## Wheat crop may be damaged, but only time will tell for sure

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## Peace officers would be affected Citizenship bill criticized

AUSTIN (AP) - Cities could require police officers to be U.S. citizens under a bill that has won preliminary Texas Senate approval despite objections from some Hispanic senators that it would unfairly discriminate.

"It is the equivalent of (Proposition) 187 in California, which is racist," Sen. Gregory Luna, D-San Antonio, said Tuesday.

Senate to vote for the bill was Sen. Eddie Lucio, D-Brownsville. Two white senators joined black and other Hispanic lawmakers in voting no: Sens. John Montford, D-Lubbock, and Peggy Rosson, D-El Paso.

Lucio, who noted that his father was a deputy sheriff who had to obtain proof of citizenship before receiving Social Security benefits, said he understands opponents' concerns.

He referred to the California ballot proposal to deny illegal immigrants access to public schools and most health and welfare benefits.

Sen. Teel Bivins, R-Amarillo, sponsor of the bill, said, "I don't think it's fair to use that type of argument against this piece of legislation."

He said Texas law previously provided for citizenship as a prerequisite to being a peace officer, and many communities have maintained the requirement in the belief they were allowed to do so.

But Lucio said he has been distressed to find people who live in the United States and receive benefits such as public schooling but have not become citizens.

"If you live in this country, you need to be proud to be a citizen of this country," he said. "My vote is simply one of patriotism."

Sen. Carlos Truan, D-Corpus Christi, said, "We have not done enough to encourage people to attend classes to become citizens ... and now, we are fixing to discriminate with this piece of legislation."

Bivins said he was sponsoring the bill at the request of police chiefs concerned that they cannot do proper background checks on applicants from other countries.

The reasoning by cities that require citizenship "has nothing to do with discrimination. It has everything to do with public safety," he said.

Bivins said he didn't expect opposition to the bill, which was tentatively approved 21-10 in a vote that divided largely along racial lines.

Before he brings the measure up for a final Senate vote, Bivins said he would check with bill backers to see whether opponents' concerns could be satisfied.

The only minority member of the

Luna added that he had many cousins who were not citizens who served in the military, and that one was killed.

"The armed forces do not ask us that," he said of the citizenship proposal. "Why should the police departments ask us that?"

## Voters skeptical about GOP reform after end of Contract

The first 100 days of the Republican-led Congress were filled with potential for change. Now, says Ken Collins, comes the harder part: progress.

As Republicans embark on the second phase of their crusade to remake the federal government, some voters are skeptical about how far the GOP will pursue the kind of reform outlined in its "Contract With America."

"I guess I'm pessimistic about whether they'll keep up the momentum," said Collins, a 38-year-old employee of the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service in Tulsa, Okla. "They've fulfilled the contract, so maybe they will be less ambitious to tackle tough issues."

On Thursday, the Republicans in Congress mark their 100th day in power. Their battle now shifts to the Senate, where action tends to be

slower. And President Clinton has erected another hurdle by recently threatening to veto some GOP-sponsored measures approved by the House.

Of 10 major Republican bills brought to the House in the past 100 days, nine passed, including welfare reform, a tax cut and a balanced budget amendment to the Constitution. The sole failure was proposed term limits.

While those issues are important, some voters said they would be more satisfied if both sides in Washington,

D.C., could achieve one simple thing during the next 100 days - compromise.

"I'd just like to see them stop fighting and start working for progress," said Mary Bowne, a 59-year-old credit specialist in Tulsa. She voted for Clinton because she wanted change, but says she hasn't seen it so far.

Mary Ellen Bowie, a 71-year-old housewife in Sun City, Ariz., echoed that sentiment. "If they'd stop thinking about what's good for their party and start thinking about what's

good for people, then we'd get somewhere."

Others, though, think Republicans are moving too fast and proposing too many drastic cutbacks in welfare that could hurt poor people.

"There are ways to address these social problems but it needs to be over a longer period," said Jane Octave, a fourth-grade teacher from Donaldsonville, La., as she guided her honors students through the Martin Luther King Jr. Center in Atlanta.

"How can you cut everything and expect us to survive?" said welfare recipient LaTonja Williams, cuddling her 8-month-old son, George, in a drafty church at the Cabrini Green housing project in Chicago.

"Everything I have now is given to me," said the 24-year-old single mother, who also depends on food stamps and Head Start to feed and care for her three children. "The day they take it back, I have nothing."

But many voters want the GOP to forge ahead with its agenda to reduce welfare rolls.

## House committee eyes bill to update open records law

AUSTIN (AP) - Bringing the Texas open records law into the high-tech age and forcing the government to produce information more rapidly are the targets of legislation considered Tuesday by the House State Affairs Committee.

A bill by Rep. Sylvester Turner, D-Houston, would change the term "open records" to "public information" in the 22-year-old open records law, and make it clear that the statute applies to computer, audio and video data as well as data on paper. The measure was left pending.

"We fully understand now that information is not just put on a piece of paper, that now it's kept on disk or electronics," Turner said. "The presumption is now that you provide the information in whatever form it's in."

Turner's measure also would prohibit governmental bodies from suing people who request information.

In September 1993, Robert Lett was sued by the Klein Independent School District after he asked for a teacher's notes concerning his daughter's conduct.

The district contended the notes weren't public. But after Attorney General Dan Morales ruled they were, the district sued Lett and Morales, then dropped the attorney general from the lawsuit.

Under Turner's bill, any governmental body seeking to withhold information would be required to sue the attorney general, not the individual requesting the information.

Lett told the committee he has had to pay large legal bills to maintain his fight for the information. The case is still pending.

"No one should have to go through what I have gone through," Lett said.

Turner's bill also would require the state General Services Commission to adopt rules for state and local agencies to follow in setting charges for copies of public information. It also would limit charges to the actual cost of producing the data.

## Consumer prices increase 0.2 percent during March

WASHINGTON (AP) - Consumer prices edged up just 0.2 percent in March, the smallest increase this year, as a sharp drop in fruit and vegetable prices helped to offset higher costs for airline fares and auto loans.

The Labor Department said last month's increase in its Consumer Price Index followed identical gains of 0.3 percent in January and February.

The March increase in the CPI was the smallest since a similar 0.2 percent rise in December of last year. So far this year, inflation has been running at an annual rate of 3.2 percent, up slightly from the 2.7 percent increase recorded both in 1993 and 1994.

Many analysts are forecasting that inflation will stay around the 3.2 percent level for the rest of the year, a significant achievement in moderation for an economy in the fifth year of recovery.

The Fed is hoping it has slowed growth enough to achieve its "soft landing" while avoiding so much credit tightening that it pushes the country into a recession.

The smaller increase reported today provided more evidence that the slowdown in the economy engineered by the Federal Reserve is helping to keep inflationary pressures under control. On Tuesday, the government had reported that wholesale prices had shown no increase at all in March.

Investors have pushed the Dow Jones industrial average to record highs in recent weeks on a belief that the Fed will not be forced to boost interest rates an eighth time to keep inflation under control.

In March, energy prices dropped by 0.5 percent, their biggest decline since last September. The decrease was led by a 0.3 percent drop in gasoline prices.

Food costs were unchanged in March after having risen by 0.3 percent in February. The moderation reflected a 3.9 percent drop in fruit prices and a 1.7 percent decline in vegetable prices.

## Damaging roots force removal of several trees

Dead trees and trees with roots threatening a street and the foundation of City Hall are coming down and will be replaced by new trees.

Four elm trees in the City Hall Park at Third and Miles as well as two globe willows and two cottonwoods felt the cut of a chainsaw.

City Manager Chester Nolen said street damage was caused by roots of the globe willows, located on Third by the water office driveway window.

And a cottonwood tree at the east door of City Hall had extended roots under the building's foundation. Nolen said the tree had to come down or the foundation would be damaged.

Roots of another cottonwood, at Miles and the entrance to the City Hall parking lot, were threatening street and curb and gutter, Nolen said.

A shademaster locust, pecan and double trunk oak trees will be planted to replace the removed trees.

## World/Nation

**WASHINGTON** - In many ways, President Clinton and Senate Majority Leader Bob Dole are political Siamese twins, joined together by shared vital interests. Although they are fierce rivals and as different as can be in age, temperament and outlook, the two are locked in a strange mutual dependency.

**UNDATED** - A New York doctor is sentenced to jail for mistakes that resulted in a patient's death. A Denver anesthesiologist is charged in the death of an 8-year-old on the operating table. An inquest jury urges criminal action for the misreading of a cancer test that led to two deaths.

For medical and legal experts, this rash of recent cases indicates a rising public anger at a greedy medical profession that should be held accountable for its mistakes.

**WASHINGTON** - Owners of the oil tanker that once was called Exxon Valdez want a federal subsidy, contending the ship has lost money since it was banned from Alaskan waters following the 1989 oil spill for which the vessel is known.

**WASHINGTON** - Border Patrol agents routinely abuse people trying to enter the United States from Mexico legally or illegally, a human rights group alleged today. The Justice Department denied the charge.

**CALI, Colombia** - Dozens of soldiers, their faces streaked with green camouflage paint, search through the day's catch - a load of communications equipment hidden inside a huge warehouse owned by the Cali cocaine cartel. It is the year's biggest find, but the raid nets only equipment, no drug traffickers.

**WASHINGTON** - A human rights group's charge that the Justice Department can't properly police the abuse complaints filed against Border Patrol agents is groundless, a Justice spokeswoman says. Human Rights Watch-Americas also contends the Border Patrol and Immigration and Naturalization Service, both Justice Department agencies, don't vigorously try to weed out abusive agents.

# Dole seeking conservative support

## Lashes out at Hollywood 'casual violence and sex'

**DES MOINES, Iowa (AP)** - Moving to shore up his conservative credentials, Bob Dole called for voluntary school prayer Tuesday and lashed out at Hollywood for promoting "casual violence and even more casual sex."

"We began as a people seeking religious freedom and have evolved into a nation whose government often seems the enemy of religion," the Republican presidential front-runner said as he campaigned in Ohio and Iowa. "The moral code we nurture in our churches and synagogues is under attack from our government."

Dole's overture to conservatives included tough talk on welfare reform and a promise to phase out federal funding for the arts and humanities, longtime targets of the Christian right. And he accused President Clinton of contributing to the nation's moral decline by abdicating leadership in the war on drugs.

Dole's courting of social conserva-

tives came just a day after he made a major gesture to economic conservatives: pledging not to raise income taxes if elected president next year.

Taken together, the remarks underscored Dole's principal goal on his weeklong campaign announcement tour: to cement his position as the front-runner by strengthening his support among the conservative factions ascendant in GOP politics.

To rivals, these might be viewed as concessions to shore up weaknesses. But the Senate majority leader rejected that characterization during a conversation with reporters on his campaign plane.

He said he signed the tax pledge, after refusing to do so in his failed 1988 campaign, because this year's version allowed for the closing of loopholes.

As for his comments on values,

Dole said that he had a proven conservative record on social issues

Noneetheless, in dropping his usual reluctance to discuss social issues Dole highlighted the importance of religious conservative voters, and the competition among GOP contenders for their support. He made values the centerpiece of speeches at the Ohio statehouse and then later at the Iowa State Fairgrounds.

Wading into the school prayer debate, Dole said: "If students can discuss sports and music or drama at school they should also be allowed to voluntarily - voluntarily - pray."

Some Republicans support a constitutional amendment allowing school prayer; Dole voted in favor of such an amendment in 1984.

His preference, however, is legislation allowing students to pray and lead peers in prayer; school officials could not lead or dictate prayers. Dole has not introduced such legislation and told reporters there

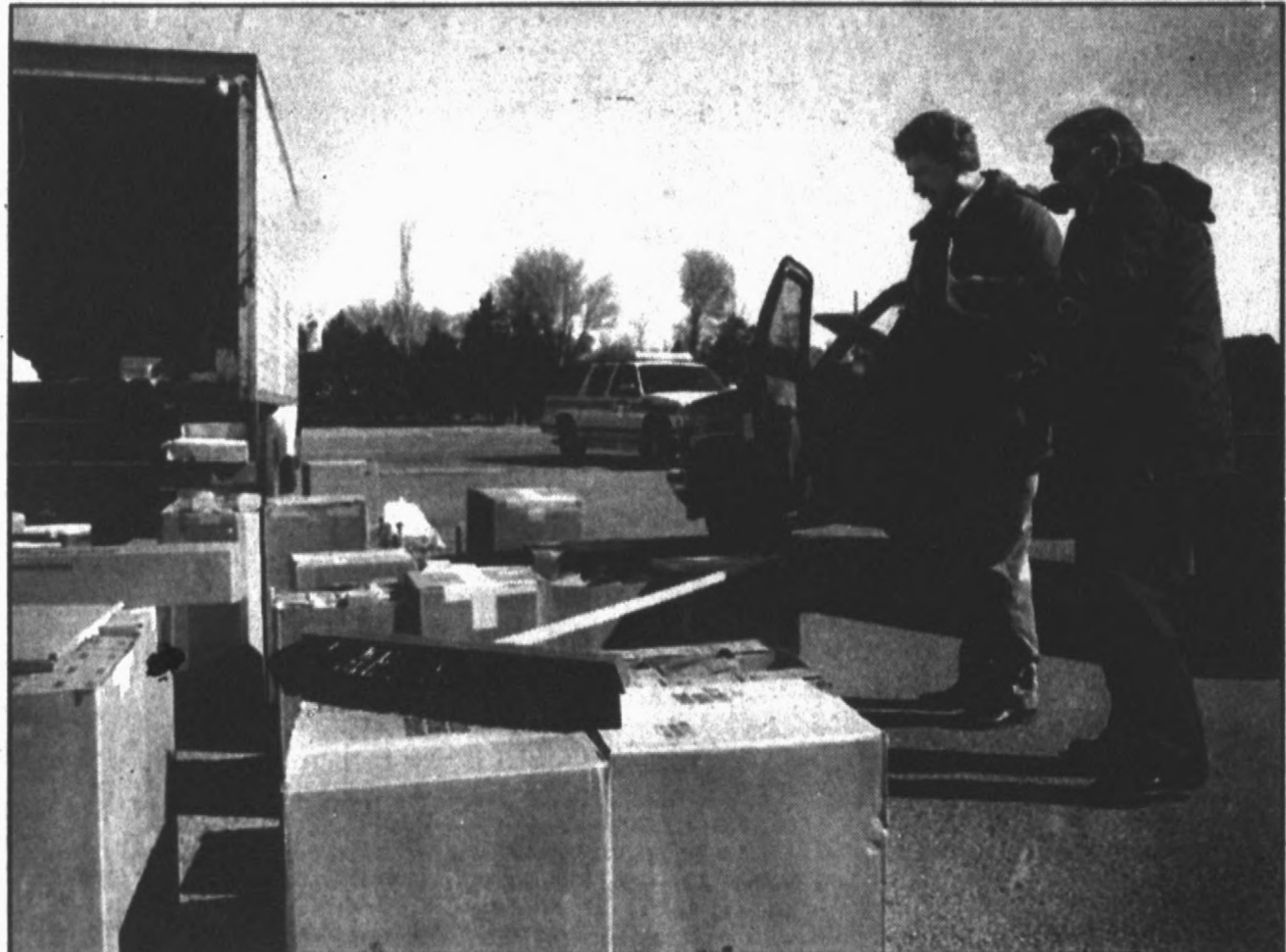
was virtually no chance such a bill could clear the Senate next year.

In taking aim at Hollywood, Dole sounded much like former Vice President Dan Quayle, whose decision to sit out the 1996 race is one reason the Christian conservative vote is not seen as committed to any one candidate.

"Every parent knows the greatest challenge to family values is the way our popular culture ridicules them," Dole said. "Our music, movies and advertising regularly push the limits of decency, bombarding our children with destructive messages of casual violence and even more casual sex."

Dole said censorship was not the answer because "we have more to fear than to gain from putting Washington in charge of culture."

Instead, he said families and communities needed to take the mission upon themselves. "Shame is a powerful tool," Dole said. "We should use it."

# Clinton marks Roosevelt death with trip to 'Little White House'

**WASHINGTON (AP)** - On the 50th anniversary of the death of Franklin Delano Roosevelt, President Clinton is embracing as his own the legacy of one of the 20th century's greatest leaders.

Clinton was traveling today to Roosevelt's Little White House at Warm Springs, Ga., the retreat where the 32nd president sought relief from the paralysis of polio and where, on April 12, 1945, he died of a cerebral hemorrhage at age 63.

In his tribute, Clinton was expected to stress the benefits to the nation of Roosevelt's GI Bill of Rights, which provided millions of returning World War II veterans with a college education. And he will promote the education and job training programs his own administration seeks as well as the tax cut targeted for the middle class that he wants Congress to approve.

The Republican Party stood in opposition as Roosevelt built the new Deal six decades ago. And many of those who fill GOP ranks today are

attempting to dismantle the liberal foundation that Roosevelt laid.

"The president intends to look at the legacy of Franklin Roosevelt in contemporary terms," White House press secretary Mike McCurry said Tuesday. "He will address the problems we face in the context of a divided government."

"Franklin Roosevelt's New Deal dramatically set our nation on a course toward tremendous economic prosperity," said Don Fowler, chairman of the Democratic National Committee. "Unfortunately, this foundation is being undermined by Republicans and their mean-spirited 'contract' agenda."

But not all Republicans attack every element of the Roosevelt heritage.

House Speaker Newt Gingrich, R-Ga., commenting on the day he assumed office in January, said: "The fact is that it was Franklin Roosevelt who gave hope to a nation that was in despair and could have slid into dictatorship."

The ceremonies at Warm Springs will include the rededication of the

restored therapeutic pools where FDR swam and the presentation of the Four Freedoms awards from the Franklin and Eleanor Roosevelt Institute.

The honorees include former President Jimmy Carter, who opened his campaign for the presidency at the Warm Springs cottage two decades ago.

Every Muster ceremony is the same. Texas Aggies pay their respects to all those who are absent because of death since the last Muster. When the names of the honored dead are called from the Muster Roll, a friend of the deceased answers, "Here".

Good attendance is expected at the first Muster to be held in the Hereford area in quite some time according to a report from the Golden Spread Aggie Mother's Club.

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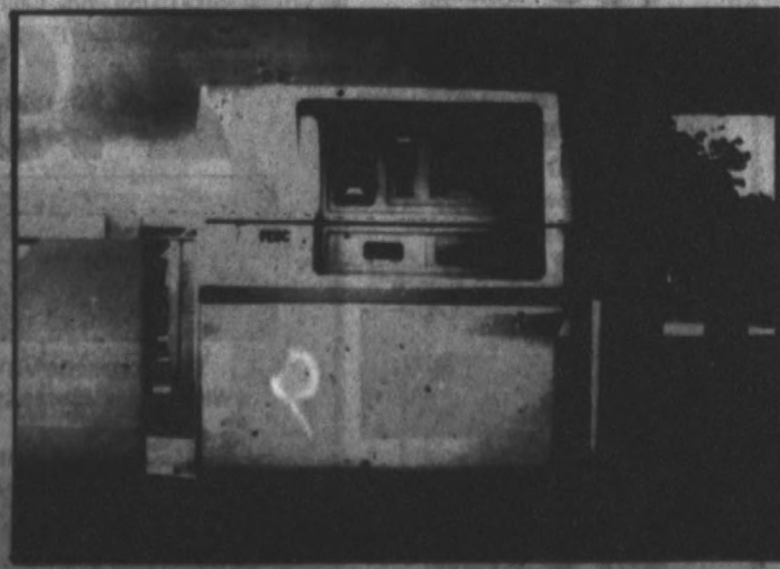

## Caprock hands Herd 11-6 setback

Walks and errors cost the Hereford baseball team in an 11-6 loss to Caprock Tuesday in Amarillo.

"Of the first seven that scored for them, five of them got on because of walks," Hereford coach Pete Rodriguez said, summing up how Caprock scored in all but one of the innings. "Then we'd make a little error here, and they'd get a little sac fly there. They picked at us with those walks."

Hereford had only four errors, Rodriguez said, but they were "crucial."

Caprock's runs, by inning, went like this: 2, 0, 3, 2, 1 and 3. The Longhorns didn't need to bat in the seventh inning. Their biggest hit came in the fourth, when Vance Dunlap spanked a two-run homer. The man he drove in ahead of him had gotten on base by a walk, Rodriguez said.

Hereford starting pitcher Sonny Perez lasted four and two-thirds innings, walking seven Longhorns and allowing eight runs. Gregg Kalka pitched in relief, giving up three runs in the sixth inning.

Hereford fell to 2-4 in District 1-4A and 5-13 overall. Caprock got its

first district win against five losses, as the Longhorns improved to 8-13 overall. Strangely, Hereford has provided Caprock its only district win and handed district-leader Dumas (5-1) its only league loss.

Hereford fell victim to Caprock ace pitcher Micah Bonilla, who recorded 13 strikeouts and pitched the complete game.

"Out of the first 15 batters that came up for us, nine struck out," Rodriguez said. "(Bonilla) was jamming us inside, and we weren't making adjustments."

Hereford, which has had trouble hitting in some games, did manage 10 hits against Bonilla.

"We've come around to the point where we're starting to hit, but then the defense falls apart. We've got to get both together," Rodriguez said.

Tanner Murphey, Wade McPherson, Armando Zambrano and Sonny Perez each had two hits for the Herd.

Hereford led briefly, 3-2, after scoring three runs in the third. Homer Hamilton singled and scored on Murphey's triple. Jacob Lopez reached on an error, which allowed Murphey to score. Lopez then scored on Perez' double.

Hereford scored twice in the fifth inning to cut the Caprock lead to 7-5. McPherson and Perez had back-to-back singles, and both scored on one play: Perez' hit got past the Caprock right fielder, allowing McPherson to score, and Caprock's throw to home

plate got away, allowing Perez to score.

Hereford got another run in the seventh, when Zambrano doubled and later scored on an error.

The entire district will take the Easter weekend off and resume the schedule Tuesday.

Hereford visits Randall High at 4:30 p.m. Tuesday. Hereford won the first meeting, 12-11.

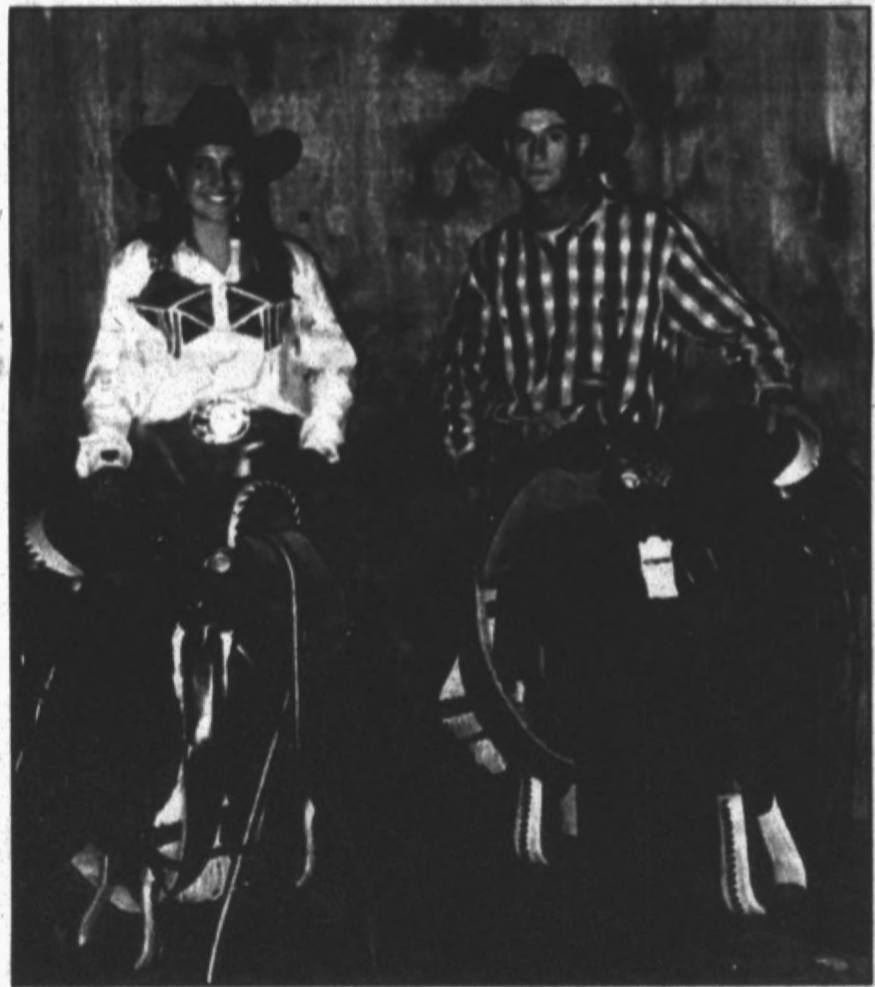
participate in both events.

Defensive linemen Harvey Martin and Randy White of Dallas were the co-MVPs in Super Bowl XII.

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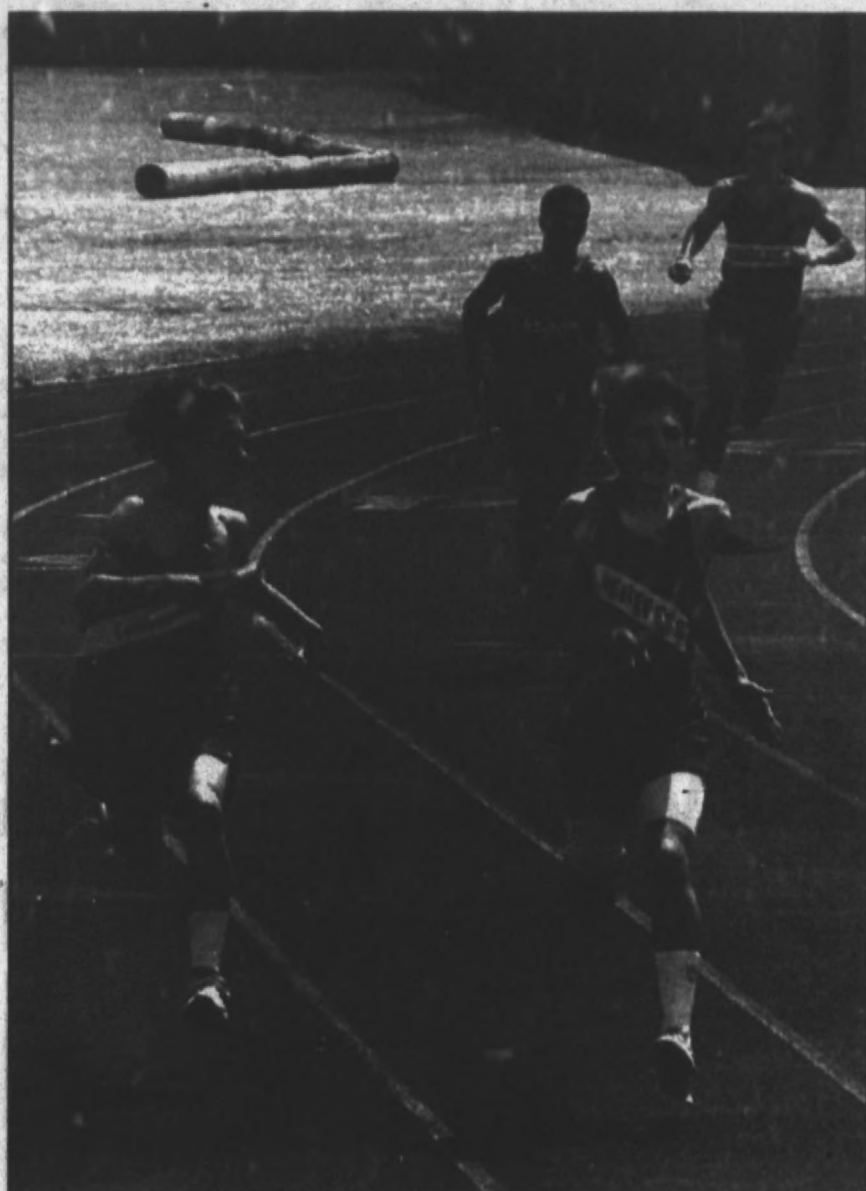

# Mavs rock Rockets in double OT

The Dallas Mavericks worked overtime for a critical victory, and the San Antonio Spurs hardly showed up in a rare loss.

Dallas is two games behind Denver and Sacramento in the race for the final playoff berth in the Western Conference after a wild 156-147 double-overtime victory at Houston on Tuesday night. The Mavericks got the third triple-double in five games by rookie Jason Kidd, whose 38 points were the rookie's high in the NBA.

"I've never been in a game like this before, and I hope it will be my last," Kidd said. "But it definitely feels good. My job is to win games and I'll let my rookie-of-the-year (credentials) and my triple-doubles speak for themselves."

The Spurs, riding a league-high 15-game winning streak, set franchise lows in scoring and shooting in falling to the Portland Trail Blazers 91-71. The 71 points, 31 percent shooting and 23 field goals all were ignominious marks for the team with the NBA's best record.

"We played exceptionally well and caught them on a subpar night," Portland coach P.J. Carlesimo said. "It was great to get a road win against the premier team in the league."

Elsewhere, Atlanta clinched a postseason berth by beating Philadelphia 110-106 in OT. Also, it was Sacramento 117, the Los Angeles Clippers 85; Orlando 107, Cleveland 90; Chicago 96, Indiana 89; Utah 100, the Los Angeles Lakers 93; Phoenix 96, Seattle 90; New York 112, Miami 99; and Milwaukee 114, Detroit 109 in overtime.

### Mavericks 156, Rockets 147, 2 OT

While Kidd also had 11 rebounds and 10 assists, teammate Jamal Mashburn scored 42 points at Houston.

The teams combined for 28 3-point baskets, an NBA record. The Rockets

and Denver set the previous high Sunday with a combined 23 3-pointers.

Clyde Drexler led Houston with 29 points, 11 rebounds and 11 assists, and Kenny Smith scored 29.

### Trail Blazers 91, San Antonio 71

Portland's defense was so good and San Antonio's shooting so bad that the Spurs were outscored 22-10 in the third quarter, their lowest scoring period all season.

Cliff Robinson had 23 points for the Trail Blazers. David Robinson led the Spurs with 21 points and 12 rebounds, but the all-star center was only 6-for-23 from the field.

### Hawks 110, 76ers 106, OT

Atlanta climbed into the playoffs as Grant Long scored a career-high 33 points and Steve Smith added 25. Playing without leading scorer Mookie Blaylock, sidelined with strep throat, the Hawks won their sixth straight at Philadelphia.

Dana Barros had 27 points and 10 assists for Philadelphia, while Clarence Weatherspoon scored 25 points.

### Kings 117, Clippers 85

Mitch Richmond scored 24 points and Walt Williams 23 as Sacramento moved into a tie with Denver at 36-39 for the final playoff spot in the West. It was the Kings' most lopsided win of the season and was clinched when they outscored Los Angeles 16-1 in the final 4:13 of the third quarter to stretch a nine-point lead to 84-61.

### Magic 107, Cavaliers 90

At Orlando, back in the lineup after missing four games because of an inflamed esophagus, Arneferd Hardaway had 12 points and eight assists as the Magic moved closer to clinching homecourt advantage through the Eastern Conference playoffs.

Orlando, still without Nick Anderson, improved to 37-2 at home and reduced the number of combined victories and New York losses needed

to clinch homecourt advantage in the East to two. Anderson has missed three games since sustaining a concussion, and it is uncertain when he'll return.

Shaquille O'Neal had 30 points and 18 rebounds for the Magic.

### Bulls 96, Pacers 89

At Chicago, the Bulls pulled down a season-high 54 rebounds, offsetting Michael Jordan's poor shooting.

Jordan, a .516 shooter during his first nine seasons, went 8-for-27, dropping his percentage to .396 in 11 games since coming out of retirement. He's at .338 over the last five games and .327 at home.

Jordan did have 25 points, a season-high 11 rebounds and six assists. The 6-foot-6 Jordan also blocked shots by 7-4 Rik Smits and 6-10 Derrick McKey.

Toni Kukoc added 18 points and Steve Kerr 16 for the Bulls, who have won eight of 11 since Jordan returned. Smits scored 26 points for Indiana.

### Jazz 100, Lakers 93

Karl Malone scored 30 points and Blue Edwards hit a 17-foot jumper with 2:48 left to give the Jazz the lead for good. Malone also had 14 rebounds.

Eddie Jones led the Lakers with 23 points, but they turned the ball over 26 times.

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## Butler moves to NY Mets; Athletics get Stottlemyre

NEW YORK (AP) - Brett Butler, Todd Stottlemyre and another half-dozen free agents found new teams. Mickey Tettleton and Andy Van Slyke are still waiting to find out their fates.

Butler, one of the union's most vocal supporters during the strike, got the biggest deal Tuesday, a \$2 million, 1-year contract from the New York Mets. That's \$1.5 million less than his 1994 salary.

Stottlemyre agreed to go to Oakland for \$1.8 million - a \$550,000 cut - and the Athletics announced pitcher Steve Ontiveros accepted the team's offer to go to salary arbitration.

Pitcher Erik Hanson, who played for Cincinnati last season, went to the Boston Red Sox for \$1,125,000, down from \$2.7 million last year.

Milwaukee came up with outfielder Derrick May, cut loose by the Chicago Cubs last Friday. He got a minor league deal that would be worth \$325,000 if he makes the team.

Pitcher Greg W. Harris took a big cut, agreeing to a minor league contract with Minnesota that would pay him \$525,000 in the majors. He made \$1,325,000 in 1994.

Infielder Randy Velarde returned to the New York Yankees with a minor league deal that would be worth \$350,000, less than one-third his 1994 salary of \$1,125,000.

Pitcher Jeff Russell, who finished last season with Cleveland, went to Texas for \$500,000, less than a quarter of his \$2,175,000 salary a year ago.

California reached into the bargain

basement for minor-league deals with pitchers Scott Sanderson and Mike Bielecki. Sanderson is 38 and Bielecki is 35.

Butler, among the top leadoff hitters in the game, was offered \$3.5 million by the Los Angeles Dodgers during the offseason, but that deal was pulled off the table after owners rescinded their salary cap plan.

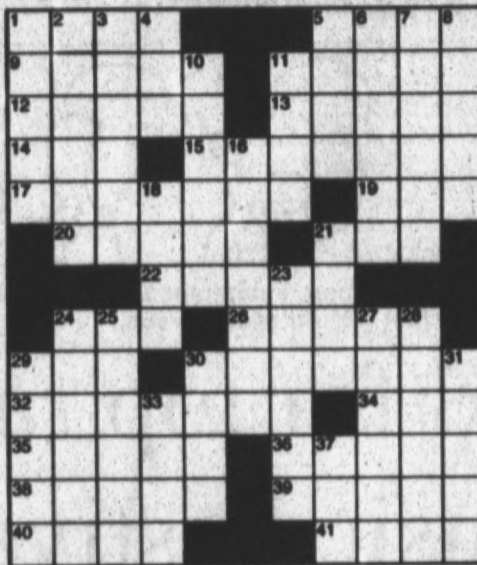

BAR 7 CATTLE CO., HCR 2, Box 61, Friona, Texas 79035 has applied to the Texas Natural Resource Conservation Commission (Commission) for a permit (Proposed Permit No. 03799) to authorize the disposal of waste and wastewater from a cattle feedlot. The cattle feedlot will consist of a maximum of 8,500 head. The waste treatment facilities will include one storage runoff control structure (RCS) for stormwater retention. Wastewater from the RCS is to be disposed of by evaporation. Manure and separated solids are to be applied as fertilizer on agricultural land, for beneficial use, by contract manure haulers. No discharge of pollutants into the waters of the State is authorized by this permit.

The cattle feedlot is on the west side of an unnamed county road about six miles west of Farm-to-Market, Road 1412, and eleven miles north of the intersection of Farm-to-Market Road 1412 and Farm-to-Market Road 1058 in Deaf Smith County, Texas. This location is in the drainage area of an unclassified stream in Segment No. 0200 of the Red River Basin.

The Executive Director of the Commission has prepared a draft permit based on the application submitted by the applicant and other information presently available.

Legal Authority: Section 26.028 of the TEXAS WATER CODE and 30 TAC Chapter 305 of the RULES OF THE TEXAS NATURAL CONSERVATION COMMISSION.

This application is subject to a Commission resolution adopted August 18, 1993, which directs the Commission's Executive Director to act on behalf of the Commission and issue final approval of certain permit matters. The Executive Director will issue this permit unless one or more persons file written protests and/or a request for a hearing within 30 days after publication of this notice.

If you wish to request a public hearing, you must submit your

request in writing. You must state (1) your name, mailing address and daytime phone number; (2) the permit number or other recognizable reference to this application; (3) the statement "I/we request a public hearing;" (4) a brief description of how you, or the persons you represent, would be adversely affected by the granting of the application; (5) a description of the location of your property relative to the applicant's operations; and (6) your proposed adjustment to the application/permit which would satisfy your concerns and cause you to withdraw your request for hearing. If one or more protests and/or requests for hearing are filed, the Executive Director will not issue the permit and will forward the application to the Office of Hearings Examiners where a hearing may be held. Commission public hearings are evidentiary legal proceedings similar to civil court non-jury trials. Although general comments from the public may be submitted either in writing prior to the hearing, or orally at the start of the hearing, the law requires that the Commission's decision about whether to approve or deny the application be based on evidence and testimony submitted during the public hearing, presented under oath and subject to cross-examination by the other parties. Public comments are not evidence and cannot be the basis for the Commission's ultimate decision. In the event a hearing is held, the Office of Hearings Examiners will submit a recommendation to the Commission for final decision.

# Lawmakers hope measures will bring peace to classrooms

AUSTIN (AP) - Teachers fearful of armed, violent students have asked lawmakers for help in taking back their classrooms.

Lawmakers are listening. A bill passed by the Texas Senate would allow teachers to kick disruptive students out of their classes, require alternative education programs and specify the offenses that mean automatic expulsion from school and referral to the court system.

"I hope it results in a classroom with an atmosphere where kids can learn, and where teachers don't have to be wardens - they can actually be teachers again," said Sen. Bill Ratliff, R-Mount Pleasant, sponsor of the education overhaul.

The House Public Education Committee is working on its own reform bill, which includes similar provisions.

John Cole, president of the Texas Federation of Teachers, called the discipline proposals "a big step forward" and stressed the importance of funding alternative education programs.

"We've handed over the schools, in some cases, to a tiny band of hooligans who are allowed to disrupt other students' learning," he said.

"We have to put a stop to that. ... This would arm the teacher with the authority to insist that something be done."

Among those attesting to the need for safe schools legislation is Gudrun Aguirre, an El Paso teacher who said a student shot and killed her husband after coming to their home one night in 1993.

Mrs. Aguirre, 53, said she received superficial wounds in the attack, which came several days after the student had shoved her against some lockers in school.

She said he was transferred into a special class for students with behavioral problems, a move that upset him, but that she still gave him schoolwork assignments.

"If he had been removed to an alternative environment, maybe it could have been prevented," she said, emphasizing the importance of addressing disruptive students' problems when they're removed from regular classes.

Mrs. Aguirre, who has taken a leave of absence, said if the legislation passes, she'll feel safer when she returns.

But not everyone is happy with the proposals. Some groups say they would take away principals' flexibility in dealing with problem

students, in a move at odds with reform efforts directed at strengthening local control.

For example, the bill doesn't allow traditional suspensions from school.

In addition, if a teacher bars a student from his or her class, a local

committee that includes teachers - rather than the principal - decides whether to override that decision.

Bill Carpenter, assistant superintendent for school and community relations at Cypress-Fairbanks Independent School District in

Houston, said he fears that leaving decisions to such committees would divide school faculties.

In addition, he said, the principal "has the responsibility for everything that happens on that campus. It just doesn't make sense to me, from a practical standpoint, to have others given the authority and not given the responsibility."

Carpenter, who represents the Texas School Alliance, composed of urban and suburban schools, also said teachers could be tempted to hastily use new authority to boot students from class.

"The kid does something dumb, and instead of working through it with the student, the teacher might say, 'I don't have to put up with this turkey,'" Carpenter said.

Richard Kouri, president of the Texas State Teachers Association, said "Most teachers are committed to working with students and wanting them to succeed. I don't think there should be a lot of concern about abuse of authority."

Carpenter also expressed concern about eliminating out-of-school suspension, a proposal Ratliff said is meant to prevent problem students from being turned out unsupervised, perhaps to roam the streets.

"The elimination of short-term suspension of students takes away a cornerstone tool that districts have used as a discipline strategy," Carpenter

said. While he understands Ratliff's view, he said, "many, many times, the short-term suspension ... serves as a wake-up call to both the student and the parent."

Patrick Francis of the Texas Association of School Boards said, "It's hard to be against zero tolerance (of violence). But when it comes down to it - almost like mandated sentencing - when you don't allow circumstances particular to the event to be considered, it doesn't necessarily make for good decision-making at the local level."

"There are certain cases where the principal can decide the best way of handling something, rather than putting a kid in alternative placement," he said. "I think folks closest to the problem have the best way of handling it."

Cole said the state already has tried leaving the issue up to school administrators.

"Many of our school principals are the very people who have been sweeping this problem under the rug," he said. "We are in the middle of a major crisis in public education. We can't ignore this problem. It isn't going away."

## Highlights of discipline bill

AUSTIN (AP) - Highlights of the school discipline section of the education overhaul bill, as passed by the Texas Senate:

- A disruptive student could be removed from class and prevented from returning by a teacher, subject to review by a local committee composed entirely or partially of teachers. The student could be sent to another class or an alternative education program.

- School districts would have to provide alternative education programs designed for students removed from regular classes. Out-of-school suspensions would be prohibited.

- Students would have to be placed in an alternative education program for assault, substance abuse, selling drugs or alcohol, terroristic threats, public lewdness or indecent exposure.

- Students would have to be expelled and referred to court for offenses including murder, attempted murder, aggravated assault, sexual assault, arson, indecency with a child, aggravated kidnapping or felony drug or weapons offenses.

- If a student was removed from his or her regular classroom, the principal would convene a hearing with the teacher, student and parent. If there was a disagreement over removal between the principal and teacher, the local committee would settle it.

- If a student was expelled, there also would be a hearing, at which the student would have to be represented by a parent, guardian or other adult, such as a lawyer. The expulsion could be appealed to the school board.

- A court could not place a student back into school as a condition of probation unless the juvenile court and school board have entered into a memorandum of understanding.

# Witness undergoes brutal questioning

LOS ANGELES (AP) - You knew things were going badly for the O.J. Simpson prosecutors when the highlight of their day was Marcia Clark's new hairstyle.

Prosecutors had to sit back Tuesday and watch criminalist Dennis Fung, with dark circles under his eyes and frustration in his voice, endure another round of brutal cross-examination.

Defense attorney Barry Scheck turned up his attack on the soft-spoken technician, suggesting that Fung was fed answers by prosecutors and was shading his testimony to gloss over police mistakes or cover up a police conspiracy to frame Simpson.

Using photos and video clips, Scheck also tried to portray Fung as a poorly trained criminalist who improperly collected and processed blood samples, rendering the results of delicate genetic tests useless.

"Scheck was really on a roll," said Loyola University law professor Laurie Levenson. "This was probably one of the worst days the prosecution has had."

The inquisition continues today with Fung's fifth day on the stand. Also today, Judge Lance Ito is to meet in chambers with dismissed juror Jeanette Harris, whose comments to the media prompted Ito

to begin an investigation of juror conduct.

Ito also has subpoenaed David Goldstein, a KCAL-TV reporter who says Harris told him that jurors had discussed the case among themselves, the Los Angeles Times reported. Such a discussion would violate court rules and could lead to a mistrial. Harris denies making the remarks, which Goldstein said came during an off-camera interview.

The only bright spot for the prosecution Tuesday was Clark's new look. Thanks to the able scissors of Allen Edwards, the celebrity hairstylist who gave Farrah Fawcett her "Charlie's Angels" mane, Clark now has darker, straighter hair, her trademark curls replaced by a modified shag.

When asked about her hair, the prosecutor laughed and told reporters and spectators, "Get a life." Prosecutor Chris Darden joked at a news conference that although Clark's hair is naturally straight, "Marcia told me that her hair was naturally curly."

But that was the extent of the humor for the day. Fung, tired and frazzled, appeared to have inherited the years Clark lost.

And Scheck spared no drama, raising his voice during key questions and lacing his queries with sarcasm and skepticism.

The court day ended with Scheck

showing Fung and the jury two photographs of a back gate outside Nicole Brown Simpson's condominium, where the slashed bodies of Ms. Simpson and Ronald Goldman were found.

The first picture, taken the day after the June 12 slayings, doesn't appear to show a blood stain - which prosecutors say matches Simpson's blood - that is present in a picture taken July 3.

"Where is it, Mr. Fung?" Scheck shouted. "Where is it?"

"I can't see it in the photograph," Fung said, squinting to view a courtroom monitor.

Earlier, Scheck drew gasps from spectators with a newly revealed news tape that appears to show Fung and his rookie colleague Andrea Mazzola - neither wearing gloves - touching a key piece of evidence at the murder scene: an envelope containing the prescription glasses that Goldman was returning to Ms. Simpson the night of the murders.

Fung denied that the object on the videotape was the envelope. "I know my fingerprints are not on that envelope," he said.

Scheck also showed jurors a crime scene video purportedly showing one of the famed bloody gloves lying at the edge of a blood-stained blanket. He suggested that the glove - which matches one found at Simpson's estate - was moved to three different

locations and became contaminated with blood from the blanket, which had been thrown over Ms. Simpson's body.

Fung said he couldn't tell whether the dark spot on the videotape was a glove.

"You know it's the glove, and you just got caught by the videotape," Scheck insisted.

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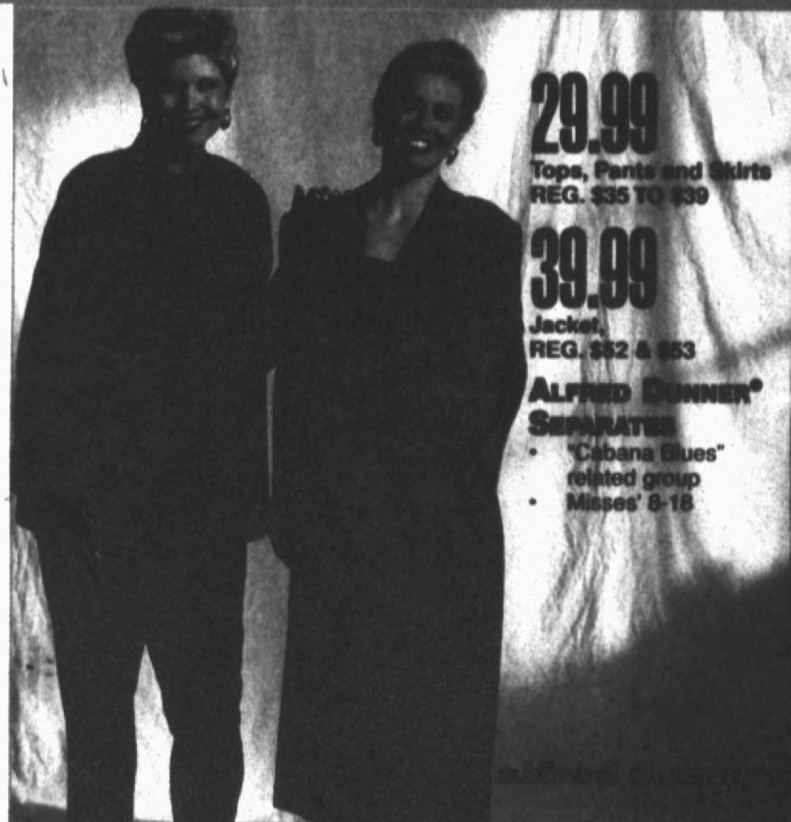


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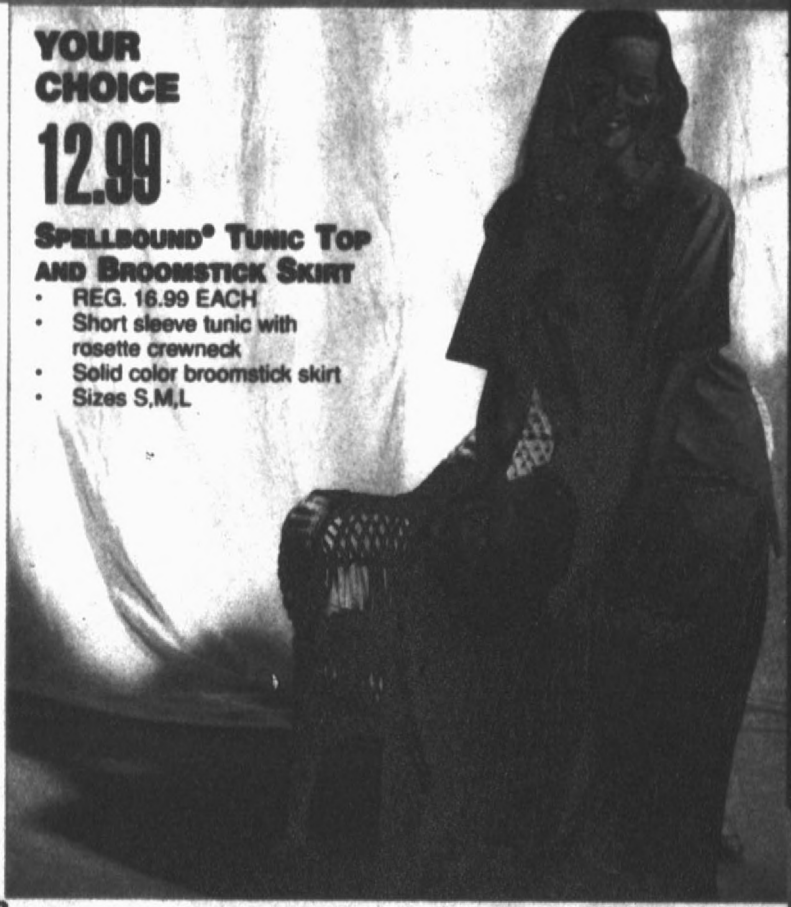
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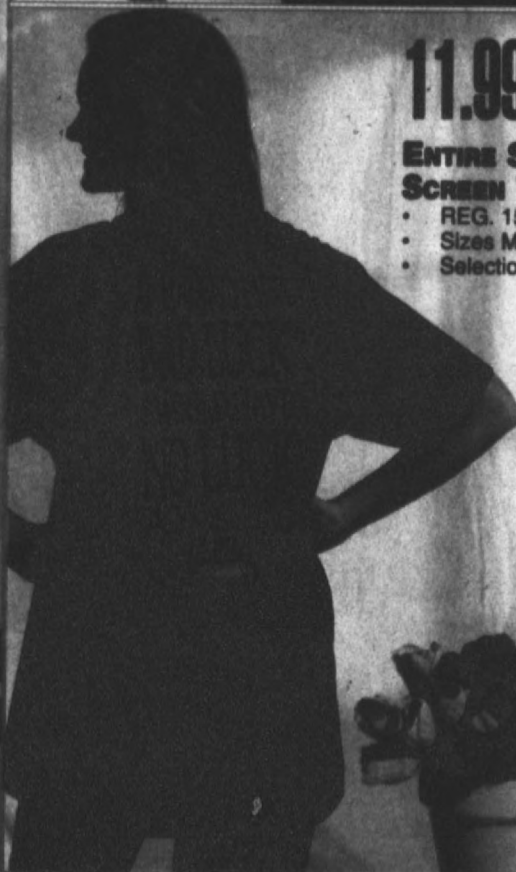
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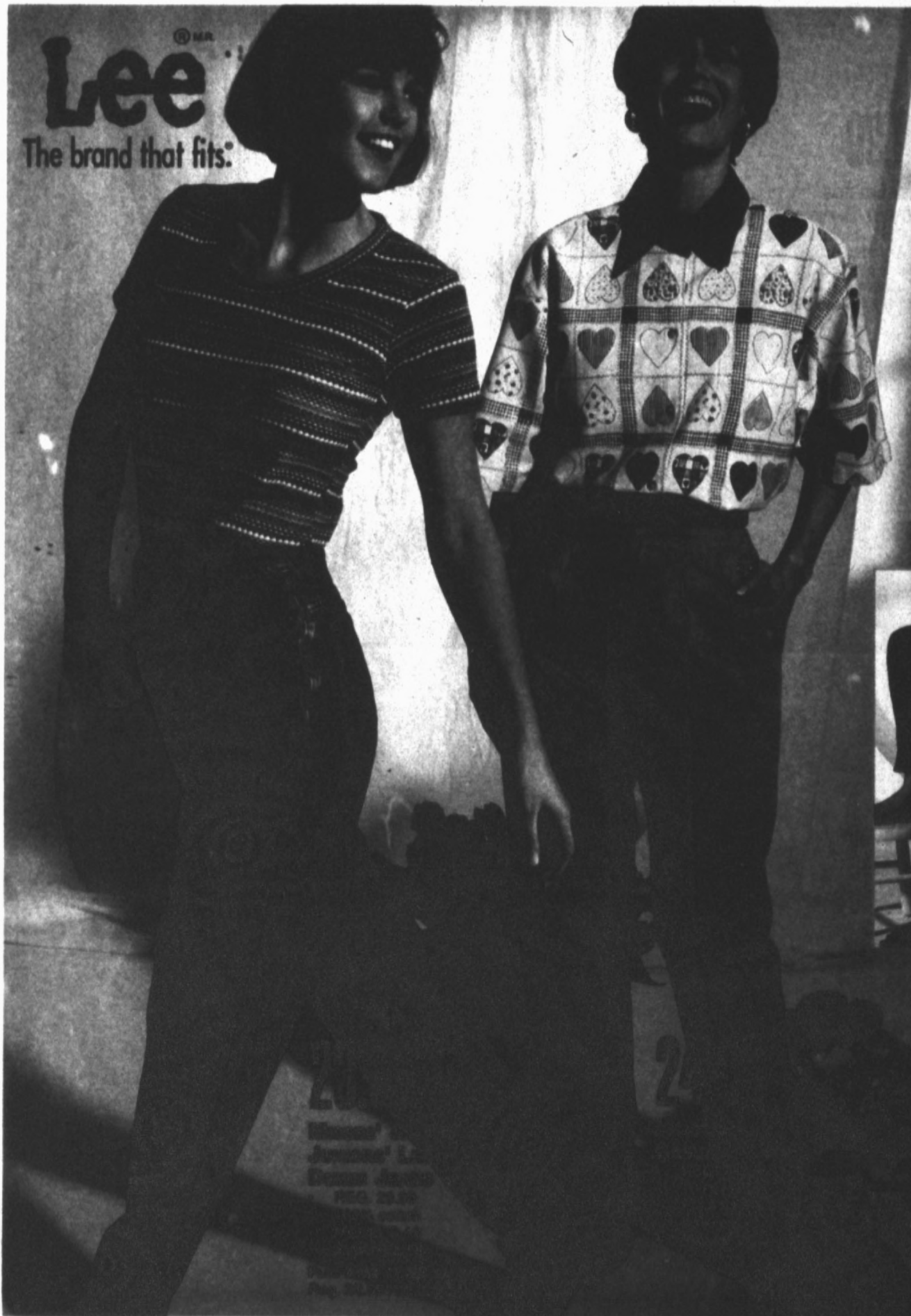
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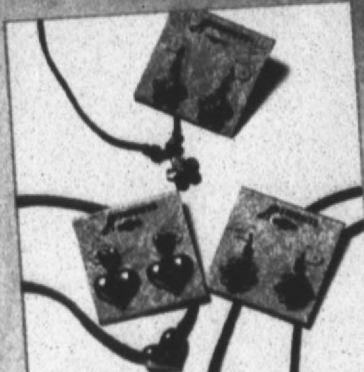


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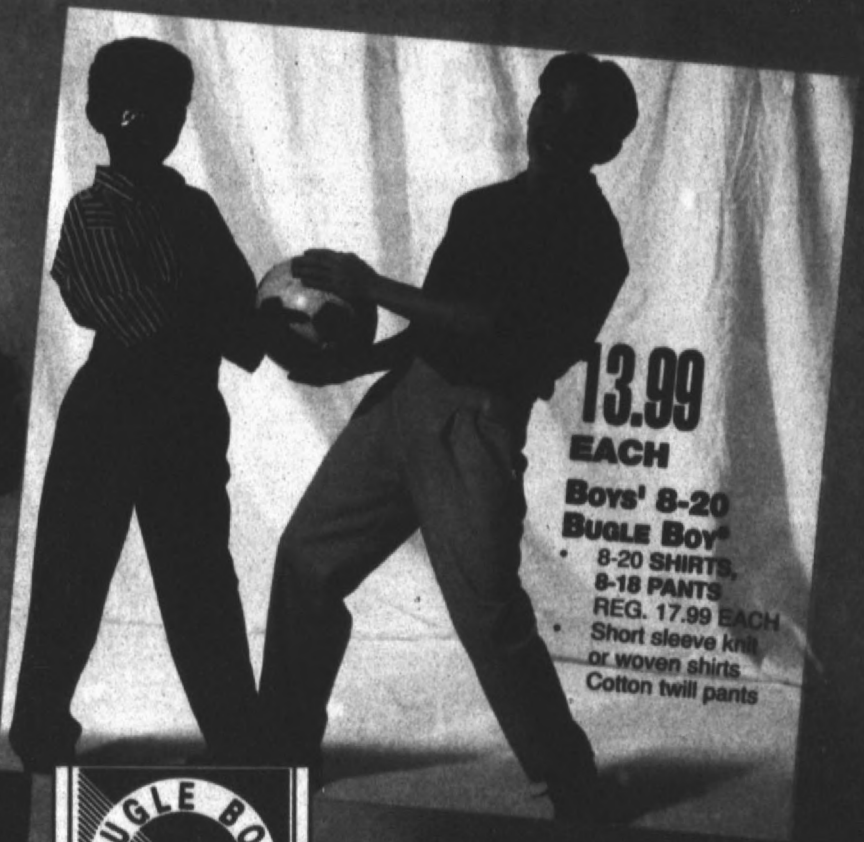
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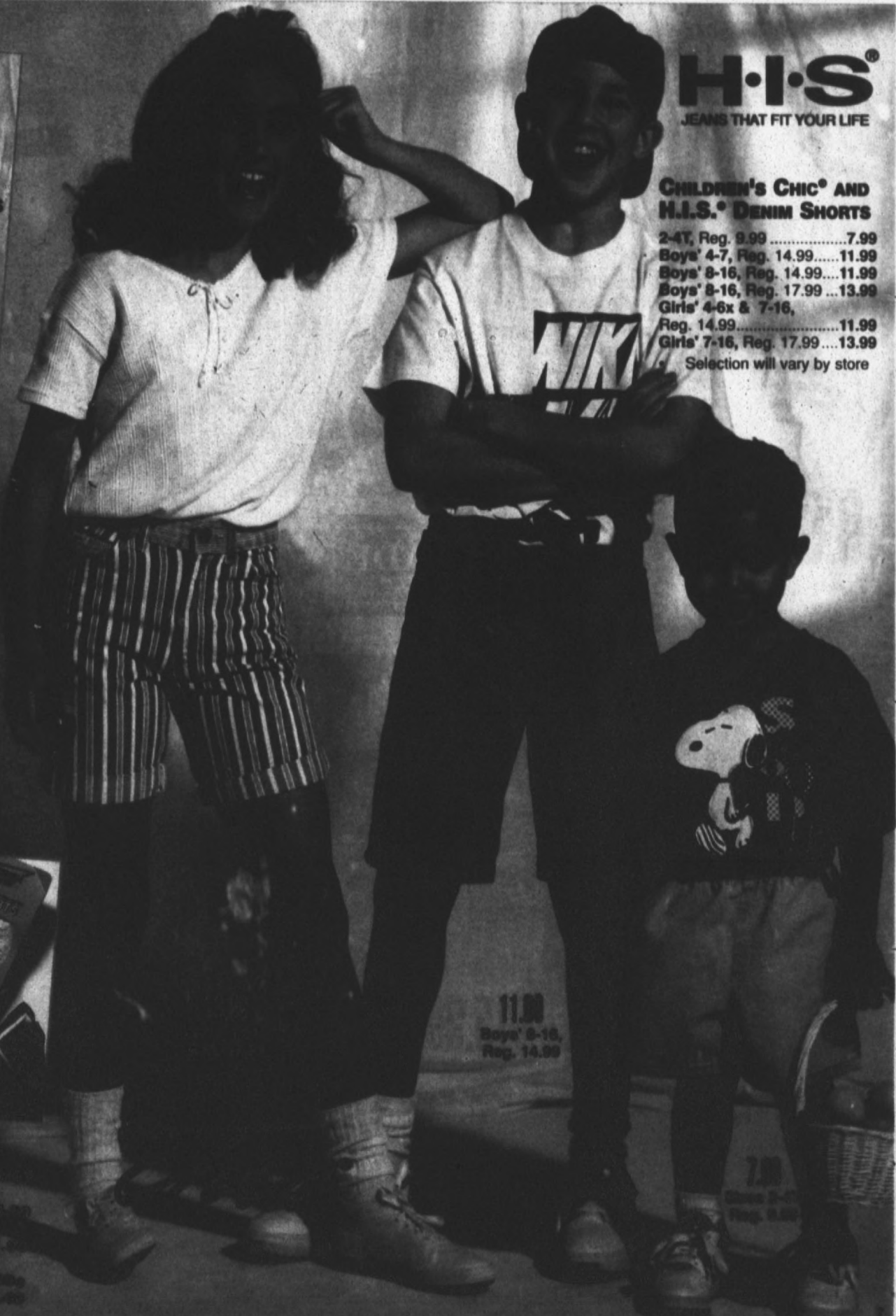
