Public meetings will be held Tuesday at 1 p.m. and 7 p.m. in the Dawn Community Center to give residents of the area an opportunity to discuss with U.S. Postal Service officials a proposal to close the office.

## Postal service may close Dawn office

Six mornings each week residents of Dawn and surrounding area pick up their mail, buy stamps, mail packages and, maybe most important, see and visit with their neighbors.

If the U.S. Postal Service follows through on a notice to close the Dawn postoffice, these simple activities will cease.

As in most rural communities, the post office is a gathering place. Picking up mail is only a part of the service the post office offers.

"People see their friends, exchange information," observed a Dawn man.

Postal customers and others interested in the community will have an opportunity to tell postal officials how they feel about closing the office.

Two public meetings are scheduled at the Dawn Community Center Tuesday, at 1 p.m. and 7 p.m. Officials from Lubbock and Fort Worth will listen to pleas from citizens to keep their office open.

Housed in a small white building, about 25 feet by 12 feet, the post office provides 86 rental mailboxes, 68 of them rented.

Ellen Nall, the officer-in-charge, drives from her home in Bushland to Dawn in time to open the office at 8 a.m. Monday through Saturday. She closes window service at noon every day but Saturday when the closing is at 10:30 a.m.

If the Postal Service closes the office, free-standing boxes will be installed at the Dawn Grocery, said Nall.

Kenneth Chambers, a postal patron at Dawn, said he thinks this will work a hardship on many elderly people.

"They can go into the post office but it's hard for them to handle the outside box," he said.

Chambers said area residents have been told that the post office operates at a loss. Nall said anytime a postmaster retires, the department considers the options. Longtime postmaster Genevieve O. Miller retired last December.

Mail arrives in Dawn at 6:30 a.m. each day, on a truck that runs from Amarillo to Bovina. Outgoing mail is picked up at 5:30 p.m., with reversal

of the morning run.

Neither Nall nor Chambers has an answer to questions about how postal patrons can obtain stamps, mail packages and the like.

"I guess we'd have to go to UMBarger or Hereford," said Chambers.

Taking the post office out of a community the size of Dawn is like taking the heart out, said a resident. In the 1994-1995 edition of the **Texas Almanac**, Dawn's population is put at 94. But, that doesn't take into account the people who live close to the community and use the post office.

Chambers said he believes much of the mail generated through the post office.

## CRP benefits not that good, except in Texas

WASHINGTON (AP)--A \$20 billion federal program that pays farmers not to farm has met with mixed success in reducing soil erosion, according to a new study.

The Environmental Working Group contends the 10-year Conservation Reserve Program that took 36.4 million acres of fragile cropland out of production nationwide has been only partly successful in halting soil erosion.

Agriculture Department conservation data examined by the research group suggests the CRP has cut soil loss by 398 million tons annually—43 percent less than the 695 million tons the government estimates has been saved.

"The CRP has had some enormous benefits, but not as enormous as USDA has claimed in the erosion control department," said Ken Cook, president of the Environmental Working Group.

## Location set near Hereford Senior Center

The upcoming construction of the Hereford Seniors Community, an apartment "community" exclusively for elderly, handicapped and disabled residents in the Hereford area, was announced Friday by Winston Sullivan, owner of the Sullivan Companies of Linden.

The community will be located on Jack Griffin Avenue, immediately adjacent to the Golden Plains Nursing Home and across the street from the Hereford Senior Citizens Center. Construction is scheduled to start before the end of the year with completion in the spring of 1995.

The apartment facility will be composed of 28 one-bedroom units in one-story fourplex buildings. Each apartment will have central air and heat, electric ranges, refrigerators, carpet, and connections for washers and dryers.

The community will offer seniors an active and independent lifestyle, providing an alternative to maintaining an expensive older home, living with others or moving to a nursing home, according to Sullivan.

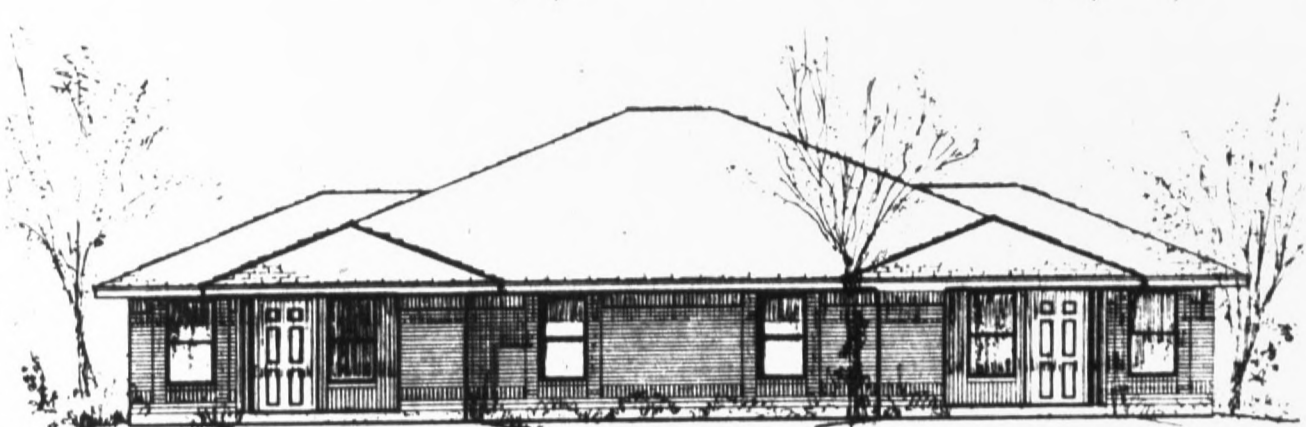
Other design features of the apartments are individual yards for gardening; landscaped exterior with all-yard care and maintenance provided by the owner, or residents can maintain their own flower beds and garden areas if they desire.

Residents must be 62 years of age or disabled or handicapped, must have good credit and character, and must be able to maintain an independent lifestyle. Residents will be accepted on a first-come, first-served basis.

Sullivan, who now resides in East Texas but is originally from the West Texas area, has built similar facilities in Linden and 10 other East Texas cities. One of the communities has been built in Lamesa and another is under construction in Brownfield.

Sullivan said the development is financed with Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) funds and will be professionally managed by MJS Management, Inc., also of Linden. An on-site manager and maintenance person will be hired locally to staff the facility. The facility will have a centrally located office for convenience of the residents.

Rents are determined by income and are affordable to seniors whose income is derived from Social Security, or fixed retirement plans. Those who are interested may contact Hereford Seniors Community at P.O. Box 847, Linden, TX. 75563.

### HRMC to hold town hall meet here Thursday

Hereford Regional Medical Center has called a Town Hall meeting for Thursday, 7 to 8:30 p.m., at Hereford Community Center. The meeting is part of a process to secure state funding for health care.

"We are required to conduct a 'Community Needs Assessment' survey in order to be designated as a Medicaid Disproportionate Share Hospital," explained Jim Robinson, administrator at HRMC.

The hospital completes the needs assessment survey each year to help determine present and future health care needs of Deaf Smith County. "This important survey will also help us to plan for future hospital services that need to be added or expanded," added Robinson.

Robinson explained that the "disproportionate share" designation simply means that the local hospital treats more Medicaid patients than the average hospital in the state.

"It is an attempt by the state to distribute funds more equitably," Robinson said. "But, we are also very interested in knowing the needs of our community, as we plan for future health care needs of the area."

# News Digest

## State

**UNDATED**--Texans crowded to their favorites malls and department stores Friday to kick off the holiday shopping season. Many stores opened as much as three hours early to get a jump on the busiest shopping day of the year. Sales on the day after Thanksgiving are seen as an predictor of Christmas buying.

**WASHINGTON**--A \$20 billion federal program that pays farmers to keep cropland fallow in hopes of reducing soil erosion has met with mixed success in Texas and nationally, an agricultural research group says in a new study.

**DALLAS**--It doesn't take much of a dip in the thermometer to send Texans scurrying for firewood and heaters. But fireplaces and space heaters also can be a safety hazard in your home. Experts warn that you should have both checked regularly.

**PHNOM PENH, Cambodia**--An angry mob rioted outside a luxury hotel, seeking compensation from a Texas evangelist who failed to perform promised faith-healing miracles. Only the arrival of 20 armed police kept the violent crowd from storming the Hotel Cambodiana where Rev. Mike Evans of Euless and his entourage had been staying.

## World/Nation

**SARAJEVO, Bosnia-Herzegovina**--Faced with defeat in the U.N.-protected area of northwestern Bosnia, the government accepts a Serb call for a nationwide cease-fire during negotiations to head off more NATO airstrikes. Serb leaders ask for time to consult in what the Bosnian prime minister describes as a delaying tactic to complete the capture of the Bihac region.

**UNDATED**--In Philadelphia, there was a mile-long line to get into a new outlet mall. In St. Louis, shoppers wore shorts on a balmy day. In Milwaukee, pogs are a hit. "You know how you can tell this is a good year? Look at the people in the mall," said a Michigan retailer. "Even if the crowd isn't big, the people are all carrying shopping bags."

**WASHINGTON**--An eclectic group of opponents promises intensified efforts to kill the sweeping 123-nation world trade agreement, contending the loss of Sen. Bob Dole is not a fatal setback. The foes say the administration is still far short of support on a key procedural vote.

**TOKYO**--An era in Japanese industry ends when Sony Corp. announces the retirement of chairman Akio Morita, who led Japan's rise into a maker of the electronic machines the world watches and listens to. Morita, 73, co-founded Sony in a bombed-out storefront, pioneering the creation of the TVs, Walkmans and CD players that built the company a \$36 billion-a-year conglomerate.

**BALTIMORE**--Several neighbors of a woman accused of killing her two young daughters in a house fire say Renee Aulton was gruff with her children, often neglected them and didn't even bother to hang curtains in the windows of her home. "We suspected her right from the beginning," neighbor Eleanor Bennett said Friday. "We thought there was no way that fire could start that fast."

## CRP STUDY

In Texas, 4.1 million acres have been set aside under CRP contracts that begin expiring next year. Those contracts have meant \$1.8 billion in income to Texas farmers over a decade.

Congress, as part of its farm bill deliberations next year, will have to decide whether to continue the 10-year program.

Supporters contend demise of the CRP would put marginal land back into production, worsen erosion, depress commodity prices and increase deficiency payments to farmers.

House Agriculture Committee member Larry Combest, R-Lubbock, has said he believes the CRP will ultimately be supported by Congress, even in an atmosphere of belt-tightening, because lawmakers understand the program's environmental benefits.

Combest, who could chair the agriculture subcommittee with jurisdiction over CRP, has little to say about the Environmental Working Group study.

"There are a jillion studies out there," said Combest's press secretary, Keith Williams. "They can make their case as everybody else has."

Soil erosion is one facet of the CRP, which provides rental payments to farmers who agree to plant grass or trees on highly-erodible land. When Congress enacted the program in 1985, lawmakers also were seeking to limit outlays in the farm commodity programs by reducing production.

The Environmental Working Group favors continuation of the CRP but wants its focus changed to put more emphasis on water quality and protection of wetlands.

"This study raises real questions about how much taxpayers should be spending on wind erosion control in Great Plains states such as Kansas when problems like pesticides and water pollution present greater risks to public health and the environment," said Cook.

The USDA's Hebert acknowledged that the focus of the program will shift from areas with wind erosion to areas with wetlands, water pollution problems and wildlife habitat.

That could be problematic in the Texas Panhandle and South Plains, which have recorded a drop in airborne dust since the CRP's implementation.

"If the Environmental Working Group have their way, the High Plains will be totally ignored in any retooling of the CRP," said Texas Tech agricultural economist Dr. R.T. Ervin, who studies airborne dust.

"My impression is the quality of life here in the southern High plains of course will decline to a certain degree when the land comes out of the program because of this airborne dust," he added.

# Plans drafted to help track money-laundering scams

**McALLEN, Texas (AP)**--Early this century, a mobster would take out loans from a bank where he deposited his ill-gotten gains. If he had to scam, he left the bank holding the bag on the loans.

The same thing happened to an American Express Co. subsidiary last week--except the crooks were international drug dealers, their schemes were elaborately high-tech, and their profits mind-boggling.

Now, the government is drafting proposals to help investigators track increasingly complex money-laundering schemes.

"We really cannot tolerate a situation in which the drug lords of the world own much of the stock and other important assets of our economy," said Sarah Jane Hughes, an Indiana University law professor who studies money laundering. "They will then wield so much power that they will be a threat to our democracy."

American Express Bank International announced a \$50 million package Monday to settle the actions of two former officers convicted of laundering more than \$30 million for a Mexican cocaine cartel.

"I think it will send shock waves through the financial industry," Hughes said. "If it doesn't, it should."

The Office of National Drug Control Policy estimated in 1993 that annual gross revenues from illegal drugs in the U.S. market alone range from \$40 billion to \$50 billion. The government projects that up to \$33 billion of the amount must be

laundered to appear as legitimate wealth.

Charts from Federal Reserve System banks show hundreds of millions of dollars beyond what can be explained for the level of business activity in Southern California, Texas and Florida--all money-laundering hubs.

"There you can surmise that it's drug money consistently driving the surplus," said Vincent Klink, resident agent in charge of enforcement at McAllen's U.S. Customs office, which houses the task force that investigated the American Express case.

By contrast, Fed districts such as New York--an end market for drugs--show consistent cash deficits.

Assistant U.S. attorneys David Novak and Charles Dause, who prosecuted the American Express case, said today's drug dealers

launder their proceeds for the same reasons the early mobsters did--to keep their wealth liquid while concealing it from authorities.

"They play leap frog with regulators and prosecutors," Hughes said. "They are like chameleons. They can make themselves into something new faster than we can figure out what it is."

In the American Express case, duffel bags stuffed with \$100 bills from drug deals were deposited in Texas banks, transferred by wire to New York and Switzerland, moved to offshore holding companies in the Cayman Islands, then reinvested in real estate and cash-intensive businesses such as retail outlets and car lots.

The bank had to write off nearly \$19 million loans that the two convicted ex-officers, Antonio Giraldi and Lourdes Reategui, made

# Big bird falls; bottom drops on emu market

**ST. CHARLES, Iowa (AP)**--This is one big bird that's had a great fall: The bottom has dropped out of the market for emus. Not to worry, say their defenders, who argue prices for the birds need to come down to boost sales.

"Two summers ago I bought two

pairs, \$9,000 for one and \$7,000 for the other. I took the \$7,000 pair down there (to a Texas auction) and they brought \$2,400," said Dennis Wienhold of Newell.

Kathy Schwartz of Cumming jumped into the business last April and bought two breeding pairs at \$18,000 a pair. "If I had waited a few months, I could have gotten them for half the price," she said.

This would be a catastrophe in a major livestock market. But emu ranchers, even those who were burned, said it's a sign that emus are slowly marching away from a market just for breeders to an affordable commercial market.

"It might take me longer to make a profit, but I'll recover," Schwartz said.

Emu farmers sing the praises of the flightless bird, an Australian cousin of the ostrich. Its beef-like meat is low in cholesterol and fat, they insist. The skin makes leather, its feathers are decorative and oil from glands on its back has uses as a skin cream and for arthritis relief.

But emu on the Thanksgiving table? Skeptics say they will go the way of soy burgers and cite other "can't miss" investments that missed.

"Since I was a kid, I've seen all sorts of wonder animals--chinchillas, llamas, elk, ostriches, longhorn cattle and emus--and I'm skeptical of any line of product which appears to be no more than a form of Ponzi scheme where the profits depend on selling at an inflated price to new breeders," said Wythe Willey, president-elect of the Iowa Cattleman's Association.

Roger Hogan of Redfield said he made big money when prices were up.

"In reality, we got a little starry eyed," he said. "We got a little cocky when prices were good, so when they dropped, it scared everybody."

He said that at the peak, about 1 (years ago), he was selling 6-month-old chicks for about \$14,000 a pair. "Right now, I'm selling 4-, 5-month-old chicks for \$1,500 to \$2,000 a pair."

The birds--standing 5 to 6 feet tall as adults and weighing 120 to 150 pounds--walk gracefully on feet that look like gloved hands. They're curious and friendly.

They're also dumb as a radish.

# Pope announces list of 30 new cardinals

**VATICAN CITY (AP)**--Clergymen who suffered under communism or struggled in regions of deep poverty moved today to the elite echelon that will select the next pope and help shape the Roman Catholic Church in the coming century.

The elevation of 30 new cardinals--including two Americans--broadens Pope John Paul II's influence on the conclave that will pick his successor.

The pontiff has named 100 of the 120 cardinals eligible to vote for a pope. His choices have reflected his desire to make the College of Cardinals more international and promote prelates who share his conservative views on issues such as birth control and the ban on women priests.

The crowd at the Vatican's main auditorium applauded today as the pope read the list of new cardinals, including clergymen from Africa and Vietnam and archbishops once jailed in Albanian, Cuban and Soviet prisons.

The Americans selected are archbishops William Keeler of Baltimore and Adam Maida of Detroit.

Maida--who became bishop of Green Bay, Wis., in 1984 and was named archbishop in Detroit in 1990--said Friday he was a bit overwhelmed by the preparations for today's ceremony. "I hope I can do it," he said.

But Keeler said he wasn't nervous. He was bishop of Harrisburg, Pa., before being named to head the Baltimore archdiocese in 1989.

The two clergymen will join eight other Americans in the College of Cardinals.

Many of the 6,000 people in the hall stood when the pope announced Vinko Puljic, the archbishop of war-ravaged Sarajevo and, at 49, the youngest cardinal of the new group.

The pope called off a trip to Sarajevo on Sept. 8 because of security concerns, but he has continued to issue sharp denunciations of the Bosnian civil war.

Travis Caraway, 85, former Hereford resident and brother-in-law of Dorothy Mercer of Hereford, died Saturday morning at his home in Greenville. Services are pending.

Mr. Caraway was born Jan. 16, 1909 at Old Emma, near Crosbyton, and he moved to Hereford in 1925 where he attended high school. He was a welder and blacksmith for many years.

Caraway moved to Lubbock in 1959 and worked for Hancock Manufacturing Co. After retirement, he did freelance photography. He was a member of Highland Terrace Baptist Church, a 32nd degree Mason, a Scottish Rite and Woodmen of the World member.

Caraway married Alta Funderburg in Hereford in 1937. She died Monday. He was also preceded in death by his parents, three brothers and three sisters.

Survivors include two daughters, Sandra Feagan of Amarillo and Carolyn Keene of Greenville; two granddaughters, three grandsons and three great-grandchildren.

office is related to business in the area.

Nall said even traffic on U.S. 60 takes advantage of the post office.

"I have truckers who stop in here regularly," she observed. "They say they can park here and do their postal business. They can't in some other places."

The history of Dawn postal service is rich and colorful. The first mail was delivered there in 1889 by J.S. Parrish and J.R. Dean. They took turns carrying the mail from La Plata to Dawn for six months, in an effort to convince the government that a regular route to Dawn was justified.

Information from the day indicates the two men encouraged friends and relatives in other areas to write, producing mail to establish the need.

In 1893, Parrish moved and the post office was relocated to the Jowell ranch, and later to the W.H. Cleary place. Cleary closed it in 1898.

For several years, residents had to travel to Hereford for postal needs but in 1913, a minor boom occurred in Dawn, according to records of the time. W.E. Neal and S.B. Edwards bought a section of land near the Dawn switch on the Santa Fe Railroad.

Neal soon owned the land, established a townsite, opened a lumberyard and a hotel, as he tried to encourage settlement of the town.

The post office was moved several times until settling into the present location in 1959. A former postmaster, Mary A. Frye, lives next door and owns the building that houses the office.

Since 1889 when Leander Parrish was the designated postmaster, 18 other persons have served in that capacity.

Even though she has a round trip of 56 miles to work every day, Ellen Nall appears to enjoy her job. She has an abbreviated history of Dawn and the post office that she sends to students and others who send inquiries about the community.

Besides the Dawn job, she is postmaster relief for the Bushland post office. The 43-year-old postal worker has concern in her voice about the possibility of free-standing boxes outdoors.

Like Chambers, she wonders how people can stand in rain and cold to collect their mail.

"We have lots of older people," said Chamber. "It will be hard on them."

# Murder mystery hidden in East Texas saga

**EDITOR'S NOTE:** For weeks, the saga of flamboyant District Attorney E. Ray Andrews sent shock waves across East Texas. The allegations of alcohol and drug abuse and minor chicanery grew into charges that he solicited a bribe in a criminal case. And somehow lost in the furor of this strange case was a tragic and very real murder mystery.

**CORSICANA, Texas (AP)** - On a late summer evening in 1993, three men in a fishing boat spotted an ominous bundle floating in the Trinity River south of Dallas.

Inside black plastic garbage bags, bound with duct tape, they discovered the body of a woman weighted with two cement blocks and fastened with chains.

Two days later, forensic specialists identified the body as that of Shelley Watkins, 35, the wife of a wealthy and well known Corsicana businessman.

They attributed her death only to "homicidal violence."

The victim, a mother of two small girls, had vanished a week earlier, but there was confusion over just when, how and to whom she was reported missing.

So began a murder case that once seemed almost open and shut but in time erupted into a bribery-laced political scandal whose headlines overshadowed the bizarre slaying itself.

Still, the mystery remains: Who killed Shelley Watkins?

On Sept. 6, 1993, Jerry and Shelley Watkins and their two girls joined other family members for a Labor Day outing on nearby Cedar Creek Lake.

Watkins, 40, is president of Watkins Construction, a hugely successful Corsicana company founded by his father, Carmack Watkins. An avid big game hunter, the elder Watkins is still involved with the firm.

Shelley Watkins, Jerry's third wife, was active in civic activities, most notably the American Cancer Society and the Women's Association of Navarro County.

Among those present at the lakeside retreat were Ronny Watkins, Jerry's brother, and his wife Barbara.

Barbara Watkins would later describe her sister-in-law as "real nervous and jittery" that day. "Shelley was not herself," she said.

Those present told investigators Shelley, like others, was drinking, and there was a "disagreement" between Shelley and Ronny Watkins over the use of jet skis.

At some point that night, Jerry Watkins scooped up the two daughters and left, which angered his wife. He later would say she returned to their home in Beaton Lake Estates and that they argued.

When she threatened to leave with the girls, Watkins said, he grabbed the keys to her white BMW. About 11:30 p.m., his wife, intoxicated, left home on foot, he told police.

He said he went to bed. Pulled from the Trinity River a week later, Mrs. Watkins' body was clothed in the same blue shorts suit she wore to the holiday outing. But someone had stripped the body of two diamond rings and an expensive silver and gold watch.

Medical examiners discovered potentially fatal lacerations about the head. They also found fire ant bites inflicted before the body was dumped in the river.

They could not determine if she had been raped.

Even in a small town such as Corsicana, population 23,500, the disappearance of Shelley Watkins did not cause a major stir. In retrospect, it is easy to understand why.

According to investigators, Jerry Watkins mentioned his wife's departure to Corsicana policeman Lewis Palos Sept. 7, a day after the holiday outing. But Palos, a longtime friend who lives on Watkins-owned property, did not formally report her missing until Sept. 9.

Worse yet, Corsicana police Chief G.M. Cox maintains he did not learn of the missing woman until Sept. 12, and that he ordered Palos to turn the case over to the Navarro County Sheriff's Department.

Palos did so, but only hours before the body was found Sept. 13.

The investigation was further muddled because the body was recovered on the Henderson County side of the river, which shifted jurisdiction in the case.

Thus, Larry Warwick, a Henderson County sheriff's investigator, was largely working from scratch when he and Texas Ranger Ray Nutt began their assignment.

Later, both quietly complained that Watkins and other members of the family were not cooperating.

On Nov. 15, a special grand jury was convened in Athens to hear evidence in the case, and District Attorney E. Ray Andrews issued

subpoenas to members of the Watkins family.

Andrews, never a stranger to controversy, overrode protests from Watkins' attorney and persuaded state District Judge Jack Holland to permit investigators Warwick and Nutt to sit in on the secret proceedings.

"I've never seen this before anywhere," grumbled Jack Zimmermann, Watkins' Houston attorney.

Grand jurors took no action, but two weeks later, on Nov. 30, Warwick obtained a search warrant authorizing him to enter Watkins' Corsicana home and to inspect the slain woman's BMW.

The fruits of the invasion would be nominal, or, as Zimmermann put it: "They searched that house inch by inch for nine hours and found nothing."

But in his affidavit, Warwick accused Jerry Watkins of "intentionally and knowingly" killing his wife and using the BMW "in the commission of the said murder."

The most compelling portion of the affidavit involved a man named John McCollum, who told Nutt about an incident that occurred Sept. 7 as he was driving to work.

He said he was crossing the Highway 85 bridge above the Trinity River about 4:30 a.m. when he saw a man "engaged in some unknown task."

McCollum said the man was driving an "expensive car." After viewing a photo lineup, the affidavit said, McCollum identified the man on the bridge as Jerry Mack Watkins.

Warwick's affidavit was loaded with curious revelations regarding Watkins' activities after his wife's disappearance.

Two neighbors, David Williams and Robert Johnson, said Watkins told them on Sept. 8 he had taken his wife's car to Dallas to have it cleaned and to get new tires. They said they considered that strange, in light of his wife's disappearance.

At some point, Watkins telephoned a car dealer in Bryan and said his wife had spilled paint in the trunk of her car. He wanted the trunk linings replaced. Some of the original panels and carpet had been removed before the BMW was brought in on Sept. 11, a Texas Ranger reported.

A survey of friends and family members produced no one who knew of paint being spilled in the car.

Although Watkins said he went to bed after his wife left, neighbors reported that lights were on at the residence at least until 4 a.m. and that the couple's cars were in the driveway.

Regarding the weights, chains and plastic bags used to conceal Shelley Watkins' body, Warwick observed: "A transient murderer does not take the time to wrap a victim in such an elaborate manner."

After the search, Ranger Nutt told the Athens Daily Review:

"This could be one of those cases, one in a thousand, where the woman was picked up. I doubt it, but it's possible."

On Dec. 20, 1993, five days after

his 40th birthday, Jerry Watkins was indicted for murder by a Henderson County grand jury. He surrendered in Athens the next day and was released on \$75,000 bond.

Zimmermann, his lawyer, insisted there was no evidence tying Watkins to the crime. He called it a case built on innuendo and rumor.

"Jerry Watkins is innocent of all wrongdoing, and we expect that he will be cleared," Zimmermann told reporters.

The high-profile attorney said there was nothing sinister about replacing the tires on his wife's car or having the trunk work done in Bryan.

"The car was taken to the dealer it was bought from, for its 30,000-mile checkup," he said. And the tires were replaced while Watkins was in Dallas on business.

Zimmermann said Watkins paid for the tires with a credit card and the trunk work with a check.

"There was no attempt to hide anything," the attorney said. "He didn't think she was killed. He didn't think she wasn't coming back."

In April 1994, Zimmermann moved to quash the indictment against Watkins, maintaining that the presence of investigators Warwick and Nutt intimidated grand jury witnesses. He argued that they violated state law by helping the assistant district attorney question witnesses.

Zimmermann also attacked the credibility of John McCollum, the so-called "bridge witness."

Under questioning by Zimmermann, Nutt conceded that "I've got some reservations, yes, sir."

So did Warwick.

"I have even said to myself that his story somehow seems too good to be true," he said.

Still, after months of haggling, the murder case was set for trial Aug. 15. But it never made it into court.

Unknown to all but a few, a bizarre drama was unfolding behind the scenes. In a Hollywood twist, Watkins, an accused killer, was cooperating with authorities to expose an alleged extortion-bribery scheme.

The target of the sting operation: E. Ray Andrews, the Henderson County district attorney whose office was to prosecute the Watkins murder case.

Andrews, 54, a heavy drinker, was already under scrutiny by the Texas Attorney General's Office for alleged misdeeds when a federal grand jury issued its indictment in mid-August.

Charging conspiracy to commit mail fraud, the government alleged that Andrews offered to drop the murder case against Watkins in exchange for a \$300,000 bribe.

According to federal documents, Andrews allegedly used two middlemen to approach Watkins about the proposed payoff.

Watkins contacted Zimmermann, who notified authorities.

Cooperating with state and federal

agents, Watkins agreed to the \$300,000 payment, and in fact delivered \$100,000 through an intermediary. The remainder was to be paid "after a dismissal occurred."

For several weeks, Zimmermann said, Watkins spent "20 hours a day" working with Ranger Nutt and other officers. "He was almost sleeping with those guys," he said.

And if he thought Watkins killed his wife, Zimmermann said pointedly, "I would never have let him stay with the guys investigating the murder case. They'd take your bar card away from you."

On Aug. 12, three days before the Watkins trial was to begin, FBI agents pounced on Andrews, accelerating his announced plans to resign.

In September, a federal grand jury in Tyler returned a three-count superseding indictment accusing Andrews of accepting cash and "favors" in exchange for favorable treatment on criminal cases.

Andrews since has admitted involvement in the scheme and faces up to 20 years in prison and a \$250,000 fine. Sentencing was delayed while he completed treatment for alcohol and drug abuse at an Atlanta recovery center.

His resignation Aug. 15 coincided precisely with the scheduled start of Watkins' trial, which was postponed indefinitely.

Zimmermann moved at once for a dismissal of the murder indictment, citing the Andrews fiasco as cause. The motion asserted that Andrews pressed for the December indictment despite requests from investigators to hold off.

No incriminating evidence of any kind was found as a result of the search of Watkins' home, cars, garage or yard, and Watkins was indicted "only because Mr. Andrews pushed for it," Zimmermann argued.

The implication was clear: Andrews wanted the indictment to set his bribery scheme in motion.

The defense motion was unopposed, and Judge Holland formally dismissed the case Aug. 25.

However, Henderson County Sheriff H.B. "Slick" Alfred and

Ranger Nutt told the Athens Daily Review the investigation is not closed and Watkins remains the prime suspect.

"The case is circumstantial, but it's a good one," the sheriff said.

Nutt said the dismissal leaves the investigation open-ended without the time constraints of a pending trial date. There is no statute of limitations on murder in Texas.

"We're confident from the comments of the prosecutors and investigators that the investigation

will continue," Zimmermann told the Corsicana Daily Sun.

He said it is important that the investigation continue.

"By closing it," he said, "no one would ever know who the real murderer was."

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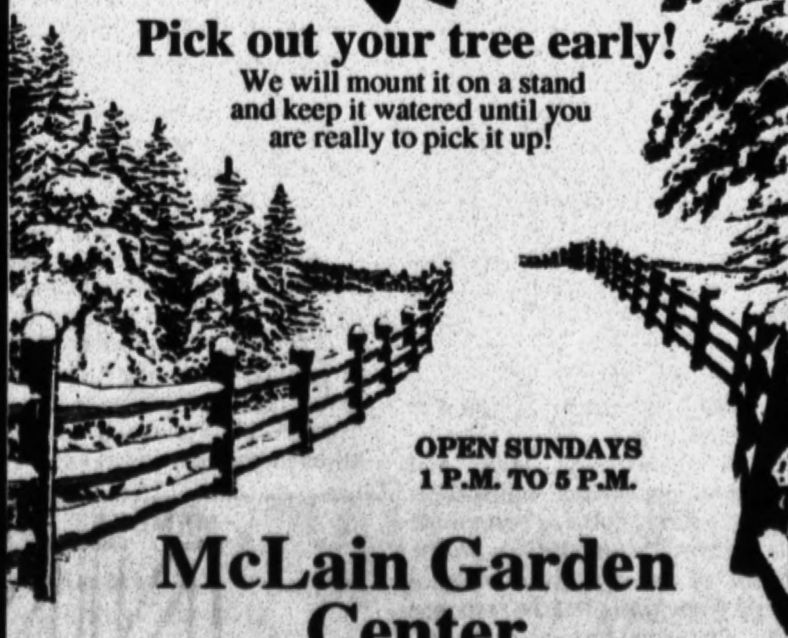

Having three daughters and no sons never seemed to bother my father. Neither was my grandfather obviously disgruntled that he had five granddaughters (there were two in California besides us in Texas) and no grandsons.

When my baby sister came along, though, I felt more than a little embarrassed. After all, how many high school seniors find out their mother is going to have a baby?

There I was, getting ready to graduate from high school and my mother was wondering if she'd be there for the big event.

She was, but 12 days later my baby sister entered the world and life was never the same again.

There was no doubt, ever, that this kid was spoiled -- parents, grandparents, two big sisters, assorted uncles and aunts took part. But, everyone attributed most of the spoiling to our grandfather.

He loved little kids more than he did his cattle, and that's going some. He could cajole any youngster into talking with him and nearly always had a penny or a nickel to make it worth the kid's time.

But baby sister was something else. With an angelic face and blond hair like a halo around her head, she could charm her grandpa out of anything she set her mind on.

He often took her with him as he visited with his cronies around town. Often, she came home in new clothes because she got dirty after she left home. A favorite stopping place, also, was a hardware-type store that stocked wheel toys, such as bicycles, tricycles, kiddie cars and the like.

One day he brought her home sitting in a kiddie car. His excuse to my mother, was a little flimsy: "She wouldn't get out of it so I just bought it."

To which my mother responded: "What are you going to do when she wants a real one?"

My sister was a whole lot smarter about that than we realized, but more about that in a minute.

She also was a gifted tattler. Again, her appearance made it difficult not to believe everything she said.

For me, her tattling was especially

disastrous. She saw me smoking a cigarette while I was home from college and couldn't wait to report this to my parents.

While driving in the pasture with grandpa one day, they came across a dead animal. On the return to the house, she told mother that he ran over a cow and killed her.

Only later, did we find out that the cow was a victim of a lightning storm the night before.

Her language was colorful at times, too, the result of being in the presence of grandpa and his penchant for swearing.

Angry at mother for making her do something she didn't want to do, she looked her straight in the eye and said, "You old (expletive deleted)." Isn't it remarkable how little kids (she was only about three at the time) seem to have an uncanny ability to use such words in context?

So stunned she could hardly keep from laughing, mother turned her back and walked away. Little sister, as far as I know, never called her mother the name again.

About the time she was in junior high school, my parents moved to another town and she was not in the company of grandparents as much as she had been. But, she still managed to wield extraordinary influence over them.

It came to her attention that motor scooters were wonderful for getting around town, until old enough to drive a car. On a visit to grandpa, she had him convinced that a motor scooter would not only be good transportation for her but would save parents a lot of time. They wouldn't have to "chauffeur" her around all the time.

Fortunately, grandpa consulted parents before buying. There would be no motor scooter in her life.

Then, the time came for her to want a car, but grandpa was very sick and unable to satisfy her wish, in person.

But before he died, he told our grandmother that his car should go to the granddaughter, the apple of his eye.

As I noted earlier, he couldn't help but spoil her.

## Walter Mears Governors agree: size of government too big

 WHITE SULPHUR SPRINGS, Va. (AP) - It is the prime time to be a Republican governor. They are resurgent, in charge in 30 of the 50 states, political power brokers - even prospective contenders - in the arenas that will nominate a Republican challenger for the 1996 presidential election.

Headly days indeed. But right behind the celebrations comes the business, the budgeting, the search for revenue to balance spending, the heavy duty of governing.

And in those tasks, the reinforced GOP governors are just like the Democrats and the independent from Maine - they could have headaches with an incoming Republican Congress bent on cuts in spending and taxes, a course that has sometimes forced costs back upon the states.

Gov. William F. Weld of Massachusetts, re-elected by landslide, said in an interview that it's worth the pressure because government is simply too big and too costly. "You've got to shrink the size of the beast," he said.

No one was disputing that at a National Governors' Association cran course for governors-elect, but with a touch of caution.

Gov. Howard Dean of Vermont, a Democrat and chairman of the association, said that Democratic Congresses have been all too willing to tell the states what to do by passing laws that cost money but don't provide it. Those are the unfunded mandates governors have griped about for years.

The governors association has no quarrel with the balanced budget amendment that House Republicans have made their top priority. But they're wary of cost-shifting; Dean said that would be dishonest politics as usual.

Dean said the Republican governors ought to be helpful getting that message to the GOP Congress. They won't have to wait long - when school is out here, GOP governors are going to their own Republican Governors' Association meeting in Williamsburg, Va., and the new leaders of Congress will be there.

An expanding economy is boosting state revenues and helping to balance budgets, but the association's self assessment is that states are "staring

down the barrel of some major spending pressures" with the new lineup in Congress.

There are a dozen Republican governors-elect, three Democrats, one independent, and one contest still unsettled. Ten came as students, about twice as many veterans to serve as the faculty, for two days of seminars on topics like budgeting, dealing with Washington, and the social and family pressures of their new roles.

Handling Washington may be the toughest course of all, regardless of their party lineups. The governors do their work in 50 capitals, separately, with neither the direct leadership nor the collective muscle that works in Congress.

Too often for their liking, Congress, or the federal bureaucracy, decides how they should govern.

Republicans in Congress say they'll pay for tax cuts with spending cuts. That's been said before and hasn't quite worked out.

But something has to give. All but the most draconian of economizers acknowledge the need for a social safety net, to catch and cover the neediest. Reforming welfare will save money, but there are costs attached. Cuts in education, housing and other federal programs leave gaps to be dealt with elsewhere.

That gets more difficult if Republicans in Congress and in state capitals all try to cut taxes at the same time.

Gov.-elect George Pataki of New York, a Republican trophy state with the defeat of Democrat Mario Cuomo, pledged a 25 percent state tax cut over four years. Now he's looking at a budget that won't stretch to balance even under the current tax code.

In Connecticut, Republican John Rowland said he would phase out an income tax that took effect three years ago, but it covers nearly 28 percent of a state budget already in the red.

Like the congressional Republicans, he talks of cutting spending to make ends meet with lower taxes.

New Jersey Gov. Christine Todd Whitman, elected a year ago on a promise to cut state income taxes, is on the faculty this time. She's up against budget pressures that make the pledge hard to keep - but the strategy has made her a national reputation.

Teach the new class of governors how to do it, and she'll deserve an honorary degree.

 Agriculture subsidies have long been the whipping boy of Washington politics. And some Republicans, including Texas' Sen. Phil Gramm and Rep. Dick Arme, are already talking about ending subsidies.

Fortunately, not all members of Congress are so shortsighted. Rep. Pat Roberts, R-Kan., is expected to head the agriculture committee in the next Congress. He admits agriculture programs will have to take their fair share of budget cuts, but he is determined to stop the practice of cutting agriculture programs and sending the money saved to other areas.

The farm bill will be rewritten in the new Congress, and it is important to have people like Roberts and Rep. Larry Combest, R-Lubbock, in place to make sure agriculture programs are treated fairly and rationally. ...

There is always room to reduce waste, fraud and abuse within farm programs, something Roberts has pledged to do. But it makes no sense to ruin the best food production system in the world by reducing subsidies irresponsibly. Fortunately for the agriculture community, they have enough allies in both parties to know that their concerns won't be ignored.

Mark Kriegshauser, a tight end for Eastern New Mexico University, was named to the 1994 GTE Academic All-District Six football team—college division.

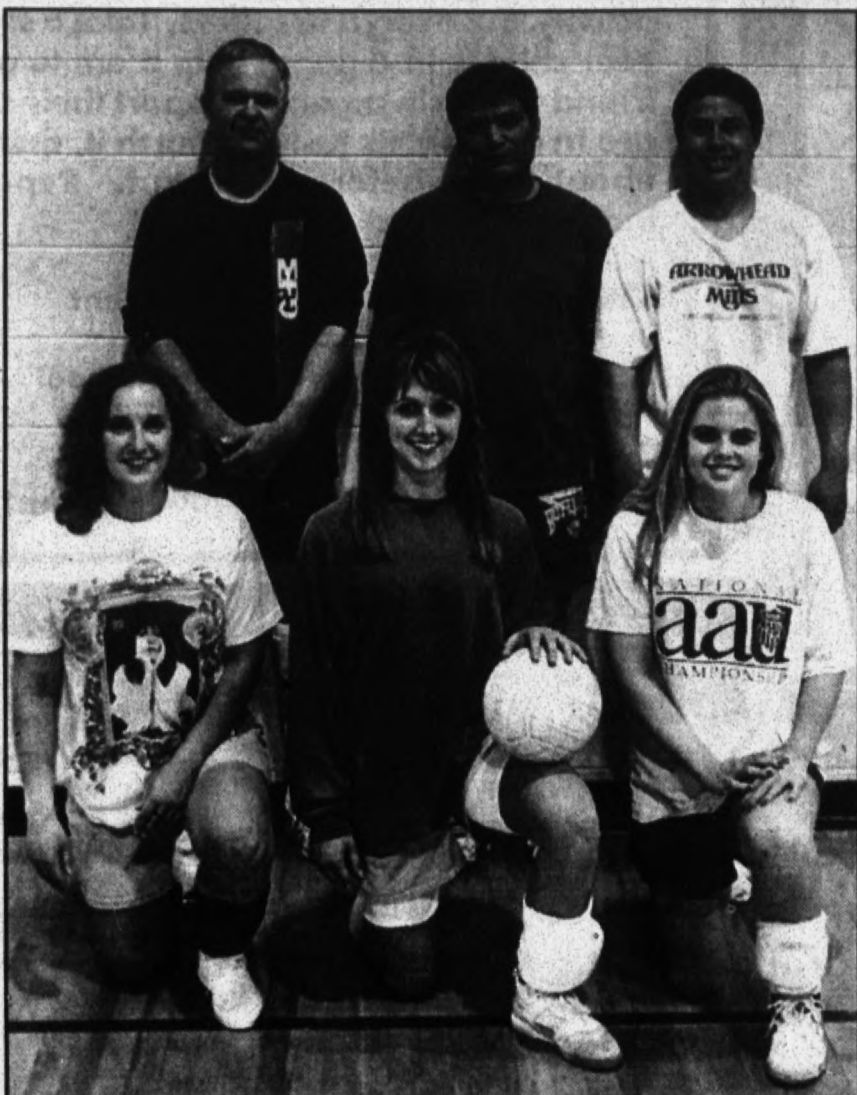

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# Tech accepts Cotton berth; TCU may get Independence

FORT WORTH, Texas (AP) — Like Cinderella, Texas Tech's Red Raiders are headed to the Cotton Bowl ball. Unfortunately, Texas Christian has already turned them into pumpkins.

With the host berth in the bag, the Raiders roared into Fort Worth Friday with a chance to win the Southwest Conference championship outright and glide into Dallas Jan. 2 with a respectable 7-4 record.

Alas, their Fairy Godmother was the Wicked Witch in disguise.

TCU's underdog Horned Frogs used two long-distance touchdown passes from Max Knake to fleet flanker Jimmy Oliver and a late touchdown by Andre Davis to bushwhack the Raiders, 24-17.

The victory earned the Frogs a share of the SWC title and probably assured them an invitation to the Dec. 28 Independence Bowl against an undetermined Atlantic Coast opponent.

"I am the happiest man alive," chortled TCU defensive guard Royal West, who had a big hand in the Frogs' seven quarterback sacks. "We are co-champs or whatever they are

going to call it.

"We are going to a bowl and I can't ask for anything more."

TCU, along with SWC co-champions Texas and Baylor, wound up with a 7-4 record while the Raiders will drag a rather dismal 6-5 slate into Dallas.

All four teams posted 4-3 conference marks and Rice (4-6, 3-3) can make it an unprecedented five-way tie if the Owls dispose of hapless Houston Saturday as expected.

By virtue of the SWC's "last appearance rule," Tech, which last appeared in the postseason classic in 1939, slipped in the back door Thursday when Texas gunned down Baylor, 63-35.

"We should be the only conference champion," grumbled Raider defensive end Tony Daniels. "A 6-5 team shouldn't go to the Cotton Bowl."

Raider quarterback Zebbie Lethridge said the Baylor-Texas verdict affected Friday's game.

"I really wish Baylor had beat UT so we'd have come here wanting it more," he said.

Despite the loss, Tech coach Spike Dykes was more than a little upbeat.

"I am so excited for this team, the university and certainly for our fans about the opportunity to play in Dallas on Jan. 2....," he said.

"These guys have played hard all year and I am just tickled to death that they are getting a chance to play in the Cotton Bowl."

The Raiders' most frequently mentioned Cotton Bowl opponents are Notre Dame and Florida State. The Frogs' most likely opponent was North Carolina State until the Wolfpack upset Virginia Friday.

Baylor is expected to go to the Alamo Bowl in San Antonio and Texas appears locked into the Sun Bowl in El Paso.

Texas A&M went through the season undefeated but is ineligible for a bowl because of being on NCAA probation.

## TCU's offensive power too much for Raiders

FORT WORTH, Texas (AP) — Max Knake burned Texas Tech with two lightning touchdown passes to flanker Jimmy Oliver Friday and Texas Christian got a late fourth-quarter score to upset the Cotton Bowl-bound Red Raiders, 24-17.

TCU tailback Andre Davis, the Southwest Conference rushing champion, contributed 63 yards of a 69-yard scoring drive with 3:52 left, sealing the victory with a 9-yard run and then bulling over for the conversion.

The victory earned the Horned Frogs a share of the SWC championship for the first time since 1959 and gave them the inside track to the Independence Bowl.

TCU and co-champions Baylor and Texas wound up with 7-4 records while Tech, as the Mobil Cotton Bowl host, finished at 6-5.

Texas Tech clinched its Jan. 2 rendezvous in Dallas when Texas ambushed Baylor Thursday, 63-35.

Tech, TCU, Baylor and Texas posted 4-3 SWC records and Rice (4-6, 3-3) can make it an unprecedented five-way tie with a victory Saturday over Houston.

The Red Raiders, after missing two field goal attempts, overcame a 16-14 TCU lead with 6:23 left in the fourth period when Tony Rogers kicked a 41-yard field goal.

But TCU struck right back with Davis ripping off runs of 12, 28, 14 and 9 yards as Knake drove the Frogs in for the winning touchdown.

On the day, Davis carried 23 times for 107 yards.

Tech got the ball back for the final time with 1:18 left but couldn't get past the TCU 45.

The Raiders, who will make their

first Cotton Bowl appearance since 1939, held a 14-10 lead in the third period after a 19-yard pass from Zebbie Lethridge to wide receiver Jayson Lavender and a 15-yard run by Byron Hanspard.

A record TCU-Tech crowd of 43,219 and part of a national television audience watched Knake sling scoring shots of 89 and 62 yards to Oliver in the second and third quarters.

The first gave the Frogs a 10-0 lead, the second a 16-14 edge. And it was a 38-yard pass from Knake to Oliver that set up TCU's second-quarter, 40-yard field goal by Michael Meeder.

Reeder's extra point kick was blocked after the second TD.

Tech specialist Jon Davis missed a 29-yard field goal attempt midway through the third quarter with the Raiders trailing by two points. Then, in the fourth period, Tony Rogers missed a chip shot 20-yards.

The Horned Frogs flirted with disaster most of the chilly, overcast day as John Washington fumbled two punts and Knake threw an apparent interception in the end zone. But TCU recovered both bobbles and the Tech defender was stripped of the interception.

Knake, hitting 12 of 23 for 267 yards, retreated back to his own goal line before tossing his bomb 55 yards in the air and Oliver, a step ahead of defender Shawn Hurd, raced the final 45 yards untouched.

Knake and Oliver stung the Raiders up the middle with the 62-yard pass play that gave the fleet receiver a school record 206 yards on seven receptions.

## Nebraska squeaks by OU

NORMAN, Okla. (AP) — Nebraska showed the mettle of a No. 1 team, defeating an inspired rival despite an uncharacteristically uninspired performance from the Cornhuskers' running game.

The Cornhuskers only managed 136 yards on the ground against Oklahoma on Friday — 222 below

their average. But the Nebraska defense made that a moot point in a 13-3 victory that sent the Cornhuskers to the Orange Bowl for a shot at the national championship.

Nebraska (12-0 overall, 7-0 Big Eight) won its fourth straight conference title by shutting down Oklahoma in the second half.

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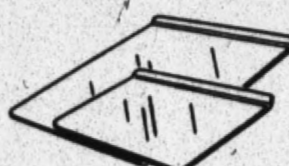
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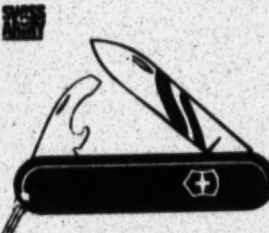


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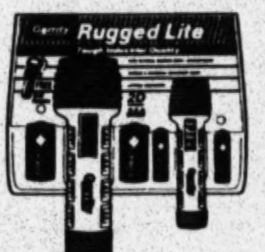

## Browns must prepare for Oilers' straight-ahead running offense

CLEVELAND (AP) — Tight ends I-formations. Straight-ahead power running.

Clearly, more than just the coach has changed since the Cleveland Browns saw the Houston Oilers last month.

"They're a normal team now," said Cleveland defensive end Rob Burnett. "We used to have to change our whole defense for the run-and-shoot."

But new Houston coach Jeff Fisher, promoted from defensive coordinator when Jack Pardee was fired in mid-November, has all but scrapped the four-receiver scheme and intends to turn to it only occasionally in obvious passing situations.

Even though the Browns (8-3) were accustomed to playing the Oilers (1-10) twice a year, the run-and-shoot remained rare enough that it forced them to study a little harder whenever a game against Houston was coming up.

Their preparations for the Oilers offense this week were much simpler. They had tapes of only one game on which to base their defensive plan: Houston's 13-10 loss to the New York Giants in Fisher's head coaching debut last Monday night.

"It's a normal pro set. It's nothing strange," Burnett said. "Actually, the run-and-shoot was strange compared to the rest of the league."

Running back Lorenzo White was the most obvious beneficiary of the Oilers' new approach. After running for 95 yards in the second half at Cincinnati the week before, White set career highs with 27 carries for 156 yards against the Giants.

Houston's new running formation seems to fit him perfectly.

"He looked great," Burnett said.

"I think he's a lot better back out of the I-formation, lining up 7 yards deep, than he was lining up 4 or 5 yards back in the run-and-shoot. He's deeper. He gets more momentum. He has better vision."

"Unlike the run-and-shoot, where they were going to throw 40 times a game, now we have to stop the run first."

Against New York, the Oilers ran 29 times and attempted just 15 passes, the first time in nearly two years that they ran more often than they passed. The 15 passes were the fewest they attempted in a game since 1981.

"If you want to win, you have to be able to run the football," Fisher said. "My philosophy is to run the football with backs in the backfield, to utilize the tight end. With the run-and-shoot, if you have a deficiency in any area, you're going to have problems."

"Over the years, it's been a difficult offense to defend against. The last couple years, defenses have made strides and done a better job against it."

Not everyone in the Houston camp was happy about the change. Receiver Webster Slaughter, his opportunities slashed sharply by the new offense, was furious; his contract includes incentives based on playing time.

"You know those receivers. They want the ball every play," quarterback Billy Joe Tolleriver said.

The Browns won 11-8 in Houston on Oct. 13 in the last full game for Vinny Testaverde at quarterback. He had to leave each of the next two games because of concussions, and Mark Rypien started the next three for Cleveland.

Testaverde returns as the starter this week.

"Their defense hasn't changed

much. The changes that have occurred are on the offensive side of the ball," Testaverde said. "The defense is doing the same things, bringing a lot of people up front, the eight-man fronts. We're going to have to keep a hat on a hat and try to keep them out."

## Montana aims for milestone

Joe Montana is expected to reach a rare NFL milestone this weekend.

Montana needs only 61 yards to become the fifth player in league history to pass for 40,000 yards. It should happen at Seattle on Sunday.

Montana would join Dan Fouts, Dan Marino, Fran Tarkenton and Johnny Unitas in the 40,000-yard club. Still, it's a milestone he's been loathe to dwell on, or even talk about.

"Those are the sort of things you look back on later," he said. "Right now, we've got way too much going on to worry about it."

The Chiefs (7-4) trail San Diego by only one game in the AFC West, which they won last year in Montana's injury-dogged first season after leaving the San Francisco 49ers.

Running back Marcus Allen will probably miss the game because of a knee injury. That means rookies such as Greg Hill of Texas A&M and Donnell Bennett of Miami will again be counted on to produce. If they perform as well as they did in last week's 20-13 victory over Cleveland, Kansas City should have little trouble with the last-place Seahawks (4-7).

The Wildcats led by 12 at the half, then blew the game open behind Blair's inside play. The lead reached 29 before coach Lute Olson emptied his bench.  
Augmon had 16. Steve Smith also scored 16.  
Vlade Divac led the Lakers with 15 points, 16 rebounds and six assists, his team-leading fourth double-double.

Kevin Willis scored a season-high 30 points as Miami snapped a five-game road losing streak and won for just the third time this season.  
Willis scored 10 points in the first

Jarvis Kelley had 18 and Ray Owses 14 for Arizona (1-1). Jason Kaiser led the Seawolves (4-2) with 21 points.

**No. 8 Duke 80, Brown 38**  
At Durham, N.C., freshmen Ricky Price, Steve Wojciechowski and Trajan Langdon helped ignite a 17-0 second-half run.

Wojciechowski's alley-oop to Price, who dunked the ball one-handed, brought a standing ovation. Seconds later, Wojciechowski went sprawling to the floor to wrestle a loose ball from a Brown player and fed Kenny Blakeney for an open layup. Langdon's 3-pointer at the 10-minute mark put Duke ahead 61-28.

**No. 10 Florida 73, Stetson 64**  
Dan Cross scored 27 points and helped Florida come back from an 11-point first-half deficit at Gainesville, Fla.

Much of Stetson's early success came from the shooting of guard Kerry Blackshear, who scored 16 first-half points on a variety of jumpers, spinning inside layups and 3-pointers.

Florida steadily came back in the second half. Cross hit a 3-pointer and a leaping jumper to cut the Stetson lead to 44-43, and forward Jason Anderson drained a 3-pointer at the 12:59 mark to give Florida its first lead of the game.

**No. 16 Connecticut 110, Lafayette 48**

Ray Allen scored 23 points and Brian Fair had 21 as Connecticut cruised at Hartford. Allen, expected to pick up a lot of the slack with last year's leader, Donyell Marshall, opting for the NBA, had 13 points in the first half.

Ohio University won the Preseason NIT behind the play of tournament MVP Gary Trent, who had 33 points and 20 rebounds in the final at New York's Madison Square Garden.

Trent was called for walking with 30 seconds left in regulation and the score tied at 71. New Mexico State (3-1) failed on a last-shot attempt and Trent helped Ohio (4-0) dominate the overtime. His basket, two free throws and two rebounds highlighted an 8-3 run.

Thomas Wyatt led the Aggies with 17 points, six in overtime.

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# Jerry Jeff Walker had big impact on Luckenbach

LUCKENBACH, Texas - The "sheriff of Luckenbach" stared across the bar, her rattlesnake earrings swaying in the breeze.

"I've stood by Jerry Jeff in the good times and bad," she said. "And there's been some really bad times. "But I love him, he's like a little brother to me. A blood brother." Aside from her duties as "sheriff," Marge Mueller has been working as a bartender for Luckenbach on-and-off since 1972. She's seen a lot of musicians perform in the dancehall over the past 22 years, but none have had a bigger impact on this tiny Hill Country town than Jerry Jeff Walker.

Several years before Willie and Waylon ever "got back to the basics," Jerry Jeff put Luckenbach on the map with "Viva Terlingua!" - Jerry Jeff's breakthrough album recorded in the Luckenbach dancehall in 1973.

But Jerry Jeff's love affair with Luckenbach didn't end there. After recording two more albums in the dancehall, and even trying to buy the town once or twice, he still returns occasionally to sing and relax in this scenic town.

"It's a step back in time," Jerry Jeff said in a recent phone interview. "Once you get in there and get your car parked and get walking around... all the modern stuff leaves you... the malls and freeways... and you can relax."

"There's not much to do there without interacting with other people. It becomes a sort of thing where you meet somebody from somewhere else and start having a good time."

Jerry Jeff took a step back in time recently, returning to Luckenbach one year after the recording of Viva Terlingua in October 1993.

"No, it's a concert," Marge said to someone over the phone. "Jerry Jeff rented out the whole town. You have to have a ticket to get in after

7:00. Yes, there's some \$40 tickets still left." By early afternoon, Jerry Jeff's fans were already descending on Luckenbach, while more leisurely tourists hadn't yet retreated back to Fredericksburg.

Among the fans was "Redneck" Decker, a radio DJ from New York who had traveled by train and cab to get to Luckenbach for the concert.

"I play a lot of Jerry Jeff at the radio station, and I wouldn't miss this for anything," he said. "Luckenbach is a small place, but it sure is big on character."

A conversation of the history of Luckenbach invariably leads to Hondo Crouch, the late "mayor of Luckenbach," who bought the place in 1971 and gave it so much of its character.

"Redneck" grins, "Hondo was a true Texas hero. He's so famous we've even heard of him in New York."

It was Hondo, in fact, who brought another New Yorker to Luckenbach.

Jerry Jeff, born Ronald Crosby of Oneonta, N.Y., learned of Luckenbach when he met musician Dow Patterson in Austin in the early '70s. Dow was married to Hondo's daughter, Becky, and it wasn't long before Jerry Jeff became good friends.

Becky said that Hondo was "an idol and father figure" to Jerry Jeff during his wilder days and that they shared a lot of common ground.

"Jerry Jeff was a believer in what Hondo believed in," she said. "Celebrating the small things in life."

Celebrating the small things is what Luckenbach does best. At mid-afternoon things have picked up some. Tourists come and go while motorcycles kick up dust in the parking lot and guitar pickers play old country songs behind the bar. Luckenbach has been described as "Texas' smallest theme park." But how did this tiny little town become a tourist attraction?

Obviously, Hondo started it all, but

most would give credit to Waylon Jennings' hit song "Luckenbach, Texas (Back to the Basics of Love)." But Jennings has never been to Luckenbach.

And neither have Chips Moman or Bobby Emmons, who actually wrote the song.

How did they find out about the place?

In 1973, Jerry Jeff (who already had released seven albums and written his smash hit "Mr. Bojangles") was looking for a place to record his second album with MCA records.

He didn't like recording studios, but he sure did like Hondo and Luckenbach. One thing led to another, and before long, "Viva Terlingua" was being recorded in the Luckenbach dancehall.

The album's name was taken from a bumper sticker in the bar for the Terlingua chili cookoff.

When the recording was nearly finished, Jerry Jeff advertised a Saturday night concert.

Nearly 900 people paid \$1 each to jam themselves into the old dancehall and hear such songs as "Desperados Waiting for a Train," "London Homesick Blues" and "Up Against the Wall Red Neck."

After that things weren't ever the same for Jerry Jeff. Or for Luckenbach.

"I remember the morning that the trucks all pulled out from reconfiguring 'Viva Terlingua!'" Jerry Jeff said, "and Hondo and I were the last two standing there in town. I remember that moment real clearly."

"I said, 'Well, I wonder what we've done?'"

As late afternoon makes its way to Luckenbach, they're setting up the sound in the dancehall and fans and tourists alike have nearly overwhelmed the general store where Jerry Jeff married his wife Susan in 1974. Hondo was the best man, and a small bust of him stands right outside the door, where another group of guitar pickers have gathered a small audience.

Hondo died in 1976, a few weeks after Jerry Jeff recorded "A Man Must

Carry On" in Luckenbach. The album was reworked and released in '77 as a eulogy for Hondo.

But even without Hondo, Luckenbach has endured.

Where there used to be just an old outhouse, they've added flushing toilets, but Luckenbach still looks pretty much the same as it always has. And the management has tried to ensure that the Luckenbach mystique remains unchanged as well.

"I think it still pretty much holds," Jerry Jeff said. "I always enjoy the same feelings when I'm there that I did before. I found that out during the 'Viva Luckenbach!' recording. It was a lot of fun again."

In October of 1993, Jerry Jeff returned to Luckenbach to celebrate the 20th anniversary of the Viva Terlingua! album by recording another album in the dancehall - "Viva Luckenbach!"

The price of the concert had gone from \$1 to \$50, and the number of tickets was limited to 350 instead of 900. But it was still a big success for both Jerry Jeff and Luckenbach.

"When he recorded the album here last year, it was the best concert I've ever seen him do," Marge said. "It was just wonderful."

Luckenbach's manager, VelAnne Howle, thought the album was wonderful too: "Since the album came out, business has picked up a lot," she said. "Jerry Jeff's a big boost for Luckenbach. He makes it possible for us to make improvements."

But VelAnne quickly added that her relationship with Jerry Jeff and his wife isn't all business. After all, she was a nanny for their kids, and traveled across the country with them in the early '80s.

An hour before the show, Jerry Jeff is doing sound checks in the dancehall, and anyone who hasn't seen him up close might peer through the windows and be surprised. With gray hair, and a couple of days' of gray stubble on his chin, he looks...old.

In fact, he turned 52 last March, but anyone who thinks he can't rock and roll anymore is going to be surprised by the end of the night.

The audience is mostly young fans from Austin or San Marcos, but there are more than a few who have traveled a long way, including a group of middle-aged men who flew in from Portland, Ore. Jerry Jeff's fans are known as the "Tried & True Warriors" after his independent record label, Tried & True Music, managed by his wife, Susan.

"We have a lot of good fans, they have a good spirit about themselves," Jerry Jeff said. "We just played at Billy Bob's (in Fort Worth), and there were 4,000 of them there. They sing along and have a good time, we have a lot of camaraderie in our group now."

Jerry Jeff kicks off the show on time at 9:00, with "Gettin' By," and manages to play "Up Against the Wall Red Neck" and "London Homesick Blues" (he'll play both of

these twice before the end of the night), before a drunk aggravates him enough to leave the stage after the 10th song of the night.

About five minutes later, he's back, launching into a rousing performance of "L.A. Freeway."

By the end of the 2-1/2 hour show, the audience, which had been laid-back and hanging out of the windows at the beginning of the show, was dancing in the aisles and pressed up against the stage while Jerry Jeff was rockin' hard.

He finished with a blazing "Hill Country Rain," to wrap up a very impressive night.

As the fans trickle out of Luckenbach, the scene looks much the same as it must have 20 years ago. The town stands quietly underneath the moon while the night grows cool. It's not so hard to imagine why Jerry Jeff keeps coming back.

"The common thread is Luckenbach itself," he said. "It can't change really... it is what it is."

## NNA wants to keep rule on bank notices

ARLINGTON, VA.—The National Newspaper Association Friday announced that Congress should not only require federally-chartered banks to regularly publish a quarterly statement of financial condition but also require publication of a statement of their local development activities under the Community Reinvestment Act (CRA).

NNA Chairman Michael Parta said the association's call came for publication of banks' community development activities as a result of the association's recent campaign to restore public reporting of the banks' financial condition.

"The American Bankers Association apparently believes that financial condition is no longer locally relevant. We disagree. Bank stability is always locally relevant," said Parta. "If you doubt that, ask who got hurt and who paid in the \$30 billion savings and loan collapse."

"But for local importance, the CRA reports are paramount," Parta said. "Banks regularly report on local lending, promotion and development. The law requires public disclosure of these reports, but the banks hide their light under a bushel by showing the reports only in the obscure corners of bank lobbies."

"We happen to believe that if the law requires banks to make these reports available, they should be published as public notices as the law required for the last 100 years. The

fact is that the public has right to know these things, and banks shouldn't squirrel them away and force people to come into the bank and ask to see them."

The CRA was passed in 1977 requiring banks to maintain their local development roles and to disclose those activities. NNA specifically took no position on the CRA, but noted that Congress had stopped a step short of effective enforcement by not requiring that the reports be published where the public could easily read them.

Community newspapers across the nation have begun a campaign against Sept. 23 repeal of the federal requirement for publication of banks' "call reports" of financial condition.

The repeal was included in the Riegle Community Development and Regulatory Improvement Act of 1994 without hearings, Parta said. "The 104th Congress has an opportunity to restore public awareness of bank stability at the same time it heightens awareness of banks' key role in their communities."

"Newspapers play a similar key role," Parta said, "and community newspapers in particular take an active part in local development. We have consulted a number of local bankers, who tell us they fail to receive due credit for their CRA-related activities. This is an issue whose time has come."

First things first...Happy 40th, Linda!...Thanks for everything you do. I wouldn't trade you for two twenties! I hope you all have had a pleasant holiday—plenty of turkey and all that. Now down to some serious Christmas doin's.

To get you in the spirit you may want to look at *St. Nicholas and the Valley Beyond*. The art work in this book is really beautiful, but I must confess there are a few things about the text that bug me. The book is called "a Christmas legend" but it seems to me that to be considered a legend, a story must have a longer history than this one. Its authorship should be in doubt, as well, though Ellen Kushner wrote this. The tale has some well-intentioned thoughts, I suppose, but I have a problem with another "pseudo-serious" work that drives a wedge between the sacred origins of Christmas and the celebration of it. To be honest, I'm not sure the book would bother me so much if it referred to Santa Claus, rather than use the actual name of the Christian bishop. I'm probably just getting crochety in my wife's old age.

While I'm speaking of Christmas, I'll make my annual exhortation to read *A Christmas Carol* (commonly called, simply, "Scrooge"). I know you've seen the movie and video versions from the old black-and-white movies to Rich Little's interpretation to Mickey Mouse's version. I enjoy them all, (George C. Scott's most of all) but NONE compare to the original—that is, the one you have to READ. Keep in mind that Dickens is an early nineteenth century writer, meaning that there are long passages of narrative, but once you get used to them, and realize the picture of London he is actually describing, your image of a "Dickens Christmas" will likely change. (For example—the Cratchit family is soooo poor, they only have three drinking glasses for the whole family!)

OK, ladies, here's the one you've been waiting for—Burt Reynolds with one of the most ingenious and clever

titles for a biography I have ever seen: *My Life What else is there to say?* This is about Burt Reynolds from the perspective of Burt Reynolds. (And yes, THAT picture is included in the photo section).

Didn't I predict that there would be more Lewis Grizzard books out before long? It wasn't *Always Easy, But I Sure Had Fun* is, according to Mrs. Dedra Grizzard, Lewis's last gift to all his fans. The jacket blurb maintains that the writer was working on this book when he died. Perhaps, but the subtitle, "The Best of Lewis Grizzard," indicates to me that it's a rerun of old articles and book material. A quick flip through, as a matter of fact, revealed a couple of items I have read in another book. No matter, he's worth reading anyway. (I'm still working on a worn out copy of *Kathy Sue Loudermilk, I Love You*).

Personally, I would have trouble taking seriously a man who has the

first name of "Napoleon", but Napoleon Hill has proven himself as a success in various fields. The author of *Think and Grow Rich* now has released *Napoleon Hill's Keys to Success*, subtitled, "The 17 Principles of Personal Achievement." Even a cursory glance indicates that there are some worthwhile points here.

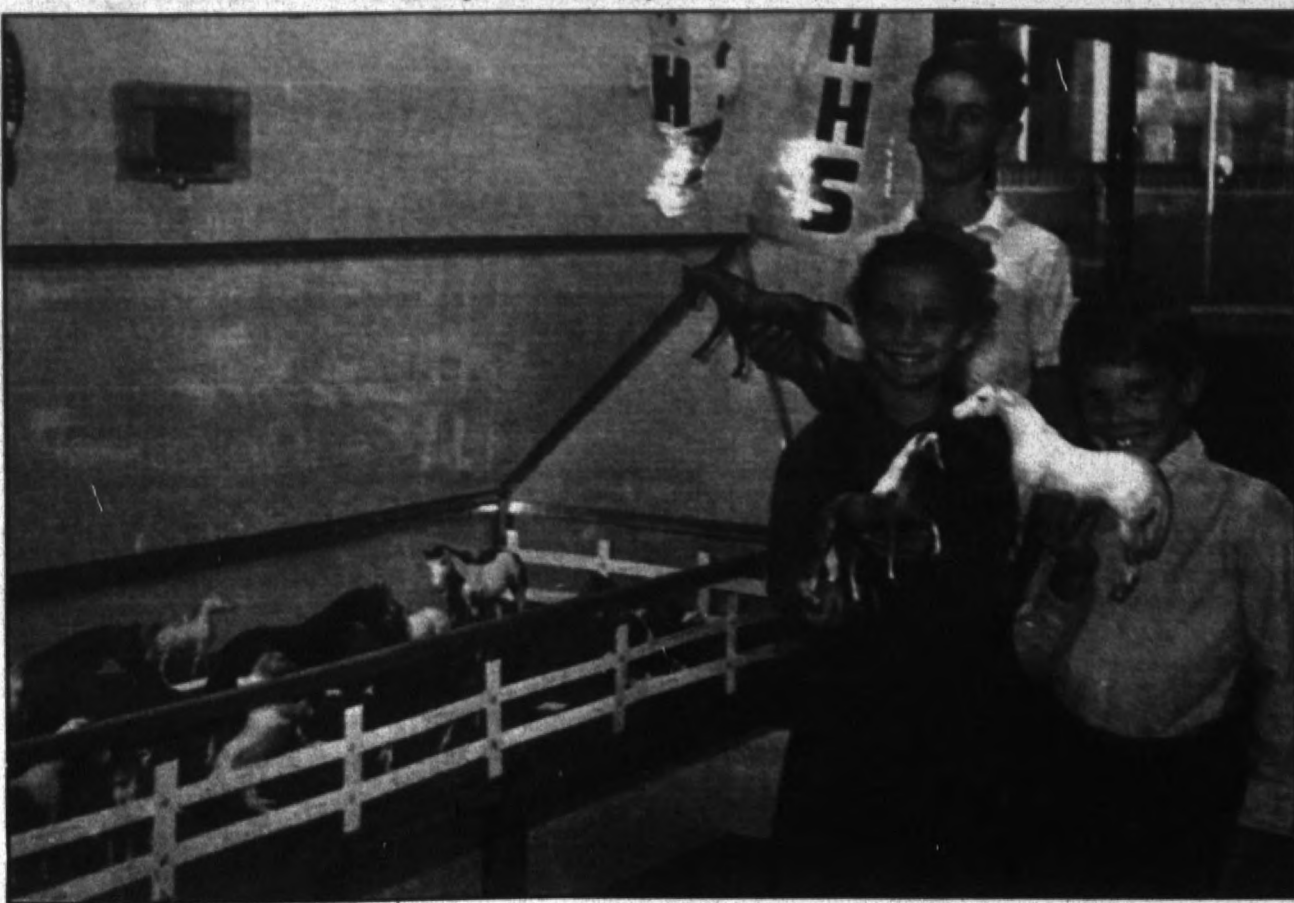

### By BEVERLY HARDER County Extension Agent-H.E. TWELVE GUIDES FOR GIFT SHOPPING

Before you go shopping for any gift, it's always best to have a plan for the gift as well as how much money to spend. These steps can help you become a wiser shopper:

-Budget a set amount for gift buying—the total amount and the amount for each person's gift. Adjust individual amounts as necessary to stay within your total budget.

-Focus on the person to receive the gift rather than on the gift alone. What are their hobbies? What would they enjoy that they would not buy for themselves?

-Take a list with everyone's name you plan to buy gifts for, including their clothing sizes. This helps avoid returns.

Have a place to keep all receipts for gift purchases, in case you need to return items.

-Consider giving gift certificates on money. This works especially well for children other than your own, whose sizes, interests and other gifts you may not know when you're shopping. They can take advantage of year-end sales and avoid being stuck with items they

already own or can't use.

-Look at unusual places. Grocery stores, museums, book stores, craft shows, and mail-order catalogs for a wide range of needs on your list.

-Allow at least three weeks for mail-order purchases. Be cautious in giving credit card numbers for phone purchases from businesses you have not purchased from in the past. Holiday time is not a good time to test their service.

-Give yourself in a special gift certificate. Give an isolated elderly family member a special dinner for the two of you or with your family during a non-holiday time when they will be alone more. Give your children two hours a week to be alone with you to do something they choose to do. Give your spouse an evening a month for you to do something together, or buy season tickets to sports or arts events in the community for the two of you to enjoy.

-If foods are favorite gifts, focus on fruit and fiber foods and avoid high fat and sugar foods. Popcorn, fiber cereal mixes, fresh fruit baskets and gift certificates for meals at a restaurant can help cut the holiday waistline stress.

-Make a New Year's resolution to begin now to plan for next year's gifts so you can take advantage of sales and spread expenses for gift purchases throughout the year.

# MINDING YOUR OWN BUSINESS

## NO FALSE STARTS

In track and field's short sprint events, competitors cannot leave the starting blocks before the firing of the starter's pistol. If anyone moves before the gun goes off, the starter declares a false start by firing a second pistol shot. All runners then return to start the race again.

When I was a young man I raced motorcycles. The starts were always high-tension moments filled with thundering engines and anxious riders. Often, a rider would anticipate the green flag and drop the clutch early. Then, the whole pack would scream into motion only to have the starter call them back because of the false start.

There are also false starts in football, basketball, hockey and most other games. A notable exception the game of life.

Yes, in the greatest race of all - the rat race - there are no penalties for starting early. You do not have to wait for a green flag or a starter's pistol. You can start as early as you like and run the race at your own pace.

If your career is trailing the pack, an early jump strategy will help. If you're a student and your grades aren't what you want them to be, adopt the start early philosophy. If your business is languishing, you can use this sure-fire advantage.

**Start early**  
One of the best lessons I learned in college was the lesson of starting early. I was 38 years old when I decided to earn a college degree. I was concerned that I wouldn't do well against the younger, brighter, better-educated students. Therefore, I took every assignment and every class meeting seriously.

From the first day of class, I worked on getting ahead and staying ahead. I wrote papers weeks before they were due. I read ahead and made copious notes. Suddenly, I found myself at or near the top of my classes.

Though I wasn't the smartest, and I hadn't studied these subjects for more than 20 years, I received the benefit of any early start. Near the end of the semester I experienced very little stress. I slept well the night before big exams. Because of the early start, I felt confident and prepared. On the other hand, the procrastinators frantically tried to play catch up to squeak out a "C" or a "D."

### Jump the gun

Here are four areas where you can get ahead of the pack and secure your future:

- **Education.** Get as much as you can as early as you can. It is much harder to play catch up when you're working, raising a family, traveling or juggling other responsibilities.
- **Retirement.** Don't depend on social security for your retirement. First, it may not survive until you need it. Second, even if you draw social security it will not allow you to enjoy the lifestyle you're accustomed to.

According to David Shipman, the assistant director of West Texas A&M University's Small Business Development Center, one dollar invested at 8 percent in the first year of a 40-year savings plan will grow to a value of \$24.27. Contrast that to the value of the same dollar invested in the 30th-year of the same plan: \$2.22. The early start dollar is worth almost 11 times the later dollar.

• **Your career.** Work hard. Complete projects early. Establish a reputation of being a person who gets the job done early. You become more valuable and a more desirable employee. Also, learn to network early. Develop contracts with people up the career ladder.

• **Integrity.** Start honestly and stay that way. If you never tell the first lie, you'll never have to tell another to cover up. Men and women of integrity earn respect in every walk of life.

National Home Health Care Week is being observed here and across the nation the week of Nov. 27-Dec. 3. Realizing the changes in health care, the special week honors the dedicated professionals who have brought health care back into the homes.

Home health care agencies, such as Deaf Smith Home Care services and other private agencies, send health care professionals to the home of patients who are recovering from an illness or accident. Many patients who are suffering from long-term illness or disability may also be eligible for home health.

"Home health care is the oldest and most humane tradition of health service delivery in the United States, enabling the ill and disabled to receive high-quality medical assistance and retain a sense of dignity and independence in the comfort of their own homes," said

Jim Robinson, CEO of Hereford Regional Medical Center.

He said Deaf Smith Home Care Services, established in 1982 as part of the hospital's circle of care, has experienced tremendous growth in the past few years.

Working with the patient's physicians, home care services devise a plan of treatment that may utilize nurses, aides, therapists, and/or social workers. Healthcare workers visit in the patient's home on a regular basis, as long as the service is needed.

The visits may continue a few days or a few months, depending on the patient's condition and the physician's assessment. In many cases, Medicare and many private insurance companies pay for home health care if the patient meets certain requirements.

During National Home Health Care Week, Robinson said he hopes

that people in the community become aware of the important role this service plays in the changing health care delivery system.

"As the area hospital district, we know that our home care services have given us an added dimension in providing health care for our patient," he said. "We congratulate the dedicated professionals who staff this vital service."

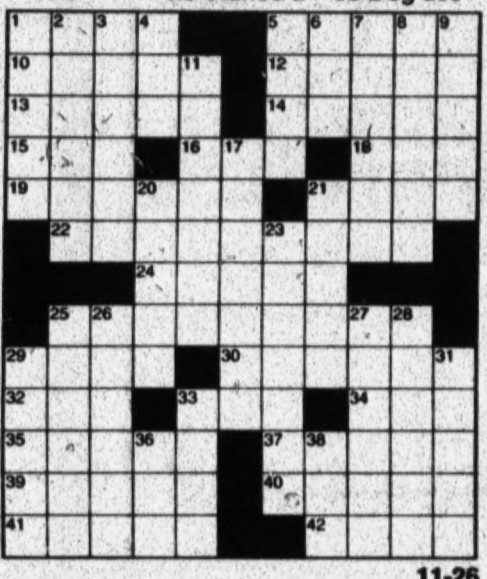

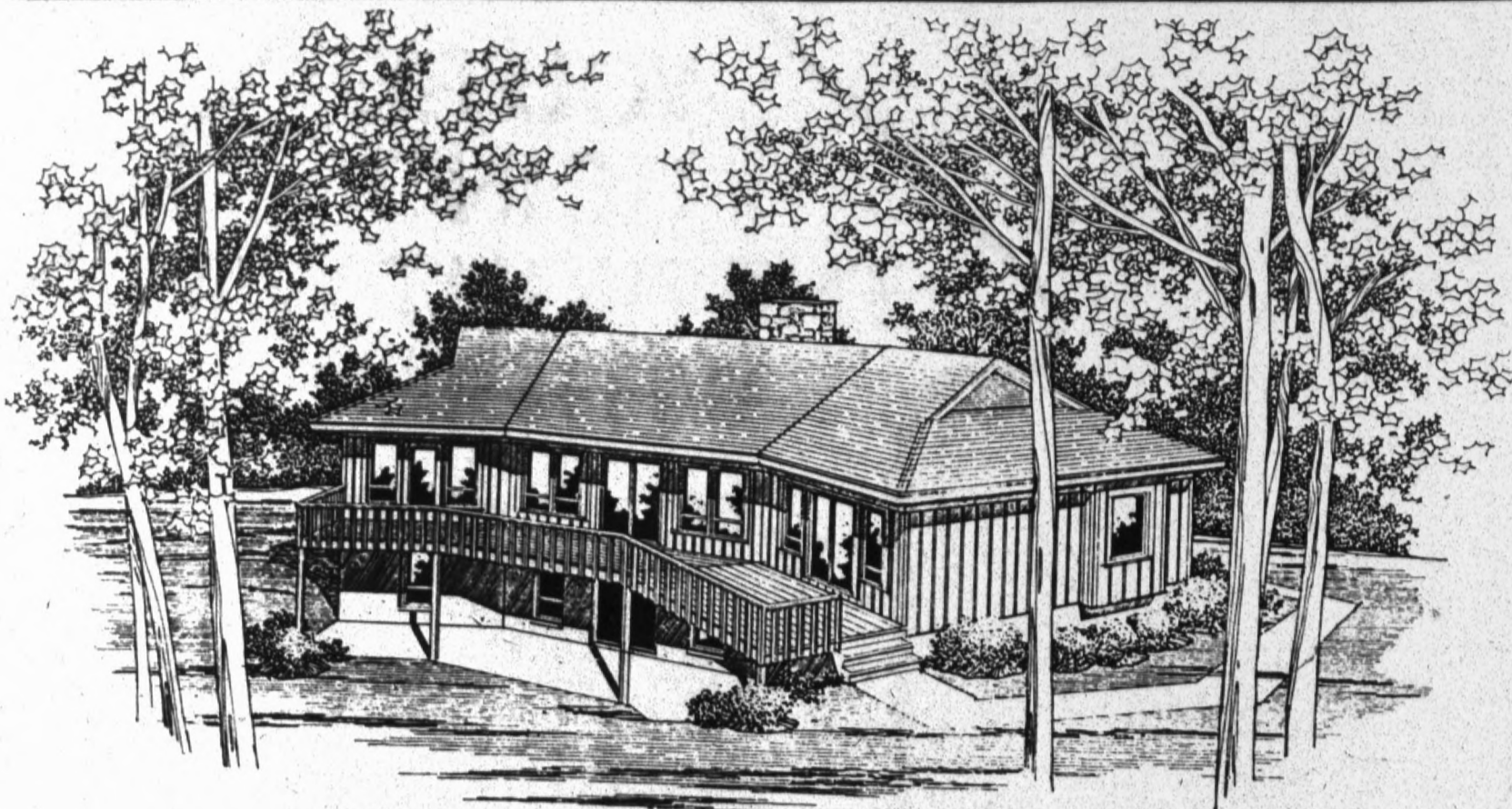

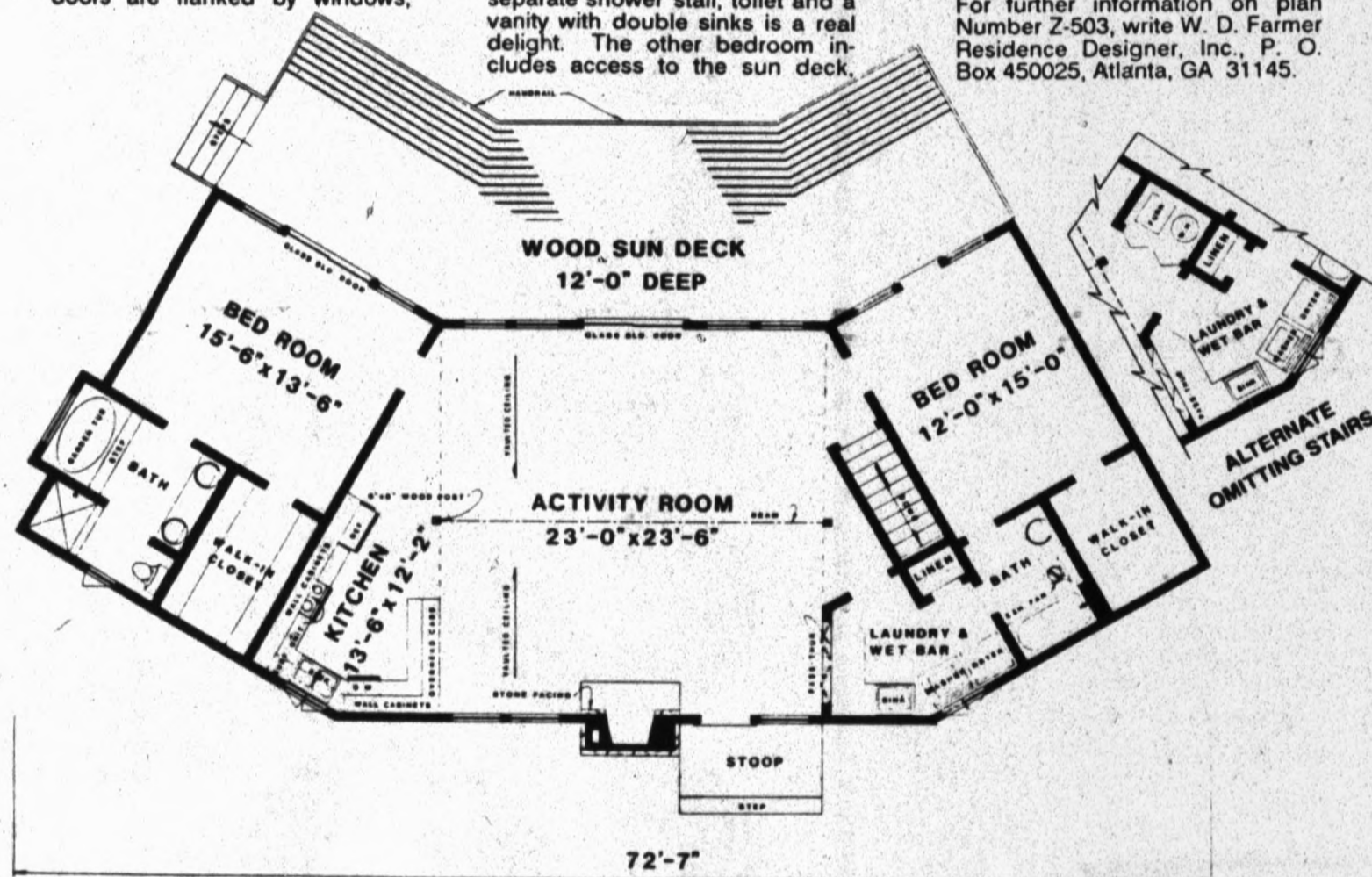

## Family can prepare for power failure

Sooner or later, every family is hit with a power failure.

If the lights suddenly go out and appliances stop running, you may have a blown fuse or a tripped circuit breaker. But if neighboring houses are also blacked out, the problem lies outside your home.

If only part of your house is affected, you may have an overloaded circuit. Turn off a few of the lights and appliances on that circuit. Replace the fuse or reset the circuit

breaker in your home's service panel.

If the fuse blows or the circuit breaker trips again, you probably have a short circuit. Examine all electrical cords for loose connections, frayed sections or defective plugs. If you find nothing, turn off and disconnect all lights and appliances and replace the fuse or reset the circuit breaker again. If the fuse blows or the breaker trips, there may be a short in your house wiring. Call an electrician.

If the house wiring is OK, plug in one appliance at a time until you find the one causing the short circuit. Repair or replace it.

In case of a full power failure, turn

off all lights and appliances in the house to avoid overloading the circuits when the power comes back on. But leave one light or the radio on to alert you when electrical services resume. After power is restored, wait about 10 minutes, then turn on one switch at a time.

An Outage Need Not Be a Disaster

Stock up on flashlights and batteries, including at least one high-power lantern. Keep a transistor radio with extra batteries on hand. Keep plenty of candles (in hurricane-type holders to minimize danger) and perhaps some oil lamps around. Don't keep fuel in the lamps, but know where to find them.

Keep two half-gallon milk cartons filled four-fifths full with water in your freezer.

Learn how to operate your oil or gas furnace manually. If you depend on electric heat, invest in a safe nonelectric heater and be sure it is properly vented.

If you have a fireplace or wood stove, close off all but essential rooms and build a slow-burning fire.

If the outage occurs in midwinter and you have municipal water, open all faucets and let water run slowly to keep pipes from freezing.

Maintain an emergency supply of canned and dry foods, plus a few gallon jugs of fresh water. Replace them regularly.

If you cook with electricity, have a substitute stove on hand - a charcoal grill, a camp stove or canned heat.

CAUTION: Don't cook in an enclosed area. Improperly ventilated fuel fumes can kill you.

If you receive advance warning

of an outage, go grocery shopping and gas up the car.

Clean up your bathtub and fill it with fresh water. Even if you don't depend on a well, public service may be interrupted.

Open the refrigerator as seldom as possible. Food will stay frozen up to 48 hours in a fully loaded freezer that is kept closed, but only 24 hours in a half-loaded freezer. Use defrosted food within two days; don't refreeze food that has thawed completely.

## Question/Answer

Q: I have a long, marble-topped table which was scratched while it was being moved. What can I use to restore the luster and remove the scratches in the marble?

A. NicSand, Inc. of Cleveland, Ohio has a product that you should consider. We have tried the company's Ultra Micro Fine Sanding Gel on a variety of surfaces and found it effective. Although we have not tried it on marble, its manufacturer says it will work on that as well. It's simple to use, just squirt it on, buff it using the foam drill pad which is supplied with the gel, and wash it off.

Don't apply the gel to the scratched area alone. It should be applied evenly over the top (a small section at a time). Otherwise, the polished area will have a higher shine than the rest of the top. Also, try the polishing gel out on an inconspicuous area first. Any polish applied with a power tool can be messy, so work over a drop cloth in a place that won't be harmed by flying polish specks (the work area should be well lighted and free of glare).

Q: We're looking at a project we don't particularly relish - pulling up a sheet vinyl floor. Do you have any suggestions to make the job less traumatic?

A: Removing vinyl-asbestos sheet flooring or resilient floor tiles can be messy, and the thought of dealing with asbestos in the flooring may prompt unnecessary anxiety in homeowners faced with the job. It turns out, that if you treat the flooring carefully, and remove it systematically, the job is no more difficult than other odious jobs faced by remodelers, according to a free booklet from the Resilient Floor Covering Institute.

There's no magic to removing this flooring. With sheet flooring, for instance, you basically make several slices along its length, then pry it up a little at a time while spraying a soapy water solution at the point where the flooring peels away from the sub-strata. The job may be slow, and certainly not a pleasure, but at least using the methods outlined here, it's manageable.

## Investment scams abound; seniors are favorite target

Older Americans are increasingly the favorite targets of scammers using the U.S. mail and interstate telephone lines to pitch crooked investment schemes, warn Postal Inspectors. One convicted con man referred to his senior victims as "WOOPIES" (Well off older people).

Inspectors cite numerous cases worked from coast to coast that repeat a familiar pattern. Investors/victims bankroll the scammers' high rolling lifestyle rather than earning the promised high returns on their investments.

A northeast "financial planner" filched over \$5 million from 40 victims, including elderly members of his own family. He was arrested for mail fraud after causing his clients to obtain second mortgages or refinance existing mortgages to invest their cash in "muni-unit trusts," an investment vehicle unknown to legitimate brokers. Victims who now cannot meet mortgage payments are receiving foreclosure notices. Inspectors tracked this crook down in Venezuela and had him returned to the United States to face charges.

A midwestern savings club operator was indicted in Chicago for defrauding over 623 individuals of more than \$13 million. The savings club plan offered unique incentives to its members--the more cash they invested, the higher rate of return they were promised. Over half their investors were seniors, and many lost their life savings.

A San Diego-based telemarketer was charged with mail fraud after bilking 600 investors of \$7 million through the sale of an "equity plus metals purchase program." The scheme offered unwary investors fraudulent contracts in silver, gold, platinum and palladium. Unfortunately, the only precious metals found in this case were in the pockets of the crooks.

The biggest investment scheme of this year was indicted in Harrisburg, PA. Thirty-four Toronto-based gemstone telemarketers and ten Canadian firms were charged with mail fraud and wire fraud in connection with a scheme to sell vastly overpriced gemstones to thousands of stateside victims, many of them seniors. Their loss? Over \$35 million.

Postal Inspectors have this advice for potential investors:

(1) Be wary of high pressure sales tactics, promises of high investment returns and minimal risks.

(2) Take the time to check out the reputation of the offeror by contacting state and federal regulatory agencies.

(3) Seek advice before investing from trusted friend or family member

and seek professional counsel.

(4) Remember, when it comes to making sound investment decisions, nothing returns more on your investment than doing your homework before you part with your cash.

## Don't drive while on sedating medications

If you choose to drive while taking a sedating medication, you may be cruising for an accident. Many commonly used over-the-counter and prescription medications can cause drowsiness, which may lead to impaired driving performance and increased risk of accidents.

The U.S. Department of Transportation estimates that driving while drowsy contributes to as many as 200,000 motor vehicle accidents and 10,000 fatalities annually. Despite these alarming statistics, the impact on driving performance of medications that caused drowsiness remains an under recognized problem.

Some examples of common medications that can be sedating include sedating antihistamines, antihypertensives, nonsteroidal anti-inflammatory drugs (NSAIDs), antidepressants, cholesterol-lowering drugs, sleep medications and tranquilizers.

To help prevent your driving skills from being impaired, follow these simple tips:

-Ask your doctor about potential side effects, especially sedation, that your prescription medication may cause.

-Read the label when buying an over-the-counter medicine. Look for

key warnings such as "may cause drowsiness," or "avoid operating machinery or a motor vehicle."

-Ask your doctor or pharmacist about alternative medications that do not cause drowsiness.

-Follow your doctor's or pharmacist's instructions about using medications safely and effectively.

-Speak to your doctor before changing the dosage of or stopping a medication.

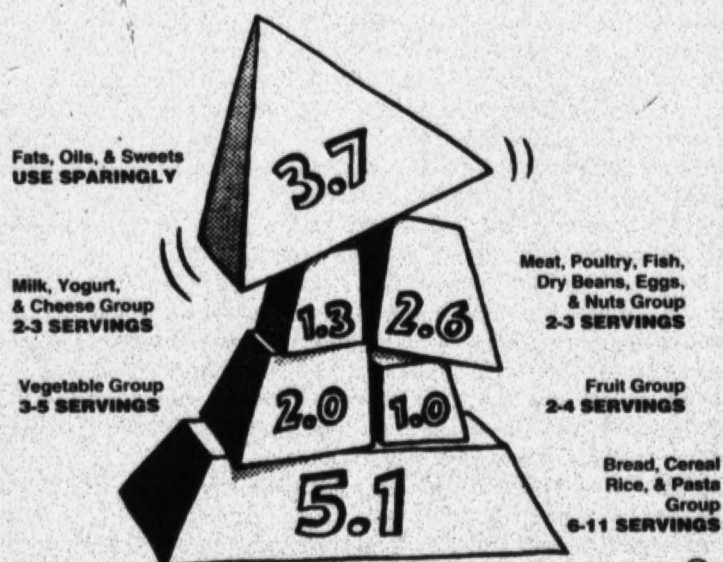
And for those drivers who are not deterred by the risk of an accident, law enforcement officers in several states are taking steps to put the brakes on drug-impaired driving. Currently, laws in 34 states prohibit driving while under the influence of any substance, including common over-the-counter and prescription medications, that can affect driving performance.

## You can win the fight against silent killers

They're quietly slinking across the country and they're out to kill. The silent killers currently stalking 60 million Americans are high blood pressure and diabetes. High blood pressure often sneaks up on people, causing no symptoms until a great deal of damage has been done. The end result of uncontrolled high blood pressure or diabetes can be heart attack or kidney failure.

While diabetes and high blood pressure can happen to anyone, African-Americans are especially at risk. High blood pressure strikes one of four African-Americans, compared with one of six whites, and African-Americans, between ages 30 and 49 develop kidney failure related to high blood pressure 20 times more often than whites. Also, while African-Americans make up only 12 percent of the U.S. population, they account for 20 percent of deaths from diabetes.

Yes, there are two killers preying upon unsuspecting neighborhoods, but there are steps you can take to protect

yourself. For starters, have your blood pressure checked regularly. If you are diagnosed with high blood pressure and need to take medicine, be sure to take it as directed by your doctor and report any side effects. Also, the following lifestyle changes can improve your health:

- Eat a balanced, low-fat diet
- Watch your weight
- Exercise regularly
- Keep salt intake down
- Don't smoke
- Limit alcohol consumption
- Try to reduce stress

To fight the outbreak of kidney disease due to high blood pressure and diabetes in the African-American community, the National Kidney Foundation (NKF) has teamed up with the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People (NAACP). As part of this joint effort, the NKF and NAACP have developed a brochure to educate the public about the dangers of high blood pressure and diabetes and how people can take control of their health if they have these diseases.

### New Study

The Federal Government is also onto these killers and its National Institutes of Health plans to launch the African-American study of kidney disease and high blood pressure. African-Americans who are diagnosed with both high blood pressure and signs of kidney disease will participate in the study. The goal of the study is to find out whether a lower blood pressure level can preserve kidney function and whether certain types of drugs are more effective than others in slowing kidney disease in African-Americans. The drugs which the patients will be taken are Altace, Norvasc and Toprol.

Through the combined efforts of so many, these killers may soon be history.

### SOCIAL SECURITY QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS

**Q:** I heard that Social Security is going to start sending a statement that shows the earnings you have credited to your Social Security account and estimates of Social Security benefits. Is this true?

**A:** It's true that Social Security is sending out a statement next year called a "Personal Earnings and Benefit Estimate Statement." It will not be mailed to everyone, but to approximately 6.7 million people who are 60 or older and not receiving Social Security benefits based on their own earnings. This statement shows how much a person earned over his working life, the taxes paid, and estimates of the benefits for which a worker and his or her family might qualify.

**Q:** I always thought that the retirement age for Social Security was 65 years old but a friend of mine said that a person has to be 67 years old to retire. Who's correct?

**A:** It depends—if you were born before January 2, 1938, you will be eligible for your full Social Security benefit at the age of 65. However, because of longer life expectancies, the full retirement age will be increased in gradual steps until it reaches age 67 by 2027. This change starts in the year 2000 and affects people born in 1938 and later. No matter what your "full" retirement age is, you may start receiving a reduced retirement benefit as early as 62. For more information, contact the Amarillo Social Security office at (806) 376-2241 and ask for the booklet, "Retirement."

**Q:** I'm divorced. Will I be eligible for any Social Security benefits on my ex-husband's Social Security record?

**A:** If you and your ex-husband were married for at least 10 years and if you are at least 62 years of age and currently unmarried, you will be eligible to receive divorced wife's benefits based on his Social Security work record. If your ex-husband is at least 62, you can receive divorced wife's benefits even if he is still working and not yet drawing his own Social Security retirement benefit if you've been divorced from him at least two years.

**Q:** I heard that IRS may delay tax refund that have incorrect Social Security numbers. Is this true?

**A:** Beginning with 1994 Federal income tax returns, the Internal Revenue Service (IRS) will delay processing or returns with missing or incorrect Social Security numbers of taxpayers, spouses or dependents. A Social Security number is incorrect when the name and number on the tax return don't match the name and number in IRS records. People who expect refunds will be particularly impacted by this policy. If the return does not include the correct Social Security numbers, IRS must have the correct information before issuing a refund. If you know, or are not sure, that your current name does not match your Social Security record, contact us immediately and we will assist you in correcting your records or verify that your records are accurate.

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# Nutrition Notes

Fats and Oils:  
A Balancing Act

As a nutrition savvy consumer, we each want to enjoy tasty meals while cutting down on fat to achieve a healthful eating style. You want to walk away from the table completely satisfied. Fats and oils play an important role in a healthful diet by adding taste and variety to foods. However, nutrition experts agree that most Americans should eat less fat than they currently do.

Fat counts for good health. It is an essential nutrient because the body cannot produce it on its own and must get it from the diet. Fat not only provides energy for daily activities, but also supplies the body with vitamins A, D and E, needed for healthy skin and optimal growth. Fat is found in many plant and animal foods. Typically, animal fats such as butter, beef tallow, and lard contain more saturated fat than do vegetable fats. Some vegetable oils such as coconut and palm oils are solid at room temperature because they contain saturated fat. Sources of unsaturated fat include nuts, vegetable oils, and soft margarine products.

All fats are not created equal. Research shows that excessive intake of saturated fats tend to raise blood cholesterol levels thereby increasing your risk for heart disease. To limit total fat intake, choose foods that contain unsaturated fat and fewer foods that are high in saturated fat. Margarine products and liquid

vegetable oil have little saturated fat and contains no cholesterol.

Fitting fats and oils into your diet. To make vegetable oils more versatile, they are often hardened by a process called hydrogenation. During the hydrogenation process some of the fats are changed to become Trans fatty acids. Trans fatty acids also occur naturally in beef, pork, lamb, butter, and milk. There is little scientific evidence to suggest that current consumption levels of Trans fatty acids need to be changed. Health professionals agree, however, that reducing total fat and saturated fat intake are most important dietary changes you can make to promote better health. Whether you are trying to find a healthy weight, lower cholesterol levels, or just eat a healthful diet, on reducing fat.

Moderation—the key to a healthful diet.

Eating a variety of foods in moderate amounts is the best way to balance your meals. To help you do this refer to the U.S. Department of Agriculture Food Guide Pyramid, this practical guide to choosing a healthful eating pattern was the subject of the last two nutrition updates. As review, the pyramid recommends eating a variety of foods from each food group to meet your nutrient needs and to supply you with the right amounts of servings to maintain a healthy weight.

The food Guide Pyramid encourages an eating pattern based on grains, fruits, and vegetables that provide fiber, vitamins A and C. Lower fat

dairy products such as skim and low fat milk provide calcium and lean meats supply iron. Fats and oils like margarine products add flavor and texture to many foods and fit into a healthful diet as long as you keep total fat under control.

Check all the facts—the Nutrition Facts.

Now, most food labels carry a Nutrition Facts panel which lists the amount of calories, calories from fat, total fat, saturated fat, and cholesterol. By reading the Nutrition Facts panel

on butter, Margarine, and oils you can learn to make wise food choices. The new food label is an excellent tool to help you include your favorite foods in a healthful diet while keeping your fat intake at the recommended levels.

Here are some ways to balance fats and oils in a healthful diet:

1. Flavor vegetables, pasta, and popcorn with soft or squeeze margarine products, a variety of spices, lemon, or vinegar. Use stick margarine for baking and sauteing.
2. Spread soft margarine or fruit

preserves on toast or bagels.

3. Create bean salads such as chickpea and black bean with a splash of lemon, spices, and your choice of oil, such as soybean, canola, or safflower.

4. Try lower fat or fat-free versions of your favorite margarines, salad dressings, or mayonnaise.

5. Read the Nutrition Facts on food labels to determine which margarine product contains the most unsaturated fat and least saturated fat.

## Anticipate changes when you retire

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## Arthritis update

What you don't know about arthritis can hurt you, cautions the Arthritis Foundation. Pay attention to the following three common warning signs:

- Pain
- Swelling
- Stiffness or loss of movement.

If you experience any of these symptoms in or around joints for more than two weeks, the Arthritis Foundation recommends that you contact your doctor. Although there are no cures yet for most forms of arthritis, you can prevent or delay much of the pain and disability by early diagnosis and treatment.

Because there are more than 100 arthritis-related diseases, getting a correct diagnosis is an essential first step in developing an effective treatment plan. Treatments vary depending on the type of arthritis you have. The information you share with your doctor, along with a physical exam and laboratory tests, will help the doctor and other members of your health-care team determine what is wrong. Together, you can design a treatment program that may include medications, exercise, joint protection and rest.

The Arthritis Foundation estimates that six million Americans are self-diagnosed. This group includes people who think they have arthritis but have not yet seen a doctor.

Recent studies on antibodies may offer ways to stop arthritis inflammation. The Arthritis Foundation, which helped fund two of the studies, note that the findings are significant steps toward effective treatments for autoimmune forms of arthritis such as rheumatoid arthritis and lupus.

People produce unique antibodies

to identify and bind with foreign bacteria or viruses, so that the body's white blood cells can destroy them. This binding is described as a key fitting a lock. In autoimmune types of arthritis, antibodies identify and bind with healthy joint tissue, causing swelling, pain, loss of movement and joint destruction.

Studies at the University of Tennessee at Memphis, the University of Michigan and Dartmouth Medical School have explored this binding process in animal models.

University of Tennessee researchers have developed a synthetic collagen peptide capable of stopping the inflammatory immune reaction in mice. At the University of Michigan, research has shown that antibodies change the structure of DNA molecules in people with lupus to create a tighter bond with the antibody. Researchers at the Dartmouth Medical School have found that the effects of arthritis can be blocked by treatment with a synthetic antibody.

Practical applications are in the future; however, the studies indicate the potential benefits from increased research funding. For general information about arthritis and a free "Basic Facts" brochure, call the Arthritis Foundation Information Line, 1-800-283-7800.

## What about health care costs?

Out-of-control health care inflation has been the most volatile force in the American workplace for at least a decade. Bold, comprehensive reform of the health care system is essential for a productive economy, for the creation of good-paying jobs in future years, and for harmonious labor relations.

In recent years, employer demands for health benefit give-backs-fueled by double-digit medical inflation-have provoked almost 80 percent of all strike activity, costing the U.S. economy at least \$2 billion a year.

Unless there is a national solution to this national problem, we are going to see labor-management confrontations of epic proportions in the coming years.

Workers know that it's not just employers who bear the burden of today's rampant medical inflation. The workers themselves pay, both directly through higher deductibles and co-payments and indirectly through smaller paychecks.

Last year, American families - unionized and non-union alike - suffered the equivalent of a five percent cut in take-home pay due to exploding health care costs, according

to a study commissioned by the Service Employees union.

Clearly, the deferral of wage increases in favor of maintaining employer-paid health benefits has been a major factor in the steady drop in real earnings since the 1970s. The White House estimates that a worker would earn \$1,000 more today if health care took no more of a bite out of wages and benefits than it did in 1975. What's worse, if the system isn't reformed, real wages will fall another \$600 per year by the end of the decade.

Medical inflation also is a driving force behind the growth of the contingent labor pool for temporaries and part-timers-only 15 percent of whom receive any health benefits at all.

No wonder that two million more Americans dropped out of the health insurance system last year, bringing the total of people without health coverage to a record 38.5 million. These uninsured citizens do receive medical services, but it's usually in the form of expensive emergency room treatment whose cost is passed along to the rest of us through higher insurance premiums.

Health care now accounts for 14 percent of the Gross National Product, up from nine percent a dozen years ago, putting a squeeze on capital

expansion and our ability to finance needed improvements on infrastructure, education, retraining and other programs vital to American competitiveness.

America's health care crisis demands bold action - a complete restructure of our health care delivery system such as the President has proposed. His plan would guarantee every American a comprehensive package of health benefits while also prescribing cost controls and financing based on ability to pay.

The various alternative plans amount to nothing more than tinkering with a system that is beyond repair. They don't guarantee universal coverage or comprehensive benefits, they don't bring all employers into the system and they don't provide an effective mechanism for controlling costs. Most important, these halfway reform plan won't get the issue of benefit cost-shifting off the labor management bargaining table.

If we can stop fighting over medical cost-shifting, perhaps union leaders and employers can start laying the foundation for genuine cooperation, and start discussing how to build high-production workplaces that sustain high-wage jobs for America's future economic health.



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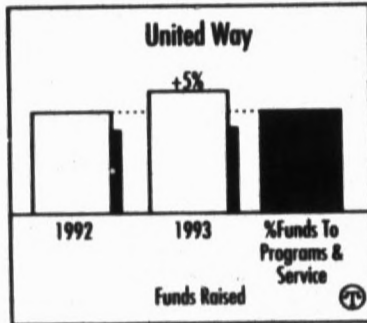

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## Spotlight on health

## What your cholesterol means

Cholesterol is too important to ignore!

Cholesterol, in the proper amount, is essential to the body. However, high levels of cholesterol increase the chance of developing coronary heart disease, the single largest cause of death in the United States.

The National Cholesterol Education Program recommends that adults over age 20 be screened for high blood cholesterol at least every five years.

**Blood Cholesterol Testing** - The ideal total blood cholesterol level is less than 200. While it is important to know your total blood cholesterol level, it is also helpful to know your individual HDL and LDL levels. Your total blood cholesterol level to HDL ratio is one of the keys to identifying your risk of heart disease.

**LDL**-Low density lipoprotein (LDLs) are called "bad" cholesterol because they correlate with increased risk of heart disease. Since LDL levels can greatly affect the risk of heart attack, it can be a better predictor of heart attack risk than total blood cholesterol.

Desirable LDL-below 130;  
Borderline high LDL-130-159 mg/dl;  
High LDL-160 mg/dl

**HDL**-High density lipoprotein (HDL's) are called "good" cholesterol because increase levels protect against heart attack. In the average man, HDL-cholesterol levels range from 40 to 50 mg/dl; in the average woman, from 50

to 60. HDL-cholesterol of less than 35 mg/dl is considered abnormally low.

To determine your ratio, divide your total cholesterol by your HDL measurement. Ideally, this number should be 4.5 or less.

**Preventing High Blood Cholesterol**-Although some risk factors for heart disease cannot be prevented, such as age, gender, and family history, three major risk factors can be controlled including high blood cholesterol, high blood pressure and smoking.

To lower bad cholesterol (LDL):  
-Reduce your intake of cholesterol-rich foods like red meat and dairy products:

-Replace saturated fats like butter with vegetable spreads and monounsaturated fats like olive oil;  
-Eat more fruits and vegetables.

While LDL cholesterol responds primarily to diet, HDL levels are most responsive to weight loss and exercise.

To increase good cholesterol (HDL):

-Exercise for 30 minutes, three or four times a week;

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# Stroke not just your grandparent's disease

When many people hear the word "stroke," they may consider it to be something that affects their parents, grandparents, or some other distant relative. But what they may not know is that 28 percent of all strokes occur in people under 65—meaning anyone could be at risk.

Although the possibility of having a stroke may seem remote, stroke strikes thousands of young to middle-aged adults every year. Despite this, many Americans know little about stroke. In fact, a study conducted by the National Stroke Association found that 97 percent of people don't even know the warning signs of stroke. Often referred to as a "brain attack," a stroke occurs when the blood flow to the brain is suddenly interrupted. Its devastating effects—from paralysis to loss of memory and speech—make stroke the leading cause of adult disability and third leading cause of death.

"Many younger to middle-aged people simply don't believe stroke can affect them. They may shrug it off as just an 'old folks' disease," says Fletcher McDowell, M.D., president of the National Stroke Association. "But people in this age group are affected by stroke. And with recent studies showing the key risk factors of smoking and obesity on the rise, the incidence of stroke among these adults may even increase."

Dr. McDowell's words reinforce why it's so important for younger and middle-aged people to get the facts about stroke—what it is, how it's caused and how to spot the warning signs. Common risk factors among people in this age group include high blood pressure, high cholesterol, eating a diet high in fat and smoking. Some of these risk factors hold even greater danger for women than men—some studies suggest that women over 30 who smoke and use high-estrogen oral contraceptive elevate their risk to a startling 22 times the average risk among this group. But with the right education, those with risk factors can take steps to prevent stroke early and learn to recognize the warning signs before it's too late.

Probably the most significant warning sign of a stroke is a "ministroke" or transient ischemic attack (TIA). A TIA typically lasts a few minutes and causes no permanent damage, but can be a serious foreshadowing: 36 percent of people who have a TIA will go on to have a full stroke. The symptoms of a TIA—which are identical to the symptoms of a full stroke—include

sudden blurred or decreased vision in one or both eyes, difficult speaking or understanding language, numbness or weakness in an arm, leg or side of the body, or loss of balance. A TIA can often be the wake-up call for people at risk to make some healthy lifestyle changes. Quitting smoking, eating foods low in fat and cholesterol, exercising and controlling weight are all ways that most people can begin to chart a course for prevention.

In addition, research has proven that there is another way to prevent a full stroke from occurring—*aspirin*. While many people already know that aspirin, when used under a physician's supervision, can help prevent a second heart attack, many don't know that medical research has also supported aspirin's use in preventing recurrent stroke.

Ischemic stroke are similar to heart attacks in that they result from blood clots blocking blood vessels. By reducing the tendency of blood platelet to clot, aspirin allows blood to flow freely throughout the body. Doctors began recommending aspirin as preventive therapy for recurrent strokes in 1980 after the U.S. Food and Drug Administration (FDA) approved its use in treating patients who had suffered TIAs.

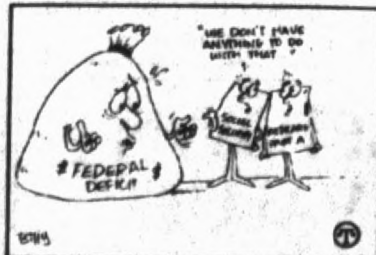
"Many doctors have found aspirin therapy to be a valuable prevention tool for their patients at risk for stroke," says Dr. McDowell. "An aspirin regimen, along with healthy lifestyle changes, has been proven to significantly benefit these individuals."

Most people can take aspirin without any stomach discomfort. For the two to six percent who actually experience stomach upset, however, doctors often recommend an enteric or safety coated version. This formula is designed specifically for people on an aspirin regimen. See your doctor to determine if aspirin therapy may be right for you.

### Lemon Lamb with Mint

Vegetable oil spray\* 1/2 teaspoon freshly ground black pepper, or to taste  
 2 teaspoons acceptable vegetable oil\*\* 2 tablespoons chopped fresh mint leaves  
 2 small cloves garlic, minced 8 loin lamb chops  
 1/2 cup water 1 tablespoon fresh lemon juice

Preheat broiler. Lightly spray a broiler pan with vegetable oil. Pour oil into a skillet over medium-high heat. Add garlic and sauté. Stir in water, lemon juice and pepper. Bring to a boil and reduce heat to simmer. Sprinkle mint over mixture and simmer about 10 minutes. Cover and set aside.

Place chops on broiler pan about 6 inches from heat source. Broil 5 minutes on each side, or until done to taste.

Transfer chops to serving dish and pour hot lemon-mint mixture over meat.

Serves 4; 2 chops per serving.

## Do you have high blood pressure?

According to the American Heart Association (AHA) 25 percent of adult Americans have high blood pressure. What's more, the AHA says that about 35 percent of those who have it don't even know it. That's why it's so important to have your blood pressure measured regularly by your doctor.

In young adulthood and early middle age, high blood pressure is more prevalent among men than women; after that, the reverse is true, although anyone can have it at any age.

Fortunately, if you do have high blood pressure, you can deal with it. Blood pressure can be controlled through exercise, diet and sometimes medication.

Because of the risk associated with high blood pressure, some companies are offering to help make medication more affordable. Hoechst-Roussel Pharmaceutical Inc., for example,

offers its Price Pledge 2000 guarantee that the manufacturer's price, an important part of the total cost of drugs, will not rise on its antihypertensive product, Altace (ramipril), through the rest of this century.

## Know your doctor and yourself

If you're like many women, you may not be receiving all the medical tests you should. A recent Roper/Mycylex-7 survey polling 1,038 U.S. women ages 18+ found that those who exclusively see a gynecologist versus a general practitioner as a primary physician receive more comprehensive annual exams.

While 51 percent of women seeing internists received external (breast and abdominal) examinations, gynecologists versus a general practitioner as a primary physician receive more comprehensive annual exams.

To avoid missing important screenings, Ramona I. Slupik, M.D., Northwestern University Medical School, advises:

-Tell your doctor up front that he/she is your "one and only" or it may be assumed another physician is giving certain tests;

-In addition to the annual gynecological exam, expect checks of your blood pressure, weight, urine, cholesterol and pulse;

-Keep your own checklist of tests performed as a safeguard;

-Request a copy of your medical records to personally track your health history.

## Suffering, will to survive are focus of new NBC movie



Ann-Margret stars as Ingalill Lundquist, a woman who recaptures her independence and discovers who she can become after her emotionally abusive and unsupportive husband dies, in *Following Her Heart*, Monday on NBC.

A drama of suffering and strength combined with a little humor is the premise for *Following Her Heart*, an NBC movie premiering Monday, Nov. 28.

Ann-Margret stars as a woman who finds the strength inside her to survive a loveless marriage, an unsupportive husband and a lack of independence.

As a way of persevering in the marriage, Ann-Margret's character, Ingalill Lundquist, dreams of performing at the Grand Ole Opry in Nashville.

"Her predicament is so extreme coming from this strict and repressive background," co-star George Segal says. "Having this desire through that to perform and get out there and kick her heels up, which makes her unique in that category, you would think that her spirit would have been broken, and instead it gives her more resolve."

Segal portrays Harry, a widower in the tour group traveling to Nashville that Ingalill joins after her husband's death.

"I find her and we presumably will get each other out of this and go forward to a kind of happiness — a kind of midlife happiness," Segal says. "She's like an inspiration to me, as I become to her."

After her husband's death, Ingalill is excited about the opportunity to live her own life. Sadly, her dreams are shattered when her husband leaves her financial affairs in the hands of Kenny, their only daughter's husband.

Kenny, who is very much like Ingalill's husband, immediately takes advantage of the situation. And once again, Ingalill finds herself controlled by someone else, prompting her to join the tour group.

"It is a literal journey, in terms of where she's going, and also an interior journey, in all the people and the kind

of effect that they have on her," director Lee Grant comments. "The trip that she takes from North Dakota to Nashville on this bus tour is a kind of journey of revelation for her."

The people she meets on the tour help Ingalill gain insight into the kind of person she was, the life she led and who she would like to become.

"She had a prearranged marriage in Sweden when she was very young to a much, much older man," Ann-Margret says. "And he was very cruel to her. Just very cold. And she thought that that was her lot in life."

With the help of Harry, Ingalill discovers there is more to her and that she can have a life of her own.

"I think people change each other," Segal comments. "If you give somebody a chance to enter your life, you'll change, only because you let them in."

"We're all such private people and all essentially defensive from all threatening kinds of situations, that when we let the barriers down and go for it, we are always rewarded."

The movie is a story of self-discovery. It is a story of one woman's journey to recapture her independence and her sense of worth.

"She always has been a very courageous lady," Ann-Margret says. "But she has been so deeply repressed and so horrendously frightened. She's not physically abused by her husband, but mentally and emotionally; he never gives her credit for being anything."

Grant effectively uses human suffering to create a movie that will touch the hearts of many people.

"That seems to be Grant's specialty both in acting and in directing," Segal says. "... getting the human values — the truth — the true human values out of any situation."

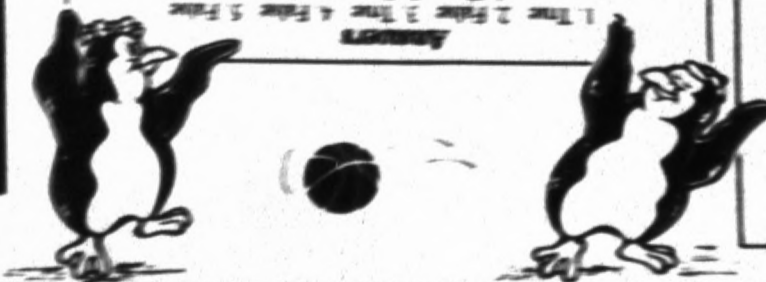

### Hapless Hoosier's dizzying ascent to executive suite provides premise for *The Hudsoner Proxy*

Anyone expecting filmmaking brothers Joel and Ethan Coen to settle down and make an average, everyday film better not hold his breath.

Their latest, *The Hudsoner Proxy*, is now available on home video. It's a delightfully bizarre fairy tale that seems at once nostalgic (reminiscent of films like *The Front Page* and *Desk Set*), yet only vaguely connected to a world recognizable as Earth. Tim Robbins is perfect as business-school graduate Norville Barnes, fresh off the train from Indiana and full of dreams of a "normal" career. But opportunities are scarce, so Norville is forced to accept a dehumanizing position in the mail room of Hudsoner Industries, a scandalously profitable manufacturer of, well, one never really knows.

When Hudsoner himself commits suicide, the board of directors, led by a scowling Paul Newman (in his best performance in years), determines to put a nobody in as president, drive the stock values way down and buy up

every share. Guess what "schmo" finds himself moved from the mail-room to the executive suite in one dizzying day?

Jennifer Jason Leigh plays a reporter who resolves to unravel Norville's unaccountable ascendancy, only to fall for the hapless Hoosier's goofy charm. And when Norville's pet project, the Hula Hoop, gives him sudden credibility and an ego as wide as Montana, Leigh is there to cut him down to size.

Other recommended recent video releases include: *The Paper*, Ron Howard's not-entirely-credible-but-always-entertaining story of a day in the life of a harried New York City newspaper staff; *Belle Epoque*, the sexy Spanish movie with the French name that won this year's Oscar as best foreign language film; and *Serial Mom*, John Waters' tale of a smiling, nurturing Baltimore housewife (Kathleen Turner) who has a unique way of handling those who offend her, slight her, mistreat her children, or, worst of all, wear white shoes after Labor Day.
