Board allows work on nursing station

Deaf Smith Hospital District directors, in a regular monthly meeting Tuesday evening, approved the release of board-restricted capital improvement funds for refurbishing a nurse's station at the hospital.

Jim Robinson, Hereford Regional Medical Center administrator, cited the need for making more space available at the nurse's station and requested that approximately \$14,000 in the budget be used for the project.

In other action, the board approved a resolution expressing the board's appreciation to the Hereford Regional Medical Center staff for "their dedication and efforts" in earning full accreditation for the hospital; approved a resolution to use the State of Texas bid list for some hospital district purchases; approved a bylaws

committee recommendation for several changes in the bylaws; and approved routine monthly reports.

The financial statement for September, which ended the fiscal year, reflected a gain in operating income of \$73,077--due mainly to a cost report settlement of \$96,927 from Medicare-Medicaid. The year-end income gain was \$284,257--which also reflected cost report settlements in the amount of \$532,798. Last year's statement showed an operating loss of \$137,995.

Net patient services revenue for the year totaled \$9,476,404. Non-operating revenue totaled \$1,445,970, which included \$1,040,983 in ad valorem taxes and \$348,997 in state disproportionate share funds. This reflected a net revenue for the year of \$1,730,227--compared to a loss last year of \$95,739.

In his operations report, Robinson pointed to an increase in inpatient days, average daily census, surgical procedures and several other professional performance categories. The addition of physicians in the community was a factor, he added.

The hospital's average daily census was 14.6 for the year, compared to 13.9 the year previous. Inpatient days increased by 222 to 5,313. Outpatient visits increased by 2,150 to 9,091. Respiratory therapy treatments also showed a big increase, rising by 5,886 to 25,198.

Directors agreed with changes proposed in the board bylaws, and the changes will probably be adopted at next month's meeting.

Robinson also reported that the Hospital Auxiliary was sponsoring a jewelry sale Friday; that he was studying a lease or purchase plan for a new Cat Scan; that a Community Needs Assessment, required by the state, is underway; that HRMC will participate in the Adopt-A-School Program with Stanton Learning Center as its school; and that the hospital has provided an around-the-clock coffee pot in the emergency room for law enforcement officers.

Nancy Griego, performance improvement director, reported on the hospital's accreditation and a staff development and continuing education program being initiated.

Directors present for the meeting were Mal Manchec, Jo Beth Shackelford, Dean Crofford, Scott Keeling, Steve Cortez and Boyd Foster. Absent was Larry Watts.

USDA drops rules for chicken, turkey

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Agriculture Department has dropped proposed new rules for reducing bacterial contamination in chickens and turkeys, officials confirmed Tuesday.

Instead, the department will fold some elements of the proposal into a separate one that would change the way all kinds of meat are inspected for safety.

The move is politically sensitive because Agriculture Secretary Mike Espy has been accused of favoring poultry over beef when cracking down on bacterial contamination. He has submitted his resignation.

The poultry proposal was criticized harshly by the broiler industry and consumer groups when it was outlined in July. Some said the proposal kept the worst elements of an antiquated inspection system and should be scrapped.

"You don't want more of the same to get in the way of something better," said Carol Tucker Foreman, spokeswoman for the Safe Food Coalition, an umbrella organization for labor and consumer groups. Foreman said she would reserve further comment until the new proposal comes out.

No agency official was available Tuesday to comment on the details of the action, except to say that food safety would not be compromised.

The department's decision to drop the poultry proposal was first disclosed last week by Jill Hollingsworth, assistant administrator of the Food Safety and Inspection Service, in a speech to the poultry industry in Ocean City, Md.

The department initially had proposed a separate set of poultry regulations on July 13.

That was four months after the department announced a planned overhaul of poultry regulations in the wake of reports by The Associated Press and other news organizations that Espy aides had delayed work on the standards.

Espy is being investigated by Independent Counsel Donald C. Smaltz for favors Espy allegedly received from Tyson Foods Inc., the Arkansas-based poultry giant with close ties to President Clinton. Investigators will also look at whether the poultry industry received special consideration in return.

When Espy announced his resignation because of the investigation earlier this month, he also said he would no longer involve himself in decisions affecting poultry. Michael R. Taylor, head of the Food Safety and Inspection Service, is directing that policy.

A key goal of the new poultry proposal was to apply to poultry the same rigid standard that since March 1993 has allowed no hint of fecal contamination on beef carcasses. Feces can carry dangerous bacteria such as E. coli O157:H7 in beef, and salmonella in chicken.

Fecal contamination can occur at several points during slaughter, including when an animal's entrails are accidentally ruptured.

The opportunity for public comment on the poultry proposal ended Oct. 11, setting the stage for final regulations to be written. By including the rules in a new, proposed "mega-regulation" to modernize food safety, the department will have to wait for comments on the broader proposal.

Alisa Harrison, spokeswoman for the National Cattlemen's Association, said the group was unaware of the decision.

Guilty pleas entered here

Defendants in 222nd District Court Tuesday entered guilty pleas to charges against them and were sentenced by Judge David Wesley Gulley.

Nancy Molinar Luna, 30, charged with theft over \$750 and under \$20,000, received a probated eight-year sentence. She also was ordered to make restitution of \$6,819.51.

Charged with aggravated assault, Rudy Martinez, 28, was sentenced to seven years' probation. He must pay restitution of \$7,813.59.

Confidence of shoppers down again

NEW YORK (AP) — The economic news was mostly grim this week: Consumer confidence fell for the fourth straight month, the dollar hit an all-time low, worker wages are creeping up only slightly and interest rates are rising.

Taken together, the news suggested that the economy, which had been thought to be growing at the healthiest clip since the 1990-91 recession, isn't necessarily as robust as forecasters reckoned.

The freshest signals on the economy's direction came from the Conference Board, a New York-based research group. It found that consumer confidence dropped in October for the fourth straight month.

That's important because consumers who lack confidence in the economy spend less and borrow less. That means merchants sell less, factories cut back on output and employers eliminate jobs. Consumers account for two-thirds of the nation's economic activity.

The Conference Board attributed the drop largely to rising fear that there will be fewer jobs in the months ahead. Consumers also scaled back plans to buy cars, appliances and homes.

The results came against not only a backdrop of anxiety over jobs but a steady rise in interest rates that began early this year when the Federal Reserve reversed a five-year era of lower rates.

Combest: Americans are fed up with bureaucracy

Like the character in the movie "Network," Americans are in the mood to say, "I'm fed up with government bureaucracy and I'm not going to take it anymore," Congressman Larry Combest told local residents who attended a "Town Hall" meeting here Tuesday morning.

He pointed to the action in Haiti and the recent outcry on private property rights as signs that the silent majority may finally take a stand.

"It is very difficult to tell government agencies how to implement legislation. What we need to do is to stop some of the laws from being passed in the first place," commented the Lubbock Republican.

Combest, U.S. Representative for the 19th Congressional District, answered questions and gave his position on several issues to about 60 people attending the meeting at 9 a.m. yesterday in Hereford Community Center.

"I think we will have, without doubt, a more conservative House next year," said the congressman. "There will be more conservatives elected, including Democrats, and there is the possibility of having a Republican majority."

Combest said he could not support some of the compromise bills passed in Congress. "Too many times, you have a bad bill and the proponents will take out some of the worst measures in hopes of getting the bill passed."

As an example, Combest explained his vote against the Crime Bill. "The measure that passed wasn't as bad as the original, but I still couldn't vote for it because it fell short of curbing crime."

Combest said everyone wants clean water and air, but legislation has put environmental controls

beyond reasonable actions in some cases. "We must seek a happy medium on these controls."

The congressman said too many groups still look to government to solve their problems and, in too many cases, it turns out to be costly and ineffective.

"The average American family spends about \$1,800 a year on health insurance," pointed out Combest, "but they spend \$4,200 a year for government services."

In response to some of the questions posed at the meeting, Combest reiterated that he supports the line-item veto, the right-to-work law, the death penalty for certain crimes, and English as the legal language.

At this point in time, Combest said he was leaning in favor of the General Agreement on Tariffs and Trade (GATT). He added that he was still studying the issue. Several citizens at the meeting expressed concern about the U.S. being involved in a world organization.

Combest said the American people made the right choice in turning down recently health care reform legislation. "It's better to do nothing than to do wrong."

He said the health care issue is still to be dealt with by Congress. Insurance reform should be studied, along with health care reform, he added.

"I am not convinced there is a health care crisis when 85 percent of the people are satisfied with the system. We need to look at solving the problem of the other 15 percent, not scrapping the 85 percent that is good."

Combest said the next big threat to the U.S. could be terrorism. "We are extremely vulnerable to terrorist attacks in this country." The town hall meeting lasted about 1 1/2 hours.

Combest also attended a luncheon here Tuesday hosted by the legislative affairs committee of Deaf Smith County Chamber of Commerce. Local officials and community leaders were invited.

Clinton hails peace accord

WADI ARABA, Israel-Jordan Border (AP) — President Clinton applauded the signing of a historic treaty in the desert today and told the people of Israel and Jordan "now you must make this peace real." He spoke after extracting a new pledge from PLO leader Yasser Arafat to combat terrorism.

"Peace between Jordan and Israel is no longer a mirage," said Clinton in a brief signing-ceremony speech that blended admiration with admonition.

"We break the chains of the past that for too long have kept you

shackled in the shadows of strife and suffering," said Clinton. He said it was up to the people of Israel and Jordan now to "turn no man's land into every man's home. Open your borders. Open your hearts."

Both King Hussein and Israeli Prime Minister Yitzhak Rabin praised Clinton for his role in brokering peace between their nations, having helped to broker peace deals during the ceremony at a border site near the Red Sea.

Clinton, who had expressed frustration with the recent wave of violence in the region, proclaimed himself "satisfied with the response."

Group calls on Senate to reduce number of filibusters

WASHINGTON (AP) — A group led by retired senators and other senior politicians is asking Senate candidates to commit themselves to fighting government gridlock by changing filibuster rules.

"Senators are elected to make decisions, not to block decision-making," says a letter being mailed today by Action, Not Gridlock, a bipartisan group that includes former Sens. William Proxmire, D-Wis., and Barry Goldwater, R-Ariz.

"Americans are entitled to know whether Senate candidates and senators will support fixing

the filibuster gridlock rule," says the letter.

It's not about partisan politics, but whether the democratic principle of majority rule is going to survive, the privately funded group says.

The organization listed each senator and the number of times he or she voted to break a filibuster during the last two years.

Voting 100 percent to do so were Sens. Claiborne Pell of Rhode Island, Tom Daschle of South Dakota, Herb Kohl of Wisconsin, John Glenn of Ohio, Charles Robb of Virginia, Barbara Mikulski of Maryland and Christopher Dodd of Connecticut.

all Democrats.

Those voting least often to allow legislation to proceed — just 5 percent of the time — were Sens. Alan Simpson and Malcolm Wallop of Wyoming and Jesse Helms of North Carolina — all three Republicans.

Not far behind was Texas GOP Sen. Phil Gramm, who voted to allow legislation to proceed 7 percent of the time. Fellow Texas Republican Sen. Kay Bailey Hutchison posted 15 percent under the group's rating system.

With Democrats in the White House and holding a majority in both houses of Congress, Republicans had either to compromise

with the Democrats or block legislation with the filibuster to get their way. They increasingly chose the filibuster as the session drew to a close.

"There were more filibusters last year alone than in the first 108 years of the Senate combined," said the Action, Not Gridlock letter. "As recently as the 1960s, the Senate averaged only two filibusters a year — a sharp contrast to the 15 a year in the 1990s, and the filibuster frenzy this year."

In the usual course of events, there are few limitations on Senate debate, and a handful of senators can delay legislation or a nomination indefinitely, especially when the Senate is rushing to adjourn for

the year.

The term "filibuster" refers not just to long-winded speeches to prevent a vote on legislation, but even to the threat of such extended debate. The usual weapon against the filibuster is "cloture" — a vote to limit debate. But that requires agreement by 60 of the 100 senators. Since there are only 56 Democratic senators, Republicans could kill a bill as long as they hung together.

After the elections, the majority is expected to be even narrower no matter which party is in control. The Democrats could very well become the more frequent users of the filibuster if they end up in the minority.

The Action, Not Gridlock group makes no specific recommendation, but changing the rules to reduce the 60 votes needed to end a filibuster would require 67 votes.

Former Attorney General Elliot Richardson, a Republican and member of Action, Not Gridlock, says senators don't need a rules change to "regain their self-restraint and respect for the democratic process."

"Americans can't make sense of what's happening in Congress and what's causing the gridlock without knowing that filibusters have destroyed the principle of majority rule in the U.S. Senate," Richardson said.

The wife accused me of kicking or mistreating the dog because "He was all right when we left." I was truly offended.

Her husband asked me to take Blaze to their veterinarian and said he would reimburse me. When the vet saw the animal, he diagnosed a serious liver disorder, which he assured me could not have been caused by an injury of any kind. Blaze died in the hospital the morning the family returned.

When I went over to the house to see them, they were not only ungrateful but insulting. I had missed two days of work because of their pet, and they didn't even thank me for my concern.

I was shocked when the wife said several items were missing from their house and the TV was broken. She also claimed the veterinarian told her

it was MY fault that the dog died, so they didn't feel obligated to reimburse me for the vet's bill. Only when I threatened to take them to small claims court did they pay up.

I urge all house and pet sitters to insist on explicit written instructions regarding the care of the pet, as well as a statement outlining the sitter's responsibility in case of damage to the house or its contents. Take nothing for granted. I learned the hard way.-- St. Pete, Fla.

Beef base makes three main dishes

With Triple Batch Beef in your freezer, you can have the base for three different main dishes.

When you have time, cook beef chuck roast with onion and garlic until it is fork tender. Divide the beef and cooking liquid into three portions and freeze. To thaw a package, take it out of the freezer the night before and place in the refrigerator.

For savory beef stew, just pair the prepared beef with potatoes, peas and seasonings. Quick-cooking barley, green beans and carrots are the add-ins for a speedy soup. A jar of salsa, canned kidney beans and chili powder transform the beef mixture into a chili that's quick to fix.

Triple Batch Beef
3 tablespoons vegetable oil
4-1/2-pound boneless beef chuck shoulder, arm or blade pot roast, cut into 3/4-inch pieces
1 teaspoon salt
1/2 teaspoon pepper
2 medium onions, coarsely chopped

4 cloves garlic, crushed
1-1/2 cups water
Heat oil in Dutch oven over medium heat. Add beef pieces, one-fourth at a time. Cook and stir until beef is browned. Remove beef from Dutch oven; season with salt and pepper. Set aside.

In the same pan, cook onions and garlic until onions are lightly browned. Pour off drippings. Return beef to pan; add water. Bring to a boil. Reduce heat, cover tightly and simmer for 1-1/2 to 2 hours, or until meat is tender. Skim off fat. Place about 2 cups beef mixture into each of three 1-quart freezer containers. Cover containers tightly and freeze. Use beef mixture in the following recipes. Makes 6 to 7 cups cooked beef.

Weeknight Beef Stew
2 cups Triple Batch Beef, defrosted
2 medium red potatoes, cut into 1/4-inch thick slices
2-3rds cup water

1 teaspoon dried oregano leaves
1/2 teaspoon salt
1 cup frozen peas
1 tablespoon lemon juice
2 teaspoons cornstarch

Place beef pieces and cooking liquid, potatoes, water, oregano and salt in medium saucepan. Bring to a boil. Reduce heat to low to medium-low, cover tightly and simmer 10 to 12 minutes or until potatoes are tender. Add peas. Meanwhile, combine lemon juice and cornstarch; stir into beef mixture. Bring to a boil; cook and stir 1 minute. Makes 4 servings.

Quick 'N Easy Beef Barley Soup
2 cups Triple Batch Beef, defrosted
3 cups water
1 tablespoon instant beef bouillon granules
1 teaspoon dried thyme leaves
1/4 cup quick-cooking barley
1 cup frozen cut green beans
1 cup frozen sliced carrots
Place beef pieces and cooking liquid, water, bouillon granules and thyme in a large saucepan. Bring to a boil. Add barley, green beans and carrots, stirring to combine. Return to a boil; reduce heat to low to medium-low, cover and simmer 12 minutes or until barley is tender. Makes 4 servings.

20-Minute Beef Chili
2 cups Triple Batch Beef, defrosted
1 jar (8 ounces) mild salsa
1 tablespoon chili powder
15-ounce can kidney beans, drained and rinsed
1 cup shredded Cheddar cheese
1/4 cup sliced green onions
Place beef pieces and cooking liquid, salsa and chili powder in medium saucepan. Bring to a boil. Reduce heat to low to medium-low, cover and simmer 10 minutes. Add beans; heat through. Serve with Cheddar cheese and green onions. Makes 4 servings.

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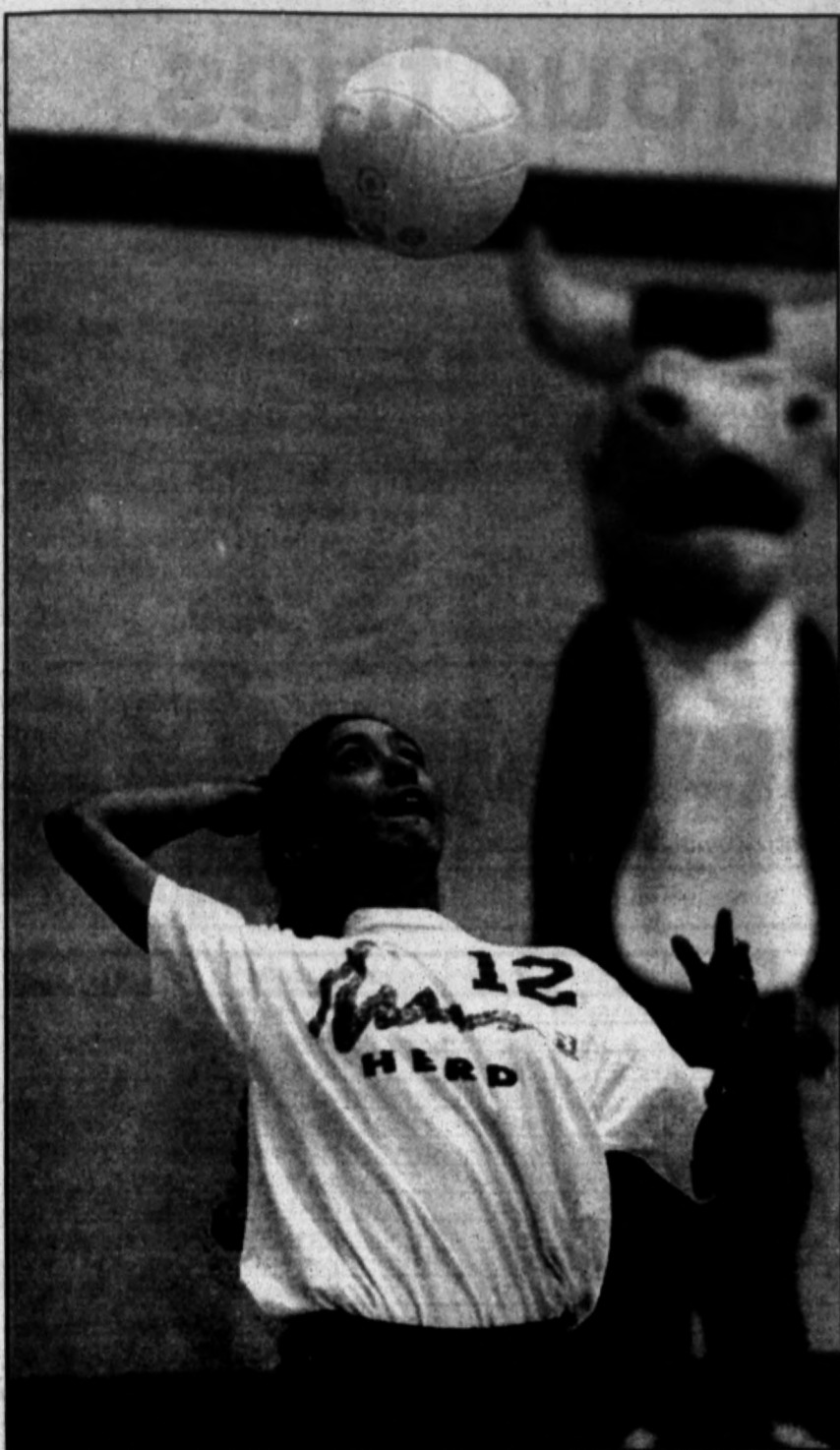

"That was the turning point for us in that game, possible even the match," Reeh said. "There really was no reason for that to change our play the rest of way through. I felt we didn't stay mean enough long enough."

Hereford never quite recovered. A three-point run got the Herd back to 12-8, but a Robinson stuff, a Herd lift, and another bad pass near the net by Hereford ended the game.

The third game was the longest of the three. While Dumas won 15-7, it wasn't a blowout; Hereford got plenty of sideouts but just couldn't score with the serve.

"We went so many rotations without scoring," Reeh lamented. "I don't know how many times we had the server back there and we didn't score. One of our goals tonight was to score at least one point on every service turn. You can't rotate that many times against a team

like Dumas without scoring." Hereford led early in the third game, 4-3, but Dumas got a stuff and a kill by Mindy Ratliff to pull ahead 6-5. From there Dumas added points very slowly and built a 12-4 lead. Consecutive aces by Brooke Bryant gave Hereford a little life, making the score 12-7. Robinson quickly ended the life with two kills, then Holmes hit a free ball long on Dumas' side to end the match.

The loss broke a 12-match winning streak for the Herd. It was the first loss for the Lady Whitefaces since Sept. 6, when they lost to Amarillo High, which completed the regular season Tuesday with a 31-0 record.

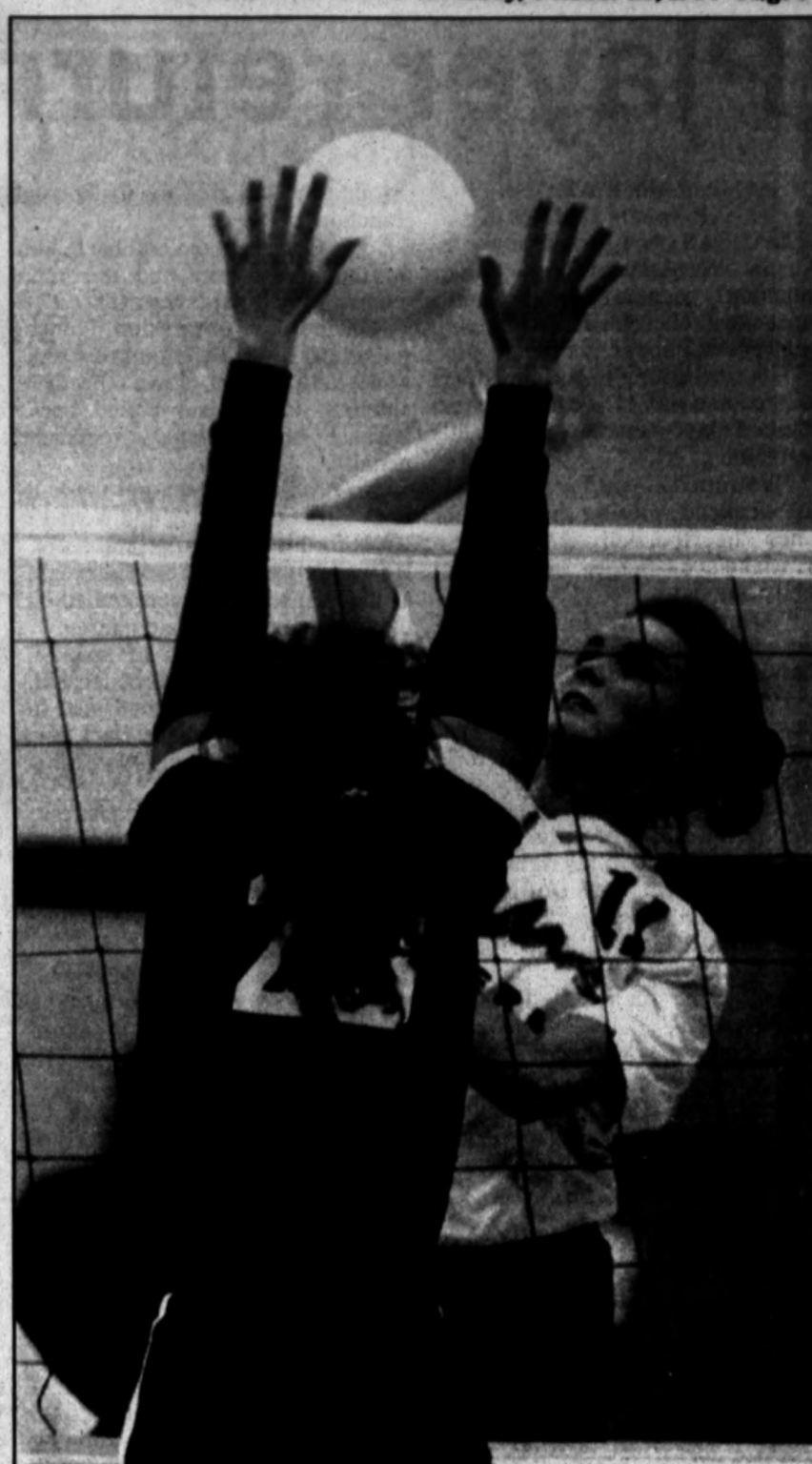

concerned decisions by Hostetler changing running plays to passes.

Shell downplayed the incident last week and the matter seemed closed until shortly before the Raiders' 30-17 victory over Atlanta on Sunday.

Allegedly, Shell called Hostetler, "another white quarterback, just like Schroeder." Reportedly, the statement was filled with expletives.
