Clinton warns Iraq: U.S. won't weaken resolve

WASHINGTON (AP) - President Clinton put about 15,000 soldiers on alert Friday and dispatched an aircraft carrier to the Persian Gulf after 40,000 to 50,000 Iraqi troops were spotted massing on the border with Kuwait.

Clinton said he considered the situation serious and would not permit Iraq to intimidate the United Nations into lifting sanctions imposed after the Persian Gulf War three years ago.

"It would be a grave mistake of Saddam Hussein to believe that the United States would weaken its resolve," Clinton said at a news conference.

Asked if Saddam might be testing the United States while its military is engaged in Haiti, Clinton declared, "Saddam Hussein should be under no illusions. The United States is not otherwise occupied."

At the Pentagon, Defense Secretary William Perry said the Iraqi troop movements "are not routine and are not typical of what we've seen in the past, and therefore cause us concern."

An Iraqi government spokesman

said in Baghdad that his country had every right to move troops within its own borders, and he accused critics of a plot "to justify their evil intentions."

Kuwait's Cabinet was called back for an emergency meeting Friday, the Muslim Sabbath.

Saudi Arabia's foreign minister, Prince Saud Al Faisal, met with Clinton at the White House and, afterwards, pledged his country's cooperation. A U.S. official, speaking on the condition of anonymity, said that includes allowing the United States to use its bases in Saudi Arabia as a staging area for air or land strikes in Iraq.

In New York, U.S. Ambassador Madeleine K. Albright hinted the United States might launch punitive air strikes if Iraq violates the cease-fire accords signed at the conclusion of the 1991 Gulf War.

"Let it be absolutely clear to the Iraqi government that a repetition of its past mistakes will be met by my government with the same resolve as before," she told the U.N. General Assembly.

Fire wipes out home, belongings of couple

A Hereford-area couple who lost everything they own in a house fire last week is in need of donations to help them get back on their feet again.

Betty Henson, director of the Deaf Smith County unit of the American Red Cross, said Mr. and Mrs. Lorenzo Tarango had no insurance on their trailer house that was located in the Westway area.

A fire there Tuesday afternoon destroyed the residence and its contents. Mrs. Henson said the retired couple was not at home when the fire broke out.

"They lost everything. The trailer burned down, I think, to the frame," she said.

The Red Cross stepped in immediately to assist the Tarangos, but Mrs. Henson said additional aid beyond that which the Red Cross can give will be needed.

Currently, she said, the couple is

staying with their son, J.M. Tarango, and his family at 902 Union.

"Their immediate needs are met. They have some clothing, they have food, they have shelter," Mrs. Henson said.

However, she continued, the couple and the Red Cross are now looking toward the future in determining needs the Tarangos have -- as well as how to meet those needs.

She said no decision has been made on housing, although they may want to try to get a new trailer in Westway.

Unfortunately, the cost of a trailer is more than the Red Cross can afford and likely is beyond the means of the couple, she went on.

Wherever the two end up living, she said, they need to have long-term needs met -- such as linens for the beds, dishes, more clothing, and "we're looking at restocking the cabinets."

Donations for the couple may be made at the Red Cross office, 224 S. Main, or at the home where they are living, 902 Union.

For donations of clothing, Mrs. Tarango wears a size 5 or 6 dress and pants and size small or medium blouse. Tarango wears 34/30 pants and a size medium shirt.

Mrs. Henson said people interested in helping may also make monetary gifts.

"That's the thing they really need the most," she said.

Contributions also may be taken to the Red Cross office or to the family.

Brand to raise newsstand price on Tuesday-thru-Friday issues

The weekday news-stand price of The Hereford Brand will be increased to 50 cents, effective Oct. 11, 1994, it was announced today by O.G. Nieman, publisher.

Dealer price of the newspaper has been 25 cents Tuesday through Friday and 50 cents on Sunday since the paper changed to daily publication in 1976. Price of the Sunday paper will remain at 50 cents.

Subscription rates will not be increased until Nov. 1, giving readers an opportunity to subscribe at the current prices, announced Nieman. Brand subscription rates were last increased in 1986.

He said production and mailing costs continue to rise, and carriers have not had an increase for home delivery since January, 1987, the last time rates were raised.

"The price of a newspaper has been equated with that of a cup of coffee over the years," Nieman pointed out, "but coffee prices have been ahead of us for a long time." Most semi-weekly and daily papers have been priced at 50 cents on the newsstand for some time.

Course not being taught anywhere else in nation

HISD centralizes print operations; offers special graphic arts class

program glitches into the system that students then have to spot and correct.

Others simply require students to learn how to operate DocuTech. They are given class time to process teacher orders while being aided by Spies.

That combination of written materials plus hands-on work, he said, will put graduates of Hereford High in the lead for post-high school print jobs, as more colleges and universities, major employers -- even companies that make copies professionally -- convert from traditional photocopies to DocuTech.

In addition, the students are learning production skills, paste-up, the importance of deadlines and meeting them and, most important, the need to put out a quality product.

Having a special shop to do all printing, then, saves teachers and aides from having to waste class and preparation time hovering over antiquated copy machines on the campuses, fretting over breakdowns and putting off planning class work to get materials put together.

Just as importantly, said Bill Spies, the move enables the district to offer a high school course that is not being taught anywhere else in the United States -- a hands-on training program that utilizes the DocuTech machine in connection with Xerox-developed training materials.

Spies heads up the entire operation, holding the dual title of graphic arts teacher and Print Shop Manager. Both Spies and Corky Lockmiller, assistant superintendent for educational support services, trained with Xerox on the DocuTech system before it was installed in July.

In addition, the district sent Spies to school to train in maintenance of the machine, allowing him to troubleshoot the system and correct most problems that arise.

Both men are effusive in their praise of the new system.

While other school districts are using the Xerox training materials, Spies said, Hereford High School is the only one to actually own a DocuTech system.

The graphic arts courses involve Xerox-developed packets that walk trainees through the various functions and capabilities of DocuTech.

Spies said there are 78 jobs in the beginning course, plus 73 in the intermediate class.

Some lessons require him to

information packets -- turned a simple task into a day-long ordeal.

But with DocuTech, a teacher, administrator or secretary who needs copies made simply fills out an order form, slips the original materials in an interoffice mailing envelope and drops that into a large gray bin located on each campus and at Central Office.

Those bins are picked up by students in Spies' EPS job training classes twice a day, in the morning and at the end of the school day.

When the order arrives at the print shop, it is processed and printed by Spies, a student under supervision or one of three other print shop employees.

Pam Wilson is at school all day.

Mystery continues in doomsday cult members' deaths in Switzerland

GRANGES-SUR-SALVAN, Switzerland (AP) - Vials of liquid, syringes, garbage bags and residents' strange accounts are adding new facets to the mystery behind the deaths of 48 doomsday cult members in Switzerland.

The two burned-out chalets where 25 bodies were found Wednesday are a macabre scene of charred clothes, furniture, electrical appliances, comic books, a melted tennis racket and clock radio and empty medical vials.

A fire and explosives expert combed the site for incendiary devices Friday said he stumbled upon numerous unopened vials with obviously fake labels including

"adrenaline," "folic acid" and "valium."

"There were several dozen syringes. They were all over the place," Jean-Claude Martin, of the Science and Criminology Institute at the University of Lausanne, said after searching the grounds for a second day.

Authorities issued arrest warrants Friday for two leaders of the cult called, among other names, the Order of the Solar Tradition. Evidence showed that many of the 48 sect members who died in Switzerland may have been murdered. Authorities in Canada, where another five sect members died, said three were

murdered.

Swiss officials have ruled out a mass suicide but were also checking supposed farewell letters from the victims. Theories have abounded in the Swiss media that the dead were drugged, perhaps willingly, shot or suffocated with garbage bags tied over their heads, then burned in a plot to cover up evidence and make it look like a mass suicide.

The bodies of the victims from Granges-sur-Salvan were stored at a morgue in nearby Sion, awaiting completion of the autopsies at Lausanne University Medical Center of the 23 other victims found the same day in the western town of

Chery. Officials expected the bodies in Sion to be transferred to Lausanne early next week.

In the meantime, the strange accounts surrounding the tragedy multiplied.

At a supermarket in this picturesque village of 1,200 near the mountainside chalets, the manager said cult leader Luc Jouret came in alone Tuesday morning and bought dozens of large green plastic garbage bags.

"He seemed a bit nervous," said manager Lydie Revaz. "He asked me to show him where the bags were. He took a real armload."

The orders are returned to the schools daily during morning and afternoon runs.

Spies said the print shop is now processing between 150 and 200 jobs a day.

Operators load up to 40 jobs at one time into the computer memory, then drop the original documents into a scanner that converts them to digital signals that are reassembled in the copier portion of the machine.

With a printing speed of 135 sheets a minute, most orders are complete and ready to ship back to the campus in about that long -- including time to collate, staple or, if desired, put on

a heat-sealed book binding.

As for its usage, Spies said DocuTech's main paper hopper holds five reams of 8-1/2-by-11-inch paper. There are 500 sheets of paper in a ream.

The shop is going through 700,000 sheets of paper a month and, he said, last week the shop topped three million sheets handled since DocuTech went on-line July 7.

"That's practically every stick of copying in the district," Lockmiller said proudly, adding that individual campuses are "not doing any substantial copying."

Lockmiller said the district has set up DocuTech so that costs are passed

on to different campuses and departments.

The district set a rate of 2 cents per page for DocuTech copying. That includes staples, book-type binding, two-sided copying and paste-up service.

For example, a teacher at West Central Intermediate School ordered 12 copies of a 12-page booklet, each one-sided copies, stapled together. The total job cost \$4.82.

At Northwest Elementary School, a teacher needed 215 copies of one page. About two minutes after programming the job into DocuTech, the copies were done. Cost, \$4.32.

Planes at Dallas-Fort Worth International Airport weren't allowed to land or depart for a brief period Friday afternoon, causing later backups and delays, officials said.

"We stopped operations for a while. They've returned now, but it's just like driving cars: Anytime you get this kind of weather it's going to back up," a Federal Aviation Administration employee said Friday night.

Tim Smith, a spokesman for Fort Worth-based American Airlines, said about 70 of American's flights were cancelled, half inbound and half outbound. Another 29 inbound flights were diverted to nearby cities to refuel until the storm passed, Smith said.

"This is pretty typical for a thunderstorm situation," he said. "There are times when you can't land or when the FAA just slows down the whole traffic pattern."

The storms also destroyed six homes and damaged the roofs of others in Collin County, with the most severe damage in the town of Princeton, about 35 miles northeast

of Dallas, said meteorologist Jim Stefkovich.

No injuries were reported, Stefkovich said.

As the thunderstorms moved quickly across the region, rain fell in some areas at the rate of one inch every 15 minutes, prompting flash floods and stranding motorists.

As much as 4 inches of rain fell over parts of East Texas during the early morning hours Saturday, the National Weather Service said.

"It's an act of God," said Princeton police Chief Allen Gibson. "We haven't seen anything like this through here in several years."

Cars were reported floating in Mesquite, and the storms may have been responsible for house fires in Irving.

Lightning set fire to a structure in Palmer in Ellis County, while power lines were blown down in Terrell in Kaufman County, Stefkovich said.

The storms marked the boundary of an intense cold front that swept through the region. The front was expected to move through south central Texas early Saturday morning.

Haiti's amnesty law expanded by Senate

PORT-AU-PRINCE, Haiti (AP)

Senators hastily approved an expansion of Haiti's amnesty law Friday, increasing pressure on army chief Raoul Cedras to resign and paving the way for the return of President Jean-Bertrand Aristide.

In a deal with the United States, Lt. Gen. Cedras had pledged to leave if Parliament approved a general amnesty or by Oct. 15, whichever came first. Aristide, who must sign the law, says he will return home by then.

The measure allows the ousted president to pardon the generals who overthrew him not only for political misdeeds but for other crimes. The lower chamber of Parliament overwhelmingly approved the amendment to an existing amnesty law on Thursday.

Senior U.S. officials said they were examining whether the measure meets the requirements of the Sept. 18 U.S.-Haitian agreement that was to culminate with Cedras' resignation.

It also wasn't known if Cedras considered the bill the general amnesty he had sought. A source close to Cedras, speaking on condition of anonymity, did not believe the parliament had approved

a general amnesty.

Haitian senators said they hoped their vote would give Cedras one less excuse for holding onto power.

The United States had strongly supported an amnesty for military leaders despite concern that Aristide might not proclaim it. His supporters have called for "justice" for political and human rights crimes by the military.

"What this bill does ... is throw the ball back to President Aristide," U.S. Embassy Stanley Schrager said Friday afternoon.

About 5,000 pro-democracy Haitians marched Friday to army headquarters to demand that Cedras leave. The rally was the first at the headquarters.

"Down with Cedras! We hate Cedras!" they jeered.

Cedras was not inside the white-and-yellow building. Some of his top commanders watched from a second-floor balcony, including Brig. Gen. Philippe Biambry, who like Cedras must leave power by the end of next week.

Demonstrators stuffed a pair of blue jeans with foam rubber and spanked it with branches - a surrogate for Cedras and the once-dreaded capital police chief Lt. Col. Michel Francois, who fled to the Dominican Republic on Tuesday.

The demonstration coincided with the visit of Deputy Secretary of State Strobe Talbott to discuss the transition from military to civilian government.

After less than an hour of discussion, the Senate voted 10-1 to give Aristide the authority to grant an amnesty. Approval quickly followed on two minor amendments related to amnesty.

"We are voting to get out the confusion, not because of the pressure from the (American) troops here," said Sen. Clark Parent, an Aristide supporter who came out of hiding from the military to cast his vote. American soldiers guarded the seaside Legislative Palace.

"I hope (Cedras and Biambry) will do their part" by leaving, said Senate President Firmin Jean-Louis. "I hope the gesture will come in the upcoming days or the upcoming hours."

Jean-Claude Roy, a conservative politician, criticized the measure. He said it "offers guidelines for Aristide only if Aristide does indeed keep his word and grant an amnesty."

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'Spanglish' or 'Tex-Mex' popular with Hispanics

HARLINGEN, Texas (AP) - It's not strict English. Ni puro espanol. No, what's spoken here along la frontera is a mixture - sometimes logical, sometimes goofy - of two languages and two cultures.

"Our parents speak English and our grandparents hablan espanol," says "Rock 'n' Roll" James Echavarria, a disc jockey on a bilingual radio station.

Rock 'n' Roll James hits the airwaves in rapid-fire delivery, with no pauses between English and Spanish:

"KWW 96, the Valley's choice for hot tejano hits. Rock 'n' Roll James accompanied by Spanish speakers in the United States don't debate which language to speak. Instead, they're mixing both."

language." Rock 'n' Roll James says. Rock 'n' Roll James calls it tejano. Others call it Spanglish or Tex-Mex. Some English-only advocates might call it a threat.

But unlike supporters of the Parti Quebecois, seeking to create a separatist French-speaking nation in eastern Canada, many Spanish speakers in the United States don't debate which language to speak.

Linguists call it "code switching," and they say it's natural when people grow up with two languages.

"It's done unconsciously," says Lucy Garcia Willis, head of the modern language department at University of Texas-Brownsville. "It gets the point across. Some people will frown on it. But it's a cultural thing."

"It's probably gaining more and

more acceptance."

With proper grammar taking a back seat to convenience, some educators worry that generations of Hispanics are growing up without knowing either language properly.

But Mark Glazer, an anthropologist at University of Texas-Pan American, sees it as a long-term movement toward English. Glazer adds that English itself formed in a mixture, with strong influence from French and Germanic languages.

- the Spanish word for shoes - is masculine, not feminine.

"Some will consider it totally butchering the language, but keep in mind the tendency of modern society for efficiency, saying things in as few words as possible," Mrs. Willis says.

"It's a cultural foundation, and sense of ownership and place, to facilitate a person to switch off languages," Zavaleta says. "As we go through the construction of a sentence at the speed of light, our minds are picking up two vocabularies, a vocabulary in English and a vocabulary in Spanish.

"English is better for describing science. Spanish is better for describing emotion."

And while phrases like "hasta la

bye-bye" may be taking things to a nonsensical extreme, people don't carry grammar books with them when they sit down to eat fajitas and French fries.

"After all, it's not a matter of language. It's a matter of communication," Zavaleta says.

Some words and phrases created by mixing Spanish and English:

"El troque" means big truck, instead of "el camion" in standard Spanish. "La troca" means pickup.

"La marketa" or "la marqueta" means market, instead of "el mercado."

"Los tenis" means tennis shoes, instead of "los zapatos de tenis."

"El mofle" means car muffler, instead of "el silenciador de un automovil."

In South Texas, it's common to insert new words like "lonche" - derived from the English word "lunch" - and throw in the English numerical system or other English words while speaking in essentially Spanish grammar:

"Vamos al lonche a las twelve." (Let's go to lunch at 12 o'clock.)

"Adriana perdió fifteen dolares." (Adriana lost 15 dollars.)

"Quiero ver las casas over there." (I want to see those houses over there.)

"El camion" in standard Spanish.

"La camioneta" means pickup.

"El silenciador de un automovil" means car muffler.



In small communities and on farms, women, especially, searched for ways to take care of their families in an economical way as possible.

During this time in history, a unique organization came to the fore and serves to this day in many areas, though by another name. The first home demonstration agent in Texas began work in about 1915.

But it was several years before the home demonstration agent and HD clubs she organized became widely known. The clubs attracted young women who searched for help and older women who had experience to offer.

The first home demonstration agent in my county was hired in the 1930s for little or nothing. Her office furniture was a chair and an orange crate, she once said.

But, she went about her business with the zeal of an evangelist and, indeed, that's what she was to some extent.

She preached cooking, sewing, canning as well as gardening and other home activities. Although many of her followers were older than she and may have known as much, she approached them in such a way as to gain their confidence in a hurry.

Both my mother and my grandmother took up the cause. It was important in my family, as in most others, to "put up" vegetables and fruits in the summer and fall so we could eat well in the winter.

The home demonstration agent was a bustling soul who offered women a chance to improve their skills and enjoyed seeing their success.

In those days, the extension service had a strict rule about married home demonstration agents. No way could a woman stay at work after marriage.

But our agent decided to marry a farmer whose prospects looked good and that brought her career to a close.

In the marriage, she acquired a stepson who became a friend of mine and remains so to this day. He and I rode the school bus together for several years and fought like cats and dogs periodically.

Actually, it wasn't a bus. The school district contracted with a woman who drove her private car to transport about five students to school every day.

We rode two in the front seat and three in the back. My sister and I were the last two picked up and I felt that my age -- I was the oldest of the group -- entitled me to ride in the front seat next to the door.

Exercising all the male chauvinism he could muster, my friend refused me that privilege. My legs were long and I hated scrunching up my knees on the hump in the middle.

But the driver wouldn't interfere except to tell us to get in the car and hush. We did but I harbored resentment for years.

I left after finishing high school and lived in a number of cities before returning to my hometown. Among the people I met early on was my friend, the seat hog. His stepmother was in failing health but she was a delightful interview subject when I wrote an article about her for the local newspaper.

Her contributions to the betterment of the community probably would never be counted. When she died, some of us thought the flag at the courthouse should be lowered to half-staff.

Then we realized, not many were left around who would understand why.

Richards-Bush duel may end in close vote

AUSTIN (AP) - Ann Richards was at her best.

The governor sat patiently for nearly 15 minutes as a long-winded U.S. Department of Agriculture administrator wrapped up a speech. Then Richards stood, smiled and shot one of her famed one-liners to the convention of soil and water conservation officials.

"After the USDA's been up here talking to you," she grinned, "I hesitate to say that I'm from the government and I'm here to help."

The laughter brought down the house.

But the anti-government sentiment behind the punch line may be no laughing matter.

In an election year when nearly two-thirds of Texans voice a favorable opinion of their Democratic governor, fewer than half tell pollsters they are ready to vote for her again.

Nearly as many, according to recent surveys, say they plan to vote for Republican challenger George W. Bush.

"The biggest factor that's hurting Ann Richards is the political environment. People are past angry with politicians. The electorate is out hunting for incumbents right now," said Mark Sanders, an Austin consultant who works for Republicans.

While Bush hasn't soared in recent opinion polls, the gap has narrowed.

The most recent Texas Poll, published Aug. 30, showed Richards with 47 percent support and Bush with 43 percent among 757 likely voters. Poll director Candace Windle said the results were within the four percentage point margin of error.

A poll of 1,204 registered voters by The Eppstein Group, released Sept. 8, found Bush at 43 percent and Richards at 42.7 percent.

The Texas Poll also found

Richards with a 62 percent favorable rating and Bush 58 percent.

The governor says none of it comes as a surprise.

"I've always thought from the outset this was going to be a very, very tough and very close and very tight race. And I think it is," she said.

Richards says she has worked hard to fulfill her campaign promises of a "New Texas," one where women and minorities hold top positions and the bureaucracy got a kick in the pants.

She points to a series of achievements: crime rates falling, student test scores rising, student dropout rates falling, a doubling of the state prison system to 145,000 beds.

Texas leads the nation in jobs created, she says, while taxes rose less than under any of the past three governors.

Bush calls for tougher penalties for

juvenile criminals, no mandatory early release of convicted felons, no parole for sex offenders, abolition of the Texas Education Agency and creation of "home rule education districts" created to give parents, teachers and local communities more control.

Bush criticizes state spending and proposes tight limits on welfare benefits, although Richards counters that welfare is controlled by the federal government under a law signed by Bush's father.

Karl Rove, top consultant for Bush, said the polls show that Bush has been able to separate personality from the issues. Chuck McDonald, a spokesman for Richards, said all of Bush's campaigning amounted to little until the Republican hit television with "negative" commercials.

"He hadn't moved a milli-inch until he began his negative TV campaign.

He'd been stumping around the state and that hadn't done a thing," McDonald said.

Insisting that they have stuck to issues, Rove said the positive reception Bush has received sparked the recent Richards attack on Bush's business

record. The Democrat's campaign says companies of which Bush was an official lost more than \$371 million.

"They don't want to talk about the issues - juvenile crime, welfare,

schools. They'd rather go out and engage in a slam," Rove said.

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Age, health catching up with older rockers

LOS ANGELES (AP) - Life in the fast lane is finally catching up to rock music's dinosaurs, those aging '60s and '70s performers cashing in on nostalgia tours and the devotion of gray-haired, potbellied fans.

These days, it's rock me gently. Medical problems have recently sidelined such venerable performers as David Crosby of Crosby, Stills and Nash; Glenn Frey of the Eagles; Jerry Garcia of the Grateful Dead; and John Mellencamp.

The culprits: geezer aches and pains, the rigors of the road and, in many cases, the cumulative effect of drug and alcohol abuse.

"In their 20s these guys thought they were immortal," Grateful Dead spokesman Dennis McNally said from a backstage telephone in Philadelphia.

"The facts are an entire generation of rockers are pushing 50 and if you aren't living a healthy lifestyle, you'll pay the price," McNally said.

Some of the illnesses are simple bugs. The Who's 50-year-old Roger Daltrey - who once hoped he'd die before he grew old - was ordered to take a few days off because of respiratory problems.

Other ailments are more serious. Frey, 45, has suffered for years from diverticulitis, a painful inflammation of the colon. He underwent colon surgery Thursday and was listed in fair condition.

The surgery forced postponement of the Eagles' concert tour and led to a slew of jokes like this revised song list: "Welcome to the HMO California," "Life in the Gas Pains" and "I Get a Diseaseful, Queasy Feeling."

Doctors say the illness that sidelined Frey, a fitness buff and smoker, generally has nothing to do with lifestyle.

That's not the case with some of his colleagues, who face the consequences of living too hard for too long.

WTAMU plans wind energy workshop

A Wind Energy Workshop will be sponsored Friday, from 9:30 a.m. to 5 p.m., at the Texas A&M Research and Extension Center in Amarillo.

Presented by the West Texas A&M University Alternative Energy Institute, the workshop is designed to familiarize participants with the status of wind farms.

Kenneth Starcher, AEI research associate, said farmers, ranchers, electric cooperative representatives, public representatives and wind farm developers will benefit from the program.

"We want to help people be informed about what wind farms can do for you," he added.

He said developers currently are leasing land in the Panhandles of Texas and Oklahoma, Eastern New Mexico and Trans-Pecos regions. Cost of the Trans-Pecos project is estimated at \$40 million.

The workshop will cover basics of wind power generation using modern utility sized wind turbines, wind characteristics and estimation of energy production.

Economics and siting requirements

of wind farms and the history of the industry also will be covered.

Afternoon sessions will include discussions with landowners, utilities, developers and government representatives.

"We will help participants understand that wind farms are a legitimate business proposal and the expected return on investment," said Starcher.

Presenting information will be Starcher and Dr. Vaughn Nelson, a member of the Texas Energy

Coordination Council. He serves as director of AEI and interim dean of the WTAMU graduate school.

Sponsors of the conference are Southwestern Public Service, U.S. Department of Agriculture research service, American Wind Energy Association, Texas Energy Coordination Council, Texas Solar Energy Society and Sustainable Energy Development council.

The WTAMU Alternative Energy Institute is the state's primary source of information on wind energy.

Registration in advance is \$30 per person. Registration on the day of the conference will be \$35.

Cheese pizza lovers, take note: new mozzarella is lower in fat

WASHINGTON (AP) - In a nation where the average citizen eats nearly eight pounds of mozzarella each year and the country consumes the equivalent of 100 acres of pizza daily, a tasty low-fat cheese is welcome news.

Scientists from the USDA's Agricultural Research Service have developed a mozzarella cheese that has 12 to 14 percent less fat than the ordinary pizza topping, said an article in Agricultural Research journal.

Existing low-fat varieties of mozzarella have about 17 percent fat by weight, but consumers complain that the low-fat mozzarella is a less stringy, less meltable and less desirable alternative to the real thing. Regular mozzarella has all the right sensory satisfactions, but delivers 22-24 percent fat.

Until now, cheese pizza lovers,

He noted that the grants will be used for vital research to aid agricultural sectors in Texas and the nation.

The grants are:

-- Goat Meat Market Survey, a \$10,000 USDA grant and a \$38,300 grant from the Texas Office of State-Federal Relations. Purpose is to determine if there is potential for a goat meat market in the U.S. TDA will contract with Texas Agricultural Extension Service and Texas Agricultural Experiment Station to survey wholesalers, retailers, restaurants and consumers.

"This survey is essential to help our goat raisers recover from the loss of wool and mohair incentive payments and to find an alternative market in meat production," said Perry.

-- Organic Materials Computer Evaluation System, a \$40,000 USDA grant to develop a computerized system to evaluate and approve of materials such as fertilizers and biosticides that can be certified for use in organic farms. TDA will contract with Organic Agsystems

Consulting of Cottage Grove, Ore., to develop the computer program.

-- Milk Product Export Survey, a \$40,000 grant to evaluate the competitive position of U.S. and Mexican dairy industries under the North American Free Trade Agreement. TDA will contract with TAES to conduct the second part of a two-year survey.

-- IPM Market Survey for Fruits and Vegetables, a \$35,000 from USDA to determine if consumer demand exists for certified Integrated Pest Management-produced fruits and vegetables. Integrated Pest Management is a farming system that controls pest populations by using a variety of practices including biological pest controls, pest-resistant crop plants, crop rotations, planting date adjustments, crop residue destruction and limited pesticide use.

TDA will contract with the University of Texas-Austin to conduct the survey. Last year, UT-Austin conducted the first part of the survey on the market potential of IPM-certified cotton and rice.

Most Texas regions experience employment growth by 1993

Employment figures show Texas jobs increased an average of 1.9 percent each year from 1983 to 1993. Jobs in the Central Texas region grew the most, 3.4 percent, followed closely by the Upper Rio Grande, 3.2 percent. Fewer jobs were available in Northwest and West Texas—areas of the state that were more dependent on the oil and gas industry. The number of jobs in mining, which includes oil and gas exploration and production, declined statewide. Most of the state saw the largest percentage increase in the service industry, as well as in agriculture, forestry and fisheries.

NAFTA impact on cattle industry hasn't reach the Panhandle yet

HEREFORD, Texas (AP) - The way it looks on paper, the North American Free Trade Agreement seems a beefy boost for cattlemen.

Mexican tariffs on U.S. beef and live cattle crumbled with the treaty's implementation Jan. 1. Exports to Mexico have soared 53 percent in value this year.

Industry leaders, therefore, describe NAFTA's initial imprint as ... frustrating?

"We're not seeing any benefit out of NAFTA. That's the simple way to say it," said AzTx Cattle Co. president Bob Josserand in Hereford. "All we've seen are the problems."

Josserand and some others in the beef business can recite a litany of what they call non-tariff stumbling blocks by the Mexican government.

They point to these developments in Mexico: the intention to require new inspections and labeling procedures for beef shipments; and an investigation into allegations that U.S. shippers violated anti-dumping laws.

Philip M. Seng, president and CEO of the U.S. Meat Export Federation, said his Denver-based group is pleased with the progress NAFTA enabled. Yet Seng acknowledges that the treaty couldn't anticipate all hitches to trade.

"It's been replete with problems," he said. "It's been very frustrating. The high expectations were raised. But I think people are getting a dose of reality."

Cattlemen in the Texas Panhandle - the so-called cattle-feeding capital of the world - aren't impressed with NAFTA so far.

Josserand, mayor of Hereford and past president of the National Cattlemen's Association, made excited predictions in newspaper columns last fall as Congress debated whether to enter the pact with Canada and Mexico.

Josserand estimated that NAFTA would create 21,000 new jobs for truck drivers, mechanics and packing plant employees in the Texas Panhandle. He called NAFTA "a high-octane infusion as trade barriers fall and fair trade gains a toehold in our business dealings with our neighbors to the south."

Josserand still insists the treaty will spur the region's economy.

But for now, he finds "no significant change in how we're doing business, much to our disappointment."

NAFTA eliminated tariffs put in place in November 1992 by Mexico, America's third-leading beef trading partner. Those tariffs - 25 percent on frozen beef, 20 percent on chilled/fresh beef and 15 percent on live slaughter cattle - sliced exports nearly in half in 1993.

Figures so far this year show a rebound.

The U.S. Department of Agriculture reports that beef and veal exports to Mexico from January to June increased 41 percent in volume over the same six-month stretch in 1993.

The USDA figures show the value of the exports increasing from \$80 million to \$122 million.

Doug Perkins, vice president of communications for the Texas Beef Council, reads positive signs into meetings between cattlemen from the two countries.

"I think a few years ago we would have had a hard time setting up such meetings," Perkins said.

Lobbying by the U.S. beef industry helped persuade Mexico to relax new inspection and labeling procedures scheduled to take effect June 27.

Furthermore, various groups have disputed claims that the U.S. industry dumped beef products on the Mexican market below production costs. Mexico's Secretariat of Commerce and Industrial Development has indicated it will make a preliminary determination on the anti-dumping charges in December.

"Mexico is simply trying to say, we want to apply the same regulations to you that you apply to us," said Homero Recio, the meat export federation's vice president for Latin America and the Caribbean.

"Now whether or not they're exactly analogous, I don't know," said Recio, who works from San Antonio. "But that is their rationale."

Mexican cattlemen feel similarly antagonized by proposed new identification standards the USDA hopes will track bovine tuberculosis, he said. The rule would require Mexican

steers and spayed heifers to be marked just above the tail with a freeze-branded letter "M."

Recio described feelings about NAFTA as mixed.

"When you look at in terms of people doing business and it is easier today than it was pre-NAFTA, a considerable portion of the trade who would say it's become more frustrating," he said.

But he - along with others - forecasts smoother relations eventually.

"The future of NAFTA will be very positive," Recio said. "We do expect the Mexican economy to take off again, and over time, if they continue on this course, their consumers will have more purchasing power. It's a meat-eating country, and we have a lot of potential."

Back in Hereford, Josserand remained optimistic as well. His company recently increased its cattle capacity to 200,000 head with the purchase of a fifth feedyard.

"I think NAFTA is still an opportunity for North America to build a trading bloc ... but I think realistically we have to look two to three years at sorting out all the problems," he said.

"I think we were naive to expect, this quick after NAFTA, to see results."



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Bill to regulate lobbyists dies after heavy lobbying

WASHINGTON (AP) - A plan to regulate lobbyists and ban their gifts to lawmakers fell victim to a tide of telephone calls generated by the lobbyists themselves, using the most modern tools of their trade.

Using faxes, computers and TV and radio talk shows, a coalition of interest groups demonstrated how technologically savvy activists can upend the U.S. Capitol virtually overnight.

"It was a victory for the special interests," said Sen. Carl Levin, D-Mich., the lobbying bill's main sponsor.

He and other backers conceded the bill was all but dead for the year after they failed Thursday to quash a Republican filibuster against it. The vote of 52-46 fell far short of the two-thirds majority needed.

An effort to revive the bill was still possible Friday, but it was seen more as an attempt to fix blame for the bill's failure than as a realistic attempt to enact legislation.

The lobbying bill would have imposed strict new reporting requirements on paid professional lobbyists and at the same time a virtual ban on gifts to members of Congress from lobbyists and non-lobbyists alike. Until last week, the bill was seen as a political imperative, a much-needed gesture to help dispel public cynicism about Congress.

Conservative groups, led by the Christian Coalition and the Family Research Council, began the assault last week, working closely with House Minority Whip Newt Gingrich, R-Ga.

Gingrich activated GOP fax machines with bulletins labeling the bill a "gag rule on grassroots." By midday Tuesday, the bill that earlier had received overwhelming House approval could barely squeak past a key procedural test, 216-205.

The Christian Coalition turned on its own national fax network linking 1,000 local chapters, each with its own fax or telephone tree numbering in the hundreds.

The Family Research Council alerted Christian activist James Dobson, who put the message out on his television show. Talk show host Rush Limbaugh made the topic a key procedural test, 216-205.

feature of his radio program.

The Chamber of Commerce entered the fray with its own fax network and the American Society of Association Executives - a special-interest group for lobbyists - fired up its members with a bulletin that concluded: "There is no time to send a letter. You must call or send faxes to your senators today."

The coalition against the bill broadened to include, among many others, the American Civil Liberties Union, which said it raised constitutional concerns; the National Restaurant Association; the American Farm Bureau; the Realtors; the National Rifle Association; the Federation of American Scientists; and the American Civil Liberties Union.

By Thursday, the bill was doomed. Ten Democrats joined 36 Republicans in blocking the bill.

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
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
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
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
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
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

Herd dominates Demons in 2nd half for 44-14 win

The Hereford Whitefaces had to survive a slow first half and a scare early in the second half, but they went on to a 44-14 romp over Dumas Friday night in Demons Stadium in Dumas.

Hereford evened its District 1-4A record to 1-1 and its overall mark to 3-3. Hereford is off this Friday, giving the Herd two weeks to prepare

for a home game with district contender Borger.

Dumas fell to 2-3 and 0-1. Friday's game was Dumas' district opener following an off week.

Hereford held a 16-14 lead after a first half that saw both teams match touchdowns--the difference was a 43-yard field goal by Terance High which countered a botched extra point. The rout didn't start until late in the third quarter, as Hereford

pulled away with four touchdowns in the final 14 minutes.

"We began to block people. We started taking advantage of situations that were presented to us, (like) field position, ball control," Hereford coach Danny Haney said.

"In the second half, we came out and really started to execute," offensive lineman Josh Gamboa said. "We were a little off-step in the first half."

"The whole team--special teams, offense, defense--really did play well in the second half," Haney said. "The effort and intensity coming out in the second half was tremendous, and we were able to take control of the game."

The Herd piled up 413 yards of total offense--291 on the ground--and limited Dumas to 246 yards, 47 in the second half. Each team committed only one turnover; Hereford's came at the pivotal point of the game.

On the third play of the second half, Hereford quarterback Michael Brown and tailback Marquise Brown miscommunicated and collided in the backfield. The resulting fumble was

recovered by Dumas' Chris Edwards at the Hereford 20-yard line.

Demon tailback Jeff Willis ran for five yards, then again for no gain. On third-down-and-five, it appeared that quarterback Eric Burks had room to scramble, but Herd linebacker Martin Martinez came up to make a big hit, tackling Burks after a one-yard gain.

"We had to stop them and get the ball back for the offense," Martinez said.

Dumas tried a 32-yard field goal for a 17-16 lead, but Willis' kick was just wide right.

"That was the biggest series of the game right there," Haney said, adding that even a field goal at that point would have been a small victory for Dumas.

"But we got the momentum and got our offense going," Haney said. "The whole thing turned around, and we went up by nine points."

That didn't happen until both teams had drives stall in the third quarter. Hereford finally scored on its third possession of the period, going 58 yards in five plays. Marquise Brown made runs of 27 and 18 yards, and Michael Brown ran the final eight yards, rolling to his left and finding the corner of the end zone. High's kick made it 23-14 in favor of the Herd with a minute and a half left in the third quarter.

Hereford's defense solved Dumas

in the second half. After giving up 199 yards in the first half, the Herd defense held Dumas to 38 yards in the third quarter and nine in the fourth quarter.

Hereford sacked Burks five times for 43 yards in losses in the fourth quarter. Linebacker Moses Ruiz shook Burks up with a blind-side hit, tackling Burks after a one-yard gain.

"We had to stop them and get the ball back for the offense," Martinez said.

Dumas tried a 32-yard field goal for a 17-16 lead, but Willis' kick was just wide right.

"That was the biggest series of the game right there," Haney said, adding that even a field goal at that point would have been a small victory for Dumas.

Haney gave much of the credit to the Herd secondary.

Hereford scored quickly and often in the fourth quarter. Marquise Brown took a toss left and ran the final three yards, and High's kick gave the Herd a 30-14 lead with 11:26 left.

A Burks fumble at the Dumas 36

set up another score. Michael Brown hit tight end Scott Parker for an 11-yard gain, and after a five-yard penalty, Haney put in some substitutes. Backup quarterback Todd Dudley made the most of his first-ever varsity pass, finding a diving Stephen Wright for a 25-yard TD pass. High's kick made it 37-14.

"(Haney) told me to warm up before the series started," Dudley said, "then he put me in there and called the play."


"It was a perfect shot," Wright said. "There's nothing to it when he delivers like that."

The two sacks by Ruiz set up yet another Herd score. The second sack was a 19-yard loss on fourth down, turning the ball over to Hereford at the Dumas 30. Backup tailback Armando Zambrano ran 12 yards, then 19 yards for the score with 21 seconds left. High's kick provided the final score.

Marquise Brown, the starting tailback, ran for a season-high 161 yards on 26 carries. A third of those yards came on the Herd's second play of the game, after a Dumas punt. Brown ran through a huge hole and down the left side of the field for a 56-yard touchdown. High's kick gave Hereford a 7-0 lead with 2:20 elapsed.

Dumas answered that immediately. Willis returned the kickoff 33 yards

Baseball owners, players plan talks

NEW YORK (AP) - Players and owners say they'll get back together at the bargaining table next week - more than a month after talks broke off.

On a day that saw owners file eight grievances, the union failed on Friday to give an answer to management's request for a 45-day freeze on signings and free agent signings.

Clubs also sent notices to eight players, among them Tom Browning, Rob Dibble and Chris Sabo, indicating they will be sent outright to the minor leagues. Those players could then refuse the assignment and become free agents.

Union head Donald Fehr, who returned to New York from Denver on Thursday night, scheduled a trip to the Caribbean to update players. He will go to the Dominican Republic on Tuesday and Puerto Rico on Wednesday. Management negotiator Richard Ravitch is due back Saturday from a vacation in London.

"We've got to get back to the table to make a deal," acting commissioner Bud Selig said in a telephone interview from his Milwaukee office. "Hopefully, both sides understand that and the sooner we get back to the table, the better off everybody will be."

With four weeks left in the high school football regular season, it's hard to imagine some of the state's top teams getting any better.

Most already appear playoff-ready as 46 of the 47 ranked teams who played Friday night came out winners, with more than half having lopsided victories and 19 posting shutouts.

The only exception was Class 5A's seventh-ranked Grapevine, which was a lopsided loser 61-26 to The Colony. It's hard to call it much of an upset, though, because The Colony had the 11th-most votes in 5A last week.

Class 1A showed the biggest collection of dominating teams - or maybe just unfair matchups - as eight of the ranked teams shut out their opponents. The other two each allowed only six points.

Here's some other knockout numbers from an unusual Friday night:

- Three games were decided by 70 or more points.

- Eleven teams won by 50 or more points.

- The closest a ranked team came to losing was a 17-14 victory by Class 3 A's sixth-ranked Carrizo Springs against Cotulla.

- The only other games decided by less than two touchdowns were in Class 4A, where No. 3 La Marque beat Brazosport 14-7 and No. 4 Sulphur Springs defeated Mount Pleasant 13-6.

Another factor this weekend was severe weather in several parts of the state. Many games were cancelled, delayed, called at the half or played through mud and muck.

Although the field was sloppy in

The Colony, which was averaging 40 points a game, gained 539 total yards. Its defense gave up a season-high 26 points after having allowed only 12 total points all season.

Abilene Cooper was idle its first weekend at No. 1 in 5A since 1979.

That left No. 2 Austin Westlake as the highest-ranked team in the class to see action.

The Chaparrals played like it, too, pounding Austin Travis 54-0 in a game sidetracked by heavy rains and a 45-minute power outage caused by a blown-out transformer.

"The only other time I have seen a game as close to as sloppy as this was when I was an assistant, and I think the final was 0-0," said Westlake Coach Ron Schroeder, whose team has outscored its three district opponents 129-0.

Third-ranked Deer Park also was impressive with a 59-6 victory over Pasadena Rayburn.

Calvin Walker had touchdown runs of 49 and 41 yards on his only two rushing plays, and he returned an interception 103 yards for a third score. Russell Medley had three touchdowns on two runs and a 58-yard reception.

Fourth-ranked Plano East beat Carrollton Turner 35-0, No. 6 Houston Cypress Creek defeated Houston Cypress-Fairbank 28-3 and

No. 8 Arlington Lamar topped Mansfield 49-7.

North Mesquite enjoyed its first week at No. 9 by beating North Garland 42-28, and No. 10 A&M Consolidated celebrated its return to the poll by defeating Conroe McCullough 49-7.

Fifth-ranked Aldine MacArthur and Spring Westfield were to play Saturday.

Texan returns Carlsbad to football prominence

CARLSBAD, N.M. (AP) - The heart of the matter is this: People down here have once again fallen in love with football.

A year ago in this southeastern New Mexico community, the future of football seemed darker than a bat's bedroom. The Cavemen, a team with a glorious past, were staggering through a 1-9 season. Friday nights were dredded, and come Saturday mornings, few townspeople wanted to talk about games in the cafes along Canal Street.

Then, last spring, a new coach named W.T. Stapler crossed the Pecos River. Like some sort of West Texas sheriff, he proceeded to clean up the mess.

Carlsbad now is 3-3.

Canal Street eateries are noisy once more with morning-after fans.

The story of Carlsbad football this year, however, isn't just the team's turnaround but also how it was achieved.

Last month, Stapler, 61, was visiting Amarillo, Texas, on a family emergency in the middle of the night, he awakened with a burning sensation in his chest. All of a sudden, he had become the emergency. When Stapler finally made it to a hospital, doctors told him he'd had a heart attack.

The next night, Stapler's Cavemen played at home against Alamogordo.

From his Texas hospital bed, 300 miles away, Stapler periodically gave advice via telephone to an assistant in the press box.

"I could feel my ol' heart going bam-bam," says Stapler, who resembles a heftier version of NFL coach Dan Reeves.

The Cavemen beat Alamo. The following morning, Stapler underwent an angioplasty to clear a blocked artery. Two days later, he left the hospital, and the day after that he was coaching again.

A week later, as his concerned wife, Betty, watched from the stands, a pale Stapler patrolled the sidelines on the road against up-country rival Artesia, then the No. 13A team in the state.

With two minutes remaining, and Carlsbad trailing by three, Stapler called for a "guard around." More commonly known as a "fumblerooski," the trick play has experienced a drought. Often competitive in its district, Carlsbad reached the semifinals of the state playoffs in 1976.

Fans continued to fill blue-trimmed, 6,500-seat Ralph Bowyer Cavemen Stadium on Friday nights, but Carlsbad no longer dominated.

Yet, even as football began to slide in Carlsbad, pressure existed to win at the sport. Coaches who didn't win were shown the door quickly.

Dave Perini, who had played for Bowyer and had achieved some good successes as the high school's head coach in the 1970s, found out he was being fired one day in 1980 when he turned on the radio.

Last year, Carlsbad thought it might have found another Bowyer.

Cecil Marks was a promising young assistant in Artesia.

But the team wound up with its worst record since 1933.

Marks resigned in February.

In March, a community-appointed committee selected Stapler, a no-nonsense, fundamentally sound

football man who, in nearly 30 years as a head coach in Texas, had won more than 200 games.

Despite Stapler's superb credentials, however, no one in Carlsbad really expected him to reawaken the echoes of Ralph Bowyer. There weren't enough bodies for one thing. Only 40 kids went out for varsity football.

"I told 'em I only wanted kids who wanted to play," says Stapler, his voice a slow, croaky twang.

By the time Carlsbad appointed him, Stapler had become something of a legend in Texas prep football.

Still, he made no boasts when he arrived. He brought five coaches with him, whistled with his mouth so loud that people covered their ears and quietly told kids that if they listened to him, things would be OK. And he

built up Carlsbad's eighth- and ninth-grade football teams.

"You can tell he's a pro," says Carlsbad's athletic director, Mike Fulkerson. "He's been around long enough to know there's a lot of fluff in coaching that you do only for show."

As the '94 season approached, the jury was still out. Carlsbad's new coach seemed liked he knew what he was doing, yes, but he also seemed, well, just a tad old. He wore a hearing aid and had teen-age grandkids, for goodness sakes.

When Carlsbad pounded Del Norte in the season opener 35-7, townspeople admitted they might be wrong. Two close losses to Texas schools-including Randall-games in which last year's team likely would have been blown to pieces, supported the growing

optimism.

Then came the Alamo and Artesia games.

Stapler argues that his "heart deal" didn't figure in those wins.

"I've always told the kids here to not play for anyone but yourself," he says. "Don't play for your daddy or your momma or for your coach. Just play for yourself."

Did they?

"Deep down," whispers Carlsbad assistant Clendon Kirkpatrick. "I know the kids wanted to win for coach Stapler. They really respect what he's done here."

Todd Wright, a senior guard who scored the winning touchdown against Artesia, says, "Everybody's got pride now. People are talking about the team. We're not a secret, like last year."

Breckenridge offensive tackle doubles as band's drum major

BRECKENRIDGE, Texas - Skip Griffith is a two-way starter for Breckenridge High School on Friday nights.

The 6-foot-3, 240-pound junior is the strong side offensive tackle for the football team and the drum major for the band.

As best as anyone can tell, he's the first boy to be leader of the band and a football starter. He's also a second-string defensive tackle.

"It's lots of fun," Griffith says. "I get a lot of personal satisfaction from being a part of the football team and impressing people with a good band performance."

Playing football and leading the band doesn't leave Griffith much time to rest on Friday nights, especially when the Buckaroos play on the road and the visiting band performs first.

At halftime, he slips off his helmet, shoulder pads and gloves, slips on a clean jersey and hustles to lead the band onto the field. It's just as well he doesn't wear a band uniform. Band director Kyle Maxwell says Griffith outgrew his between sophomore and junior years.

Griffith misses 10 minutes of coaching at halftime, but the coaches fill him in on any adjustments to be made for the second half.

"Coach (Ross) Dodson tells us to get ready for a game; we prepare all week long - it's not something that you do (with a pep talk) at halftime."

Band is his first love and his first extracurricular activity. He joined the band in the sixth-grade.

"I signed up for band because that's what all my friends were doing. I didn't know what a trumpet was when I signed up."

He learned quickly and made All-District band in the eighth- and ninth-grades. He competed in the state UIL solo and ensemble contest last year, receiving a Division 2 rating in solo and a Division 3 in an ensemble. He takes private lessons from Bob Johnson, music director at Ranger College.

"I like music from soundtracks like 'Jurassic Park' or 'Schindler's List.' Once you understand it, music is extremely enjoyable."

Likewise, once he began to understand football, it became fun. His first time to play the sport was as an eighth-grader - then he broke his arm and didn't play in any games.

"My freshman year, I didn't have any idea what I was doing in football. This year, I finally know what to do, and I like it."

Off the field, he is on the AB honor roll, is junior class favorite and is active in youth activities at First Baptist Church.

Griffith says he couldn't handle both duties without the support of Dodson and Maxwell, plus his parents, Pam and Leslie Griffith.

Maxwell says, "He's got a load on his shoulders, but he's done wonderfully well. I know he's a good drum major for us."

Of his football abilities, Dodson says, "He's got a chance to be a D-1 (Division 1 college) player. He's a very quality football player."

Dodson says he encourages students to participate in more than one sport, or in this case, more than one activity. In fact, five varsity players are in the band, although they don't march at halftime, he adds.

"Anytime you force a kid to make a choice, someone is going to lose," Dodson said. "We try not to force kids to choose between one thing or another."

When he's on the field or the sidelines during a game, being drum major, Griffith can't help but notice how the band sounds.

"When the band sounds really good, I can tell a difference in the way the team plays," he says.

Whether he's leading the band at halftime or leading the way for a running back, Griffith is giving his all for the Buckaroos.

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Baylor, UH boast father-son combinations

When Clay Helton was growing up, his dad - the football coach - was a positive fountain of advice on the family business.

"He used to suggest that I shoot for a career as a pro golfer," Helton said, laughing. "And when we had time together, we usually went hunting or fishing."

Similarly, Mick Rossley's dad - the football coach - forever was tossing Xs and Os at him.

"Actually, he was more into baseball," Mick Rossley said. "We never discussed my 40 (yard dash) time. It was always, 'Let's go hit a few,' or 'Let's go to the Rangers game,' or maybe, 'Let's hit the golf course.'

"He never told me to play football, but I always felt I was greatly valued as a golfing partner."

Despite this appalling lack of zeal from Kim Helton and Tom Rossley, their sons currently are winding up their collegiate careers playing for old dad.

Mick Rossley, a Run-and-Shoot receiver scheduled to graduate from SMU in the spring with a degree in business marketing, easily is the more recognizable name. His 32 catches currently are tops in the Southwest Conference and he figures to finish his career with a high ranking in both school and conference receiving annals.

Clay Helton, a quarterback who transferred from Auburn last year when his father was hired as the new

head coach at Houston, underwent complete reconstructive surgery on his right shoulder during the off-season and was scheduled to make his first collegiate start against Texas A&M on Saturday. He is scheduled to graduate in December with a degree in math.

"This is an awful way to get the job," said Clay Helton, who completed 7-of-9 passes in a 52-0 loss at Ohio State last week after starter Chuck Clements broke his hand. "But I also feel that I can say nobody is giving me anything."

"When I first heard the news that my dad was the new head coach here, I was in Chapel Hill, North Carolina, on a recruiting trip," he said, smiling. "When we heard the news, the guy recruiting me felt a little awkward, I think."

"After a few minutes, he started telling me how tough it is to play for your father."

"But it's never been a problem. I came here to prove myself, and I think I've done that. By the end of two-a-days in my freshman year, I feel I was legitimately a part of the team."

"Besides, I'm basically a real easy-going person, and I get along with most people. I feel I get along well with every guy on this team."

Mick Rossley ranks sixth in

catches with 135 and seventh in yards with 1,339 on SMU's career receiving list.

Among numerous similarities between Mick Rossley and Clay Helton is the fact both fathers were star players in college and led the usual nomadic coaching life.

Tom Rossley, who made several All-America lists in 1968 when he caught 80 passes from quarterback Greg Cook at Cincinnati, was with the Atlanta Falcons when the SMU job came open in '91.

He previously had been the Mustangs' offensive coordinator (1989) and had coached in the Arena Football League, United States Football League, and Canadian Football League in addition to college stints at Holy Cross, Rice, Arkansas and Cincinnati. He also had various high school coaching jobs.

Kim Helton, who starred for Florida's 1969 Gator Bowl champions, spent several years coaching at both Florida and Miami in addition to National Football League jobs with Houston, Tampa Bay and the Los Angeles Raiders.

Additionally, both sons were last coached by their fathers in Little League baseball, and both made their college choice in part to help rebuild a program.

"I grew up in Gainesville (Fla.), but I went to high school here in Houston (Sugar Land)," said Clay Helton, who logged spot playing time during his two years at Auburn. "I came back because there were exciting things going on here that I wanted to be a part of."

Said Tom Rossley: "I really thought that's where he would wind up because he visited down there three times. But I really didn't influence his decision in any way because I was still in Atlanta during most of the recruiting process."

"Several schools recruited him, and I was proud that he finally made this choice, essentially, on the basis of academics."

"I just wish the Southwest Conference had stuck together. Rice, TCU and SMU are on the way back, and we have great new facilities here, and a good future, I think. It's just a shame that the conference is breaking up."

"One of the reasons I came here," Mick Rossley said, "was to help rebuild a program and put it back on the map."

Mick Rossley was preceded at SMU by a brother, Max, who now works for GTE in Dallas.

"He was able to tell me a lot about the school," Mick Rossley said. "He told me how tough it was academically ... about the small classes, the individual attention, the social life, the business opportunities in the area."

"A lot of my friends in high school were really anxious to go to school down in Austin, and I thought about it myself, because of the baseball program."

"But I had only been in Dallas for three years and I was beginning to love it here and wanted to learn more about it. There are great business opportunities here, and I think this is where I want to stay. I perceived the situation at Texas as kind of a deal where you're preparing for a pro baseball career."

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"Several schools recruited him, and I was proud that he finally made this choice, essentially, on the basis of academics."

"As for his situation on the team, I'm not his position coach, so fortunately I'm not the one making the decision about how much he plays. And when we're down there on the sideline on a Saturday, he's just No. 22."

Both players insist that during their youth, there was nary a shove from dad in any particular direction.

"He was never the pushy kind of father," Mick Rossley said. "Even in Little League, he was never one of those guys who insists that his kid has to be the star, or anything like that. For me, it was great growing up that way."

Said Clay Helton: "When I was getting out of high school, I was recruited by Rice, LSU, Auburn, some others. My dad's attitude always was, 'Make up your own mind - it's your life.'

"We always spent time together whenever we could, and we always had a lot of fun. But my dad has always worked hard - it's the only way I know."

"The situation here right now is kinda rough, but that suits him well. He has never wanted life to be easy."

"If this job ever became easy, he'd probably quit and go off fishing in the Everglades."

When Clay Helton takes the field, he says, "It will be the first starting assignment of my life where my dad will actually see it. But the funny thing is, it's also probably the first time I don't feel nervous."

Mick Rossley said that if there's an offer, he would continue playing football after college. But he isn't worried about it.

"A lot of my friends have left here and gone into business locally," he said. "It's a good life. Looking back

on my decision, I couldn't be happier."

Clay Helton said that when he graduates in December, he will start looking for a coaching job.

"I guess the explanation for that," he said, "is that if there's anyone in the world I want to be like - it's my father."

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Old Olympic gymnasts never die

Zmeskal, Belarussian rival make comeback under Karolyi

HOUSTON - Just a few years ago, they were portrayed as icy Olympic rivals who wouldn't even shake each other's hands after competition. They were a pair of intense gymnasts who didn't look at each other, let alone speak.

At least that's what we thought.

Today, Kim Zmeskal and Svetlana Boguinskaia can laugh about the old days and far-from-the-truth perceptions - just as the two friends did just the other day over breakfast. At the top of the topic list? Not the U.S. vs. Belarus or the Unified Team, but comebacks.

Two years after a pair of disappointing performances in Barcelona, Zmeskal and Boguinskaia are training together under a coaxed-out-of-retirement Bela Karolyi and attempting to return competitively to a sport that, heretofore, has been cruel to almost anyone over 18.

Just like Karolyi, the two women never really left the sport. Both stayed in good enough shape to perform in exhibitions, but both felt something was missing. So Zmeskal, at 18, and Boguinskaia, at 21, are putting their careers back in Karolyi's gold-medal hands.

"I feel bad that I introduced (dominance by younger gymnasts) to the sport," Karolyi said. "Now, at the end of my career, I have a chance to show people how much grace, beauty, maturity and longevity can mean to this sport."

"I hate it when kids are 17 (and)

they are forced out of the sport. So many of them don't even want to hear about gymnastics. This may help open the door for them. ... It may help open up a new perspective and bring the maturity and artistic grace back."

Zmeskal put college on hold and began her comeback in June, but she tore the anterior cruciate ligament in her right knee in an exhibition in Boston. The native Houstonian, who grew up in Karolyi's gym, now trains with a brace on that knee. Ironically, Boguinskaia, who arrived in Houston last week, made her comeback decision when she attended that Boston exhibition as a spectator.

"She came up to me with tears in her eyes and told me she wanted to try again, not for retaliation, but for the love of the sport," Karolyi said. Said of Boguinskaia, known as the Swan of Belarus. "She asked me to coach her."

He gave her the same talk he had given Zmeskal a month earlier. Both passed, and Karolyi was out of retirement. That pair will be joined in the recently refurbished gym by up-and-coming 13-year-olds Dominique Moceanu and Jennie Thompson, a former Karolyi kid who has been training in Oklahoma with Olympian Shannon Miller and her coach, Steve Nunn.

Call it Karolyi's Dream Team. "It's going to be incredible," Karolyi said of the pairing of two former world champions/Olympians. "The rivalry they will have every day, and the exposure will be good for both of them. The mental strength

of Kim is so contagious for everyone, and Svetlana's physical movements, emotional maturity and expressiveness is the best. It's the ultimate model."

"This is the best combination I could ever imagine putting together to train."

Boguinskaia won four medals at the 1988 Olympics (two gold, one silver, one bronze) and a team gold medal in 1992. When she returned to Belarus, she was given "a couple of flowers and they told me if I needed help, I could coach in the gym." She spent her first seven months in the U.S. in Boston coaching and teaching private lessons. Now she's training seven hours a day.

"My Russian friends said, 'Are you crazy or what?'" Boguinskaia said with a grin. "'Why are you doing this? You won almost everything. It's so much hard work.' I told them, I know. I just want to do it. But you know, it's none of their business."

Boguinskaia said it will take at least six months to know if she can compete at the level she wants. And does she worry about her age?

"No," she said. "I used to worry about it when I was 19. Now, I know it doesn't mean anything."

Zmeskal, whose dreams of Olympic gold ended with a spill early in competition in 1992, would have to agree. She injured her knee at the end

Weddell built LaMarque into perennial power

LA MARQUE, Texas - Eighteen wins, two losses.

That's what the Freeport Brazosport Exporters did in 1967 and 1968 as they dominated regular season football in Brazoria County and beyond, beating up on some of the toughest competition on the upper Texas Gulf Coast.

Alas, the reason all the games were regular season games was that there were no playoffs for Brazosport, which was ranked as high as No. 2 in the Associated Press poll in '67 before a stinging loss that knocked the Exporters out of contention.

"Texas City beat us 14-13," said Alan Weddell, an all-district lineman back then with his football ticket already punched to the University of Texas. "Then, in my senior year, Galveston Ball scored in the last three minutes to beat us by six points. So we were 9-1 both years and didn't make the playoffs."

Twenty-five years later, things have come full-circle.

After spending 12 years rebuilding what seemed to be a hopeless Victoria program, Weddell is in his fifth year at La Marque's helm, and the Cougars have reached the playoffs every year of his tenure, including the Class 4A state championship game last season (a 26-13 loss to Stephenville).

He chose La Marque so he could be closer to home - it's about an hour away from the Lake Jackson residence of his mother, Gena - and build another successful program. This season, the Cougars are 5-0 and in the midst of the state's longest regular season 4A winning streak at 32 games.

Despite having left Brazosport, and the two gut-wrenching defeats, so long ago, the 43-year-old Freeport

native has taken a measure of revenge. Against the Cougars' two archrivals, which happen to be the very same Texas City and Galveston Ball teams that haunted him so long ago, he's a cumulative 10-0.

"I talk about it to the players every time we play them," Weddell said. "Yeah, I do remember (the losses)."

After high school, the young lineman turned down a commission to the Naval Academy and other Southwest conference offers to attend Texas, where cousin Mike Cotten captained the Longhorns in 1961.

"I'd been to Texas games since I was 10 years old," Weddell said. "(Cotten) lived next door to (former Texas head coach) Darrell Royal, and we stayed there during Hurricane Carla. My blood turned orange really quick."

Numerous injuries, including ligament damage in his right knee that required three operations, ended his college playing career before it began. But while Weddell the player was through, Weddell the coach was just getting started.

"I think that helped me get into coaching," he said. "It got me looking at the game in a totally different way. I wanted to continue in the game because I felt like my career got cut short."

"But it was a tremendous experience getting to watch people like (Texas assistants) Emory Bellard, Fred Akers and David McWilliams at work."

McWilliams, who later became head coach at UT himself and currently serves as a fundraiser for the athletic department's endowment, has remained friends with Weddell through the years.

"We spent time talking about high school and college coaching - I've done both," McWilliams said. "He struck me as a great high school

coach. He loves kids, and he doesn't just care about athletic, he cares about their academics and their personal lives."

"It's made him successful. When you get a coach that cares that much for his players and players that care that much about their coach, you can't be beat. His players won't quit."

Weddell's coaching experience began while he was still attending college as a volunteer assistant of the new school in his home area, Clute Brazoswood. He helped with drills and provided other services, including pressbox work during the games. He returned near his home in 1973 when he landed an assistant's position at Angleton and spent his summers trying his hand at another sport.

"I coached American Legion baseball from 1972 to 1975," Weddell said. "We won the state championship in 1974. It was nice, because every year when we got beaten, we'd start right up with football practice the next day."

After Angleton and four years of assisting at Victoria, he ascended to that school's head coaching position. Years before, well-known prep coach Gordon Wood was quoted in Sports Illustrated as saying no one would win there.

He was wrong.

"It was kind of a coaching graveyard," Weddell said. "Most people wondered why anyone would want that job. But it was a challenge."

After beefing up participation, a Weddell trademark, things did change in Victoria. He left after the Stingarees had posted four straight winning seasons at a school that hadn't fielded back-to-back winners since the sixties.

At La Marque, he's 50-7 and hasn't lost a regular season game since 1991.

One of the first things Weddell did as the Cougars' coach was to schedule

Brazosport, but he's been as tough on his alma mater as he's been against the rest of La Marque's opposition, including a 34-0 non-district win last year.

The victory was more than bittersweet for Weddell. The week before his already emotional homecoming his father Bill, once a member of the Brazosport school board for nine years, died suddenly of a heart attack.

"That week was a tough week," he said.

Friday night, the schools clash in Freeport for the first time as District 24-4A rivals, making the game that much more meaningful.

"Every time we play them, it's a little more important," said Weddell, whose team is ranked No. 3 in the Associated Press poll. "This year, not only are we going down there, but it's also a district game against one of the top playoff contenders."

Gena Weddell won't attend the contest, and for good reason. In Alan Weddell's 22 years of coaching, neither of his parents has ever seen him win.

"Never, whether it was JV, varsity, assistant or head coach," he

said. "The last one she came to, we were like 40-point favorites and we got beat."

In fact, Weddell said he's considered the possible deja vu of losing to Brazosport, going 9-1 and

missing the playoffs in a three-way tie. It's a longshot, but it's happened to him before.

Twice.

The monthly blood pressure and glucose screenings offered by Deaf Smith Home Care Services have been changed to the second Thursday of every month, according to Jim Robinson, chief executive officer at Hereford Regional Medical Center.

The screenings will now be held at Hereford Senior Citizen Center on the second Thursday from 9 a.m. to noon.

Blood pressure numbers and glucose levels can be excellent indicators of a health problem, said Pat Ancona, RN, director of the Deaf Smith Home Care Service. "Older people should monitor their blood

pressure on a regular basis, especially if they have had a problem with high blood pressure in the past."

Ms. Ancona explained that hypertension or high blood pressure is known as the "silent killer." She said people can be suffering from high blood pressure and exhibit no symptoms until they have serious damage.

The screenings are offered free. "This is an important outreach program for the hospital district," Robinson said. "By providing this service free at the Hereford Senior Citizen Center, we hope that a number of people will take advantage of the screening to make sure their blood pressure and blood sugar are at a normal level."

She Walks These Hills by Sharyn McCrumb has all the ingredients of an award winning novel. A ghost, escaped convict, an ambitious deputy and a non-suspecting hiker are among those ingredients. Kidnapped by the Shawnee in 1779, Katie Wyler escapes and follows the rivers through the wilderness in search of home. Folks say Katie's ghost still wanders the Tennessee hills and Nora Bonesteel sees her every autumn "when the air is crisp and the light is slanted and the birds are still." Fascinated by the story, historian Jeremy Coble intends to backpack the Appalachian Trail in an attempt to retrace the tragic journey of 16-year-old Katie Wyler. Hiram "Harm" Sorley, escapee of the Northeast Correctional Center in Mountain City, Tenn., is also wandering the hills. Suffering from Korsakoff's syndrome, Harm has no recent memories of the crime for which he was convicted and Sheriff Arrowood isn't sure Harm killed the hated local bureaucrat. Ambitious Martha Ayers sees the capture of Harm Sorley as the best way to prove her qualifications for the position of deputy sheriff. It is only a matter of time before all of them meet in the wilderness.

Vicky's fears are pricked further when art thief master of disguise and the man she knows as "Sir John Smythe" is seen in the shadow of the Sphinx on the first days tour. Vicky finds it difficult to focus on her job when she sees the beautiful young girl clinging to Sir John's arm, and then there is the romantic billionaire gorgeous "sheik," a pompous Boston professor, and the glamorous American widow who thinks it's her duty to give everyone beauty tips. Vicky realizes she must concentrate on her job when

her boss R. Schmidt shows up and a crew member is murdered.

"One of the most unique and powerful debut novels of the decade" is **The River Sorrow** by Craig Holden. At 34, Dr. Adrian Lancaster is given a second chance. His long hair is a reminder of a rougher time, when as a younger man he had become an addict. Everyone in small Morgantown knows of his past and Dr. Lancaster is about to discover how easily someone can destroy his career. Police Detective Frank Brandon, working on gut instinct, believes Lancaster is somehow connected to the murder of John Doe and to others. It is up to Lancaster to discover who is responsible for the killings and to clear his name and reputation.

The Book of Reuben by Tabitha King takes Reuben Styles through his impressionable teen during the 1960s when his romantic ideas were shaped by the songs of that time. Trying to

do everything right, life seems very unfair. After his father's death, Reuben must go to work after high school, but hard work at the local filling station results in an opportunity to buy the station. Reuben becomes involved with an older lady that ends with her child's mysterious murder. Reuben's incredible spirit sees him through a bad marriage and finally he meets Pearl, his soul mate that helps him become the person he envisioned.

Food Service Department given special recognition

National Food Service Employee Week recognizes the important contribution food service workers make to the care of patients in hospitals, according to James Robinson, Hereford Regional Medical Center's chief executive director.

"At HRMC, our dietary department is a vital member of the patient care team. They prepare more than 2,000 meals each month for four different types of diets. And those meals must not only look and taste good, they must be carefully calculated to provide proper nutrition to our patients," Robinson said.

Manager of the department is Martha Rincon. She is a certified dietary manager and has been in the dietary field for over 19 years.

Rincon supervises the planning of the 21-day cycle of menus. She must plan for a general menu and three modified menus which include a bland or soft menu, a diabetic menu and a low-sodium menu. Working with the physicians, Rincon visits the patients and does nutritional screening and assessment. She

assesses the nutritional needs of the patient and does what she calls a "basal energy expenditure requirement" which determines the caloric and protein requirements for the patient.

The physician orders the diet, and the dietary staff works with both the patient and the physician to determine what type of meals will work best.

Rincon is also responsible for the quality assurance program of the dietary department. She monitors and reviews the food, the service and the results of the special diets. The monitoring is done through the patient surveys and through individual audits.

Other members of the department are JoNell Satterfield, head cook; Juanita Del Toro and Silvia Martinez, cooks; Jennifer Hubbard and Pat Esqueda, cook's assistants; and Julia Nunez, dietary aide. Nunez is a HISD 1995 senior who has joined the staff part-time to expand her knowledge in the medical field. Her goal is to graduate from HISD and attend college.

Charlotte Clark, an employee of the hospital for 15 years, provides the hospital district with federally mandated dietary supervision. She has a master of science degree, is both a registered dietitian (a national registration) and a licensed dietitian (a state registration).



Extension News

Not eating breakfast negatively affects a child's ability to learn in school regardless of socioeconomic class. Any child who goes to school without breakfast and then does not have a school breakfast usually develops a "gnawing feeling of hunger." This hunger is not related to their family's socioeconomic level nor their nutritional status, but is due to a lack of nutritious food and enough calories for the energy they need.

The result is the same for children of all socioeconomic classes--limited learning. This condition will cause physical, mental and behavioral symptoms that prevent a child from being able to understand and learn as well as cognitive impairment, according to research by the American Dietetic Association's president-elect, Doris Derelian, Ph.D.

Derelian has shown that this condition called "transient hunger" even causes physical symptoms in children. Some of the symptoms that have been verified include respiratory illness, stomach pain and other gastrointestinal ailments.

There is more absenteeism among children who do not eat nutritious foods and adequate calories in the morning. Such children automatically have a disadvantage when measured against those who are able to be present regularly.

The transient hunger has behavioral outcomes as well. The teacher may describe this behavior as "restlessness," "low time-on-task," "hyperactivity," "sleepiness" and/or "unacceptable interpersonal relations." Regardless of the label, the results or "transient hunger" is obvious to all who watch these children, according to Derelian.

Hungry children also score lower on achievement tests. The ability to

read, do math and perform tasks related to logic are impaired when children are hungry. They not only score lower on the problems they attempt, but even quit trying to solve the problems and leave more unanswered, which results in having lower grades than well-fed children.

School breakfast programs are only available to "slightly" more than half of the nation's students and just less than 20 percent of those to whom it is available actually participate. Regardless of income or social standing, all children who may be suffering even from sporadic hunger must have access to food. Greater efforts are needed to help school administrators, students and their parents to become more aware of the child nutrition programs.

Dr. Derelian, T. Berry Brazelton, N.D., Carl Sagan, Ph.D. and others testified before the Nutrition and Investigations Subcommittee of the Senate Agriculture, Nutrition and Forestry Committee on USDA food and nutrition programs.

They gave the following research findings:

-Undernutrition, along with environmental factors associated with poverty, can permanently retard a child's physical growth, brain development and the capacity to learn and understand.

-The longer a child's nutritional, emotional and educational needs go unmet, the greater the likelihood of impaired ability to learn and understand.

-Low-income children who attend school hungry score significantly lower on standardized tests than on-hungry low-income children.

-Supplemental nutrition programs under the National School Lunch Act can help to offset threats posed to a child's capacity to learn and perform in school, which results from inadequate nutrient intake.

Flu, pneumonia season is fast approaching

Each year millions of Americans are afflicted with influenza and pneumonia. Those most at risk are the very young, the very old, those suffering from chronic lung or heart disease and those with weakened immune systems.

This fall, the American Lung Association of Texas urges all those who are considered high risk to get a flu shot. You are at high risk if you are over age 65, have chronic lung, heart or kidney disease, reside in a nursing home or other longterm care facility or if you have other chronic diseases. In addition, health care workers should be immunized to reduce the chances of spreading this condition to high-risk people. The shot is recommended every year because the influenza virus strain changes annually. The ideal time to receive flu vaccine is between October 15 and November 15.

According to the Lung Association, both influenza and pneumonia are deadly. "Influenza is a highly contagious, potentially life-threatening lung disease," said Dr. William Paul Glezen, epidemiologist at the Influenza Research Center at Baylor University. "Since 1960, pneumonia has been the

leading killer by infectious disease in the U.S. It is both the most common and most deadly complication arising from influenza," he explained.

"Combined, influenza and pneumonia are the fourth leading cause of death among all American women and the fifth leading cause of death among all Americans over the age of 65," Dr. Glezen said. Lung disease, including influenza and pneumonia, is the third leading cause of death in America.

Senior citizens are at particularly high risk for both influenza and pneumonia and are most likely to be hospitalized as a result of this deadly combination. Influenza and pneumonia are the fifth leading cause of death for those aged 65 and over, resulting in 68,962 deaths in 1991 alone.

"Only 40 percent of older adults living in the community receive their influenza shots every year, and only 20 percent receive the pneumococcal pneumonia vaccine," said Dr. Glezen. "Both vaccines are covered under Medicare and other health insurance programs."

The finest restaurants use it. Child care staff use it. The Red Cross uses it. And four out of five U.S. families use it in everyday laundry and household cleaning. What is it?

Common Household bleach

For almost 80 years, household bleach, also known as "chlorine bleach," has been the safest, most effective ingredient for many cleaning tasks. For example, child care staff clean both toys and diaper changing tables with it to prevent the spread of germs among babies, toddlers and parents.

And chefs use it to clean food preparation areas to prevent the spread of bacteria such as E. coli and salmonella that can cause food poisoning.

The Red Cross also distributes bleach to purify drinking water after natural disasters when boiling the water is not possible.

Bleach is safe to use. It is essentially non-toxic if ingested. It may cause irritation if it gets in the eyes or on the hands, but first aid requires only rinsing with water.

Household bleach is not part of the health and environmental issues currently being discussed about some chlorinated compounds that build up in the environment, such as dioxin, DDT and PCBs. In fact, "chlorine bleach" actually has no free chlorine in it. What's in the bottle is sodium hypochlorite—a compound that breaks down mostly into salt and water during and after use.

Here's a recipe for using bleach to purify water in the event of water supplies being contaminated by an earthquake, flood, hurricane or other emergency, when boiling water is not possible.

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in the ear the way hearing aids are. Maskers work by interrupting the internal noises.

I have often recommended a good nighttime noise masker, an ordinary bedside radio tuned to an intermediate static frequency. I have never gotten feedback from readers on this. I'd like to.

For a further discussion of hearing loss and ear noise has to do with the fact that the sensitive hearing cells lie deep in the ear, and as they die they emit signals perceived as noise, usually some form of ringing.

The answer often lies in interrupting the hearing-noise association. One solution is a simple hearing aid to intensify sound signal reception. If that does not help, then you can turn to sound maskers, devices worn

to men, but they can play a role in female hair thinning, especially after menopause.

So, yes, your doctor's Tagamet therapy does make some sense, even though we usually think of the drug for its action in reducing stomach acid.

DEAR DR. DONOHUE: My wife was having colon polyps and was using Metamucil. I used bran muffins for the same fiber effect as her Metamucil. I got her to switch to my bran-muffin approach, but it didn't work for her. Her doctor said the muffins were not an adequate substitute for her fiber need. Your comments, please. — M.K.

ANSWER: We need between 20 and 35 grams of fiber daily.

Fiber is the undigested part of food, such as the husks of grains. It is the stuff we have gotten into the habit of refining out of existence in Western society.

Fiber keeps moisture in undigested food as it traverses the intestines. That is one way it works to prevent constipation.

For sure, you are better off getting fiber from natural food intake than from medicine, but some people need supplementation. We can now supplement our fiber needs with products such as Metamucil, which is made from the husks of psyllium seeds.

Does a single bran muffin contain all the fiber one needs for a day? I doubt it. You just cannot pack that much fiber into a single muffin. If the daily muffin works for you, fine.

Bran itself is a good fiber source, a single tablespoonful containing 4 grams of fiber. And many breakfast cereals today have high fiber content. Fresh fruits — especially with skins — and vegetables are good sources.

Previous generations called fiber "roughage."

STAYING YOUNG

*How beautiful is youth! How bright it gleams.
With its illusions, aspirations, dreams! - Longfellow*

According to folklore, Ponce de León traveled inland from the Florida coasts in 1513 in search of the fountain of youth. I assume he did not find it. If he had, I'm certain we would have seen his "Eternally Young" infomercial on television by now. He'd still be alive you know.

Like de León, some folks are still looking for the secret of youth. Every year millions spend their hard earned dollars on gimmick products aimed at extending their youth. They color their hair, moisturize their skin and gobble bottles of pills and liquids for the sake of slowing the aging process.

I do not mean to condemn these products or anyone who

uses them. What I want to offer in this column are some serious thoughts on staying young. No gimmicks, no hype and no charge. Youth is an attitude.

Gen. Douglas MacArthur made this observation about youth. "Youth is not entirely a time of life, it is a state of mind. Nobody grows old by merely living a number of years. People grow old by deserting their ideals. You are as young as your faith, as old as your doubt; as young as your self-confidence, as old as your fears; as young as your hope, as old as your despair."

I agree with MacArthur. Youth is a state of mind - an attitude. I know people who are still young at eighty and ninety. Yes, their bodies are bending a little under the weight of years, but they are still young at heart. They have confidence, hope and faith. They are still accomplishing their goals, living their dreams and enjoying life.

To these fortunate ones, life is sweet and full of promise. Even as their health erodes, they retain the attitude of youth. They have learned that life is not the circumstances we face, but what we make of them.

Youth is habit

No one would argue that feeling good can help you feel young. And, just like we can control our attitude, we can also affect the quality of our health.

Dr. Peter Walters, Director of Life Services at West Texas A&M University, says youth is a habit. Actually several habits. "We can improve our quality of life and extend our youth by developing healthy habits," Walters contends.

The evidence he presents is strong. He sites research on the

aging process that shows that the average American loses about 50 percent of optimum body function between the ages of 30 and 65. Reaction time slows, muscle strength deteriorates and we become less flexible. However, by developing healthy habits, we can slow the aging process significantly.

Walters suggests making changes in three areas: Diet, exercise and rest. "God created our bodies to do work. To work efficiently, the body needs fuel (food) and periods of recuperation (rest)," he said.

Walters recommends a diet low in sodium and fat, and high fiber. "You can eat most foods in moderation," he said, "but fresh fruit and vegetables are great fuel for your body."

For exercise Walters suggest walking and swimming. "Get your physician's approval and then gradually increase your activity level," he said.

On the subject of rest, Walters advises using common sense. "Don't think you can cheat the rest cycle. Rest is every bit as important as food and exercise. If you don't allow the body to recuperate naturally, you'll pay the price later," Walters said.

I've decided to follow Dr. Walters' advice. Won't you join me? As we work to develop healthy habits, I'll say a special prayer for both of us: That as the years roll by we'll stay young at heart, full of faith and hope and enjoy lasting health.



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

Keep those home fires from burning

Fire started in homes by cigarettes, arson, electrical malfunction and other causes result in about 6,000 deaths in the United States and Canada each year, and more than 31,000 injuries. Billions of dollars worth of property are lost as well.

There are many important precautions families can take to prevent fires in their homes. These include keeping matches away from children, unplugging small appliances when leaving the home and storing fuels, paints and battery acid in tightly closed containers away from ignition sources.

Smoke detectors are the most important fire-safety items in the home. Smoke and deadly gases spread faster and farther than flames and heat. More than 80 percent of United States homes have smoke detectors installed and when properly used and maintained, smoke detectors save lives. Unfortunately, one-third of all home smoke detectors, it's believed, are inoperable due to dead, disconnected or missing batteries.

However, there are some necessary precautions families can take to protect themselves should a fire start in their home:

-When purchasing a smoke detector look for the UL label, which indicates fire-code standards have been met.

-Check to see if the detector operates with a common battery. Those that don't frequently have a custom battery that can be hard to find in stores.

-Dust and test detectors monthly. Test an alarm by exposing it to smoke.

-Replace the batteries in all home smoke detectors once a year.

-Place detectors in key locations throughout the home—one at the top of each stairwell leading to sleeping areas and one on each floor and/or each distinct living area, including the basement and attic.

-Keep at least two fire extinguishers in the home—one in the kitchen and one in the furnace area.

Some advanced smoke detectors are integrated with home security systems to offer homeowners added home protection and peace of mind.

Barbecuing secret is revealed by craftsman

LEXINGTON, N.C. (AP) - Wayne Monk pulled open the barbecue pit's heavy metal doors that do so little to rein in the sweet and smoky aroma that makes this small North Carolina town famous.

Cooking ever so slowly on metal grates in the oak-fired pits were 20 pork shoulders, each weighing about 15 pounds. In a matter of hours, the tender meat would be chopped or sliced into Lexington-style barbecue in a tradition that began around the turn of the century.

"I built 'em just as far as a man can reach," Monk, the dean of Lexington's barbecue craftsmen, said of his pits.

Monk, who has served the delightful fare to presidents and common folk for 43 of his 58 years, feeds about 1,000 customers a day at his Lexington Barbecue restaurant, a modest white building along Business 85. It's one of more than a dozen places in this community of 16,000 that serve barbecue. (In 1983, Monk served it to President Reagan and the leaders of several other nations at an economic summit in Virginia.)

According to legend, Lexington-style barbecue has its origins at the Davidson County Courthouse square, where it was cooked under tents and served it to crowds in the early years of the 20th century. "They used to keep the money in an old cigar box," Monk said.

The mantle has been passed down from generation to generation, like a prized family heirloom.

Monk began in 1951, when he was 16 years old. Working in a local restaurant, he learned the secrets of Lexington barbecue over the next decade, then went into business on his own in 1962.

Even Monk questions the need for a museum when there's so many barbecue restaurants that still cook it the old-fashioned way, over a slow fire. Roy and Boyd Dunn, who own Speedy's Barbecue, are among 16 other barbecue restaurants listed in the Lexington telephone book.

The Dunns began working at Speedy's in 1963. They bought the place about 15 years later. "It's all I really know," Roy Dunn said during a break from the kitchen. "I guess you can say we have it in our blood."

Like Monk's employees at Lexington Barbecue, most of Dunn's waitresses and cooks have been with him for 15 years. Some longer.

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

Something Wilder is a way of life for show's producers

Standing at his twin sons' day-care center, slightly-past-middle-age father Gene Bergman (Gene Wilder) is mistaken for the boys' grandfather by the father of one of the other children.

After being corrected, the errant parent states, "I don't know how you do it. I had my kid when I was 21."

To which Gene deadpans, "I had my boys when I was ... ready."

And so goes *Something Wilder*, a lighthearted new comedy about the joys of parenthood airing Saturdays on NBC.

The series stars two-time Oscar nominee Wilder (*The Producers*, *Young Frankenstein*) and Daytime Emmy Award winner Hillary B. Smith (*One Life to Live*).

They play Gene and Annie Bergman, two advertising executives who met and married at a New York City agency. Gene and his somewhat younger wife decide to get off the fast track and raise their fraternal twin boys in Annie's wholesome hometown of Stockbridge, Mass.

A first-time father late in life, Gene wants to spend as much "quality time" as possible with little Sam and Gabe (played by Carl Michael Lindner and Ian Bottiglieri, respectively), and, of course, Annie. He attempts to do so while trying to get his new ad agency off the ground and supervising the remodeling being done on his 18th-century house.

Wilder brings all of his alternately hyperfrenetic and soft-spoken big-screen charm to the role. And his character's goggle-eyed whimsy and wonderment at vicariously re-experiencing the mysteries of childhood seem genuine, making the show likable without going over the edge of cutesy canyon.

The show's executive producers are late-in-life fathers themselves. Lee

Kalcheim and Barnet Kellman explain how the series' premise came into being between baby bottles and dirty diapers.

"This series is the story of my life," Kalcheim says. "I spent 20 years in the wilderness, and then I found a terrific woman with whom I had twins. It was my epiphany — I was born again — and it was the best thing that ever happened to me. I wondered, 'What was it I had been waiting for?'"

"For us, it's very personal," Kellman says. "It comes from a very, very immediate and personal experience for both Lee and myself, as we find ourselves later-in-life fathers. We find ourselves amused and humbled and awed and excited by the challenges that face us every day and the situations that face us every day."

"And we got to talking about that, and Lee had been working on this and noodling, writing scenes and things like that —"

"And changing diapers," Kalcheim interjects.

"While changing diapers," Kellman continues, "and the idea of a series was born."


Much like their program's main character, Kalcheim and Kellman struggle with the problems of juggling hectic careers and parenthood.

"The irony of creating a series about my love affair with my family," Kalcheim says, "is that the work demands of the series will probably keep me away from them. The fact that this show is picked up and on the air is going to take me away from the very thing that I'm so enraptured with."

"Also, when I'm with my family, I'm constantly stopping myself from playing with my kids and thinking, 'This would be a good idea for the show.' "





Premiering on TBS Monday, Tuesday and Thursday, Oct. 10, 11, and 13, *The Native Americans* is divided into six segments.

Each segment highlights a different geographic region of the United States, focusing on the history of the tribes indigenous to that area, and, in each case, linking the past with the present.

Also within each episode, a group of tribal leaders from the featured region

are brought together as a "council," where they share their culture's rich histories and discuss the states of their respective nations today.

The series explores the legacies of American Indians still imprinted on society today, citing their influence in the fields of food, medicine, language, politics and military strategy.

Often dark, somber and brooding, the series offers little in the way of light entertainment.

What it does present is an introspective, thought-provoking look at the history of the United States, long before it ever was the United States, and the corruption, devastation and attempts at preservation of the glorious societies that occupied the land.

Later this month, keeping with the American Indian theme, TNT presents the film drama *Lakota Woman*, based on the best-selling autobiography by Mary Crow Dog with Richard Erdoes, on Sunday, Oct. 16.

And beginning Monday, Oct. 31, CNN debuts the month-long, 20-part *Special Reports* news series, *The Invisible People*.

late 1995. The film is based on the Vito Russo book about the portrayal of gay and lesbian characters in mainstream movies.

Meanwhile, HBO Showcase is developing *Atomic Mafia*, a two-part dramatic miniseries about a plot to smuggle nuclear materials out of the former Soviet Union and what might happen if they fell into the hands of terrorists.

Material for the script is being gathered from eyewitnesses with links to Scotland Yard, Interpol, the CIA and the KGB. *Atomic Mafia* is also set for a 1995 debut.

Next on HBO's to-do list is *Going, Going, Almost Gone! Animals in Danger*, a family special being produced in cooperation with the World Wildlife Fund.

Slated for a November debut, the half-hour special will feature voice-overs by Phil Hartman, Bernadette Peters, Ed Asner, Jasmine Guy, Judd Hirsch and Geoffrey Holder.

The Kennedy Center Honors, presented as a gala two-hour special each holiday season on CBS, is scheduled to be taped in early December in

Washington, D.C. The honorees are Kirk Douglas, Aretha Franklin, Pete Seeger, composer Morton Gould and producer/director Harold Prince.

And speaking of people outstanding in their fields, PBS' *American Masters* begins the season in November with a tip of its 10-gallon hat to cowboy humorist Will Rogers.

Also on tap are retrospectives of the work of Tennessee Williams, Edgar Allan Poe, Rod Serling, Richard Avedon, the comedy team of Mike Nichols and Elaine May and "adopted American" Placido Domingo.

Fred Astaire made his movie debut playing himself in 1933's *Dancing Lady*. Joan Crawford and the Three Stooges also starred.

Twenty-one years after leaving Hollywood, (Princess) Grace Kelly returned to film to narrate 1977's *The Children of Theatre Street*.

They may have been unlikely co-stars, but Elsa Lanchester and Elvis Presley worked together in 1967's *Easy Come, Easy Go*.
