Dawn post office closing 'not done deal'

Postal patrons at Dawn were assured Tuesday afternoon that closing the community's post office "is not a done deal."

Don O. Jones of Lubbock, manager of post office operations for the Fort Worth District, told an audience of about 50 persons that "you think we have our minds made up, but we haven't."

Since much of the discussion

during the 75-minute meeting in the Dawn Community Center centered on the economics of the Dawn post office operation, Jones said the decision on the future of the post office will not hinge entirely on that issue.

Jones said studies will be conducted on feasibility of continuing operations in the Dawn post office as well as alternatives. If a decision is made to recommend closing, it will be posted in January.

The procedure to close could take up to a year before a final decision is made, he said.

Opening the meeting, a Dawn resident, Kenneth Chambers, read a statement, detailing the uses, customers and necessities of postal service in Dawn. He called the post office a "vital link" between its customers and their businesses.

Chambers called attention to the needs of elderly residents of the community, saying that free-standing

boxes exposed to the weather would work a hardship on senior citizens.

He also observed that Dawn residents are proud of their post office and take care of the grounds, being certain grass is mowed.

"Will closing the post office and going to another kind of service provide an efficient, reliable service?" he asked.

Stan D. Deweber, post office review coordinator for the Fort Worth District of the U.S. Postal Service,

responded to questions from interested citizens.

He insisted that the post office won't be closed "because it doesn't make money." He added that authorities will look at alternative delivery patterns and their costs before making a decision.

The review of the Dawn post office operations is routine, in light of the retirement last December of Genevieve Miller, the postmaster, he said.

Postal officials in attendance Tuesday said statistics show approximately \$8,200 in business recorded by the post office in each of the last two years.

However, Deweber said cost of the operation is "three or four times that amount."

He had no breakdown of expenses, but pointed out that overhead includes salary and benefits for the officer-in-charge, rent on the building and utilities. Costs amount to more than \$30,000 per year, he continued.

Additionally, Deweber said a survey conducted for two weeks, beginning last Aug. 28, showed an average of only seven transactions at the window during post office hours.

A citizen responded to the transaction question by noting that "every person who went into the post office to get mail ought to be counted as a transaction."

Church receives grant for building planned Hispanic Community Center

A Tulsa, Okla., foundation has awarded a \$50,000 challenge grant to San Jose Catholic Church, toward construction of a proposed \$380,000 Hispanic Community Center.

The church is required to raise approximately \$70,000 to receive the grant from the Mabee Foundation, said the Rev. Daryl Birkenfeld, pastor.

The grant and challenge money will complete financing of the Hispanic Center. Already available are funds totaling more than \$200,000.

Parishioner donations, a \$75,000 gift from the Meadows Foundation and an available mortgage have been secured for the project.

Father Birkenfeld said the parish has until September 1995 to meet the challenge of the Mabee Foundation.

He said the hope of the project's planners is that the funding will be complete by early 1995 so construction can begin in the spring.

The building will house programs to address a number of critical issues facing Hereford's Hispanic community, he pointed out.

Classrooms, offices and recreational facilities will be provided in the 11,600 square foot brick veneer structure, said Father Birkenfeld.

Site of the Community Center will be at 735 Brevard, across the street from San Jose Church parking lot, and adjacent to Blue Water Gardens apartment complex.

Among programs to be implemented when the building is erected is a dropout intervention program, a high priority issue because statistics indicate an overall dropout rate of 42

percent in Deaf Smith County.

A high percentage of the dropouts, according to figures, are from the Hispanic population, said Father Birkenfeld.

He said programs in bi-lingual health screening and programs for the elderly as well as expansion of an early childhood development program at San Jose will be implemented.

State Sen. Teel Bivins (R-Amarillo) will conduct a town hall meeting here Thursday, beginning at 9:30 a.m., in Hereford Community Center. All area residents are invited to attend.

Sen. Bivins will discuss the opening 74th Legislative Session, including bills he has prefiled and those he still plans to introduce. He will also answer questions from constituents and solicit their views on state issues.

In January, the legislature is expected to address such issues as juvenile crime, education reform, home equity, and casino gambling.

"The Texas Legislature has been adjourned for a year and a half now. It's important for me to hear what citizens want out of this next session," Bivins said. "The state also has new leadership and I hope to learn what expectations people have in light of that."

The legislature will convene Jan. 10 and meet through May.

CSF gifts bring help in variety of areas

A blind, 71-year-old woman often finds that her small Social Security income isn't enough to cover the bills, especially with a 16-year-old grandson living with her. This holiday season is no exception.

Behind her utility bills, she asked for assistance from the holiday charity Christmas Stocking Fund to avoid having her power shut off.

Thanks to the generosity of caring local residents each Yule season, the CSF helps to keep power and heat on for a large number of less fortunate residents of Hereford and Deaf Smith County.

Utility assistance is just one of the forms of help stemming from the stocking fund. Help can also come in the form of groceries or vouchers for clothing, medicine, medical help

and personal health items.

CSF is administered by an anonymous committee of volunteers who screen applications and make decisions on who receives help. CSF is not affiliated with any other organization or entity and is funded solely by the donations of caring individuals and businesses.

Donations to the CSF may be made in person at the offices of The Hereford Brand or mailed to CSF in care of Box 673, Hereford. The Brand serves as the official agent for CSF, collecting donations and periodically publishing listings of donors.

Residents are encouraged to make their CSF contributions as early as possible, since the CSF group is working against a Dec. 20 deliver date. Assistance is limited to the sum of donations received from local residents.

HRMC meet set Thursday

Hereford Regional Medical Center has called a Town Hall meeting for Thursday, 7 to 8:30 p.m., at Hereford Community Center. The meeting is part of a process to secure state funding for health care.

"We are required to conduct a 'Community Needs Assessment' survey in order to be designated as a Medicaid Disproportionate Share Hospital," explained Jim Robinson, administrator at HRMC.

Robinson explained that the "disproportionate share" designation simply means that the local hospital treats more Medicaid patients than the average hospital in the state.

"It is an attempt by the state to distribute funds more equitably," Robinson said. The hospital completes the survey each year to help determine health care needs.

The hospital will present the finding of a community survey and ask for public input during the meeting.

Stamp price jump appears inevitable

WASHINGTON (AP) - It's not a question of if or when: Stamp prices are going up in January. Only the amount remains to be decided.

The independent Postal Rate Commission is about to rule on the U.S. Postal Service request for a three-cent increase, bringing the price of a first-class stamp to 32 cents.

That would mean an extra 60 to 75 cents per month for the typical household.

The boost would be part of a proposed 10.3 percent increase in mailing costs to be applied to all types of mail.

The rate commission's decision could take effect as soon as Jan. 1. The date will be set by the post office's governing board either at its Dec. 6 meeting in Tampa, Fla., or a special session a week later in Washington.

The price of a stamp has been 29 cents for four years - the longest period without an increase since the post office became a semi-independ-

ent agency in the early 1970s.

But the agency went some \$1.3 billion in the red in the last fiscal year and needs the increase to help balance its books. Indeed, some critics contend that the planned increase is too small, and the post office will require another price rise within a year or two.

The increase proposed by the Postal Service was supported by many large mailing organizations, which suggested the amount nearly a year ago, promising to go along if it were applied evenly to all classes of mail. Much of the jockeying during rate considerations involves efforts to shift costs from one class to another.

The rate commission's consumer advocate argued for a 31-cent first-class rate, urging a greater increase on third-class advertising mail to make up the difference. That idea drew opposition from business and particularly charities, since nonprofit groups are large users of advertising mail.

SARAJEVO, Bosnia-Herzegovina - U.N. Secretary-General Boutros Boutros-Ghali arrives today to discuss a possible cease-fire and an end to Serb harassment of the 24,000 peacekeepers in Bosnia. Fighting continues in northwest Bosnia as international mediators press for a negotiated end to the war.

WASHINGTON - Tens of thousands of U.S. troops would be needed to rescue U.N. peacekeepers from Bosnia under hostile conditions, but Pentagon officials say they hope such a mission won't be necessary.

WASHINGTON - With House approval of a sweeping 124-nation trade accord behind it, the Clinton administration is turning its attention to shoring up support for the pact in the Senate.

WASHINGTON - Halfway through her husband's bumpy first term, Hillary Rodham Clinton has set modest goals: Make small improvements in health care, keep her private life private and raise a healthy, happy alien baby. Number of uninsured Texans may require \$2.2 billion more

AUSTIN (AP) - A growing number of uninsured and needy Texans will require an additional \$2.2 billion over the next two-year budget period to fund the state's Medicaid program, according to health officials.

The state's Medicaid director said Tuesday that there is no room to make cuts in the program without affecting health services to the elderly, disabled or poor.

"The basic problem in Texas is that we have a disproportionate number of low-income, uninsured people who qualify for Medicaid aid," said state Medicaid Director DeAnn Friedholm.

"This demand is coupled with medical inflation and higher reimbursement for institutions, such as nursing homes and hospitals."

Medicaid provides health care to poor and low-income persons, many of whom are elderly and children of welfare recipients.

State leaders say they will try to meet the \$2.2 billion request in the budget that will pay for state programs in 1996 and 1997. That budget will be written during the 1995 Legislature, which begins in January.

"We are going to have to meet the request. It's going to be a tough, tough budget year," said Cindy Rugeley, a spokeswoman for Lt. Gov. Bob Bullock, who presides over the Texas Senate. "Besides Medicaid, we have got the requirement of funding schools, a financial commitment of opening up the new prisons and the funding of our universities and colleges."

Legislative health committee members from both the Texas House

and Senate listened to state officials outline cost-saving proposals that include cutting Medicaid provider payments, cutting services, restricting eligibility or getting a federal Medicaid waiver.

The waiver would allow the state to completely restructure its Medicaid services under a federal exemption.

The estimated savings from cutting services would be \$237 million, while a reduction in provider payments would total \$482 million, according to Ms. Friedholm.

But Ms. Friedholm and lawmakers agreed that the cuts were simply a "Band-Aid" approach to save money in the short term and would ultimately end up costing more in the long term. "The cuts are not very palatable," Ms. Friedholm said.

Ms. Friedholm said long term savings would best be obtained through a waiver that would allow the state to restructure its Medicaid program.

If a waiver was granted, the restructuring would include the formation of a state-county partnership. Local hospital districts and county indigent health care programs would be consolidated into Medicaid so that local funds would draw federal matching dollars, according to Ms. Friedholm.

Ms. Friedholm said the plan would allow local officials to gain greater control over how to set up Medicaid managed care that fits their communities while also improving competition and cost controls.

State Sen. Judith Zaffirini, D-Laredo, who chairs the Senate Committee on Health and Human Services, said she supported the plan.

"The partnership would reduce local costs through increased federal funding and help meet the state's \$2.2 billion general revenue needs for

growth and inflation without increased taxation," Ms. Zaffirini said.

"We do not want to make cuts at the state level that would simply shift costs to the local level," she added. "A Medicaid waiver could allow us to continue to provide services and to serve more persons more economically."

According to state Medicaid records, the process of preparing and receiving federal approval for a waiver takes 10 months. The Legislature would need to direct the Medicaid office to pursue the waiver.

Slain woman's sister lashes out at lawyer

LOS ANGELES (AP) - For the second time in a week, Nicole Brown Simpson's sister called O.J. Simpson a killer and said her family was unable to "turn the other cheek any longer."

Denise Brown issued an anguished statement Tuesday imploring the public to "remember that my sister was a wonderful woman and a loving mother who has left behind two of the sweetest children in the world."

She also attacked Simpson's attorney, Robert Shapiro, who told reporters Tuesday that he forgives the victims' relatives for saying they believe Simpson is guilty. The relatives haven't heard Simpson's side of the story, Shapiro said.

Brown told Geraldo Rivera on CNBC that Shapiro's remarks were insensitive and made her "fighting mad."

"Mr. Simpson's defense team can posture and pose all they want to," her statement said. "That's their right, and maybe even their job. But they can't expect the family of Nicole Brown to turn the other cheek any longer."

Simpson is charged with murdering Nicole Brown Simpson and her friend Ronald Goldman. They were stabbed and slashed to death June 12 outside Ms. Simpson's condominium.

Jury selection was scheduled to resume today. Opening statements aren't expected until mid-January.

Relatives of Goldman and Ms. Simpson, at first restrained in their comments about the case, have recently become more vocal.

A week ago, Brown said Simpson is guilty. Goldman's father, Fred, expressed a similar opinion Monday during an interview on ABC. Late Tuesday, Goldman also blasted Shapiro. "Mr. Shapiro, I don't need your forgiveness," he told KABC-TV. "Don't you dare be patronizing or condescending to any of us."

Simpson, who called himself "a battered husband" in the note he left after fleeing arrest, appeared enthused when two alternate jury prospects

"I've never had a problem at Dawn," he declared. "That's the reason I still use it."

Education financing may force tax issues

AUSTIN (AP) - Taxes won't be an issue in the 1995 legislative session unless the Texas Supreme Court overturns the school finance law, according to a special assistant to Lt. Gov. Bob Bullock.

"If the Supreme Court substantially sets aside our current school finance system, that will become the highest priority of the Legislature to find an alternative," Brad Reynolds told a tax policy conference Tuesday.

"Our entire tax structure would be in debate if we have to craft a new school finance system," he said.

Since 1989, the state Supreme Court has declared Texas school funding laws unconstitutional three times.

A fourth challenge is pending before the court.

The Supreme Court has ordered lawmakers to even out funding available to school districts of differing property wealth.

While lawmakers have made changes, school funding continues to rely mainly on a combination of local property tax money and state aid.

If the new law is overturned, Reynolds said proposals such as a value-added tax would be considered to replace certain property taxes.

A value-added tax is imposed on an item at different stages of production.

But if the court upholds the school finance law, Reynolds said, lawmakers will make only minor changes in the state's tax laws.

That is because Bullock, presiding officer of the state Senate, and House Speaker Pete Laney, D-Hale Center vowed more than a year ago that there would be no tax increase, he said.

"The status quo is going to prevail," Reynolds said.

That commitment, he said, also means there are no plans to restructure the tax system.

Even a revenue neutral change could increase the tax burden on some taxpayers and be construed as a tax increase, he said.

The defense has occasionally complained about conditions at the jail.

- An appellate court agreed with a New York trial judge that Simpson's DNA expert must be in court in New York on Thursday in another case. The ruling raised questions of whether attorney Peter Neufeld could attend a critical DNA admissibility hearing in the Simpson case, set for Dec. 12.

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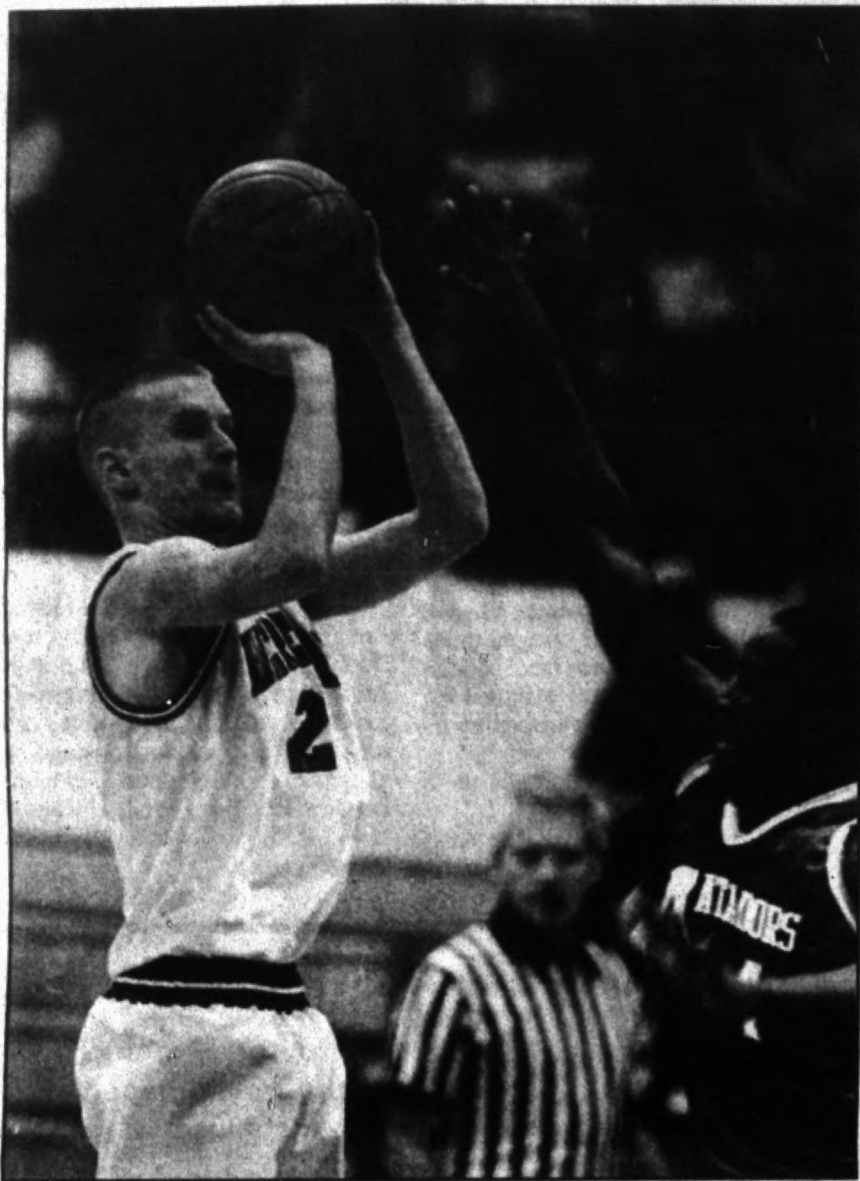

Aikman could play; Cowboys hope he stays on sidelines

IRVING, Texas (AP)—Troy Aikman, who was saying for awhile that he might play against the Philadelphia Eagles on Sunday, now says he wants to wait one more week to be sure his sprained left knee is fully healed before he gives it a game test.

Aikman will be in uniform Sunday, but the Dallas Cowboys hope their quarterback problems don't get so bad he has to play.

Aikman, who suffered a knee ligament sprain 10 days ago, will be the Cowboys' designated third quarterback.

Either Jason Garrett, who rallied Dallas from a 14-point deficit to a 42-31 victory over Green Bay on Thanksgiving Day, or sore-thumbed Rodney Peete will start against the Eagles.

"We'll know more later in the week, but both Jason and Rodney will be in the mix," Dallas coach Barry Switzer said Tuesday. "Troy will suit up and probably be the third quarterback. I think Rodney should be healthy, and both he and Jason will be taking a lot of snaps this week. I sure like what Jason did against Green Bay."

Aikman said he hasn't ruled out playing against Philadelphia.

"I think it would be extremely optimistic to say that I'm going to be ready to play in the game," Aikman said. "I'll certainly be ready the following week (Dec. 10 against Cleveland). My knee feels better. I'm able to run around and do things I haven't been able to do although I'm not totally pain-free."

Switzer said he was still concerned about Peete's thumb, which was injured on Nov. 20 against Washington, the same game in which Aikman was hurt. Peete suited up but did not play against the Packers as Garrett threw two touchdown passes.

"Rodney is still throwing the ball with four fingers and not using his thumb in the throwing motion," Switzer said.

Garrett said he understands if Switzer moves him aside for Rodney. "Rodney has more experience than I do," Garrett said. "I wouldn't have any problems with that. I understand my role on this team."

Switzer said he wants the Cowboys to go ahead and clinch the NFC East division title against the Eagles so they don't have to worry about it anymore.

"I don't think we'll lose our edge if we do clinch because of our stumble against San Francisco," Switzer said. "We've got to take care of business week to week to stay on track for the homefield advantage."

Dallas has a 20-6 record in games played after Thanksgiving. Last year the Cowboys defeated Philadelphia 23-17 at Texas Stadium after Thanksgiving.

The Cowboys beat the Eagles 24-13 in the sixth game of the season at Texas Stadium.

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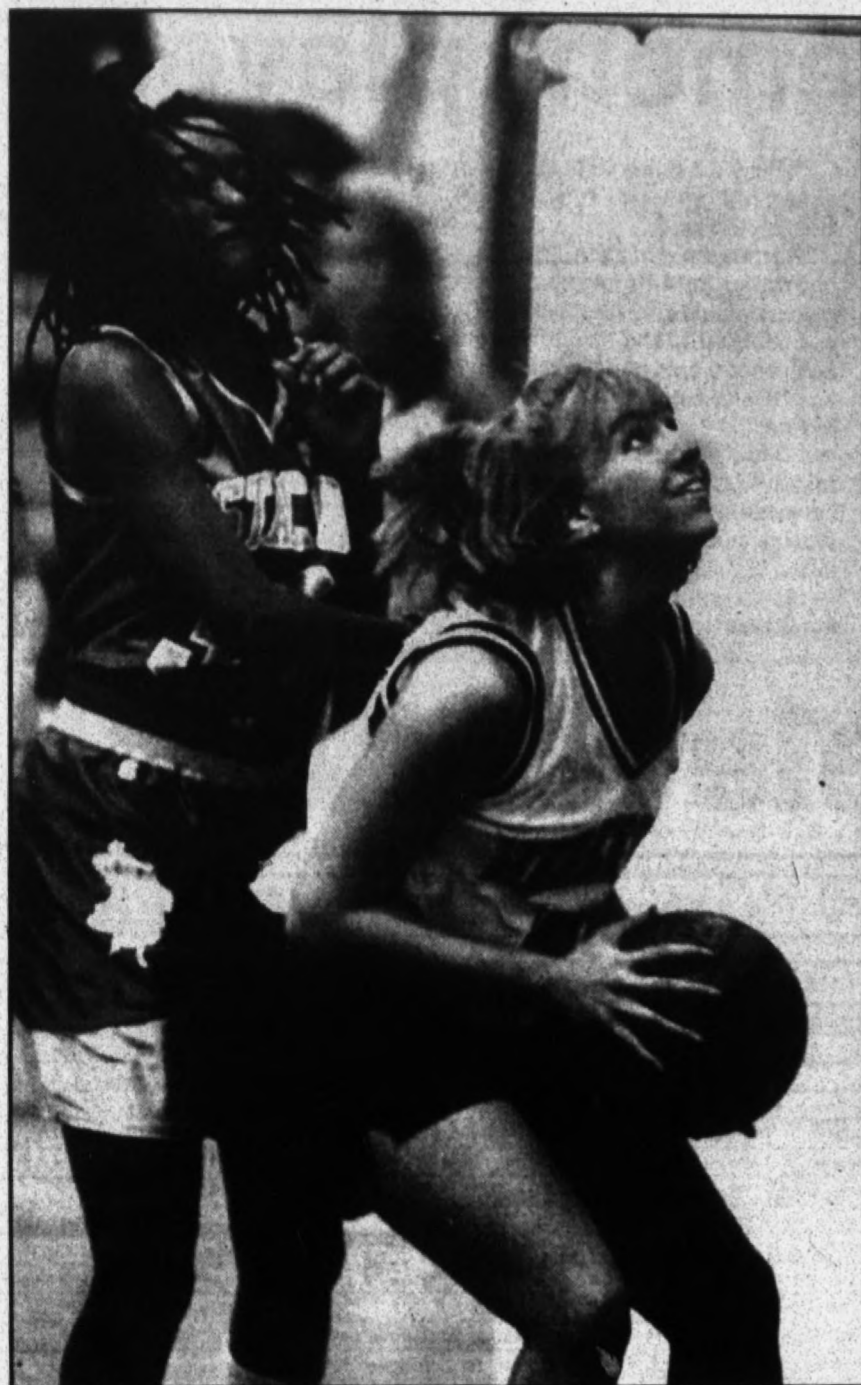

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Minnesota limps past Sacramento St.

The Minnesota Gophers learned the downside of Shootout fallout.

"People are going to come out to get us, and if we're not prepared we're going to get beat," Jayson Walton said Tuesday night after Minnesota struggled against Sacramento State, the worst team in Division I-A basketball last season, before winning 102-84.

Minnesota has had its share of success in recent years, winning the NIT in 1993 and making it to the second round of the NCAA tournament last March.

This season, the Gophers looked good in winning the Great Alaska Shootout. So good, in fact, that they went from unranked to No. 15 this week in the Associated Press Top 25.

That's the upside of Shootout fallout.

The downside was being unable to break free against a team that has lost 50 in a row on the road since moving to Division I in 1991-92 and finished 1-26 last season.

"I think this is a wakeup call for us," said Walton, who had 17 points and a game-high nine rebounds.

"We're a tired ballclub right now," Voshon Lenard said. "The effort was there, but sometimes the shots don't fall."

In other games, No. 2 North Carolina beat Pittsburgh 90-67, No. 16 Connecticut beat Duke 90-86, No. 8 Florida beat Boston College 91-65, No. 11 Maryland beat Loyola (Md.) 92-62, No. 21 Wake Forest beat Davidson 74-62 and No. 22 Syracuse beat Colgate 88-53.

Sacramento State (0-2) opened quickly, getting eight points from Abie Ramirez to open a 10-3 lead 2:28 into the game. Walton hit a baseline jumper 16 seconds later to start a 24-3 run, which included two 3-pointers and 10 points from Lenard, the senior who returned to school after being drafted last summer by the Milwaukee Bucks.

Sacramento State cut the deficit to 47-39 at halftime, but never got closer than seven in the second half even though it never let Minnesota (4-0) pull away. The final margin was the largest of the game.

"Sometimes it's hard to get up for teams that you don't know much about," Minnesota center John Thomas said. "I think we were a little tired after last weekend, and we weren't mentally prepared."

Lenard had 28 points in 23 minutes on 8-for-12 shooting, but the rest of the team shot just 32 percent. Sacramento State got 23 points from 6-foot-7, 280-pound freshman Adrian Hillman.

No. 2 North Carolina 90, Pitt 67
At Chapel Hill, N.C., Rasheed Wallace scored a career-high 30 points on 14-for-19 shooting, including eight dunks, with 11 rebounds and three blocked shots. Jerry Stackhouse had 17 points and five steals and Donald Williams had 13 points.

Reserve Garrick Thomas hit five 3-pointers in the second half and led the Panthers with 17 points.

No. 16 Connecticut 90, No. 6 Duke 86

At Auburn Hills, Mich., experience worked in Connecticut's favor.

The Huskies (2-0) used their trapping defense to frazzle a young Duke team early and had a 13-point lead late in the first half. It was 79-70 before Duke closed to 88-86 with five seconds to play. Kevin Ollie made two free throws with 2.2 seconds left for the final margin.

Sophomore Ray Allen scored 26 points while seniors Ollie and Donny Marshall had 24 and 17, respectively.

Cherokee Parks, who got his fifth personal foul on a technical with four minutes left, finished with 24 points for Duke.

Owners threaten to use replacement players

LEESBURG, Va. (AP)—A salary cap and replacement players look more likely than a settlement to the baseball strike.

Players failed to make a counterproposal Tuesday, and teams threatened to start next season with replacement players.

"We want to make a commitment to the fans that we're going to play the 1995 season with some caliber of professional baseball player, and we believe it will be entertaining and we believe that's what the fans want," management negotiator John Harrington said after the union failed to make a new proposal.

"Fans want baseball with the best quality player that we can put out there. Our preference is to play with major league players out there. If they're unwilling to play, then we'll go with someone else who is willing

to play."

Owners, who already have vowed to impose their salary cap on Monday if there isn't a deal, expected the union to respond to the luxury tax plan teams offered Nov. 17.

The sides met for about four hours and were to resume talks today. Union head Donald Fehr, who met with Colorado Rockies chairman Jerry McMorris past midnight, said Harrington conveyed the threat to use replacements directly to the union.

"Some comments," Fehr said, "do not make the process more simple. They have the opposite effect. This is one."

Eugene Orza, the union's No. 2 official, called management's plan to use replacements "internally inconsistent."

"Only major league baseball

players can play major league baseball," he said. "And absent an agreement by opening day 1995, major league players will be on strike."

Owners want a deal by Dec. 7, the last day for teams to offer salary arbitration to their former players who became free agents. Management, intent on eliminating arbitration, say the new system will take effect next Tuesday.

Eighty-two players face the Dec. 7 deadline. Another, infielder Felix Fermin, agreed Tuesday to a \$1.7 million, 2-year contract with the Seattle Mariners.

Harrington and Fehr said the sides briefly discussed the possibility of moving back the deadline, but it was too early to tell if that would happen. Free agent outfielder Brett Butler

said there was sentiment not to make a counteroffer on the tax plan until after the union's executive board meets in Atlanta next week, but owners said that would be too late.

"Once you go past the point of implementation, it's difficult to put the yolk back into the egg," Harrington said before the meeting.

"I'm a little discouraged we didn't get a counterproposal," he said after the talks recessed. "We came here with a high degree of expectation in that regard."

Management's bargaining team brought along five of the teams' chief financial officers.

"We were ready to bargain every figure up and down the chart," Harrington said.

Harrington said even if the players end the strike without an agreement, owners would consider locking them out. An end to the strike without a deal would leave the possibility of another season without a World Series.

"That might not be fair to the fans," Harrington said, adding that he wouldn't want to play "with the season in jeopardy on a day-to-day basis."

A decision to impose the cap would lead to litigation. Anticipating

a new system, teams scheduled a meeting of general managers on Monday in Chicago and moved up the annual draft of minor leaguers by a day to Sunday night.

Management's expansion committee will meet Sunday night in Chicago to interview backers of a potential team in Orlando, Fla. Groups from Phoenix, St. Petersburg, Fla., and northern Virginia made presentations earlier this month.

"It's difficult to move the expansion train onto the main line with the labor train blocking it's way," said Harrington, who also chairs the expansion committee.

Tour issues ultimatum: us or them, but not both PGA and World Tour

TAMPA, Fla. (AP)—The lines are clearly drawn between the established PGA Tour and the new World Tour. It will be one or the other. Not both.

Now it's up to golf's leading players to decide on which tour they will compete.

"If a new tour becomes a reality in 1995 or thereafter, our members will have to decide whether they want to continue to play on the PGA Tour or play on a new tour," PGA Tour commissioner Tim Finchem said Tuesday.

The hard-line stance toward the ambitious venture spearheaded by Greg Norman was unanimously approved in a 2-day meeting of the tour's policy board, Finchem said.

And, he said, "it is worth noting that a substantial majority of PGA Tour members, as well as a number of prominent non-tour players, have expressed their intention to continue

to support our sponsors and play on the PGA Tour."

In fact, Finchem said, Norman is the only tour member he is aware of who has fully committed to the World Tour.

The Australian star has been a spokesman and prime mover in the venture that was announced less than two weeks ago. Norman said he was surprised by the PGA Tour's moves, but hopes there can be a reconciliation.

"I've always been a believer that you could have both tours," he said at a news conference in Melbourne, Australia. "You can't go along and undermine the PGA Tour. From my point of view I've always said that it has got to be interfaced with the PGA Tour."

Mark Calcavecchia, also in Australia, said he doubted the World Tour would get off the ground in

1995 "despite what Greg is saying and what other people are saying." "We've got to work together," he said. "We don't want to keep fighting with each other."

Plans call for each tournament to carry a \$3 million purse with a 40-man field, including the top 30 members of the Sony World Rankings. Precise dates and locations of the tournaments have not been announced.

Finchem noted the World Tour "showed some flexibility," in a meeting last week with PGA Tour staff members, but "insisted that, due to their arrangements with Fox Network, most of their events would have to be held during (the PGA Tour's) official money season."

That would put it in conflict with the regular tour schedule, and players will have to choose the circuit in which they want to compete.

PLASTIC BREAD WRAPPER

Q. Can you please tell me how to remove melted bread wrapper from a stainless-steel toaster? Both my husband and I read your column every day and enjoy your hints. — Betty Head, Texarkana, Texas

A. You can use either denatured alcohol or fingernail-polish remover.

First unplug the toaster and make sure it's cool. Be sure to work in a well-ventilated area and keep the alcohol or fingernail-polish remover away from any heat source since they are flammable.

Next, test the cleaner you chose on a hidden area to make sure it is not going to harm the finish. Use a cotton ball or sturdy paper towel to apply it and rub until all the plastic is gone. It may take a little elbow grease, but this should do the trick. — Heloise

Dear Heloise: My son gave me a terry cloth headband which I found to be very effective when giving myself a home permanent.

To prevent the waving solution and neutralizer from dripping, the directions advise using petroleum jelly and cotton around the forehead and neck. I simply place the headband over the same area and because of the thickness of the terry cloth, the drippings are more effectively absorbed. It works like a charm. — Wanda Roth, Ft. Lauderdale, Fla.

IRONING-BOARD HELPER

Dear Heloise: I have found that my ironing board makes an excellent bedside table when I am bedridden during periods of illness. It is also good for those wonderful lazy Sunday mornings. Mine has an attachment for holding the iron, which I use to hold a small snack tray and sometimes my telephone.

I place a cutting board on the ironing-board to stabilize my drinks. Depending on your cover, you may want to throw a towel over it for protection from stains.

To Your Good Health

DEAR DR. DONOHUE: How can I tell if I am running aerobically or sprinting, which is not aerobic? I mean I never know if I'm running too fast to qualify for aerobic benefits. — T.P.

ANSWER: You have hit on a point that many do not bother to consider. That is, when is your activity aerobic and when is it not?

Basically, aerobic exercise is the kind you do to improve your heart health. Generally, it is the kind of activity you should carry on for 15, 20 or more minutes at a stretch. It is not the kind where you sprint as fast as possible for a limited time, as in baserunning in baseball.

There is a simple rule to tell if you are breaking out of the aerobic running—jogging—zone: Simply count your breaths while running. If you can comfortably take in one breath for every two steps and breathe out once for the next two steps, you're safely in the aerobic benefit zone. You are not sprinting.

DEAR DR. DONOHUE: Do you get more or less calcium in whole milk as opposed to skim milk? I want to watch my fats, but don't want to skimp on calcium. — N.L.

ANSWER: Actually, you get a bit more calcium in skim milk than in whole milk. Whole milk contains

290 milligrams calcium per cup; skim milk 300 milligrams. Removing the fat from the milk permits a bit of extra volume for nonfat components, including minerals.

DEAR DR. DONOHUE: I am having trouble with weights. Someone told me how you should lift and lower to a certain rhythm. I try to lift a weight in a two-count and lower it to a four-count.

The problem is I get so distracted with the counting that I pay less attention to the weight itself. I wonder if the precise number system is vital. — G.S.

ANSWER: It is not essential. Studies at West Point have demonstrated that it doesn't make much difference.

Actually, if you simply adopt a tempo of lifting and lowering that is comfortable for you, you will be fine. Adopting your own tempo might even produce a more natural rhythm.

DEAR DR. DONOHUE: I've been running without injury until now. I injured my left knee and ran through the pain too long. Then I foolishly went into pain denial and ran when I should have been resting. My problem is the iliotibial band. I took three months off, but it still hurts, when I run. I need help. — H.

ANSWER: The iliotibial band is a sheet of dense fibrous tissue forming a girdle for the muscles on the outside of the upper leg. It runs from hip to knee. When inflamed, the pain can occur around the hip or at the knee.

I don't have to tell you that you should have rested immediately until

all inflammation subsided. That need is still there apparently.

You might need anti-inflammation medicines and some icing. A heel wedge can remove some stress from the injury.

Rest is still the prime priority. And if the pain persists, be examined.

Overuse is the usual setting for iliotibial band injury. When you resume running, avoid downhill running, which puts stress on the band.

For prevention of future problems, look up a good iliotibial-band stretch exercise.

DEAR DR. DONOHUE: My question is about skin ulcers, specifically one my dad has had on his left leg for more than a year now. No matter how well we clean it up, cover it up and put salves on it, it just seems unable to heal — and it's getting ugly. He's 76. What is the prescribed way to heal an ulcer of this kind? He bumped the area about seven months

ago and it hasn't yet healed over. — Mrs. R.S.

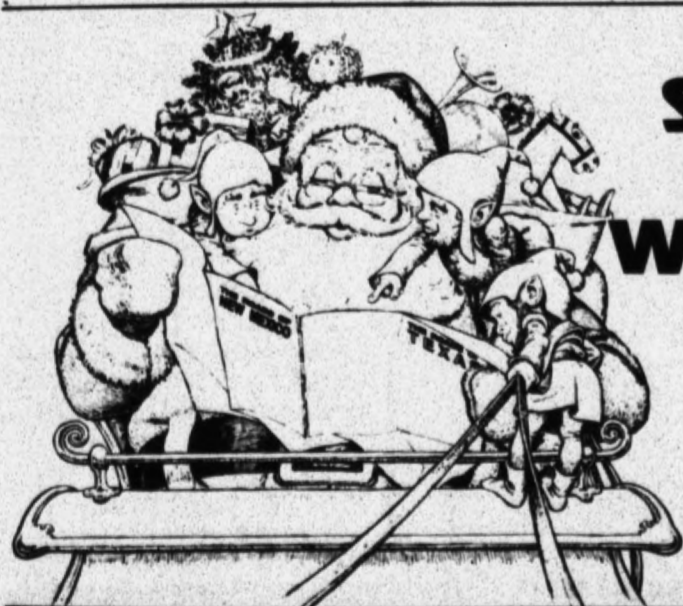
ANSWER: Healing a leg ulcer can be difficult, especially in an older person and particularly in one who is inactive.

Start with basics, by which I mean a thorough cleanup of the ulcer site.

Gently remove the dead tissue, which can harbor bacteria. Next, use wet dressings of Burrow's solution or of potassium permanganate.

Hexachlorophene soap is effective in such cleanup work. To really do the job right, ask a doctor to prescribe an antibiotic ointment.

In the meantime, look for ulcer causative factors that might have been defying past healing efforts. You might find faulty veins in the area. That could cause a continuous oozing of fluid into surrounding tissue, creating a swelling. Such swelling often compresses smaller adjacent blood vessels.



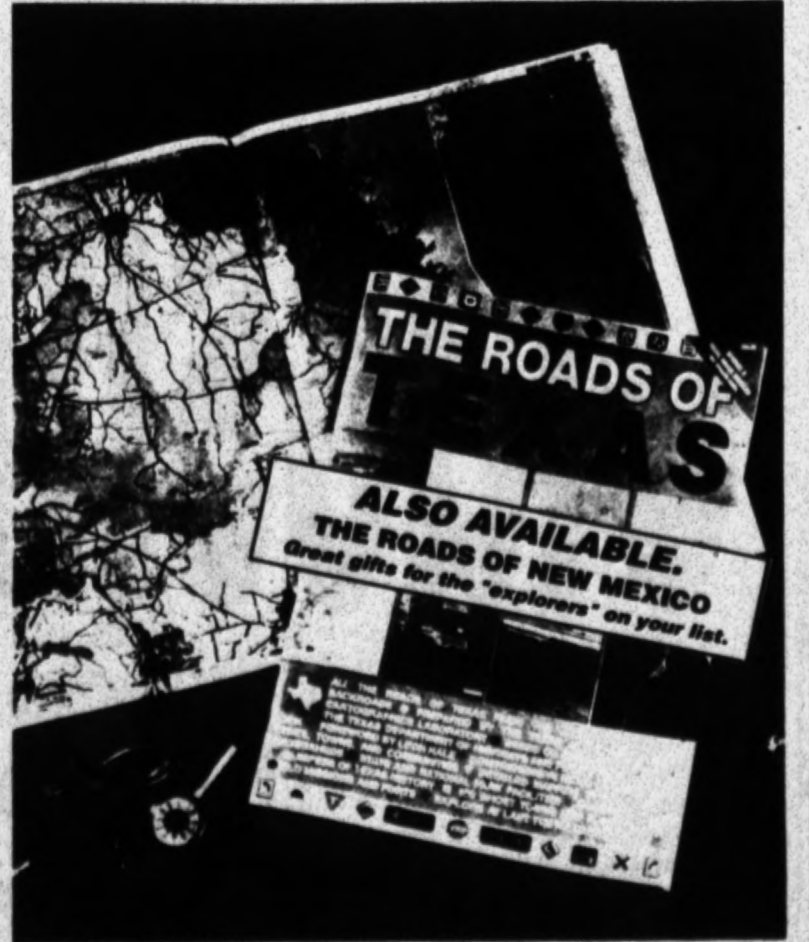

TAES reports 'one of best cotton crops'

Producers say yields excellent despite weather conditions

COLLEGE STATION, Texas (AP) — Only 10 percent of the 1994 cotton crop, one of the best in years, remains to be harvested, the Texas Agricultural Extension Service says.

"With harvest almost finished, producers have found that this year's cotton crop bounced back from past weather conditions with excellent yields," Extension agronomist Kater Hake of Lubbock said Tuesday.

"Also, the quality of the cotton is even better than last year's."

The bumper crop and rising market prices — an unusual combination — are bringing smiles to Texas cotton producers, Hake said.

"This isn't something cotton farmers expected, because the market usually falls as yields go up," Hake said. "However, this year was an exception and just reflects the strong demand for cotton both within and outside the United States."

Hake noted that the number of contaminated "barky" bales is down 11 percent and that the strength of the fibers is better than expected.

He said yields estimated for Texas stayed the same as last year — about 5.5 million bales. Nationally, the cotton harvest is estimated at 19.5 million bales, up one million bales from last year.

Dr. Carl Anderson, Extension economist at Texas A&M, said domestic and export demand has played a key role in the rising market.

"It may in part be uncertainty of general economic conditions and the possibility of larger-than-expected export sales," Anderson said. "Also, large speculators have been on the buying side for several weeks."

He added that the uncertainties concerning the size of cotton harvests in China and Pakistan have promoted U.S. export sales of cotton, which in turn has improved the market.

Hake said South Plains producers still waiting to harvest the rest of their crop should expect to see fewer bales and lower quality. Producers don't usually have to wait this long to harvest because the first killing freeze usually occurs before November, he explained.

Producers who used harvest-aid chemicals on their cotton didn't get hurt by the late freeze," he said. "Producers who didn't use the chemicals may reconsider their harvesting options next year."

Robert Roark, Extension agent in Andrews County, just north of Odessa, said cotton producers there are also still waiting for the first killing freeze to help strip leaves off their plants.

"Most of the producers in the area don't spend money on harvest-aid chemicals, so they must depend on the weather," Roark said. "But this year the weather is not proving to be something they can depend on."

"The bolls are just hanging on the plants ready to be harvested, only producers can't get to them through the leaves," he said.

Roark said usually the first freeze is around the first of November, and that producers expect the delay to affect the cotton quality and grade for the area. He added that temperatures have been dropping so producers hope to harvest soon.

Meanwhile in Southwest Texas, pecan and peanut harvests are completed and producers now are getting ready for spring planting.

Jose Pena, Extension economist in Uvalde, said most of the farmland is ready for planting, but a hard freeze could slow producers down.

"A freeze could slow fall vegetable growth as well as forage production," Pena said. "These mild conditions have really helped producers in our area, and if we had a choice they would continue."

Jon Zeitler, meteorologist at the National Weather Service Agricultural Service Center in College Station, said a high pressure system will bring cool conditions to Texas through Thursday.

"Other than some high clouds, skies will be fair, with plenty of sunshine during the latter half of the week," Zeitler said. "Temperatures will warm up beginning Friday, pushing high temperatures into the 70s and low 80s across most of the state this weekend."

He added that high temperatures will range from the upper 40s in the Panhandle to the lower 70s along the Gulf Coast. No rainfall is expected for the state until Sunday.

The following specific livestock, crop and weather conditions were reported by district Extension directors:

PANHANDLE: Soil moisture short. Pastures, ranges need rain. Harvesting cotton, carrots. Sorghum, sugar beet harvests completed. Supplemental feeding continues for livestock.

SOUTH PLAINS: Soil moisture short. Pastures, ranges need moisture. Harvesting cotton. Sorghum harvest near completion. Planting wheat. Dry weather slowing small grain growth.

ROLLING PLAINS: Soil moisture short to adequate. Pastures, ranges in fair to good condition. Cotton harvest delayed, waiting for killing freeze. Wheat progressing. Livestock in good condition; supplemental feeding continues.

NORTH TEXAS: Soil moisture surplus to adequate. Pastures, ranges improving with rain. Harvesting cotton, soybeans, peanuts, pecans. Vegetable harvests completed. Planting wheat, oats.

EAST TEXAS: Soil moisture adequate. Winter pastures good growth; some hay feeding. Good harvests of winter greens, sweet potatoes, other cole crops. Final harvest continues in pecans; poor yields. Cattle good; market steady.

FAR WEST TEXAS: Soil moisture very short to adequate. Pastures, ranges in fair to good condition. Harvesting pecans, cotton; dryland producers

waiting for first freeze. Cutting, baling hay. Livestock good; supplemental feeding continues.

WEST CENTRAL TEXAS: Soil moisture short to surplus. Pastures, ranges improving with moisture. Wheat, winter pastures progressing. Some dryland peanuts will not be harvested. Livestock in fair to good condition.

CENTRAL TEXAS: Soil moisture surplus. Pastures, ranges improving with rain. Wet fields stopping field activity. Peanut yields good to excellent. Pests damaging wheat fields. Livestock in good condition.



Senate should take close look at GATT

On Nov. 30 the 103rd Congress will reconvene in an end-of-the-year session to consider one very significant legislative matter: Whether to approve a new global trade agreement.

The proposed trade pact has a long name — the Uruguay Round of the General Agreement on Tariffs and Trade, usually abbreviated to GATT. It has an even longer history. The United States initiated this round of negotiations aimed at lowering global trade barriers in the early 1980s. Three administrations — Reagan, Bush and Clinton — negotiated its provisions. It was written to U.S. specifications, and strengthens our ability to challenge unfair barriers to U.S. exports.

I am a committed advocate of free trade. I have no doubt the lowering of tariffs would benefit American businesses and American consumers. Because American workers are the most productive in the world, they would enjoy a competitive advantage in the global marketplace. Lowering tariffs would lower prices, saving American families on the average \$1,700 a year.

Texas exports are valued at close to \$36 billion a year, double the amount exported in 1987. And 98 percent of the more than 7,000 companies exporting from Texas have fewer than 500 employees. Texas is the nation's third leading exporting state. Clearly, a trade pact which expands world markets would be to Texas' benefit.

I do, however, have some reservations regarding the GATT. My concerns focus primarily on the way this measure is to be financed.

Participation in the GATT will mean the United States must cut its tariffs — and therefore lower its revenues. The Clinton administration has devised a five-year financing plan to make up the difference. Unfortunately, this involves budget gimmicks and penalizes some Americans. I would have preferred instead the identification of spending cuts to compensate for lost revenues.

The administration has come up with a Rube Goldberg device which it calls a "Pay-Go Surplus" to make up the difference. Supposedly, because tax increases enacted since 1990 exceed tax cuts, there is a \$2.5 billion "surplus" left over to pay the GATT's bills without increasing the deficit. Trouble is, this "surplus" is nonexistent. Those "excess" tax increases have already been counted towards cutting the deficit — or used for new spending.

Another unwise funding provision would do away with the 4 percent floor on the interest paid on U.S. savings bonds. But the people who buy these bonds are the most financially vulnerable in our country — working-class families saving for college or retirement. For decades U.S. savings bonds have been a low-risk way for small investors to accumulate savings while investing in their own and America's future. Those who buy savings bonds shouldn't be called upon to help finance the GATT.

Nor should the World Trade Organization, which will administer the GATT, have the power to make rulings which override U.S. law. I have asked the U.S. Trade Representative to clarify this issue.

Several other enabling measures related to GATT are equally flawed. All told, they would increase the U.S. tax burden by more than \$9 billion. I sincerely hope these concerns can be addressed in ways that are fiscally sound and equitable.

PHOENIX (AP) — After her husband left their stranded van to get gas, 77-year-old Annabelle Goodwin tucked a few blankets around her and listened to cars whistling by on an interstate about a mile away.

More than two weeks later, she was still there — having lived off a day's worth of food, prayers and very little else. But her husband of more than 50 years, who suffers from the early stages of Alzheimer's disease, was missing.

Speaking in a faint voice Tuesday from her hospital bed, Mrs. Goodwin said she stayed alive by keeping busy. "Oh, you have to sing and you have to pray, and sometimes you just don't know what to do but hope," she said.

A man found the snow-covered van on a dirt road Monday in a remote stretch of mile-high northern Arizona range. Mrs. Goodwin had just three blankets; she had eaten the cookies, ham, bologna and a loaf of bread the couple had bought to snack on while driving.

Vincent Goodwin, 76, was still missing Tuesday. An air and ground search was to resume today. Searchers had found no trace of him.

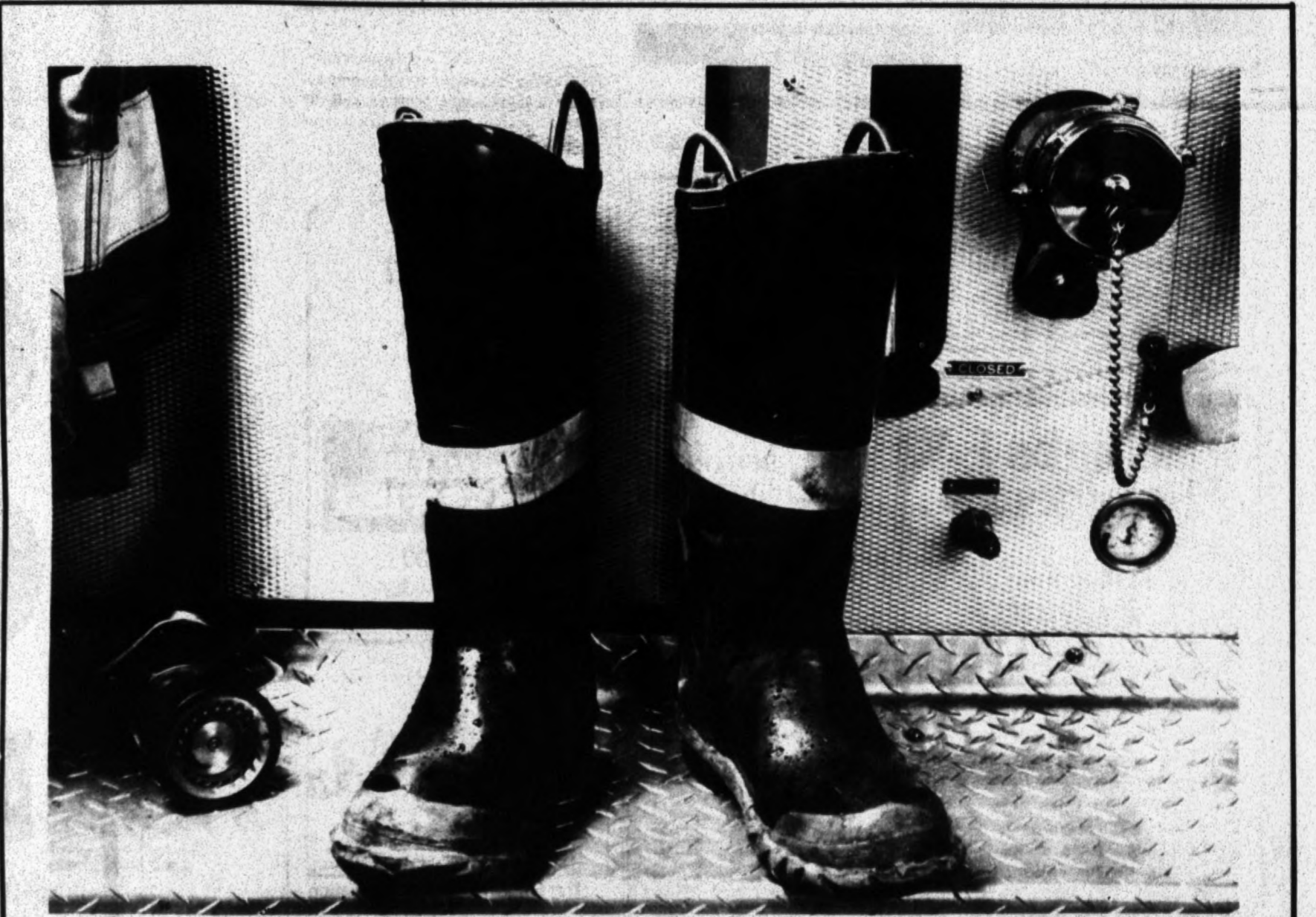
"I don't know what could have happened to him, so I just keep praying," said Mrs. Goodwin, who was treated for exposure and was in fair condition.

She knows the odds aren't good that her husband will be found safe. Nighttime temperatures have dipped to the 20s in the area.

"There's probably an inch and a half of slushy snow in the area now and it will probably freeze overnight," said Lt. Kathy McLaughlin, a sheriff's spokeswoman.

The Goodwins' daughter, Allie Foster, said her father suffers from early stages of Alzheimer's disease, a brain disorder which causes increasing memory loss and confusion.

"He gets disoriented, loses his sense of direction, so when I heard they were on I-40 I felt good. I least I knew he was going in the right direction," she told The Contra Costa Times.
