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Graffiti Fighter

Discouraging graffiti artists could become easier if cities, businesses and individuals take advantage of a product that some Hereford men have developed.

Myriad Utile Spray is a coating that is applied to a surface to protect the material or paint.

If the surface then is defaced by paint or other substance, a hot, high-

pressure water spray washes the paint right off.

Proof that it works was exhibited in Hereford last week.

"After we painted over graffiti on a building in a park, these people asked us if they could apply the coating," said Hereford City Manager Chester Nolen.

Although he won't admit to being doubtful about the material's effectiveness before the demon-

stration, Nolen does admit to being "amazed" when the latest graffiti on the building was just washed away with water.

Brady Jones, vice president of Myriad Utile, Inc., said the product first was observed in Mexico. The Hereford group of investors bought it and brought it to the U.S. for testing, production and marketing.

The developer, Francisco Urena, is one of the men involved in the

corporation formed to manufacture and market the coating.

Do not be misled, though, about uses for this substance -- there are many besides the ability to shed graffiti.

After initial development, Jones said, the spray went to Texas A&M University where exhaustive testing was undertaken.

Then, there were field tests to determine the reliability of the product.

And, finally Washington, D.C. lawyers were retained to usher the product through the patenting process.

Jones said there are another products that make the same claims as Myriad Utile Spray.

"There are some paraffin coatings but none like this -- all our claims have been cleared," he continued.

The spray's contents are liquid hydrocarbons and microcrystalline wax. The coating is white and does not discolor the surface to which it is applied. And, it is not visible to the naked eye.

Within a short time after application to a surface, the coating's hydrocarbons evaporate, leaving the wax substance. Tests verify that paints and other materials will not penetrate the coating.

The substance can be applied undiluted, with an ordinary garden spray.

After witnessing the demonstration in the city park last week, the city manager ran down a long list of

Senate panel approves \$243.6 billion for military budget that has pay hike

WASHINGTON (AP) - The Senate Appropriations Committee approved a \$243.6 billion defense spending plan for 1995 that includes a 2.6 percent pay raise for the military and funding for a new aircraft carrier.

The bill is \$3.5 billion higher than this year's defense budget, not counting inflation. Nonetheless, Sen. Daniel Inouye, D-Hawaii, its chief architect, called it a bare-bones measure.

"This bill will buy only 17 combat aircraft. This year the Army will buy no tanks. This year the Navy will buy four ships," Inouye said. "We are staving off the collapse of the defense industrial base."

This bill shores up the so-called readiness aspects of the defense budget, which include funds to pay for day-to-day operations, military salaries, and training.

Inouye, who chairs the Senate Appropriations defense subcommittee, said those costs, and the costs of closing down military bases worldwide, are eating into weapons procurement.

The spending plan for the fiscal year beginning Oct. 1 is \$821 million below President Clinton's request and \$55 million above the defense appropriations bill approved by the House. Once the measure wins approval in the full Senate, lawmakers from both houses will work out differences in a conference commit-

tee. The bill provides \$2 billion for six C-17 transport planes, \$2.7 billion for three Aegis guided missile destroyers, and \$2.3 billion for a new nuclear-powered aircraft carrier built in Newport News, Va. It also includes \$150 million to keep B-2 Stealth bomber suppliers going and keep alive the option of buying in later years more than the 20 B-2s already on order.

The committee included a recommendation that could have a profound impact on the Army's helicopter suppliers. Concerned that development of the new Comanche

Sikorsky Aircraft in Stratford, Conn., and Boeing Helicopters in Philadelphia are working on the Comanche project. McDonnell Douglas Corp. in St. Louis has the Apache contract.

The committee also approved an Inouye proposal to prohibit defense contractors from using Pentagon funds to pay sky-high executive

salaries. Inouye presented a list of chief executive officer salaries, including the \$7.3 million made by General Dynamics Corp.'s James R. Mellor and the \$3.6 million paid to Martin Marietta Corp.'s Norman Augustine.

More than 200 ballots marked in early voting

The number of early voters climbed toward the end of last week as Hereford residents registered their approval or disapproval of a half-cent city sales tax that would provide funds for economic development.

The election to decide the issue will be held Aug. 13. By Friday afternoon, 202 ballots had been marked during the first five days of early voting.

Residents may vote prior to election day through Aug. 9, in the Deaf Smith Courthouse office of County Clerk David Ruland. Hours are 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. weekdays.

The election was called by the Hereford City Commission in response to a recommendation from a task force, People Promoting Progress. Funds raised by the tax levy would be used to assist expansion of existing business or recruiting new business to Hereford.

The task force determined that other cities in the area are using the tax to their advantage and without the levy, Hereford is not competitive in business development.

The seven-acre park presently has three swing sets, a small metal


climbing structure and a basketball goal.

"We could keep garbage trucks cleaner by spraying the surface after they washed," he mentioned. "Then, we could just hose them down." Among other uses, sewer equipment could be protected from corrosive materials with an application of Myriad Utile Spray.

Homeowners might want to use Myriad Utile to protect wood decks or fences as well as concrete block fences.

The principals in the company, including Mario Mula, president; Bill Confer, Jones and Urena, believe uses for the coating are unlimited.

Cost of Myriad Utile is now \$30 to \$35 per gallon, said Jones, but a little goes a long way.

"Coating a stop sign would cost about 30 cents," he said. "Or, for unpainted concrete or wood, it would cost about seven or eight cents per square foot."

The beauty of the material is its resistance to both heat and cold.

"It's stable from minus-350 degrees Fahrenheit to plus-450 degrees after it is applied," Jones said. The material remains pliable and

will not become brittle, he added.

The Food and Drug Administration has approved Myriad Utile Spray for a protective coating on the outside of cartons used for shipping fruits and vegetables, Brady noted.

The park building that has been a regular target for graffiti furnished the proving ground for the spray, as far as Chester Nolen is concerned.

Nolen said after the city was contacted about a demonstration of the effectiveness of the spray, the building in the park was considered ideal because it had been vandalized repeatedly and repainted by the city.

"They coated it about a month ago," Nolen pointed out. "All the black paint that vandals sprayed on it was cleaned off in about 20 minutes."

When warm water is sprayed onto the surface under high pressure, paint does not run. It beads up and slides off without causing further mess.

Principals in Myriad Utile, Inc., have high hopes for their product. They believe more uses will be discovered.

City Manager Nolen agrees, saying his colleagues in municipal government, as well as business and industry, may find the spray to be just what they've been looking for.

Portrait of Thomas Jefferson stolen

BOSTON (AP) - The earliest known life portrait of Thomas Jefferson, described by his friends as looking nothing like him, was stolen from a studio where it had been sent for reproduction, police said Friday.

The 1786 painting had been insured for \$500,000 by its owner, Charles Francis Adams of Dover, a sixth-generation descendant of John Adams, the second president of the United States.

The theft was reported early Friday by an employee of Limitless Design Corp., which shares space with

Polaroid Corp.'s Museum Replicas division, said Sgt. Robert O'Toole.

Thieves got to the painting by breaking into Polaroid's 3-foot by 12-foot metal-and-concrete safe, apparently with a hammer and chisel. The safe did not have an alarm and no security guards patrolled the offices, O'Toole said.

The portrait was commissioned by John Adams and painted by popular 18th century artist Mather Brown, a descendant of the family of famous religious writer Cotton Mather. It shows Jefferson at age 43.

All remaining seventh grade students and all eighth grade students may pick up their schedules from Tuesday Aug. 16 through Friday, Aug. 19. The office is open from 8:30 a.m. to 3:30 p.m. daily.

Registration for kindergarten through sixth grade will be held at the

elementary school campuses on Monday, Aug. 8. Parents/guardians may register children between 7 a.m. and 6 p.m. on this day. Campuses will be open during the noon hour.

Parents who have kindergarten or first grade students who are entering school for the first time should bring proof of age documents, immunization records and the child's Social Security number.

Kindergarten classes will be held at Northwest Primary School, Aikman Primary School, Bluebonnet Intermediate School and Tierra Blanca Primary School.

Kindergarten registration on the paired campuses will be on a **first come basis**. When the kindergarten classes on a campus area at a maximum level, students subsequently registering will be required to attend the kindergarten classes at the other paired school in that attendance

zone.

Actual student assignments to teachers will be made by the building principal.

Pre-kindergarten class registration will be held on Wednesday, Aug. 6 at Stanton Educational Support Center, 711 E. Park Avenue. Registration will be between 7 a.m. and 6 p.m.

The pre-kindergarten classes will be half-day, with morning classes from 8 a.m. to 11:30 p.m. and afternoon classes from 11:55 a.m. to 3:30 p.m.

Morning or afternoon assignments will be made by the building principal.

Transportation for pre-kindergarten classes will be provided outside the two-mile limit for the morning classes. Students in the afternoon classes may also be picked up. These

students will be delivered to the bus drop-off points after school.

Parents are responsible for all other transportation.

Breakfast and lunch will be provided for the morning classes. Lunch will be provided for the afternoon classes.

To be eligible for the pre-kindergarten class, the family must meet free or reduced lunch guidelines or limited English proficiency guidelines.

Parents registering any student new to the district should bring all available educational records, proof of age, immunization records and the child's Social Security number to the school.

Bus information is available at the time of registration. Parents should contact their assigned campuses concerning questions about registration.



Local woman to head Amarillo agency

Northwest Primary School counselor Maria Garcia has announced she is leaving the Hereford Independent School District for a post with an Amarillo non-profit agency dealing with handicapped children and their parents.

Mrs. Garcia is the new director of Uniting Parents.

"We do a lot of advocating for children," Mrs. Garcia said of the organization, which is funded by the Chronically Ill and Disabled Children's Service and Amarillo Hospital Home Care.

Mrs. Garcia said she will stay in Hereford for the time being and even after moving to Amarillo will continue to work with parents of disabled children here, trying to meet the needs they have, whether medical

or otherwise.

"We try to find the local resources," she said. "A lot of it's empowering families," teaching them about laws affecting handicapped children and services available to them and their families.

To help with the work of Uniting Parents, Mrs. Garcia said, "Five parents under my direction have been trained" and are staff resources working in the 26 counties of the Panhandle.

Each one is a parent of a handicapped child and knows the rights of children and can teach parents how to find services for their children.

Mrs. Garcia has a personal interest in her work: Her 3-year-old son, Juan, was born with Down Syndrome.

She is a member of the Texas

Interagency Council for Early Intervention, a state advisory board to which she was appointed by Gov. Ann Richards.

In addition, she is a member of the Deaf Smith County Child Welfare

Board. During her tenure with HISD, Mrs. Garcia was a bilingual teacher at Northwest for four years and counselor the past seven years.

She is immediate past president of the Hereford Classroom Teachers Association.



Mrs. Ramey made history come to life

Editor's Note: A number of Hereford students who attended Stanton Junior High have fond memories of seventh-grade Texas History as taught by the late Mildred Ramey. But no one has probably ever put those memories into words quite like the former student:

She grabbed the long old rusty sword from its dusty place on the wall, slashed it through the air a few times, as if fighting a long-dead ghost, and then dragged it across the floor. She got to the other end of the room and then spoke the words of William Travis to the eventual defenders of the Alamo.

"Those that will stay and defend these hallowed old walls, step across this line. Those that don't may leave with honor, and without explanation." She quoted the speech from memory.

We, about 25 to 30 seventh graders, re-enacted the famous scene crossing the make-believe line in the classroom. The desks had been moved with as much noise as possible. But, then she made us take on an almost church-like reverence.

To this lady, the subject was religious. She was teaching us Texas history, not just history, but Texas history, and she was in the chapter dealing with the Alamo.

Her name was Mrs. Ramey, and she was a character, an actress, an old lady whom at the time drew some strange stares from some wide-eyed know-it-all seventh graders. She really put on a show with that sword and she cried real tears when she sat and read the now famous letter Travis wrote concerning his fears and his promise of no retreat.

The Alamo was stormed on March 6, 1836, and all the Texas fighters within its boundaries were killed. And on that day 124 years later, March 6, 1960, Mrs. Ramey staged her greatest performance.

With desks stacked to form walls, she had all of us 12 and 13-year-old students play the parts of the heroes. She would not allow anyone to act as one of the attackers, the scourge of Mrs. Ramey's heart. We stood behind, or on the desks, repelling the make-believe enemy and one by one Mrs. Ramey had us lay down in turn.

"You have fallen, a hero of Texas...forever," she would whisper.

Twelve years later I finally got to visit the actual Alamo. It's a strange feeling, especially that first visit, to stand look out from the front of the famous Shrine. Woolworth Variety Store is the first thing I saw, and



Out of the Blue

An article I saw on the Associated Press wire the other day shows, I believe, how far our First Amendment rights of free assembly and freedom of religion have eroded over the past few years.

Now, even gathering in public to pray to be the best men they can be gets these men harassment, insulted and harassed.

They are accused of pushing a particular political agenda and of trying to take over this country.

Again, let's make Hereford the growing and thriving community we can be proud of. A vote for this small increase in sales tax is one way we can each do our part.



Ismael Valdes (2-0) pitched two innings for the victory despite giving up the go-ahead run on a balk.


James Mouton opened the ninth with a single off the glove of

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Model UT recruits have athletic, academic skills

AUSTIN - Call University of Texas sophomore Tre Thomas the model recruit for the 1990s. As a high school senior, he was listed as one of the top five overall athletes in the country and received scholarship offers from all the top football programs.

Equally impressive to recruiters, faced with ever-increasing academic standards for their student athletes, were Thomas' classroom credentials. He scored 1,010 on his Scholastic Assessment Test, 400 points more than the minimum required by the NCAA to accept a Division I scholarship. He also carried a 3.7 grade point average on a 4.0 scale.

Thomas, whose mother is a lawyer and whose father is a manager at a food service company, is considered to have the talent to eventually play in the National Football League. The teen-ager from Sugar Land broke into the Longhorns' starting lineup midway through his freshman season before a shoulder injury ended his year. At 6-foot 1-inch and 202 pounds, he's bigger than most defensive safeties, and he's faster. Yet playing professional football is not his chief goal.

"It's more important for me to graduate than it is to play in the NFL," Thomas said.

Although it might seem unusual, given the history of athletes' academic performance, Thomas is more of the rule now than the exception on the Texas football team.

According to an analysis by the Austin American-Statesman of the team's high school grades in college-preparatory classes, Texas is one of the best prepared teams, academically, in the country.

Preview Of Bears

DECATUR, Ill. (AP) - Before they were the Chicago Bears, they were the Decatur Staleys.

But they were led by George Halas, the man later known as the "Papa Bear."

The Staleys apparently played the same kind of "smash mouth" football made famous by the Bears. In a 1920 game against the Universal Tractors of Moline, they won, 20-0. The Decatur Herald raved about the fierce and fast attack and defense of the Staleys, who allowed the Tractors to make just one first down.

Officials believe these strong high school grades combined with the team's equally impressive average on the SAT eventually will translate into higher graduation rates.

An analysis of scholastic information provided by the NCAA showed that UT's graduation rates have ranged from poor to average. When the NCAA first released graduation rates five years ago, reflecting the freshmen who enrolled in 1982-83, the men's athletic department at UT had a 38 percent graduation rate.

The NCAA recently tabulated rates for the class that entered college in 1987-88, finding that the UT men's department had improved its graduation rate to 43 percent. Combined with the women's department's 77 percent, UT had an overall graduation rate of 52 percent for student athletes, which ranked 64th in the country out of the NCAA's 103 major programs.

Yet the 1993 football team's GPA and SAT scores out of high school rival those of traditional academic schools such as Rice, Stanford and Northwestern.

The analysis was done on the freshmen entering in 1990-91, 1991-92, 1992-93 and 1993-94. Two classes were recruited by former football coach David McWilliams, and two were signed by current coach John Mackovic. The GPA was an average of grades in college-preparatory courses in math, natural sciences, social sciences and English.

The data showed:

The UT football team has a combined GPA of 3.07, the fifth best in the country behind Stanford (3.5), Rice (3.38), Northwestern (3.23) and Duke (3.08). The average GPA for football players at all Division I-A schools was 2.68. Texas A&M, the

Longhorns' rival, had a GPA of 2.81. The average SAT score on the team was 873, the 17th best in the country. The average SAT score for football players at all Division I-A schools was 850. Texas A&M's combined SAT was 830.

Of the schools that will form the Big 12 Conference, starting in 1996, UT is No. 1 in both GPA and SAT.

The four recruiting classes between 1990 and 1993 featured some of the top high school prospects in the country. Of the 18 first-year players last fall, half were honor graduates at their high schools. And this same group, according to most national recruiting services, was ranked in the nation's top 10 for its athletic talents.

"I think that says we're going to win some games perhaps other teams might not," Mackovic said. "I think you'll find that the best football teams tend to be a little brighter."

So far, the better grades haven't translated into more wins. UT hasn't won the Southwest Conference since 1990, and under Mackovic, Texas has posted a 11-10-1 record. However, the Longhorns are overwhelming favorites to win the conference this fall, and early polls have ranked Texas as high as No. 9 in the country.

But the grades, perhaps, are more important than recent wins in these days of increasing academic reform.

In 1986, the NCAA instituted tougher academic requirements, known as Proposition 48. Under that rule, athletes must average at least a 2.0 in 11 college-preparatory classes and score a minimum of 700 on the SAT or 17 on the American College Test to sign with a Division I school and become brighter.

A recent study, however, by the

NCAA's Special Committee to Review Initial-Eligibility Standards, projected that 72.2 percent of black student athletes would be ineligible under Proposition 16.

"Every time we have talked about raising standards, we have seen this hysterical reaction," Hearn said. "We have seen that with the passing of Prop 48 that graduation rates are going up. More studies are showing that more athletes are qualifying. The stories are legion of young people taking and retaking their SATs until

they qualify. That wasn't the case when there weren't restrictions."

"We have got to impress on these athletes who want to play in Division I, on their coaches, principals, parents, that these young people have got to work as hard on their studies as they do on their sport," Hearn said. "They'll do it. They have competitive instincts in their bones."

The NCAA's Special Committee recommended that athletes who scored as low as 410 on the SAT be allowed to play for Division I schools if they had a 3.0 GPA. The Presidents' Commission, meanwhile, reiterated its position but compromised a bit by allowing schools to

give nonqualifiers scholarships as freshmen.

The NCAA council will meet to discuss both proposals next month.

As for Thomas, his high school performance seemed to be an accurate predictor of what he would accomplish in college - at least in his freshman year. He's passed 33 hours of classes and has a 2.55 GPA.

He likes the fact that the Longhorns are gaining an academic reputation. "Every program wants that," he concedes. "But I'd rather win the Southwest Conference."



Try fresh figs this season

As summer's parade of fresh fruits floats by, keep an eye out for fresh figs. With their meaty flesh and sweet pear-melon flavor, they add heartiness to summer desserts, without adding fat or many calories. You can choose between Black Mission or Calimyrna figs for this honey-spice compote. The pear-shaped Black Mission fig has a purple skin and a pink interior. The large, round Calimyrna fig has greenish yellow skin and pale pink flesh.

Cherry-Fig Compote

1-1/2 cups white grape juice or apple juice

1 tablespoon honey

4 inches stick cinnamon

1/4 teaspoon ground nutmeg

8 fresh Black Mission or Calimyrna figs

4 medium peaches or nectarines, pitted and sliced

1/2 cup dark sweet cherries, pitted and halved

Whipped cream (optional)

Ground nutmeg (optional)

In a medium saucepan stir together grape or apple juice, honey, stick cinnamon and nutmeg. Bring to boiling over high heat; add whole figs. Return to boiling; reduce heat. Cover and simmer over low heat for 5 minutes.

Add peaches or nectarine slices and cherry halves to the mixture in the saucepan; heat through. Serve the compote warm or chilled. To chill, cool the compote slightly, then cover and chill in the refrigerator for up to two days.

Before serving, remove the cinnamon sticks. If desired, top each serving with a dollop of whipped cream and ground nutmeg. Makes 8 servings.




Caan had a closed meeting Wednesday with a prosecution hearing officer. He was booked March 10 for investigation of brandishing a weapon.

Look for the warning signs of diabetes

Are you experiencing excessive thirst or extreme hunger, frequent urination, dramatic weight loss, irritability, weakness and fatigue, nausea or vomiting and frequent or persistent vaginal infection or dryness? These could be the warning signs of diabetes.

Additional symptoms include recurring or hard-to-heal skin, gum or bladder infections, drowsiness, blurred vision, tingling or numbness in hands or feet, and itching.

Of the 14 million Americans who have diabetes, nearly half are undiagnosed. Type I, the insulin-dependent form of the disease, often develops in childhood but sometimes strikes older people. It stems from the body's failure to produce insulin, a hormone that allows glucose to be used by cells. About one million people have Type I diabetes, which has warning signs that appear suddenly. Treatment consists of daily insulin injections.

Type II, or non-insulin-dependent diabetes, is far more common. It affects an estimated 13 million people, six million of whom do not know they have the disease. This type occurs when the body doesn't produce enough insulin, or doesn't use it effectively, or both. You are at greatest risk for developing non-insulin-dependent diabetes if you are over 40, overweight and have a family history of the disease. Symptoms usually develop gradually.

Type II diabetes often can be controlled without insulin injections. Patients, together with their physicians, develop an individualized management plan that consists of eating small, frequent, healthy meals and exercise, which help the body to utilize insulin more effectively. Left unchecked, soaring blood sugar levels can lead to diabetic shock or coma, which require immediate medical attention.

A third type gestational diabetes, affects about three to 12 percent of all pregnant women. Again, family history and obesity are major risk factors, along with advanced maternal age. Left untreated, the disorder may be associated with serious problems for the baby. Pregnant women age 30 and older should receive a glucose screening test midway through

pregnancy to detect this condition.

In most cases, gestational diabetes can be controlled through diet and management. It usually disappears after birth, but in 50 percent of cases it returns as non-insulin-dependent diabetes within 5-10 years.

Being diagnosed with diabetes requires that you take a very active role in managing your own health. The sooner it is regulated, the easier it is to control.

Make a quick chocolate sauce in your microwave oven, drizzle over the pie shell and chill in the refrigerator for 1 hour. Strawberry Almond Chocolate Tart

1 pre-baked 9-inch pie shell, cooled
1/4 cup strawberry jam
1 cup (6 ounces) semisweet chocolate chips
2/3 cup sweetened condensed milk (not evaporated milk)
1 tablespoon Amaretto liqueur or 1/2 teaspoon almond extract
2 cups sliced strawberries
3 tablespoons toasted almonds
Spread pre-baked pie shell with the 1/4 cup strawberry jam.

Cook semisweet chocolate chips and sweetened condensed milk in a medium microwave-safe bowl on 100 percent power (high) for 1 minute. Stir until smooth. Cook on high a few seconds longer, if necessary. Stir in liqueur. Pour over jam in pie shell; spread to edges. Chill for 1 hour or until chocolate is set. Arrange sliced strawberries over chocolate. Sprinkle with almonds. Serve immediately. Makes 8 servings.

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

Extension News

The evidence linking diet and heart disease is about 20 years ahead of the studies linking diet and cancer. Diet probably plays a smaller role in cancer, but over a lifetime, it can make a difference.

One of the best protectors against a number of chronic diseases, including colon cancer, is fiber. Many studies examine this relationship, but drawing a correlation is difficult due to the complex nature of fiber.

With funding from the National Cancer Institute, research conducted at Michigan State University from 1990 to 1991 examined the ways different types of fiber interact with colon cancer. So far, this work was only done with animals, but as results are gathered and analyzed, some insight

into the fiber-cancer relationship in the human body should be evident.

Preliminary results have shown that the insoluble fibers, which include brans and vegetable stems and stalks, offer more skin and vegetable leaf fiber (soluble fiber). This is so because these insoluble fibers increase the bulk and speed of waste and may help to dilute any carcinogens in the lower intestine and colon, giving them less time to become harmful.

This research determined the components of the fibers that offer the cancer protection and how they work in the body, with the hope of inserting these compounds into other foods.

Basic consensus remains that over a lifetime, diet is important but it won't have a strong therapeutic effect immediately.

Acreage increased in '94 for vegetables; 12 percent above '93

WASHINGTON (AP) - Acreage for harvest of processed vegetables increased 12 percent this year from 1993, with tomato production predicted to reach a record high, the Agriculture Department says.

Processors contracted out 1.49 million acres from farmers for the production of five major crops: snap beans, sweet corn, cucumbers for pickles, green peas and tomatoes. With the exception of cucumbers, acreage for each of the vegetables increased from the previous year.

Tomatoes are forecast to weigh in at a record 11 million tons, an increase of 14 percent from 1993 and 27 percent from 1992. Green pea production increased 42 percent from 1993 to 474,490 tons, mainly because last year's crop suffered from bad weather.

Rural roads to be studied by committee

AUSTIN - A special interim Senate committee has been appointed to report to the next Texas Legislature on the needs of Texas rural roads and bridges.

Lt. Governor Bob Bullock, in announcing the appointments, said, "Safety, commerce and convenience are all at stake in our rural transportation system and the infrastructure that supports it."

Named chairman of the committee is Senator Bill Haley of Center. Serving with him will be Senators Ken Armbrister of Victoria and Bill Sims of San Angelo.

"This committee should focus on what is needed for preventive maintenance and safety," said Bullock.

He charged the committee to look into what the state should spend on rural roads and infrastructure, the needs of the counties and the equity of distribution of state money.

Full cooperation by the state Department of Transportation with the committee was asked by Bullock.

The committee's jurisdiction includes the 40,000 miles of rural Farm-to-Market roads as well as the approximately 138,000 miles of roads maintained by counties.

A report by the committee is to be turned in no later than Dec. 1.



Pig producers finding hard economic times

WASHINGTON (AP) - These aren't good times to be a small- or even medium-scale producer of hogs, according to the Agriculture Department's newest overview of the livestock business.

Breeding herds are expanding. Commercial pork production is forecast at 17.37 billion pounds for 1994, a new record. Some 100 million head will be slaughtered in 1995, beating the 1996 record.

But the herd expansion is limited mostly to states like Missouri and North Carolina, where contract farmers prevail. The contract producers specialize in one thing - hogs, lots of them - to sell to large packing plants.

"Recent studies show that contract producers have lower costs through economies of size, and may receive higher prices for larger marketings of consistently high quality hogs," the department said in its Situation and Outlook report.

The larger operations, from March

through May, averaged 8.65 pigs per litter, compared with 7.5 for small operations.

"Herd cutbacks among smaller producers are expected to continue," the report said.

The break even cost of raising hogs from farrow to finish in the band of states from Ohio to the Dakotas, Kansas and Nebraska is in the \$45-\$50 range, while hogs are selling in the low \$40s per hundredweight.

Even lower feed prices aren't helping, the report says. Higher pork production and large supplies of beef and other meats are expected to keep average hog prices near \$40 per hundredweight.

"Thus, higher-cost producers are expected to experience a cost-price squeeze over the next year, which may force many to exit the industry."

The Deaf Smith County office of the extension service will provide brochures with details on safety practices in transporting materials. Steps in cleaning old containers are outlined in a brochure, also.

Interested persons may obtain a copy of the brochures by calling the extension office, 364-3573.

Personnel of the three sponsoring agencies will be present to assist in the collection project.



What happened? I'm still the same old flag. Oh, I have a few more stars since you were a boy. A lot more blood has been shed since those parades of long ago.



SOCIAL SECURITY QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS

Q I understand that the recent Social Security trustees report stated that Social Security is running out of money. Is this true?

A The trustees review the income and outgo of the trust funds over the next 75 years to determine if they are sufficiently financed to pay benefits during that period. In the past, the Congress has always made the necessary changes to insure the program remains solvent. The latest trustees report shows that Social Security will be able to pay retirement benefits for the next 35 years without any changes in the law. This gives the Congress ample time to take the necessary actions.

Q Is it true that my Social Security benefits may be reduced because I receive a government pension?

A Yes, your benefits may be reduced. There are two rules that may reduce your benefits. One, called "government pension offset" applies only if you receive a government pension and are eligible for Social Security benefits as a spouse or widow(er). The other, sometimes called "windfall elimination provision," affects the way your retirement or disability benefits are figured if you receive a pension from work not covered by Social Security. For more information, either call Social Security's toll-free number, 1-800-772-1213 or the local office at 376-2241, and ask for the factsheet Government Pension Offset, and/or the factsheet A Pension From Work Not Covered By Social Security.

Q If I earned Social Security and military retirement, can I get both Social Security benefits and my military pensions?

A Generally, there is no offset of Social Security benefits because of your military retirement. You'll get your full Social Security benefit based on your earnings. For more detailed information, contact our office and ask for the factsheet Military Service And Social Security.

Q My elderly neighbor isn't able to get out much and has been having a difficult time managing things. I'm concerned about him and would like to help. Could I act as his representative payee even though we're not related?

A We will first determine whether your neighbor is unable to manage his benefits. He may simply need someone to help him make out bill payments from time to time, but may not need someone to assume total responsibility for his affairs. If we find that a payee is needed, we will locate the best available person to take responsibility for managing his affairs. Please contact our office as soon as possible and tell us of your concerns about your neighbor.

Q I'll be retiring next month at age 63. When will I be able to get Medicare benefits?

A Medicare will not start until you reach age 65. You should plan to continue your employer's coverage, or enroll in another health care plan if you cannot continue your present coverage, until your Medicare protection takes effect.



Rather than face the prospect of a future in pain and perhaps in a wheelchair, Blake contacted the Florida Spine Institute in Clearwater, Fla., one of the nation's leading and largest medical centers specializing in the treatment of neck and back pain.

After Blake received a complete physical examination and a diagnosis of spinal stenosis, a customized treatment plan was designed to overcome his pain without surgery.

Eighty-five percent of patients treated at the institute do not require surgery to regain a life without pain. Medication, physical therapy, injections, biofeedback and lifestyle changes are normally all that's needed. In Blake's case, however, surgery was the best solution after conservative methods were tried.

"My recovery was much quicker than I thought it would be," Blake said

Nutrition Notes

When Scientist discovered PROTEIN IN THE LATE 19TH CENTURY they assigned it a name based on the Greek word *proteins*, which means "primary" or "in first place." This was done for a very good reason.

More than half our water-free body weight is protein. However, the importance of protein and realization that meeting caloric needs in the individual's intake almost always guarantees protein needs will be met. Americans consume considerably more protein than generally required;

approximately 70% of protein is derived from animal sources. Near the turn of the century about one-half our protein was derived from plants. Animal food contain all of the dispensable amino acids and so are called complete proteins. Plant proteins generally contain one or more limiting amino acids; either with combining or consuming large amounts of the plant protein the nitrogen and indispensable amino acids requirements can be adequate.

Combining complementary proteins can increase the value of plant proteins. The American Dietetic Association position is that to combine proteins at the same meal is not necessary but consume complementary proteins throughout the day. However, one needs to realize that the most maximal benefit is achieved when the time frame is limited.


Plants are the predominant harvesters of solar energy and they constitute a primary resource of carbon, vitamins, minerals, fiber, protein, some essential fatty acids and usable energy for human food production.

It is usually accepted that concentration and availability of the individual indispensable amino acids are major factors responsible for differences in the nutritive value of various food protein sources. Hence, the efficiency with which a given source of food protein is utilized for supporting and adequate state of nutritional health will depend on (1) the physiological

requirements of the consumer for the individual indispensable amino acids and for total nitrogen and (2) the concentration of specific amino acids in the food proteins.

We ask about the nutritional significance of these differences in amino acids content and profile. This brings up the topic of protein nutritional quality and the various approaches used to assess the comparative value of food proteins. In the research area of protein values we are seeing alternative procedures being proposed and developed. From these studies we may see in the future greater accountability and more detail information which will demonstrate the use of plant proteins in the healthy diet of Americans. It is predicted that these plant proteins will be well tolerated and have greater acceptability; the plant proteins will become a valuable and nutritious means of achieving man's food needs and desire for healthful diets among all economical levels of our citizenry.

Use arthritis rubs with care

The Arthritis Foundation urges people to use caution when applying topical creams, rubs or sprays for arthritis and to contact their doctor if pain lasts for more than two weeks.

An estimated 57 percent of those with arthritis use these over-the-counter (OTC) remedies for temporary relief of arthritis pain.

Topical pain relievers work in several ways, depending on ingredients. Some contain salicylates, the substance found in aspirin, which may penetrate through the skin to the joint and reduce pain.

Others contain ingredients such as menthol or camphor that irritate the skin and distract attention from the actual pain. A third type contains capsaicin, a substance found in hot peppers that reduces the amount of pain signal to the brain.

The Arthritis Foundation also advises:

- Read and follow package directions;
- Wash your hands after every application;

- Avoid combining topical pain relievers with a heating pad because of the risk of skin burns;

-Keep these products away from eyes, mucous membranes, cuts or irritated skin;

-If you are allergic to aspirin or are taking anticoagulant medication, talk with your doctor before using any topical pain reliever that contains salicylates;

-Use topical pain relievers only as one part of a comprehensive treatment program.

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Most people nearing retirement are anxious about their future

WASHINGTON (AP) - Two-thirds of Americans nearing retirement age anticipate serious problems trying to live comfortably on their retirement incomes, a survey shows.

"People age 45 to 59 approach their futures with anxiety," according to the summary of the survey entitled, "Concerns of Adults in Their Pre-Retirement Years."

"Few feel well prepared financially for the transitions ahead - retiring from a job, putting a child through college, helping to support a parent," it explained.

And, the survey found, "Virtually no one this age thinks government can be relied upon to help with the challenges ahead."

The survey was conducted for the American Association of Retired Persons by Princeton Survey Research Associates. It involved 1,223 adults aged 45 to 59 polled between last Nov. 11 and Dec. 5 and had a margin of sampling error of plus or minus 3 percentage points.

The survey found that 39 percent of the respondents either had nothing saved or did not expect to have saved enough to meet even basic living expenses in retirement. Twenty-two percent believed they would have just enough to meet basic living expenses.

Only 11 percent believed that their savings would permit them to "live very comfortably" after retiring. An additional 24 percent said they expected to be able to meet expenses "with a little left over for extras."

Forty-six percent of workers aged 45 to 59 say they plan to retire before age 65, the survey showed. Twenty-eight percent plan to retire before the age of 70, 5 percent plan a later retirement and 15 percent say they will never retire.

Sixty-nine percent of workers aged 45 to 59 have begun to save for their

retirement, although few believe that their current course of saving and investment will lead to very comfortable lifestyles. And 31 percent are relying on Social Security for most of their living expenses.

But another survey, by the Gallup Organization, found only 30 percent of the 2,002 adults polled in February and March expected Social Security benefits to be available throughout their retirement.

Social Security's trustees have warned that unless Congress intervenes, its trust funds will run out of money in 2029.

Contributing to the pre-retirement concerns expressed in the Princeton survey were:

- Twenty-three percent of the workers polled, excluding the self-employed, worry they may lose their jobs within the next year or so.

- Twenty-eight percent have a child under 18. Fifty-seven percent of these are saving for their child's college education and 28 percent are already helping to pay college tuition.

- Forty-seven percent have been unable to save as much because they have given financial help to a relative during the past five years.

- Seventy percent have a parent, or in-law, still living who may become dependent on them for financial assistance, or need help at some point with the tasks of daily life.

- Despite this potential need, only 18 percent feel "well-prepared" to provide financial support. Thirty-eight percent are "unprepared" and 44 percent are only "somewhat prepared."



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Healthy aging update

The Alliance for Aging Research recently became the first national health advocacy organization to issue specific recommendations urging Americans to sharply increase their daily intake of beta carotene, vitamin C and vitamin E.

The non-profit group reports that these antioxidants help prevent heart disease, cancer, cataracts and other age-related diseases in healthy adults.

Groups offer help for stroke survivors

Stroke is the nation's third leading killer. But it is not always fatal. In fact, more than three million Americans are alive today after having a stroke.

But surviving isn't enough. Stroke survivors strive to regain or compensate for lost speech and movement skills as well as to revive feelings of self-esteem. They also want more independence and not have to rely entirely on a family member or close friends for their care.

In the first few weeks and months after a stroke, survivors will most likely work with one or more healthcare professionals, depending upon how they are affected. People recovering from a stroke may spend time with physical therapists, speech pathologists, psychologists, nurses, social workers or health educators.

But even professionals may not be enough. Stroke survivors often feel isolated and estranged from family, friends and the world in which they lived and worked.

That's where a support group can help. Clubs across the nation bring together people, including caregivers, who share common experiences with stroke. This lets club members learn about stroke-related disabilities and exchange information about getting better.

Club activities can also renew help and encourage more independence and self-improvement for people who have had a stroke. At workshops, seminars, conferences and social

Vinegar adds spice

In some parts of the country, the secret's been out for years: Don't put salt on your french fries, use vinegar instead.

The robust flavor of aged red vinegar can add spice to life—with less than a milligram of sodium per ounce.

One ounce of vinegar has just four calories and less than one gram of fat.

As the story goes, vinegar was discovered more than 10,000 years ago when a cask of wine was left to age too long. The oversight produced a liquid of such universal appeal, it's been used for everything from medicinal purposes to enhancing food ever since. Today, it's one of the most widely used grocery products on the market.

The Alliance's recommended range detailed in the graphic above are between four to 16 times higher than the current U.S. RDA for vitamins C and E has and set a specific range for beta carotene for the first time.

The ranges were set by a panel of leading medical researchers, nutritionists and consumer safety experts at a time when the federal

government's nutrition policy is confusing and outdated. The panel's findings were based on more than 200 clinical research and population studies conducted on antioxidant-rich fruits and vegetables and vitamins over the past two decades.

Scientific understanding of antioxidants began in 1956 when researchers in aging discovered that naturally-occurring substances in cells known as free radicals were linked with many chronic afflictions of aging. Since then researchers have learned that antioxidants can help block free radical damage and retard the progression of age-related diseases.

Fewer than one in 10 Americans eats at least five servings of fruits and vegetables a day as currently recommended by the federal government. Optimal levels of some antioxidants are difficult to reach by diet alone. For instance, to attain the daily levels the Alliance recommends, a person would need to consume 15 oranges for vitamin C or over two cups of sunflower oil for vitamin E.

"To maintain a good health longer in life, people should intake higher ranges of antioxidants through a combination of eating fruits and vegetables and using nutritional supplements," comments Daniel Perry, executive director of the Alliance for Aging Research. "Consumers now have safe recommendations on the levels of antioxidants they need to help protect themselves against chronic illnesses."

Recommended daily antioxidants

Daily intake of antioxidants, including beta carotene and vitamins C and E, is effective in helping to prevent heart disease, cancer, cataracts and other conditions associated with aging.

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
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Light therapy may alleviate symptoms of Alzheimer's

ATLANTA (AP) - After many restless nights filled with hallucinations of bears in her bedroom, Eveleth Harshman proudly says she now sleeps soundly after reading a single magazine article.

The same kind of light therapy used to treat the winter blues has alleviated much of the disturbed sleep and agitation the 80-year-old woman suffers as a result of Alzheimer's disease.

Mrs. Harshman, who can remember the name of the brain surgeon who operated on her at age 9 but can't recall her telephone number, is among 30 patients participating in a study of light therapy at Emory University.

Light therapy may enable Alzheimer's patients to remain at home or ease the problems they have living in nursing homes, said Dr. Robert Green, director of Emory's Neurobehavioral Program and Memory Assessment Clinic.

"If it works, you would have a treatment option that would be low-cost, low-tech and easily available to caregivers and nursing centers across the country," he said.

More than 4 million Americans are believed to have Alzheimer's, which gradually wipes out the memory until its victims can no longer perform

even the simplest task. There is no test to definitively diagnose Alzheimer's; doctors rule out all other possibilities and confirm a diagnosis during autopsy.

The Emory research, funded by the National Institute on Aging, is based on previous studies of people with severe winter blues, or Seasonal Affective Disorder. The depression they experience can sometimes be restored by the systematic exposure to high levels of artificial light.

Exactly how the light affects the brain isn't known, but it apparently affects the levels of two brain chemicals, a neurotransmitter called serotonin and a hormone called melatonin.

Similarly, the brightness and duration of light also affect sleep patterns, restoring a person's ability to sleep well at night. Disrupted sleep frequently occurs among Alzheimer's patients, resulting in restlessness, pacing, wandering, irritability and other behavioral problems.

Drugs can lessen those problems, but often result in unwanted side effects. Emory's Green and his colleagues believe that exposing Alzheimer's patients to bright light may provide a safer way of improving their sleep and alleviating their agitation.

"There are studies that show that this (sleep problem) is in fact one of the things which disrupts family members the most and actually leads to nursing home placement," Green said.

Dr. Norman Rosenthal, an expert on Seasonal Affective Disorder and a psychiatrist with the National Institute of Mental Health, said the study "makes sense."

"Light is known to help consolidate the sleep of some people," he said. Light therapy would not cure the patient's Alzheimer's disease, but anecdotal reports indicate it may succeed at relieving some of its symptoms. "There's a reasonable hope that some relief could be provided," he said.

Patients entering the study wear a watch-like device on their wrist to measure the amount of light they are normally exposed to and the amount of movement or time they are awake. The patients wear it throughout the four-week study.

After a week spent in normal-light, they then spend two weeks in light therapy, followed by a fourth week without the light treatment.

During the treatment, participants sit on a pastel sofa in a waiting room facing a bank of six light boxes about 3 feet high to 5 feet high. For 1½ hours, they read or talk with sitters while the fluorescent light penetrates their eyes. Green estimated that patients receive light about five times as bright as in an office.

Mrs. Harshman joined the study in April after her son Bill learned of the project. Initially she wasn't interested, but decided she had "nothing better to do."

At her first treatment, "they gave me a pile of magazines and I read, and after awhile, I realized a lot of time had passed," said the former teacher. "I was very curious the whole time

- and I'm still curious - about what the end result will be."

The positive results are so obvious to Mrs. Harshman's family that they would like her to continue to participate in the research. But Green said the outcome is uncertain and adds that many more patients will have to participate to determine whether the therapy is at all effective.

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

An 'Angel' lands in 'Waikiki' as Ladd stars in new drama

Sometimes, a new song, film or television series can equal more than the sum of its hackneyed parts. Such is the case with "One West Waikiki," premiering with a special two-hour episode on Thursday, Aug. 4, on CBS.

"It's kind of like a combination of 'Quincy,' 'Magnum P.I.' and 'Moonlighting,'" the series' star, Cheryl Ladd says, and rightfully so.

"One West Waikiki" stars Ladd as forensic pathologist Dr. Dawn "Holli" Holliday (a la "Quincy"), is set in Hawaii ("Magnum") and boasts a relationship between the two principal characters that borders on a polar-opposite attraction ("Moonlighting").

But stably hidden somewhere in the mix is an electricity, a spirit or something different that makes one plus one plus one equal more than three.

Ladd returns to series television 13 years after "Charlie's Angels" left the air.

Strangely enough, "One West Waikiki" will occupy the Thursday slot previously inhabited by that CBS Hawaiian detective drama, the aforementioned "Magnum P.I."

And unlike another recently failed CBS detective drama, "Traps," "One West Waikiki" has the kind of appeal that can reach a broad-based audience, one that can't be pigeonholed.

The intellectual aspect of the show (the highly technical forensics jargon) seems to be leveled out by the sometimes slapstick antics of Dr. Holliday's ("And I love her name too, Doc Holliday," Ladd adds) partner in crime-solving, Lt. Mack Wolfe (Richard Burgi).

"Oh yeah, there certainly is a high intellectual level to the show," Ladd states, "but it's also a lot of fun. And the scenery is just beautiful."

Mack recently came off departmental probation following an investigation

where he was framed to look like he had killed innocent people. He supplements his income by doing everything from selling toothbrushes to lounge singing.

In one scene, Mack jumps a fellow police officer who is following him and asks the bewildered officer at gunpoint:

"Have they told you some of the names they call me around the office? Like Mortuary Man and Lead Head and Trigger Mortis? Is there anybody who'll miss you if you disappeared for a long time?"

"I got a wife and three kids, man. And a dog!" his hapless victim replies.

"Well if you're as reckless with their future as you are with your own," Mack growls, "your wife's gonna be a bag lady, and your kids are gonna be eating recycled tacos. Have you even got insurance?"

"No," is the reply.

"Really?" Mack croons. "How'd you like to buy some home-life? Or I can get you into a really nice term package for very little down ..."

At first, viewers may see Burgi as being too "pretty" to be taken seriously in the role. But if anything, Burgi's rugged good looks (and bona fide talent) enhance the notion of a romantic relationship developing between Mack and the equally stunning Holli.

"I'm not going to say they'll never get together," Ladd intimates. "But, for the show's sake, it's a lot more interesting if they maintain the kind of relationship they have in the pilot, at least for a little while."

"Kind of a mutual respect and admiration, bordering on an attraction."

Maybe kind of like "Moonlighting," but in the final analysis, "One West Waikiki" stands on its own, and deserves a look.



to 3 hours and 40 minutes, according to the NAB, and much of the added programming is locally produced.

The NAB is hoping to pre-empt any additional regulation by the Federal Communications Commission, which licenses stations and enforces programming standards.
