First holiday of summer

City of Hereford and Deaf Smith County will close offices Monday, except for law enforcement and emergency personnel, in observance of Memorial Day. Also taking a day off will be state and federal employees. Some retail businesses will take a holiday while others will be open for customers. The offices of The Hereford Brand will be closed on Monday as well.

HISD board to meet

The Hereford Independent School District Board of Trustees will meet in regular session at 6 p.m. Tuesday, May 31, in the board room of the administration building, 601 N. 25 Mile Avenue. Immunization schedule noted

The Texas Department of Health has announced its June immunization clinic schedule for Hereford. Vaccines against polio, diphtheria, lockjaw (tetanus), whooping cough (pertussis), measles, rubella, mumps and HIB (hemophilus influenzae type B) will be offered. The Texas Department of Health charges to help with the cost of keeping the clinic open. Charges are based on family income and size and the ability to pay. Regular clinics will be held from 7 a.m. to 11:30 a.m. and 1 p.m. to 5:45 p.m. The clinic will be on Thursday, June 2, then June 9, 16 and 23 in the Health Department offices, 205 W. Fourth St., Suite B.

Swimming pool set to open on Tuesday

appraised uniformly, tax burdens will vary. The lowest average ratio of tax appraisals to market value (selling price) was 67.7 percent in Lakeview ISD (Hall County), while the highest ratio was in the Divide ISD in Kerr County at 836.2 percent.

Gambling news mixed as lottery begins second year

AUSTIN (AP) - While Texas lottery officials are pleased with the \$4.25 billion worth of tickets sold in the contest's first two years, not all the state's gamblers are happy.

Parimutuel wagering, especially

dog racing, has suffered with easy gambling offered by the lottery, says David Freeman, executive secretary of the Texas Racing Commission.

Wagering at dog tracks in Corpus Christi and Harlingen has dropped about 40 percent since the lottery has come into full swing, Freeman said.

"Anytime there is competition for the discretionary dollar, someone is going to lose," Freeman said.

He said the lottery is easier to play, and with 15,000 retail outlets selling tickets, much more accessible.

Freeman said the tracks could be more aggressive in advertising, but the Legislature may ultimately have to help.

"There is going to have to be the ability for these racetracks, through legislation perhaps, to get into an off-track betting situation where they can have their product throughout

Fog rolls in across Panhandle

Visibility was less than a mile over the Texas Panhandle on Saturday as low clouds and fog developed.

Temperatures at daybreak Saturday were mostly in the 50s and 60s in West Texas, ranging from 56 at Amarillo to 67 at El Paso.

The National Weather Service said showers or thunderstorms could be expected much of Saturday across West Texas, with highs in the 80s and 90s.

Highs Friday were in the 80s across most of North Texas, but temperatures fell into the 80s across the region.

Strong thunderstorms developed rapidly in and just east of the Dallas-Fort Worth metroplex around sunset Friday.

Numerous funnel clouds were reported as the strongest storm exploded in Van Zandt County. Tornadoes were sighted at Ben Wheeler and just north of Frankston.

Patchy dense fog also formed over the coastal plains of South Texas. Temperatures across South Texas ranged from 66 at Junction to 77 at Brownsville.

Thunderstorms continued over extreme Southeast Texas on Saturday morning along a stationary front that was draped across Central Texas.

The forecast calls for a chance for showers and thunderstorms over the Coastal Plains and Southeast Texas today. Otherwise it will be partly cloudy and warm for South Texas on Monday, a holiday.

Paper says plea refused

CHICAGO (AP) - Rep. Dan Rostenkowski has decided to reject a prosecutors' plea bargain offer and fight allegations of misusing government funds, the Chicago Sun-Times reported Saturday.

Rostenkowski informed prosecutors on Thursday of his decision and, barring any last minutes changes will be charged Tuesday, the newspaper said, citing unnamed sources.

Rostenkowski, chairman of the House Ways and Means Committee, is under investigation by the U.S. attorney's office over his use of office and campaign accounts. He could face indictment, raising speculation he might resign from Congress.

Prosecutors plan to ask a federal grand jury in Washington, D.C., to return an indictment accusing Rostenkowski of defrauding the government of hundreds of thousands of dollars over a period of two decades, the paper said.

No negotiations are scheduled over the Memorial Day weekend, but Rostenkowski could still change his mind and accept the plea bargain by the Tuesday deadline, the Sun-Times said.

In their final plea bargain offer, prosecutors demanded that Rostenkowski plead guilty to a felony, serve a short prison sentence, resign from Congress immediately and make restitution.

Health Department eyeing no-consent abortion rule

AUSTIN (AP) - A rule being considered by the Texas Department of Health to ensure that minors have access to abortion without parental or spousal consent has been met with strong opposition by anti-abortion forces.

State Health Department rules currently don't address parental consent, but officials are considering a proposal stating that "neither spousal or parental consent may be requested or required" for minors seeking to terminate their pregnancies.

The proposal does, however, direct counselors to encourage minors to talk to a "trusted or significant adult" about their decision.

The proposed rule is one of many the Health Department is reviewing for family planning procedures.

Health Department guidelines

must be followed by clinics if they are operated by or have contracts with the state agency.

At a hearing Friday, officials representing Right to Life Committee Inc. said the new rule would "gag" counselors from suggesting to pregnant girls younger than 18 that they seek help from their parents.

Report shows large numbers of farm workers are illiterate

WASHINGTON (AP) - More than half of all hired farm workers lacked high school diplomas, compared with only 14 percent of all wage and salary employees, says a newly released Agriculture Department study.

"In fact, 14 percent of hired farm workers were functionally illiterate; that is, they had completed less than five years of schooling, compared with only 1 percent of all other wage and salary workers," USDA's Economic Research Service said in a Rural Conditions and Trends report based on 1992 figures.

It said 57 percent of all hired farm workers had not completed high school.

Years of schooling varied

significantly by racial and ethnic group, the report said. Only 11 percent of Hispanics had completed high school, compared with 60 percent of whites and 39 percent of blacks and others, it said.

Not unexpectedly, farmhands earned significantly less than most other workers.

Among those working 35 hours or more per week, hired farm workers had median weekly earnings of \$240, or only 54 percent of the average \$446 earned by other U.S. wage and salary workers, the report said.

The weekly earnings of hired farm workers varied by education level, ranging from a median \$193 for workers who did not complete high school to \$300 for those with some college education.

Number of cases of skin cancer up

DALLAS (AP) - Melanoma, the deadliest form of skin cancer, is of more concern to doctors than ever before, with the number of cases rising about 4 percent a year since the 1970s.

With more people moving to southern states and evidence that the earth's protective ozone layer is thinning, public health officials worry that the cancer will only get worse. The Dallas Morning News reported in its Saturday editions.

In 1960, one American in 600 was diagnosed with melanoma. By 2000, that number is expected to be one in 75.

This year, the American Cancer Society expects 32,000 new cases, about 1,600 of those in Texas. For all skin cancers in the United States, the numbers are expected to exceed 700,000.

In southern states, about 30 percent of the population is expected to develop skin cancer at some point in their lives.

"It's particularly tragic because it affects young people," said Dallas dermatologist J.B. Howell, who has seen melanoma rates climb during his 50 years in practice.

The newspaper said scientists are constantly working out strategies to protect sun worshipers.

Among recent findings, Texas researchers have focused attention on sunscreen, suggesting that the lotion might not be the chemical suit of armor that many people believe it to be.

Also, doctors are now emphasizing children's exposure to sunlight as a foreshadowing of their melanoma risks as adults.

To protect the eyes as well as the skin, a San Antonio scientist has

come up with a new kind of sunglasses that guard against the potentially harmful effects of visible light as well as ultraviolet light.

"We're exposing ourselves more to sunlight, and we're starting to see the consequences," said Stephen Ullrich of the University of Texas M.D. Anderson Cancer Center in Houston.

Three of Ullrich's colleagues found themselves embroiled in controversy in January after publishing reports showing that sunscreens didn't protect the components of the skin's immune systems that may keep melanoma cells in check.

The scientists suggested that perhaps sunscreens actually increase a person's chances of melanoma by luring susceptible people into staying out in the sun longer than they would without protection.

In short, they said, stopping a sunburn might be like disabling a smoke alarm that might work of a free agent before it does too much damage.

Dr. William Jacott, a family practitioner at the University of Minnesota and a board member of the American Medical Association, joined doctors from three other professional associations Friday in issuing their strongest warning yet that children are in great danger from the sun's rays. The organizations issued a set of guidance called "Save Our Skin" that emphasize keeping children out of the sun and protecting them with an SPF-15 sunscreen when they go outside.



Some people believe that this country, and the world as a whole, is going to pot. But, I think if you check back in history, our parents, grandparents, and great-grandparents probably thought the same thing.

Things sure seem worse, primarily because of dope and drugs, and one other thing—communications. We hear more about all the nation's woes in today's society. The national news is sensationalized on TV, especially those dumb "magazine" shows that parade folks who tell about crime, immorality, bad kids, bad parents, bad spouses, and different lifestyles.

But we recently noticed a study on American families conducted by MassMutual magazine that dispels the following myths about U.S. families.

Myth: Between work and other demands, parents do not spend enough time with pre-teen children.

Reality: More than (59%) say they spend the right amount of time with their children.

Myth: Things were easier for parents 20 years ago, and parents, particularly mothers, had more time to spend with children.

Reality: Despite the increasing amount of working mothers (69% in this study), 71 percent of women say they spend the same amount or more time with their children than their own mothers spent with them. Sixty-four percent of fathers make the same claim.

Myth: Because working mothers are not there to supervise them, children spend more time with the television as a baby sitter.

Reality: Children of working mothers spend the same amount of time in front of the TV by themselves as do children of stay-at-home mothers.

Myth: Today's children are overscheduled, and parents spend too much time caring their children from activity to activity.

Reality: Parents do not report that their children are overscheduled. Only 5 percent say their children are involved in too many activities.

Myth: Today's families never



Ex-ENMU official charged with having stolen secrets

SANTA FE, N.M. (AP) - Attorney General Tom Udall will help prosecute a former Eastern New Mexico University official charged with possessing trade secrets stolen from a Silicon Valley company.

Donald Zarlengo, who formerly headed the Computer Science Center at ENMU, was arrested on March 8 and charged with criminal possession of stolen property worth more than \$20,000 and conspiracy.

Zarlengo resigned his job at ENMU in April.

The stolen property was a contractor's proposal for renewal of a \$100 million contract with the National Aeronautics and Space Administration, Udall said Friday.

Udall said he would assist Ninth Judicial District Attorney Randy Harris in the state's case against Zarlengo. Udall said he was asked to join the case because of the complex issues involved.

No trial date has been set.

Zarlengo, 52, worked as a consultant in charge of software support for Serv-Air of Mountain View, Calif. He was accused of having trade secrets from NSI Technology Services Corp. of Sunnyvale, Calif., which was said to be competing for NASA contracts potentially worth more than \$99 million.

According to a court affidavit, the largest contract for which Serv-Air and NSI were competing was for technical and mechanical support for an airborne telescope project. Trade secrets worth an estimated \$142,000 involved the Kuiper Airborne Observatory contract proposal to NASA.

Investigators seized computer peripherals and a diskette from Zarlengo's ENMU office and a pair of diskettes from his car. In a raid of Zarlengo's home in Portales, investigators seized 1,186 diskettes,

along with 17 NASA documents and papers relating to both Serv-Air and NSI.

Changeover from apartheid to black rule in South Africa quick

CAPE TOWN, South Africa (AP)

- Somehow it has all changed so quickly and so smoothly.

President Nelson Mandela, who spent more than two decades in prison on an island in nearby Table Bay, emerged last week from the doors of a sparkling state mansion built by gold-and-diamond magnate Cecil Rhodes.

He stood comfortably on the back steps of his new presidential estate, situated on the flank of Table Mountain, overlooking manicured lawns, acres of gardens, a helicopter pad and a tennis court. Two flags of the now democratic South Africa flapped serenely in the breeze.

At Mandela's elbow was the leader of the pro-apartheid Conservative Party, Fendi Hartzenberg. Respectful and amiable, he was thanking the new president for their meeting in which Hartzenberg pleaded for an amnesty for white rightists arrested in a series of pre-election blasts that killed 21 people.

Mandela gave every indication he would consider it, in the interests of

"healing the wounds."

Such incongruous scenes have become commonplace 2 1/2 weeks after the African National Congress began settling into the halls of power and Mandela was inaugurated the country's first black president.

If the country's first non-racial election was preceded by apocalyptic rhetoric, racially inspired murders and fears of civil war, the immediate aftermath has been one of a lingering good feeling.

One agency counted just 12 deaths nationwide from political violence, making the week the most tranquil in four years.

"Miraculously, the afterglow of the peaceful election and cathartic inauguration is still with us," said the Star newspaper in Johannesburg this week after Mandela opened the country's first representative parliament.

However, there was also a feeling about that the government's real work has not yet begun. Several weeks of back-patting for the successful transfer of power from the white minority to the black majority was

good for the national spirit. But some South Africans inevitably were starting to focus on the enormous tasks ahead.

Addressing the first joint sitting of parliament Tuesday, Mandela said, "Let us all get down to work!"

He outlined a moderate domestic program designed to uplift the country's black majority. It was leavened with repeated promises to the white business establishment to hold down government spending and taxes and to maintain fiscal discipline.

Although the speech was widely praised, one black South African newspaper columnist said it went down better among whites than blacks and warned that black ANC supporters might become disillusioned if Mandela doesn't make more changes.

Mandela's Cabinet members were starting to make their marks. Communist Party leader Joe Slovo, the new minister for housing, called together housing officials from the nine provinces to plot how to meet the ANC's goal of 1 million new

homes in five years.

Deputy President Thabo Mbeki, whose father was an ANC prisoner with Mandela on Robben Island, jetted off to New York to be on hand when the United Nations lifted the last trade sanctions against South Africa.

The other deputy president, F.W. de Klerk, moved out of the gracious, antique-filled Tuy Huis presidential office to make room for his new chief, Mandela. In parliament, de Klerk made a point to welcome the new black members, who for decades were kept out by his National Party.

Foreign Minister Alfred Nzo restored full diplomatic relations with Angola's leftist government, long opposed by the old South Africa.

Meanwhile, new black Defense Minister Joe Modise announced that he was retaining the services of the former white commander of the army, Gen. Georg Meiring, to lead the new South African National Defense Force. He will be responsible for merging the old South African army with 23,000 ANC guerrilla troops and troops from now-abolished black homelands.

That was all Houston manager Terry Collins needed to see, yanking Williams, who said he thought his time in baseball was running short.

"I think it's time for Mitchy-poo to take it to the ranch," he said, referring to his cattle ranch in Hico, Texas. "The way it looks, I'm not going to be here past Monday."

Scott Servais and Steve Finley hit solo homers in the seventh for the Astros, and Houston's other closer, John Hudek, got the final two outs to beat the Phillies 4-2.

Williams has struggled this season

after giving up the World Series-winning home run to Joe Carter last year. The Phillies traded him to Houston on Dec. 2.

Elsewhere in the NL it was: Atlanta 7, Chicago 2; Montreal 4, Colorado 2; New York 10, Cincinnati 2; San Francisco 4, Florida 3; San Diego 8, St. Louis 6 and Los Angeles 6, Pittsburgh 5 in 10 innings.

Juan Gonzalez was walked intentionally and Greer singled through the left side of the infield.

Scott Cooper's RBI single put Boston ahead in the second, but Frey walked in the third and Clark hit his sixth homer of the season for a 2-1 lead.

Utah unites to claim win in series against Rockets

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) - The Utah Jazz won a game they desperately needed by finally playing like a team.

After failures in Games 1 and 2 that were marked by unbalanced scoring and Hakeem Olajuwon's dominance, the Jazz reversed those trends Friday night and beat the Houston Rockets 95-86 to cut their deficit to 2-1 in the Western Conference final.

The Jazz, who never trailed, got strong contributions from almost every player. Karl Malone had 22 points and 16 rebounds, Jeff Hornacek had 17 points, Jay Humphries 15, David Benoit 14, John Stockton 13 points and 11 assists and Tom Chambers added 10 points.

In the first two games, only three players - Malone, Hornacek and Stockton - scored more than 15 points in a game.

Olajuwon missed his first eight shots of the game, misfired on seven of 16 free throws and was reluctant to pass the ball when faced with double coverage. He finished with 29 points and 13 rebounds, but was easily his worst game of the series.

Utah opened a 12-point lead at halftime, upped it to 18 in the third quarter and didn't let Houston get closer than eight in the final period.

Utah had a 53-39 edge in rebounding, made 4-of-7 3-pointers while Houston went 6-of-21 from

beyond the stripe, and shot 42 percent to Houston's 36.

The Jazz will look to even the best-of-7 series in Game 4 on Sunday afternoon.

After going 4-for-15 from the field in the first three quarters, Malone hit his first three shots of the final period as Utah took an 84-67 lead. Humphries' 3-pointer with 5:45 left made it 89-74, and from there it was only a matter of keeping Houston from going on too big of a run. The Rockets missed 15 of their first 18 shots in the quarter, but had a 7-0 run after Humphries' basket to get the



The first two periods were noteworthy for the poor shooting by Olajuwon (4-for-15) and Malone (2-for-10) and for Houston's four technical fouls, none of which were

prompted by any ranting or raving.

Rutherford recalls special Indy 500 victory

FORT WORTH, Texas - Twenty years ago, Johnny Rutherford was preparing to win the 58th Indianapolis 500 and to lose his father.

That was the bittersweet script John Sherman Rutherford III dealt with on May 26, 1974. Eleven years after his first race at the Indianapolis Motor Speedway, Rutherford rolled into Victory Lane for the traditional swig of milk, donning of the laurel wreath and promise of motor racing immortality.

Back home in Fort Worth, John Rutherford Jr., Johnny's 61-year-old father, climbed back into his bed. Cancer would end his life in two months, but at that moment he and his son were scripted onto the same page. They were dealing with immortality.

"In Victory Lane I said that I wanted to dedicate the race to my father, who was seriously ill in Fort Worth," said Rutherford, who made no mention of the disease his father had been silently battling for two years. "It was really the first (public) notice I had made of the illness."

"It was very sad. He was doing all he could, but we knew it was a matter of time. He'd been to all of my other 10 races at Indy. He just couldn't be there in 1974."

The elder Rutherford settled for listening on radio and watching on television, tuning in as his 36-year-old son drove the race of a lifetime.

En route to victory, Rutherford overcame a rules snafu that had relegated him to the 25th starting position in the field of 33 cars despite having posted the month's second-fastest speed.

He raced wheel-to-wheel against an oil-spewing A.J. Foyt, the pole-sitter who was in the prime of his storied career with three Indy 500 victories.

military general and several corporate chieftains promptly held private meetings after the season's end.

The board contemplated personnel changes and mapped out a three- to five-year plan for winning a championship.

For days word leaked out that the board was debating the ouster of vice president Bob Bass and coach John Lucas. Those threats led to the May 12 resignation of Spurs president Bob Coleman, who cited philosophical differences with the governing board and proclaimed his support for Bass and Lucas.

A search is on for Bass's replacement, and the name circulating the most is Gregg Popovich, former Spurs assistant coach and currently a Golden State assistant coach.

If Popovich comes aboard, and even if he doesn't, questions remain

Combined with impeccable pit work by his Team McLaren crew, Rutherford's tiny orange race car led 122 of the 200 laps around the two-and-a-half-mile oval.

"It was almost like it was predestined," said Rutherford, then in his second season of driving for Team McLaren. Founded by driver-designer Bruce McLaren of New Zealand, Team McLaren was the Team Penske of its day. The wedge-shaped M16 McLaren, powered by a 4-cylinder turbocharged Drake Offenhauser engine, represented cutting-edge technology.

None of that, however, impressed Tom Binford, rookie chief steward for the race-sanctioning U.S. Auto Club. In his book, "A Checkered Past," Binford set up the most unusual qualifying scenario in race history.

The "energy crisis" of 1974 affected the entire country, and the Speedway was no exception," Binford recalled. "To save fuel, instead of four days of qualifications, we had four 'sessions' of 3 1/2 hours instead. The sessions were held on two Saturdays, and practice was eliminated during qualifying."

Before the first session, the Offy engine in Rutherford's No. 3 machine blew up. Rutherford's crew executed a record 58-minute engine change, but the car was not in its place in the qualifying line when the session began at 11 a.m.

Harlan Fengler, the former chief steward had interpreted the rule that if you were in line when your time came up to qualify, you were legal," Rutherford said. "Binford said you had to be in line at 11, when qualifying started. He had his cronies checking numbers up and down the line and when we weren't there, we were sent to the end of the line."

Along with Al Unser Sr., who had

suffered a similar engine problem, Rutherford in effect had been relegated to the "third day" of qualifying. He and his car - among the fastest all month in practice - were not eligible for the pole position.

That went to Houston's Foyt, who qualified his Gilmore Racing Team entry at 191.632 mph. Rutherford averaged 190.446, good for the "pole" of the ninth of 11 rows.

"When Johnny came into my office later to discuss the matter, he slammed his helmet on the floor for emphasis," Binford said.

"I knew the car was good and quick," Rutherford said, "but the reality was we had the deficit of starting 25th."

Ten laps into the race, Rutherford was up to fourth - a gain of 21 positions. He was third on lap 20 and second at lap 30. On lap 65, he took the lead from Foyt for what would be the first of a series of position swaps.

"We raced real hard and then Foyt's engine finally began throwing a lot of oil," Rutherford said. "All of a sudden - whack - I was just covered up with oil. I backed off 75 or 100 yards and watched him and the track."

Foyt, who had led 70 laps that day, ultimately headed for the pits after completing 142 laps. As key as Foyt's exit was to Rutherford's victory, Betty Rutherford, Johnny's wife, pointed to an equally important factor.

"The turning point was we hit every pit stop exactly when we wanted to," said Betty, who under the Speedway's liberalized track rules was allowed to perform her scoring and timing duties from the pits for the first time in '74.

Rutherford made eight pit stops that day, consuming a flawless 5 minutes, 43 seconds.

"The confidence he had that May relayed itself to the whole crew," Betty

said. "None of us had ever experienced a victory before. We were eager to find out what it was like."

Rutherford needed 3 hours, 9 minutes and 10.06 seconds to cover the distance at an average speed of 158.589 mph. He finished 21 seconds ahead of Bobby Unser, who like J.R., was a three-time winner-to-be.

Back in Fort Worth, Rutherford's father - a former Air Force mechanic


who had raced motorcycles and Midget cars - took a phone call from his son.

"He sat up to watch the race, but as soon as it was over he went back to bed," Rutherford said. "He was virtually never out of bed again until he died in July. It was almost like he hung on until the dream was realized."

Rutherford walked into Victory Lane in 1976 after the rain-shortened, 255-mile race. In 1980, he started from

the pole and dominated en route to Indy victory No. 3 in the Chaparral of Midland's Jim Hall.

"The 1974 victory is the one I rank best," said Rutherford, whose 24th and most recent Indy 500 start was in 1988. "That classic battle with A.J., a tremendous team and race car and winning it for my dad ... all those things happened just right and made it very sweet."

Author says West Texas was a music mecca

"In my semi-official capacity as a person supposedly capable of explaining Texas to normal people, this theater asked me to explain to San Franciscans why so many great musicians come from Lubbock. How fortunate that I know: There's nothing else to do in Lubbock," Molly Ivins, Dallas Times Herald, Feb. 3, 1987.

LUBBOCK, Texas (AP) - In the years when Buddy Holly played his guitar on the roof of the Hi-D-Ho hamburger drive-in, Hope Griffith was recording rock 'n' roll tunes like "Harborin' the Blues."

Hope who?

"For every Buddy Holly there were a lot of us people who were involved you never heard of," says Hope Griffith Crabtree, a Lubbock woman who now teaches at Floydada High School.

Never heard of the Picks? That trio of Texas Tech University students sang backup to Holly.

Or how 'bout the Velvets, the Odessa teen-agers who sang doo-wop with their English teacher in the early 1960s?

Those aspiring artists - along with

legends like Holly and Roy Orbison - made the windy plains of the Lone Star State what author Bill Griggs considers a musical mecca.

Griggs' "A Who's Who" of West Texas Rock 'N' Roll Music looks at 98 singers, songwriters and others who made their mark in the 1950s and '60s.

The 55-page publication (\$9.95) features anecdotes, tidbits and snapshots that capture slick-haired performers wearing ties while strumming out the new sound of teen-age rebellion.

"From Amarillo to Odessa, I'd stack West Texas (recording talent) up against any other part of the world," Griggs said. "This gives the whole story, gives them some credit and due."

The magazine-style format includes profiles of Holly and the Crickets of Lubbock; Orbison, from Wink; Waylon Jennings, from Littlefield; and Buddy Knox, from Happy. Others hailed from towns like Meadow, Aspermont and Ropesville.

"People in this particular area do not realize themselves how much talent and influence Lubbock and this area had," said disc jockey Larry

Byers, who contributed to the booklet. "If it wasn't for those early rock pioneers, the modern performers wouldn't have something to go on."

Griggs and others describe a cozy atmosphere in which the hit-makers and wannabes in West Texas knew each other and played together. The influence went both ways, they said.

"Some of the best songs I ever heard were from people who didn't make it," said Virgil Johnson, the teacher who recorded with his students at Odessa's Blackshear High School.

Music fans will find a wealth of trivia in Griggs' work: Radio stations, for instance, refused in 1961 to play "Big Bad John" until Jimmy Dean of Plainview struck the word "hell" from the last line of his biggest hit.

Other details, though, are sketchy: Griggs knows the names of only three of Borger's Five Bops.

Photographs show the performers in concert, at the recording studio, at radio stations and on album covers.

Griggs, the 52-year-old founder of the Buddy Holly Memorial Society, said rock 'n' roll became a popular outlet for rural teen-agers trying to entertain themselves.

"You have to transport yourself

back to 1950s West Texas," he said. "If you weren't into farming, there was nothing else to do."

Mrs. Crabtree said performers back then didn't think in terms of laying the bedrock for future rock

music.

"If you had told any of us at the time that that was what was happening, I'm sure we would have said, ha ha, forget you," said Mrs. Crabtree, who cites Eric Clapton and Robert

Plant as her current favorites.

"We tend to romanticize it, and I'm sure every bit of it wasn't as fun as I remember, but there really was a nice sense of freedom in what everybody was doing."

Senior gospel singalongs bring back 'Good Old Days'

STANTON, Texas - Years ago, going to visit Grandma was one of the highlights of a child's life. Grandma and Grandpa provided those extras that were unique only to them.

Who else could bake cookies that tasted so good? Who else would give you a clove to put on a toothache? Where else would someone put a smelly mustard poultice on your chest when you had a cold?

Nowadays, some people say that those are days gone forever.

But they're not.

In fact, a good old fashioned recipe has taken hold in Stanton every second Tuesday of the month. Like the mustard poultice, it offers relief - a remedy from the rat race of everyday life.

What has taken hold in Stanton, and across West Texas, is senior citizen gospel singing.

"Tis a lovely land, a wonderland, where the angels sing ..."

More than 40 seniors - many of them from Midland and Big Spring - turn out to sing their favorite hymns once a month.

They travel to as many areas and organizations that they are able to. They sing whenever and wherever they can.

"We don't have a whole bunch to do and we love to sing," explains Midland's Pat Merritt.

"We're too old to do much of anything else," he jokes.

"Speak for yourself," pipes in Pat Cates. "I've still got a lot of plans."

Foot tapping and hand clapping, shouts and loud hallelujahs frequently are heard when the seniors are singing.

May Wood Kelley, who just turned 80, practically dances a jig while encouraging her friends to sing. She stomps, claps, and belts out a strong alto.

The Seniors take turns leading songs, choosing favorites and joking with each other. All are quick to point out that they are not "Old Soreheads."

"We're just a bunch of older folks who love to sing," explains Edna Moore of Lenorah. "We love it when visitors come. This is a wonderful way to make new friends."

And visitors are truly welcome, almost to a fault. The group won't allow anyone to sit in the back and stay uninvolved. Instead, they're

quick to find a seat, a book and a friend for anyone new to the gospel singing scene.

Anyone in attendance may be asked to lead the singing, or may even be motivated to "volunteer." Volunteering may be in the form of being taken by the hand and being led to the front of the room.

"I'm not sure I can do this," one senior was overheard to say. "It's been a lot of years, but don't ask me how many," she joked.

When a song was repeated, the group joined in razzing their songmate. "Boy, we just sang that one ... but then again age does make the memory fade," someone piped up. "I'm glad I'm not that old!" added another.

Yes, the gospel-singing seniors sing about angels. They sing about sunshine being in their soul. And they sing about lands where "living waters flow."



Bush library being sorted inside old bowling alley

History is being sorted and organized in an old bowling alley.

In fact, there's so much history the people doing the work behind the walls of the unmarked building in a nondescript shopping strip have had to cram some of the stuff next door in what used to be the kitchen of a Chinese restaurant.

The unlikely setting is the temporary home of 36 million pages of documents, one million photographs and 40,000 objects that will become the George Bush Presidential Library and Museum at Texas A&M University.

"Our job is to preserve, arrange and review and ultimately try to make as much available as we can to the American people," says David Alsobrook, acting director of the Bush Presidential Materials Project.

The actual library and museum—an \$83 million project—is about 90 percent complete on an engineer's drawing board. Groundbreaking is planned for November with dedication in 1997.

That means Alsobrook and his staff of 10 researchers from the National Archives have three years to catalog and organize items that filled four C-5A cargo planes in the days just before Bush vacated the White House in January 1993.

The material isn't confined to Bush's presidency. Other items come from his eight years as vice president, his tenure as a Texas congressman, as CIA director and other government stops that accounted for dozens of moves his family made around the globe.

They even include scarred furniture that made many of the moves and date back to home movies of Bush as a child. The museum also has the left-handed first baseman's glove Bush used as at Yale. "BUSH," prominent in capital block letters, was carved into the leather decades ago.

The crates and boxes were flown from Andrews Air Force Base in Washington to Texas' Fort Hood, where they were transferred to 20 tractor trailer trucks for delivery to the old Chimney Hill Bowl in College Station.

But material from all over the world continues to arrive as foreign governments and ordinary citizens deliver gifts and Bush memorabilia.

"This is not a static collection," says Patricia Burchfield, the museum curator. "It's forever growing."

"Every day is like Christmas around here. There's some really spectacular things."

Like a gold model of a Saudi palace and gold swords and jewelry from grateful Saudis and Kuwaitis for Bush's role in the Gulf War.

There's a saddle from Mexico, at least two golf bags and sets of clubs, a porcelain candelabra from Germany.

Items range from tiny jewel boxes to a section of the Berlin Wall.

"What you're looking at here is

very recent American history," says Alsobrook, who spent 10 years at the Carter Presidential Library in Georgia before drawing the Bush assignment.

"I've always found it very exciting and interesting. Sometimes you never know what you might find next."

One man from Oklahoma who served in Desert Storm sent a piece of marble column he said came from Saddam Hussein's summer palace in northern Iraq.

An emir from Kuwait sent Bush a door from his palace, trimmed with gold and engraved with the names of American soldiers killed during Desert Storm.

Researchers don rubber gloves to handle many of the items.

According to federal law, anything given to Bush and worth more than \$180 becomes property of the government.

While archivists assign no monetary value, the collection obviously is priceless.

Uniformed guards patrol the premises. There's closed-circuit television monitors and sophisticated electronic detectors along walls and doors. Some printed material is classified, will remain so for years and is open only to those with top-secret clearances.

"We've got every piece of important campaign memorabilia that deals with George Bush," says Ms. Burchfield, who spent 20 years at the Lyndon Johnson Library in Austin.

Rows of shelves hold campaign signs, banners, buttons, even a huge likeness of Bush's head that someone wore at a Republican National Convention.

Organizers are planning on a rotating display of the objects in the museum to keep visitors returning.

Another warehouse-like room that once served as lanes for the bowling alley now has 58 lanes of stacked shelves filled with boxes of printed documents.

"You just take little bites," Alsobrook says of the daunting task of going over each item.

While Alsobrook and his staff try to organize the Bush collection, Don Wilson is charged with finding a way to pay for the three-building complex on a 90-acre site at the west end of the Texas A&M campus, across from the A&M goat and sheep center.

The museum and library will be the centerpiece of the Center for Presidential Studies, the Center for Public Leadership Studies, the Center for International Studies, the George Bush School of Government and Public Service and several Texas A&M academic departments.

The university has committed \$41 million. Wilson, executive director of the Bush Presidential Library Foundation and former director of the Gerald Ford Library, has raised about half of the \$42 million he needs. He expects to complete the fundraising in a year.

"We're in good shape," he says. "It's not a tough sell."

The buildings will be of Texas limestone trimmed in pink Texas

granite, include a rotunda area and be of a style known as "simplified federalist."

Bush, who is kept apprised regularly of the project, has insisted it be a working place for historians and students.

"He's a little bit self-conscious and really doesn't want this to be a monument," Wilson says. "But he's pretty comfortable with it and very interested because he wants to spend a lot of time here."

Wilson says computer technology should make the Bush library the most high-tech of the 10 presidential libraries operated by the National Archives.

Computerization of written documents already is making the job or sorting documents somewhat easier. Historians eventually will be able to use key words or phrases to find what Bush said about a particular subject and when he said it.

For example, historians will be able to note that in 6,786 speeches or public statements, Bush mentioned his not-so-favorite vegetable—broccoli—54 times.

Geena Davis and Michael Keaton play a Democrat and a Republican in "Speechless." The movie is set for release in December.

Carville directed President Clinton's 1992 victory. Matalin was a strategist in the Bush re-election campaign. They were married last year.

BATON ROUGE, La. (AP) - Gov. Edwin Edwards got a new bride and Louisiana a new first lady.

"I'm very nervous, but a happy nervous," Candace Picou Edwards, a 29-year-old operating room nurse, said after the wedding Thursday.

"I'm a happy man," echoed Edwards, 66, who met his wife in 1990 when he was representing a client in court and she was a legal secretary.

Cancer patients receiving treatment in the Harrington Cancer Center's service areas are eligible for financial support. The Circle of Friends assists with services not covered by insurance or available through other agencies. Limited funds are available for out-of-pocket expenses such as travel, lodging, prescribed nutritional supplements and other special needs. Assistance is provided on a short-term basis for crisis situations.

Information about financial support through the organization can be obtained by contacting the Harrington Cancer Center, Director of Supportive Care at 1-359-4673 or by calling 1-800-274-HOPE. At the patient or family's request, the health care provider conducts a brief financial assessment which helps patients and families define their needs and explore available resources.

Applications are referred to the Division of Supportive Care of the Harrington Cancer Center. Requests for assistance are reviewed by the Financial Support Advisory Committee comprised of health care professionals from community agencies and cancer patients. The Advisory Committee meets monthly to review applications which are considered on an individual basis. Funds are distributed immediately after application approval.

The Circle of Friends' socials are held as one of the two major sources of funding. The other fundraiser is the sales of the Caring Touch Christmas Cards. Each November area school children are given the opportunity to enter their Christmas card designs in a contest. More than 1,000 entries are received each year and the designs of the six top winners are used for general sales. Neiman Marcus stores also sell these cards.

The Circle of Friends hosts holiday parties for children in the pediatric oncology department and the organization also sponsors a Hereford child to attend Camp Alphic, a camp for pediatric patients in the summer. In addition, members provide lunches for the Parents Camps.

The organization also supports weekly "dialogue" support groups for cancer survivors and their families. The weekly meetings are held so that participants may talk, listen and learn.

While you are here enrolling your child, get a book for yourself. Among

the new books this week is the *Fist of God* by Frederick Forsyth. This story about the Persian Gulf War is set at a neck breaking pace. In an effort to penetrate the Iraqi regime, British intelligence working with Israel's Mossad contact "Jericho," a mole in Iraq who is part of Saddam's government. It is Major Mike Martin's job to identify and contact "Jericho." Disguised as an Arab, Major Martin begins his mission. General Schwarzkopf and his colleagues are haunted by a scenario in which Saddam used his ultimate weapon. It is up to Major Martin and "Jericho" to locate that weapon in time.

Loyalties: A novel of World War II by historian Thomas Fleming is a "dazzling mosaic of men and women caught in the crossfire of history." Kapitanleutnant Ernst von Hoffmann commands the submarine that

torpedoes and destroys the USS Spencer Lewis off the coast of Iceland. Lieutenant Commander Jonathan Trumbull Talbot is denouncing President Roosevelt's unconstitutional, undeclared war against Germany when the torpedo cuts his destroyer in half. In Berlin Berthe Von Hoffmann, Ernst's wife, becomes a part of the German Secret Service and the Schwarze Kapelle - a circle of courageous men and women sickened by Hitler's war on the Jews, who comprise the secret supremely dangerous resistance to Nazism. After Pearl Harbor catapults America into the war these three meet in Spain which results in a tangled web of love, jealousy and patriotic deceit.

Clive Cussler's *Inca Gold* begins in 1532 when a fleet of ships secretly sail to an island in the middle of an inland sea. There a magnificent treasure is hidden with only a great

stone demon left to stand guard over the hoard. After the treasure is hidden all those involved disappear. In 1578 Sir Francis Drake captures a Spanish galleon containing Inca gold, silver, and the key to the lost treasure, Drake's ship is destroyed by a tidal wave while trying to return to England. In 1998 a group of archaeologists diving into a sacrificial pool high in the Andes of Peru, almost drown, Dirk Pitt who is in the area on a marine expedition arrives just in time to save the archaeologists. The archaeologists and Dirk find themselves in a struggle for survival when a party of smugglers searching for the lost ancient treasure arrive. The battle of wits in a race against time and danger includes art thieves, the FBI, Customs Service, local Indians, Pitt and his NUMA friends and an unexplained under-

ground river that runs through the ancient treasure chamber.

Reba: My Story by Reba McEntire is the story of a star so rare and popular that she is known by her first name. In Chockie Oklahoma Reba grew up as a part of a hardworking rodeo and ranching family. "This little red-headed girl started singing, and it just blew me away," says Reba. As a teenager Reba began to perform in FVV halls, honky-tonks, fair shows and "holes-in-the-wall" dance halls, where dances were more like fistfights set to music. With fierce determination Reba set out to challenge the experts who believed female singers could never match the popularity of male singers. 

HEALTH CLAIMS

A health claim is any claim on the food label that describes a relationship between a food or food component and a disease or health-related condition. To make a health claim, a food must meet specific nutrient levels that are set by the government.

A health claim is only allowed if it is approved for regulation. The Food and Drug Administration (FDA) has authorized health claims for seven diet and health relationships that are supported by sound science. Foods that qualify may make more than one of these health claims. The seven areas in which health claims are allowed are the following:

*Calcium and Osteoporosis
*Fiber-containing grain products, fruits, vegetables and cancer.
*Fruits and vegetables and cancer
*Fruits, vegetables and grain products that contain fiber and coronary heart disease.
*Fat and cancer
*Saturated fat and cholesterol and



How to stop the spots, stains

While no home is immune to everyday spills and stains, your house doesn't have to show it.

Here are a few hints on restraining those stains.

-To remove mineral stains or cloudiness from the bottom of an ornamental bottle, fill it partially with water and ammonia and let it stand for several hours or overnight, then rinse it thoroughly.

-A piece of lemon dipped in salt may remove corrosion from brass. The piece can then be finished with brass polish.

-Grease spots on wooden furniture can sometimes come out if you wipe them carefully with cleaning fluid and then polish.

-To clean a pleated lampshade, take it outside and spray it with a can of compressed air.

-If your carpet or upholstery is what's got the spot, remember the faster you treat it, the better the treatment will work. Many turn to a powerful, lightweight, portable deep cleaning machine.

When a spray cleaning solution is applied to a stain, a residue may be left behind on the carpet or upholstery. The residue acts like a magnet, attracting additional dirt to the area.

Carpet, in fact, may be a friend to those who suffer allergies; it traps and holds allergens, which can be removed with appropriate cleaning.

Fortunately, mites and their allergens can be greatly reduced, say experts. Here's how:

-Monitor moisture. Fix leaks promptly and use dehumidifiers to control damp conditions.

-More air. Open the windows! An

air cleaner on your home's heating and cooling system, or free-standing room air cleaners featuring a high-efficiency particulate (HEPA) filter may also be helpful.

-Clean effectively. Vacuuming and cleaning carpet and other furnishings can reduce dust particulate and allergens significantly. Dry extraction carpet cleaning systems, such as the rental and professional systems reduce live dust mite populations and dust mite allergen levels by over 70 percent, studies show.

Here are some additional cleaning tips:

-Use an upright, revolving-brush vacuum. Disposable bags are recommended.

-Dust furnishings with damp pick-up cloths.

-If you're especially sensitive to dust, leave the house while vacuuming and dusting chores are being completed.





Construct fences to fit the surroundings

Americans, since the first settlers, have always been enthusiastic fence builders. Early fences contained livestock, while today's fences are used to frame the lawn, define boundaries and provide privacy.

When you consider building a fence, pick a style that will fit its surroundings. Then measure the proposed perimeter to see how many sections you'll need.

Most fences are built in 6- or 8-foot sections. Posts are commonly 4x4s, although 6x6s and 8x8s are sometimes required for corners and gateposts. Rails, the horizontal bars, are 2x4s, and fence pickets or vertical boards may be 1x4s or 1x6s.

To prevent rust from staining the wood, use aluminum or hot-dipped, galvanized nails and hardware. Estimate the amount of gravel you'll need for drainage. If you set the posts in concrete below the frost line, figure that a 90-pound bag of pre-mixed concrete occupies about two-thirds of a cubic foot.

Use wood that has been pressure treated with a preservative to resist rot and insects, or wood that resists decay naturally, such as cedar, redwood, cypress and locust.

Begin laying out the fence by locating the corner posts and driving in stakes. Then run mason's twine

tautly between two corner stakes. Mark the correct on-center position of each intermediate fence post on the twine with chalk. A plumb line against the mark centers each post on the ground. Drive a stake here.

In loose, sandy soil, it's best to set posts in concrete - but only in frost-free areas or where the concrete will be below the frost line. Generally, set one-third of the post in the ground. Start with the corner posts.

Whether you set a post in gravel or concrete, dig the hole 4 to 6 inches deeper than the post bottom for drainage material - a large flat stone or gravel bed. Flare the hole at the bottom for good support. Then stand the post in the hole on the drainage material.

To set the post in earth, fill in with 6 inches of gravel and tamp it solidly before replacing and tamping the excavated soil. Fill several inches at a time and tamp each layer.

Lay a level vertically on two sides of the post to make sure it's plumb. Add a last layer of rocks at ground level and cap with a tamped-earth cone to drain water away from the post. In concrete, make the hole 6 inches deeper for gravel, set the post on the gravel and fill around it with concrete. Slope the top for drainage.





IT COULD HAPPEN

I don't have a crystal ball. I don't even claim to be a futurist. I certainly can't predict the future. However, that doesn't keep me from speculating on what may happen in the next few years.

Two areas of business I've been watching with some interest are the finance and the fast food industries. There have been many changes in both of these industries over the past 10 years. We may see some significant reorganization in the next five years.







3. She was a victim of childhood sexual abuse?




Solutions to critical issues studied

LUBBOCK - Recommendations for solutions to critical issues facing the food and fiber industry in Texas in the 21st Century were prepared during a recent conference at Texas Tech University.

Some 200 "stakeholders" in the future of Texas agriculture gathered to seek solutions to five critical issues.

Issues -- identified during the Texas Agricultural Summit last October at Texas A&M University -- steps recommended at the TTU conference are:

-- Protecting the environment and natural resources: use economics to promote wise use of resources, compensate landowners for desirable use or non-use of resources, take interdisciplinary, regional approaches

to problems and concerns, get agencies working together.

-- Competitiveness of Texas agriculture: accelerate technology, explain research benefits to public, promote commodity checkoffs for research, reorganize to avoid duplication, develop additional value-added enterprises, maintain a highly-skilled, highly-educated agricultural work force.

-- Public policy for agriculture and rural areas: build coalitions between urban, municipal and agricultural sectors to develop win-win plans to benefit all, develop an agricultural group or agency to educate the public on values and importance of agriculture.

-- Education and information needs of consumers: form an alliance

to develop a united agricultural message for Texas, search and identify existing successful programs, seek funding sources to implement education programs, target specific audiences for programs and implement and expand such programs.

-- Agricultural leadership for the 21st Century: encourage pro-active, risk-taking agricultural leadership, coordinate and publicize existing programs to train leaders, make programs bilingual, build coalitions to speak for agriculture with a common voice.

State Rep. Pete Laney of Hale Center, Texas House speaker, in an address to the conference cautioned that solutions "can't be put on hold" and said that the next session of the Legislature is expected to consider

actions that are within the issues.

Also addressing the conference, State Sen. John Montford of Lubbock, observed that agriculture contributes \$13 billion in cash receipts to the Texas economy, with "\$4 billion of that from right here in West Texas."

Texas agriculture is competing in the international arena with China, Germany, Japan and Russia, said Montford.

He also assured the conference that the Legislature will pay "very close attention to what you report out and what you come up with" in the discussions.

The conference at Texas Tech was one of five being held across the state to address the issues identified in the summit in October.

"Whether you are 18 or 80 - you need a living will. Think of it as an insurance policy that will safeguard your end-of-life wishes, so that your loved ones don't suffer outrage in addition to grief," explained Karen Orloff Kaplan, Sc.D., Executive Director of Choice in Dying.

Here are facts you should know about "advance directives" (the general term for a living will or a durable power of attorney for health care):

-A living will is a legal document that lets you indicate your wishes about accepting or rejecting medical treatments at the end of life, if you

become unable to speak for yourself.

-A durable power of attorney for health care is a legal document that allows you to appoint someone you trust, such as a spouse or adult child, to make medical treatment decisions for you if you are unable to do so yourself.

-Although all 50 states have passed some type of legislation enabling Americans to sign advance directives, few people exercise this legal right. A recent poll reveals that 75 percent of Americans approve of living wills, but only 20 percent actually sign them.

-Laws authorizing living wills vary from state to state. Preparing the form is not difficult, and does not require a lawyer. However it's essential to ensure that the advance directive conforms with state law.

-Choice In Dying provides free, state-authorized advance directives and has trained staff that can answer questions about advance directives and state law. The group also provides information to families struggling with end-of-life medical treatment decisions. The phone number is (800)-989-WILL(9455).


Branson tour set June 14-18

Reduce your sleep deficit

Following are some tips to help ensure that you get the better sleep you need:

Keep Regular Hours. Try to go to bed at the same time each night and wake up at the same time each morning - even on weekends.

Exercise regularly. Some form of exercise, for 20 to 30 minutes at least three days a week is ideal - but be sure not to exercise too close to bedtime.

Cut down on stimulants. Consuming stimulants such as caffeine in the evening makes it harder to fall asleep.

Sleep on a good bed. It's difficult to get deep, restful sleep on a bed that's too small, too soft, too hard or too old. It won't provide the comfort and support you need to rest well.

Don't smoke. Smokers take longer to fall asleep, awaken more often and spend less time in deep sleep.

Drink only in moderation. Drinking alcohol before bed makes it difficult to fall asleep, interrupts the sleep stages and causes awakenings in the early-morning hours.

Unwind early in the evening. Try to deal with worries and distractions before going to bed.

Don't go to bed stuffed or starved. A stomach that is either too full or too empty may cause physical discomfort, making it difficult to sleep through the night.

Fat foods that can help you sleep. If you're hungry and can't get to sleep, try eating foods that contain the amino

SOCIAL SECURITY QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS

Q • When I changed wallets, I must have left my Social Security card in the old one. How can I get a replacement?

A: If your card has been lost or stolen, you can get an application for a free replacement card by calling the toll-free number, 1-800-772-1213, or by visiting our office located at 3501-E W. 45th. If you come to the office to apply in person, please be sure you have personal identification, usually a driver's license. If you are not sure what identification is acceptable, call us at 376-2241.

Q: My sister's diabetes has been getting progressively worse and we think it is likely she will need kidney dialysis at some point in the not too distant future. She's 54, unmarried and doesn't make a lot of money. Is there a government program that would help her out?

A: Yes. Under Medicare, there are special rules for people with permanent kidney failure. Under these rules, your sister is eligible for hospital insurance regardless of her age if she is receiving maintenance dialysis or a kidney transplant. She must also have worked long enough under covered employment to be insured for Medicare. Have her contact her nearest SSA office as soon as possible.

Q: Last year I filed for an extension on my Federal income tax return, but Social Security penalized me for filing my annual earnings report late. I don't think that's fair. Do you?

A: The Internal Revenue Service and the Social Security Administration are different agencies with different reporting requirements. You would need approval from EACH agency to be late with each report that you needed to file. If you are not certain what SSA's reporting requirements are, please contact us at 376-2241.

Q: After retiring, I found I had more time on my hands than I needed. I'm thinking about taking a weekend job as a starter at a local golf course. How much can I earn before Social Security will reduce my benefits?

A: In 1994, people under 65 can earn \$8,040 before their benefits are reduced. Those who are ages 65-69 will be able to earn \$11,160 without a reduction. The amount of the reduction is \$1 for every \$2 earned over \$8,040 for individuals under 65 and \$1 for every \$3 of earnings over \$11,160 for those age 65-69. There is no earnings limit for people age 70 and older.

Put the puzzle pieces together

Studies are currently being conducted at the University Medical Center in conjunction with researchers at the Texas Tech University Health Sciences Center to determine whether the synthetic hormone tamoxifen is effective in preventing breast cancer and whether the drug finasteride is effective in preventing prostate cancer.

Although results from the studies will not be available for several years, researchers are hopeful that a breakthrough will be made in preventing these types of cancers for those individuals at a high risk for developing the diseases.

Although many cancers cannot be prevented, many needless deaths can be prevented by early detection. Routine cancer-related checkups are the best means of early detection for many cancers. Awareness of changes in the body and prompt medical attention can lead to an early diagnosis with an excellent chance for successful treatment.

The possibility of one dramatic cure for all types of cancer seems unlikely today. Most realistically, the next few decades will probably see continual advances in preventing and earlier detection. By putting together all of the pieces, the puzzle of cancer prevention will eventually become a clear picture for everyone affected by this disease.

New car buyers are being misled

Expecting something for nothing can only hurt a consumer in most cases, especially when it comes to new-car purchase, experts agree.

New-car buyers may have been misled by recent stories that a fair dealer profit for a new car or truck is \$100 to \$300 over dealer invoice, says the National Automobile Dealers Association (NADA).

"It's irresponsible and a disservice to consumers to lead them to believe they can make that kind of a deal," says NADA President Jim Lust. "For a new-car dealer, who has a huge financial and personal investment in his or her business, to accept \$100 to \$300 over dealer invoice on a product that averages \$18,000 would be a shortcut to bankruptcy."

One of the great myths of the retail auto industry, according to Lust, is that dealers are making a huge profit on the sale of new cars. "In reality, dealers today make an average of less than seven percent gross profit on the sale of a new vehicle. From that gross profit, dealerships must pay their operating costs, which include facilities, equipment, interest on inventories, advertising and employee salaries and training. After those expenses are deducted, there is very

little, if any, net profit from the sale of a new vehicle," he says.

NADA research data shows that the average dealership actually lost money on the sale of new vehicles in 1990 and 1991, and barely broke even in 1992. The average net profit before taxes from all dealership sales, which includes used cars and service and parts, was one percent from 1988 to 1991, and 1.5 percent in 1992.

"To sell and service today's high-tech cars and trucks and to satisfy today's more educated and more demanding customers, all dealerships have invested heavily in training, equipment and facilities," says Lust. "They cannot be expected to sell their products at no profit or a loss."

New-car buyers have the advantage of a manufacturer suggested list price required by law to be attached to every new vehicle. In most cases, this represents a fair market price and a reasonable, not excessive, markup for dealers.

"The actual sale price will depend on the demand for that particular model, the value of your trade in and any rebates or other buyer incentives offered by the manufacturer or dealer on that model," says Lust.

Help prevent medication errors

The most important thing you can do to prevent a medication error is to ask questions and make sure you understand the answers.

Make sure you know the name and strength of the medicine you are taking. Ask your physician, or other prescriber to print the name of the medicine and the directions for taking the drug.

Ask your physician questions about the medication. Be sure you know:

-How the medicine is supposed to work.

-What side effects might occur and how long they could last.

-What to do if the medicine doesn't seem to be working.

Discuss your medication with the pharmacist. This helps to catch errors that may have occurred when reading and transcribing the written or phoned prescription. Be sure you know:

- what the medicine is for
- how to take it
- when to take it
- how long to take it

Be sure to take your medication as the directions say you should. Medicines don't have the end result you want and need if they're not taken as instructed. If you are taking a medicine for a chronic condition, it is especially important that you understand how the medicine is to be taken: how much, how often, for how long, and what to do if you miss a dose.

Remember, when you take a medicine or help others to take theirs, you become part of the human drug therapy chain. As a patient or a caregiver, your responsibility is to make sure you understand what the medicine is for, how it looks, how it should be taken, what results to expect, and what to do if you don't see the results.



Nutrition Notes

Nutrition labeling will be available for almost all foods under new FDA labeling rules.

Manufacturers were given to May 8, 1994 to comply with the new labeling rules. They must comply with the rules for meat and poultry products by July 6, 1994.

In addition, nutrition information is currently voluntary for fresh fruits and vegetables and raw fish at point of purchase.

The FSIS rules require mandatory labeling for most meat and poultry products except raw, single-ingredient products such as raw chicken breasts. The information is based on products "as packaged"—it does not include additional consumer preparation such as frying in oil. A label may also include information "as consumed."

Although the labeling for raw produce and raw meat, fish, and poultry is voluntary, the regulations carry strong incentives for retailers to participate. If voluntary compliance is not adequate, nutrition information for such raw foods will become mandatory.

FDA and FSIS have exemptions for certain products:

3. Food in small packages;
4. Food shipped in bulk.

The new food label will have a new title on the nutrition panel. "Nutrition Facts" will replace "Nutrition Information per Serving." A new set of dietary components will be provided on the nutrition panel.

The mandatory and voluntary (underlined) components and the order in which they must appear on FDA-regulated foods are as follows:

1. Total calories
2. Calories from fat
3. Calories from saturated fat
4. Total fat
5. Saturated fat
6. Polyunsaturated fat
7. Monounsaturated fat
8. Cholesterol
9. Sodium
10. Potassium
11. Total carbohydrate
12. Dietary fiber
13. Soluble fiber
14. Unsoluble fiber
15. Sugars
16. Sugar alcohols
17. Other carbohydrate
18. Protein
19. Vitamin A
20. Vitamin C
21. Calcium
22. Iron
23. Other essential vitamins and minerals.

If a claim is made about any of the

optional components, or if a food is fortified or enriched with any of them, nutrition information for these components then become mandatory.

The aforementioned mandatory and voluntary components are the only ones allowed on the nutrition panel. The required nutrients were selected because they address today's health concerns. The order in which they must appear reflects the priority of current dietary recommendations.

In addition to the aforementioned components, FSIS will also allow stearic acid to be listed voluntarily.

TERMS ON FOOD LABELS

GENERAL TERMS

Free: "nutritionally trivial" and unlikely to have a physiological consequence.

High: 20% or more of the Daily Value for a given nutrient.

Less: at least 25% less of a given nutrient than the comparison food (see individual nutrients below).

Low: an amount that would allow frequent consumption of a food without exceeding the dietary guidelines (see individual nutrients below). A food that is naturally low in a nutrient may make such a claim, but only as it applies to all similar foods (for example, "fresh cauliflower, a low-sodium food").

More: at least 10% more of a given nutrient than the comparison food.

Reduced: must identify the comparison food, the percentage of reduction, and the amount in the comparison food (see individual nutrients below).

Source of: product provides between 10 and 19% of the Daily Value.

CHOLESTEROL

Note: Foods containing more than 11.5 g total fat or per 100 g must indicate those contents immediately after a cholesterol claim. As you will see, all cholesterol claims are prohibited when the food contains more than 2 g saturated fat per serving.

Cholesterol-free: less than 2 mg cholesterol per serving and 2 g or less saturated fat per serving.

Low in cholesterol: 20 mg or less per serving and per 100 g of food, and 2 g or less of saturated fat per serving.

Less cholesterol: 25% or less cholesterol than the comparison food (reflecting a reduction of at least 20 mg per serving), and 2 g or less saturated fat per serving.

Reduced cholesterol: 50% or less cholesterol per serving than the comparison food (reflecting a reduction of at least 20 mg per serving), and 2 g or less saturated fat per serving.

ENERGY

LowCalorie-free: fewer than 5 kcal per serving

Light: one-third fewer calories than the comparison food. Any other use of the term must specify what it is referring to (example, "light in color" or "light in texture").

Low calorie: less than 40 kcal per serving and per 100 g of food.

Reduced calorie: at least one-third fewer calories than the comparison food.

FAT

Extra-low: less than 4.9 g of fat per serving and per 100 g of food.

Fat-free: less than 0.5 g of fat per serving (and no added fat or oil).

Low: less than 10.4 g of fat per serving and per 100 g of food.

Less fat: 25% or less fat than the comparison food.

Less saturated fat: 25% or less saturated fat than the comparison food.

Low fat: 3 g or less fat per serving and per 100 g of food.

Low saturated fat: 1 g or less saturated fat per serving and not more than 15% of calories from saturated fat.

Percent fat-free: may be used only if the product meets the definition of low fat.

Reduced fat: 50% or less of the fat in the comparison food and reduced by more than 3 g fat per serving (for example, "reduced fat, 50% less than our regular cookie, reduced from 10 g to 5 g per serving").

Reduced saturated fat: 50% or less of the saturated fat in the comparison food and reduced by more than 1 g.

FIBER

High fiber: 20% or more of the Daily Value for fiber, a high-fiber claim made on a food that contains more than 3 g fat per serving and per 100 g of food must also declare total fat.

SODIUM

Sodium-free and salt-free: less than 5 mg of sodium per serving.

Low sodium: less than 140 mg per serving and per 100 g of food.

Reduced sodium: no more than 50% of the sodium of the comparison food.

Very low sodium: less than 35 mg per serving and per 100 g of food.

SUGAR

Sugar-free: less than 0.5 g per serving.

New Food Labels Are Here!

The new food label can be found on food packages in your supermarket. Reading the label tells more about the food and what you are getting. What you see on the food label—the nutrition and ingredient information—is required by the government.

This brochure shows what the new label looks like and explains some of its new features.

Nutrition Facts Title
The new title "Nutrition Facts" signals the new label.

Serving Size
Similar food products now have similar serving sizes. This makes it easier to compare foods. Serving sizes are based on amounts people actually eat.

New Label Information
Some label information may be new to you. The new nutrient list covers those most important to your health. You may have seen this information on some old labels, but it is now required.

Vitamins and Minerals
Only two vitamins, A and C, and two minerals, calcium and iron, are required on the food label. A food company can voluntarily list other vitamins and minerals in the food.

Numbers on the nutrition label may be rounded for labeling.

1994 survey focuses on health risks, sleep loss

A new poll confirms that most adults don't get the sleep they need. Though three-quarters of all adults believe that sleep loss is bad for their health, more than half admit to not getting enough sleep, according to the survey of 1,000 adults commissioned by the Better Sleep Council (BSC).

Conducted by Bruskin/Goldring Research, the poll examined adults' sleep deficit - the amount of sleep people need but don't get. Results indicate that North America's sleep deficit is running high. In fact, according to the National Commission on Sleep Disorders Research, adults today are getting 20 percent less sleep than they did 100 years ago.

Experts who reviewed the study found it underscored their concerns. "Sleep debt is potentially the most costly problem to our society in terms of both dollars and human suffering," says Dr. William Dement, Director of Stanford University's Sleep Disorders Clinic and Research Center in Palo Alto, CA. Sleep's role in a healthy lifestyle should not be underestimated, he adds: "Sleep should be a full partner in the triumvirate of health - fitness, good diet, good sleep."

What's the best way to pay off the sleep debt? "The only way to reduce a sleep deficit is to sleep more or get better quality sleep," says Dr. James K. Walsh, Director of the Sleep

Medicine and Research Center at St. Luke's Hospital in Chesterfield, MO.

Quality is particularly important: people with busy lives may find it difficult to control the quantity of sleep they get, but they can control the quality. As Dr. Walsh explains, "The entire sleep environment should be examined to ensure a quiet, comfortable place to sleep. This includes factors such as light, noise, temperature and mattress quality."

"Feeling drowsy during the daytime generally means you have a sleep debt," says Dr. Demand. But many people have mistakenly learned to accept daytime drowsiness as a fact of life - ignoring its implications.

Dr. Mark Mahowald, Director of the Minnesota Regional Sleep Disorders Center in Minneapolis, suggests that "we're taught that the way to keep up with increasing demands is to get less sleep - in short, that sleep is unimportant. This implies that sleep loss has no consequences, which is untrue."

Indeed, the study found evidence of some of those consequences. Half of those surveyed in the new BSC poll that said lost sleep caused them to lose energy. With so many already reporting a lack of sleep, the results - lack of energy and productivity - are significant and widespread. Dr. Walsh adds, "There are obvious consequences of the sleep debt, such as traffic and industrial accidents. However, more difficult to measure is fatigue's undoubtedly substantial role in family and social relationship problems associated with depression and irritability." The bottom line, according to Dr. Mahowald, is that "people must acknowledge that sleep is a biological imperative and make it a priority - sleep is not a negotiable need."

Poll results indicate that even people who know they need sleep try to do all their catching up on the weekend. Experts like Dr. Dement say that's not enough: "Even though the only way to reduce the sleep deficit is to get more sleep, most people's sleep debt is huge and can't be made up in one night." Nevertheless, the poll found that twice as many people (38 percent vs. 19 percent) get more than 8 hours of sleep on weekends than do on weekdays. Men of all ages and young adults aged 18-24 are particularly apt to make up sleep this way.

"We commissioned this survey to bring the vast array of sleep statistics out there down to a personal level," explains Better Sleep Council Director Andrea Herman. "We also want people to realize it's not just how long they sleep but how well they sleep. In fact, some people don't get enough sleep even when they make a special effort to because they aren't getting good quality sleep."

Experts say this is where other factors come into play: a healthy diet and regular exercise contribute to deeper sleep. Another item most people overlook is right under their nose - or rather, their whole body - their bed. Herman agrees with the doctors, who stress the importance of a healthy sleep environment: "An old, worn-out mattress can prevent a person from getting a good night's sleep. People should consider a good mattress an investment in their health - just like their running shoes or gym membership."

Offer your support for foundation

If you know anyone with Parkinson's disease, a disorder of the nervous system that interferes with muscular control, here's encouraging news.

Support groups for patients and family members are helpful and medications are available that do much to relieve the symptoms.

The Parkinson's Disease Foundation produces helpful literature, makes referrals to competent physicians and support groups. The PDF, the first organization established to address the problems of PD, is now actively pursuing Parkinson's patients and their families to take advantage of the help the foundation can give.

Surprisingly, some 15 percent of the contributions to the foundation are made in memory of someone who dies with Parkinson's disease. The foundation appreciates these contributions, but notes that fewer than half of the honorees were known to the foundation in their lifetime. Since it is there to help people, the foundation hopes to bring in more people as they may benefit from its many services.

Social Security

"Special provisions can help people who are blind or near blind qualify for Supplemental Security Income (SSI) payments," said Jim Talbot, manager of the Amarillo Social Security office. "And there are also other provisions to help people who are blind and already receiving SSI to return to work and still receive SSI benefits or Medicaid protection," he noted.

SSI makes monthly payments to people 65 and older and to people with disabilities at any age (including children) whose income and assets are below a certain level. And people who receive SSI usually qualify for Medicaid and food stamps, too.

If local Social Security officials determine that individuals can receive SSI payments for up to 6 months while they wait for a formal decision by a state Disability Determination Service. If they're later found not to meet the SSI definition of blindness they do not have to pay back any money.

Other provisions within the law also help people with disabilities

receive SSI while they're working. For example, when figuring a disabled person's earnings, SSI does not count any work expenses directly related to the disability. "These exclusions are important because the SSI payment is offset by other income a person has," Talbot explained.

People who are blind receive additional exclusions. SSI excludes most of their work expenses (not just those related to their disability). Some examples include Federal, State, and Social Security taxes; routine transportation costs to and from work; and union dues.

People who are blind also can ask for special handling of any letters sent by Social Security about changes in their SSI. "At their request, we can either telephone them or send the letters by certified mail," Talbot said.

Anyone who wants more information about it or who want to apply for benefits should call the local Social Security office at 378-2241.

Healthy eyes are not only eyes needed for donations

Glaucoma patients can help scientists understand this sight-threatening disease by donating their eyes to support glaucoma research.

Research tissue supplied by people who had glaucoma allows scientists to explore the fundamental questions - the biology, chemistry, physics and genetics - of this eye disease with no known cure.

Glaucoma is essentially a plumbing problem in the eye - the fluid produced in the eye does not drain properly, in most cases causing a build-up of pressure. The increased pressure permanently damages the optic nerve at the back of the eye," said Tara Steele, executive director of the Glaucoma Research Foundation. An estimated three million Americans have glaucoma. It is the second leading cause of irreversible blindness in the U.S.

The Glaucoma Research Foundation is a national, tax-exempt organization dedicated to protecting the sight and independence of people living with glaucoma. The foundation operates the nation's only glaucoma-specific eye donor program. To date, more than 1,300 eyes have been dedicated to glaucoma research as a result of this program.

One registered donor enrolled in the Glaucoma Research Eye Donor Network considers donating her eyes "a tremendous boost to my ego, because part of me is going to do something else some good." The Network, which was founded in 1984, supplies valuable eye tissue needed for basic and clinical studies which provide a better understanding of glaucoma.

Currently 22 research laboratories in the United States, Canada and Germany receive tissue through the Network.

Many important research projects depend on the availability of glaucoma specimens. Unfortunately, the short supply of donated eye tissue delays vital research that may

someday lead to prevention of glaucoma, and perhaps a cure.

If you have glaucoma, you may want to consider donating your eyes for research. No matter how long you have had the disease, what medications you have taken, or what surgeries and procedures have been performed, your eye tissue could benefit thousands of people, including members of your own family.

Glaucoma eye donors carry a special wallet identification card that includes the telephone number of their local eye bank. Donating your eyes to the Glaucoma Research Eye Donor Network will in no way affect your funeral plans, not even arrangements for an open casket. There is no cost to eye donors or their families, thanks to public support and a generous grant from the Norris Foundation.

The fight is not over - while the death rates for heart disease and cancer are dropping, the lung disease death rate is climbing.

With the generous support of the public and the help of volunteers, there have been many advances in lung disease. The work, however, is far from finished.

Here are some tips for lung health:

-If you have a persistent cough, frequent colds, chest pains, cough up blood, or if you are out of breath after moderate exercise, see a doctor.

-If you already have a lung disease or any chronic disease or are over age 65, get flu shots yearly and a pneumonia shot.

-If you have been in contact with someone who is sick with tuberculosis, see a doctor.

-Motor vehicle exhaust is comprised of many dangerous air pollutants that can cause lung disease and irritation. Help yourself and others by keeping your car well-tuned.

-Check for lung hazards in the home to eliminate them or protect yourself; test your home for radon.

-Don't smoke.

-If you do smoke, quit!

-Avoid second-hand smoke.

-If you have asthma, see a doctor on a regular basis. You can manage your asthma and avoid asthma attacks.

NBC's 'Roommates' tackles AIDS and homophobia

"Roommates," premiering Monday, May 30, on NBC, tells the dramatic story of two very different men who form an uneasy friendship as each faces life with AIDS. Written by Robert W. Lenski ("Breathing Lessons," "Decoration Day"), this crackling TV movie stars Eric Stoltz, Randy Quaid, Charles Durning and Elizabeth Pena.

Inspired by a real-life situation that producer Michael Filerman brought to Lenski's attention, "Roommates" takes a conventional "odd couple" situation and fills it with pain, humanity and compassion. The results are so compelling, so bristling with conviction, that even wary viewers will find themselves completely hooked by the time the first commercial break arrives.

Jim Flynn (Quaid), a heterosexual ex-con on parole for bank robbery, was just in the process of getting his life back on track when a barroom brawl led to an HIV-tainted blood transfusion.

Tired of constantly fighting with his blue-collar father, Barney (Durning), Jim moves into "The Residence," an apartment complex for people living with AIDS.

At first, Jim's homophobic rantings ensure that he has his apartment to himself. But administrator Lisa Elliott (Pena) has a shrewd card trick up her sleeve — Bill Thomas (Stoltz), an AIDS education volunteer, whose own battle with the disease has worsened a strained relationship with his family.

Lisa introduces Bill to Jim as his new roommate. It's not a match made in heaven.

"I don't really care what kind of crap you hand 'em at the civic and professional groups," Jim bellows in Bill's face. "It is my firm conviction that AIDS is God's way of cleanin' house

— including me, pal."

"Well," replies Bill blandly, surveying the sloppily apartment, "I see even God doesn't do windows."

After a single tense night, both men appear in Lisa's office demanding a change. She decides to play hardball: "I am not the reservations clerk at the Ritz. ... Now, either you both try it, or you can both take a walk."

Resigned, the two roommates declare an uneasy truce, then slowly begin to come to terms with their own hidden prejudices. When Jim faces avoidance and prejudice from his old buddies, Bill joins them for a game of pool — with surprising results. And when Bill is heckled during an address to a local women's group, a surprise visit from Jim gives Bill a new understanding of how important it is to put a human face on a health tragedy.

Just as they are finding common ground, two serious medical emergencies challenge their friendship. The conclusion is a touching and very hopeful testament to tolerance.

Pena, a splendid actress whose work is too little known (she previously costarred with Stoltz in "The Waterdance"), gives Lisa both soul and steel. Durning, in a part he probably could phone in, reveals all of his character's inner conflicts, most of them the product of his upbringing.

Since his character is afflicted with crushing headaches, Quaid has the more flamboyant role, roaring and blustering uninhibitedly. Yet ultimately it is the quiet performance of Stoltz, his piercing blue eyes framed by his red hair, that will stay with the audience for some time to come.

"Roommates" is a tough yet tender drama that examines tricky issues and avoids easy answers. It deserves a chance.






Another cable channel, more awards, video stores barking arrival of 'Lassie'

The art house at your house: Bravo, the "culture for everyone" network, has announced the launch of The Independent Film Channel on Thursday, Sept. 1.

The 24-hour, commercial-free channel will feature about three dozen feature-length films a month, plus documentaries, short subjects, animation and works by emerging filmmakers.

Charter members of the channel's advisory board are Martin Scorsese, Robert Altman, Joel and Ethan Coen, Martha Coolidge, Spike Lee, Steven Soderbergh and Ed Saxon. IFC has been promised carriage by cable operator Cablevision Systems.

A release from Sony's Wonder video label says the company hopes to have consumers "playing fetch" at their local video stores come Tuesday, June 21. That's when four half-hour "Lassie" adventures hit the shelves as part of a 50th-anniversary salute to the world's favorite collie. (The release dovetails nicely with the summer's new "Lassie" theatrical movie, too.)

With a suggested retail price under \$10, each tape contains two vintage episodes and includes a "Lassie" activity book. The episodes are the first of 500 scheduled for video release.

Glenn Close and the cast of Broadway's "Sunset Boulevard" are scheduled to perform at the 1994 Tony Awards ceremony, to be broadcast Sunday, June 12, on CBS. Anthony
