between supplier and Gerber."

He said the certification process for Holly Sugar began in October 1992. Holly is the sole supplier of sugar to the Gerber Products Arkansas plant.

Setterbo said of the 200 suppliers to the Fort Smith plant, "Holly is our fifth" to receive the Certified Supplier designation.

Don't bag grass clippings

Citizens' help needed in waste disposal plan

Hereford residents can help save the city money if they cooperate with a new program of waste disposal.

With City of Hereford garbage trucks traveling to Bushland and Canyon to unload trash, the emphasis is on separating waste to reduce the amount that must be paid for

dumping.

-- Only household waste should be placed in dumpsters in the city's alleys.

-- Grass clippings -- loose, not bagged -- may be piled in alleys for city trucks to collect.

-- Leaves and tree limbs also may be left in alleys and should not be placed in plastic bags.

-- Building and construction debris, concrete, used appliances should be hauled to the Type IV landfill for non-household waste.

-- Recyclables should be deposited properly.

Monthly collections of paper and metals have been conducted by civic organizations for some time. Now, the City of Hereford has arranged for glass collections.

An Amarillo firm is providing heavy cartons for deposit of glass and will pick up the filled cardboard containers.

Announcing the glass recycling program, City Manager Chester Nolen said glass must be separated by color -- clear, amber and green.

Bottles and containers must be rinsed and metal rings or paper identification removed.

"We have to be sure the colors don't get mixed up," said Nolen. "One bottle of the wrong color means the company won't take the carton."

The cartons will be set up in the barn at the landfill.

Since the landfill in use for several years closed 10 days ago, the city has

initiated a program to inform citizens of options they have.

For instance, a "Don't Bag It" campaign is in another season under sponsorship of the Deaf Smith County Extension office. This program encourages homeowners to leave the grass clippings on their lawns for mulch.

However, persons who prefer to collect the clippings have two options:

1. They may deposit the clippings in the alley for city trucks to pick up. The clippings should not be placed in plastic bags.

2. The clippings may be taken by the homeowner or yard attendant to the landfill and dumped. Again, the material should not be bagged.

City officials point out that bagging defeats the purpose of allowing dumping of yard materials without a charge.

"If we have to cut the bags open and empty them, we're not accomplishing anything," said a landfill attendant.

Tree limbs left in alleys usually are chipped and hauled to the landfill where chippings may be picked up for yard work.

When the city began planning for the day the landfill closed, several proposals were studied, and later discarded.

At first, placing a dumpster on each block for yard clippings and

Voting in local elections will start Monday

Early voting for May 7 municipal, school and hospital board elections will begin Monday in Hereford and Deaf Smith County.

Voters will choose trustees for the Hereford and Walcott school districts, directors of the Deaf Smith County Hospital District and Hereford City Commissioners.

There are no contests for the four places to be filled on the Hereford City Commission. Seeking re-election are Wayne Winget, Place 4, and at-large commissioners, Carey Black and Roger Eades. Nancy Griego, appointed last year to fill an unexpired term, is running for a full two-year term in Place 2.

Hereford Independent School District board members Ron Weishaar, representing District 1, and Raymond Schlabs, District 3, are seeking re-election to their position.

Angie Villarreal is running against Weishaar and Randy Tooley is opposing Schlabs.

Voters will elect four board members for the hospital district. Incumbents seeking new terms on the board are John Perrin, Boyd Foster and Merle Clark. Running, also, are Steve Cortez, Dean Crofford and Larry Watts. The four candidates receiving the most votes are elected.

Paul Abalos is not running for re-election to the board.

City, HISD and DSCHD early voting will be conducted in the office of Deaf Smith County Clerk David Ruland. Hours are 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. daily. Early voting will end at 5 p.m. on May 3.

Balloting for the Walcott election will be held at the school office there.

'Breakfast with Mayor' offered here Wednesday

Since that meeting, the city has worked on a new policy for bids and enforcement of time limits for trains to block crossings was initiated. Train conductors have been issued citations for failure to clear a crossing within the time limit.

Hereford man is unapologetic about unusual choice of pets

Grizzly Adams, make way for Buffalo Blankenship.

Actually, you could give Sidney Blankenship any of a half dozen nicknames -- Bear, Lion, or Buffalo, since he raises all of the above on a farm near Sims.

Blankenship, 50, shares the farm with his parents, Morris and Jewel Blankenship, who often shake their heads in awe when they talk about the exotic animals that are part of their son's life.

His menagerie includes two full-grown African lions, two large black bears and a cub, 10 buffalo, half a dozen wild pigs, two White Tail Deer,

a small herd of Texas White Dall Sheep, and more than 40 dogs.

The Blankenships, along with Sidney's brother, Morris, own more than 8,000 acres of prime farm land adjoining each other.

Morris has a master's degree in math -- he taught in Fort Worth for eight years -- and presently works as a commercial pilot while he farms on the side. Sidney is content to take care of the animals and help his 81-year-old father with the farming chores.

The obvious question is, why does he do it?

Sydney doesn't answer the question directly. A quiet-spoken man who is thoughtful in all his actions,

he instead tells you about his educational background.

He attended Abilene Christian College in the 1960s, transferred to the University of Edinburgh in Scotland for a year, then enrolled at Oxford where he received his Master's Degree in Theology.

"Back then, I wanted to be a theologian," he said. "But as I pursued my studies, it seemed I gradually moved into what I'm doing today."

He raises animals for one basic reason: he likes being around them. He enjoys watching and caring for wild animals in their natural environment, and builds cages large enough for the captive animals to be comfortable.

Blankenship said his 40 dogs are descended from two dogs he had originally.

"They're a mixed breed of hounds," he said with a smile. "I don't use them to herd buffalo or for any work on the farm. They're just here."

"I use them as my reflection of their biological relevance to mankind."

While he has sold some of his animals -- he has a Class A Dealer's Permit from the U.S. Department of

leaves was studied.

Nolen said the city didn't have enough dumpsters for that project so the decision was made to ask residents to leave the materials in the alley, or haul to the dump.

To facilitate disposal, the City Commission agreed to waive the charge for dumping yard materials. Contract yard workers as well as homeowners may take advantage of the free dumping.

However, the charge for placing building debris and appliances and certain other items still is applied.

Because regulations made by the Environmental Protection Agency for operation of a landfill imposed expensive restrictions, the City of Hereford decided more than a year ago to convert the facility to a Type IV landfill and transport household waste to other sites.

The EPA mandate closed Hereford's landfill on April 8 and trucks have been hauling waste to the Amarillo landfill at Bushland and a privately-owned facility at Canyon. Nolen said the operation ran "very smoothly" during the first week.

Amarillo closed Monday because of dampness and we went to Canyon," he reported. "I'm sure there will be times when we'll have to hold garbage because of wet weather."

So far, the city has had no need to increase personnel in the health department and Nolen sees no changes down the road.

At a price of \$12.50 per ton for dumping, trash disposal is an expensive business for the city. Every bit of waste that can be recycled saves money.

Nolen expects to have a pretty good idea of the cost of hauling Hereford's garbage out-of-town after a month of the new operation.

The city uses five diesel and two gasoline trucks for the trips. To provide a chassis for heavy loads, health department employees upgraded three trucks, to tandem axle.

Five tandem and two single axle trucks are in service now, two of them bought last year for the department.

The landfill is open daily, from 8 a.m. to 5:30 p.m., Monday through Friday, and 8 a.m. to 2:30 p.m. Saturday, for the convenience of Hereford residents.

Tornado plows through Crosby, injures 14 people

CROSBY, Texas (AP) - A tornado plowed through a subdivision northeast of Houston Friday, injuring at least 14 people, flattening a church and causing damage to several buildings including a trailer park, authorities said.

The tornado hit about 5:15 p.m. at a trailer park and adjacent subdivision north of Crosby, which is 25 miles northeast of Houston.

Harris County Sheriff's Sgt. M.A. Walker said 14 people were injured, all of whom were inside the trailer park. The injured included some children, but Walker did not know how many. There were no fatalities reported.

Residents said the Community Baptist Church was flattened and most homes were destroyed in the Heathergate trailer park, about six miles north of Crosby.

"It looked like it came in on the treetops and twisted some of the tree limbs into the yards, and it looked like it just sat down on the trailer park and wiped it out," said Jim McCall, a resident of the Indian Shores subdivision.

McCall said some other homes were damaged in his subdivision, but the trailer park was hardest hit.

"They suffered a big loss," said McCall, whose own home wasn't damaged. "Probably about two-thirds of the trailer park was wiped out."

McCall estimated the trailer park was the size of about four city blocks. Authorities did not know how many homes were in the park or how many were damaged.

Janis Parker, spokeswoman for Emergency Medical Service in Crosby, said 500 to 1,000 people had

been displaced. The Red Cross planned to use the Crosby High School as a shelter.

Four victims were taken to Northeast Medical Center, spokesman Tom Broad said. One woman was in critical condition and three men were in serious condition, he said.

"It was mostly lacerations to the forehead, fractures, hip injuries and bruises from flying objects," Broad said.

Three people were admitted to San Jacinto Hospital and were in stable condition with minor injuries, a hospital spokeswoman said.

Agriculture -- he is not in the business of trading wild animals.

Blankenship is meticulous in his record keeping -- the U.S.D.A. requires it -- and he keeps his property clean considering the large number of animals that occupy it.

A year ago, one of the bears bit him on the hand. The wound required stitches, but Blankenship doesn't blame the bear.

"There was snow and ice, and it was dark," he reflected. "The bite was just a reminder that these are wild animals after all. I didn't mind."

On another occasion, a friend got careless with the lions and nearly ended up a casualty.

"I warned him not to get close, but he went into the cage and one of the lions grabbed him behind the neck," said Blankenship. He averted a possible tragedy by playing with the lion until the animal released his badly shaken friend.

A spokesman at LBJ Hospital in Houston says an 18-year-old woman and a 19-year-old man were released after treatment of minor injuries.

About 30 members of the Community Baptist Church gathered in the dark, puddled parking lot of their destroyed church for a prayer service. The 14-year-old church has about 400 members.

Associate Pastor Robert Williams said Sunday's church services would be held in the church's parking lot.

"It's really just a building, it can be replaced. People can't," Williams said.

People who meet Blankenship for the first time are taken back by his appearance. He wears his hair long in twin braids, Indian-style, and has a full beard.

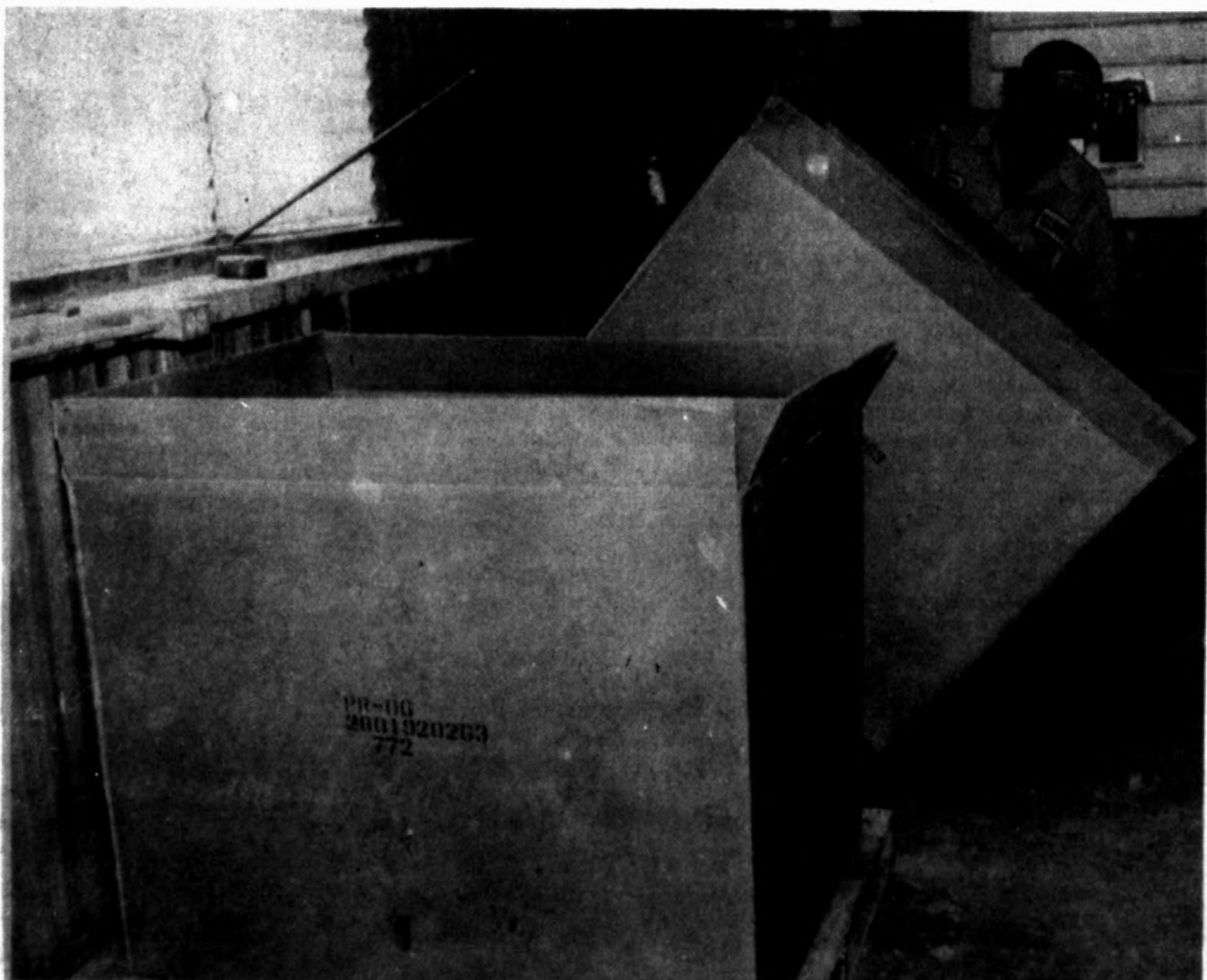
"I've had long hair since the '60s," he declared. "And I've been a vegetarian the past 14 years."

He was in England, studying at Oxford, during the Vietnam War. Like Bill Clinton, he escaped the draft because he was on a student deferment program.

None of Blankenship's animals ever goes hungry. Their diet ranges from dog food from Hereford Bi-Products, to corn, rice, beans, apples, and carrots from his garden.

He is unapologetic about his lifestyle and admits he loves what he is doing.

"Out here, there is a sense of timelessness," he said. "Living on the prairie is like being on the ocean. You're never bored."

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Pampa, Colorado City have different opinions on impact of local prisons

PAMPA, Texas (AP) - No, Pampa residents aren't fussing over the prison that opened east of their city in November 1992.

But they aren't bestowing unilateral enthusiasm, either, on a facility billed as an economic turnaround. From the mayor's office to the gas station down the highway from the Jordan Unit, there's some feeling the prison has made little more than a muted ripple in terms of business, housing starts and sales tax revenue in Pampa.

"Not a tremendous impact," said Mayor Richard Peet. "There is some disappointment when you visualize your community in a very depressed situation and then think this is the answer."

Now consider Colorado City. A 1,300-bed prison will open by summer outside this town of 4,700 West Texans. By September 1995, the state plans to complete a 1,000-bed state jail nearby.

Colorado City leaders point out that prison construction already has spawned three new restaurants. Two developers bought tracts to build homes for prison employees, they said.

"The advent of the prison and the jail is probably the biggest thing in Mitchell County since Genesis 1:1," said Mayor Jim Baum. "It's big."

Big, definitely, in jobs and multi-million dollar payrolls.

Big, too, in competition for lockups that at one time were considered a neighborhood enigma. Sixty-three communities vied for a prison when the Texas Board of Criminal Justice made its 1992 awards.

The nine-member board met March 17-18 to discuss new facilities helping to roughly double the state's inmate capacity by 1995, to 145,000 beds.

Board member Allan Polunsky of San Antonio said economic hard times led many cities across Texas to covet a piece of such a stable industry.

"Those communities that have jumped into the sweepstakes have

correctly recognized that these are plums they should be pursuing," Polunsky said.

That raises the question of whether a prison's economic benefits, and potential spinoff businesses, justify the handsome packages and exhaustive effort many communities exert to lure one.

"I think it's too early to really tell," said Peet, the Pampa mayor.

"It's getting us back to the boom time we had enjoyed in the early days" of cattle and oil, insists Colorado City's Baum.

Pampa and Colorado City suffered similar woes when oil prices fell in the 1980s: Jobs evaporated, businesses boarded up and people moved out.

Texas Employment Commission figures show that 10,153 people were working in Gray County in 1985. By 1991, that figure for the Pampa area fell to 8,425.

The Jordan Unit gets credit for bolstering the 1993 employment number back up to 8,666.

Bill Waters, a former Gray County district attorney, spearheaded the effort to lure a prison to Pampa. He calls the economy "steady" now and says rental properties are scarce.

"It made them (residents) feel more positive again when there'd been nothing to feel positive about," Waters said.

Pampa had to try twice to win its 1,008-bed medium-security unit, which employs 305 people and provides an annual payroll of about \$6.7 million.

First, in 1989, the city drew up a prison package that included about 1,200 acres of farmland and the offer to pave a 2-mile access road and extend utilities, water and sewer lines. Residents donated \$800,000 to help finance the deal, Waters said.

But it wasn't chosen.

Pampa made much the same offer again in 1990 - campaigning with the slogan, "A prison for Pampa. Two P's in a pod" - and this time was successful.

Residents and city leaders say they know of no social downsides the prison caused.

"Other than knowing it's out there and believing that it's having an economic impact, I wouldn't know it's out there," Waters said.

The state plans to expand the Jordan Unit to house 420 parole violators by September. D.D. Sanders, the warden, said he'll need 120 more employees.

"Just another opportunity for growth out here," Sanders said. "The comments I get are, 'When is it going to be done?'"

About half the prison employees live outside Pampa, a city of 20,000. Some of them are shopping now at

Wayne's Western Wear, said owner Wayne Stribling.

"We're definitely seeing some different customers in our store," Stribling said. He added an afterthought: "A good oil boom might be better than a prison."

Baum predicts that Colorado City's vacant businesses downtown will reopen and the schools will get crowded once the prison and jail open, employing about 700 workers.

Colorado City's offer to the state - accepted on the first try - included 800 acres off Interstate 20.

"Everyone is awfully enthused over our good fortune," Baum said. "The group that may be the most enthusiastic is the older citizens, because they remember when Colorado City had Saturday redneck day - the shops and streets were full. They see that this could be a return to that prosperity."

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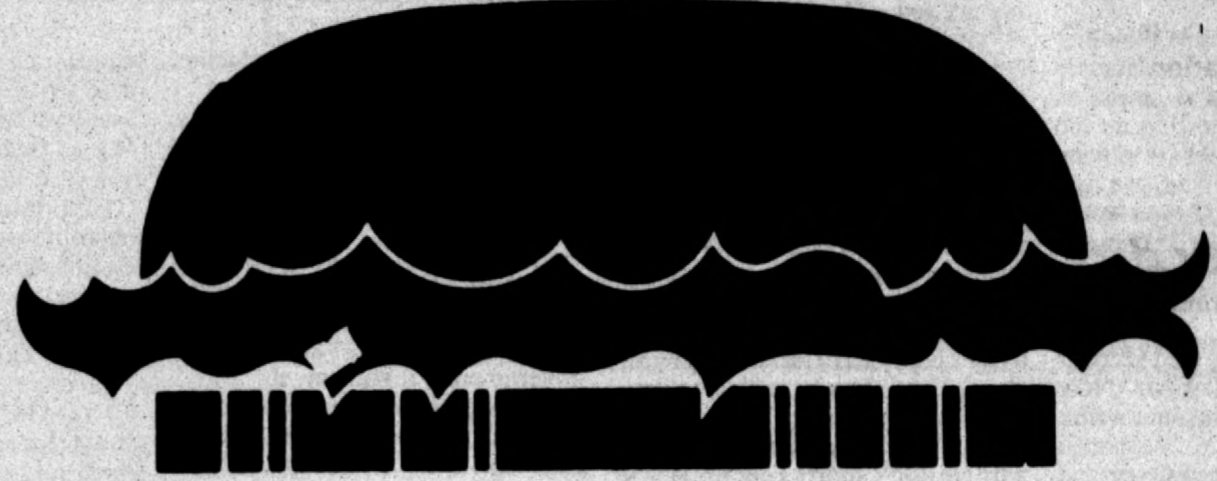

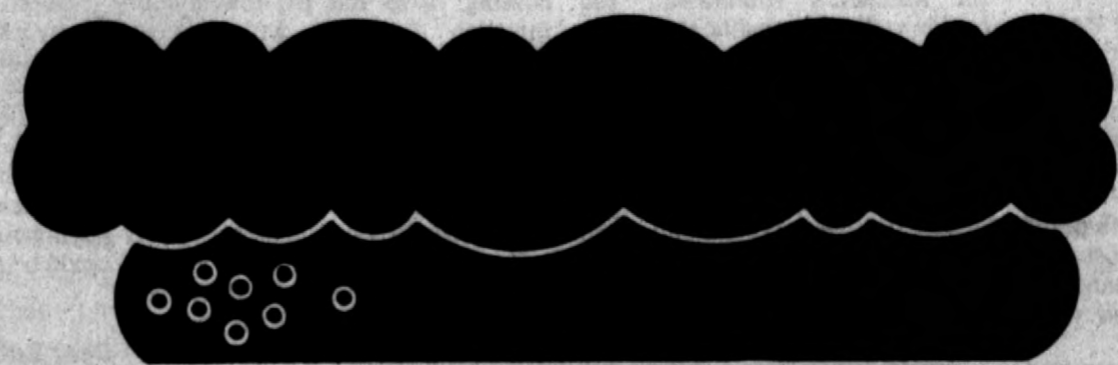

Did Mitchell step aside, or did he get a gentle push?

WASHINGTON (AP) - George Mitchell seemed the perfect candidate for the Supreme Court: so popular in the Senate that confirmation probably would have been unanimous.

Now his abrupt withdrawal assures President Clinton of yet another headache in filling a key judicial appointment.

Was Mitchell gently nudged aside by the White House? Or did he truly decide on his own to devote his energies to the health care battle?

Whatever the case may be, it is almost certain that whomever Clinton picks will have a tougher time winning confirmation than would have the amiable Senate majority leader from Maine.

Mitchell was a well-respected figure nationally, a former judge with a reputation for evenhandedness.

No one on the list of potential contenders now said to be under consideration even approaches Mitchell's credentials.

The job sounds like nice work if you can get it: a lifetime post with good fringe benefits, a chance to leave a mark on U.S. legal policy and plenty of respect.

So why do presidents - and particularly Clinton - seem to have such a hard time filling vacancies? And why do so many potential well-known candidates withdraw their names?

"I think the whole process has gone sour," said Tom Korologos, a Republican lobbyist who helped shepherd President Reagan's

nominations of Chief Justice William Rehnquist and Justice Antonin Scalia through the Senate. He also handled Reagan's unsuccessful nomination of Robert Bork to the high court.

Clinton in the past has spoken of the virtues of appointing political figures instead of judges to the court and has cited as an example the broad experience that the late Chief Justice Earl Warren, a former California governor, brought to the bench.

And yet, with Mitchell's withdrawal, the list of individuals said to be under consideration by Clinton consists almost entirely of judges and those in the legal system - names few Americans have heard of.

If there was some hidden reason for Mitchell's withdrawal, you couldn't tell it from public statements on Tuesday by both the president and the majority leader. Both indicated that the choice to withdraw was Mitchell's and that he had been Clinton's first choice.

But there were some early signs of possible trouble, including the obvious, that Clinton really wanted Mitchell to help marshal support for his health care plan.

Or maybe Mitchell wanted to gamble that another court slot would open up - perhaps that of chief justice - while Clinton was still president.

In any event, with Mitchell's withdrawal, Clinton lost his best shot at winning quick approval for a Supreme Court nominee, and must now brace for what could yet another nasty - but typical - confirmation battle.

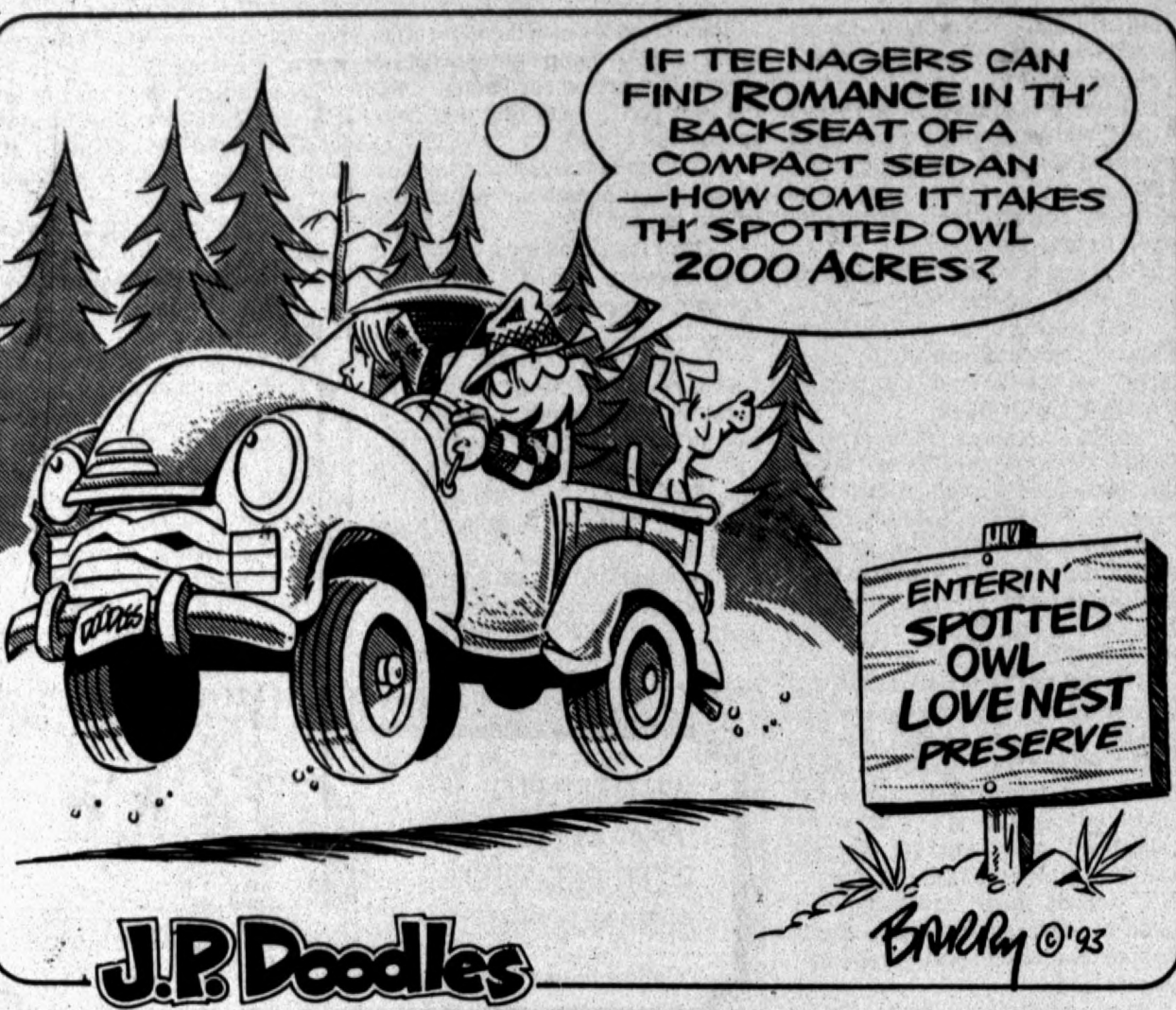

Hallelujah, the primary election season is over!

But wait, not so fast. On Monday, early voting begins for the school board, city commission and hospital board elections, which will be held on May 7.

I think these three elections provide the best place a concerned citizen can become active, because these are the most basic level of governmental involvement.

I mean, how much more basic can you get than the operation of the school district, the hospital district or the city?

Besides, unlike the county commission and other county offices for which elections were so recently held (and re-held in a couple of cases), city, school board and hospital candidates run on non-partisan ballots, meaning you don't have to have a Democratic or Republican primary first.

And that means a person does not have to submit to the ideological whims of partisan politics in order to get elected (meaning in a county like Hereford, someone who is a registered Republican might be elected to one of these offices!).

In addition, these are relatively short terms of two or three years, so someone who seeks the office is not obligating himself (or herself) to a

long stretch as a public servant, yet there are no term limits, so another candidate can serve a long time, so long as that person gets re-elected every few years.

Unfortunately, however, while school, hospital and city commission elections are the most basic level of representative government, they also tend to be those that are overlooked or looked down upon by the citizens of the city or district.

I have been told several times of school board races in the past in which the person elected was simply the one who had the most write-in votes because nobody bothered to fill out the paperwork to get on the ballot.

It's not like it's that difficult to get on the ballot in the first place -- there's no filing fee and no petition, just some papers to fill out.

This year we have six candidates running for four spots on the hospital board. Three of the candidates are incumbents, so there will be at least one new face on that board after May 7.

In the school board race, two incumbents each have challengers, so the board could stay the same or get two new faces.

Nothing will change at all for the city commission, since nobody but the incumbents filed to run for any of

the available seats.

So even though you are probably tired of elections, campaigning and voting, please hang in there for a little longer.

This may well be the most important election this year, since the people elected next month will have the most direct control over your purse strings as they set tax rates and oversee operations of the city, schools and hospital.

Speaking of elections, we have now completed the primary election season and have entered the "Political Hypocrisy" stage of the political year.

This is the time that appears most frequently at the state and national level, when the primary losers jump up and endorse their party's nominee for the job they had sought.

The most visible Political Hypocrite this year may well be Jim Mattox, who lost his primary runoff race to Richard Fisher last week.

What I mean by Political Hypocrisy is this -- after months of running around Texas calling each other names and slinging mud about character, morals, political views and other nonsense, the voters have chosen Someone Else and now Joe Candidate has to pacify the state party leadership.

So the first thing he does is call a news conference and says, "I just want to congratulate Bill Nominee for a hard-fought victory and give him my absolute support in the tough battle ahead against that nefarious opposition candidate. I know a few things were said -- on both sides,

mind you -- that were spoken in the heat of battle, so to speak, that might have been taken wrong by some people. But all that is behind us now and I want everyone to work together and support good old Bill."

Then he trundles off around the state with Bill Nominee on a "good-will" tour to whip up support among his followers in order to keep the votes from going over to the camp of Phil Opposition Party.

Finally, the loser makes sure that every stop along this "good-will" tour includes visits with the local media -- the same people, mind you, who were told last month that Bill Nominee was a scoundrel, a crook who would sell out his own mother for a dime, and a womanizing anti-American pig not worthy of life -- and talks fervently about how we should support Bill Nominee in November.

As you can see, it's pretty hypocritical and anyone with half a brain in his head should see through this pile of fertilizer.

But no matter how transparent the act is, for some reason it still goes on and this year will be no exception.

Well, I guess that's all for this week. Have a good week and don't forget the Day of Prayer for Rain on Sunday. If your church has not planned organized prayer during services, suggest it. If not, at least pray on your own.

If we all pray together, I believe we can get that six inches of rain we so desperately need.

Is anyone better off as a result of the existence of Texas Rural Legal Aid? Are there really any battles that have resulted in any real victories?

Can we actually justify this program that is being paid for by all of us? What kind of a crop has this agency harvested? What really is the fruit of its labor?

It appears to me that in Hereford, some of the fruits are many empty buildings that used to house a very dynamic vegetable industry. These were businesses that provided jobs and contributed to the local tax base.

The most undesirable fruit seems to be the division and dissension that exists as a result of all the lawsuits that have been filed over the years.

I question whether anyone, including the alleged victims of injustice, are really pleased with the results. The biggest loss is to our own integrity. We have more bitterness, resentment and jealousy as a result of these outside lawyers coming in to tell us how much injustice to which we've been exposed.

When will it ever end? What really is their agenda?

Twenty-two years ago, there may have been a way to justify the TRLA program. The underprivileged needed to have access to the same law and order as those who could afford it. Today we have better than free legal aid. There were many federal and state agencies formed just to keep the playing field even.

There are programs for everything from discrimination to labor and equal opportunity concerns. What does TRLA do that couldn't be done by one of these other agencies? And, we could cut our deficit by about half a billion dollars a year.

Some readers may think--"What difference does it make to me? May

I tell you that it will make a difference. The latest injustice that TRLA has taken an interest in is sexual harassment. That door is wide open to affect most anyone in the private or public sector--from baker to banker, cowboys and Indians, and administrators to the least suspecting of all, other attorneys.

All it takes is two people in agreement with a legitimate or illegitimate claim, and TRLA can come after you with all the backing of the U.S. Treasury. You will have to come up with the money and time to defend yourself whether the charges are true or false.

How can any of us be responsible for what is said in the workplace between two employees? If there is a problem, can't we encourage people to work it out, report it to their supervisor or, lastly, an agency created to help in those situations...like the EEOC, Department of Labor, or Texas Employment Commission?

Do we really need an army of taxpayer subsidized attorneys? Could it possible be time to question whether this agency has overextended its welcome? Who watches the TRLA; who are they accountable to; what is their mission?

Remember, you, the taxpayer, are paying for this program. And you could be the next defendant.

Most of the Hereford entries made it to the semifinals during the first day of the District 1-4A Tennis Tournament Friday in Borger, but only the doubles team of Brooke Weishaar and Kara Sandoval won in the semis. Weishaar and Sandoval; the No. 1 seed in the 12-team girls' doubles bracket, defeated Munoz and Hodges of Randall, the No. 4 seed, 6-2, 6-3, in the semis. The Hereford duo was to play in the finals as the tournament finished up Saturday in Borger.

Hereford coach Ed Copen seemed pleased with all the Hereford players' performance. The seven Hereford entries which lost Friday did so to seeded opponents. Three unseeded Hereford singles—Melissa Berend, Rob Reinauer and Tyler Merrick defeated seeded opponents in the second round.

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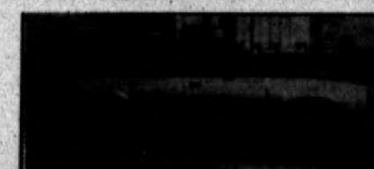

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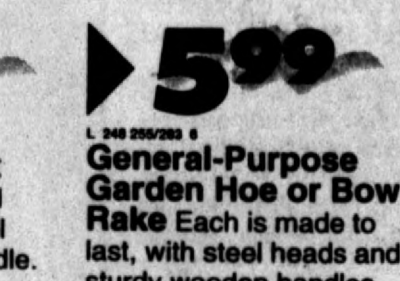

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Most successful owners stay behind scenes

DALLAS (AP)—The always-critical owner position has forever been underrated in the sports world.

The players and the coaches get the hurrahs if the franchise wins but the owner usually gets the heat if a team loses.

Dallas fans were blessed from day one when Clint Murchison bought the NFL expansion Cowboys in 1960. He had the good sense to hire competent people like Tex Schramm and Tom Landry and get the heck out of the way.

He surfaced once when asked what he was going to do about the Cowboys losing ways to give his answer: a 10-year contract for Landry.

Murchison signed the checks, let Schramm run the franchise and Landry coach the team.

You never saw his picture in the paper. And you seldom saw him unless you were on one of the Cowboys team charters for a road game.

Unfortunately, owners aren't like that anymore.

Look at the Brad Shorts and the Brad Corbetts who turned the Texas Rangers more into a circus than a professional team.

The owner circus has come to the Metroplex and apparently won't ever leave again.

Let's start with the Mavericks, where Don Carter admitted this week when he fired personnel director Rick Sund maybe he isn't qualified to own the team. After 14 seasons, that's one assumption that's not too far off target.

Carter hired club president Norm Sonju, who hired Sund way back in 1979. They tried to pattern their franchise after the Cowboys, building

through the draft and became very successful.

The Mavs were within an eyelash of the NBA Finals when Mark Aguirre went south on them in the Western Conference title game against the Los Angeles Lakers.

Instead of ditching Aguirre, Carter coddled him. Then Dick Motta had a bellyful of Sonju and Sund and walked off the job.

The rest is NBA history as the Mavs became a franchise on decline with Carter pulling the trigger here and there on personnel decisions and hitting himself in the foot. Carter never even played basketball in high school. Exactly when did he become a basketball man?

Instead of an aggressive franchise the Mavs became a club directed by an owner who should have been letting his basketball people run the team. And if he didn't get results from Sonju and Sund, he should have hired new basketball people.

Carter should have dismissed Sonju when he got rid of Sund, who apparently was fired because he hired Quinn Buckner, who has the Mavs last in the NBA.

At least the owner of the Dallas Stars, Norm Green, has the good sense to allow the talented Bob Gainey to coach the NHL team and wheel and deal for the players as general manager. Green doesn't interfere with Gainey's decisions and more power to him.

The current Rangers owners have pretty much left things up to the baseball people, making Tom Grieve the guy who makes most of the trade calls. There's no interference with manager Kevin Kennedy.

You don't see general partner George W. Bush involving himself in day-to-day decisions.

Then there's Dallas Cowboys owner Jerry Jones, who is so obsessed

with getting credit for the Super Bowl champions current success that he refused to work a deal where Jimmy Johnson would stay on.

Jones couldn't stand being in the background with Johnson getting all the praise. A heavy cash flow and two Super Bowl trophies sitting in his office weren't enough for Jones, who wants to show the world he can both own and coach the team to a championship.

Barry Switzer found that out his first day on the job when Jones cut tight end Alfredo Roberts without telling Switzer.

"Oh, that's OK with me," Switzer said.

It better be, Barry, because you no more coach this team than the man in the moon. And you'd better laugh and cut up if Jones brings Prince Bandar of Saudi Arabia down on the sidelines during the third period like he did in one game, infuriating Johnson.

When it's all said and done, Jones may eventually make the Don Carters of the professional ownership world look good.

Not many owners have taken back-to-back world champions and burned the whole thing to the ground.

The prediction here is it will happen to the Cowboys. They'll make the playoffs the next two years but no Super Bowl.

Then the panic will set in like it did with the Mavericks.

Owners. It's the most critical position on the team. Too bad you can't draft 'em.

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Between The Covers

I sat for a while trying to come up with a catchy phrase that would gain the readers attention, and bring the books selected for this week together under a common theme. The more I worked, the more diverse the books seemed to become. So the theme this week is diversity in time, thought, and approach. Because of an interest I have had lately in Texas history and the different personalities involved in making Texas what it is today, I selected the book *Promised Lands* by Elizabeth Crook. Elizabeth also wrote *The Raven's Bride*, another novel about Texas. *Promised Lands* begins with the Callum Mackay family and their struggle to survive in an area where wolves and Comanche, can sound alike and be equally dangerous. Sarah and Callum were awakened by a long, trailing howl of a wolf, but as they, husband and wife, stood at the window prepared to do battle, the crouched form of a man could be seen moving from the cornfield. "Hide the children under the bed" Callum commanded. The battle began in the next second and when it was quiet again, Sarah and daughter Matty are dead, Callum has been scalped and left for dead, and baby Samuel had been saved only because he was covered in his mother's blood. It is July, 1835, early for a raiding party, but Ysambanli has his own timing and these were not the only Texans to suffer. Callum survives and begins his search for the half breed called Maytee, leaving baby Samuel in Gozales with a midwife. It is a time when Santa Anna had taken similar measures in other Mexican states, disarming militias. Now he is at Gonzales demanding that a scrappy 6-pound cannon be surrendered. The cannon was disabled and only used to frighten Indians away with the loud thunder like noise, but the colonists were not willing to give it up. Someone had cut a flag from a wedding dress and painted a crude likeness of the cannon on it and written

the words "Come and Take It" underneath. So Santa Anna was here, in force, to take it. Callum Mackay, Domingo De La Rosa, Hugh and Katie Kenner, and Maytee are a few of the people the reader will meet in this account of the Texas Revolution and the time following. "Throne of Isis" by Judith Tarr takes place in the word of Cleopatra, Queen of Egypt. The most powerful woman of the ancient Mediterranean holds the throne for nearly 30 years. Educated in 12 languages, a student of philosophy and the arts Cleopatra was wife to Julius Caesar and bore his only son. After Caesar's death Cleopatra meant to use Mark Anthony to unite Egypt and Rome under the Throne of Isis. Mark Anthony becomes her partner in this vast political enterprise and Cleopatra falls in love. Judith Tarr's choice of heroines keeps the historical tale enlightening and entertaining. "Pride: The Charley Pride Story" by Charley Pride tells of a young man coming from an impoverished childhood into the world of country music. Charley's first ticket out of Sledge, Mississippi and poverty was through baseball. While playing for a Missonia, Montana semipro team, Charley had his first opportunity to sing in a country western bar. He signed with RCA in 1956 and his records began to sell immediately even during the most bitter civil rights struggle. Charley's constant struggle for acceptance has enriched many lives and earned him a permanent place in country music's history. "Rhinstone Cowboy: An Autobiography" by Glen Campbell "is the story of a rhinstone cowboy whose sparkle was fading fast, but who rose to live again, and lived to tell about it." It began like a dream. One of 12 children, Glen started as a brilliant studio musician behind such artists as Sinatra, Elvis, and Nat King Cole. As a solo performer in the 60s and 70s, Campbell sold 45 million records and hosted his own top-rated

TV show. Fame became a nightmare of mad spending, multiple marriages, alcohol and cocaine dependencies that threatened Campbell's career and his very existence. Struggling in recovery, Campbell, now a Christian, gives a book that is both a "star-studded show-biz memoir and a spiritual testimony." Campbell wishes to thank the millions who have supported him through the good and the bad, and hopes that some can be inspired by what he has to say as honestly as he can say it. "The World Must Know: The History of The Holocaust as Told in the United States Memorial Museum" by Michael Berenbaum summons all who enter its doors to remember and immortalize the 6 million Jews and millions of other Nazi Victims of World War II. The museum is a creation of those who felt that the memory of the Holocaust was dying with the last survivors. As this generation passes on the details of the four major historical participants: the perpetrator, the bystander the rescuer and the victims will remain to tell the story that the world must not forget. The museum does not strive to explain why the Holocaust happened but meticulously restricts itself to answer the questions of how it happened. This book seeks to introduce the reader to the museum through the Study of the Holocaust. Through text artifacts, photographs, oral histories, maps, documents, film and music the reader will learn of the events, and at the same time begin a thought provoking, disturbing and personally upsetting experience.

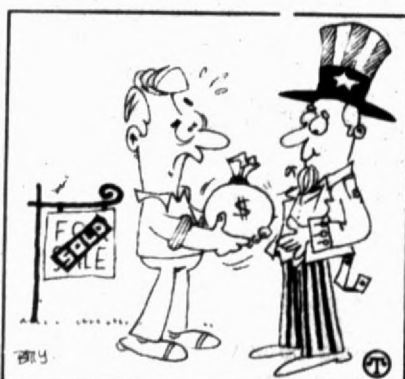
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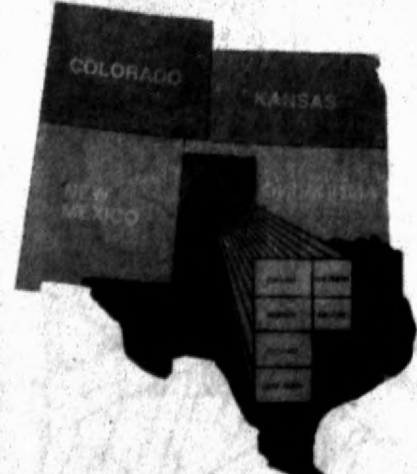

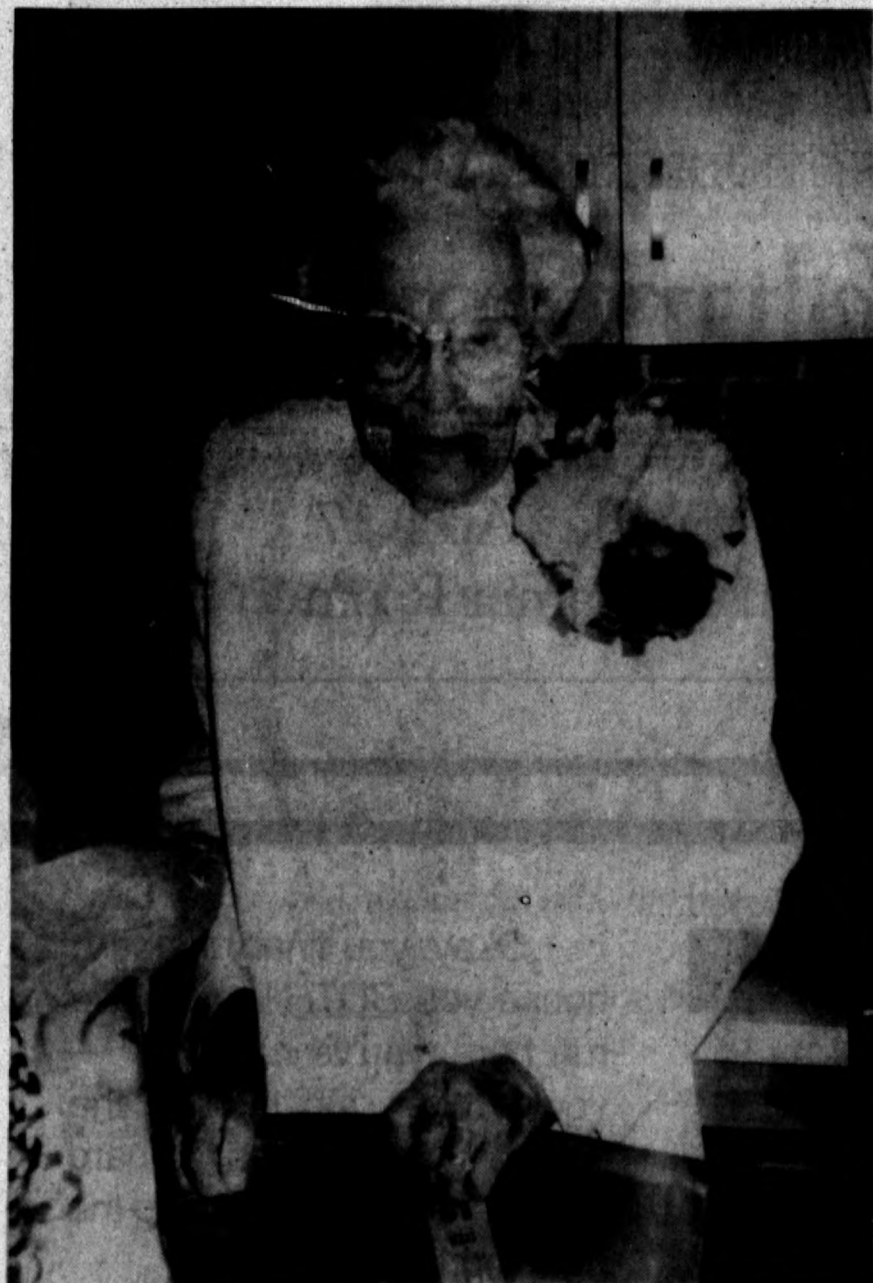

DEAR ANN LANDERS: It was with great interest that I read your column about teachers because I am one of them.

Do people realize that today's teacher is expected to entertain, motivate, counsel, diagnose, arbitrate, instill self-esteem and do a little teaching--if she has enough time and energy left?

Teaching is becoming increasingly difficult. Every year, I find myself seeing fewer students who come to school ready, willing and eager to learn. We are here to teach, not to baby-sit, police, psychoanalyze or provide a "feel good" environment. Today, the stakes are high. Children who do not have a good education have little chance of succeeding in this

competitive world.--K.A., Fort Worth

DEAR K.A.: The mail on this subject was red-hot. Much of the anger was directed toward parents who blame teachers when their kids don't do well.

From Youngstown, Ohio: I am a retired teacher, counselor and principal. When I began teaching 30 years ago, I was able to walk into a cafeteria full of inner-city junior high school students, and they would immediately quiet down because a teacher was an authority figure. This is no longer true. Students have no respect for authority today because that's how they were raised. The demand for instant gratification is the order of the day. So now we have

drugs, drive-by shootings, hate crimes and a total disregard for the law. What we are witnessing is the complete breakdown of morality.

Denton, Texas: I am a not a teacher. I am a 16-year-old student who is also fed up with the system. I have never been in trouble and don't hang out with kids who do drugs. Schools today are much too lenient. I have seen some very fine teachers take a lot of abuse. When they are in a head-to-head battle with parents, they always lose. The school system does not back them up, especially if the parents happen to be influential.

Phoenix: When I hear people complain that teachers work only six hours a day and get three months a year off for summer vacation, I see red. There are a great many tasks that require extra time--grading papers, phoning parents, locating and organizing material, attending seminars and recently a new one--cleaning the classroom. Many of our critics have not set foot in a school since they were students. I challenge these parents to come and see what is going on.

Philadelphia: I am tired of being accused of turning out illiterates who cannot function. How come 50 percent of my class fails an exam when the answers are given the day before? Why do I wait at lunch time and before and after school for students I have volunteered to help who do not show up? Today's children are running their parents, so why should anyone be surprised that they are also running our schools?

Chicago: When my mother taught school, students were reprimanded for chewing gum in class, whispering and running in the halls. Today, they carry weapons. A few months ago, a 5-year-old brought a gun to his kindergarten class. He could have fired the darned thing and killed someone. Who is at fault here?--R.D.

DEAR R.D.: The parents.

Drive safely even during rainy weather

Besides lush flowers, spring rains often bring hazardous driving conditions.

"Slow your speed" is the National Safety Council's primary rainy weather message for drivers. Drivers need to refresh their wet weather driving skills to help prevent roadway mishaps and accidents.

Safety recommendations for wet weather driving include:

-Increase distance between vehicles. Allow two car lengths for every 10 miles per hour of speed.

-Avoid sudden moves with the steering wheel, brakes or accelerator to reduce the chances of a skid.

-Watch out for hydroplaning. Hydroplaning means your vehicle's tires are riding on a thin layer of water and have no contact with the road surface. If this happens, take your foot off the accelerator. As you slow, your tires will cut through the water, grip the road and give you control again.

-Move slowly through deep water. Lightly pump your brakes to test them. If they are wet, shift into low gear and drive slowly holding the brakes on lightly until they dry.

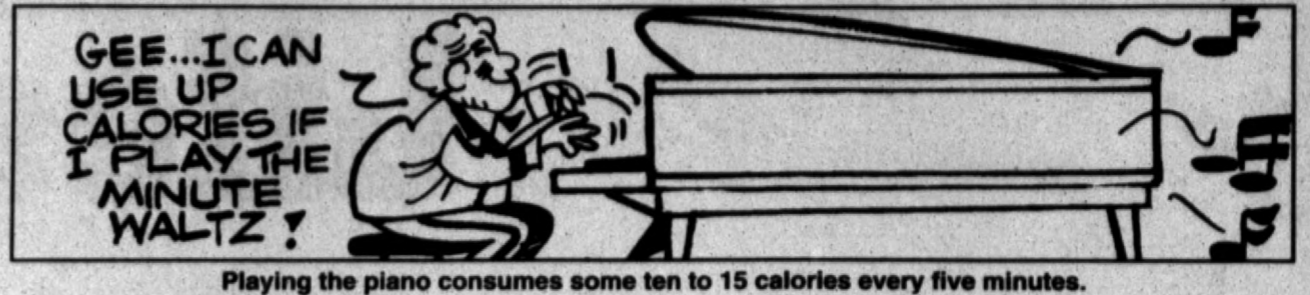
-Keep headlights, taillights clean. Mud sprayed from the road can cut their lighting power considerably.

-Join an automobile club. Auto clubs provide towing and road service benefits to assist drivers who are stranded by high water or involved in breakdowns or accidents.

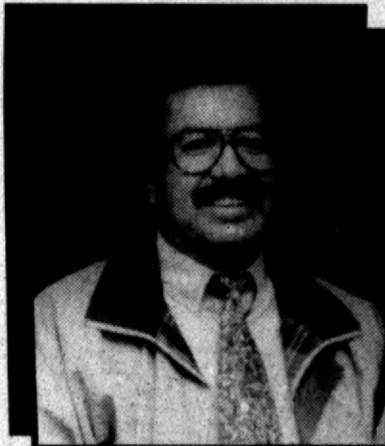
The attorney general was one of seven winners Wednesday of the 1993 Jefferson Muzzle awards for curbing free speech.

PLEASE DO NOT PLACE GRASS CLIPPINGS, LIMBS AND BRUSH IN THE DUMPSTERS!!

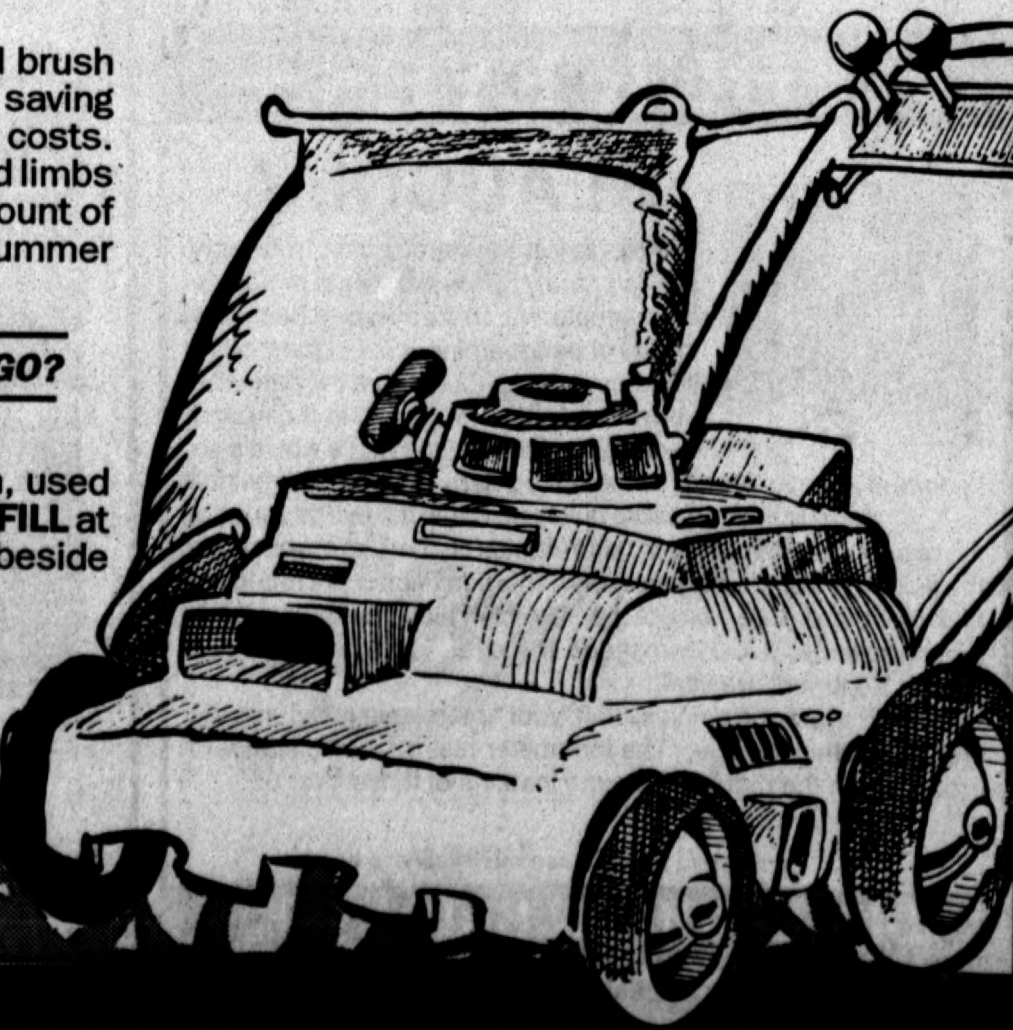

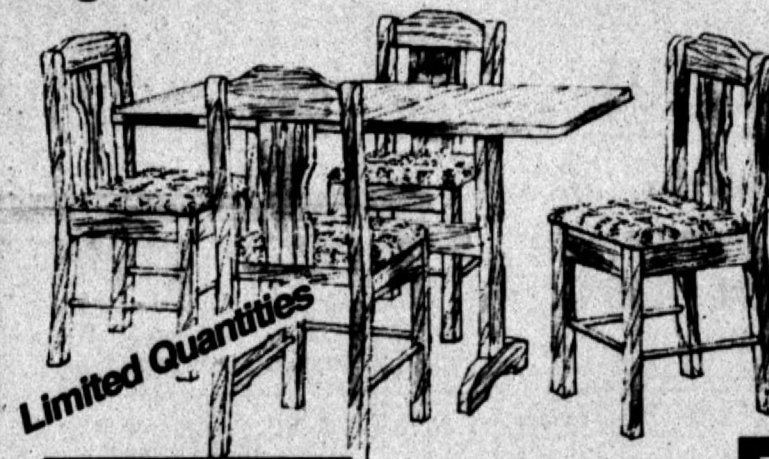

Chris's plans after graduation are to attend either the University of Texas at Austin or Texas A&M University where he will pursue a degree in computer or electrical engineering.

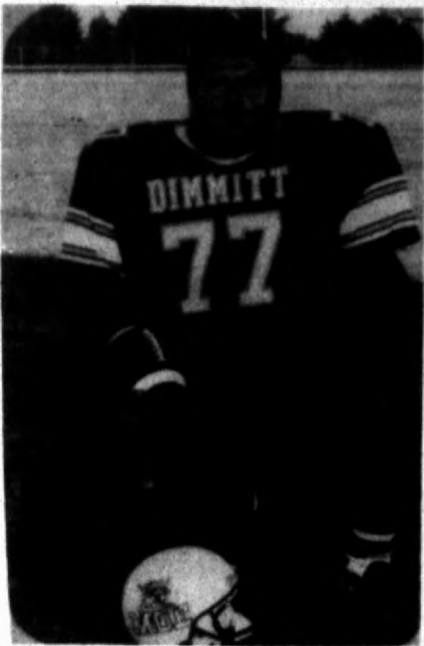

How to halt gypsy moths

These pests, which were introduced into this country approximately 125 years ago, have caused severe destruction on deciduous trees throughout the Northeast, Mid-West, and Mid-Central United States.

Hairy, tannish egg masses that are laid on tree trunks, branches, fence posts, picnic tables and a host of other structures hatch into tiny larvae during April or May. The larvae soon crawl into trees to feed on leaves, often causing the tree to suffer severe defoliation, loss of vigor and slowed growth. While young larvae chew small holes in leaves, older larvae completely defoliate trees.

It is helpful to remove and destroy any visible egg masses on the accessible lower parts of trees.

OATRIM--A NEW FAT SUBSTITUTE

One new food is being tested in research on 24 volunteers at Beltsville (Maryland) Human Nutrition Research Center. The food is lowering punch in the form of beta glucan (the principal fiber in oats and barley).

However, "Oatrim" did little to reduce triglycerides (form fat stores in body) levels.

Volunteers had a significant decrease in LDL (Low Density Lipoprotein) Cholesterol (known as the bad cholesterol) without decreasing the good HDL (High Density Lipoprotein) cholesterol. Their ability to process sugar at a meal (glucose tolerance) improved significantly also. In fact, the blood glucose levels were lower -- 7 to 12 percent after eating "Oatrim."

See more Jane in ABC film 'Passion for Justice'

Some people are suckers for romance. Stick a story full of tragedy on a pair of lovers, anchor it with a heavy and important issue, and zing go the strings of the heart.

ABC treats romance lovers to such a tale with "A Passion for Justice: The Hazel Brannon Smith Story," Sunday, April 17. Jane Seymour ("Dr. Quinn, Medicine Woman") stars in the film, based on Pulitzer Prize-winning journalist Hazel Brannon. The film depicts Hazel's difficult fight against Southern racism and ignorance in the mid-1950s, with the support and understanding of a loving husband.

"It's very moving in the end," Seymour says. "Did you get a weeper?"

The answer is yes. But then again, raw onions also generate tears.

Hazel is a writer and publisher of a small Mississippi newspaper and a member of the town's elite society. Her marriage to Yankee Walter Smith (D.W. Moffett) breaks some hearts while signaling the start of her serious journalism career.

But things get tough when Hazel breaks convention and starts doing business with black people. And when the town sheriff kills an innocent black man, she responds with editorials demanding justice. The town turns against her, at times violently, but she continues her fight.

The film offers a unique point of view from within the South, which offers insight, not justification, into the origins of racism. This appealed to Seymour.

"We were really doing a film that shows from a white Southern person's perspective, how having been brought up in the South with the way the South was, how suddenly when integration — when this change — came about, how it took those people a while to realize what it was that they were dealing with," she says.

Seymour views Hazel as a person

who did realize the injustice of racism.

"I think what's nice about Hazel Brannon is, right from the beginning, she's definitely a Southern belle," Seymour says. "She's more interested in new hats and a visit to Paris than she is in anything else. And I think when she saw how really badly treated the black people were by this particular sheriff ... she suddenly started seeing the other point of view."

Seymour adds that "through (Hazel's) eyes we realize how it is that Southern people, or that anyone could be in a group where a certain philosophy is believed and where the change is slow to come about and they don't get it."

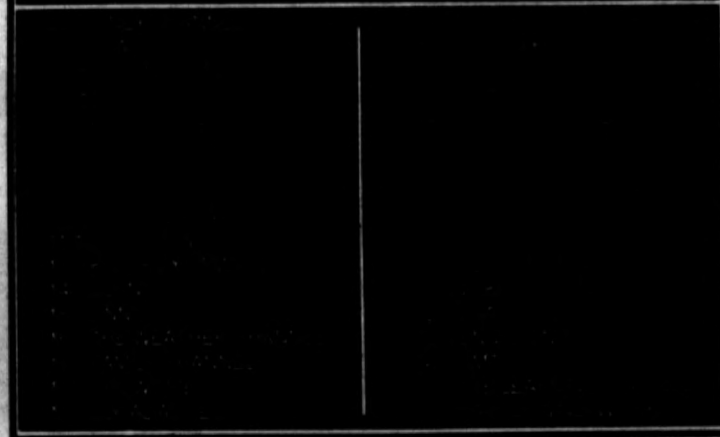
In Seymour's opinion, "The film asks the audience the question 'Are you racist?' or even more importantly ... it asks everyone the uncomfortable question 'How racist are you?'"

Again, there's more to this film than heavy morality.

"I think there's a really touching love story in there too," Seymour says, describing passion and poignancy, including a husband who suffers because of his wife's actions. "But he has enough respect for her that, to a degree, he lets her go ahead and do her thing. That's really unique. You never see that on film, ever!"

"A Passion for Justice" works best when it focuses on its unique perspective of racism and the depiction of a strong romance. When viewed casually it is emotional and enlightening, and the awkward pace, occasional triteness and plastic characters fade from memory. It's kind of like love: Those seeking perfection are usually disappointed.

Though he says "the author (James Herriot) has run out of stories" to tell about the ups and downs of a rural veterinary practice, Hardy admits that one tale remains unfilmed, and that he would like to tackle it.

"There is one story, one true story, left, which there is some hope of one day making into a film, but goodness knows when. It's an enchanting story about taking a pedigree Jersey bull by air from Yorkshire to Turkey. I would love to be part of that," he says.

Hardy is currently appearing in the "Masterpiece Theatre" presentation of George Eliot's "Middlemarch," Sundays on PBS (check local listings).

It's pilot season in Hollywood, and Fox has announced a slate of proposed series that includes a drama from John Sacret Young ("China Beach") about a sleuth (Lori Singer) who uses virtual reality to solve cases.

Then there's "Party of Five," a family drama about a handful of parentless siblings between the ages of 1 and 25. Comedies include "Howe High," featuring a teen-age Al Bundy type; "Face Value," about a group of models in New York City; a revival of "Get Smart"; and a sure-to-be-quirky effort called "Harvey Berger, Salesman," from the creators of "Buffalo

Bill" and "Bakersfield P.D." Then there's "Metropolitan Hospital," an "Airplane"-type spoof from Ivan Reitman ("Dave"), and "T.V. Guys," a comedy from former NBC entertainment chief Brandon Tartikoff about a pair of former child stars from the '70s. The movie and miniseries slate includes "The Bo Jackson Story," "The Munsters" and "And the Beat Goes On: The Sonny and Cher Story."

On the Fox drawing board for summer is a suspense anthology from Joel Schumacher and Aaron Spelling, plus the drama "Models, Inc.," starring Linda Gray. No series about the modeling industry has ever lasted more than a season.

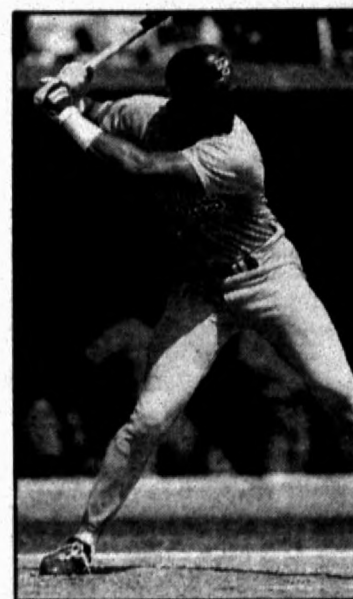

Q: I have never missed a single episode of "Dr. Quinn, Medicine Woman." I am a big fan of Joe Lando. Could you tell me some other things he has appeared in and give me an address where I can write to him? -P.K., Trenton, N.J.

A: Before coming to "Dr. Quinn," Lando was best known as Jake Harrison from ABC's "One Life to Live." He also appeared in the TV series "Nightingales" and in the feature film "Star Trek IV: The Voyage Home."

A: The mysterious Vera, though referred to many times on "Cheers," only appeared in two episodes. In one episode all viewers saw was her feet, but in a Thanksgiving episode, Vera gets clocked in the face with a pie.

The gracious soul who stood in for that scene was none other than George Wendt's real-life spouse, Bernadette

Birkette.
Q: A friend of mine's favorite American movie starred Jeannette MacDonald and Nelson Eddy. She believes the title is "Mayday," but wasn't there a movie starring those two singers called "Springtime"? Big Three at Yalta, Menendez brothers, Southern female publisher - read all about it

World War II buffs should take the phone off the hook Tuesday and Wednesday, April 19 and 20, for "World War II: When Lions Roared," a four-hour drama on NBC.

The screenplay reveals the behind-the-scenes dealmaking and wrangling among Allied leaders Franklin Roosevelt, Winston Churchill and Joseph Stalin, culminating in their 1945 meeting at Yalta. The Big Three are played by John Lithgow, Bob Hoskins and Michael Caine, respectively, with support from Ed Begley Jr. as FDR's right-hand man, Harry Hopkins.

Filmed in the High-Definition television (HDTV) format, the drama makes good use of split-screen technology, giving the impression that the leaders are conversing with one another as the actors bring to life the text of letters and communiques.

Monday, April 18, Fox does history of a different kind in "Honor Thy Father and Mother: The True Story of the Menendez Murders." David Beron

and Billy Warlock star as the siblings accused of murdering their parents. Their cases recently ended in mistrials. But the real question here is, does co-star Jill Clayburgh need work this much?

Craig T. Nelson wrote his own script for "Ride With the Wind," a story of one man's redemption from life on the fast (motorcycle) track, Monday on ABC. Across the dial on NBC, Nicollette Sheridan and Gary Cole play a couple expecting their second child in "Time to Heal." During labor, Jenny Barton (Sheridan) suffers a stroke and is confined to a wheelchair, leaving her husband to care for the family.

Female publishers have been fashionable since "Lou Grant," and ABC offers another on Sunday, April 17, in "A Passion for Justice: The Hazel Brannon Smith Story." Jane Seymour stars as the Southern matron with a backbone of steel.

A Mountie (Paul Gross) and a salty Chicago policeman (David Marciano) solve an international crime in "Due South," Saturday, April 23, on CBS.

Beron gets meaty role for dramatic debut in 'Honor'

In Fox's "Honor Thy Father and Mother: The True Story of the Menendez Murders," which airs Monday, April 18, actor David Beron makes his dramatic film debut as Erik Menendez.

However, younger viewers, particularly those in high school and even more particularly those involved in home-economics classes, may recognize Beron from something else.

"Actually, I played an older brother once in an industrial film called 'Around the World With Pork,'" Beron states. "It was for the National Meat Board. I helped my 'little sister' cook various pork dishes, like pork chili, pork-kabob, whatever.

"So that's when I hit the national scene. And as far as I know it's played in home-ec classes in high schools all over the country."

Now Beron gets to showcase his talents in a much meatier role, as the emotionally fragile younger sibling, in the first film surrounding one of the most compelling and controversial court cases in recent history: the Menendez murders.

Viewers familiar with the case, in which Beverly Hills, Calif., brothers Lyle and Erik Menendez stand accused of murdering their wealthy parents, will note Beron's strong physical resemblance to the real-life Erik. But in fact, Beron originally auditioned for the part of Erik's older, angrier, more-manipulative brother, Lyle.

"If you had to say if I look like one or the other," Beron says, "I'd have to personally say I look more like Lyle."

"In fact, I had to go through five auditions, and for the first four, I had auditioned for Lyle. They switched me, the night before it went to network to be approved, to Erik, which was 'panic in Detroit' for me. I freaked out. They're completely different and it's a completely different angle, so I had to stay up all night working on it."

And now that he has landed a role that doesn't relate to trichinosis, does Beron find it easier getting other roles?

"Actually, I'm getting much further now," he says. "I get to meet producers now. But still, you have to work for the part. You have to be right for the part. Until you're like Tom Cruise, or something like that."
