Suspect in custody, charged in bombing

OKLAHOMA CITY (AP) - With one suspect in jail and two witnesses being questioned in other states, officials said Saturday a second suspect, so far unidentified, was still at large in the deadly bombing of the federal building.
Timothy McVeigh, 26, was held in a correctional center after being charged Friday with the bombing. Authorities said McVeigh, an ex-soldier, was enraged at the government for the 1993 Waco, Texas, cult disaster.
A second man, Terry Nichols, 40, was being held in Kansas, where he lives, and Nichols' brother, James, was held Friday night in Michigan. Both are considered material witnesses, Justice Department spokesman Carl Stern said in Washington.
"These are very encouraging and positive steps, but there is much work to be done," said Weldon Kennedy, special FBI agent in charge of the investigation. He said the search was underway at other locations around the country but would not elaborate.
The second suspect was the man whose composite sketch was released Thursday by the FBI, the one with a tattoo on his left arm, Kennedy said.

In Washington, Stern said James Nichols was questioned and held Friday after his farm in Decker, Mich., was searched by investigators. He said both Nichols brothers were cooperating with federal investigators. Neither man has been charged.
Under federal law, prosecutors can obtain court permission to hold people as material witnesses in order to ensure that their testimony is available for investigators.
In Oklahoma City, a small cinder-block building that had been weakened by Wednesday's blast at the federal building 2-1/2 blocks away collapsed Saturday morning. Three people who were inside barely escaped injury.
One of the three, a man identified only as Don, told reporters that the structure's west wall had been leaning 6 to 8 inches at the top since the blast. The building housed a taxi dispatching service.
Rescue efforts at the federal building were suspended early Saturday because of stiff winds and rain, and concern that cracks on the south side of the building could cause part of it to collapse as workers remove rubble.
"We've got some cracks right now that are widening on us," Assistant Fire Chief Jon Hansen said. He said

officials were monitoring the cracks with time-lapse cameras, which can detect if they are widening.
"It's difficult right now to tell when we will be able to get back to a full-scale operation," Hansen said.
Many spaces in the rubble have been spray-painted "DB" to identify where the bodies are.
"We see, we know where bodies are in the void but we can't get to them because of the rubble," Hansen said.
The toll from the bombing was 78 dead by late Friday, before wind, rain and a brief storm of pea-sized hail hampered workers and slowed the search.

The Deaf Smith County Clerk's office reported Friday afternoon that 35 ballots were marked in the two HISD trustee contests. City of Hereford voters cast 26 ballots and 29 votes were reported for DSCHD directors.
Seeking election to the District 4 school board seat are Elizabeth Agan and Roy Dale Messer. They are contesting for the seat formerly held by Mike Veazey who decided not to seek re-election.
Steve Wright, incumbent in the HISD District 5 seat, is challenged by Cherry Holt McWhorter and Jeff Matler.
On the City of Hereford ballot are incumbents Mayor Bob Jossens and Commissioner Silvana Juarez, Place 1. Scott Hall, appointed to an expired term in Place 3, is a candidate for a full two-year term.
Incumbents on the hospital board are Mal Manchec, Jo Beth Shackelford and Scott Keeling.
Early voting in all three elections is conducted in the courthouse office of Deaf Smith County Clerk David Ruland, between 8 a.m. and 5 p.m. daily.
Last day for early voting is May 2.

Shaw receives Lions International award

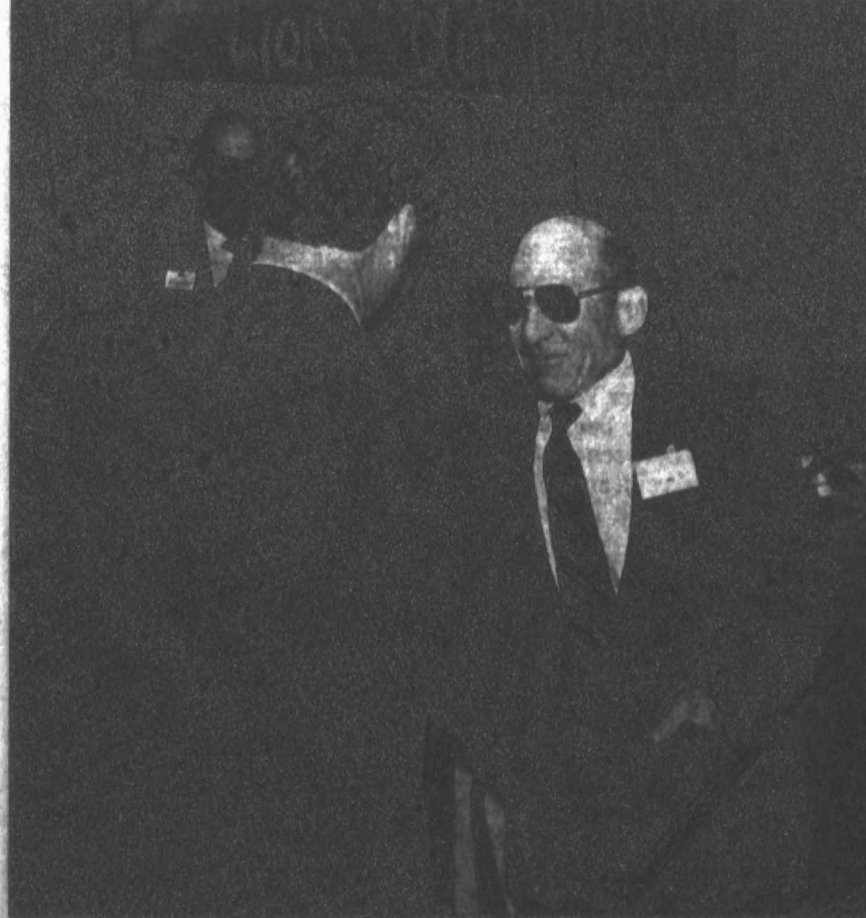

Wagner gives warning about hazards of sniffing inhalants

Hereford Police Chief David Wagner has issued an alert to residents that some local teenagers have recently been caught sniffing a popular brand of air freshener in order to get high.
According to the Texas Prevention Partnership, two Texas teens died last summer from sniffing Glade air freshener.
Wagner said incidents of teens here sniffing the same product have been reported.
"What we've seen is quite a bit of this stuff going on the last three weeks in the county," Wagner said. "Our community is not any more unique than any other in Texas."
"I'm not telling these kids what's the latest fad, they're telling me what's the latest fad," the chief continued.
The TPP reported three toxic substances -- n-propane, butane and isobutane -- were found in the blood of a Plano teenager who died after inhaling the air freshener last July.
These products are known as

cardiac irritants, the organization notes.
Wagner said criminal activity connected with sniffing Glade air freshener has increased in recent weeks.
"We've got calls on shoplifting on these products, also runaways and criminal mischief related to this and we have found as many as 21 cans in

one spot," he said.
Wagner said this particular product is just the latest in a string of many items teens have sniffed. Some of the products, he said, have been reformulated to the high-producing substances are removed.

Celebrity auction offers items from famous people to benefit Foundation

What is believed to be Hereford's first "Celebrity Auction" is scheduled Saturday, April 29, in the administration office of Hereford Independent School District, beginning at 6 p.m.
The benefit auction, a major fundraiser for Deaf Smith Healthcare Foundation, will offer donated items which should interest all potential buyers. The "celebrity" items include donations from nationally-known athletes, entertainers and politicians, as well as items from local and area artists of note.
The unique auction will have an admission price of \$2.50 a person, but this includes a bonus-and-cornbread supper from 6 to 7 p.m., and the chance at a door prize of two airline tickets to the Caribbean, donated by American Airlines.
Because of the large number of items, a "silent auction" will start during the supper and the live auction begins at 7 o'clock. Items for the live auction will also be on display from 6 to 7. The live auction is expected

to last 1 1/2 to 2 hours.
Sylvia Khari, executive director of the Healthcare Foundation, stressed that the items range "from the unusual to the usual, and everyone should find something of interest in their price range."
She added that the project took about nine months to put together-- primarily because of the time involved in securing celebrity items.
But the long planning period should pay off, because some of those items include such top-notch bidding attractions as footballs signed by Dallas Cowboy stars Troy Aikman and Emmitt Smith. Other items from star athletes include an autographed basketball from Hakeem Olajuwon of the Houston Rockets, a signed baseball from Will Clark of the Texas Rangers, an autographed tennis ball from pro star Andre Agassi, a signed tee-shirt from Chris Evert, and a basketball autographed by Sheryl Swoopes, former Texas Tech star.
From the political arena, auction items include donated items from President and Mrs. George Bush,

Tipper Gore, former Gov. Ann Richards, President and Mrs. Carter, Sen. Phil Gramm, and Rep. Larry Combest.
Items were also donated by entertainers Clint Black, Wynona Judd, Carol Burnett, Reba McEntire, Connie Chung, Clint Eastwood and Whoopi Goldberg, Robert Redford, and Eddie Murphy.
Besides many items given by local merchants, other individuals and artists of the community and area are providing contributions. These include sculptures, paintings, jewelry, and everything from haircuts to food.
Some of these items could be coveted more than the those of national celebrity status. Just to name a few, there will be sculptures by Andy Wilks and Kenneth Wyatt, a piece of pottery from Ivan Tippis, a Santa Claus doll by Ruth Black, a painting by Giles Boone, and a gourmet dinner for six from Dr. Duffy McBrayer and Mary Messer.
Among the auction block will be such unique items as four Bibles--two covered with Mother of Pearl and two

covered with olive wood--that were blessed at the Holy Tomb of Jesus in the Holy Land; a money jar (amount unknown) from First National Bank; a kid's backyard swing set; and a weekend use of a Colorado condominium for 6 to 8 people.
A list of items can be found in today's issue of The Hereford Brand, and some late items are expected.
The foundation is also selling \$10 raffle tickets for a chance at two American Airlines tickets to any destination in Europe. The winner's name will be drawn at the auction.
The Deaf Smith Healthcare Foundation is a non-profit corporation which will build and maintain an endowment fund for Hereford Regional Medical Center and healthcare in general.
The foundation will give financial stability to the hospital by providing needed equipment, help in recruiting healthcare professionals, by providing scholarships for students with a commitment to returning to the county, and other projects.

Jury's revolt throws O.J. trial into turmoil

LOS ANGELES (AP) - Discontent among the O.J. Simpson jurors surged into open revolt, with 13 members of the panel attempting to boycott the trial over the abrupt dismissal of three deputy guards.

Superior Court Judge Lance Ito called off testimony Friday while he interviewed seven jurors and wrestled with the legal ramifications of the discontent among some members of the panel.

"I have grave doubts that this case is ever going to lumber to a verdict," said noted defense attorney Leslie Abramson, in the courthouse on another case. "I think the odds against keeping these people together under these terms is very high.... You can't sequester people for this long with no end in sight."

Ito planned to interview more jurors Monday. He also planned to talk to the contingent of sheriff's deputies assigned to the jurors, his spokeswoman said. The trial is scheduled to resume Tuesday.

Simpson is on trial for the June 12, 1994, slaying of his ex-wife Nicole Brown Simpson, and her friend Ronald Goldman.

Some legal experts said the jury's actions could constitute contempt of court and form a basis for mistrial, though they said that was unlikely.

"No one should panic yet," said Loyola University law Professor Laurie Levenson. "Judge Ito has to step in and hear these jurors out. I think it is possible for him to resolve the matter."

Levenson said she has never seen a case where jurors have boycotted a trial. "It's a serious situation that Judge Ito has to approach carefully," she said.

Friday's developments capped a week in which much of Ito's attention was focused on the jury. The judge halted testimony for part of Tuesday

and all of Wednesday so he could interview jurors one-on-one about a dismissed panelist's accounts of racial strife and personality conflicts among jurors. After those interviews, Ito said he had found no misconduct.

Testimony resumed Thursday, but the trial was quickly knocked off track again.

Sources said many jurors were in tears when they left the courthouse Thursday night after being told that three of the sheriff's deputies assigned to guard them had been removed because of complaints by a small contingent of the panel.

The deputies handle the 24-hour job of keeping jurors insulated from outside influences and news accounts of the trial. Dismissed juror Jeanette Harris had told the judge that jurors were separated by race when they exercised, went shopping, or watched movies.

She blamed the deputies for some of the problems, saying the jurors were being treated as if they were prisoners and that deputies were fueling discord among them.

"To some degree, she's right," Deputy Scott Matthews, one of the reassigned jury guards, told the Pasadena Star-News on Friday. He would not respond in detail to Harris' allegation that deputies showed favoritism toward white jurors.

Matthews said the dismissed deputies are scapegoats for other problems in the trial, the newspaper reported.

"We are just doing our jobs and everything was taken out of proportion and exaggerated," he said.

Rebellious jurors balked at coming to court Friday and asked Ito to come to their hotel. The judge said they had to come to court to speak with him, sheriff's sources said.

Jurors then were driven to the courthouse and marched into the courtroom as if in a funeral procession, stone-faced and with most of them dressed in black.

Local man claims distinction of being first swimmer in old pool

With the demise of the old Hereford swimming pool comes the end of a relationship that held Hereford resident L.J. Clark for nearly half a century.

Clark, 69, claims the distinction of having been the first person ever to swim in the pool, jumping in for a dip even before construction was complete back in 1948.

Clark was an employee with Parkhill, Smith and Cooper, the consulting engineers in charge of a massive project that included paving some 200 blocks of city streets and construction of the new swimming pool.

"An instrument person, Clark was responsible for checking grades on the construction work, making sure streets drained properly and the pool was built just right.

"Really I was just a general supervisor over what was going on when the engineer wasn't there," he said.

As construction on the new pool continued, Clark said, he got permission from his supervisor to be the first person to take a dip when water was added.

"I had asked the engineer if I could be the first one to swim in it and he

said yes. I wore my swimsuit for three days," he said.

Finally, the historic day arrived. Clark said he could not remember the exact day the pool was filled, but said he was sitting with then-Mayor W.E. Dameron.

"When it got up to the steep part, I started pulling my clothes off," he recalled with a chuckle, remembering the mayor's futile protests. A short dive later, Clark said, brought the young man in contact with "the coldest water in the world."

Officially, the pool opened on July 18, 1948.

History does not record who the "official" first person in the pool was, but Clark relishes his memories of the dive.

Clark said the pool project was just part of an extensive modernization of the city that he had a part in. The engineering company he worked for had been awarded contracts to pave a large part of the city's streets and to build the sewer plant.

Originally, he said, the contract was for 180 blocks to be paved, but that was later increased to 200 blocks.

Before that, he said, Hereford had only two paved streets -- U.S. 60 and U.S. 385 -- although several streets in the central part of the city were

paved with brick, including Main Street and several others.

The paving project was designed to turn many residential and outlying feeder streets from dirt to asphalt.

In addition, the company built the outfall line -- which is the main line running into the sewer plant -- and the sewer plant itself.

Later, Clark had further dealings with Hereford streets.

He left the engineering firm after the pool and street project, attending Texas Tech University for one semester, then accepted a job with the state highway department, where he would work until retiring in November 1986.

Clark worked in the Hereford area with the highway department, from his first project as an inspector on Loop 211 from U.S. 385 to U.S. 60 (East Park Avenue) until his last job.

He also was on hand for the paving of FM 1058 (or the Harrison Highway, or West Park Avenue) from U.S. 385 west for 37-1/2 miles to the New Mexico line.

That, Clark said, was one of the first farm roads in Texas that was paved.

Overall, Clark said, paving Hereford streets "got it out of the mud" and set the stage for future growth of Hereford.

BOMBING

spent more than an hour touring the bomb site early Saturday, arriving about 4:45 a.m. Gingrich did not want to disrupt the rescue effort, so he consulted with Federal Emergency Management Agency director James Witt before choosing a time to tour the site.

"He spent a pretty substantial amount of time visiting with rescue workers, and he thanked them for their help," said Rep. Frank Lucas, R-Okla., who along with Rep. Ernest Istook, R-Okla., joined Gingrich on the tour. "It obviously made an impression on him."

"I appreciate the speaker for not turning it into some kind of show," Gingrich also met with FBI agents to discuss the continuing investigation.

About 150 people remained unaccounted for, and about 200 others were injured in the blast, caused by thousands of pounds of fuel-and-fertilizer explosives packed into a Ryder rental truck.

Rescue workers expected the toll to rise still more Saturday as they reached the portion of the ruined building that held a day care center

and Social Security Administration office.

After a 15-minute appearance before the magistrate he called "sir," McVeigh was taken to the El Reno Federal Correctional Center 30 miles away pending court hearings next Thursday.

Two court-appointed attorneys represent him for now against a charge of "malicious damaging and destroying by means of an explosive a building or real property, whole or in part, possessed or used in the United States."

The government has said it would seek the death penalty.

Nichols, wearing blue jeans and accompanied by his wife and daughter, drove his blue pickup into the police parking lot and walked inside to surrender, saying he had heard his name on television. The Wichita Eagle reported Saturday.

McVeigh, a ringer for an FBI artist's suspect's sketch in circulation since Thursday, had been sitting in a county jail 63 miles away since his arrest in a traffic stop less than 1-1/2 hours after the bombing.

Many in a crowd of 250 spectators booed and some shouted "Baby-killer" as he was brought out of the Noble County Jail for the trip here. Dozens of base personnel and their families also yelled and booed from across the

road when heavily armed federal agents and soldiers took him to the court appearance.

Stopped Wednesday morning because he didn't have a license plate on his 1977 Mercury Marquis, McVeigh also was charged with carrying a concealed weapon after the trooper took a loaded Glock semiautomatic from him, authorities said. But he likely would have posted bail on five misdemeanor counts and slipped away if he hadn't been recognized.

"He came desperately close to making bail," said Mark Gibson, assistant district attorney in Perry.

After early suspicions that the Alfred P. Murrah Federal Building was targeted by international terrorists, Friday's developments pointed strongly to homegrown violence from the extremist anti-government movement.

In court papers, the FBI said the former co-worker called the bureau Friday after seeing the sketch on television. He described McVeigh, who served in the Army at Fort Riley, Kan., as having "extreme right-wing views" and anger over Waco.

The Waco debacle began with a deadly gun battle between the Branch Davidian religious cult and agents of the Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco and Firearms.

Sen. Pryor announces retirement

LITTLE ROCK, Ark. (AP) - U.S. Sen. David Pryor, an icon in Arkansas politics for more than three decades, announced his retirement Friday, the fifth Senate Democrat not to seek re-election.

His retirement opens the door for Arkansas Republicans to send a senator to Washington for the first time in more than a century.

The 60-year-old Pryor still is immensely popular in his home state, having been a state legislator, congressman and governor before going to Washington.

He won his third term in 1990, facing only a write-in opponent and taking 99.8 percent of the vote.

He suffered a heart attack in April 1991 and underwent heart bypass surgery in November 1992.

However, Pryor said neither his health nor the Republican takeover of Congress prompted his decision, which he said he made long before the 1994 elections.

"There comes a time, I think, when one should step aside, and for me that time has come," Pryor told more than 250 well-wishers at his announcement. "A seat in the U.S. Senate should not become the personal property of one individual."

Pryor said he was reluctant to leave, particularly with Republicans holding a 54-46 edge in the Senate going into the 1996 election.

"I hope my colleagues and I hope our president and my friends will not think I'm deserting the party at the time of, perhaps, its greatest need," he said. "But I think that I can still help this party and I want to help this party."

Four other Senate Democrats have announced they will not seek re-election: Paul Simon of Illinois, James Exon of Nebraska, Howell Heflin of Alabama and Bennett Johnston of Louisiana.

Sen. Claiborne Pell, D-R.I., announced recently he had been diagnosed with Parkinson's disease, but he has not said yet if he will retire. Sen. Sam Nunn, D-Ga., also is weighing whether to leave.

Sen. Alphonse D'Amato, R-N.Y., said Friday that Pryor's seat would receive the Republican Party's highest priority.

State to expect rain for part of weekend

Showers and thunderstorms are forecast across Texas Saturday, with some clearing skies in North Texas. Rain is likely to continue through Sunday.

determine if a child is inhaling substances from outward symptoms.

"Every chemical's different," he said.

However, parents can be aware that their children may be sniffing air freshener in other ways.

"I think No. 1 is smell them when they come in," he said. "They see the cans in the bedroom, they smell it on their kid."

In addition to its possibly deadly side effects, Wagner said sniffing inhalants also bears a criminal penalty.

"It is an offense to inhale, so be intoxicated by inhalants," he said.

"This is the newest fad and hopefully it'll die down," he said.

"I bet I looked at the numbers on that ticket 50 times after the drawing. But I still couldn't believe that I had won," he said.

"He called me to check the

numbers," Alice Lowmire added. "And I knew he had won. His heart was beating so fast, I could hear it over the telephone."

Lowmire received a check for \$1.31 million, the first of 20 annual payments.

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According to some businessmen in Mississippi Delta

Casinos taking money, not infusing economy

EDITOR'S NOTE - Like cotton, casino gambling was supposed to infuse badly needed cash into the Mississippi Delta, one of the poorest regions of the country. But according to some business owners in the Delta town of Greenville, it hasn't worked out that way. The casinos, they say, are mainly taking money from the local folk.

GREENVILLE, Miss. (AP) - Sam Samanader figured his trendy men's shop would hit the jackpot when floating casinos brought blackjack, roulette and slot machines to this old river city.

Now he wonders if the floating gaming houses are doing anything more than slowly draining the pockets of poor Mississippi Delta residents

with lofty dreams of instant riches. "People who were shopping are not shopping like they used to. We thought it would be better when the casinos came in," Samanader said as he stood among racks of the latest fashions at Georgio's. "When I go to the casinos I see my customers all over the place."

Samanader's 7-year-old shop sits in the middle of a row of stores that many believed would ring up increased sales with the arrival of gambling two years ago.

Now some downtown business owners are complaining that they were duped into believing casinos would attract hordes of deep-pocketed tourists willing to spend their vacation cash at the crap tables and with local merchants.

Keeping old customers and finding

new ones is vital in the Delta, traditionally one of the nation's poorest regions. The per capita income in Washington County, where Greenville is located, is \$13,203, less than two-thirds of the national average.

"It hasn't brought any tourists," says Linda Presswood, whose A&S Pawn Shop is just a few blocks away from Greenville's two casinos. "They need to put more back into the community than they're taking out."

The customer base for Greenville's two floating casinos, docked on Lake Ferguson near the city's Mississippi River levee, differs from that at most of Mississippi's 28 other casinos.

Beaches, sunshine and other attractions draw many out-of-towners to the 12 casinos spread across the Mississippi Gulf Coast. Casinos there

Combined, the two employ more than 1,000 people.

John Halbrook, executive director of the Washington County Convention and Visitors' Bureau, says casino payrolls mean money back into the local economy.

Halbrook insists the casinos do draw tourists.

"We have a lot of tour buses coming to town," he says. "These are people staying in our hotels, eating in our restaurants."

Halbrook and other officials are working to reform the area's image and attract more visitors. He doesn't think it will be a hard sell.

"We have the essence of Mississippi," he says. "People are fascinated with what we have here."

Some experts say a broad customer base may be what the casinos and the city need.

"If the goal is to generate unusually large tax revenues for the county or Delta they're going to have to draw from outside the area," says Craig Silvers, a Los Angeles gaming analyst. "All they're doing otherwise is recycling money."

Stuart Allen, a drug and alcohol abuse counselor in nearby Bolivar County, says he expects to see many of the Delta's residents coming to him soon for help with gambling addictions.

"It was supposed to solve our economic problems," Allen says. "In some respects it has, in others it hasn't."

"It's like being in the eye of a hurricane. You don't see the destruction that's going on."

draw traffic from New Orleans and other nearby cities in Louisiana, Alabama and Florida.

Casinos in Vicksburg and Natchez, both on the Mississippi River, draw

heavily from Louisiana, while Tunica, north of Greenville in the Mississippi Delta, has a ready-made market for its booming casino business in nearby Memphis, Tenn.

But in Greenville, there is the local population of about 45,000, tourists from mostly rural southeast Arkansas and a sprinkling of visitors from other states.

Some business owners said that judging from their cash registers, the real customer base for Greenville doesn't stretch much beyond the city limits.

Presswood moved her pawn shop in 1993 from a 10-year location to the other side of the city in anticipation of an influx of customers drawn by casinos. They never came.

Instead, she says, many of her old customers are hocking their possessions at her store and can't afford to redeem them.

"Unless they've got something else to pawn," she says, "I've lost a customer."

Presswood says the arrival of gambling has "helped people get some jobs but I can't see that it has helped the economy that much."

Hal Fava has a different story to tell.

Fava says his 44-year-old Walnut

Street Pawn Shop, located just yards from the casinos, has thrived in recent years and many of his customers are people who have won at the casinos and want to use winnings to buy something.

But, Fava adds: "Pawns have gone up 30 percent."

Greenville didn't get its first casino until 1993 when The Cotton Club Casino opened. It was followed a few months later by The Las Vegas Casino.

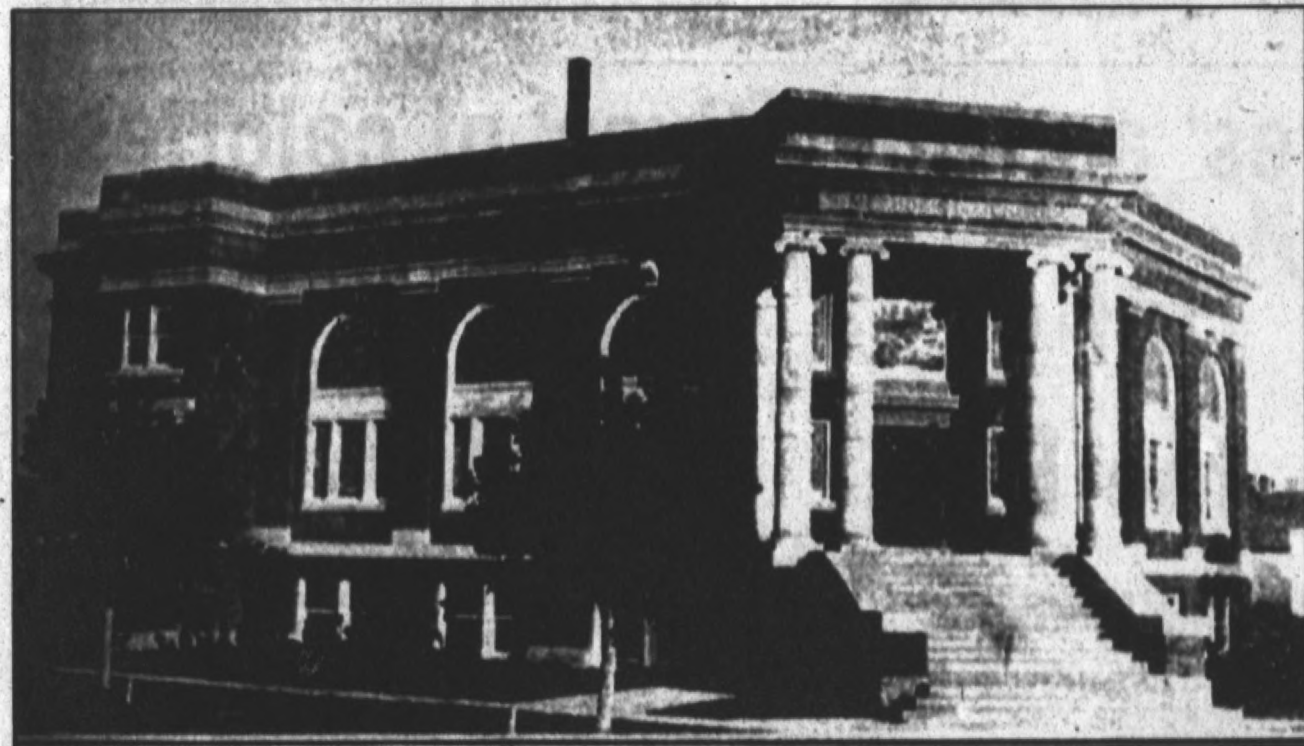

Methodist Church in 1922

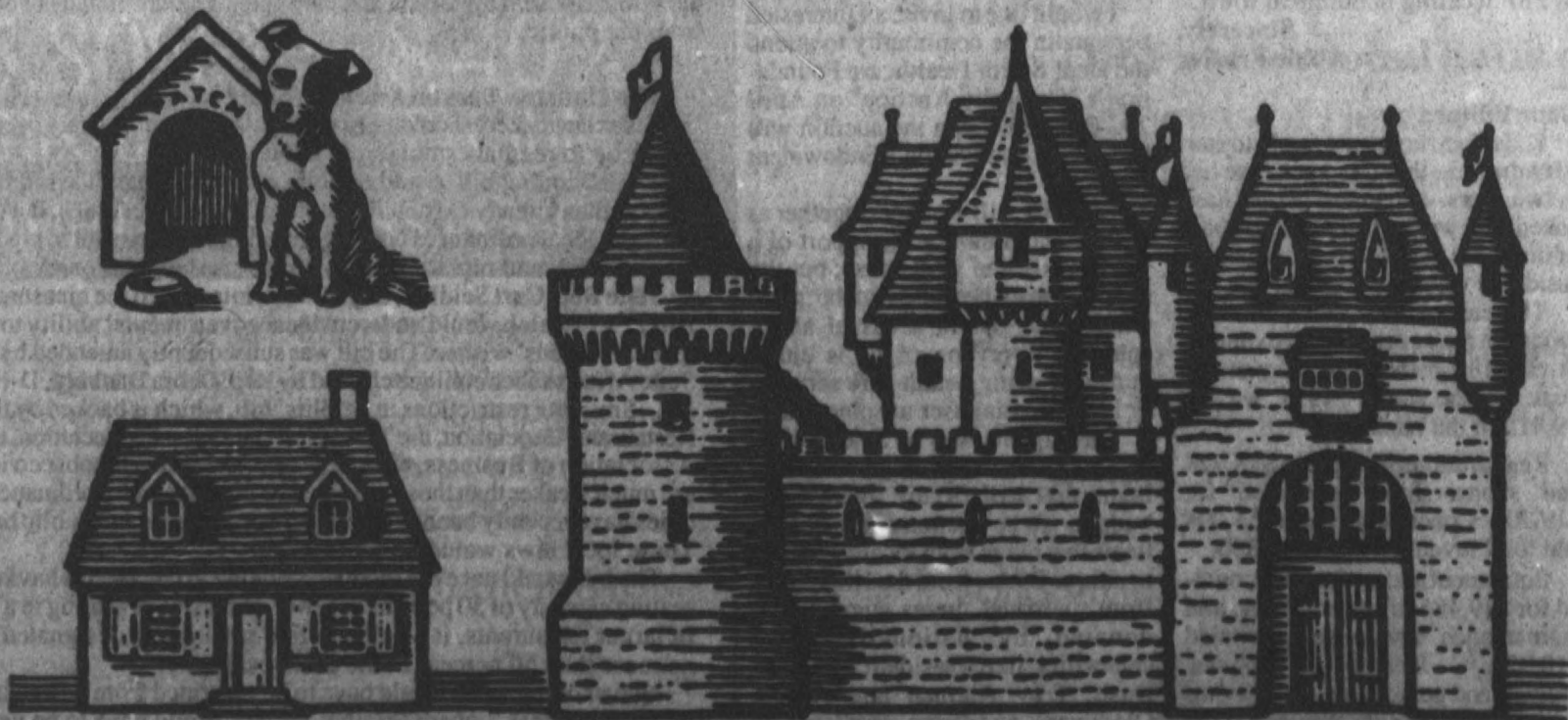

Cockleburrs and Devil's Claws

Having been accused recently of old fogeyism, I feel obliged to live up to that label.

Although no fan of the current music enjoyed by most young people, I have discovered that a comparison of music of one generation with another is less satisfying than expected.

In my mind's ear, the music and singers of the '40s and '50s were inordinately better than the rock of the last three and a half decades.

The words with the music of 50 years ago were understandable. I can't say as much for today's music. After listening to more than two hours of 50-year-old recorded songs, though, the only thing I'm certain of is they're different from today.

The tunes as played by Glenn Miller, Artie Shaw, Benny Goodman, Duke Ellington and other luminaries of the era have a sameness about them that becomes apparent only when heard in succession.

The voices, whether male or female, seem to be crooning the songs. The names are a who's who of the music business -- Perry Como, Bing Crosby, the Andrews Sisters, Rudy Vallee, Kate Smith, et al.

While the years of World War II were tragic and terrible, the music was a bond between the men overseas and the families who were "keeping the home fires burning" (sounds like a song, huh?).

There was a kind of romance about the men going off to fight a war while their wives or sweethearts worked in war plants or took care of the children.

"Don't Sit Under the Apple Tree with Anyone Else But Me" was an admonition that, if the truth were known, made little sense. Another song with apple in the title, "I'll Be with You in Apple Blossom Time," was a wish made by millions.

Songs with some other kind of relationship with war in the title were many and varied. What about "Bell Bottom Trousers" or "He Wears a Pair of Silver Wings" for a start?

Then there were "Johnny Zero" and "Coming in on a Wing and a Prayer," as well as "Remember Pearl Harbor."

A little boogie goes a long way, as

heard in a plain "Boogie Woogie" or "Boogie Woogie Bugle Boy."

Granted, nostalgia buffs will remember these tunes, even sing a few bars, maybe.

In my thinking, the most notable accomplishment of those years is the sound generated by Glenn Miller. And, there's something tragically romantic about the loss of Miller in an American war aircraft.

But, I have to admit, listening to a couple hours of those wartime songs can be as tiring to the ears as rock is to us old folks.

After years of telling my children that their music is nothing compared to the music of my day, I wouldn't want them to hear these tapes. They would laugh me out of the house.

Don't be misled, I'm not about to say the current music standards are better. They're just different.

Another thing, hillbilly and cowboy music -- as we used to refer to a particular kind of music -- has become more sophisticated, at least in title. Now we call it country and western. It doesn't matter much to me what it's called, I still don't enjoy it very much.

And, I know so little about C&W that a few years ago, I listened impatiently as a friend extolled the talent of a well-known male singer. In my ignorance, I had no more idea than a goose who she was talking about.

Finally, in total frustration, I asked, "Who in the world is George Strait?" My friend has never let me forget my abject ignorance.

To tell the truth, my favorite music has to be the musical comedy words and music, especially Rodgers and Hammerstein.

But, back to the music of the war years...

My position that the words of songs of the era were all understandable, in direct contrast to this current age, won't hold water, I'm afraid.

Some of the musical renditions of Spike Jones and the City Slickers made little sense, at first listening.

But the most notable example of an understandable probably is "The Hut-Sat Song." That's right up there with the best of 'em.

Editorials from around the State

Amarillo Daily News on White House access:

Not surprisingly, attacks on the White House have the president's security forces worried. But in their zeal to protect the president and his residence, they may take security measures too far.

In response to shots fired at the White House and a plane crashing on the mansion's lawn, then-Treasury Secretary Lloyd Bentsen appointed a panel to study how to improve security. The panel is reportedly going to recommend closing off Pennsylvania Avenue in front of the White House to pedestrian and automobile traffic. Presidential spokesman Michael McCurry said the president probably will defer to the panel's recommendations.

But is making the White House more inaccessible the answer? Don't forget, the White House belongs to the public. The president and his staff occupy it only for as long as voters allow them...

While closing off a section of Pennsylvania Avenue may make security sense, it doesn't make democratic sense. Don't forget, this panel is looking at the issue from a security perspective. That means there is a bias to extending security perimeters. What will the next step be? Clearing out the surrounding blocks?

The White House has good security. It's true that opening the mansion to the public creates risks, but those risks are worth it. The symbolism of having the head of state's residence accessible to the public is too important. This nation is founded on the principle of "we the people" and that means the White House, Capitol Hill and the Supreme Court should not be hidden from the public.

The Houston Post on smoking bans:

Texas lawmakers should kill a proposal to pre-empt local governments' authority to regulate smoking in public.

The offending bill would establish uniform statewide requirements weaker than already exist in Houston and some other cities. It would also wipe out local ordinances curbing smoking that were not in place before Jan. 1, 1994, and replace them with the state regulations.

State Rep. Curt Seidits, D-Sherman, introduced the measure - House Bill 2973 - which would undercut local governments' ability to respond to their citizens' wishes. The bill was subsequently amended by a House State Affairs subcommittee chaired by Rep. Debra Danburg, D-Houston.

... Smoking restrictions in Seidits' bill, which is backed by the Texas Restaurant Association, the Texas Hotel and Motel Association, the Texas Association of Business, chambers of commerce and tobacco interests, are much weaker than those provided by numerous city ordinances. Some cities have recently banned smoking in restaurants and public buildings. These local laws would be snuffed out.

The bill would not even regulate smoking in restaurants having indoor seating capacity of 50 persons or fewer, exclusive of seating in a bar area. In larger restaurants, it would confine smoking to designated areas of no more than 50 percent of the dining capacity.

Non-smoking areas would have to be separated from designated areas by at least 4 feet "where feasible." They would have to be ventilated, "where feasible," and situated so that air from the smoking area was not drawn into or across them. But the bill requires no structural changes or expenditures - no separate ventilating systems, for example - to create non-smoking areas.

If business organizations want uniform standards, they should shoot for much tougher ones. Even so, a state law should not tell cities they cannot protect public health better.

If the bill's repeal and state pre-emption provisions are not eliminated, the Legislature should kill the measure altogether.

COP volunteers curb crime in Fort Worth

FORT WORTH, Tex. (AP) - Jennie Skidmore, a retired woman at home alone, discovered she needed a few things at the store. Be back in a jiffy, she said to no one, and hopped in her car.

As it disappeared down the street a nondescript auto with three men pulled up in front of her house. One got out. The car drove around to the back. The other two got out.

Just then a third car, with a blue emblem on the door, cruised by.

Spotting it, the two men jumped back in their auto, rushed around front to collect the third, and sped off.

When Mrs. Skidmore returned a police officer greeted her at the door.

"I wasn't gone 20 minutes," she recalled. "Can you imagine? I nearly got robbed."

Now Jennie Skidmore's own Toyota bears a blue emblem. It identifies members of COP - Citizens on Patrol. COP numbers about 3,000 Fort Worth citizen volunteers, a group three times the size of the city's police force.

They are trained at the city's police academy and equipped with police radios. And they are backed up by a specific neighborhood patrol officer who, as in the abortive Skidmore break-in, can answer a call in minutes.

So COP is a far cry from simply well-meaning neighbors who take turns "keeping an eye on things." Indeed, COP is the linchpin in an approach to law enforcement that appears to be gathering steam in city after city across America.

The results in Fort Worth tell why. Since community policing began here four years ago:

- Burglaries have gone down by 51 percent.
- Grand theft by 38 percent.
- Auto theft by 60 percent.
- Robberies by 31 percent.
- Aggravated assaults by 56 percent.

"I almost don't believe it myself," says Fort Worth Police Chief Thomas Windham. "But look at the figures. The city's overall crime rate has been reduced by 44 percent. It is the lowest it's been since 1978. Community policing is largely responsible for that. Not entirely, but largely."

That's because COP is just one aspect of a broader endeavor the city calls Code:Blue, a catchword borrowed from hospital jargon to signify an emergency.

What it signifies in Fort Worth is the city's priority at getting citizens involved in taking back their neighborhoods. In many American cities, Fort Worth among them, it has been a goal viewed as an emergency. Code:Blue enlists the support of local businesses as well as every city department - police, schools, parks, housing, sanitation, roads - the works.

"Code:Blue is more than a name and more than a program," says Chief Windham. "It's a philosophy. It's a concept that recognizes the critical difference between law enforcement and crime prevention."

According to Joseph Brann,

director of Community Oriented Policing Services in Washington, D.C., an offspring of the Justice Department, "Fort Worth is one of the country's best models of this approach to policing."

"Five or six years ago you couldn't have found more than a dozen examples in the nation of community policing," Brann said. "Now literally hundreds of cities are adopting it."

The reason for the upswing, he says, is because the crime bill that Congress passed last year ties the money for 100,000 new cops by the year 2000 to community policing.

"Chiefs complain they favor the idea but don't have the resources," said Brann. "This gives them the resources. Once a city gets started it will stick to it, find the resources."

Chicago, as one example, instituted community policing in five pilot districts. Professor Wesley Slogan of Northwestern University's Center for Urban Affairs, after a yearlong study, found "significant, visible improvements in the quality of life. . . . The single most impressive set of outcomes I've seen yet."

Chicago is now expanding the scheme to its 20 other police districts.

"I'll tell you what Fort Worth thinks of it," says Mayor Kay Granger.

"Can you imagine any city these days voting for a tax INCREASE? Well, last month we voted a sales tax increase to raise \$120 million to fund Code:Blue over the next five years. That's what we think of it."

Local businesses have sponsored management training courses, donated rent-free units for storefront police and COP use, house trailers for mobile police ministrations. ("Park one in front of a dope house," says Chief Windham, "it has an immediate effect.") One officer explained COP to a Lions Club meeting and left with a dozen pairs of donated binoculars.

Code:Blue, says the chief, "requires the public's complete involvement and a willingness to try anything within reason to prevent crime. 'Hey, folks, tell us what you think it will take. No limits.'"

"Some areas might want a gym opened at night, for example, a basketball league. That's what they want. OK. But what they need is job training. So we combine the two. If that approach doesn't work we try something else."

What Fort Worth has tried so far seems to be working, so the figures say. Equally revealing is what the people say.

Jay Stott, 57, lives in South Hills, a middle-income neighborhood with many retirees. "We've gotten rid of all the crack houses and one chop shop," he said. "Now we see people in the parks again."

Jesse Kemp is COP coordinator in Highland Hills, a predominantly black neighborhood in South Fort Worth. He is 58, owns a janitorial service and has put three sons through college. He says he worries less nowadays about his teen-age grandson. "We don't have anybody hanging out on the corners anymore. People feel comfortable getting out again."

"Stopping crime is one result of COP," said Chief Windham. "Reducing the fear of crime is as important. Fear drives people inside, behind locked doors, destroying the neighborhood concept. What kind of life is that?"

Sheldon and Karen Field saw that concept return to their neighborhood of Fairmont where drug dealers and prostitutes once operated openly.

"We were sitting in the car at 2:30 one morning observing a place known for drug sales. Suddenly a woman popped up at the car window, just to chat. She had lived there 25 years but rarely came out at night. There she was, in her robe, in the middle of the night, chatting with us about the neighborhood."

The emblem on cars such as the Fields', the COP emblem, is a magnetic device, like an oversize

refrigerator magnet, and can be switched from car to car. On duty, patrolers wear light-blue windbreakers, T-shirts and baseball caps. By now they and their cars are recognized, and waved at with enthusiasm, all over town.

COP has spread to 97 neighborhoods so far. It will perhaps double by year's end, as fast as a large backlog can complete the 12-hour training course. Patrolers learn police procedures, how to spot crime and what to look for. They have two rigid rules: Never leave the car, never confront a suspect.

Essential to the community policing concept is the Neighborhood Patrol Officer, or, bowing to Code:Blue's penchant for initials, the NPO.

An NPO is assigned to every COP neighborhood or clusters of neighborhoods, a throwback to the old-

fashioned cop-on-the-beat. Except the 1990s version drives a car with a computer, an assortment of telephones, radios, beepers and what all. NPOs are on call 24 hours a day, adjust their own schedules.

"The people get to know us, confide in us, and if we see to their problems they learn to trust us," said Officer Roy Guilfour, a West Division NPO. "Even something as minor as replacing a broken street light. We know how to cut through the red tape and get it done. That gains confidence."

In some cases, more than just confidence.

Officer Jim Smith was the NPO in Cavile, an area encompassing 300 apartments and known as Fort Worth's war zone. He had become well known to all its 1,200 citizens. At first he didn't seem to fit because his was practically the only white

face. Nonetheless he shared their worries, solved their problems, gained their trust.

"Don't call it war zone," Smith said evenly. "And don't call it a project. Cavile is a neighborhood."

In that neighborhood on June 4, 1993, Officer Smith made what is still called a drug bust. It wound up a wrestling match. The man grabbed Smith's gun from its holster and shot him in the leg, shattering the bone. He fired off more shots, and with the officer immobile on his back pointed the gun directly at his face.

Whereupon a woman threw herself across the officer's wounded body. At least 10 other residents called 911. Help came. The man fled and hid. Neighbors told police where to find him and they did.

Flowers overflowed Smith's hospital room. They came from Cavile, a neighborhood.

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Names in the news

LAS VEGAS (AP) - Casino magnate Steve Wynn usually wins when gamblers lose.

Now he stands to profit from the story, as well as the money, of an elderly man who parlayed \$400 into \$1.3 million during several days at Wynn's Treasure Island Hotel and Casino - then lost a big chunk of it.

Girls' golf team hopes February trip to San Angelo pays off now

Each year, Hereford golf coach Stacey Bixler hopes that playing in the San Angelo Invitational in February will pay off if his girls get to go back to San Angelo for the Region I-4A Tournament in April.

It often does pay off. In recent years, the Hereford girls' golf team played well enough in San Angelo to advance to the state tournament three years in a row, from 1991-93.

Bixler hopes it will work again, as the girls play in the regional tournament Monday and Tuesday at Riverside Municipal Course in San Angelo. Hereford won the regional tournament two years ago at Riverside, although the girls from that team are no longer around.

The five girls that make up the Herd now are Karen Manchec, Jana Baird, Jami Bell, Krista Beville and Stephanie Bixler. Those same five played in the San Angelo Invitational, finishing tenth against the best 4A and 5A teams in West Texas.

"This same five played when we went down there in February," coach Bixler said. "When we talked about (the course at practice Thursday), Krista pulled out a card she had jotted down on. It helps when they play on a course they've played before. It comes back to you."

Riverside is a good course for Hereford's team, rather that

Bentwood Country Club—the regional site last year.

"Of the courses we could play down south, (Riverside) is probably more like a Panhandle course," Bixler said. "It's probably got more trees, but the greens are fast. There's no sand traps. It has creeks going through it, but we've got that on our course. It really has a lot of similarities to Panhandle courses."

Hereford won't be one of the favorites in San Angelo. Hereford finished second in District 1-4A to Borger—although Hereford has qualified for state twice in the past after finishing second in district.

Andrews and Snyder should be the favorites, because both of those schools went to state last year and returned most of the girls that took them there. However, Bixler

emphasizes that the regional tournament is just two days of golf, and whichever two teams play the best get to go on to Austin.

"We always look at it like it's a reprieve," he said. "Everybody starts even. It doesn't matter what you did this year, or what you did last year. I think we've got as good a chance as any team down there. We've seen a lot of those teams before, and I feel like we can play with the teams that are going to be down there."

Bixler won't know which of the 14 teams his girls will be paired with until after a coaches' meeting Sunday night. The key, he said, is to play well the first day so you get grouped with the top teams on Tuesday.

"You just hope you put up a score the first day, that'll put you in contention the next day," he said.

Herd doubles face unknown foes

Whenever the Hereford tennis team sends players to the Region I-4A tennis tournament, it's a mystery who else will be there from most other towns.

Hereford coach Ed Coplen tried to expose his players to non-Panhandle competition, taking them to a tournament in Abilene in March. Still, they rarely know what they're going to face until the first serve.

Hereford's representatives at this year's regionals—set for Monday and Tuesday in San Angelo—are two doubles teams. Pete Vargas and B.J. Lockmiller are the District 1-4A boys doubles champions, while Paige Robbins and Natalie McWhorter are the district runners-up in girls' doubles.

Coplen won't know who either will play until after a coaches' meeting Sunday night.

Robbins and McWhorter have been paired together all year and last spring, when they were alternates to the regional tournament. They have a 28-10 record this year in the fall and spring. They own impressive wins over top pairs from Andrews, Sweetwater, Burleson and Wichita Falls; Coplen can only hope those pairs will be in the tournament.

"I don't know that they're going

to be there, but they're some of the stronger teams in their district," Coplen said.

Vargas and Lockmiller started playing together in the spring but have bonded well enough to win tournaments in Abilene, Hereford and Amarillo, plus the District 1-4A tournament. Their record is 17-4.

Coplen has talked to coaches around the area, but hasn't found out much about the competition, except: "Supposedly, that whole Big Spring district (4-4A) put all of its good boys in doubles because Big Spring has one great singles player, so that district will be tough."

Both Hereford pairs will be fighting for a trip to the state tournament, which will be awarded to the top two finishers in each bracket of this tournament. They'd be Hereford's first representative at state since Greg Coplen, Ed's son, went in 1993.

Although coach Coplen doesn't know much about the competition, he does know something about what it'll take to get past the competition.

"They'll have to play with a lot of intensity and have to play real aggressively; I think that's the main thing they have to do," Coplen said. "They'll have to be relaxed. They

can't let the pressure of playing at regionals get to them. They have to play relaxed and go after the people they're playing."

"Both of (Hereford's pairs) have a good chance to advance," he said. "I'd really like to see us take some people back to state."

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Big league baseball isn't same game as in 1994

The Montreal Expos, led by Marquis Grissom and Larry Walker, were the top team in baseball last summer. Bo Jackson was a star attraction in the majors, Michael Jordan was the best draw in the minors.

Beginning Tuesday night, baseball starts trying to make its biggest comeback since the New York Mets rallied in the 10th inning to beat the Boston Red Sox in Game 6 of the 1986 World Series.

"Welcome to the Show" is the sport's new slogan, and fans will be asked to return, as if all is forgiven after a strike that robbed them of record chases, wrecked the World Series and ruined the spring with

replacement ball.

What they'll find, along with free tickets, half-price food and plenty of autographs is a game full of changes.

Five of the last seven World Series MVPs have moved on - Orel Hershiser, Dave Stewart and Pat Borders have signed with new teams, Jack Morris has retired and Frank Viola is in limbo.

The last two AL Cy Young winners - David Cone and Jack McDowell - have been traded. Four league MVPs - Jose Canseco, Terry Pendleton, Andre Dawson and Kevin Mitchell have switched clubs.

More than one-tenth of the major leaguers have moved since anyone last threw a pitch that mattered. There was a 12-player trade between the Houston Astros and San Diego

Padres, the largest swap in 37 years, and a recent weekend in which nearly 100 players changed clubs.

Cal Ripken remained one of the few constants, entering the season 121 games short of Lou Gehrig's record string of 2,130. The Baltimore Orioles star is scheduled to break the mark Sept. 6 at Camden Yards.

The New York Yankees got McDowell, John Wetteland and Tony Fernandez, the Atlanta Braves acquired Grissom and the Toronto Blue Jays took Cone.

The Expos lost Grissom, Walker, Wetteland and Ken Hill while the Kansas City Royals traded away Cone and Brian McRae.

The Colorado Rockies spent more than \$35 million for Walker and Bill

Swift, and had a little left over to sign starting pitcher Omar Olivares. The Milwaukee Brewers could only afford to add injured Joe Oliver, and backups David Hulse and Fernando Vina.

"I'm sick about it," Detroit Tigers general manager Joe Klein said. "What has happened to Kansas City and Montreal is very, very unfair."

After eight months of bickering between Donald Fehr and Bud Selig led to the longest labor stoppage in U.S. sports history, this is the bind baseball is left in: the haves vs. the have-nots.

And there still isn't any kind of real agreement on revenue sharing.

"It was like someone took a Day-Glo yellow highlighter and ran it over the problem," Atlanta general manager John Schuerholz said.

Andre Dawson, Tom Browning and Benito Santiago all took pay cuts of more than \$3 million. Some, like Mitchell, Julio Franco, Shane Mack and Pete Incaviglia, left for Japan.

Had they stayed, this is what they would face as opening day approaches:

- A 144-game season, cut down from the regular 162. That's enough games to make for interesting races for the expanded playoffs, but surely not enough to allow for Ken Griffey Jr., Matt Williams and others to chase

Roger Maris' home-run mark.

Not since 1972, when the players struck for two weeks, has a season started with a trimmed schedule.

This year, teams can expect to play some one-game series, and also play the day after the All-Star game in Texas. Yankees manager Buck Showalter and Montreal manager Felipe Alou will manage the All-Star squads.

- Umpires have been locked out since Jan. 1, and crews of former major and minor league ump's, plus college and high school amateurs, have been calling exhibition games. Similar crews are set to work in the regular season if the real umpires do not return.

Players indicated they won't think about going on strike again, at least until next spring. They've also been signing more autographs, talking more to fans and throwing more balls into the stands. There still is no signed agreement with owners.

- With spring training shortened to three weeks, players are rushing to get ready. Even with rosters expanded from 25 to 28 into mid-May, look for pitchers to develop some sore arms by trying to work more than five or six innings in early games.

- Bo Jackson, Kent Hrbek, Jack Morris, Goose Gossage and Jeff Reardon have retired and Michael

Jordan has gone back to the NBA. Doc Gooden and Darryl Strawberry are suspended.

- The Rockies will play at 50,000-seat Coors Field. Kansas City will play on grass at Kauffman Stadium.

- Greg Maddux is aiming to extend his record streak to four straight Cy Young Awards, and Frank Thomas is bidding to become the first player ever to win three consecutive MVPs.

Dave Winfield, now with the Cleveland Indians, begins the season as the active home run leader with 463. Lee Smith, who signed with the California Angels, is the career saves leader with 434.

Rangers start season with new manager, no Canseco

ARLINGTON, Texas (AP) - Texas starts the 1995 season with a new general manager and new manager despite being ahead in the American League West when the strike began.

Although they were first, the Rangers were just 52-62 last season. That's why manager Kevin Kennedy and general manager Tom Grieve got booted. Doug Melvin was hired as GM from Baltimore and former Orioles manager Johnny Oates.

Melvin quickly traded Jose Canseco to Boston for centerfielder Otis Nixon and infielder Luis Ruiz. He then signed right-hander Bob Tewksbury, relievers Jeff Russell and Roger McDowell, designated hitter Mickey Tettleton, and infielders Mark McLemore and Mike Pagliarulo.

Texas, the host club for this summer's All-Star game, has had even more confusion than most teams this spring. Juan Gonzalez starts the season on the disabled list because of

a herniated disc. Manager John Oates will miss the first two weeks because his wife took ill; coach Jerry Narron will take over.

"Everything will be OK," Melvin said. "Everything will come together."

Nobody is sure when Gonzalez' back will heal.

"We don't think it's a season-ending thing," Melvin said. "It just needs rest."

When Gonzalez is healthy, the Rangers' regular lineup will have Will Clark at first, Jeff Frye at second, rookie Benji Gil at shortstop, Dean Palmer at third and Ivan Rodriguez behind the plate. In the outfield, Gonzalez will be in left, Nixon in center and Rusty Greer in right.

Kenny Rogers will be the opening day starter, followed by Tewksbury, Kevin Gross and Roger Pavlik. Other spots are open as new pitching coach Dick Bosman takes a hard look at his talent.

Oates said the Rangers like the deal they made for Nixon.

"I like Jose Canseco a lot," Oates said, "but we are going to be a better team with the players we have here. We've got more ways to score runs, and we might not have to score nine runs to win games with our pitching staff improving."

Nixon provides the Rangers with a base-stealing leadoff hitter. They haven't had one since Mickey Rivers. Nixon has a .354 on-base percentage and 252 stolen bases over the last five seasons.

Melvin, 42, is the sixth GM in club history. He's been in pro baseball since his playing days began in 1972. He has been an executive since the New York Yankees made him scouting director in 1985. He joined the Orioles the following year.

"Defense and pitching and staying free of injuries are the three areas the Rangers need to improve as a ballclub," he said. "Good defense will make pitching better."

New Astros will feature faster, more powerful lineup for 1995

HOUSTON (AP) - Pitcher Doug Drabek, first baseman Jeff Bagwell and second baseman Craig Biggio will be in their customary starting positions but after that, you'll need a scorecard to identify the Houston Astros.

A giant 12-player trade with the San Diego Padres last December and a pair of rookie prospects have changed the Astros dramatically and given them an extra push in the National League Central.

The Astros expect to be faster and more powerful.

"The thing that stands right out is this team has more speed," manager Terry Collins said. "We've got five or six guys that can steal 15-20 bases and that's the way I like to play. I'd say on paper this team looks like it's more my kind of team than last year's."

Former Padres Derek Bell, Phil Plantier and Craig Shipley will play key roles in the Astros chances of catching Cincinnati, which led Houston by a half game when the strike started last August.

Rookie shortstop Orlando Miller also gives the Astros a new look and another rookie, Brian Hunter, could

figure into the center field picture.

Bell, who will start in center field, was the key to the trade that also brought pitchers Doug Brocail and Pedro Martinez and shortstop Ricky Gutierrez to the Astros.

Plantier will start in left field and Shipley will platoon at third base with Chris Donnels. Luis Gonzalez moves from left to right field to start the season.

Bell will give opposing pitchers another serious problem, hitting ahead of Bagwell in the lineup. It will be more difficult to pitch around Bagwell.

"I hit the ball hard and Plantier hits the ball hard," Bagwell said. "But nobody on this team hits the ball as hard as Derek Bell, and in my opinion there aren't many guys in baseball who hit as hard as Derek."

Bagwell had a career year in 1994. He was the NL's most valuable player after hitting .368, his best average at any pro level, and leading the NL with 116 RBI and 104 runs.

Bagwell joined Orlando Cepeda in 1967 and Mike Schmidt in 1980 as the only players to receive unanimous MVP selection since the award was established in 1931.

Bell had his best year with the Padres last season with a .311

average. He had 135 hits and 54 RBI.

The Astros may have lost as much as they received. Gone are third baseman Ken Caminiti, center fielder Steve Finley, shortstop Andujar Cedeno, pitcher Brian Williams, infielder Roberto Petagine and a player to be named.

Drabek, who had a 12-6 record and 2.84 ERA last season, will be the opening day pitcher. The rest of the starting rotation will be Greg Swindell, Darryl Kile, Shane Reynolds and Mike Hampton.

Biggio wants to be a part of a champion.

"I want to be here when this team wins," Biggio said. "I want to be a part of it. I've seen the Rockets do it last year, and I want to be here when this team does it."

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"The Council would like for all Americans to be aware of these facts. And we hope that all consumers share the cotton industry's belief that

Jordan said the National Boll Weevil Eradication Program, conducted by the U.S. Department of Agriculture's Animal and Plant Health Inspection Service, is an outstanding IPM effort.

The program's tactics include interrupting the weevil's food supply and over-winter survival and monitoring weevil gone. With the weevil's demise, Georgia has seen its cotton acreage climb from 270,000 acres in 1989 to an estimated 1.2 million acres in 1995.

Jordan said the Council is encouraging environmental steward-

ship within the cotton industry. This was evidenced by the 1994 launch of The Cotton Foundation's High Cotton Awards program that recognizes

individual cotton farmers who employ environmentally-sound production methods.

The Council continues to support biocontrol projects aimed at improving cotton's relationship with the environment. Some examples of that leading edge research are:

* a genetically-engineered cotton variety, proven to be highly effective in resisting and actually killing cotton bollworms that eat on the plant, and

* *Catolaccus grandis*, a tiny wasp native to South America, which has attacked boll weevil larvae aggres-

sively and controlled that pest during two years of tests at a USDA research facility in South Texas.

In fact, at least 80 percent of USDA's Agricultural Research Service dollars are now being directed to developing biological and other alternatives to broadly toxic chemical control methods.

That is consistent with a joint goal of USDA, the Environmental Protection Agency and the Federal Drug Administration of reducing pesticide use on food crops and increasing the use of integrated pest management practices on 75 percent of crop acres by the year 2000.

"Now that the Cold War is over, DOE, through its Technology Transfer Program, is in a position to provide private industry and government agencies with the technology, state-of-the-art engineering and other expertise it hone during its involvement with the weapons industry," Jordan noted. "Such an arrangement could go a long way in helping cotton and other agricultural industries become even better stewards of the environment."

Deaf Smith water table declines according to area water district

Deaf Smith County ground water levels declined an average of 1.53 feet in 1994 in 88 privately-owned wells in the observation well network maintained by the High Plains Underground Water Conservation District No. 1 in its 529,200 acre service area within the county.

121,451 acre-feet of water in storage in the Ogallala Aquifer last year in the portion of Deaf Smith County within the Water District boundaries.

Don McReynolds, High Plains Water District Technical Division Director, said "Dry soil conditions during the past two years have increased the demand for ground water. In some heavy water use areas, there was a greater amount of decline in 1994 than in previous years," says Don McReynolds, High Plains Water District Technical Division Director.

Ground water levels within the Water District's Deaf Smith County service area decreased .89 of a foot during the 10-year period from 1985 to 1995. An average annual decline of 1.14 feet was recorded during the five-year period from 1990 to 1995.

Ground water levels in the Ogallala Aquifer within the 6.7 million acre Water District service area had an average decline of 2.15 feet from January 1993 to January 1994. This is a net decrease of about 2,160,750 acre-feet of ground water in storage in the Ogallala Aquifer with the Water District service area.

A zero average annual change in ground water levels was recorded for the first time in Water District's history in 1985.

Depth-to-water measurements revealed an average ground water level rise of 0.50 of a foot in 1986; an average rise of 0.90 of a foot in 1987; an average decline of 0.51 of a foot

in 1988; an average decline of one foot in 1989; an average decline of 1.06 feet in 1990; an average decline of 0.73 of a foot in 1991; an average rise of 0.14 of a foot in 1992; and an average decline of 1.46 feet in 1993.

A network of 1,184 privately-owned observation water wells is used to determine the annual change in the quantity of water in storage in the Ogallala Aquifer within the High Plains Water District. The depth-to-water measurements with those taken the previous year, McReynolds says Technical Division staff members can determine what changes have occurred in the ground water levels.

Of the 15 counties or portions of counties making up the High Plains Water District, only Randall County recorded an average rise in depth-to-water levels in 1994. The counties with average declines in depth-to-water levels in 1994 were Armstrong, Bailey, Castro, Cochran, Crosby, Deaf Smith, Floyd, Hale, Hockley, Lamb, Lubbock, Lynn, Parmer, and Potter Counties.

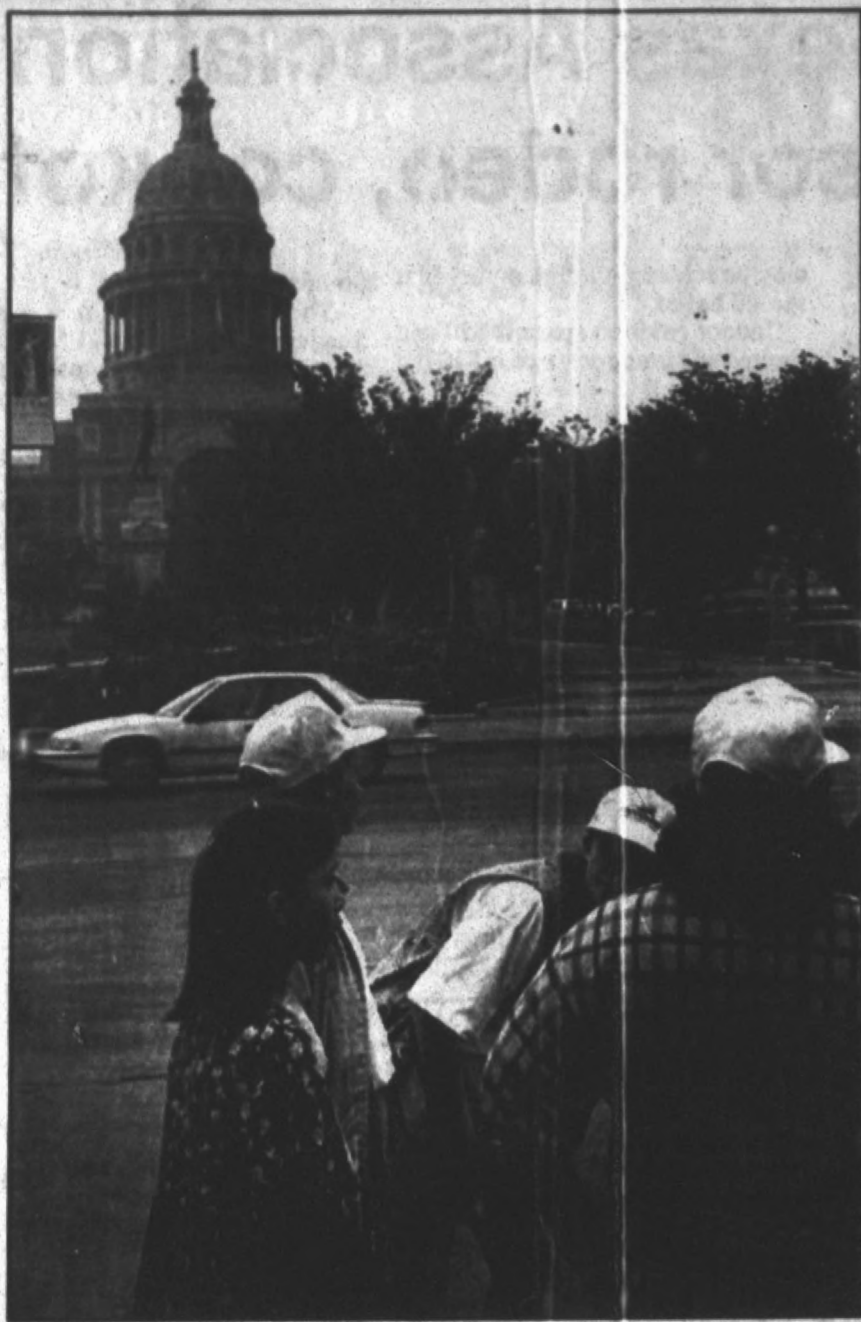

The stately pink granite building, described in 1888 as the seventh-largest in the world, no longer holds that distinction. But the home of Texas government remains a remarkable structure.

"A noble edifice," Sen. Temple Houston said in initially dedicating the building 107 years ago. "This building fires the heart and excites reflection in the minds of all."

"A symbol of the greatness that was, is and will be Texas," Gov. George W. Bush said in rededicating it Friday.

Cleaned, painted, repaired and renovated to its original condition - at a cost somewhat higher than the original price of \$3,744,630 - the Capitol stands as one of Austin's top tourist attractions.

There's a lot to see. Built on 25.96 acres of tree-covered, park-like grounds, the Texas Capitol was modeled along the same lines as the U.S. Capitol in Washington, D.C.

It's shaped in the form of a Greek cross, constructed with a rotunda and

dome at the intersection of corridors linking the Senate and House chambers east-to-west, and the governor's and other offices south-to-north.

Like the state it symbolizes, the building is huge.

It covers three acres of ground, with floor space of approximately 18 acres.

It had 392 rooms when built, along with 18 vaults, 404 doors and 924 windows.

Its cooper roof covers 85,000 square feet.

Its exterior walls required 15,000 railroad carloads of granite to build.

The Capitol is so big, in fact, that some of the statistics have become a little fuzzy over the years.

A book published by the Texas Legislative Council listed its length at 566.5 feet and its width at 288 feet, 10 inches. A Texas House of Representatives' pamphlet put the length at 585 feet, 10 inches and the width at 299 feet, 10 inches, "including steps."

The House publication said its cornerstone weighed 16,000 pounds "in the rough," while the State Preservation Board reports a weight of 12,000 pounds.

Four governors salute Capitol at fete

AUSTIN (AP) - Four governors and \$187 million later, Texans on Friday celebrated the nation's largest capitol restoration project by rededicating their pink granite statehouse, 107 years after it first opened.

State leaders, including all the former governors who helped oversee the project, reflected on the rich history of the building and the tribulations of the overhaul.

"This building must endure so we never forget that our government was born in the struggle for independence," Gov. George W. Bush said.

"The oak, pine and cherry woodwork has been painstakingly refinished. Century-old brass hinges engraved with the words 'Texas Capitol' once again hold doors in position," Bush said. "Original Capitol furniture, believed lost, was located and restored to mint condition."

The overhaul was launched by former Gov. Mark White after a 1983 fire nearly destroyed the building.

Work included renovation of the interior and exterior of the Capitol and construction of a 620,000-square-foot underground annex.

The 1856-57 General Land Office Building, oldest surviving state office

building in Texas, also was restored. It is located on a corner of the tree-covered Capitol grounds.

Workers demolished a maze of add-on walls, mezzanines and lowered ceilings, removed asbestos and lead paint and rebuilt original doorways. New plumbing, electrical, mechanical and fire protection systems were installed.

The outside of the granite building and its metal dome were restored as well.

"It's easy to say \$187 million," said former Gov. William Clements, who presided when planning for full restoration began in 1988. "It's very difficult to appropriate it."

"People would come up to me and say, 'Bill, you have absolutely lost your mind. The Legislature will never ever give \$187 million to rework the Capitol.' But they did."

"We had full cooperation from Democrats and Republicans both inside and outside state government. I can't ever remember a cross word or a partisan word. Everyone worked together," Clements said.

Former Gov. Ann Richards took a moment to send good wishes to the families who lost loved ones in the Oklahoma City bombing this week.

"The people of Oklahoma are our kinsmen and our hearts go out to them today for the great courage they are showing," Richards said.

"In the face of that destruction, we Texans hold up this Capitol restoration as a celebration of our determination as Texans to build and as a reflection of our pride in our state and in our home and in our country."

House Speaker Pete Laney recalled how construction caused some sections of the Capitol to be closed and offices relocated.

During the 1993 Legislature, only the House met in the Capitol. The Senate convened six blocks away.

"Anyone who has ever scheduled a home remodeling project or a root canal knows that there is no such thing as a good time to have it done," Laney said. "Through extensive planning, the Legislature managed to get its work done through the dust and debris."

"The project had to be completed before the opening of the (1995) Legislature at noon on Jan. 10," Laney said. "That crucial deadline was not only met, but was done so with about 2-1/2 hours to spare."

A Journey for the children

Every journey starts with a single step, and Greg Scruggs will make the first step of his journey on August 6. Scruggs, who is currently the director of activities at King's Manor Methodist Home, will depart from Amarillo on horseback on a 70 day journey that will cover 2,000 miles. His final destination will be New York City.

The ride is a fundraising effort to benefit Camp Cactus, a western theme camp located in Amarillo for children infected by the HIV virus. The idea for the benefit ride was conceived by Scruggs after he attended his ten year class reunion and learned that some of his former classmates were founding a camp for innocent children whose lives had been affected by AIDS. "Since the camp was to operate with a western theme, I thought the

horseback ride would be a good way to raise money and provide publicity for Camp Cactus," said Scruggs.

"It is an opportunity for me to fulfill a lifelong dream and support a worthy cause," he said. Camp Cactus will open for its first session July 1-4 at the Bishop Quarterman Conference Center in Amarillo.

Funds that Scruggs raises on his "Journey for the Children" (as he has titled his fundraising effort) will be used for next year's camp, to ensure a quality, well-staffed camp that will be nationally recognized and enjoyed by children from all over the country.

The route that Scruggs intends to take will follow the old Santa Fe Trail and Overland Stage routes as he retraces paths that many of our ancestors followed on their way west.

"I selected New York City as a final destination since many of our ancestors were from that area. And

I wanted them to know the west is still here," said Scruggs.

He has applied for a four month leave of absence from his job in order to make the journey. He will be the lone rider, accompanied by a chase vehicle which will pull the horse trailer for use on the return trip.

Scruggs is contacting the chamber of commerce in towns along his route, explaining the purpose of his journey, and asking for assistance with food and lodging.

"He will make notes and take pictures along the way, gathering material for a book he plans to write about the trip.

Contributions for the "Journey for the Children" are already being received.

Tommy Steiner Ranch in Austin has volunteered to provide two horses for Scruggs use and Will Rogers Range Riders in Amarillo will provide stalls for the animals until the journey actually begins.

High Plains has contributed a bedroll and Texas Saddlery has given

a pack saddle. "Doppler Dave" Oliver, weatherman on KFDA channel 10, has agreed to give periodic updates on Scruggs' location during his journey. Scruggs said, "I hope to cover 30 miles a day, if things go according to plan, but of course, they won't." Still, he hopes to reach New York City on or about October 15.

"We are contacting David Letterman," said Scruggs. "We thought this trip might be of interest to him and maybe I'll have an opportunity to be on his show."

Scruggs was born in Liberal, Kan., but grew up in Amarillo, graduating from Tascosa High School, then Texas Tech University in Lubbock. He has been employed by King's Manor since July 1994.

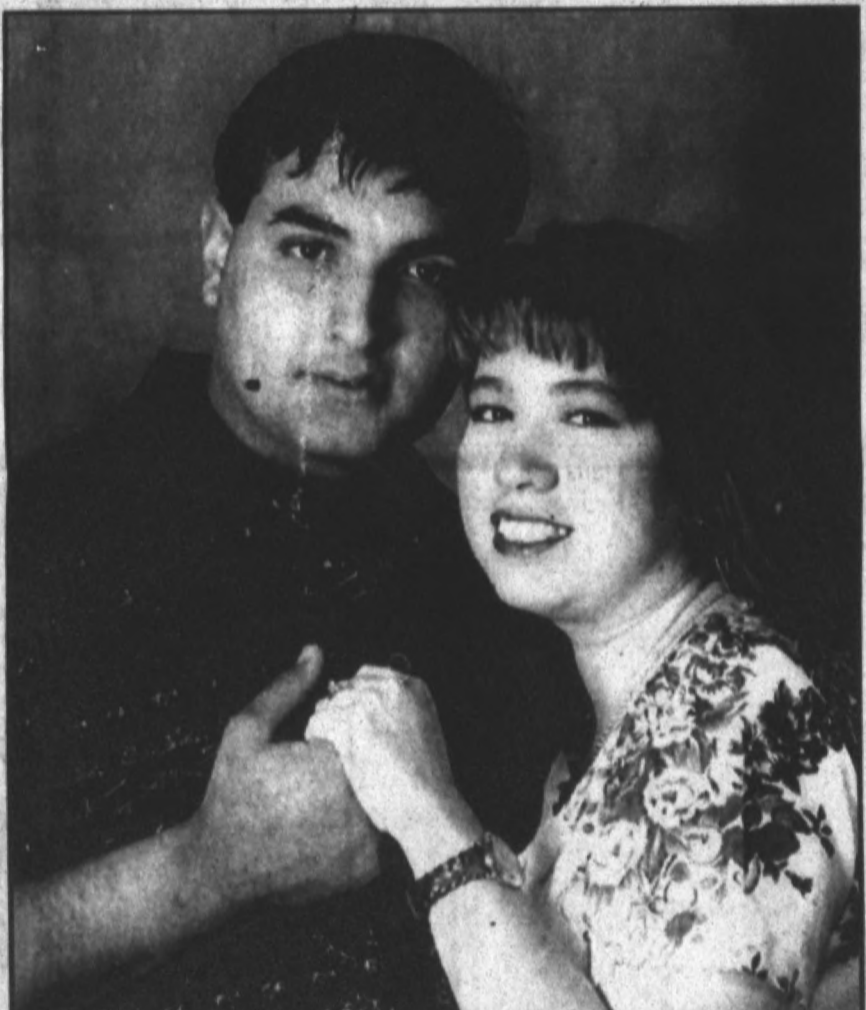

Encouraging curiosity in such simple ways is just as key to the child's future ability as what happens in class, the study suggests.

"Let them explore, let them ask questions," former astronaut Mae Jemison told parents Tuesday. And what if parents don't know the answers to "Where does the sun go at night?" "Why do leaves fall from trees?" or "How come the sky is blue?"

Don't worry, Jemison told parents and educators at a seminar. Not knowing is what science is all about. And they can always turn to a library or teacher for help.

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To Your Good Health

DEAR DR. DONOHUE: Regarding the macula of the eye and the degeneration thereof, I am interested in the two types you mentioned — wet and dry. Which is which? Is one more common than the other? I wish you had gone into it a bit more. My own doctor says I have it. When I asked which, he said dry, but did not elucidate. — R.D.

ANSWER: The macula lutea (MACK-you-luh-LOOT-ee-uh) is as I described it earlier, the most sensitive part of the retina, which is a remarkable sheet of light-sensitive cells at the back of the eye.

The macula, which makes up a small area at the retina's center, is the part of the retina that provides close-up precision demands, such as in reading or sewing.

In macular degeneration, the confined area has wasted away somewhat. It's a rather common condition.

As to the two forms of macular degeneration: I might have been more helpful on that topic. Really, we speak of the more common "dry" form of the degeneration just to distinguish it from the rarer "wet" degeneration.

The wet form arises from growth of abnormal retinal blood vessels, which proceed to leak fluid. That causes the retinal cell damage. The wet form detected early can be corrected by a laser, which can seal off the vessels, ending the damaging leakage.

Reader C.I. wrote to ask just how large the macula area is. It is about the size of a capital "O" in the newspaper text you are now reading.

DEAR DR. DONOHUE: I am an elderly man in good health, except for a dizziness problem. In the a.m. when I get up, the room seems to be whirling around. It finally stops, but if I sit up again it returns. I get it when my body is in a certain position. I worry about all sorts of things — stroke, brain tumor, maybe a brain aneurysm, you name it. My blood pressure is OK. What can I do? — S.R.

ANSWER: About 80 percent of such episodes stem from a malfunction of the balance system in the inner ears.

You describe a specific form of the problem: positional vertigo. Patients report the symptoms as occurring from turning the head or when repositioning the body in bed.

For some people, the phenomenon

occurs only once or twice and is forgotten, but for others it becomes chronic.

I can suggest some things that might help, but it is really something for you to report to your doctor, along with such information as any drugs you might be taking.

One therapy described to me recently involves purposely positioning the head into the precise position that brings on the attack. If you do that, you should be monitored, to avoid accidents. The idea is to repeat the exercise in order to desensitize the body to that particular vertigo position.

Problems other than balance mechanism disorders can prompt vertigo attacks, among them irregular heart patterns.

Hints from Heloise

Dear Heloise: I have quite a supply of unused stamps which I want to use.

At one time, I read a hint on how to remove the stamps from old envelopes. It seems the microwave is used to do this. — Lucile Schilling, Ft. Wayne, Ind.

The hint was from June Bartley of St. Louis, Mo. She moistens the stamps with water and puts the whole envelope in the microwave for a few seconds. She says the stamps peel off very easily.

Another method that works: Tear or cut the edge of the envelope where the stamp is and soak just that part in a bowl of warm water for a few minutes. Gently peel the stamp off the paper and lay it face down on a paper towel to dry. When you're ready to use the stamp, simply add a drop of glue on the back and secure it to the envelope. — Heloise

• Slip dishes of food inside the liner sack to keep a spotless microwave and retain just the right amount of moisture in foods.

• Crackers crush easily with no mess when you use the sack.

• Slip in chicken breasts and use a rolling pin to pound them to the desired thickness.

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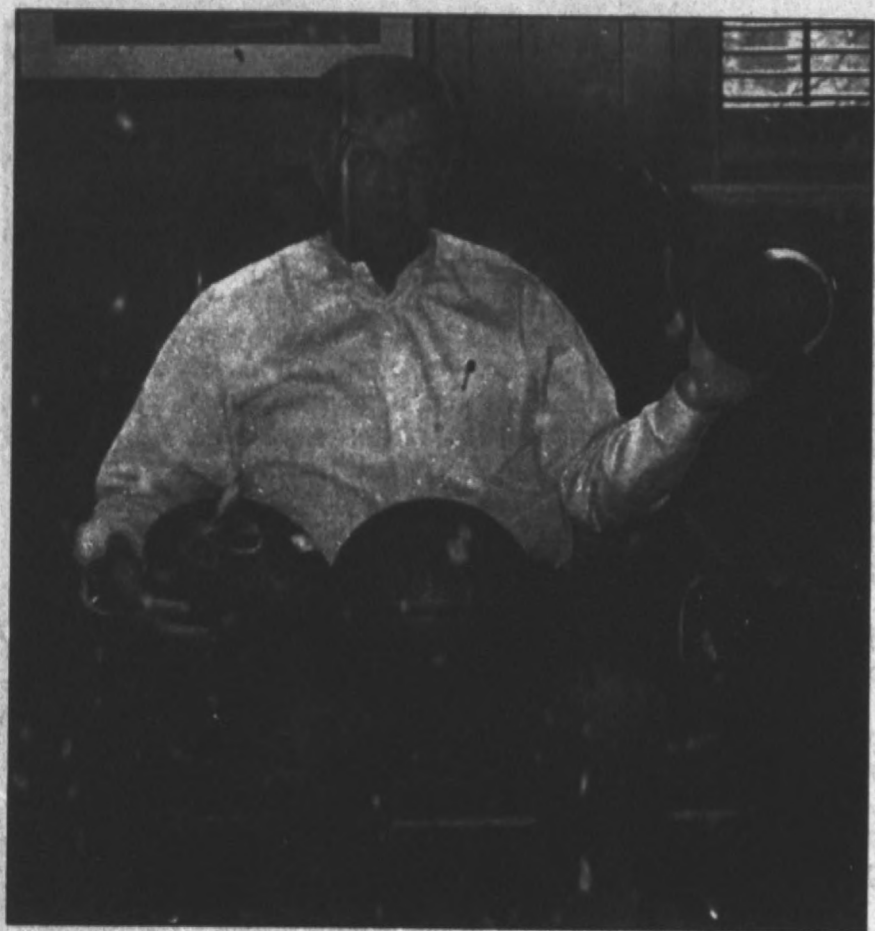

Extension News

Semi-solid food is usually recommended for the infant from 4 to 6 months of age. Commercial baby food can be used or baby food can be made at home.

Many families want to make their own baby food to save money, to make use of foods in season or to avoid some of the additives in baby food.

Homemade baby food should be smooth without lumps. At about 9 months food with more texture can be introduced.

Select whole grain or enriched cereals. Rice cereal is a good choice because it is unlikely to cause allergies. In the following month, add barley and wheat cereals. Dilute cooked cereal with breast milk or formula. Coarse cereals will need to be strained or blenderized so they are not lumpy.

Select fresh, frozen or canned fruit. If using frozen or canned, select unsweetened. Vegetables such as carrots, squash, spinach, string beans, peas, asparagus, tomatoes, white or sweet potatoes and beets can be used fresh, frozen or canned. Broccoli, cauliflower, cabbage and turnips should be cooked without a lid to let some of the strong flavor escape.

The egg yolk, an excellent source of iron and protein for the baby, is well tolerated by seven months. Egg white is usually not given to babies until they are a year old.

Cook meat, poultry and fish without adding fat or salt. Remove any gristle or bone. The blender is the easiest way to puree for feeding infants up to about 9 months. At about 10 months, coarsely ground or finely chopped meat, fish and poultry can be fed to the baby.

Make sure that the blender, grinder

or whatever equipment used to puree is clean and that hands have been washed. Meats and eggs pureed for the baby should be kept only one day in the refrigerator because they spoil easily. Pureed fruits and vegetables can be stored in the refrigerator for two to three days. To store homemade baby food up to three months, put the mixture into ice cube trays, cover with a moisture-vapor proof wrap, and freeze. Transfer to freezer bags or air tight containers. One ice cube is about the right size for one serving.

If you are planning to make your own baby food at home, there are some things that you should not do:

*Do not season baby foods even if they seem tasteless to you. Baby food should not have added sugar, salt, fat, fat-back or seasonings.

*Do not use mixtures such as pizza, casseroles, cobblers, or meat pies which are prepared for family consumption because of the salt, sugar and fat content.

*Do not use fried or greasy foods such as pickles or sauerkraut.

*Do not use processed food such as hot dogs, sausage, luncheon meat or cured pork because of sodium content as well as nitrates and nitrites.

*Do not give infants high-calorie, low-density foods such as candy, chips, cakes and cookies.

*Do not use honey in food for infants under one year of age. Some honey contains organisms which can cause illness or death in infants.

*Do not give a baby food that contains nuts, popcorn or raisins. Even up to 1 to 2 years of age, small foods such as these can cause choking.

Remember to gradually introduce the baby to a variety of foods from each of the food groups. Start only one new food at a time, one teaspoon at a time.

MINDING YOUR OWN BUSINESS

MIXED SIGNALS

I'll admit that I felt cheated. I seldom throw away money, and never intentionally. So when I purchased a small gift for my daughter that turned out to be something less than desirable, I was disappointed.

I'm hooked on little books like H. Jackson Brown's "Life's Little Instruction's" series. I find them entertaining and uplifting. So when I saw a new little book called "Cheatsheets on Life," I picked it up for a quick review.

The first few quotes and thoughts I read were positive and on target. A few statements I saw included: "Be careful what you say around children. They will listen and repeat everything." "If you want to be a better writer, keep writing"

and "Vote. It's your right. It's your responsibility." Pretty good advice wouldn't you agree? I thought this would be a perfect reminder of my trip for my daughter, Christi. So I bought the book.

Later, as I sat in an airport waiting for the connecting flight home, I got the book out to read. That's when I noticed that not all the writings were as wholesome and full of wisdom as I first thought.

For example, this little book advised, "Don't work to improve someone else's business. Work to improve yourself." Careful, I thought to myself, if you work for someone else you better be helping them improve their business, too! Otherwise, you'll end up unemployed and unimproved.

Then there's the example on Page 76. It said, "Buying retail is stupid." I guess millions of us are stupid. Because I'm careful of what I buy, I get good value and satisfaction buying at retail.

However, the statements that really made me feel cheated were those lacking any moral fibre. Mixed signals like these are why our morals are decaying in America.

These statements made me sorry I bought the book: "Do what you want, not what you are supposed to do," "Consider living together before marriage. You cannot really know someone until you live with them," "Have lots of relationships when you are young...practice safe sex" and "There is no such thing as a right or wrong decision - only THE decision."

I believe any of you who know me well, understand my disappointment. The thoughts I listed above are certainly not a message any loving, caring father would share intentionally

with an 18-year-old daughter. **Straight stuff**

I can't understand why we continually confuse our young people with conflicting messages. Mixed signals never send a clear message. If our young people need anything today, they need basic knowledge of right and wrong.

For me, most issues are black and white. Yes, I am aware that many so called "ethics" courses and seminars are teaching that all of today's issues are merely shades of gray. They tell us that we must be guided by our feelings not by God's laws or the wisdom of our forefathers.

Here's straight stuff. There is no feel good substitute for truth, honesty and fairness. Lying is lying whether in politics or in marriage. Honesty is still the only policy. And fairness means fair to both parties, not it's fair as long as I get what I want.

We can eliminate many of the mixed signals our young people are getting by setting the example ourselves. Let's call lying, lying; not truth deficit statements. Let's call stealing, stealing; not appropriation of another's property.

Most issues are still black and white. I'd like to keep the term "the graying of America" referring to our aging population, not becoming a reference to our mixed signals and moral decay.

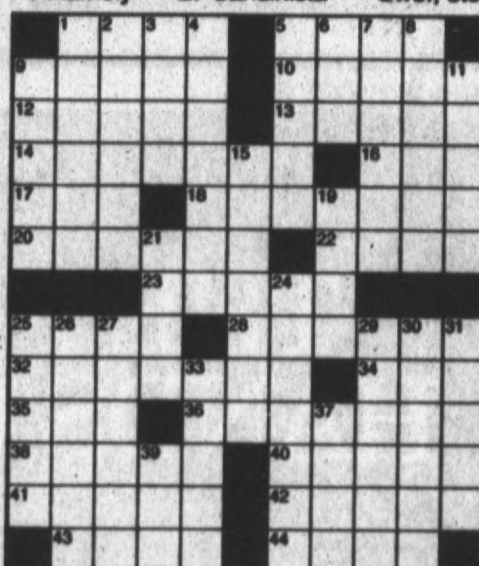

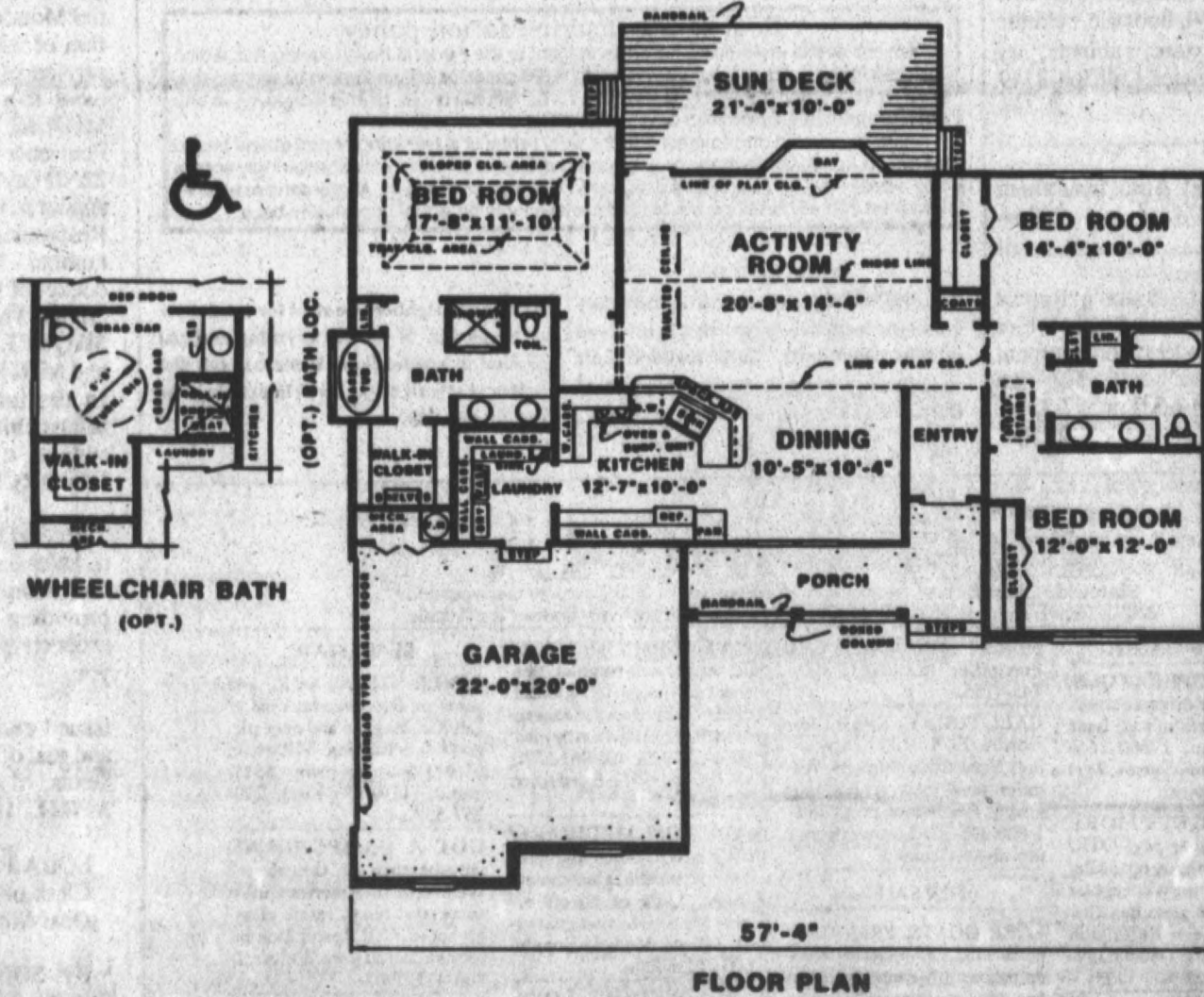

Home survey finds hazards to children

ATLANTA (AP) - A house is not a home for kids if they can get hurt there.

"For children five years and under, over 50 percent of unintentional injuries occur in the child's own home," says Maryann Johnston, emergency center nurse at Egleston Children's Hospital at Emory University.

Go through the house, identify potential hazards, and eliminate them during home improvement projects, she urges parents.

"In the kitchen, check your cabinets and move items that need to be locked up high and kept out of children's reach. An inexpensive lock on cabinets is essential for storing any poisonous cleansers, alcoholic beverages, knives, matches, detergents and-or soaps," she says.

The same goes for the bathroom. Lock up out of reach any medicines, cosmetics, scissors, razors, and cleansers.

In bathrooms or any room where electricity and water are closely positioned, make sure you have a ground fault circuit interrupter. The GFCI can't prevent shocks, but it can prevent serious injury or death. Electrical appliances should be stored on shelves or cabinets away from tubs and sinks.

Lower thermostats for bath and shower water to 120 degrees, or install an anti-scald device. Put a tub spout cover on the faucet to prevent head injuries and place a rubber mat or stickers on the bottom of the tub to prevent slippery falls.

Phone, extension and all other electrical cords can be hazardous, she points out. A child can suffer burns by chewing on a cord, for example. Throw away old, frayed or faulty cords and put safety covers on all electrical outlets.

Furniture should be surveyed for sharp corners (use corner guards), loose knobs, and whether heavy pieces are stable.

Unless they are part of the fire escape plan, all upper floor windows should be equipped with window guards, she says. "A child can fall out of a window opened just four inches, even if there is a screen."

Potential hazards in the garage or workshop also need safety checks, making sure tools, hardware, chemicals, pesticides, cleansers and machinery are out of children's reach. Make sure your automatic garage door opener is the type that automatically reverses when it touches a person or object, she warns. Test the reverse feature frequently.

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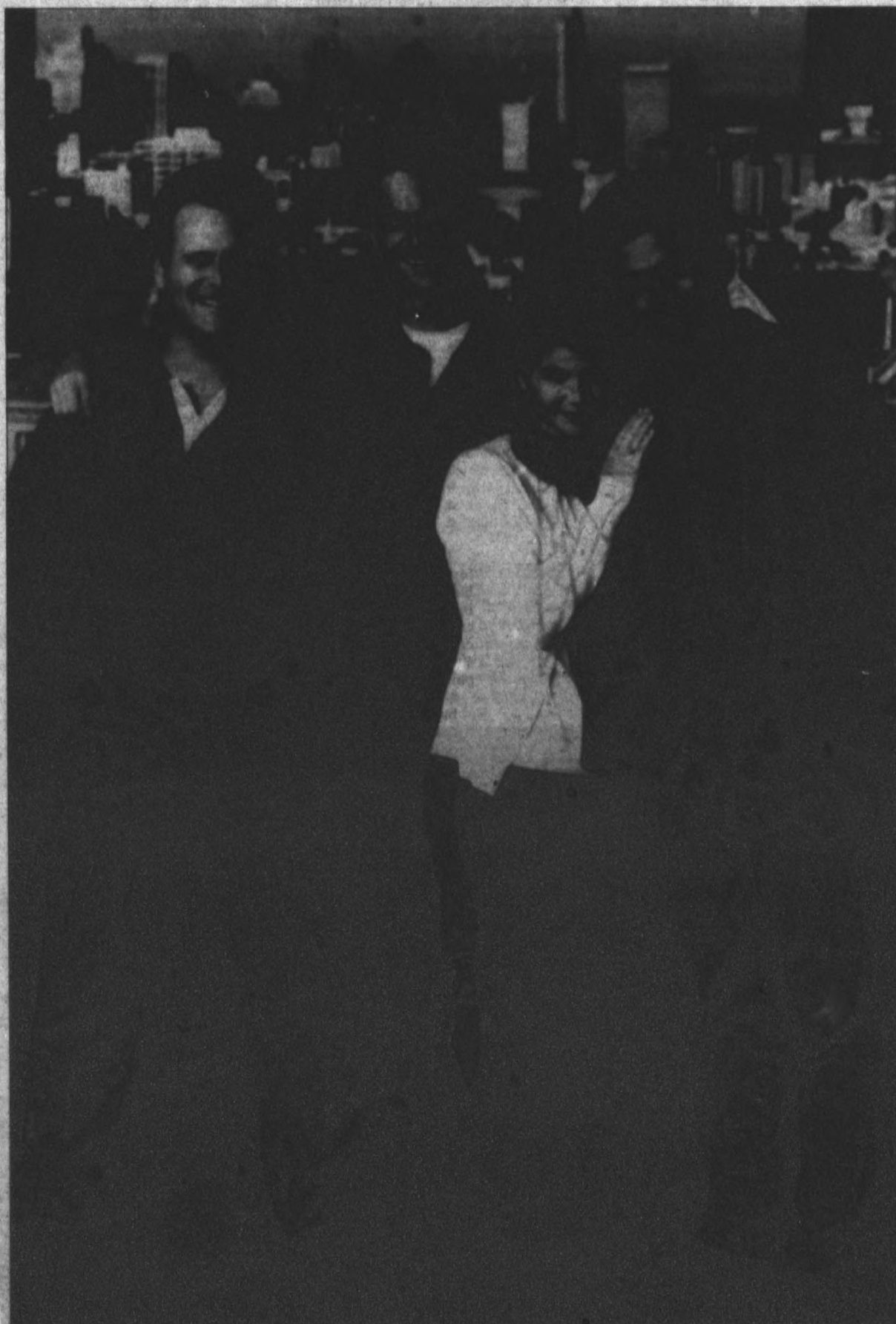

Full House star Coulier full of comedic, acting talent

Everybody knows the type. There was someone like him in every high-school study hall.

Somebody who just wouldn't shut up. Somebody who could do perfect imitations of every teacher in the school. Somebody who just can't stop being funny, even for a minute.

For Dave Coulier of ABC's *Full House*, which airs Tuesdays, this is the story of his life.

As a student in St. Clair Shores, Mich., Coulier (and a few of his high-school buddies) turned his talent for doing voice imitations into a two-hour stand-up and sketch show that netted 900 paying audience members.

That was Coulier's first taste of show business, and he hasn't stopped since.

Proficient at stand-up comedy, voice imitations and acting, Coulier parlayed his talents into a long-term starring role on the *House* sitcom.

In addition, he was the co-host of the now defunct *The New America's Funniest People* and has provided the voices for numerous characters in animated series such as *The Muppet Babies*, *Scooby Doo* and *The Real Ghostbusters*. And he's made guest appearances on *Newhart*, *Family Ties* and *Madam's Place*.

Given his duds, does Coulier prefer stand-up, acting or voice-overs?

"I've had a lot of fun doing all of them, really," Coulier says. "I guess probably stand-up, because it's live and it's stuff that I've written. In television you don't really get a 'live' audience, where if you want to kind of switch gears you can. You're kind of locked in to the script. The same thing with cartoons.

"With stand-up, if somebody says something or something happens that's particularly funny in the room, you can shift gears and go to that and break the

fourth wall."

With *Full House* now in its eighth season — and running rampant in syndication — Coulier's crystal ball gets foggy when he thinks about the show's future.

However, he does admit to pondering his career moves for when the show runs its course.

"I think people are starting to think about what their options might be after this," Coulier confesses. "You know, the show can't go on forever, but the ratings have been so strong and the show does so well worldwide that it's really kind of hard to say when it's going to go off the air exactly.

"But I think people are starting to think about what their options are and 'Gee, what am I gonna do after *Full House*?' Specifically John (Stamos) and Lori (Loughlin) more so than anyone else."

While Coulier and *Full House* co-star Bob Saget have their own gigs outside of the show (Saget is host of ABC's *America's Funniest Home Videos*), the other cast members may be looking at series opportunities as spin-offs from *House*.

One possibility might be a show centered around Stamos' and Loughlin's characters, who are the parents of a pair of twins on the show.

"I don't know that they would want to do that," he adds after a pause. "They may want to both go on their separate ways, who knows? You never know what's going to happen."

Meanwhile, the easy-going Coulier is working on yet another endeavor: "There's a character called Mr Woodchuck that I brought up on *Full House* for quite a few episodes. We're trying to put him into production as a Saturday morning cartoon."

Richter a dying breed -- talk show sidekick

NEW YORK (AP) - His office door at NBC headquarters says "Telly Savalas," but, no, there's not a shred of doubt the occupant is really Andy Richter, all 28 years and six feet, two inches of him, relaxing after a "Late Night" taping.

Richter may be the last of a dying breed: the couch-stationed talk-show sidekick. That couch is at the right hand of red-haired, even taller Conan O'Brien, who inherited "Late Night" from David Letterman in September 1993.

Back then, before the O.J. Simpson trial made instant celebrities of half the population of Los Angeles, both O'Brien and Richter seemed remarkable for their abrupt, TV-generated fame.

All the more remarkable was the pounding Richter took from critics, who singled him out for many of "Late Night's" perceived sins.

No sweat, says Richter, recalling those early days with something not unlike pleasure: "It was exciting even to be on TV and have BAD reviews written about you."

Fortunately, that brand of excitement is mostly behind him.

Just mark the thundering chant of the audience in Studio 6A when Richter is introduced: "An-DEE! An-DEE!"

"What's great about Andy is, when he does something, you really notice," says Cynthia Gill, who edits a monthly "Late Night with Conan O'Brien" fan magazine from her home in Canon City, Colo. "Andy's not just a yes-man. When he needs to, he can shine."

The ratings are up 6 percent over last season's, and averaging 1.8 million households since January (against 1.5 million for its CBS challenger at 12:35 a.m. weeknights, "The Late Late Show with Tom

Snyder").

"A show like ours is all referential to something we've done before," Richter says, "so I can see why in our first few weeks people would turn us on and go, 'What the hell IS this?'"

"We just needed a little time. Like with a friendship: You laugh at things your friends say because you know 'em."

Bits that crack up "Late Night" cognoscenti (and leave others just shaking their heads) include "Things We Didn't Get to Make Fun Of," "In the Year 2000," "Staring Contest,"

"Andy Richter's Self-Help Tapes" and "Right Side-Wrong Side" - during which viewers playing the Official "Late Night" Drinking Game get to take a swig each time Conan calls Andy "the spawn of Satan." Cheers!

By all indications not the spawn of Satan, the oddly cherubic Richter

grew up in Yorkville, Ill., outside Chicago.

After film school and a stretch as a production assistant for TV commercials, he enrolled in an improvisation class. "But not to get into Second City and then move on to 'Saturday Night Live,'" he cautions. "I just felt, 'This would be fun.'"

It was, and so was playing Mike Brady onstage in "The Real Brady Bunch" and joining Chris Elliott in his film "Cabin Boy."

Then, in Los Angeles two short years ago, Richter was filling out job applications when he got a phone call from New York.

"Getting hired for 'Late Night,'" he says gratefully, "saved me from interviewing to be an assistant manager at a movie theater in Westwood."

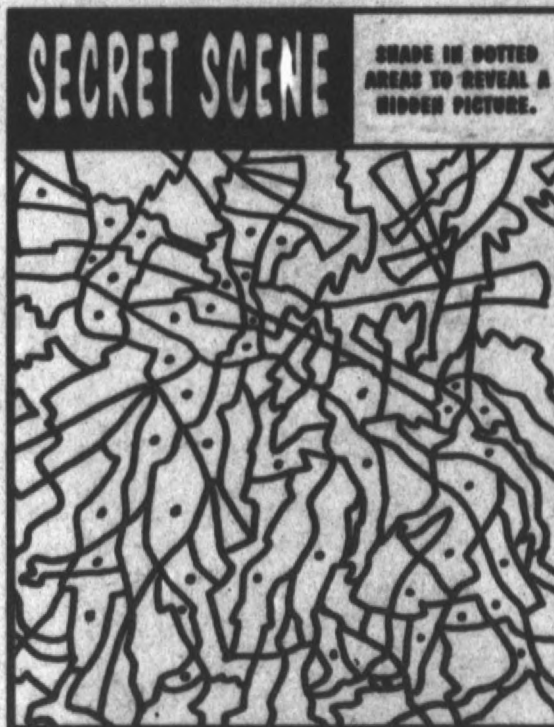
"I get to be the guy on the couch."

I also get to be a sketch-comedy performer. I also get to be the ... Ed Bradley type and tape remote bits, shoving a mike into people's faces at the Miss America pageant or the NBA Finals."

And after all that, he gets to go home to his wife of one year, writer-actress Sarah Thyre, with whom he hopes to have children "and a really nice family life."

"I have a great job," he says, but sounding very Andy, adds, "to me it's still a job. And if there were some horrible power failure which meant we couldn't do the show one day and we had to put on a rerun, I'd say, 'Ahhhh, that's too bad.'"

"But I'd be in the next cab home, and happy to be going."

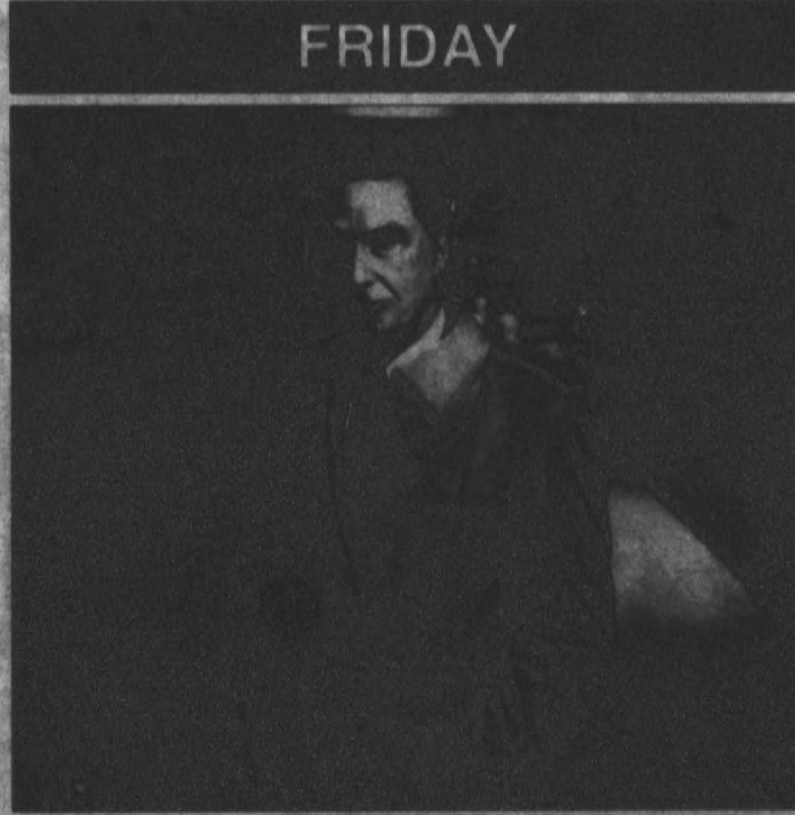

Rise, fall of 'Iron' Mike told in HBO movie *Tyson*

HBO is looking for a knockout - or at least a favorable decision - in the docudrama arena with *Tyson*, an original movie debuting Saturday, April 29.

The movie is based on the book *Fire and Fear: The Inside Story of Mike Tyson*, by Jose Torres. Michael Jai White (*Universal Soldier*) stars as the fallen heavyweight champ recently released from prison after serving time for a rape conviction.

White, a black belt in karate who holds 26 competitive titles, says it took some preparation to play the role.

"Physically, it was a lot of extensive boxing and boxing training and lifting weights," he says. "I had to physically get a good amount bigger."

"Psychologically, I just got every thing I could. I got my hands on every bit of news footage, and type of video, interviews, countless stories and articles, plus read between the lines myself, thinking about where all of these things came from."

Oscar winner George C. Scott (*Patton*) portrays famed boxing manager and trainer Cus D'Amato, who

discovered Tyson. Paul Winfield (*Souder*) plays promoter Don King.

Malcolm-Jamal Warner (*The Cosby Show*) stars as "Iron" Mike's longtime friend, Rory Holloway. Warner says he originally read for the Tyson role.

"I really didn't think I would be right for the character (Tyson) at all, to be honest," he says. "But I wanted to audition because I wanted to at least meet the people behind it, because I was interested in the Rory character."

"That's a character that people wouldn't immediately expect me to do. So that is the character that I had really been looking for."

So, how will *Tyson*, the movie, portray Tyson, the fallen boxing hero?

"We've tried to remain as faithful to the incidents of Mike Tyson's life as we possibly can," executive producer Edgar Scherick says.

The real-life Tyson announced he will return to professional boxing, and the world will be watching to see how he fares.

On Saturday viewers will see if *Tyson*, the movie, also has the mettle to go the distance.
