City agenda announced

Three items for action are on the agenda for the regular meeting of the Hereford City Commission. The meeting will begin at 7:30 p.m. Monday in City Hall. The commission will hear a request for a zoning change from Edwin Bridges, consider bids to sell a landfill compactor and hear a proposed ordinance for calling a special election on adoption of a half-cent sales tax for economic development.

Immunization schedule noted

The Texas Department of Health has announced its June immunization clinic schedule for Hereford. Vaccines against polio, diphtheria, lockjaw (tetanus), whooping cough (pertussis), measles, rubella, mumps and HIB (hemophilus influenzae type B) will be offered. The Texas Department of Health charges to help with the cost of keeping the clinic open. Charges are based on family income and size and the ability to pay. Regular clinics will be held from 7 a.m. to 11:30 a.m. and 1 p.m. to 5:45 p.m. The clinic will be on Thursday, June 9, then June 16 and 23 in the Health Department offices, 205 W. Fourth St., Suite B.

Summer classes will begin Monday at HHS

Summer school at Hereford High School will begin on Monday, according to a Friday announcement. Classes for students who need to master specific objectives in order to pass a class in which they were enrolled during the 1993-94 school year are eligible to attend the tuition-free program. Two classes a day will be held through July 1. They will be from 8:30 a.m. to 10:10 a.m. and 10:20 a.m. to noon. Classes will be offered in math,

English, science and social studies for students in grades seven through 12. In addition, there will be TAAS remediation in English, writing and math to help prepare high school students for the scheduled July offering of the exit-level TAAS test.

Students who did not preregister for class but who need to participate must call on Monday.

North, Miller face off for Virginia bid

RICHMOND, Va. (AP) - Virginia Republicans gathered Saturday to choose between the divisive charisma of Oliver North and a candidate who claims he can unify the fractured party to oust Democratic U.S. Sen. Charles Robb in November.

About 14,600 delegates met to select a nominee in secret balloting at the state GOP convention.

North, a central figure in the Iran-Contra scandal, has tapped restless voters who want something to believe in by pitching himself as a maverick Washington outsider.

His opponent, former Reagan budget chief James C. Miller III, has made a more pragmatic pitch, billing himself as the unifying candidate with a better chance of beating Robb. Two statewide polls in April supported that claim, showing Miller running ahead of Robb, and Robb ahead of North.

But North on Friday tried to downplay talk of a splintered party. "The real victory will be the unity you see come out of this convention," he said.

Not according to the state's highest-ranking Republican, Sen. John Warner.

"What is the sign the Virginia Republican Party sends when the only person it can find is someone with (North's) record?" Warner said this week.

He has said North is unfit to serve in the Senate because of his convictions for lying to Congress during the Iran-Contra affair. Those convictions were later overturned. At the time, North was a Marine lieutenant colonel serving as a White House aide.

Warner is backing Miller. But he says if North wins, he'll support the independent bid of former Attorney General J. Marshall Coleman, a Republican. Former Democratic Gov.

continues: "When an infuriated German began firing at one American soldier who was slow in leaving the ditch, Captain Nobles lowered his hands and advanced on the German soldier, and fully realizing the great personal risk, ordered him to cease firing.

"Without waiting for a reply, he turned his back, walked to the American soldier, and assisted him from the ditch."

For his heroism, Dr. Nobles was presented the second highest award in the U.S. Army, the Silver Star.

Today, he modestly downplays his efforts, saying that a sergeant was responsible for reporting the incident.

In the D-Day invasion, the troops that landed behind enemy lines in some instances were separated by miles from their fellow soldiers. Such was the case of Dr. Nobles and his medical unit.

However, 12 hours after the incident at the ditch, American soldiers and a tank came upon the German patrol and its prisoners.

Just as quickly as they were taken prisoner, Dr. Nobles and his men were free, again.

He and his staff of corpsmen were taken to headquarters where they were questioned about their hours in German custody.

Most crisis situations will

produce some kind of tension-breaker. And, so it was in Dr. Nobles' wartime experiences.

"A Frenchman came up to us in the aid station but he was hard for us to understand and vice versa," laughed Dr. Nobles, relating the incident.

"Finally, I realized his wife was about to have a baby, so I went with him and delivered the baby.

"The trouble now, though, is I don't remember if it was a boy or girl."

The Frenchman appeared sometime later with a small supply of fresh eggs as a token of his gratitude for the American's help.

Dr. Nobles stayed with the 82nd through campaigns in The Netherlands, the Battle of the Bulge, into Germany and, finally, to Berlin.

He remembers the Dutch with much fondness, saying, "They were genuinely glad to see us. They tried to help any way they could."

The medical officer spent a few leave days in Paris, France, and went into Berlin with his outfit.

About Paris, he remarked, "I wasn't impressed."

Dr. Nobles came back to the States soon after the war ended in 1945. His outfit was among military units that marched in New York City's victory parade.

Then in 1946, Dr. Nobles brought his wife, Wilma, to Hereford. They

had married in Dallas in 1942, before he was posted overseas in 1943.

"Hereford didn't have but 2,700 people and we loved it... still do," declared Wilma Nobles about their life. They brought up their two children here. The couple belongs to the Presbyterian Church.

Dr. Nobles, now 77 years old, began his medical career as a general practitioner but later was certified in radiology.

CLINTON

Queen Elizabeth II, French President Francois Mitterrand and leaders of other nations whose forces stormed Normandy beaches on June 6, 1944.

In the largest state dinner ever held by the queen, the leaders will meet at Portsmouth Guildhall, a Victorian structure heavily damaged by German bombs but now restored to its late 19th century splendor.

Clinton will be an overnight guest on the queen's royal yacht, the Britannia. After memorial ceremonies in Portsmouth on Sunday, Clinton will sail overnight to Normandy on the aircraft carrier USS George Washington for Monday's memorial celebrations.

The Allies' air campaign was a key part of the movement to crush

Dr. Nobles doesn't dwell on his experiences in Europe and, especially, on June 6, 1944. He's never returned to the area he first saw in France and indicates he doesn't care to.

Reflecting on the war, in general, and apprehensions about the invasion in 1944, his position is very clear:

"We had a duty to do and we did it."

Hitler's Atlantic Wall of concrete fortifications, landing obstacles and mine fields. Intense bombing severely weakened the German air force and helped the Allies stage their famous deception, making it appear that they would cross the Channel at its narrowest gap, the Strait of Dover, and attack at Calais.

On Friday, Clinton stood before the graves of Americans killed in the battlefields of Italy and saluted the bravery of World War II soldiers.

"We are the sons and daughters of the world they saved," Clinton said. "Now our moment for common cause has come. It is up to us to ensure a world of peace and prosperity for yet another generation."

County 4-H'ers to take on state at annual Roundup

Deaf Smith County 4-H members will compete this week in the Texas 4-H Roundup event, set for Monday through Thursday on the Texas A&M University campus in College Station.

The first events will be the Texas 4-H Foundation Scholarship interviews, in which students from here will interview for placing in the 92 scholarships to be awarded.

Kinann Campbell, Don Metcalf, Wade Johnson, Lee Harder and Sheila Teel -- all 1994 HHS graduates -- are under consideration for the awards, which are for Texas 4-H youth who have excelled in academics, leadership, community service and 4-H activities.

Scholarship amounts range from \$15,000 to \$300. Scholarship announcements will be Tuesday night.

The Deaf Smith County 4-H Livestock, Dairy, Meats and Horse judging teams also will compete.

The competitions, set to begin Wednesday, involve the two top placing teams from 12 districts in Texas.

The Livestock Judging team is made up of Metcalf, Moriah Olson, Trey Skiles and Michael Carlson. They will judge eight classes of livestock -- breeding gilts, market hogs, market lambs, breeding ewes, market steers, heifers and bulls.

Each person in the contest will give a set of reasons on one of the classes. This will be done on four different classes.

The Dairy Team is comprised of Sy Olson, Ted Peabody III and Josh Howley. They will judge eight classes of dairy cattle, four each of Holsteins and Jerseys.

Within each breed they will have to place heifers, 2-year-old cows, five-year-old cows and Aged cows.

On two of the classes they will

have to talk reasons and on two more they will have to write reasons.

The Meats Team is comprised of Caleb Brumley, Johnson, Clint Robison and Karon Harder. This team has to place beef carcasses, wholesale cuts of beef and pork, retail cuts of beef and pork and identify 30 retail cuts which can consist of beef, pork, lamb or variety meats.

They also will have to give reasons on three classes.

The Horse Team is made up of Joann Brumley, James Payne, Miss Campbell and Courtney Crawford.

This team is coached by Ed Crawford and Jimmy Payne.

They will have to place horses at halter and horses in performance classes. They also will have to talk four sets of reasons on four different classes.

Also scheduled for Wednesday is the Texas 4-H Fashion Show.

Amanda Sims and Cindy Harder will compete in this event after placing first in the District Buying Division event.

The buying division category involves comparison buying, construction of garment knowledge, fiber and fabric characteristics, modeling techniques and public speaking and interview skills.

Announcement of Wednesday contest results will be made during that day's main assembly.

The Food in Nutrition event will begin on Wednesday with a banquet sponsored by J.C. Penny Co. Contestants will prepare their food dishes and give nutrition interviews on Thursday at selected sites in College Station.

Food science in nutrition, preparation, teaching opportunities and career choices will be included in the interview process.

Method demonstrations, illustrated

talks and public speaking will be the final contests involving Deaf Smith County 4-H members.

Peabody will participate in the Public Speaking contest with a speech titled "Monstrous Hope."

Miss Campbell and Lee Harder will present a method demonstration "Deadly Designer Disease" in the clothing and textiles area.

Karis Blain and Joanna Brumley will present an illustrated talk in the Cooperative area titled "Coop Connection."

Finally, Jami Parker, Cindy Harder, Erin Auckerman, Sheila Teel and Amanda Sims will present "Who's Watching for the Children" in the Family Life area.

Food show awards and public speaking awards will be presented Thursday night.

Recreational events also are scheduled for the trip, including stops at Six Flags, a Texas Rangers game and shopping at the Galleria in Dallas.

The Roundup concludes a year of project activities for senior level 4-H members.

The Children's Miracle Network Telethon celebrates "10 Years of Making Miracles" with this year's broadcast, which will be aired from 8 p.m. Saturday through 5:30 p.m. Sunday on KAMR-TV channel 4.

This year's show will feature nine area children and babies and their families who represent the hundreds of children and infants treated at Northwest Texas Hospital and benefit from Children's Miracle Network dollars.

Jimmy Owens of Hereford is one of the 1994 Miracle Kids to be featured on the telethon.

Jimmy suffered severe facial lacerations in a traffic accident in Hereford last June. He spent three weeks in the Pediatric Unit of Northwest Texas Hospital.

Through his bravery, faith and the care of the staff of the hospital, Jimmy has had a speedy recovery.

In January 1985, a group of citizens and medical professionals, concerned about medical care

available to children and infants in this region, founded the Children's Health Foundation.

The foundation was organized to enhance and support medical care for children and infants in the region.

Its focus is to purchase equipment and supplies and to support continuing and outreach education to medical staff throughout the region who work with children and infants.

The Children's Miracle Network began in 1983 as an effort to produce a high-quality, national television special to raise money to provide

equipment and supplies for hospitalized children.

Since its inception, the network has become the largest fundraiser of its kind and has raised more than \$650 million—\$117 million in 1993.

In addition to Jimmy Owens, this year's telethon will feature eight other "Miracle Kids."

-- Kaci Bargas, a 9-year-old from Amarillo, has dermatomyositis, a rare muscle disease.

-- Amanda Smith is returning for a follow-up story. She was the first miracle baby featured on the first

CMN telethon aired in Amarillo.

-- McKenzie Myer, 5, who made a miraculous recovery from an automobile accident, will tell her story.

-- Luke, Joy and Blair Gossett, triplets born to Murray and Jeri Gossett six weeks early, will entertain viewers with their smiles and varying personalities.

-- Sarah and Emily Renshaw, 28 week neonates, will bring their parents to tell their story.

"This year, locally, we want the audience to know these miracle

children when the show comes to a close," said Jelaine Workman, CMN Telethon Coordinator. "We will also feature the miracle makers of our hospital, the nurses and doctors who work with these kids daily, who share in the good and the bad with each family who comes into our hospital.

A "Celebration of Life" party will be held in conjunction with the telethon and sponsored by the hospital's NICU and Pedi-ICU units.

This is an opportunity for babies and children treated in these units to come back and see the people who cared for

them.

Hosts for this year's telethon include: Jenny Smith, weekend anchor for KAMR Channel 4; John Moesch, program director for K108 and participating in his fifth telethon; Terry Hill, CHF board member; and Dean Kelley, Amarillo businessman and nine-year veteran of the CMN telethon.

Teen genius wants to find cure for boxer Ali

SAN ANTONIO (AP) - A 13-year-old California genius whose idol is Muhammad Ali, says his dream is to find a cure for the illness that befell the former boxing champion.

Masoud Karkehabadi, who has never attended elementary, middle or high school, earned his second college degree this year, a bachelor of science degree, from the University of California at Irvine.

He was in San Antonio to participate in Saturday's Children's Miracle Network Telethon, a benefit for the city's Santa Rosa and

Methodist children's hospitals. The event continues Sunday.

Fiesta Texas officials put on a special combination birthday and graduation party Friday for Karkehabadi at Zaragoza Courtyard in the park's Los Festivales section.

Karkehabadi, whose IQ is more than 200, said he learned to read when he was 18 months old and decided when he was 4 that he would someday be a brain surgeon.

"I became interested in neurological disorders such as Parkinson's disease and decided I wanted to find a cure for it," Karkehabadi told the

San Antonio Express-News.

"My hero is Muhammad Ali, who suffers from Parkinson's disease. Next week, I'm going to Washington, D.C., to meet him," the youth added.

Parkinson's disease is a progressive degeneration of nerve cells in the brain that control muscle movement.

Using a \$5,000 grant, he's already performing experiments on rats in an effort to determine how to replace brain cells lost through Parkinson's Disease.

"I give them a chemical called 6-hydroxydopamine and other growth factors to get the cells growing.


"If we can replace the cells that are lost through Parkinson's, we can reverse its effects," Karkehabadi said.

He said he's confident of finding a cure within five to 10 years, depending on continued funding of his research.

Karkehabadi said he plans to start medical school at Cal-Irvine in September 1995 and earn his medical degree by age 18.

Despite his intellectual achievements, he's found plenty of time just to be a boy.

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Focus on Your City

This Monday, June 6, the City Commission will consider the approval of an ordinance ordering a special election to be held on Aug. 13, with the question being asked of city residents, "Are you in favor of the adoption of an additional sales and use tax of 1/2 per cent within the city to provide funds for industrial and economic development?"

On Monday evening, the Commission will simply act upon a motion to place this economic development proposal on the ballot.

The request for this special election has come to the City Commission from an economic development group originally established by me and ultimately adopting the name, "People Promoting Progress."

I was particularly thank those who have served so diligently with many, many meetings and hours spent studying the economic situation in the Panhandle area as well as statewide. I especially would like to thank the original chairman, Jeff Carlile, and

his co-chairman, Shirley Garrison. These two gentlemen have certainly gone above and beyond in their service to the citizens of Hereford.

In the next two months, the People Promoting Progress committee will make available to all interested citizens a more detailed description of why the committee feels the tax is necessary if Hereford is to compete on a regional as well as statewide basis for new businesses and to retain present businesses.

I believe it is quite important that all citizens of Hereford acquaint themselves with the facts and then make their own decision as to how they vote.

It definitely is the feeling of the commission that the opportunity needs to be provided to Hereford citizens to set their own destiny with regard to economic development and decide if the tax or some other means should be utilized.

To explain some of the reasons People Promoting Progress committee members believe the tax to be the best approach, let's look at the facts.

First, without an economic development tax, Hereford would not be playing on a level playing field. There are approximately 150 cities statewide with have adopted such a tax. In elections in May, 19 cities adopted the tax, including Booker in the Panhandle.

Cities in the area that already have the tax in place are Amarillo, Big Spring, Borger, Brownfield, Childress, Crowell, Lamesa, Levelland, Littlefield, Muleshoe, Memphis, Munday, Pampa, Perryton, Quanah, Shamrock, Snyder,

Sweetwater, Vernon and Wellington.

What this all means, simply, is that without the tax, the playing field is anything but level.

Secondly, with a declining tax base over the past few years, and with no increase in property taxes for the City of Hereford since 1986, we are rapidly coming to the point where the tax base must increase again; or, if we continue to provide the same services for our residents, property taxes will have to be increased.

Hopefully, by passing a sales tax for economic development, we can cause our tax base to increase again by bringing in new business. I think it was the feeling of the committee that a sales tax for economic development, spread across all the people of Hereford is a much better approach than property tax increases, which affect only property owners.

Thirdly, the committee believed that many conditions had changed since Hereford was so successful 20 to 25 years ago in attracting new business. Approaches used then probably would not be successful in today's business climate. We are operating in a different economic time than in the past.

It is estimated by the State Comptroller that the 1/2 percent sales would increase the tax burden of a family with a \$35,000 annual income only \$51 per year.

Interestingly, lottery sales in Deaf Smith County in 1993 totaled \$2,234,488, or approximately \$41,115 per week. Using these figures, every adult over 18 has spent roughly \$127 per year on lottery tickets.

With the vast majority of this money leaving the county and city, the committee feels most citizens would rather invest their money in something that stays in the city and, hopefully, improves our quality of life here.

In future "Focus on your City"

columns, I will attempt to explain how your City Commission would establish the proper economic development commission or corporation, how it would be staffed, and who would serve on the board. I know that it is important to you, as a citizen, to know how the \$300,000 to \$350,000 raised annually for economic development would be handled and by whom.

Again, during the next two months, please take it upon yourselves as citizens of Hereford to get the facts about economic development by attending one or more of the informational meetings presented by People Promoting Progress. And, vote your convictions on Aug. 13.

That feller on Tierra Blanca Creek says there's one reliable rule for estimating the cost of living—take your income and add 10 percent to it.

Ever notice how quickly kids learn to drive a car, yet cannot understand how to operate other machinery—like the lawn mower or the vacuum cleaner?

Monday marks the 50th anniversary of the invasion of Europe, but the observance of D-Day is more than a celebration of a special day in world history—it should be remembered as a tribute to an entire generation of Americans.

D-Day was the largest mobilization of men and equipment that the world has ever seen. The generation that fought World War II was unique in American history. Most of them grew up during the Great Depression and, perhaps, some of the traits learned in those years prepared them for the battle.

After the bombing of Pearl Harbor, they flocked to the enlistment centers to defend their country. Never has a nation mobilized so quickly for a war. From those in the armed forces to those who kept the factories and economy going, it was an all-out effort to achieve victory.

Hopefully, the world may never see such an effort again.

And, that generation of Americans proved to be "doers" when the war was over. Millions of men and women took off their military uniforms and set about improving this country.

We have been the beneficiaries of

that generation, but many of these community leaders have passed the torch. Only time will tell if this generation is up to the challenges now facing this great nation.

The Hereford City Commission will be asked Monday night to call for an election on whether to adopt a one-half cent sales tax for economic development. An economic development committee, appointed by the mayor, has studied ways to "prime the pump" of Hereford's economic growth. They believe the dedicated sales tax is the best solution.

Will Rogers once said, "People want just taxes more than they want lower taxes. They want to know that every man is paying his proportionate share according to his wealth."

Fairness is the essence of the half-cent sales tax increase. In the past, the chamber of commerce was the only organization working on industrial development and the only funding came from business contributions.

There is a limit to funds from this source, because business in Hereford has been slower than normal for several years. Most businesses are hard pressed to keep operating at a profit at a time when funding is needed to compete with other cities.

We hope citizens will start considering the benefits of this proposal and rally behind the effort. Please read Mayor Bob Josseland's column in today's paper. We think it will help our readers better understand the proposal.

Lubbock Avalanche-Journal on Texas optimism:

Everything - well, almost everything - is coming up roses for Texas as the spring of 1994 moves toward its exit. West Texas farmers are particularly happy about the rains that came just in the nick of time. When farmers are expecting a prosperous year, people in other areas of business and industry feel happier and more optimistic about their prospects, as well.

The good news about the Texas economy doesn't stop at the caprock, however, but extends all across the state. Several factors indicate that this year may be the best Texans have experienced in a long, long time.

The Index of Leading Texas Economic Indicators, issued periodically by State Comptroller John Sharp, showed that for March, consumer optimism, a strong housing market and plentiful jobs benefited the Texas economy significantly.

Two rather dark clouds loom over the state, however. One is the perpetual struggle to find a way to fund public education that is constitutional, yet at the same time does not break the back of property owners with an excruciating tax load. The second cloud is the lack of progress in combating violence on the streets of cities all across Texas. Both problems will be addressed - again - when the Legislature convenes next year.

In the meantime, the improved economy leaves most Texans feeling optimistic, which is nice for a change.

San Antonio Express-News on D-Day:

The observances of the 50th anniversary of D-Day make this Memorial Day even more poignant.

In this time of declining military budgets and forces, Americans should be acutely aware of the sacrifices that made the promise of peace and freedom possible.

With an extended period of relative peace, the danger is that too many will forget - or possibly never learn - of the heroes who died at places like Little Brandywine, Shiloh, Belleau Wood, Normandy, Pork Chop Hill and Khe Sanh.

Those men and women died to keep America free. They helped save this democracy and in some cases launched others in the places they died.

As you read stories of the 50th anniversary of D-Day and see the documentaries on that watershed battle, recall also all those who have given their lives for the nation. All of us should hope and pray that such sacrifices will not be necessary in the future.

The Dallas Morning News on immigration costs:

In promising to bring suit against the federal government for reimbursement of costs pertaining to illegal immigration, Texas Attorney General Dan Morales has acted in the best interests of the state. Yet even though both he and Gov. Ann Richards deserve congratulations, it is legitimate to ask what took them so long.

Mr. Morales now says that the federal government's failure to enforce laws against illegal immigration is "placing an enormous strain upon state government, municipalities, counties and our citizens." He maintains that the tab may actually be more than \$1 billion.

Many legal experts and veteran immigration observers doubt that the immigration-related lawsuits of Texas, California, Arizona and Florida will prevail. Perhaps, but the costs to Texas are far too burdensome to continue to absorb this impact lying down. The federal government is in fact winking at its own immigration laws and harming the interests of U.S. citizens and legal immigrants in so doing. That is deeply wrong.

It cannot be repeated too often that illegal immigration is illegal. As Ms. Richards correctly pointed out, America "is a place that indeed opens its arms, but it does so under the law." When all is said and done, Congress and the executive branch simply must regain their bearings. The point is not to appear to be doing something about illegal immigration; the point is to do something about it.

Sgt. Wayne Beighle, a public affairs officer with the Department of Public Safety in Amarillo, was the special guest of the Hereford Lions Club this past week.

Beighle shared some interesting information about traffic deaths, which I thought should be passed on.

Using the David Letterman "Top 10 List" format, Beighle presented the "Top 10 Reasons for Killer Accidents in Texas."

10. Following too close. Beighle said the two-second rule should be used, in which a driver counts the seconds it takes his car and the car ahead to pass the same stationary object.

9. Passing with insufficient clearance. He said it takes half a mile to pass safely.

8. Improper parking (on the roadway, not on the shoulder).

7. Going the wrong way on a one-

way street.
6. Running red lights and stop signs.

5. Driving on the wrong side of the road, not passing or on a one-way road. Beighle said two people died this way in Texas during the Memorial Day weekend.

4. Failure to yield right of way. This also claimed two lives during the Memorial Day weekend.

3. Unsafe speed, or driving too fast or slow for conditions (not speeding).

2. Driving over the speed limit. Beighle said the faster you drive, the less you see. Speed claimed 10 people during the Memorial Day weekend in Texas.

1. DWI. Someone is killed in a drunk driving accident every 21 minutes in the United States, Beighle said. Seven people died in DWI accidents in Texas over Memorial Day.

Beighle said use or failure to use seat belts does not specifically fall under the Top 10 list, but it is a factor in traffic deaths.

He said 12 people in Texas died over the Memorial Day weekend from failure to use seat belts.

Please, when you get out on the road, think about these 10 things and try to address them when you drive. Then maybe you won't be the next Texas highway traffic fatality.

Now if you just thought "1984" was a work of fiction that became outdated a decade ago, think again.

Seems the Clinton administration is pushing a plan in which electronic chips would be installed in all communications devices.

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War's top two aces lived very different lives

EDITOR'S NOTE - They were the two top aces of World War II, hell-for-leather fighter pilots that between them shot down more than 50 Japanese planes. But their prowess in the skies was about the only similarity between Gregory "Pappy" Boyington and Joe Foss, who recently received still another honor.

PENSACOLA, Fla. (AP) - One was a hard-drinking brawler who inspired a television series about his Black Sheep Squadron. The other was a straight-arrow who became a general, governor and football commissioner.

Depending on who is doing the counting, one or the other is the top flying ace in Marine Corps history.

Black Sheep leader Gregory "Pappy" Boyington, who died of cancer at 75 in 1988, and Joe Foss, 79, recently were enshrined together in the Naval Aviation Hall of Honor for their World War II heroics.

The pair of aces, both Medal of Honor winners, were friends and never considered themselves in competition to shoot down the most enemy planes, Foss recalled.

"Combat - you don't look at that as a game," Foss said. "Combat's dangerous. You are liable to end up losing your breathing process. All we were interested in was knocking down every plane that we could so the suckers wouldn't be back the next day."

Boyington's record remains as controversial in death as he was in life. The American Fighter Aces Association of Mesa, Ariz., credits him with 24.5 aerial victories, the Naval Aviation Guide gives him 25.5 and his Marine Corps biography puts the number at 28.

That's two more than Foss, but Foss still can be considered the top Marine ace because all 26 of his kills came as a Marine. Boyington's 28 total included six kills as a Flying Tiger in China. The Aces Association and Naval Aviation Guide credit him with fewer Flying Tiger victories.

Flying Tigers is the nickname of the American Volunteer Group, mostly former U.S. military pilots, who flew for the Chinese air force before America's entry into World War II. The AVG later was incorporated into the U.S. Army and many pilots such as Boyington returned to their former services or duties.

The Hall of Honor is part of the National Museum of Naval Aviation at the Pensacola Naval Air Station. That's where Foss, who returned for the enshrinement, and Boyington met in 1940.

"Back 50 some years ago when I was roaming around here I never had any idea I'd be receiving any honors," Foss said. "I was just figuring maybe I'd be lucky to get through the training."

Foss, now residing in Phoenix, left the Marines as a major, but advanced to brigadier general in the South Dakota Air National Guard.

He was twice elected governor of South Dakota in the 1950s. Foss later served as commissioner of the American Football League, president of the National Rifle Association and host of television outdoors programs.

Boyington's fame revived when his 1958 autobiography, "Baa Baa Black Sheep," became a television series of the same name, later retitled "Black Sheep Squadron," in the 1970s.

Actor Robert Conrad played Boyington as a likable rogue, but that was a sanitized version of the real thing, the ace's son said after the enshrinement ceremony.

"He was a lot tougher. He was smart and clever and pugilistic," said retired Air Force Lt. Col. Gregory Boyington Jr. "He enjoyed the rowdiness of the men. He loved it. He wasn't a bad guy, but he was a tough guy."

"He was a great fighter pilot, great shot and could handle an airplane as well or better than anyone else," Foss recalled. "His only problem was with alcohol. When he drank ... he'd want to whip somebody twice his size."

Boyington acknowledged his drinking problem and told of

overcoming it in the final chapter of his book.

Television also portrayed the Black Sheep as military misfits.

"That's a crock," said Foss, who reviewed the show for TV Guide. "What they were was a pool of people waiting to make replacements ... That wasn't any group of bandits or guys waiting for court-martial."

But Foss said it was an interesting story and he watched every show.

Foss got all his victories on the first of two tours in the South Pacific from September 1942 through April 1943. Shortly before he went home to give war bond speeches and train new pilots, Boyington arrived.

"Joe's final score was 26 before the Marines finally yanked him out of combat, full of malaria and worn down to a nub, and the first American to tie Eddie Rickenbacker's World War I record," Boyington wrote in his book.

His most remarkable feat came on his final day at Guadalcanal. Foss led

a group of eight Marine F4F Wildcats and four Army P-38 Lightnings that intercepted a Japanese force of more than 100 fighters and bombers.

Foss played hide-and-seek in the clouds to keep the Japanese guessing how many planes he had. He stalled long enough for the rest of the American planes, parked like sitting ducks, to get airborne. The Japanese fell for the bluff, aborted their attack and dropped their bombs in the ocean.

Foss had not fired a shot.

Boyington, an Idaho native who grew up in Tacoma, Wash., had to talk his way into a command after recovering from a broken ankle suffered in a brawl. He suggested the replacement pilots be used to create a new squadron.

His Black Sheep called him "Pappy." He considered it a form of respect, figuring it was because at 30 he was older than the other pilots, none over 22. Boyington wrote that he later found he actually got the name because

he had reminded his pilots of a flight school legend about a white-bearded instructor who never failed anyone.

Boyington himself was shot down and spent the last 20 months of the war as a prisoner. After retiring as a colonel to Burbank, Calif., his civilian occupations included that of wrestling referee and beer salesman.

The religious Foss recalled visiting Boyington shortly before his death.

"I witnessed to him ... because I figured one of these days he was about to be a-leaving," Foss said. "He just listened. He never said anything. But I have a hunch that he ... will be sitting up there in heaven when we come by."

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Risk of breast cancer down for ex-smokers

ATLANTA (AP) - It may not be too late: Women who smoke can eliminate their increased risk of dying from breast cancer by quitting, a study has found.

Smokers were 25 percent more likely than nonsmokers and ex-smokers to die of breast cancer, according to a recent American Cancer Society survey of 604,412 women who were initially free of cancer.

But quitting would return a former smoker's risk to that of a lifelong nonsmoker, researchers say.

"It could be that quitting encourages healthy behaviors," such as having mammographies which can detect breast tumors at an early stage, Dr. Michael Thun of the American Cancer Society said Friday. "The ideal thing for a woman to do is not smoke and get mammograms."

After six years, 880 of the women surveyed had died of the disease, which strikes one in eight U.S. women.

The risk grew with the number of cigarettes a woman smoked, culminating in a 75 percent greater risk among women who smoked two packs a day or more.

An estimated 46,000 women will die this year of breast cancer, the second-most common cancer killer among women. The biggest killer, lung cancer, has long been attributed almost entirely to smoking.

Eugenia Calle, an epidemiologist who directed the American Cancer Society research, said the study does not suggest that smoking causes breast cancer.

"For example, smokers may have impaired immune systems, they may not obtain routine (mammograms), or smoking may cause a direct deleterious effect on survival," Calle said.

The study's conclusion was unexpected because previous research had suggested that smoking might actually offer some protection from breast cancer by decreasing a woman's estrogen. Thun said that breast cancer was one of the few major cancers not linked to smoking.

Starks sparks Knicks with 26

INDIANAPOLIS (AP) - John Starks got back on track just in time to get the Knicks back to New York. Starks scored 26 points, including 5-for-6 shooting from 3-point range, and played strong defensive against Indiana's Reggie Miller as the Knicks defeated the Pacers 98-91 Friday to even the Eastern Conference finals after six games.

The deciding game in the series will be Sunday night at New York. The winner will face Houston in the opening game of the NBA Finals on Wednesday.

Starks made 8 of 11 shots from the field and 5 of 6 free throws in posting his high for the playoffs this year, topping the 21 he scored in Game 3 against Chicago in the conference semifinals.

"I made a conscientious effort to come out offensive-minded," said Starks, who had 11 points in the first quarter.

The Knicks led 15-4 before Indiana responded to trail 33-31 at the end of the first period.

Miller said that quick start took its toll on the Pacers. They paid for it while failing to make a field goal in the game's final five minutes.

"You can't play catch-up against the New York Knicks," said Miller, who finished with 27 points while making only eight of 21 shots. "It takes too much out of you." Miller had scored a career playoff

record 39 points in Game 5 as the Pacers rallied to win in New York on Wednesday.

"I needed to step up and keep up with his (Miller) pace," said Starks, who had averaged 10.8 in the first five games of the series while Miller was averaging 24.2.

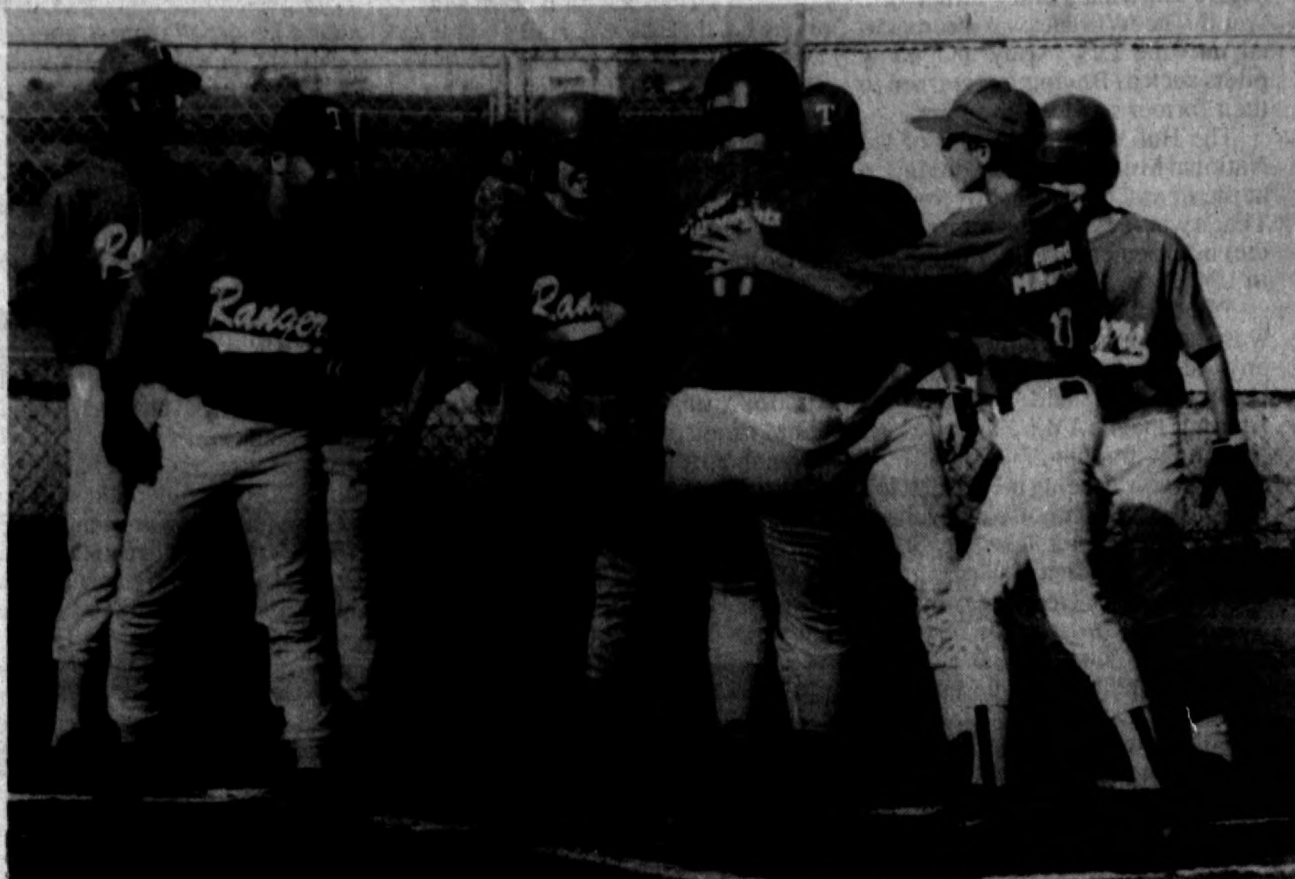
Starks got plenty of help from his teammates in clamping down Miller. "He wasn't shooting the gap. He's great at reading defenses. But (Charles) Oak, Charles Smith and Patrick Ewing helped me out, getting out on him until I could catch him," Starks said.

The Knicks led by 11 points at the start of the fourth quarter, but the Pacers came back to tie it 91-91. Then New York got even more aggressive.

"This was all about pride," said Ewing, who had 17 points and 10 rebounds. "All of our fans and media back in New York had given up hope on us. But, we didn't. We knew we were going to be playing on Sunday. Now, we just have to go and take it to them on Sunday, and move on to the next series."

Ewing also was a defensive force against Rik Smits, who was 7-for-19 from the field and had four of Indiana's 20 turnovers while scoring 18 points.

Indiana never held the lead and scored its last basket with 5:06 to play. In the remaining time, Indiana had five turnovers in addition to missing three free throws.

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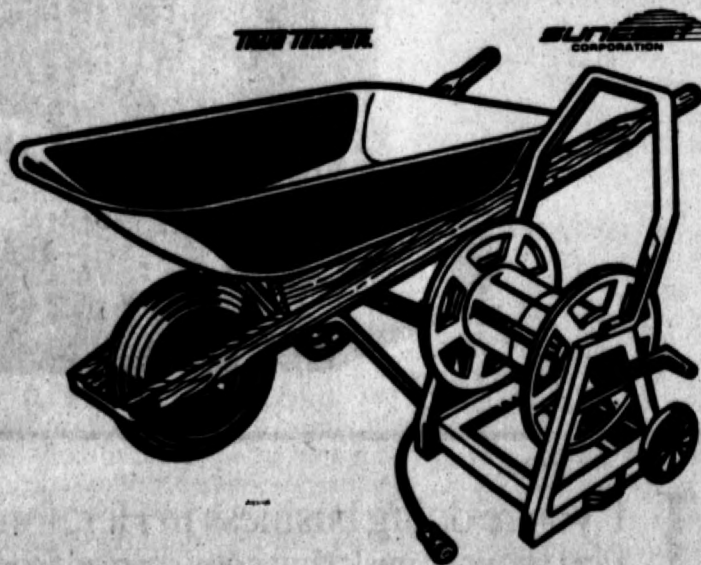
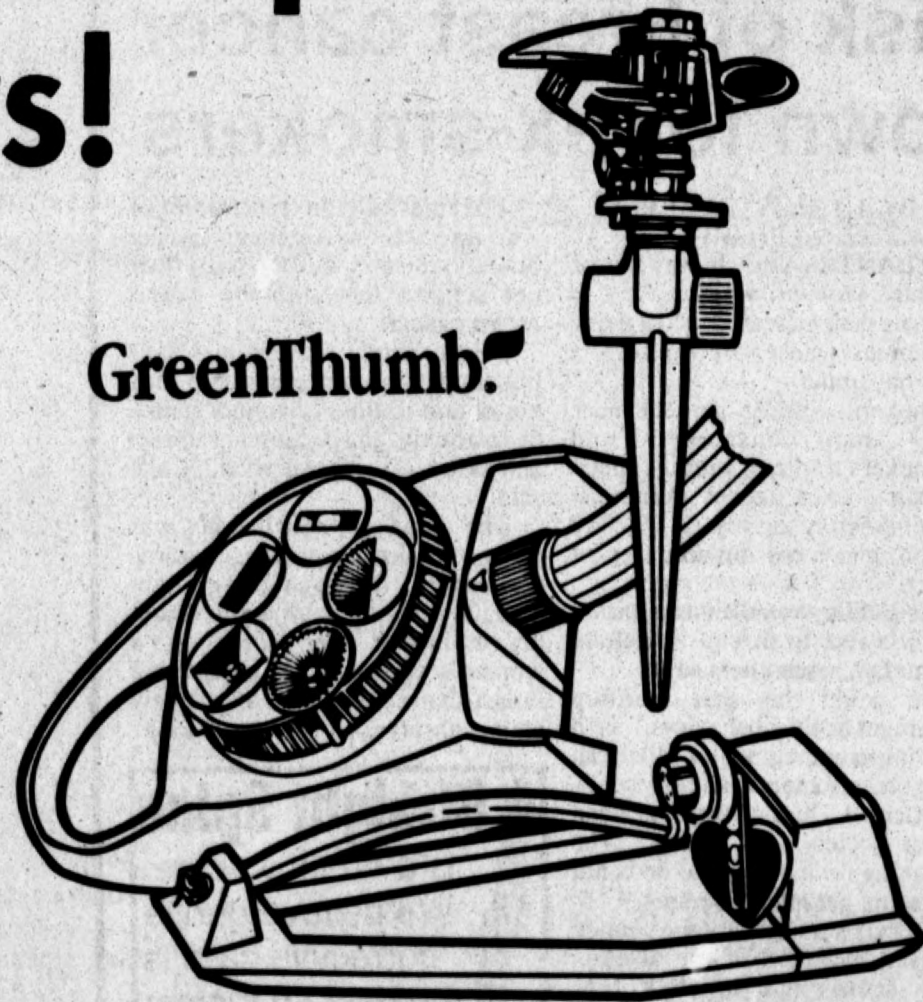
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Lilly still gets star treatment

"Hey, Bob Lilly! How 'bout them Cowboys!"

The stranger peels out, leaving a tall, red-haired man standing 50 yards away in a fishing boat, chuckling self-consciously.

Halfway across the state, in a sleepy cafe on the shores of Lake Fork, near Tyler, bleary-eyed fishermen and their guides suddenly look up from their morning coffee.

"That's Bob Lilly."

Nudge, nudge.

"That's Bob Lilly."

Word gets around and before the big fellow can eat and pay, he has been approached by the waitresses, the kitchen help and half the men in the room. Handshakes and autographs all around. Each visitor leaves his table beaming, satisfied that it will be a nice day, whether the bass bite or not.

So it goes for Robert Louis Lilly.

A month away from his 55th birthday, Lilly has his health, a growing family, a busy schedule and an untold legion of fans who remember him as one of the four Dallas Cowboys in the NFL Hall of Fame. Life is good.

But 55? Surely not.

Freckled, rawboned, full shock of red hair, broad-shouldered, Lilly, 6-foot-5 and still 265ish, looks as though he could report to training camp and be ready for the season opener.

Instead, he will stay home with his wife, Ann, and youngest son, Mark Edward, 18, in Graham, in the rolling ranch country of North Texas. Lilly will visit three other grown children Robert Jr., Michelle Miller and Chris Carruth.

From this home base, not far from Throckmorton, where he grew up, and Fort Worth, where he was an All-America defensive tackle at TCU, Lilly stays busy throughout the year.

He makes public appearances for the Fellowship of Christian Athletes, promotes a line of wildlife feeders and air rifles, and is the host for a new hunting and fishing TV series called "Americana Outdoors."

Hard to imagine that, come September, it will be 20 football

seasons since Lilly last wore the silver star. Seems like only yesterday that, after the Cowboys lost Super Bowl V to Baltimore in the last seconds, Lilly tore off his helmet in frustration and threw it across the field. But, today, Bob and Ann Lilly have six grandchildren.

"I've been lucky," Lilly told the San Antonio Express-News. "I've got a great family. I feel good and I go places to meet lots of neat people."

These recent travels have led to warm memories fishing the brine of storied Baffin Bay, hunting for mule deer with former Raiders quarterback Daryle Lamonica in the badlands of West Texas and landing an eight-pound bass at Lake Fork.

In between, he has taken time to chase that ever-elusive Perfect Photo. Wildflowers and windmills remain his passion.

"Closer together," Lilly said, squinting into the viewfinder of a bulky German camera.

He and Mark had just caught giant redfish in the 15-pound class, trolling spoons in 12-17 feet of water, and they were posing for pictures with Calaveras guide Jeff Snyder. A video crew prepared for Lilly to do a stand-up. Strangers came up, took snapshots with automatics and walked away jabbering to each other.

"It's like that on every shoot," said Lisa Pollard, general manager of "Americana Outdoors" and Careco Productions. "It's amazing when you consider he was not a quarterback or a star running back. Bob didn't play a glamour position."

But longtime Cowboys fans still remember when Lilly would break through the blocking and wrestle a ballcarrier to the ground. Without ceremony, he would stand next to the ball, hands on hips, legs crossed in peculiar fashion.

"In football, Bob always conducted himself with a certain class," Pollard said. "People respond to that. The public sees what kind of person he is, and they relate to him."

Eleven Pro Bowls and seven All-Pro selections during his 14-year career (1961-74) led to Canton, Ohio, where he was inducted into the NFL Hall of Fame in 1980. But it never changed Lilly's hat size.

Another stranger approaches him at the Calaveras boat ramp and starts talking about running back Don Perkins

and what the man calls the "Cowboys' golden era."

Lilly has heard it a thousand times before, but acting interested, he listens until the fan stops to catch a nervous breath. He escapes by giving an autograph.

"Good to see you," Lilly says after a handshake that swallows the visitor's mitt.

There are only four living legends in Texas, says one sponsor of Lilly's TV show, reciting the names of Roger Staubach, Nolan Ryan, Tom Landry and the first college player the Cowboys ever drafted.

"He's great to have in the boat," Snyder said. "He's laid-back and he seems to enjoy being around people. After spending the day with him, I can see why he's still so popular."

Lilly deflected the praise and steered the dockside conversation to fishing. Talk turned to fish caught that day and those to be caught soon.

"Great day on the water," Lilly said. "Beautiful day."

Anglers have time to think, to put things in perspective, and here's how the world looks to an NFL Hall of Famer:

On his former coach Tom Landry: "I always respected him, but I got to know him better once I quit working for him. He is so stable. His character is so good. As a player, I never doubted his motives. He never manipulated people. He told us the truth and expected us to respond like pros. He was not a rah-rah type, even on game days."

What Lilly misses most: "I miss the games. I will always miss the competition. I don't miss practices. I don't miss training camp or meetings with the coaches. And I don't miss waking up sore on Mondays. I don't miss the physical pain."

On the recent Jimmy Johnson-Jerry Jones parting: "I see it as a rigged arrangement the whole way. Jimmy Johnson is such a competitor, I can't imagine him quitting with a chance for winning a third straight Super Bowl something no coach has ever done."

"And I don't think he got fired. He may have fired himself, but Jerry Jones wants to win, too, and he's too smart to fire the guy."

On the Cowboys' shot at a threepeat: "When you win, everybody shoots at you, even the league itself. The best team each year gets the

toughest schedule and picks last in the next draft. That makes it tough to repeat."

"The Cowboys still have a lot of talent, but free agency, injuries, contracts and personal jealousies can take their toll. I'd give them a 50-50 chance. It would be fun to see them do it."

On the effect of money in the NFL: "My top salary was for the 1974 season, the year I retired. I made \$85,000."

What would Lilly be making these days? "You mean if I was a good player? I don't know, maybe a million a year."

Reminded that Reggie White makes \$3 million: "You're right. (shrugging) I hadn't really thought about it that way."

The NFL's most disturbing development: "There's an arrogance that comes from the players and management. I don't see them treating fans with the respect they deserve. Fans built pro football. Without the paying customer, you have no market for the product."

"We played because we loved the game, not for the money. Today, it's me, me, me, not the fans."

"I see Troy Aikman and Emmitt Smith giving time to kids, but I've seen some of the other (behavior), too. Heck, Don Meredith and Bob Hayes would stand outside the locker room at the Cotton Bowl, signing autographs for two hours after a game. We all did. I used to keep my mom and dad waiting there to go home and enjoy dinner together."

The NFL's greatest advancements: "Marketing and enthusiasm."

"When I was with the Cowboys, they didn't even have any photos of us. They took a few before each season, and gave them all out. That has changed. The teams and the league is doing a better job of selling itself to the public."

"I love the fire and enthusiasm some of the players have. I don't mean all that taunting and hot-dogging for the cameras, I mean sheer joy, not acting. I think it adds to the excitement of the game."

"In my day, a guy would make a big quarterback sack and just come walking back to the huddle to wait for the next play. We had the same enthusiasm; we just weren't allowed to show it. Coach Landry didn't go for it, and a lot of other coaches of that era didn't either. You didn't see Vince Lombardi's guys jumping on each other."

"Today, if I sacked the quarterback, I might jump up and down and do handsprings," he said, chuckling. "Or at least I'd try."

COWBOYS

weather changed. Buck took different shoes and different cleats. He studied the weather like a meteorologist. And he was pretty darn good at it.

"Looks like a muddy field in San Francisco," Buck would say. "Better pack those long cleats."

There's no off-season for equipment managers in the modern NFL, particularly at Valley Ranch.

Landry had mini-camps then Jimmy Johnson doubled them. Buck was always repairing equipment, getting it cleaned properly, replacing it, and trying to fit rookies and newcomers like they were in the office of the finest tailor in the world.

Buck was on the cutting edge of

technology. He was the one who helped rig a special harness for Emmitt Smith during last year's NFL playoffs that kept the Cowboys running star in the game.

Buck had numerous duties and one of them was keeping spectators and the media safely away from the field during practice in training camp.

Once in Thousand Oaks, several media members sat down on the sidelines.

Buck pounced.

"Now you know coach Landry," Buck drawled, "doesn't like ANYONE sitting down at his practices and that includes you boys."

Message received.

Buck will get to go fishing now but he won't hang up his work pail.

Buck often joked "if I get a job that's just 40 hours a week it will seem like it's only parttime because of the long hours you have to work with the Cowboys. I loved every minute of it."

Buck was replaced by Mike McCord, who joined the Cowboys in 1989 as a ticket manager and has been working under Buchanan.


For us Buck lovers, it's a sad day.

His name is "Bucky." It's old Buck's son.

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
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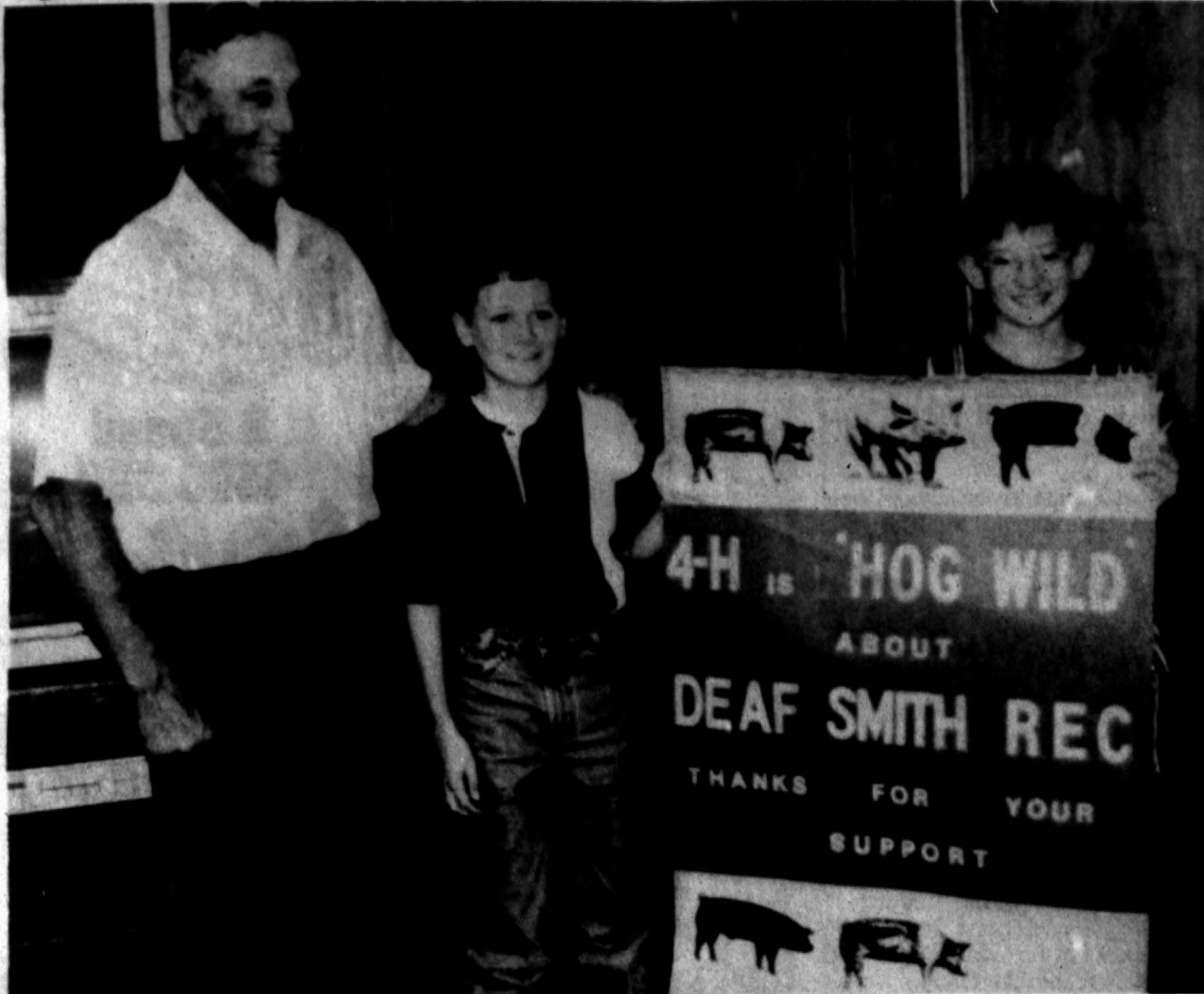

Bitter memories remain for survivors of WWII bombing

CAEN, France (AP) - As D-Day

crowds remember fallen soldiers, bitter survivors gather at the 14,000 scattered and forgotten graves of civilians sacrificed in the name of the Liberation.

Most of them were victims of the "Transportation Plan," an essentially fruitless Allied effort to slow German reinforcements by bombing Norman cities and crossroads into heaps of rubble.

People expecting deliverance watched in shock as explosives leveled urban centers that Resistance agents had reported were free of enemy concentrations.

"They aimed not to kill Germans but to cut the roads, which the French knew was impossible," said Jean Quellien, a historian who studied civilian casualties. "Everyone wondered: 'Why?'"

Because inaccurate bombing was worsened by bad weather and anti-aircraft fire, far more people died from the air raids than from the crossfire of battle, he added.

Direct air attacks on German troop columns did slow some movement to the front, but the attempt to block roads and blow bridges did little more than devastate towns and kill civilians.

At the time, anger blunted the joy of D-Day. Franz Gockel, a young German soldier fleeing Omaha Beach with a wounded hand, recalled his surprise when he was cornered by French civilians.

"I expected them to tear me apart," he said. "One man pulled out a dagger, but he pointed it to the sky. 'This is for the Americans,' he told me."

Few dared to criticize the Allies amidst the euphoria of gratitude of people who did not directly suffer. Later, as France rebuilt at a furious pace, the past was pushed aside.

Only now, 50 years later, are Frenchmen talking out loud about repressed emotions. So long after the fact, anger has settled into a gnawing bitterness, a frustration that no one knows or cares.

"We were forgotten, left to our own devices," said Frederique Legrand, an infant when Allied bombers missed the bridge at Caen but killed her parents. Thousands died as the city was leveled.

Orphanages were so jammed, and other costs were so pressing, that France did not get around to

recognizing Legrand as a ward of the state until she was 21. That amounted only to a piece of paper.

"Relatives helped raise me and my sister and brother. But we were different from other kids," she said. "No one seemed to know what Normandy suffered."

Pierre Poupard, who watched his hometown of St. Lo crumble around him, has located 1,100 survivors of the firestorm for a solemn weekend reunion in the rebuilt city.

"We don't blame the Allies," he said. "They freed us from the tyranny of occupation." But, he added, it was a terrible cost and he wished more people realized the price paid.

"No one ever taught this in school," said Christophe Bauduffe, a journalist whose book, "The Sacrifice of the Normans," details countless scenes of human misery.

"Now, it is coming out."

The Transportation Plan was debated hotly before D-Day. Winston Churchill opposed it, fearful of killing civilians and devastating old monuments. Senior air commanders wanted to keep bombing Germany.

Others insisted that since bombing had disrupted rail traffic, it could do the same with roads by collapsing cities and villages onto crucial highways. Gen. Dwight Eisenhower, the commander, agreed.

SPORTS GOGGLES



Kids play rough--but so do grown-ups. And both age groups need the special protection offered by sports goggles made of tough, poly-carbonate plastic. Regular street-wear glasses don't offer adequate protection. At first, it was only eye professionals and coaches who promoted this eyewear, but now

that professional athletes on TV are wearing goggles, more amateurs realize they're "cool."

In recent years, it was racquetball that caused the most injuries when a high-velocity ball hit a player's eye, but goggles are commonly worn today and required for tournaments. In basketball, the close contact under the basket often results in scratched corneas, fractured cheek/eye sockets and detached retinas. This year, the Center for Sports Vision at Wills Eye Hospital in Philadelphia will concentrate on baseball, which causes the most injuries in 5- to 14-year-olds.

In case of an eye injury, see an eye doctor promptly. For first aid, tape a bag of crushed ice to your forehead, hanging over the eye area.

Daily values and percent daily values are the new reference terms on the nutrition label. Daily values are set by the government for adults and children age four or older and reflect current nutrition recommendations for a 2,000 calorie reference diet. Technically, the term Daily Value is an "umbrella" term for two sets of reference values: Daily Reference Values (DRV) and Reference Daily Intake (RDI). Daily Reference Values are set for total fat, saturated fat, cholesterol, total carbohydrate, dietary fiber, sodium, potassium and protein. The Percent Daily Value shows how the amount of a nutrient in a serving of food fits into a 2,000 calorie reference diet. Consumers can use % Daily Value to compare food products and determine what a serving of food contains relative to a 2,000 calorie

reference diet. Most people probably do not eat a 2,000 calorie reference diet. However, the percent Daily Value information on the nutrition label can still be used to see if a diet meets nutrition recommendations for a given nutrient. Personalized nutrient amounts based on a person's individual caloric intake can also be calculated.

By now you may have heard all about D-day that you want to, but I'm still amazed at all that went into that invasion. Deaf Smith County Library has a good collection of materials about World War II. We have quite a range of books on the subject from the 40s (and earlier) to some of the most recent works available. Cornelius Ryan's *The Longest Day* has been pretty much regarded as the definitive popular work on D-day, but Stephen Ambrose's new *D-Day, June 6, 1944* will probably surpass it. If you prefer watching to reading, we have several good tapes in our video collection—most with live footage sequences.

John Sandford is "preying" on the mystery shelves again. *Night Prey* is a shocking thriller about multiple murders, a misunderstood investigator, and lots of action.

Non-fiction books encompass both sides of the American political spectrum. First up is *Leading With My Heart* by Virginia Kelley, mother of Bill Clinton. I'm going to stick my neck out again here, but I see little of substance in any of this family. Other non-fiction books take in a variety of subjects. You may not realize that we have books of music, both popular and classical. This week we're putting out some collections of bluegrass tunes and pop hits of the 40s, 50s, 60s, 70s, and 80s. The *Tightwad Gazette* offers vital, cost-cutting information on just about everything and promotes thrift as a "viable alternative lifestyle." We even have books on Bible Facts and Fortune Telling.

Q: Can you advise me as to where I can purchase a time delay wall switch. I once had one controlling my carport light, and it became inoperative. I haven't been able to find a replacement anywhere. The switch had a 45 to 60-second delay. It allowed me to turn off the switch, go outside and lock the door, get in my car and start to drive off before the light went out.

A: Leviton Manufacturing Co. in Little Neck, N.Y., manufactures the Decora Time Delay Switch, Catalog

Number 6690. You can buy the switch at Electrical Supply Stores, Home Centers and Hardware Stores. It costs about \$20. There are three buttons on the switch: one to turn the light on, another to turn it off and a third for the delayed off function.

When the delayed off switch is pressed, the light will remain on for five minutes and then shut off automatically. The switch is for incandescent lights only and fits a standard wall box.



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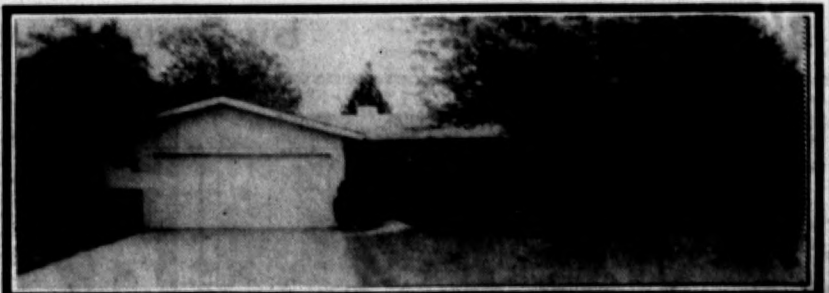
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MINDING YOUR OWN BUSINESS

QUALITY TIPS

Some business-building concepts are so elegantly simple that we say to ourselves, "Why didn't I think of that?" This is the case with a local company's quality improvement program.

Culligan Water Systems of Amarillo, TX, uses a straightforward approach for creating excellence from within. Tom Grimes, the company's owner, shared his five-element plan with us several weeks ago. The quality program was developed by the entire staff.

I've read the five elements several times as I've sorted piles of information on future column topics. Each time I reviewed the five points, I was reminded that good programs don't have to be complex. Recently, quality critics have criticized some of America's

larger companies' TQM programs because of their complexity. The critics say that several of these programs are failing because the process is too complicated to understand and implement.

We relax that all business management issues are easier to discuss than to put into practice. However, if the process is too complex or if those charged with responsibility of implementing the program feel that it is too complicated, it is doomed from the start.

This is why keeping it simple and straightforward is beneficial. If you can express the main elements of your quality efforts simply, you can work out the methods of implementation and measurement. **Chrysler's Simple Turnaround**

Lee Iacocca, the retired chairman of Chrysler Corporation, described his success in turning the troubled company around a few years ago. He said the fundamentals were to, "Create a quality product, deliver it to the marketplace and make sure you let everyone know about it."

Iacocca's formula is neither complex nor difficult to understand. He founded it on sound manufacturing principles: Produce and deliver quality and then promote it.

Many specific operations are required to produce quality. You should examine each aspect of your business operation to ensure that it is contributing to quality in your products or services.

The elements of quality will vary from business to business. Some companies will be more product oriented, others more service focused.

The Q.T.I.P.S. Program

For Tom Grimes and his Culligan team, the quality effort began by identifying five areas to improve. They call their process the

Q.T.I.P.S. Program. Here it is as Grimes shared it with us.

- Q- Quality - Quality products, quality image and the most important factor quality people. Customers will pay more for real quality. Employees take pride in working for a quality company.
- T- Teamwork - Work together toward common goals. Teamwork makes heavy loads lighter and laughter brighter. Insist on cooperation from all departments and staff. Eliminate bad apples from the barrel (firm).

- I- Integrity - This is the foundation: Honesty and fairness. Customers respond to integrity; employees thrive on it. There is no other way to do business.

- P- Profit - Profit is not a dirty word. Profits mean good wages, new trucks, better products and services. Who is responsible for profit? Everyone in the company. Selling is essential for profit. Who sells? Everyone in the company.

- S- Service - Service is the Hallmark of good business. It separates the best from the rest. People take pride in providing good service. Customers demand it. The key elements are good people, trained well.

Start with quality and end with service. Build a team of dedicated individuals. Run the business with integrity. Watch the bottom line profits.

Grimes summarizes the process by saying, "Q.T.I.P.S. sound simple but you and I know better. It takes dedicated people to make it work and it is an ongoing process."

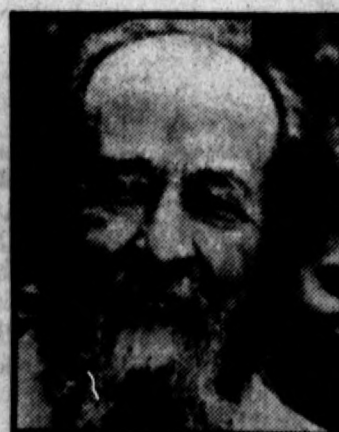

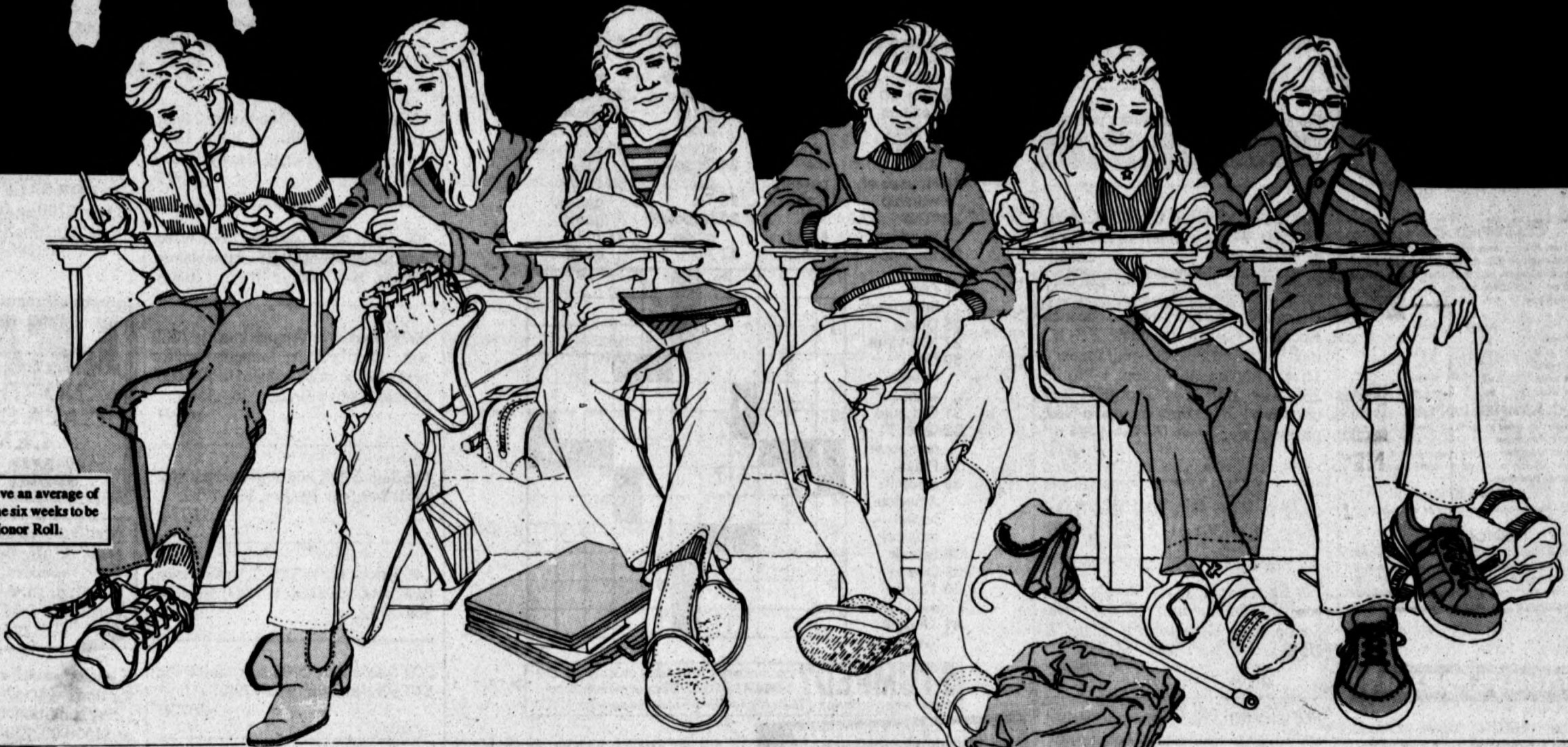

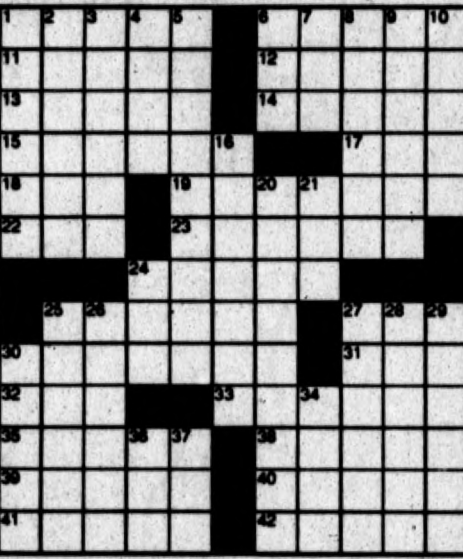

Weather, pests hurt 1994 wheat crop Texas losses worst among states producing grain

SPUR, Texas (AP) - Wheat farmers around Dickens County usually let their cattle graze on the crop for several months each year. Eddie Clark's cattle grazed on wheat for only six weeks this spring.

"It just didn't grow," Clark said. "A cow got one bite, and that was the end of it for that plant."

Lousy winter wheat across the state is being blamed on a multitude of factors: green bugs, hailstorms, sporadic outbreaks of viral disease, late freezes in the Panhandle.

But drought seems the biggest reason behind estimates that Texas wheat farmers will harvest 27 percent less than last year's production, and

33 percent less than their total in 1992.

Some farmers already have plowed their wheat under, rather than continue mowing with a crop worth less than its cost to harvest.

Dickens County extension agent Robert Herrington pointed to a barren field during a recent drive near Spur, about 60 miles southeast of Lubbock.

"This was wheat right here," Herrington said. "And let me tell you, that's not good. That's not good at all."

Spur fields yielded as much as 40 bushels per acre two years ago. But Clark's land, which received less than an inch of rain from September planting through March, will probably yield just six to eight bushels per acre this year, he said.

The statewide average is projected

at 29 bushels, down three bushels from 1993.

Timing determines whether dry spells damage a crop. Ironically, dry conditions are beneficial in some states, said U.S. Department of Agriculture statistician Greg Preston.

"The dry weather for the Midwest actually is ripening their winter wheat early and helping out with insects," he said.

"Texas is probably worst off as hard winter wheat states go," said Vaughn Siegenthaler, USDA agriculture statistician. "The panhandle of Oklahoma, I've heard horror stories about it. Whether that's so, we don't know yet."

Farmers who attended a seminar last week in Amarillo heard that 38 percent of the Texas wheat crop is considered poor to very poor.

The 1994 Texas winter wheat harvest is projected at 87 million bushels with revenue of \$282 million, said Beverly Boyd, spokeswoman for the state Department of Agriculture.

As of May 10, the USDA projected a national winter wheat harvest of

1.66 billion bushels, 6 percent less than last year.

Agriculture experts say a poor wheat crop hurts the farmer economically and saps the strength and reproductive capacity of cattle trying to graze on it.

"Farmers have a tendency to pour-mouth their own fields a little bit," said Amarillo wheat geneticist Mark Lazar. "While there are definitely some poor fields, there are some good ones, too."

Dallam County extension agent Mike Bragg said at least 20,000 acres were damaged by a hailstorm May 9 north of Dalhart.

"Before the hail we had standing wheat that would tickle you above the knee," Bragg said. "After the hail it wouldn't hardly reach your boot top."

Problems were detected much earlier in Dickens County.

"We first felt desperation back about October," said district conservationist Charlie Morris. "We knew going into spring that we were in trouble."

Bluebonnets being touted as new cash crop in Texas

AUSTIN (AP) - A long-stem native bluebonnet may give Texas growers a new crop with potential

international popularity, says state Agriculture Commissioner Rick Perry.

"Most of our cut flowers are imported from out of state. But that won't be the case with the long-stem bluebonnet, which has thrived under greenhouse conditions and which could be homegrown," he said Thursday.

Tim Davis, a horticulturalist at the Texas A&M University Research and Extension Center at Dallas, said there aren't many blue cut flowers in the world market "and blue is a very desired color in the industry."

Researchers at Texas A&M University have been selecting preferred traits found in the bluebonnets, which grow along the Rio Grande in Big Bend. The flowers could be available for commercial use in a year or two, Davis said.

The blooms have a vase life of at least eight days, according to the Texas Department of Agriculture. Their stems range from 12 to 24 inches long.

Proposed names for the new blooms are Texas Sapphire, Texas Sunset and Texas Ice.

Ittycheriah has many years of experience as a crop and soils consultant in West Texas and Eastern New Mexico.

The meeting is open to the public as part of the club's year-long focus on soil, leading up to the Sixth annual Southern Plains Conference, set for Jan. 14, 1995, in Amarillo.

Ag income affected by cattle price drop

WASHINGTON (AP) - The lowest prices in nearly six years for steers and heifers helped cause a 1.4 percent drop in the prices farmers got for their raw products in May, the Agriculture Department says.

Prices also dropped from April to May for milk, eggs and corn. Prices rose for tomatoes, broilers, celery and peaches.

The May index held even with year-ago levels, however. Increases for corn, soybeans, oranges and cotton offset decreases for cattle, tomatoes, hogs and onions.

The monthly report, issued Tuesday, said beef cattle prices averaged \$67.70 per hundredweight, down \$4.30 from April and \$9.40 from a year ago. The report said the average price of \$70.30 for steers and heifers, the chief slaughter animals, was the lowest monthly price since August 1988.

The decline follows a glut of cattle in feedlots, where the animals are fattened on grain for slaughter. Dry conditions in the Southeast and Southern Plains led ranchers to sell their stock to the feedlots rather than graze them.

The feedlot pressure should ease

this spring and summer because of better grazing conditions, the department said in a separate report.

That separate analysis also said retail beef prices should drop this summer, averaging \$2.88 a pound, down from a record of \$2.93 last year.

In the prices-to-farmers report, the department said milk dropped 30 cents a hundredweight to \$13.20 in May, but was still up from \$12.90 a year ago.

Eggs dropped to 58.2 cents a dozen, from 61.7 cents a month earlier and 63.3 cents in May 1993.

Corn dropped to \$2.60 a bushel in May, from \$2.65 the previous month, but was still higher than \$2.14 in May 1993. The department said the decrease from April to May was due to favorable growing and planting conditions in the major states and a projected rebound in 1994 production after last year's flood- and drought-shortened crop.

On the upside, producers received 37.1 cents a pound for broilers, up from 35.3 cents a pound the previous month and 35.2 cents in May 1993.

Tomatoes brought \$25 a hundredweight, compared with \$16.50 a month earlier and \$57.80 in May 1993.

WHEAT

About half of the state's wheat acreage is grown on the Texas High Plains, where more than a third is irrigated. Most of the wheat grown in Texas is of the hard red winter varieties, planted in September and October. Producers in 1993 harvested 118 million bushels, down about 10 percent from the previous year.

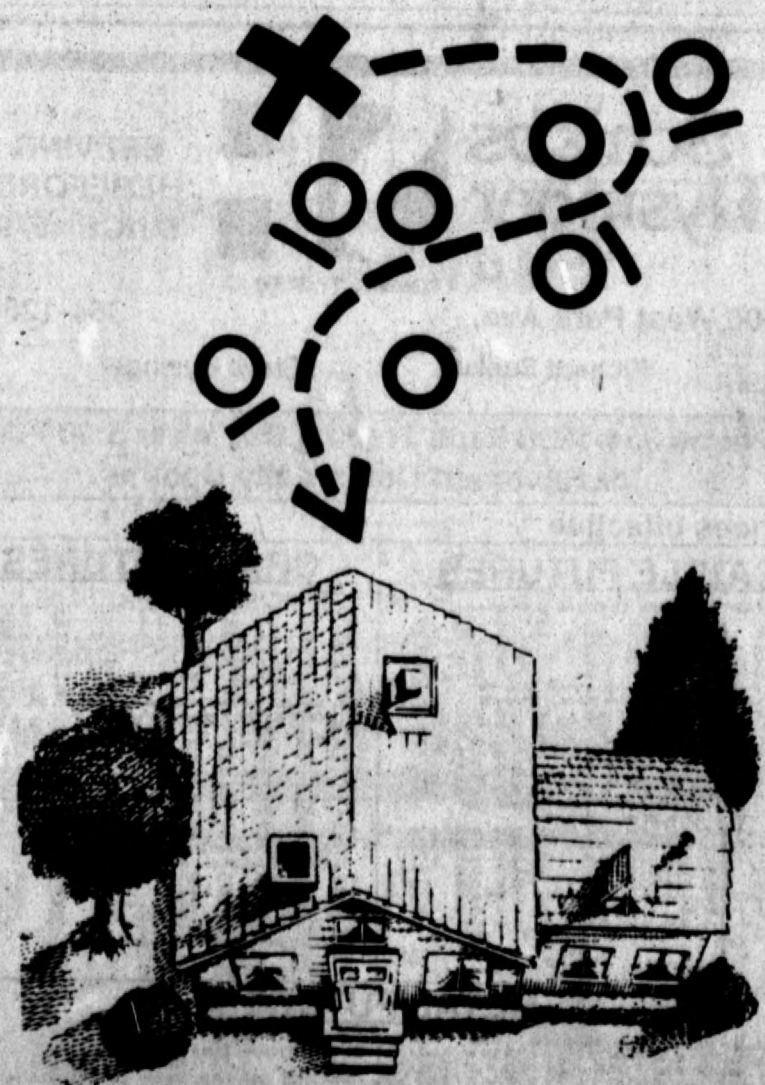

'Storytime' demonstrates fun of families reading together

To be an actor, it's well known that good looks and an outgoing nature help, but the ability to read well can't be overlooked, either. At least that's how A Martinez, star of "Santa Barbara" and "L.A. Law," puts it.

"If you're going to be in the acting profession, the ability to read well is critical to getting work. I think that one of the singular gifts of my childhood was that my mother made it her business to read to me and to teach me what sounds letters made."

"But beyond that," the father of three continues, "books have a way of opening up your imagination that watching the best television cannot match."

Books are what brought Martinez and his daughter Devon to the set of "Storytime," a Los Angeles-based children's series that's all about reading books aloud. "Storytime" began as a local production in the fall of 1992 and became such a success after just one season that it is set to join PBS' national weekday schedule beginning Monday, June 6 (check local listings).

The show's three hosts are Lucy (Anne Betancourt), Mara (Marabina Jaimes, also of "Santa Barbara") and 7-year-old Kino the puppet, who is operated by Mark Riitts (Lester the Rat on "Beakman's World") and is a little older than the show's target audience of 3-to-6-year-olds. With Kino, the two women take turns welcoming guest readers, most of them celebrities.

The first 40 episodes include readings by John Goodman, Valerie Bertinelli, Shari Belafonte, Telma Hopkins, Paul Rodriguez, John Ritter, Patricia Richardson, Ellen DeGeneres, Mayim Bialik, Edward James Olmos, Tom Selleck, Alfre Woodard and Paula Poundstone. Some readers, like Amanda Plummer, actually perform the parts, with accents and other the-

atrical touches. Often the guests bring their own children, who sit in their laps while their parents read to a small circle of children gathered nearby.

Three stories are read during each half-hour. The titles are selected by a panel that includes four teachers, three child psychologists and two book-sellers. They have suggested a total of 1,000 titles so far, of which some 130 have been read. The books include "Chicka Chicka Boom Boom," "Any Kind of Dog," "The Gingerbread Man," "Owl Babies," "Rumpelstiltskin," "Horton Hatches the Egg," "If You Give a Mouse a Cookie," "The Woman Who Outshone the Sun," "A Big Fat Enormous Lie," "Franklin in the Dark," "Princess Smartypants" and "More, More, More, Said the Baby."

All books selected for "Storytime" are widely available in bookstores and libraries and through the national literacy organization Reading Is Fundamental.

"Accessibility is a real key element in the choice of books," says the series' co-creator, Stephen Kulczycki — especially given the fact that fewer than 40 percent of all American homes added a book to their shelves in 1993. In testing, Kulczycki says, "almost 20 percent of the parents reported after the first time seeing the show their children asked them to read to them more than ever before. That was very encouraging to the basic notion that we can be infectious with this idea and just give (families) the slightest bit of incentive to do it a little more often."

"The fact is, the more that you are read to as a kid, the more you want to read. And if you can read, there's no telling how far you can go in life."

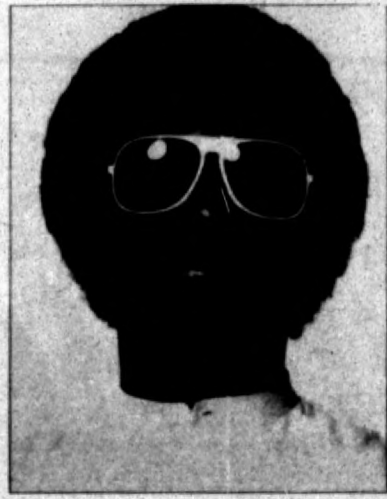

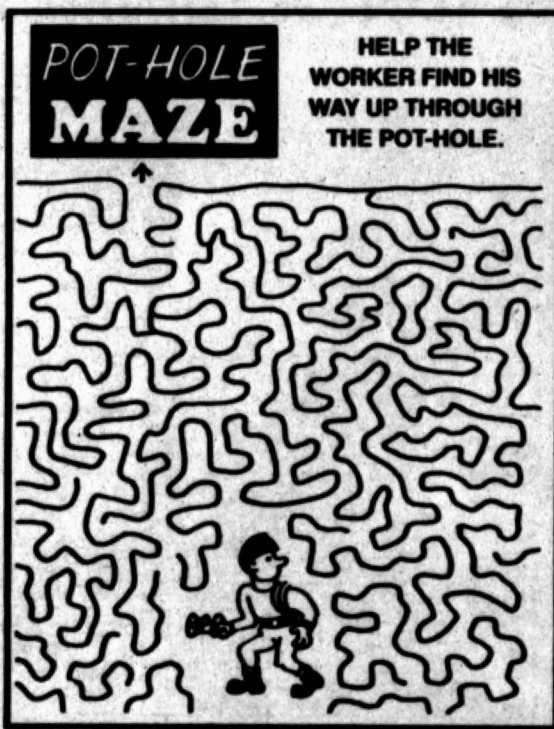

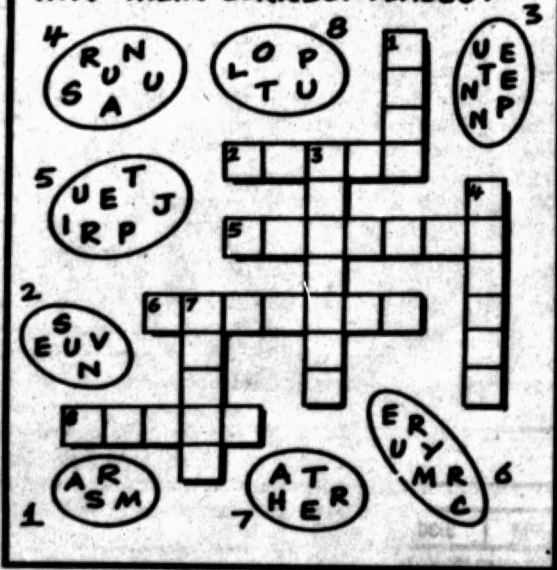

Filmmaker explores life, death and family ties in ultimate home movie as 'P.O.V.' season opens

Filmmaker Ross McElwee makes the ultimate '90s home movie in "Time Indefinite," the opening salvo in the high-profile seventh season of PBS' "P.O.V."

Airing Tuesday, June 7 (check local listings), the film once again exposes McElwee's family and friends to his compulsive need to make art out of life's everyday events, much like 1986's "Sherman's March."

McElwee's obsessive need to chronicle every action, however trivial, traces the course of events that follow the announcement of his engagement to fellow filmmaker Marilyn Levine.

The wedding day itself is lightened by several moments of unintentional

humor, including McElwee negotiating for another 10 minutes of filming time after being asked by his bride-to-be when he is going to get ready. Only reluctantly does he turn his camera over to someone else to document the joyous event.

McElwee's celebration of life takes on a darker tone with the deaths of his grandmother, father and unborn child.

While struggling to come to terms with his loss, there are reaffirmations that life is good. A son is born, a friend revisits the scene of a tragic fire to find a rebuilt house and his family's long-time housekeeper happily renews her wedding vows after 50 years of marriage, one of the film's strongest moments.

Fortunately Linder is lucky enough to share her life with a "wonderful man," her husband. She works with him on several projects and enjoys just hanging out with him.

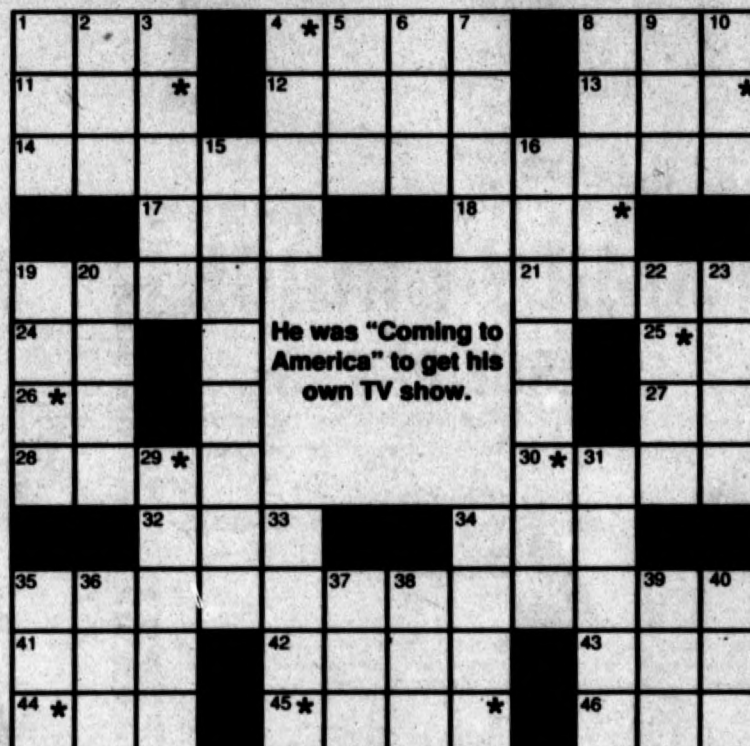
Linder has a big heart and is involved in several charities. Most of her time off is filled with calling or visiting fans who are ill and lending her celebrity to various charities.
