Rain, thunderstorms found all over Texas

Lousy weather, with the potential of flash floods and tornados, continued to batter all parts of Texas Friday, with heavy rains in the south and north and light snow in the West. In Hereford, the weather station at KPAN Radio reported 0.78 of an inch of rain fell between 7 a.m. Friday and the time the rain quit about 4:30 p.m.

The city also recorded a high temperature of 37 degrees -- at 7 a.m. Friday -- and an official low of 32 degrees at 11 a.m.

The overnight low Saturday morning was 34 degrees. Elsewhere, showers were heavy in South Texas Friday morning, but had abated by the afternoon. Flash flood and tornado watches continued for parts of the Hill Country throughout the night.

Winds were gusty, up to 30 mph. Temperatures were mostly in the 80s, with readings in the 90s in the deep south.

Saturday's South Texas forecast calls for overnight temperatures in the 60s and 70s. Otherwise, turn to local forecasters for the latest weather developments.

A flash flood watch and tornado watch were posted for portions of North Texas through Friday evening. Rainfall totals in parts of the area were between 2 and 3 inches.

Temperatures were in the 60s to lower 80s in the region.

Saturday's North Texas forecast calls for a 30 percent chance of rain in the morning with decreasing cloudiness. Highs will be in the mid-60s.

In West Texas, a tornado watch was in effect for the Concho Valley

and Edwards Plateau through Friday night. A winter weather advisory was in effect for the Panhandle.

A miscommunication evidently led to some forecasters reporting that a tornado had touched down near Waxahachie in Ellis County. The clouds on radar only looked like a tornado, but none actually formed, National Weather Service meteorolo-

gist Skip Ely said.

Hail an inch in diameter was reported west of Kaufman, Ely said.

Snow was falling across the northern Panhandles, with 1 to 3 inches on the ground in some areas. Rain was prevalent across the southern Panhandle, South Plains, Concho Valley, Edwards Plateau and Big Bend.

Wet, cold spell may affect crops

Rain, hail, cold weather -- what will Mother Nature think of next, Hereford area residents are wondering.

The brief cold snap that hit Hereford recently "will have some effect on sugarbeets and other young crops," said Dennis Printz, spokesman for Holly Sugar.

"Cold weather, wind, and blowing dirt will all have some effect on the crops. Some replanting will be necessary.

"We're evaluating the situation and it looks like we'll be okay in most cases. I think we'll still have a good quality crop."

Dennis Newton, Deaf Smith County Extension Agent, said he would need a couple more days before he could make an assessment of current local conditions.

"The wind hurt the sugarbeets coming up," said Newton, "and it possibly hurt some corn."

"But luckily the temperatures dropped only to 31 degrees. Had it been in the 28 to 30-degree range for a sustained period of time, we would be facing some serious damages."

Newton said he would have a report ready on local crops by the first part of next week.

The rains Friday, even accompanied by some hail, were good for area farmers, the men agreed.

"It's wonderful," said the wife of a Hereford farmer. "We can't get enough rain to suit me."

Another Hereford person who welcomed the rain was Jay Spain, fire marshal for Hereford and Deaf Smith County.

"The rain is wetting down everything, including the CRP grass," said Spain. "It's helping to improve the local fire situation and conditions."

Motion in Gudgell case to be heard here Monday

A motion for separate trials for defendants in a murder case will be argued Monday in 222nd District Court.

Donna Gudgell, 48, and Chris Don Barron, 24, are charged with murder in the death of her husband, Bill Gudgell last September.

The attorney for Donna Gudgell, Selden Hale of Amarillo, is asking Judge David Wesley Gulley for severance, claiming his client "believes that defendant Chris Don Barron will testify against her."

Trial of the two defendants has been set to begin on June 16.

Bill Gudgell was shot while sitting at the kitchen table in his home in northwest Deaf Smith County, sometime after 11 p.m. on Sept. 11.

Gudgell was transported by helicopter to Northwest Texas Hospital in Amarillo where he died several hours later.

Barron was arrested on Sept. 14 and charged with murder. A month later, he and Donna Gudgell were both indicted for murder by a Deaf Smith County Grand Jury.

Bond of \$200,000 was set for each defendant but later reduced to \$50,000 for each. They have been free on bond since Oct. 21, 1993.

Donna Gudgell claimed she found her husband with the head wound when she got out of the shower at their home.

A hearing reportedly was recovered outside the house.

A hearing on pre-trial motions originally was set for June 10. However, Judge Gulley moved the hearing to Monday because of the motion to sever.

Earnings, spending up in March

WASHINGTON (AP) - Americans were earning more and spending more last month, but only at a moderately quicker pace after unusually sharp increases in February. And the housing industry shook off winter doldrums and took off in March despite climbing interest rates.

"The latest set of data suggest that the economy is emerging from its winter hibernation, but at a much slower pace than that witnessed in the fourth quarter of last year," said economist Jose Rasco of Merrill Lynch & Co.

The Commerce Department reported Friday that personal income rose 0.6 percent in March and consumer spending nearly kept pace, rising 0.4 percent.

The department revised estimates upward for February as unusual factors sent incomes up 1.8 percent and spending 1.3 percent.

The February income jump was the biggest since it soared 5.1 percent in December 1992.

The February rise in consumer spending, which represents two-thirds of the nation's economic activity, was the largest since September 1992 when it increased 1.7 percent.

Spending has risen in 11 of the past 12 months, only declining in

January when it slipped 0.1 percent.

The government said sales of new homes jumped 11.1 percent in March, the biggest increase in six months as the housing industry rebounded from winter storms and frigid cold.

All regions participated in the gain except for the Midwest, where sales slipped slightly. The Northeast experienced a double-digit advance.

Sales totaled 739,000 at a seasonally adjusted annual rate, up from a revised 665,000 in February. The original February estimate was 649,000.

Fixed-rate, 30-year mortgages averaged 7.68 percent in March, compared with 7.15 percent a month earlier. Rates were at 8.32 percent on Thursday.

In another development, Treasury Secretary Lloyd Bentsen announced the United States intervened to support the value of the dollar in foreign currency markets as the greenback approached a record low against the Japanese yen. The move appeared to signal a shift in administration policy away from putting pressure on the yen as a way to cure America's huge trade deficits with that country.

Analysts said the latest government statistics buttress reports that the economy is expanding at a moderate rate, and that inflation - while increasing - is well in check.

"Wage and income growth actually were very strong in February. But that was due to factors not to be repeated month to month," said Marilyn Schaja of Donaldson, Lufkin & Jenrette Securities Corp. "Income is on a moderate growth path."

The Clinton administration said it is pleased with the home sales figures. Housing growth is "on a solid path," said Henry Cisneros, secretary of Housing and Urban Development.

David Berson of the Federal National Mortgage Association said the housing market is fundamentally strong, with the growing economy and pent-up demand offsetting mortgage rate increases.

The Commerce Department said incomes rose to a seasonally adjusted annual rate of \$5.63 trillion in March from \$5.60 trillion in February. Spending was up to a seasonally adjusted annual rate of \$4.58 trillion from \$4.56 trillion in February.

The sharp February advances were due to higher farm subsidies and a rebound from the depressing effects of the California earthquake on rental income.

The government reported Thursday that expansion slowed dramatically in the first three months this year.

Early voting period to end Tuesday for May 7 election

Election of board members for Deaf Smith County Hospital District has attracted the most votes in early balloting for city, school and hospital officials.

Early voting for the May 7 elections will end at 5 p.m. Tuesday in the office of Deaf Smith County Clerk David Ruland.

Voters will elect four hospital board members from a slate of six. Only 139 votes had been marked by noon Friday.

Hereford Independent School

District trustees from District 1 and District 3 will be elected. Ruland's office reported 41 votes cast Friday.

And, in uncontented Hereford City Commission elections, 98 persons had voted Friday.

Incumbents John Perrin, Boyd Foster and Merle Clark are seeking re-election to the hospital board. Challenging the incumbents are Steve Cortez, Dean Crofford and Larry Watts. Incumbent Paul Abalos is not running for re-election.

HISD District 1 voters will choose

between Ron Weishaar, incumbent, and Angie Villarreal. Raymond Schlabs is running for a new term on the board from District 3. He is opposed by Randy Tooley.

On the Hereford City Commission ballot are Wayne Winget for Place 4, Nancy Griego for Place 2 and Roger Eades and Carey Black, at-large. All are incumbents although Griego is seeking her first elective term. She was appointed to fill an unexpired term last year.

Dictionary records words thought up during war time

WASHINGTON (AP) - Along with blood, sweat and tears, war produces words. A new dictionary records the words American doughboys, dogfaces, GIs and grunts have thought up in every war they fought.

The list goes beyond terms that have crept into civilian vocabularies - jeep, AWOL, gizmo and snafu - to others whose military origins may not be as obvious - scuttlebutt, goldbrick, baptize by fire, bite the dust, big wheel and Dear John.

"War Slang: American Fighting Words and Phrases from the Civil War to the Gulf War" by author Paul Dickson, shows that as long as Americans have gone to war they have also taken a sardonic view of the environment of battle - the mud, the food, the enemy, the petty rules and

the chances of survival. Food, death, disfigurement and discharge have been soldier preoccupations forever.

Chow and grub date back to the Civil War. The GIs of World War II came up with the most slighting terms for food. Fried liver was alligator bait; corned beef was GI turkey. Prunes were army strawberries.

Sausages were bags of mystery; beans were commissary bullets; spinach was marsh grass; toast was shingles; sauerkraut was shrubbery. In the Vietnam War, canned ground beef patties in gravy were called Gainesburgers. In the Gulf War, any unappetizing entree was camel meat.

In the Gulf, MRE stood for Meal Ready to Eat, the successor to the C-ration of World War II. Those forced to consume MREs said the name consisted of three lies. From MREs, it was simple for soldiers to

shortcut the name to simply Rees.

They also said the initials stood for Meal Rejected by Ethiopians or Meal Refusing to Exit.

Death spawned a vocabulary. Kick the bucket was used in the Civil War. In World War II, to die was to check out. In Korea, the term became to buy the farm or to go to the big PX in the sky. In Vietnam, to waste was to kill but to be killed was to be greased, as in, "Anything you do can get you greased, including doing nothing."

The body bag of Vietnam was officially called the human remains pouch in the Gulf War.

In World War I, a basket case was a soldier who had lost all four limbs and was brought home as a head and a torso in a basket. The War Department issued a bulletin on March 28, 1919, saying it had no record "of an American soldier so (See DICTIONARY, Page 2A)

Bush, Morales fight over prisons

AUSTIN (AP) - The debate between Democrats and Republicans over how the state should handle the prison system and county jail overcrowding turned personal Friday. Democrat Texas Attorney General Dan Morales called Republican gubernatorial candidate George W. Bush "chicken." A Bush spokesman called Morales "one of the weakest attorney generals in the history of the state of Texas."

After hearing of Morales' attack, a slew of Republican lawmakers stepped up and offered to debate the attorney general.

The name-calling began after Morales was asked Friday if he would debate Republican attorney general candidate Don Wittig about issues facing the prison system.

Morales sidestepped Wittig's challenge and pressed for a debate with Bush.

Bush has endorsed breaking an agreement that Morales helped negotiate to settle the so-called Ruiz prison lawsuit, named after the inmate, David Ruiz, who filed it.

Democrats say the settlement ended federal court control of the state's prisons. Republicans say the courts still maintain authority and that the state should renegotiate the settlement.

"George Bush made a statement that he believes I made a mistake in the way that I handled the Ruiz final judgment," Morales said. "I want to

know if George Bush is willing to back up those statements. I believe he is afraid to do it.

"I think George Bush is chicken. I think George Bush is scared."

Bush spokesman Reggie Bashur said Morales "is one of the weakest attorney generals in the history of the state of Texas. In his 3-1/2 years of office, he has flagrantly flip-flopped on the major issues of importance to Texas."

"He is today engaging in political posturing to help a governor in serious trouble on criminal justice issues. If Dan Morales is serious, he should debate his opponent, Don Wittig."

Wittig said, "We will debate any reasonable time and place on the prison situation, which is caused largely by (Morales') capitulation to criminals."

Morales said Thursday the prison system, which now holds some 70,000 inmates, is full to its constitutional capacity. The state is building some 76,000 more prison beds to bring total capacity to more than 140,000 by 1996.

But Morales said renovations or additions to existing prison units could provide more space if state leaders determine that would be cost-effective.

Morales said the law allows the state to put up tents for work camps or boot camps. Officials noted that such camps are part of emergency projects now under way to provide

Clinton declares parts of North Texas disaster

WASHINGTON (AP) - President Clinton has signed a disaster declaration clearing the way for federal assistance for North Texas residents who suffered damages from tornados earlier this week, Rep. Martin Frost said Friday.

The aid for Dallas and Cooke counties was requested by Gov. Ann Richards after Lancaster, DeSoto and Gainesville were hammered by twisters on Monday and Tuesday.

"I'm pleased that the president has acted quickly on the governor's request," said Frost, a Democrat whose district encompasses the neighboring towns of DeSoto and Lancaster.

"Federal assistance will be needed and will provide area citizens with means to deal with the near-term consequences and prepare to get on with their lives in the long-term," he added.

The declaration will allow qualified residents to obtain assistance through the Federal Emergency Management Agency for temporary housing, medical expenses, clothing and other costs.

Three deaths were reported after a tornado hit Lancaster and DeSoto on Monday night and more than 700 buildings and homes were left in shambles between the two neighboring Dallas suburbs.

A day later, tornados ripped through residential areas in Gainesville, leaving another swath of destruction.

On the state level, the Texas Department of Insurance announced that special telephone teams will work between 8 a.m. and 5 p.m. this weekend to answer insurance questions for storm victims. The insurance hotline usually is only answered weekdays.

Callers initially will hear a recording, but they can speak to a property insurance expert by touching the zero button on the phone. They also can leave a message.

Plainview man sentenced to death for part in killing

PLAINVIEW, Texas (AP) - A Plainview man who served as the lookout during the shooting of a grocer and his elderly mother has been sentenced to death for his role in the bungled robbery and slaying of the store owner.

During the course of sentencing deliberations, the jury asked District Judge Marvin Marshall to make available various pieces of physical evidence and transcripts of key testimony in the two-week trial.

The request for extra information led to speculation that jurors were leaning toward a life sentence for 22-year-old Joe Lee Guy.

But, ultimately, jurors decided Thursday that Guy should be

executed for his participation in the capital murder on the night of March 25, 1993.

Larry Howell, 52, and his mother, 82-year-old Frenchie Howell, were gunned down by six shots from a .22-caliber pistol wielded by co-defendant Thomas Howard, 22, of Plainview, testimony showed.

Howell was killed; Mrs. Howell is recovering from a bullet wound to the abdomen.

Surprise testimony by defense witness Dr. Steven Peterson, a psychiatrist, may have sealed Guy's fate.

Peterson testified about an interview he conducted with Guy on April 7. He said Guy told him he and Howard had argued about who would be the triggerman and had planned to shoot the Howells so no witnesses would survive.

Court-appointed defense attorney Rick Wardrop of Lubbock tried to deflect Peterson's testimony by arguing that Guy merely was trying to "elevate himself" among his

wounded during the whole period of the war.

Formal sentencing for Guy is scheduled May 9.

Ask Dr. Lamb

DEAR DR. LAMB: By definition I have chronic bronchitis. I have severe attacks three or four times each winter with each attack lasting five or six days. I had one attack in October while visiting Great Britain, a mild one in early December and a bad one just after Christmas. I do not smoke nor do I live where there is factory smoke.

I have read that in Great Britain those suffering from bronchitis are put on a program of antibiotics throughout the winter season. Does this type of program show results in the United States, and what type of doctor should I consult to start the program? Amoxicillin does work in just two or three days.

DEAR READER: First, find out if you really do have chronic bronchitis. A few attacks of a respiratory infection a year is not sufficient to conclude that is the case. You could see a specialist in pulmonary diseases. Your family physician can refer you to one. Since you are from a small town, you may be required to go to one of the nearest large cities.

What can a pulmonary specialist do? He can do pulmonary function tests to see if you actually have any obstruction of the airways in your lungs. If you don't, it would be hard to justify the diagnosis of chronic bronchitis. In that condition, there is enlargement of glands in the airways and increased mucus formation that causes obstruction of the airways.

There are arguments for and against the continuous antibiotic treatment of patients with more severe chronic bronchitis. In some few patients who do have frequent recurrent pulmonary infections as a complication of chronic bronchitis, antibiotics are given on a regular basis. In other cases, they are given only when a respiratory infection occurs. Continuous antibiotic therapy may result in inadequate treatment if you had a serious infectious complication, such as pneumonia. But it can also protect against infections. It depends a lot on how severe the disease is.

Antibiotics will not protect against viral infections.

Guest columnist Honoring twenty years of nursing education in area

Twenty years ago this month, West Texas A&M University graduated its first class of nursing students. Since then, the WTAMU Division of Nursing has conferred 2,186 bachelor of science and 223 master of science degrees.

These numbers are impressive but do not begin to explain the importance of the division's 20-year history to the Texas Panhandle. An estimated one of every three nurses practicing in Amarillo is a graduate of West Texas A&M University's baccalaureate nursing program, and based on WTAMU statistics and increasing community health demands, those percentages are on the way up.

The WTAMU Division of Nursing is concerned with and responds to regional needs. And that concern is passed on to the students. Eighty-four percent of the university's nursing graduates practice in the state of Texas, and 62 percent stay close to home, providing health care for residents of Texas' top 26 counties.

Currently, 442 students are enrolled in the university's undergraduate program. Some are enrolled in the basic BSN program, and some are transfers who have completed associate degrees and/or nursing diplomas. Eighty-nine registered nurses are enrolled in the WTAMU graduate program.

The success of the WTAMU Division of Nursing is due, in large part, to the visionary planning of community leaders more than a quarter of a century ago. The first concrete evidence of that vision was realized in 1970 when the Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board issued formal approval for a degree-granting nursing program at then-West Texas State University. An office was established in 1971 and the university's first nursing students were introduced to the WTSU campus soon thereafter.

The undergraduate program has been accredited by the National League of Nursing since 1975 and has continual approval of the State Board of Nursing Examiners since its

inception. The program continued to grow, and in 1983, officials of the university and Northwest Texas Hospital approved a merger of the university's baccalaureate program and the hospital's diploma program.

Graduate-level studies in family nursing were added to the curriculum in 1978 and the master of science in nursing program, with a focus on teaching and administration, was granted full accreditation in 1983. The most recent addition to the graduate offerings is the family nurse practitioner program.

The nursing program, reorganized from a School of Nursing to a Division of Nursing in 1986, has enhanced its reputation with each passing semester and was recognized as "exceptional" during a recent accreditation visit by the National League of Nursing.

The Division of Nursing, under the leadership of Dr. Horace H. Bailey, dean of the College of Agriculture, Nursing and Natural Sciences, and Dr. M. Joleen Walsh, head of the division, continue the vision begun 20 years ago.

The goal of the nursing program at WTAMU is to provide quality nursing education and to serve the region by preparing nurses at the baccalaureate- and master's-degree levels to practice professional nursing in a variety of health care settings.

Our goal is not that different than the one we embraced two decades ago. Instead of building a tradition, however, we are challenged to continue that tradition of excellence. So, as WTAMU nursing faculty, students and alumni reflect upon the last 20 years and anticipate the next 20 years, we hope you will join us as we observe National Nurses Month and celebrate the WTAMU Division of Nursing's 20th anniversary.

Folks, I sure hope you're sitting down for this little tidbit, because it's not something you want to take in a position where you could either fall down or kick something of value.

The other day we received in the mail the April/May issue of *Advocate*, which bills itself as "Voice of the Texas State Teachers Association."

Now for those of you who don't know, TSTA is the state affiliate of the National Education Association. Locally, the TSTA/NEA affiliate is the Hereford Educators Association. Anyway, TSTA's cover story in this issue of *Advocate* features a movie poster-style graphic bearing the admonition to "Beware! The Invasion of the Radical Right."

We are told it is "Starring: Stealth Candidates. They're Targeting Our Schools With a Secret Agenda."

Finally, at the bottom of the graphic -- in bright red letters -- is the warning, "BE PREPARED."

TSTA then proceeds to tell us that the "Radical Right invades Texas." Now, before I get into what TSTA tells us, I want to make it clear that I know many local teachers who are members of HEA and I know Carolyn Waters, the HEA president.

Mrs. Waters is a fine Christian woman who does not espouse these principles of TSTA or NEA.

In fact, when I mentioned this column to her, she was very vehement in telling me to make it perfectly clear that HEA does not espouse many of the views of the writers of *Advocate*, nor does the group endorse much of the ideas that come from the NEA.

So please, don't think I am painting HEA with the same paintbrush I am using for its parent organizations.

Anyway, back to the story.

The lead paragraph says, "If you don't believe the Radical Right has infiltrated Texas, look around. Their campaign to keep children from thinking for themselves and to impose their own narrow, ultra-conservative views on all citizens is well under way."

Readers are given a series of ways to "fight the Radical Right" and are told that "The scope of their efforts is frightening: some operate chapters in every state and claim hundreds of thousands of members. Some have amassed war chests by using scare tactics."

They also give several suggestions for how to fight the Radical Right. Here are some of them (all of these are quoted directly from the article. I didn't make them up):

-- Adopt a total association policy to combat the Radical Right (i.e. censorship, academic freedom, school board elections).

-- Use your local association newsletter to educate and inform members about the Radical Right: what it is, its strategies and activities affecting the public schools.

-- Enlist the assistance of the NEA Censorship Network, if appropriate, and TSTA.

-- Appoint an association committee or task force that has responsibilities for monitoring Radical Right activities.

-- Form coalitions with friendly board members and administrators.

-- Learn to recognize disinformation efforts and tactics designed to shut down schools or remove certain personnel from the school or district.

Now for the really repulsive part of this whole mess -- *Advocate* lists a number of national groups that it says have "an anti-public school agenda."

Look over this list very carefully and see if you can spot anything about these "anti-public school" groups.

-- American Family Association, headed by the Rev. Donald Wildmon.

-- Christian Coalition, founded by former presidential candidate Pat Robertson.

-- Citizens for Excellence in Education.

-- National Association of Christian Educators.

-- Concern Women for America, headed by its president, Beverly LaHate.

-- Eagle Forum, whose president is Phyllis Schlafly.

-- Family Research Council, with president Gary Bauer.

-- Focus on the Family, founded and operated by Dr. James C. Dobson.

-- Free Congress Foundation.

-- Traditional Values Coalition, chaired by the Rev. Louis Sheldon.

I am familiar with most of these organizations and the common factor among all of them is that they are all Christian-based, pro-family organizations determined to bring conservative, pro-family, Christian values and principles back into the public schools.

Now correct me if I'm wrong, but doesn't this sound more like a crusade against Christianity and all that comes with it (you know, those terrible things like love of family, concern for America, decency in education, etc.) than a push to get the best people possible on school boards?

Look at the words they use -- censorship, the NEA Censorship Network, attacks, monitor. They all represent attempts to restrict our Constitutionally-guaranteed rights to freedom of religion and freedom of speech.

Yes there are individuals and organizations -- Christian and otherwise -- who are pursuing their own agendas in relation to the schools, and yes there are those who would try to shut down public education or shape it in their own image.

But it seems to me that the organizations that TSTA and NEA are so vehemently fighting against are groups that want traditional family and Christian values returned to education.

I've said it before and I'll say it again -- I don't understand how anybody who stands for pro-Christian, pro-family values can send money to groups that are so vehemently opposed to those very beliefs.

Remember, even though you may not agree with what they stand for, if you send your membership money to them and receive their publications and are known as a member of that group, you are saying you agree with what that group stands for.

And are the views of TSTA and the NEA really the values and positions we want used in shaping the Hereford Independent School District?

An AP news analysis Nixon changed his approach to media

WASHINGTON (AP) - The Candidate came aboard, the campaigner's mask erased as he turned away from the crowd, unsmiling as he went to his compartment in the chartered airliner. No small talk.

Not with the Richard M. Nixon of 1960, brusque and distant when he did deal with the political reporters who traveled with him. The impression was heightened when the Nixon entourage put up at the Waldorf Astoria Hotel in New York and John F. Kennedy, in the city for a joint appearance, turned up in the lobby, saying he'd come over to get a haircut.

He did, after a genial chat with newsmen, almost all of whom were traveling with his Republican rival for the White House.

Eight years, two election defeats and one political revival later, there was a new Nixon approach. Author Theodore H. White wrote that the smiling self-pity of prior campaigns was gone.

"Gentlemen, this is not my last press conference," Nixon said as he began his New Hampshire presidential primary campaign in 1968, wryly recalling his bitter, "last press conference" concession of defeat in the election for governor of California.

To emphasize the new look, Nixon threw a campaign cocktail party for the political press that night in New Hampshire, stood on a chair and promised a more open, accessible campaign. Next morning, he went unannounced to a town hall question-and-answer session taped for campaign television, avoiding coverage by political reporters.

Later, there was lunch at Antonio's during a New Orleans campaign stop, Nixon reminiscing about a dinner there with his wife in 1941, recalling

not only what they ate but exactly what it cost.

But it was invited audiences only, no reporters allowed, in the theaters where Nixon campaign-staged 10 TV interview forums with carefully selected questioners.

Having it both ways, or trying, was a Nixon trait.

The self-contained denial was one way of doing it as, for example, when he learned just before the 1968 election of an impending halt in the bombing of North Vietnam. He said he'd been told it was a cynical attempt to influence the election but that he didn't believe it was. That made and disowned the accusation at the same time.

Or the "secret plan" to end the war in Vietnam. "I never said I had a plan, much less a secret plan, to end the war," he wrote in his memoirs. What Nixon did say in 1968 was that, if elected, he would end the conflict; when asked how, he wouldn't say, on grounds that would undercut the administration. A reporter coined the "secret plan" description and the phrase caught on.

He never apologized for Watergate, although he did write in one of his last books that he had failed to establish a moral tone that would have made it unthinkable. But when he was asked in 1986 what lessons he took from the scandal that forced his resignation, Nixon retorted: "Just destroy all the tapes."

After the Nixon enemies list was disclosed in 1973, he told H.R. Haldeman to compile a list of journalists he considered to be fair or even friendly. It wasn't nearly as long.

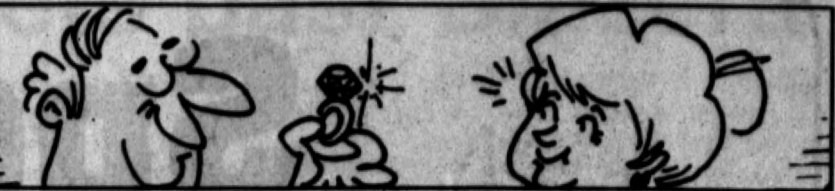

Spotlight on health

How would you react if an economist or politician asked that your child take a prescription medication that had never undergone laboratory testing for safety and effectiveness? Would you stand by quietly if you were notified that your spouse must submit to an experimental surgical procedure for which there is no evidence suggesting a successful outcome? You'd probably object strongly.

Similarly, most of us take for granted that when it comes to the current debate over health care services. However, a careful look at the rise of the untested theory known as "managed competition" reveals the high stakes and even greater uncertainty now at work in the health care reform debate.

Under the managed competition reform concept endorsed by the White House, all employers would be required to either buy or make a contribution toward a basic health care package for all of their workers. This approach would limit employers and employees to choices among plans approved by massive government-run "health alliances."

The best prescription for managed competition, say the members of the Association of Health Insurance

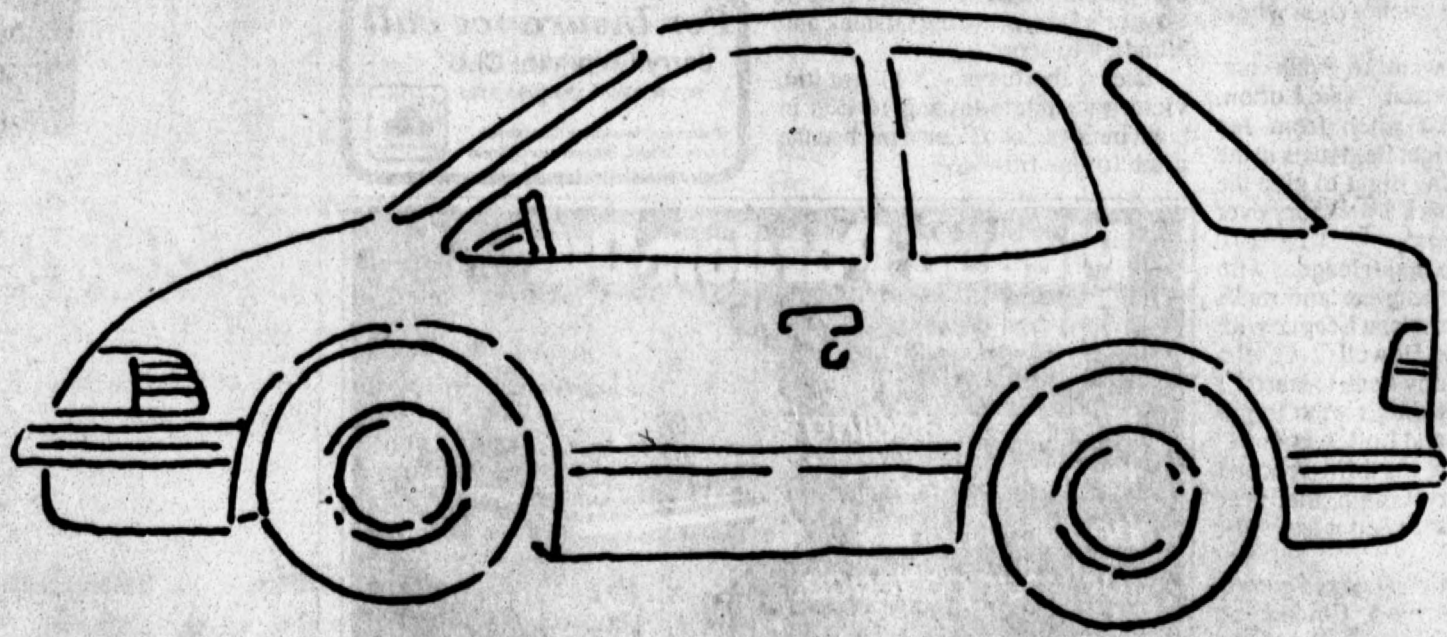
Agents (AHIA), would be to subject it to a real-world test by allowing alliances to be voluntary, thus giving employers the option of going to the private sector for the health care that makes the most sense for themselves and their workers.

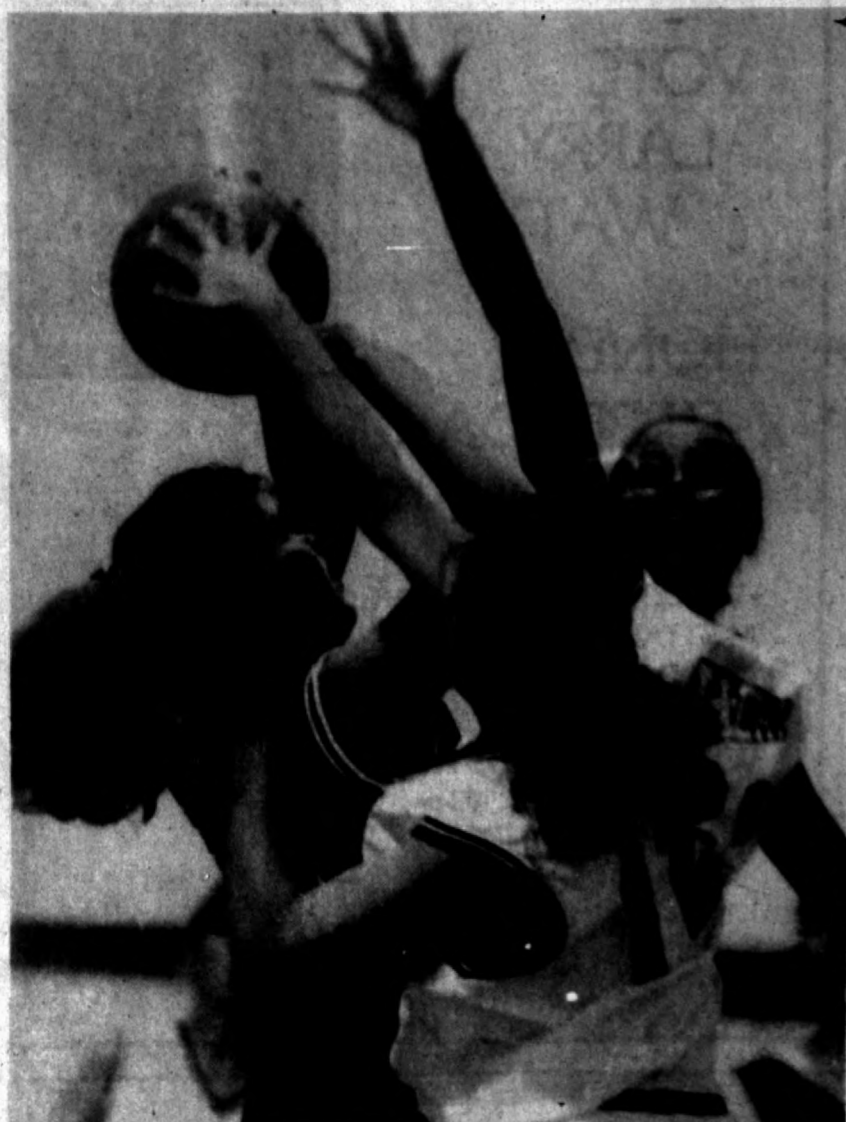

Southwest Conference will survive through '95

DALLAS (AP) - The Southwest Conference definitely will be around in 1994-95, although the dying league's future after that is in doubt. The SWC's official demise was set for the fall of 1996 after seven of its eight teams found new homes, but some athletic directors have suggested ending conference play even sooner.

"There is a lot of sentiment to stay with the Southwest Conference for two years, but there are also those who'd like to split sooner. It's a mixed bag," Texas Christian athletic director Frank Windegger said Friday.

The athletic directors voted at a Friday meeting to continue playing as a conference in all sports in 1994-95, which SWC commissioner Steve Hatchell said was never in doubt.

But how many sports and how many of the league's 17 championship games will be played in 1995-96 has yet to be determined.

The only sport that will definitely continue SWC play in 1995-96 is football, with the conference champion winning a guaranteed spot in the bowl coalition.

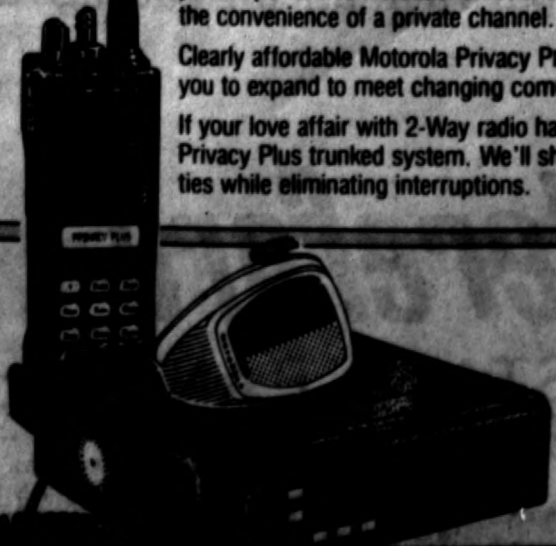

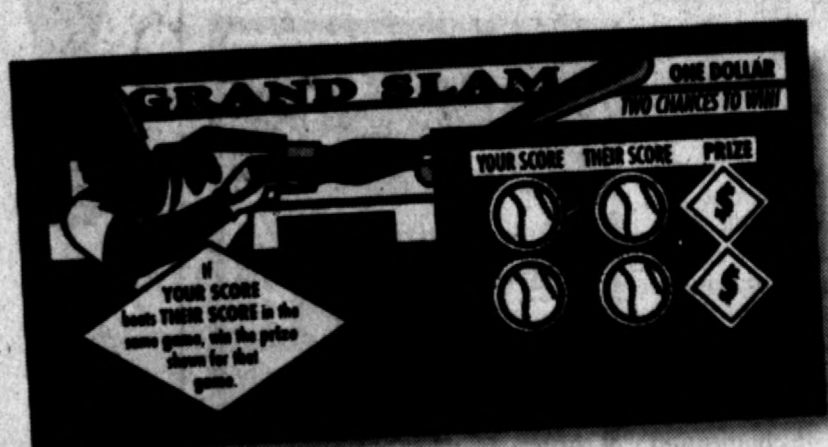

Maxwell's outside game helps Rockets past Blazers

Hakeem Olajuwon was great, as usual. What the Houston Rockets needed was someone to be great along with him.

On Friday night, that man was Vernon Maxwell.

Maxwell made his first four shots, then missed six of seven before scoring 10 consecutive Houston points in a fourth-quarter surge that carried the Rockets to a 114-104 victory over Portland in their playoff opener.

"I just stopped being aggressive on offense," Maxwell said of his midgame slump. "My teammates kept telling me to be aggressive on offense. They stayed on me the whole night."

The Rockets were protecting a 97-95 lead with 5:20 to play when Maxwell—who scored 24 points and hit five 3-pointers—hit consecutive 3-point baskets and then two jumpers, giving Houston a 107-98 lead with 2:39 to play.

Olajuwon also played a big role in the victory with 26 points, 10 rebounds and six blocked shots. Clyde Drexler had 26 points and 13 rebounds for the Trail Blazers.

The other four series resume today and tonight. Indiana and Miami hold 1-0 leads in the Eastern Conference after road wins at Orlando and Atlanta. In the Western Conference, San Antonio and Seattle both won at home, beating Utah and Denver, respectively.

The Portland-Houston game featured 15 3-pointers, matching a playoff record. Terry Porter, who scored 21 points for the Blazers, had four second-quarter 3-pointers, equaling the record for 3-pointers in one period.

Houston led 64-55 at the half, but the Blazers outscored the Rockets 13-6 to start the third period, closing to 70-68 with 7:31 to go in the period.

Houston took a 90-83 advantage into the final quarter before Portland took its first lead since the opening

basket, 91-90, on Porter's basket with 8:42 to play.

The Rockets regained the lead on a pair of free throws by Mario Elie, setting the stage for Maxwell's spurt.

"It was a good comeback, but we had a lot more work to do and didn't do it," Drexler said. "He (Maxwell) got really hot. He kind of fools you because he shoots so quick it's hard to recover. We need to stay closer to him, but I'm not sure we can."

Suns 111, Warriors 104

Charles Barkley put back a missed free throw with 16 seconds left, then stole the ball from Chris Webber and made two free throws as Phoenix dodged an upset bid by visiting Golden State.

"It's my job to make plays when the game is on the line," said Barkley, who finished with 36 points and 19 rebounds. "My teammates did a good job of getting me the ball."

The Suns led 107-104 after Kevin Johnson missed a free throw with 17

seconds left. When Johnson also missed his second attempt, Barkley took the rebound over a fallen Webber and banked it in for a five-point lead.

After the inbounds pass, Barkley bumped Webber off-balance, grabbed the ball and nearly hit a 60-foot shot as he was fouled.

Billy Owens had 27 points and 17 rebounds for Golden State, and Latrell Sprewell had 22 points and 10 assists.

Johnson scored 24 points and Dan Majerle 19 for the Suns.

Bulls 104, Cavaliers 96

Scottie Pippen scored 31 points and Scott Williams 13 of his 21 in the final quarter as Chicago started its playoff bid for a fourth straight NBA title by winning at home over Cleveland.

The Cavaliers played without the heart of their inside game. John "Hot Rod" Williams, Brad Daugherty and Larry Nance watched from the bench

in street clothes because of injuries.

Gerald Wilkins led Cleveland with 23 points. Mark Price, with a 17.3 regular-season average, managed just nine points on 2-for-11 shooting.

Pippen also finished with 12 rebounds. His 31 points were one short of his career playoff high.

Cleveland closed within four in the final period, but Williams scored eight straight for Chicago, lifting the Bulls to an 88-79 lead with 6:44 left.

Knicks 91, Nets 80

New York, which lost the regular-season series 4-1, defeated New Jersey as Patrick Ewing led a 10-0 fourth-quarter run.

Ewing missed 13 of his first 17 shots

and New York trailed 68-64 before the veteran center started the winning burst with a three-point play. Charles Smith put New York ahead with a layup and, when he missed the ensuing free throw, Ewing made it 71-68 with an emphatic rebound dunk.

Ewing finished with 25 points and 13 rebounds, and both he and Smith scored 11 in the fourth quarter. Derrick Coleman scored 27 points for the Nets.

"We wanted to send a message to them," said Knicks forward Anthony Bonner, a solid contributor inside with nine rebounds and seven points in 21 minutes. "They predicted a win, but we're just trying to tell them that, even though there are two teams in this area, we are THE team."

Houston cut it to 2-1 in fourth when Biggio doubled with one out and scored on a double by Luis Gonzalez, but the Cardinals made it 3-1 in the fifth when Ozzie Smith reached on a fielder's choice, moved to third on a single by Gregg Jefferies and scored on Zeile's sacrifice fly to right.

Rockies 6, Cubs 5

Andres Galarraga set a National League record with his 30th run batted in for the month of April on Friday, helping Colorado to a 6-5 win over Chicago, who remained winless at home.

David Nied (3-2) gave up four hits over five innings for the win, walking three and striking out two. Darren Holmes earned his third save.

Steve Trachsel (2-2) gave up 10 hits and walking one over six innings. He struck out five.

Galarraga hit an RBI double in the Rockies' fifth to open a 4-2 lead. The 30th RBI broke the NL April record

of 29 shared by Dale Murphy (1985) and Ron Cey (1977).

The Cubs now are 0-9 at Wrigley Field, the worst home start in the team's history.

Chicago tied the game 4-4 in the fifth on Ryne Sandberg's two-run homer.

Expos 3, Padres 1

Kirk Rueter became the first major league pitcher since Fernando Valenzuela in 1981 to start his career with a 10-0 record, leading Montreal past San Diego 3-1 Friday night in Montreal.

The 23-year-old left-hander struck out seven, outduelling Padres starter

Andy Benes (1-5). Rueter (2-0) lasted 7 1-3 innings and allowed six hits, helping Montreal win its third in a row.

Rangers' Gonzalez struggling with big expectations, ballpark

ARLINGTON, Texas (AP) - Pressure. It comes at Juan Gonzalez from all angles.

He's trying to live up to a \$45 million contract and the fame brought by consecutive American League home run titles.

Expectations are higher now. And the 24-year-old Gonzalez struggles to make the Texas Rangers fans happy.

It's only been a week since the drug-induced death of his brother, Juan "Puma" Gonzalez, and the memories are hard to shake.

It's been an awful April for the foundation of the Rangers franchise.

"I need to be more relaxed at the plate," Gonzalez said. "I'm tight. I've been putting pressure on myself with men on base. I need more walks. I need to be more patient."

Pitchers pick on his anxieties. They throw curveballs outside the strike zone. Gonzalez swings anyway.

"This is the first time in my career that I've started this slowly," said Gonzalez, who is hitting in the .230 range and has just three homers and 13 RBIs. "I think because of my big contract sometimes I try too hard."

Gonzalez, who had 46 homers last year, tries to tell himself it's a long season and other big-name stars struggle.

"Rafael Palmeiro struggled in

April last year and look at the season he had," Gonzalez said. "Barry Bonds is starting slowly this year."

But there are other things bothering Gonzalez. Like The Ballpark's 390-foot power alley in left center.

"The stadium is too big," Gonzalez said. "I have to go to right field here. There are a lot of extra bases but no home runs. If I hit a ball hard, there will be no question it will go out. But other balls I hit that might go out in other stadiums won't go out here."

Texas manager Kevin Kennedy has moved Gonzalez to fifth in the batting order for the first time.

"A lot of things are coming at Juan," Kennedy said. "He has the new contract and expects more of himself and he's getting over the death of his brother. He just needs to get in focus at the plate. He needs to take more balls. Until he starts walking he won't get a lot of good pitches."

Gonzalez said the drop to fifth in the lineup doesn't bother him.

"It's OK for four or five games," Gonzalez said. "It will help me relax."

Luis Mayoral knows the hurt Gonzalez is feeling. The Rangers' Latin American liaison lives in the same house with Gonzalez.

"Juan is a unique person,"

Mayoral said. "His fame and his money doesn't make him feel superior. But those who boo him should understand he's come a long way in four years. I think he was making about \$90,000 four years ago. Now look what's he's making. He gets frustrated if he feels he isn't earning it."

"His brother's death hurt him. But he has some great friends on this team. Will Clark has been a great influence. Juan respects Clark a lot."

Batting coach Willie Upshaw said Gonzalez "is just trying too hard. He's got to clear his head. He's got to take his walks and look at pitches better."

In the dressing room, Gonzalez has a small statue of the late Roberto Clemente for inspiration.

Gonzalez is striving to be a hero of Clemente's stature in his native Puerto Rico.

But for now Gonzalez just wants to find Juan Gonzalez again. The Rangers' biggest star has been lost in The Ballpark.

Cowboys hold first team meeting with new coach

IRVING, Texas (AP) - The Super Bowl champion Dallas Cowboys visited "Switzerland" Friday.

Barry Switzer, the third coach in the club's history, got the team together for the first time since Jimmy Johnson's departure with a mandatory minicamp for every player under contract.

Switzer playfully wrestled with discontented wide receiver Michael Irvin in the dressing room and said, "The next time you start throwing trash cans, I'll help you reload."

Only weeks ago, Irvin threw a fit and trash cans at a television camera crew after learning Switzer would be the new coach.

The only big-name player missing was running back Emmitt Smith, whose grandmother died early in the week. Smith is scheduled to attend the last day of the camp at Valley Ranch on Sunday.

Rain poured down and Switzer called it "a downer."

"But it's great to have everybody together," he said.

It was Switzer's first full day as a coach in the NFL and the first time he had a whistle around his neck since leaving Oklahoma under a cloud of scandal five years ago. He gave the team a rousing pep talk, then talked about getting back to the game he loves.

"I was out a long time and was getting bored," Switzer said. "Life is full of obstacles and challenges. I look forward to it as an opportunity."

Switzer said he is willing and able to handle the pressure of getting the team to the Super Bowl.

"People ask me about pressure," Switzer said. "I don't think about pressure. My God, at my age (57) I'm not concerned. If I was 30 years old I'd be worried about it. Remember I was retired when Jerry (Jones) called."

Switzer said he's not going to change.

"I'll be the same coach I always was," he said. "Probably more like I was in the early '70s when I first became a head coach. That's the enthusiasm I have right now."

He added, "Now, we get into what this job is all about - the coach-player relationship. That's what I've missed."

"The players have to be patient with me. I knew the names. I've got to put the faces with the names. We're looking for a comfort zone."

Switzer said the Cowboys will have as many camps as they did under Johnson.

"You practice like you play and play like you practice," Switzer said.

"You bring that same level of intensity in practice that you need on Sunday. You don't go out in shorts on Sunday. You need those four or five second bursts in practice that you need in games."

"This staff knows how to work. I'm going to protect some players. If your premier players - the Emmitt

Smiths, the Charles Haleys, Troy Aikmans - are going to get hurt, it's going to be on Sunday."

Quarterback Troy Aikman said Switzer has a lot to learn.

"The tough thing for him is going to be learning the NFL game," Aikman said. "It's a lot different from college. Everything speeds up. He's going to have a lot of game-day pressure on him."

"I think the players will like playing for coach Switzer," Aikman added. "He's always had an open-door policy. If you have a gripe with him, you can walk in his door and get it settled. I think his coaching style will help this team relax."

About Irvin throwing trash cans at the camera crew, Switzer laughed and said, "He'd be the first one to get mad if they didn't show him."

"Switzerland" has opened.

The brilliant pro running back, Walter Payton, also passed the ball and kicked field goals and extra points at Jackson State.

An appeals court Wednesday ordered the German group to pay the No. 1 women's tennis player \$35,000 for lyrics suggesting she had an incestuous relationship with her father.

The Karlsruhe court threw out an appeal by Run-Over Schoolchildren of a ruling in Graf's favor last year by a lower court.

The judge also accused the band of trying to publicize the case to boost sales of its albums.

going to have to eat his hat.

Here is a sampling of the most one-sided mail I've ever read:

DEAR ANN: Here are three facts that are absolutely irrefutable:
 1. Elvis is dead.
 2. The pope is Catholic.
 3. In a Pacific typhoon, with winds over 70 miles an hour and massive swells, waves can and will come over the top of the bow of a carrier. I've seen it happen. -- John M., USN Retired, Oxnard, Calif.

DEAR JOHN: Thanks for the backup information. Here's more from the Department of the Navy:

DEAR MISS LANDERS: Enclosed you will find two photographs of the aircraft carrier USS Bennington, after the ship had been through a typhoon off Okinawa on June 4, 1945. I'll bet this typhoon was the one referred to by your correspondent. As you can see, the damage to the steel structural members supporting the flight deck was so massive, they simply folded over.--David Walden, assistant for exploratory development, Department of the Navy

From Albany, N.Y.: I am enclosing photos of the USS Hornet with the deck that was battered by 90-foot waves. I lived through that typhoon, and it was an experience I shall never forget.

Blaine, Minn.: I came home from Pearl Harbor submarine base on the aircraft carrier Saratoga. The sea was so rough and the waves so high, we couldn't eat at tables. We sat on the hangar deck with our backs to the bulkhead and the tray on our laps. I was also in Okinawa in 1945 during the typhoon. It was so bad, I lived for four days under a bulldozer.

Mesa, Ariz.: I hate to admit it, but that loudmouthed braggard is right. Carrier decks CAN be washed down by heavy seas. On June 9, 1945, I was in the Yellow Sea, aboard the USS Pittsburgh. The waves were over 100 feet high, and the winds were up to 142 miles per hour.

MINDING YOUR OWN BUSINESS

GENERAL BUSINESS

Business is war, is a theme woven into several business books and articles I've read recently. The authors then go on to compare managing a business to running a successful military campaign. Many of the comparisons are valid and all are interesting. This week I worked to find the top of my desk. As I sifted the piles, I ran across some excerpts of a speech General H. Norman Schwarzkopf made after returning from the Persian Gulf. In this speech, Schwarzkopf outlined the philosophy and principles he used to guide American troops to quick success. As I read these military guidelines, I began to see how you could apply them to business problems. We've written about most of these topics before in this column, but coming from a General, well, they have a different ring.

Schwarzkopf Suggestions

- You must have clear goals and you must be able to present them plainly. I'm glad Schwarzkopf put this high on the list. I believe that one of the reasons small business owners don't succeed is because they don't set goals to guide them toward the desired outcome.
- Give yourself a clear agenda: Every morning write down the five most important things you want to accomplish that day. Whatever else you do, get those five things done and insist that people who report to you operate the same way. As we've said before, don't get tangled in the urgent but unimportant. Decide what is critical to your business success and concentrate on getting those tasks done.
- Let people know where they stand: The grades you give the people who report to you must reflect reality. I believe the military may be ahead of most businesses in this area. I know many business owners and managers who avoid having heart-to-heart talks with employees. They fear that they may hurt someone's feelings and end up making the situation worse. However, I've yet to see a problem solve itself. Instead, they usually worsen.
- What's broken, fix now: Don't put it off. Problems that aren't dealt with lead to other problems. I've also found problems tend to grow when left unattended. Problems are like weeds, they get bigger without cultivation.
- Set high standards. Too often we don't ask enough of our people. People generally won't perform above your expectations so it's important to expect a lot. Though the general didn't say it, he sets the standard by example. Most leaders do. You can't really

expect the troops to outperform their leader.

- Lay the concept out, but let your people execute it: Step back and allow your people to own their work. This concept is becoming more popular in business today. It's popular because employees who feel that they have ownership are more productive.
- People come to work to succeed. Schwarzkopf doesn't feel that you need to watch people closely. Train them, let them know what you expect, and then let them succeed on their own.
- Never lie, ever. All it serves to do is undermine your credibility with your people.
- When in charge, take command: Leaders are often called to make decisions without adequate information. Many postpone doing anything at all. Instead, they should make a decision, monitor the result and change course if necessary. We call this the Ready, Fire, Aim philosophy. You'll never get all the information on any business situation. So, get what you can, make the decision and see what happens. In business, these decisions are seldom a matter of life or death. You usually get another change to adjust or make it better.
- Do what's right. Schwarzkopf said, "The truth of the matter is that you always know the right thing to do. The hard part is doing it." I agree.

Question/ Answer

Q: I've been told that new concrete should be kept moist for at least three days while curing. I'm wondering just how much stronger can it get, and how long should it cure for maximum strength?

A: Keeping concrete moist helps the curing process. Concrete hardens as a result of a chemical reaction, called hydration, between cement and water, not because it dries. The hardening, or curing, continues as long as moisture remains in the concrete. If too much water is lost from the concrete through evaporation, hydration - and the hardening process - slows down or ceases.

Concrete continues to gain strength after pouring for as long as it retains moisture, but the longer it moist-cures, the slower the rate of strength gain. Moist-curing concrete for 20 days more than doubles its strength compared with 4 days of moist-curing, which is considered a minimum. Although the greatest gain is in the first week or two after pouring, the curing process continues for several months.

Concrete that is not moist-cured at all dries too rapidly, and reaches less than half its potential design strength. It will also have a greater number of shrinkage cracks.

The most frequent moist-curing method is to spread moisture-retaining fabric, such as burlap, over the concrete after it has hardened enough to prevent surface damage.

The fabric should be kept thoroughly soaked with a garden hose so a film of water remains on the entire surface of the concrete throughout the curing period.

Q: I am interested in making a below-grade finished basement into a comfortable office. There is no water seepage, but even so, the basement is cold and clammy in the winter and humid and musty in the summer. I'm using a dehumidifier and a portable heater, but cannot overcome the discomfort. Any suggestions?

A: You have the ingredients for making the finished basement into a comfortable office all year long. However, either you need additional heaters and dehumidifiers or you are not using the ones you have long enough each day.

If you have two or more rooms in your basement, a single dehumidifier will need a fan to circulate the air.

Most dehumidifiers have an automatic control switch which will shut them off at a predetermined humidity setting. Let the unit operate until it shuts itself off. During hot, muggy summer days, the dehumidifier may run almost continuously. If you shut it down prematurely, the unit will not reduce the humidity to the comfort level.

A space heater is effective in heating a single room. If you want to heat more than one room, you'll need a fan to circulate the air between rooms.

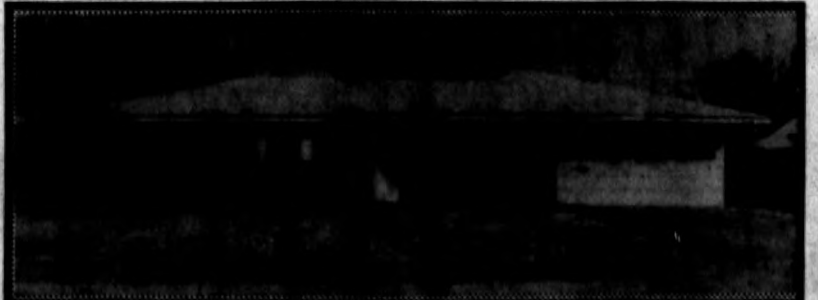

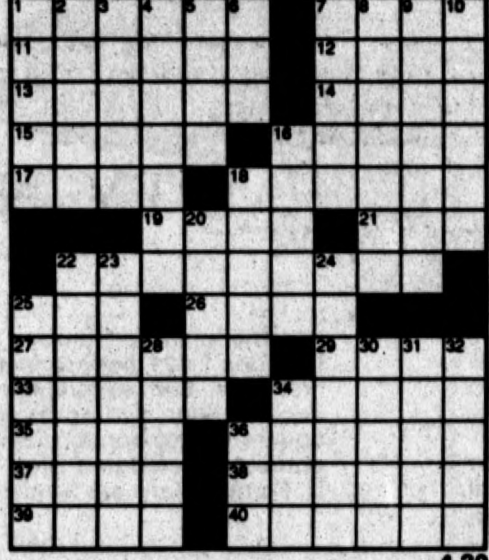

Playa lakes to be symposium topic at TTU, May 18-20

A Playa Basin Symposium will be conducted at Texas Tech University, May 18 through May 20, offering several topics of discussion related to water resources of this area.

The more than 19,000 playas scattered over the area, said authorities, constitute a critical element in water resources.

Dr. Lloyd Urban, director of the TTU Water Resources Center and co-chairman of the symposium, said, "The purpose of this symposium is to bring together as many individuals as possible to share their experiences with each other and with those in attendance -- scientists, engineers, land owners, wildlife management specialists and others who have an interest in and a concern for playas."

Keynote speaker will be Senator Teel Bivins of the 31st Texas Senatorial District. Senator John T. Montford of the 28th District will address a luncheon the same day.

Speaking on a May 19 luncheon will be State Representative David Counts of the 70th District. He is chairman of the House Natural Resources Committee.

On the concluding day of the symposium, participants will take a tour of the High Plains area, visiting playa basins that represent the uses addressed during sessions.

Among topics to be explored during symposium sessions are recharge of the Ogallala Aquifer, playa basin modification, infiltration rates, water quality, playas used in stormwater management, playas used in waste management systems, wildlife management and agricultural production.

Hereford man is certified crop advisor

A Hereford man, Kevin Peck, has completed requirements to become a Certified Crop Advisor.

Peck, a Terra International employee, now is certified by the American Registry of Certified Professionals in Agronomy, Crops and Soils.

The program is designed to establish base standards of knowledge for individuals who advise growers on crop management and production inputs.

"Achieving CCA status demonstrates an individual's thorough understanding of crop production," said Hubert Backus, area manager for Terra.

To qualify for CCA, an individual must have two years of crop production experience and a bachelor's degree in agronomy, or four years of post-high school experience. The applicant also must pass a state and a national CCA exam and sign a code of ethics.

Claims by other countries draw questions from U.S. producers

WASHINGTON (AP) - Countries like Australia, Canada and New Zealand boast of their ability to compete in the world export market for farm goods without subsidies.

But people in this country who grow wheat or produce milk for export are questioning that notion more vigorously than ever before. The Agriculture Department seems to be as well.

Entities like the Canadian Wheat Board and the New Zealand Dairy Board have been singled out last week in official statements and congressional testimony as being closest subsidizers.

"We think the main culprit is the Canadian Wheat Board, which is an entity that will be coming under greater scrutiny from the world," Agriculture Secretary Mike Espy said last week as the United States undertook to restrict imports of Canadian wheat and barley.

Espy referred to the board's ability to undertake "predatory pricing." The board can keep its prices secret and undersell the publicly known price offered by competitors, the complaint goes.

This practice goes on, despite a Canadian Free Trade Agreement in 1989 and a new global trade

agreement under the General Agreement on Tariffs and Trade.

"It is not GATT illegal," Espy conceded, "and it has been excepted from the CFTA."

The wheat board is the kind of institution that should cheer prairie populists in the United States, since the benefits go to the farmers rather than private companies.

The board buys grain, paying an advance price based on the expected world price.

After the crop year ends, the farmers get a final payment based on what the grain actually sold for, minus various costs. The government makes up any difference between payments to farmers and receipts from sales.

Although the institution is legal under world trade agreements, critics like Sen. Kent Conrad, D-N.D., say some practices aren't. The Canadian Free Trade Agreement says neither the United States nor Canada shall sell its grain at below what it cost to buy it from farmers.

But the final payments have been omitted from that calculation, Conrad says, and he blames the Republicans who negotiated the agreement.

"The key issue is the definition of full acquisition cost," he said.

The New Zealand Dairy Board, a similar organization, was singled out

in a House Agriculture Committee hearing on GATT.

"There is an opportunity for ruthless foreign competitors to very adversely affect our domestic industry," said Kay Zeosky, a dairy farmer from Turin, N.Y. "In particular, I am referring to the New Zealand Dairy Board and its monopolistic practices."

The board has been held up by the Congressional General Accounting Office as an example of a group with the kind of export marketing expertise that the United States should emulate. U.S. producers have relied too much on domestic farm programs and paid too little attention to export markets.

Dairy producers, in fact, have been trying to come up with a self-help program that would create a board with export enhancement functions. But they've met with administration concerns that the board's operations could be challenged.

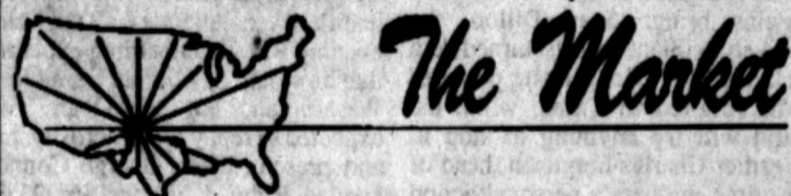

Stellar females dominate CBS' 'Widow' miniseries



Diane Lane portrays Lucy Marsden, the wife of a Civil War captain, played by Donald Sutherland, in "Oldest Living Confederate Widow Tells All" on CBS. Married when she was just 14, the two have problems caused by their age difference and his wartime memories. The miniseries begins Sunday and concludes Tuesday.

Some of stage and film's most luminous actresses have a field day in "Oldest Living Confederate Widow Tells All," a two-part, four-hour miniseries premiering Sunday and Tuesday, May 1 and 3, on CBS.

Diane Lane ("Lonesome Dove") and Anne Bancroft share the title role at various ages, and the supporting cast is caviar all the way: Cicely Tyson, Blythe Danner, Maureen Mueller (the sitcom "Doctor, Doctor") and former Broadway star Gwen Verdon all have plum roles.

Based on the best seller by Allan Gurganus, "Widow" tells the sprawling and often funny life story of Lucy Marsden, who is married at age 14 to a 50-year-old Civil War veteran, Capt. William Marsden (Donald Sutherland). Their union is a rocky one, and Lucy is forced to mature quickly to cope with Marsden's vivid wartime flashbacks, including the sight of his best friend dying before his eyes.

"Widow" begins in the present, as 100-year-old Lucy shares her past with residents at a senior facility. As the naive teen-age Lucy struggles to cope with adult responsibilities and trauma, she finds herself becoming reliant on Castalia, the captain's housekeeper and former slave (Tyson). A warm bond slowly grows between the two women, and it is Castalia who helps Lucy develop a backbone.

"I think that Castalia recognizes immediately what this young, innocent child is in for," says the Emmy-winning Tyson, reflecting on her role. "And (she) begins to lay the groundwork for her so that she will be able to sustain whatever it is that comes. Having lived in this Marsden family from the time she was about 3, 4, 5 years old, (Castalia) knew what Lucy was in for."

While the housekeeper is a former slave, she remains very much her own

woman. "She made the choice to stay with (the captain's) mother," Sutherland points out, "rather than go and be free."

Lane, who is barely 30 herself, plays Lucy from ages 14 to 58 (Bancroft plays only the 100-year-old widow), but she says Lucy's inner core remains so constant that the shifts in time were not especially difficult for her.

"There's an innocence and a lack of guile and a lack of manipulation that somebody has at that age," Lane says of her early scenes as a 14-year-old. "In some ways it's more complicated to shave away the things that you know than to act as though you're hyperaware of everything that's going on around you."

Most of the narrative, logically, is told from a feminine perspective, yet Sutherland, who says he rarely accepts TV roles, found himself hugely enjoying the role of the addled captain. He adds that a clerical error very nearly cost him the part.

"They sent it to me and I turned it down," he recalls. "And then they sent it to me a second time, and I turned it down. Then my agent said, 'Really, take it seriously, because it's a terrific piece. I don't know why you don't like it. Talk to the director.'"

"So (director) Ken Cameron phoned me and I said, 'I don't like the script. I find the character confusing. I don't understand it.' He said, 'Do you like the scene in the hotel?' And I said, 'What scene in what hotel?'"

"They had sent me only the second half. I had read the second half twice," he laughs. "And I was so overwhelmed with how wonderful it was when I read the first half that I said, 'Sure!'"

'Baseball' season begins Sept. 18 on PBS; 'Larroquette' lauded; Foster Grants return

PBS has announced the official bat time for Ken Burns' epic "Baseball" documentary. The near 20-hour miniseries, divided into nine "Innings," begins Sunday, Sept. 18. Better start roasting the wieners now.

NBC's "The John Larroquette Show" has received a Wilbur Award - not for its portrayal of a recovering alcoholic - but for an episode titled "God," in which Mahalia (Liz Torres) went to great lengths to save the soul of her agnostic boss (Larroquette).

Fox's "In Living Color" is looking for a shot in the arm from new cast members, some of whom are being selected in a multicity search this spring. Casting director Jaki Brown-Karman and her crew interviewed about 700 hopefuls in New York last month. "Fox is most interested in seeing as many new faces as they possibly can," she says. "What we're looking for are very funny young people who appear to be between the ages of 18 and 35, who are at least 18. Any talented, funny person who just kind of comes in and has their own uniqueness is what we're looking for."

"Certainly comparisons will be made to what they've had and what they have on the show now. It was a strong ensemble when it started out with the Wayans family. Once they left, I think it did leave a bit of a void. The one thing that they try to do is take the show back to where it was." The new cast members are expected to join the

ensemble comedy series in the fall. Meanwhile, folks in Washington, D.C., and Miami still have time to audition for the job of talk show host on NBC's new cable network, **America's Talking**. Would-be Oprahs and Phils should come armed with a videotape of themselves in action.

Spacek shines in ABC's 'Place for Annie'; 'Widow Tells All'; murder case turns documentary on PBS

Perhaps ABC's "A Place for Annie" would have been more aptly titled "A Place for Linda."

The Hallmark Hall of Fame presentation, Sunday, May 1, stars Sissy Spacek as Susan, a nurse who becomes a foster mother to an infant, Annie, who tested HIV-positive at birth.

When Susan attempts to adopt Annie, her mother, Linda (Mary-Louise Parker), reappears after abandoning her at birth. Linda is a recovering drug user who has the AIDS virus. She doesn't have much time to live, and she wants to spend that time with her daughter. But Susan doesn't think Linda is capable of caring for the child, and opens her home to her for two reasons: to make sure Annie has a suitable home where she can remain close to her, and to give Linda a better housing option.

The two women, who hate one another at first, grow to get along and even care about each other, especially as Linda's days dwindle. The story

ultimately becomes one about Linda and Susan's relationship.

Both women turn in first-rate performances, as does Joan Plowright as the baby's nanny. After an awkward first scene for Jack Noseworthy, who portrays Susan's teen-age son, Danny, he eases into the script nicely.

Also on Sunday, CBS offers Part 1 of "Oldest Living Confederate Widow Tells All," with Donald Sutherland and Cicely Tyson. The film chronicles the life of a Civil War veteran's wife. Part 2 airs Tuesday, May 3. The chilling "Cape Fear" comes to NBC Sunday, starring Robert De Niro.

Tuesday, May 2, PBS' documentary "Brother's Keeper" interweaves courtroom footage and interviews in the Bill Ward murder case. His brother, Delbert, was accused, but the case was not open-and-shut.

The Harts are back, yet again, in NBC's "Hart to Hart: Old Friends Never Die," Friday, May 6.

"Made in America" makes its HBO premiere, Saturday, May 7.
