Sad day for chickens, amoeba: 'Far Side' artist Larson retiring

Associated Press Writer SEATTLE (AP) - Limp hens lying around the Boneless Chicken Ranch. Bears spying campers in sleeping bags and exclaiming "Sandwiches!" Smart-talking cows. Dumb scientists. Amorous amoebas.

It's not just that cartoonist Gary Larson sees the world through a different lens. "I think the wires connecting the lens to the gray matter are crossed," said his friend John McCosker. "I just wish I could figure out how to do it myself."

After Jan. 1, he'll have to. Larson is retiring, ending 15 years of his syndicated daily cartoon 'The Far Side.'

Monday's announcement had fans running to refrigerators and filing cabinets for a reassuring glance at their favorite "Far Side" clip, such as:

- "Wait a minute here, Mr. Crumbley," the doctor says to a man impaled on a rhinoceros. "Maybe it isn't kidney stones after all.'

- A tyrannosaurus and two other dinosaurs puffing on cigarettes over the caption "The real reason dinosaurs became extinct."

Larson creates a world of supersaturated silliness in which

animals act like humans and vice versa. Through characters such as pudgy little boys and women with beehive hairdos, he conjures up absurdity by inserting ordinary conversation into extraordinary situations.

His work often teeters at the edge of bad taste - and occasionally embraces it.

Take the 1990 cartoon about the Donner Party, whose 1847 attempt to cross the Sierra Nevada ended in cannibalism. Larson's cartoon showed a foot sticking out of a sandwich.

"The mind that conceived it must be terribly sick, and the mind that permitted this to be printed is even sicker," one reader wrote to the Miami Herald.

To which another reader replied: "If you mess with Gary Larson fans, you may be sorry! We are intelligent, independent, and potentially fierce! If pushed, we could get militant. Terms like 'economic sanctions' come to mind. We also are hard-working, loyal Americans who happen to enjoy witty, offbeat, thought-provoking humor."

Fans appear to outnumber the critics.

The cartoon is distributed to nearly 1,900 newspapers worldwide through the Universal Press Syndicate. "The Far Side Off-the-Wall Calendar" has been the nation's best-selling calendar for nine years. And each of Larson's 19 books of collected cartoons has sold more than a million copies.

An exhibit of his sciencerelated cartoons made a nationwide tour of science museums, including the Smithsonian, and now resides permanently at the California Academy of Sciences in San Francisco. Larson even has an insect named after him: Strigiphilus garylarsoni, a biting louse.

Larson, 44, is not entirely comfortable with all the attention. He lives in Seattle and rarely grants interviews.

Officials at Universal Press Syndicate said Larson was "out of the country" this week - the same place they said he was in 1988 when he announced a 14-month hiatus from drawing "The Far Side."

In a prepared statement, Larson said Monday that he was worried his work would suffer if he continued, "or at the very least ease into the Graveyard of Mediocre Cartoons.'

The syndicate will continue to publish "Far Side" books, calendars and greeting cards, but they'll be based mostly on existing

In the fiscal year just ended, courts ordered 24,937 hours of community service. A total of 22,393 hours were completed by 379 offenders participating in the program.

Local agencies saved an estimated \$111,967 through the CSRP hours. The amount is based on \$5 per hour of service.

Clinton may be unseen ballot issue

Poll shows lagging popularity could affect candidates

HOUSTON (AP) - Although voters won't notice on their November ballots, an unseen issue could be as important as their choices for candidates.

A poll conducted for The Houston Post and KHOU-TV shows that lagging popularity of President Clinton could affect the performance of his fellow Democrats up and down the ballot. "It's clear he is not a popular

person in this state," said Bob Stein, the Rice University political scientist who conducted the statewide poll of 676 likely voters Sept. 23-28. Results showed that 58 percent

disapproved of Clinton's job performance while 33 percent Questioned about their overall

feelings about the president, 54 percent said they had an unfavorable view and 35 percent replied favor-

Popularity ratings for incumbent Democratic Gov. Ann Richards, in

contrast, were 56 percent favorable and 34 percent unfavorable. She is a longtime Clinton ally,

Ratings were 54 percent favorable and 23 percent unfavorable for Republican challenger George W. Bush, son of former President Bush.

Of those who disapprove of Clinton, 60 percent support George W. Bush and only 23 percent back Richards. About 68 percent of white voters in the poll gave unfavorable reviews to the president, with only 25 percent favorable.

The president fared better with Hispanics, 57 percent approval and 31 percent disapproval, and blacks, 60 percent approval and 21 percent disapproval. Richards also polls better among minorities.

Even among those voters who believe the economy is improving, 48 percent disapprove of Clinton's performance and 47 percent approve.

Ratings for ex-president Bush topped them all at 66 percent unfavorable.

Margin of error for the poll is plus or minus 3.5 percentage points. The so-called "Clinton factor" is being felt in campaigns in many states, especially the South, where the president's poll ratings are depressed.

Democratic U.S. Senate nominee Richard Fisher, also a longtime friend of Clinton's, recently declared publicly that the president's ratings are hurting Democrats in general.

Despite Richards' popularity and her strong personality, the poll showed her in a virtual dead heat with Bush, and the numbers suggest it has a lot to do with the negative feelings for Clinton.

Richards campaign spokesman Chuck McDonald said that regardless of the numbers, Democrats expect the incumbent to be judged on her own merits, not the president's.

"Voters just don't see it as a Bush-Clinton race. They know better. Fisher," Stein said.

But Bush strategist Karl Rove predicted the Clinton factor will ecome more pronounced as the election nears.

"It's hurting Ann Richards and every Democrat. She definitely is not immune to this. After all, she was chairman of the (1992 Democratic National Convention) that nominated Clinton," Rove said.

The Clinton influence is even more. pronounced in the U.S. Senate race between Fisher and Republican incumbent Kay Bailey Hutchison.

Even among voters who approve of Clinton's performance, only 36 percent support Fisher, compared with 23 percent for Mrs. Hutchison. "Fisher doesn't even get a majority of the vote that thinks Clinton is doing well. That's very bad news for





Abilene Reporter-News ABILENE, Texas - How far will a high school six-man football team go to play a game? Try 886 miles. country - by Wells.

That's how far some fans will travel this Saturday when Revere, Colo., plays at Gordon.

That's right, Gordon, Texas, located three miles north of Exit 370 on Interstate 20, 90 miles east of Abilene. Revere is a consolidated school between Ovid and Sedgwick near Interstate 76. It's about three miles south of the Nebraska border the way the crow flies, but 12 miles

if you drive it.
"We had trouble getting some games, so when we were contacted by Tommy Wells about playing Gordon, we jumped at it," Revere coach Dave Rice said. "This will be a great experience for our kids. We want them to have some fun and we'll use it as a learning tool."

If nothing else, they'll learn a lot about geography, and they won't miss any school time. Rice said the team will drive to Denver, about 180 miles from Revere, after school Friday and then will fly Saturday to Dallas, arriving around 9 a.m. Gordon will have a bus waiting there to pick up the team and take them to the stadium

for the 4 p.m. kickoff.

After the game, the team will be fed a meal, then be taken back to the airport for an 11 p.m. flight home.

There are 20 players, plus two coaches and two managers, cheerleaders and school administrators making the plane trip along with several fans. Rice says quite a few fans are leaving Friday morning to drive to Gordon,

a 16-hour trip. Wells, who lives in Ranger but publishes six-man football magazines in Texas, Colorado and Nebraska, is using some of the proceeds from his publications to help defray some of Revere's expenses.

"We came up with an open date when Blum was put in 11-man football, leaving only five schools in our district," said Gordon coach Nelson Campbell. "Tommy approached us about playing an out-of-state team, but efforts to get a team from Nebraska fell through. Then he worked out a deal with

Revere won the Colorado state six-man championship in 1989, '90

and '91, winning 29 straight games during one stretch. Then the Raiders went 4-4 and 9-2 the past two years in eight-man football before dropping back down to six-man. The Raiders are 4-0 this year and are the top-ranked six-man team in the

6-man team plans 886-mile road trip

One of its former players is Keith-Miller, a reserve fullback on the University of Colorado's undefeated team. Rice said he didn't have a player of Miller's caliber this year.

The Raiders will have to get used to a few rule changes for this game because it plays under high school Federation rules; Texas doesn't.

"We have to pitch the football at once before we can run with the football," Rice said. "And we can throw two forward passes on the same play as long as both are thrown behind the line of scrimmage. We

swapped films with Gordon and I noticed some chop blocks thrown and no penalties were called. Those are illegal up here."

This may be the first trip to Texas for most of the players, but Rice once pitched in a baseball game for Lamar Community College at Ranger College. Ranger is about 30 miles from Gordon.

Right now, the schools are working on a one-game contract, and there's been no dicussion about next year. But Campbell said he's not against playing them again.

Gordon has just built a new football stadium which will seat 3,500, Campbell said.

"We've drawn well this year, our side of the stadium (about 2,000 seats) has been full for each game, but our opponents haven't brought many fans with them," he said. "I understand they have a pretty good following coming here."

But they may be too travel-weary to enjoy the game, especially those who will be thinking about the drive back home. .

Garland fullback racks up 323 yards, 7 TDs

DALLAS (AP) - North Garland's Joseph Polk spent the first four weeks of this season getting used to being a fullback, picking up things like which linemen to run between instead of around like he did as a tailback.

Game five was against Garland Naaman Forest, where Polk went as a freshman

Spurred by the excitement of playing his ex-teammates and filled with the confidence of being comfortable at his new spot, Polk had the game of his life Friday night.

He ran for 323 yards and seven touchdowns on 16 carries in a 56-20 North Garland victory, earning Polk top billing on this week's Associated Press honor roll.

"When I came (to North Garland), people I knew from Naaman Forest were talking up stuff about me," Polk said. "All that was built up inside me. ... I wanted to have a big game

against Naaman Forest this year." Polk had a huge first half, rushing for 321 yards on 15 carries. His six TDs in the first two quarters included runs of 30, 54, 59 and 91 yards. His only second-half carry was a 2-yard TD run.

North Garland coach Joe Allen said Polk's big night was a culmination of him understanding his new role and settling an old score.

"He looked a little different in practice last week," Allen said. "He looked more explosive. Usually when we break a play he goes 15 yards. But last week he'd go 30. I guess that was because we were playing Naaman."

It also was because Polk is getting

the hang of playing tailback. "He had been tentative sometimes," Allen said. "You have to read your blocks and go inside. The cuts and things are a little different than they are at tailback."

Polk - who is 5-foot-9, 165 pounds with 4.48 speed in the 40 - sprung loose for the big runs by popping through the line and burning

downfield. Allen said he saw Polk show an extra burst of speed as he headed downfield. That's something that may be traceable to an adrenalin rush caused by playing his old school.

"That was extra incentive for him," Allen said. Polk's outing easily was a

career-best, but it wasn't totally out of the ordinary. He already was among the area's

Class 5A rushing leaders and he now has 764 yards, an area-best 102 points and an average of 8.1 yards per carry. He ran for 805 yards as a tailback last



Special treatment can help premature babies

CHICAGO (AP) - Premature babies who receive care tailored to their own needs and personalities develop stronger minds and bodies than those who get the standard treatment, a new study found.
"It has implications for the

medical outcome. It has implications for reducing costs," said Dr. Edward Ogata, head of neonatology at Children's Memorial Hospital in Chicago. "And it has implications for what parents think about - what their baby will be like after 10 or 12 years

The concept behind the research is simple: Care for premature children as if they are "actively participating in their own care and shaping their own development."

Doctors said the results were

Only one of the 18 infants who received the specialized care suffered a brain hemorrhage. Of the 10 in the study who didn't get the specialized care, six were diagnosed with internal brain bleeding.

"That was the most surprising," said Heidelise Als, an associate professor of psychology at Harvard University and a co-author of the study, which appeared in Sept. 21 issue of the Journal of the American

Medical Association. The children who received specialized care also showed a reduction of chronic lung disease because they spent less time on mechanical ventilation.

"These children with chronic lung disease have much poorer pulmonary functions," Als said. "They're very vulnerable children, and they grow poorly. They put all their effort into

In the study conducted at Brigham and Women's Hospital in Boston, premature infants weighing less than 2.76 pounds were monitored for 91 behaviors before and after each

care-giving activity.
Some behaviors, like flaccidity and gaze aversion, were considered signs of stress. Others, like grasping and hand clasping, were labeled regulatory behavior and interpreted as signs of vulnerability.

The observations were turned into ppropriate treatments such as placing the infant in a flexed position to promote rest, holding the child after taxing procedures and making rooms dark and quiet.

The procedures might sound like common sense, but doctors say they're not always easy to use in intensive-care nurseries.

"Those tiny little bodies need intensive procedures," Als said. "To simultaneously take into account what the baby was saying was probably overwhelming."

Less intrusive technology means it's easier to integrate the ideas, Als said. But there's still the obstacle of training and money, she said.

Some hospital nurseries are using a few of the procedures described in the study - and that's an improvement from years ago.

"When I started about 16 years ago, the lights never went off because you always had to see the baby," said Ogata, who was not involved with the study in Boston. "There were often radios blasting because the staff had to stay awake.

ANSWER: Several kinds of moles have cancer potential, an example being one that has been present since birth. Otherwise, potentially dangerous moles distinguish themselves by how they look and where they

A broad category of potentially pre-cancerous moles is the atypical kind. The atypical mole has pretty reliable telltale features to distinguish it from the ordinary kind. It is generally larger than a pencil eraser and has a variety of coloration, with tans, grays and blacks mixed in. An irregular circumference is another characteristic of the atypical mole.

Any mole on the scalp, breast or buttocks should be looked at with suspicion. Ordinary moles rarely occur in those places.

Changing shape and coloration are other mole danger signs.

The safest rule to follow is to suspect any unusual skin growth, no matter where it appears. Periodic skin self-examination is one of the easiest and most rewarding preventive steps you can take. That precaution alone has prevented many cases of melanoma, a skin cancer that is highly curable when reported early. Melanoma can be lethal if ignored.

DEARDR. DONOHUE: Could you lease explain a bit further about chemical imbalances? How it is diagnosed? Is there a lab'test for this? Is it possible that a person with a chemical imbalance could be misdiagnosed as having chronic fatigue syndrome? What is the treatment for chemical imbalance?
