## Schools reach out to aid Oklahoma bomb victims

Hereford school students, touched by the emotion of last week's bombing in Oklahoma City, have begun reaching out to the victims -- and easing their own grief at the same time.

Members of the Industrial Technology Club at Hereford Junior High School on Tuesday planted a tree in front of the building, then in a short ceremony named it for one of the victims of the bombing.

Meanwhile, at Tierra Blanca, HJH, Northwest, Shirley schools, students this week are raising money that will be sent to a variety of relief efforts.

The HJH tree -- a Scotch Pine -- was planted by sponsor Terry Zimmerman after school dismissed for the day.

A small group of club members, teachers and other students watched as he put the tree in the ground. Club members Cody Hunt, John McWhorter and Matt Lopez helped Zimmerman pat the dirt in place and water it.

The tree will be named "Baylee" after 1-year-old Baylee Almon, who died in the blast, but who grabbed the heart of the nation when a picture appeared of a firefighter taking her from the wreckage soon after the bombing.

At Tierra Blanca School, a journal entry by third-grader Anthony

Mendoza in Emily Christie's class has birthed a school-wide fundraising effort.

The class had recently won a \$50 prize from winning a school-wide fundraiser, with the funds to be used for anything they wanted.

Class members were considering a trip to Wonderland Park when the bombing occurred.

Mendoza wrote in his journal that something should be done to help the victims.

As a result, several students approached their teacher and asked if they could use their winnings to help in Oklahoma.

Assistant Principal Sharon Hodges said the class then took notes around to all other classes, challenging them to help as well.

The slogan of the drive is "Oklahoma Tears Are Shared by Tierra Blanca Students."

Collection buckets have been placed in the library and students are bringing money.

The collection will continue through Friday.

Mrs. Hodges said the school is in contact with First Christian Church in Oklahoma City to determine where to send the money.

She said students want it to go to children, possibly to rebuild one of two day care centers hit by the blast, or to buy toys for a center.

Fundraisers also are under way at

Hereford Junior High, Northwest Primary and Shirley School.

At HJH, the Red Team has challenged all other teams to raise money by giving the price of two candy bars -- \$1 -- this week.

Those funds will be turned over to the American Red Cross at the end of the week.

The Red Cross also will benefit from a Northwest School fundraiser.

There, students who have just completed a fundraiser to buy trees for the playground opted to continue their efforts one more week.

Teacher Terry Fortenberry said students will collect aluminum cans all week and sell them for cash.

She hopes to raise between \$50 and \$75 this week. Betty Henson, executive director of the Deaf Smith County Unit of the American Red Cross, will be at the school Friday to collect the donation.

Also at Northwest, on Friday students will tie ribbons to the new trees in the playground to show their support and concern for the bomb victims.

At Shirley, students and teachers will be allowed to wear hats and caps to school on Friday -- provided they pay first.

For a 25-cent donation, students can cover their heads all day Friday.

Funds raised through that effort will go to an as-yet undetermined relief effort.

## HISD approves PSF 10-year abatement

Hereford Independent School District trustees on Tuesday approved a 10-year tax abatement for Premium Standard Farms despite concerns raised by one trustee about the size of the abatement.

Trustee Jim Marsh questioned giving PSF a 50 percent abatement for 10 years, which would amount to a total 500 percent abatement.

Previously, he said, abatements were limited to 475 percent.

County Judge Tom Simons, who attended the meeting along with representatives of the County Commission, City Commission and Hospital Board, said the previous largest was 375 percent given a few years ago for a \$13 million expansion at Holly Sugar.

Simons also said that Plainview gave Wal-Mart a 100 percent abatement for 15 years -- or 1,500 percent -- to get that facility.

Trustee Mike Veazey, who represents the school board on the tax abatement board, said state laws allow any size abatement for 10 years, but that local policy limited them to 475 percent.

That, he noted, was changed in

light of the PSF move.

Trustee Ron Weishaar complained that school trustees were not notified about the change in tax abatement board policy that raised the limit.

"I don't know who to place the blame on," Weishaar said, noting that the school board does not need other entities such as the tax abatement board making decisions for the school board.

However, Weishaar conceded, "It's hard to argue with everyone here" and that he would not "upset the apple cart for \$1,500 a year," the difference between the 475 percent and 500 percent figures.

Veazey forestalled further discussion about the change, noting that the purpose of the agenda item was not to discuss that, but to vote on the abatement.

Veazey made a motion to approve the abatement, with Trustee Joe Flood offering a second.

Brian Paulson of PSF was on hand at the meeting. He presented artists renderings of the Hereford plant, plus a plan showing the overall layout of the area, including parking lots, roads and a lake for water runoff.

Paulson said the plant will be 300,000 square feet, with hog pens

at one end for temporary holding of hogs coming from the Dalhart plant.

He estimated it will cost \$60 million to \$65 million to build the plant, including land acquisition and will employ "probably 500 people," although that could fluctuate.

Paulson said the plant will process 9,000 hogs a day on a dual shift, with some 75 trucks passing in and out of the plant daily.

Superintendent Charles W. Greenawalt said Tax Assessor Fred Fox has estimated that the district will receive \$318,410 a year in taxes even with the 50 percent abatement.

That figure, he noted, is an estimate and, depending on the equipment deemed part of the abatement, could go higher.

After the 10th year is up, the school district would receive the full taxes.

Following debate on the issue, a final vote was taken, which was 7-0 in favor of approving the abatement.

In other action, trustees voted to spend about \$10,000 to put down asphalt paved areas on the playgrounds at Stanton, Bluebonnet, Northwest and Aikman schools this summer.

The request came following a survey earlier this year of principals concerning their playground equipment needs.

Those schools said they needed asphalt areas for games and activities.

Assistant superintendent Don Cumpston said the requirements will be different at each school and will be painted according to the needs of those schools, for different ball games, or whatever.

Trustees also voted to apply for waivers for Hereford Junior High for

## Bipartisan tax plan being offered

WASHINGTON (AP) - A bipartisan tax reform proposal permitting Americans to deduct every dollar they save or invest is entering a crowded field of plans vying to replace the current income tax.

Senate Budget Committee Chairman Pete V. Domenici, R-N.M., and Sen. Sam Nunn, D-Ga., introduced their Unlimited Savings Allowance tax legislation Tuesday.

"The central objective is to raise the level of national savings because there is a direct relationship between how much we save and the real income of working Americans," Domenici said.

Even as the Senate prepares to take up the House-passed "Contract With America" tax cuts, sweeping tax reform is developing into a major issue for the 1996 presidential race.

Senate Majority Leader Bob Dole of Kansas, considered the front-running GOP presidential contender, and House Speaker Newt Gingrich, R-Ga., have asked former Housing Secretary Jack Kemp to lead a commission to evaluate various tax proposals.

They include flat-rate income tax plans, pushed by House Majority

Leader Dick Armey, R-Texas, and Sen. Arlen Specter, R-Pa., also a presidential candidate; and a national sales tax advocated by another White House hopeful, Sen. Dick Lugar, R-Ind.

Domenici conceded his proposal was more complex than the flat tax but said it nevertheless would reduce the current 10,000-page tax code to about 300 pages.

## Probation revoked on man

A defendant who failed to abide by terms of probation was sentenced to seven years in prison Tuesday during a session of 222nd District Court.

Judge David Wesley Gulley ordered probation revoked for Anthony John Mondragon, convicted earlier of burglary of a building. His original sentence was 10 years deferred adjudication.

Three defendants entered guilty pleas to charges and terms of probation of another defendant were modified.

To a charge of forgery by passing, Valerie Ann Leal, 20, pled guilty and was given a five-year deferred adjudication probation sentence. She

Terms of probation on two convictions for felony driving while intoxicated against Rolando Rene Ramirez were modified. He was ordered to enter the Texas Department of Criminal Justice substance abuse felony punishment facility.

## Death toll nears 100 in OKC

OKLAHOMA CITY (AP) - At 9:02 a.m. today, the city stood still.

Exactly a week after the catastrophic truck-bomb attack, Gov. Frank Keating blew a whistle and then briefly joined hands with his wife at the ruined federal building.

The droning boom of cranes removing rubble ceased. At least one officer removed his glasses and wiped a tear; a worker made the sign of the cross.

Drivers pulled off the highways throughout the city of 445,000 residents. Conversations ended in mid-sentence at the church where families were getting the news that their loved ones had died. But outside, Air Force personnel continued to load supplies into trucks and vans, heading them toward the bomb site.

The moment was observed across the nation. St. Patrick's Cathedral in New York City passed its bells; the Iowa and Nebraska legislatures took a pause from their sessions.

Keating had asked for the moment of silence to mark the time seismologists say the bomb - now estimated to have weighed 4,800 pounds - destroyed the Alfred P. Murrah Federal Building a week ago today.

The bomb's toll climbed to 98 today, and investigators pressed a search for their most-wanted suspect.

Brothers James and Terry Nichols, previously held as witnesses, were charged Tuesday as conspirators with bombing suspect Timothy McVeigh in the construction of explosive devices in Michigan.

McVeigh, 27, remained the only person arrested in the actual bombing. He is not charged in the Michigan case, and the Nichols brothers are not charged in the Oklahoma bombing.

A law enforcement source in Washington, speaking on condition of anonymity, said traces of nitrate and high explosive were detected in the car McVeigh was driving when stopped for a traffic infraction hour after the blast.

The FBI continued searching for

a second suspect, identified only as "John Doe2," and released a second sketch of him Tuesday. But The Daily Oklahoman reported today that agents also were pursuing a theory that he died in the blast.

Wind gusting to 32 mph hampered the search early today. Operations were suspended in parts of the building for fear the gusts would bring down unstable chunks of debris, Fire Capt. Todd Matthews said. Crews used brooms, shovels and rakes to push back debris from exposed areas.

"The problem yesterday was, we hit a point where large structural members became exposed. They had to do a lot of jackhammer work," said Fire Chief Gary Marrs. "We're optimistic that when we start today, we can move across it."

The death toll was at 98, including a nurse killed in the rescue effort. The bodies of 14 children have been found, including one loosed Tuesday night. Mayor Ron Norick doubted

**DEAR ANN LANDERS:** Like "Troubled in Westchester," I, too, was always fearful of contact with people infected with HIV, despite being an experienced and well-educated public health professional. In fact, I recall my hesitation at eating baked goods prepared by people with HIV that were offered to me at a weekly AIDS clinic at my health facility.

All that changed when I was diagnosed with AIDS, which I got from a blood transfusion. I was fearful of infecting my family members and friends. I worried that my siblings would avoid contact with me and I would never again be able to hug and kiss my nieces and nephews. I was concerned that my friends would not allow their children to come to our house and play with my children. Except for family members and close friends, my husband and I harbored this secret for several years -- until it became obvious that I was ill.

Once the news was out, the support

and love we received was overwhelming. Never do I feel that there is any attempt to avoid me. Friends share meals with us often. Their children come to our house. I feed them snacks and home-baked goods. I hug and kiss their children. In the 12 years since I became infected, neither my spouse nor my children have become infected, despite the fact that we were unaware of my HIV status for the first five years. HIV is not easy to catch if you understand the disease and take the appropriate precautions.

If someone close to you is HIV positive or has AIDS, be a real friend and educate yourself about this disease. It's the least you can do. People with HIV need your love, your support and your affection. I am a -- Person with AIDS in California

## Herd netters send two pairs to state tourney Lockmiller, Vargas, Robbins, McWhorter all earn trip to Austin

For the first time, representatives of Hereford at the State Tennis Tournament will need a van to get to Austin.

Hereford will send two doubles pairs to the state tournament May 12-13, after the teams of Pete Vargas/B.J. Lockmiller and Paige Robbins/Natalie McWhorter both took second place at the Region I-4A

Tournament completed Tuesday in San Angelo.

Vargas and Lockmiller went into the tournament as the No. 4 seeds after winning a district title. They won two matches to get to the semifinals, then played a lot of tennis after that.

They won their semifinal in three sets, beating second-seeded Jacob Plant and Branch Craig of El Paso High, 4-6, 7-6, 6-4. In the finals,

Vargas and Lockmiller met John Armstrong and Mitch Gray of Andrews, the No. 3 seeds, but lost 5-7, 7-6, 6-1.

"We knew they were going to be really tough," Hereford coach Ed Coplen said of the Andrews pair. "They lobbed the ball a lot on the serve, and we weren't used to that."

"We had a chance to win it," Coplen said. "We were up, I think, 3-4 in the second set, but we missed a

couple of shots and let them right back in it. And in the third set, we didn't come back very well."

Coplen said the grueling semifinal took a lot out of the Hereford duo.

"They expended a lot of energy in that match," he said. "They had to come back and play the finals an hour later, where Andrews had about two hours. Our semifinals lasted about three hours, and we didn't have much

rest. That probably hurt us in the third set."

McWhorter and Robbins were seeded second, and that looks about right. After winning in the semifinals, the Hereford duo ran into a buzzsaw in the finals, losing 6-0, 6-2 to top-seeded sisters Maria and Monica Villarreal of Big Spring.

"They played together all year, and they're in the rankings," Coplen said. "And their dad's a coach."

In the semis, McWhorter and Robbins had to face an unseeded team that had already knocked off the Nos. 3 and 4 seeds—Eunice Orozco and Maria Cisneros of El Paso Jefferson. Hereford won that match, 6-3, 7-6.

"They were a team that stayed at the baseline and lobbed the whole time," Coplen said. "They'd try to get you frustrated—and they got a lot of teams frustrated—but (McWhorter and Robbins) kept their composure and beat them."

Coplen said he thinks the four

Whitefaces may be the most Hereford has ever sent to Austin, but no complete records exist.

In the last decade, Hereford has sent three singles players to state: Kevin Hansen in 1989, Brenna Reinauer in 1991 and Greg Coplen, Ed's son, in 1993.

Dumas will send Emily Johnson to state in girls singles, after she beat Borger's Dawna Denny in a playback match, 2-6, 6-2, 6-1. Denny had beaten Johnson, 6-3, 7-5, for the District 1-4A championship less than two weeks ago on April 15.

Denny lost in the regional championship match, 6-0, 6-2, to Lindsay Woodworth of Fort Worth Arlington Heights.

Three other District 1-4A representatives finished fourth at regionals: Matt Thompson of Borger in boys' singles; Randall's Hollye Hodges and Nicole Munoz in girls' singles; and the No. 1 seeded Pampa duo of Brooks Gentry and Billy DeWitt.

## Girls golfers claim 5th at regionals

The Hereford girls' golf team finished fifth at the Region I-4A Golf Tournament, which was played Monday and Tuesday in San Angelo.

Hereford totaled 365 Tuesday at Riverside Municipal Golf Course for a tournament total of 726. Hereford was fourth after a round of 361 Monday, but District 1-4A champion Borger shot a 353 Tuesday to pass Hereford and finish fourth at 716.

The top three teams didn't change from Monday to Tuesday. Snyder won the region with a 325 Tuesday for a total of 647, and Andrews also earned a trip to the state tournament with a 325 for 660. Both teams also went to state last year.

Fort Stockton finished third with a 353 for 695.

Hereford was led individually by Jans Baird, who shot an 89 Tuesday for a total of 180. The other Hereford players were: Jami Bell, 95-181; Krista Beville, 90-182; Karen Manchec, 91-183; and Stephanie Bixler 104-196.

"The kids played pretty good," coach Stacey Bixler said. "It's a whole new ballgame when you're playing (in foursomes) with Snyder, Andrews and Fort Stockton. Playing in that group, we had a lot of people watching. I thought that was pretty good. It was good experience for the ones that are coming back."

Seniors Baird and Manchec finished their high school eligibility, but Bell, Beville and Bixler will be back.

Coach Bixler noted the improvement from last year, when Hereford finished eighth at regionals. A team that included Manchec, Beville and Stephanie Bixler totaled 779 last year; 53 more strokes that this year.

"We've got to come back and get to work," he said. "We'll try to come back and do it again next year."

Dumas' Jamie McInturff won the regional medalist title, so she'll go to state. She shot 74 Tuesday after a 69 Monday for a total of 143. Snyder's Brooke Lowrance was second at 73-76-149. Last year, Lowrance won the region and McInturff was second.

# Mondesi starts year with bang; LA wins

MIAMI (AP) - Baseball returned Tuesday night with a big crowd, a few boos and a powerful performance by Raul Mondesi.

Last season's National League rookie of the year homered twice, doubled and drove in four runs to help the Los Angeles Dodgers beat the Florida Marlins 8-7, ending the splintered sport's record 257-day layoff.

Although there were a few thousand empty seats on opening night, the crowd of 42,125 was announced as a sellout. The first game since the strike, however, was still surrounded by another labor problem - locked-out umpires picketed outside while replacement umps worked without any arguments.

The Marlins rallied from an 8-2 deficit, scoring four times in the ninth inning before Rudy Seanez struck out rookie Charles Johnson to end the game.

The fans greeted the players with a mixed reception.

Just prior to the game, both teams lined up along the base paths and tipped their caps toward the stands in a gesture of reconciliation following the longest strike in baseball history.

"Thanks to the loyal, patient and knowledgeable baseball fans of South Florida," the public address announcer said. The crowd cheered.

Then came the first pitch of pro baseball's 126th season, albeit 23 days and 2 minutes late. At 7:37 p.m. EDT, Florida's John Burkett threw a fastball that was fouled off.

The crowd cheered. It was baseball's best moment in 8-1/2 months.

The game was the first sports event at Joe Robbie Stadium since the Super Bowl. The Dodgers scored as easily as the 49ers, rapping 13 hits, including five doubles, one triple and Mondesi's homers.

Terry Pendleton, who hit a home run in his first at-bat for the Marlins, hit a two-run single during the rally in the ninth. Greg Colbrunn also hit an RBI single off Todd Worrell before Seanez relieved for a save.

Jeff Conine homered earlier for Florida.

Ramon Martinez allowed two runs in six innings and broke a 2-all tie with an RBI double in the fifth. He then scored on a double by Delino DeShields. Antonio Osuna pitched 2-2-3 innings before Worrell and Seanez entered.

Burkett, a former 22-game winner signed by the Marlins during the torrid turnover that followed the strike, allowed six hits and five earned runs in 4 2-3 innings.

Following a spring training shortened to three weeks, the game produced two errors and 12 walks.

Collins said previously he was interested only in running a front office.




















## Hints from Heloise

Dear Heloise: I had several small spots of taco sauce on the white area of a multicolored cotton/polyester polo-style shirt. The shirt was sprayed with pre-wash, soaked, and washed using a good laundry detergent, but the spots remained. I tried additional soaking with other cleaning agents to no avail. In desperation, I turned to using some hydrogen peroxide. Still the stains remained untouched.

Next, I took about 1 1/2 ounces of hydrogen peroxide and put it in a coffee cup and heated it to about 150 degrees in the microwave oven.

I then added about 1 teaspoon of powdered dishwasher detergent to the hot hydrogen peroxide to make a runny-type paste.

I placed the stained portion of the shirt over a large-mouthed coffee cup (this kept the mixture from migrating into the colored material of the shirt) and applied this mixture to the stained area.

I worked the mixture into the material for about 20 seconds using the handle end of a small spoon. Within a matter of minutes the stain was completely removed!

I then rinsed the entire shirt in cold water and dried it, and now it looks good as new with no evidence

whatsoever of the stubborn taco-sauce stain.

**CAUTION:** This should only be used on white material, and under no circumstances allow the peroxide mixture to migrate into any colored areas of the garment. — Chuck Davies, San Antonio, Texas

Thanks so much for the info. It just goes to show that even the most experienced experts have problems getting stains out.

"This celebrates the magic of movies by bringing the things people see at a distance closer to them," she said. "It makes them part of the whole scene."

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
