

### Changeover brings number of defections to 31 this year

**Associated Press Writer** AUSTIN (AP) - Texas politicians are flip-flopping, but the switch is over parties rather than issues.

Law enforcement officers in Hereford and Deaf Smith County are taking advantage of a program set in motion by President Bush to improve their ability to protect local citizens.

The Hereford Police Department and Deaf Smith County Sheriff's Department both have recently obtained vehicles and equipment at no cost through the Operation Alliance program in which surplus military equipment is provided to law enforcement.

Police Chief David Wagner said Operation Alliance was begun under President Bush.

"At one time the Army would go out and blow up stuff like this," Wagner said. Then Bush ordered surplus equipment be offered to police instead.

As a result, both departments have made written application to Operation Alliance and received equipment.

Currently, two Blazers are being used by the Sheriff's Department and a van to transport prisoners, all of which were donated by the military. military binoculars.

### White House, GOP race for budget deal

WASHINGTON (AP) - With time fiscal year, which ends Sept. 30, to running out, the White House and **Republican congressional leaders are** struggling to work out final details on a compromise plan to cut more than \$16 billion from already approved spending.

A draft plan circulating on Capitol Hill Monday would restore \$724 million to education and job training programs the Republicans wanted to cut, balancing those additions with new reductions in federal administrative and travel budgets, NASA and agriculture programs.

President Clinton on June 7 used his veto authority for the first time in killing the bill to trim \$16.4 billion from the budget. He said the bill was unacceptable because it would have sacrificed education and environmental programs while leaving intact federal building projects.

The decision to veto the bill was complicated by the inclusion in the package of \$6.7 billion in relief money for victims of the 1994 California earthquake and other disasters, \$250 million to support anti-terrorism activities and \$275 million in debt relief for Jordan.

Congressional sources said a compromise must be reached this week, before Congress leaves for a weeklong Fourth of July recess. ### **Deaf Smith County among** group getting new welfare, **AFDC disbursement cards**

AUSTIN -- Beginning Aug. 1, food stamps will disappear in transfer program in the nation. Hereford and Deaf Smith County, according to an announcement by affect 300,000 families and 4,000

State Comptroller John Sharp. "Deaf Smith County is included in the largest expansion of the Lone Star card in Texas, and with this roll-out, the Texas attack on bureaucratic bloat and welfare fraud moves into high gear," Sharp said in the Monday announcement. Card.

"In just four weeks, food stamps will virtually disappear in another 90 Texas counties, in the San Antonio, El Paso, Lubbock, Amarillo, Victoria and Beaumont-Port Arthur areas. along with portions of East Texas," Sharp said, "And retailers who prepare early should be ready to accept the card without a hitch."

The Lone Star Card is the cornerstone of Sharp's wide-ranging welfare reform plan, which was recently approved by the Texas Legislature and signed into law by Gov. George W. Bush.

The Lone Star Card replaces paper food stamps with a card resembling a credit card.

retail grocery outlets. Sharp said slightly more than 50 percent of the retailers in the expansion area have signed agreements to provide food stamps and Aid to Families with Dependent Children (AFDC) payments with the Lone Star

The Lone Star Card was first proposed in 1991 and implemented in February in the Houston area. Sharp said retailers accepting the card noticed an immediate increase in food sales when it was introduced.

"Between February and March, food sales rose by \$4.5 million, because benefits can be spent on food and food alone, not on crack cocaine or other illegal activities in the food stamp black market," Sharp said.

In June, the card was introduced in the Dallas-Fort Worth area and along the Gulf Coast, Sharp said, adding that it has "been working so smoothly that retailers have rung up food sales totaling nearly \$65

The state comptroller said the new card will cut the cost of offering the benefits.

"This card will trim the national costs of the old food stamp system by \$45.4 million for printing, \$4.5 million for shipping and storing and \$23.1 million for the final processing and destruction of the paper coupons at the Federal Reserve," he said.

In addition, Sharp said, the Lone Star Card has already reduced food stamp fraud.

"By the end of this year, we will have abolished paper food stamp coupons in Texas," Sharp said. "We are returning the program to its original purpose -- feeding hungry children, not feeding a bureaucracy and a black market of fraud."

### Hair, fiber evidence described by lab witness for prosecution

**Associated Press Writer** LOS ANGELES (AP) - Prosecutors have begun to present hair and fiber evidence against O.J. Simpson through extremely detailed testimony by a police laboratory technician.

In opening statements, prosecutor Marcia Clark said hair similar to Simpson's and fibers similar to the carpet in his Ford Bronco were recovered from the cap found at Ronald Goldman's feet. She also said a hair similar to Simpson's was found on Goldman's shirt, and that both victims' hair was found on the glove at Simpson's estate.

Denise Lewis described Monday how she processed hairs, fibers from Simpson's Ford Bronco and clothing from both victims. She said she didn't handle bloody gloves and a ski cap. Lewis explained exactly how each piece of evidence was carefully examined, packaged and, in some cases, placed in a freezer. Clark's detailed questioning seemed to anticipate defense challenges of Lewis' testimony, which will be followed by scientific analysis of trace evidence and dog and human hairs.

Unlike DNA analysis, hair and trace evidence is open to broad interpretation because there is no nationwide database of standards against which findings can be compared, experts said.

"I would be personally surprised if the prosecution didn't end with a bang," she said.

### Drought, not NAFTA, blamed for decline of U.S. cattle prices

beef cattle have plummeted in the last 18 months because of an oversupply among U.S. producers and a flood of Mexican imports, area ranchers said.

"Cattle prices have gone to hell," said Hence Barrow, an Ector County rancher who has a cattle operation. 'That's all you can say.'

Prices have dropped from a high of \$1.25 per pound to anywhere from 62 to 84 cents per pound, according to ranchers, extension agents and

marketing specialists. "A 600-pound calf didn't bring \$400," feed store operator Sonny Henderson told the Odessa American. "Ranchers can make some money, but it's not where it was. Five hundred dollar calves were a pretty good boom."

Marketing specialists and economists predicted the drop in cattle prices more than two years ago because of an oversupply in the United States, said Ernest Davis, a Texas A&M Extension cattle marketing specialist in College Station.

American ranchers had 34.6 million beef cows that calved in 1993, and 36.1 million in 1994, Davis said.

ODESSA, Texas (AP) - Price for Livestock market economists have been telling ranchers to scale back, but they haven't been listening, he said.

"Our ranchers don't like to blame themselves," he said. "We had good prices from 1987 to 1993. Normally we only have good prices for two or three years.'

But overstocking is not a problem in West Texas, Ector County Agricultural Extension Agent Jim Word said. "Our ranchers out here are aware of the fragile system, and they know it can take years to recover from overgrazing, if at all," he said.

Davis disagrees with those who blame the North American Free Trade Agreement for the problem, saying Mexican ranchers were either going to ship their herds to the United States or watch them die.

"NAFTA has nothing to do with it," he said. "The drought in Mexico has hurt. They are shipping cattle into the United States that would otherwise just die."

Don't tell that to Ector County rancher Bob Steakley, who is upset about the end of quotas for Mexican cattle imports into the United States.

That may be true, but if they didn't have 2 million cattle coming in, I guarantee prices would be better," Steakley said.

"The auto industry couldn't stand 15,000 cars a day (in imports)," Steakley said. "There are hundreds of thousands of pounds of processed meat ready for the dinner table in somebody's home or restaurant, and they are just sitting there."

Almost all West Texas counties are eligible for federal feed assistance programs, where they are reimbursed for the money they spend on feed.

Defense lawyers have already addressed some of the hair and fiber evidence, suggesting that a blanket police took from Nicole Brown Simpson's condominium to cover her body could have contaminated the crime scene. They suggested Simpson's hair and Bronco fibers could have been left on the blanket

population geneticist Bruce Weir admitted that he made mistakes in calculating genetic frequencies in mixed blood stains, saying his conclusions were "consistently wrong" because of a computer programming error.

His mistakes all involved stains that DNA experts say probably included Simpson's blood. For that reason, the defense contended Weir's errors were biased because they made it appear very unlikely that someone other than Simpson could have contributed to a stain.

Defense attorney Peter Neufeld led Weir through a series of corrections showing it was now about 2{ times more likely that someone other than Simpson could have contributed to blood stains found in his Bronco and on the glove found at his estate.

Under redirect questioning by prosecutor George Clarke, the North Carolina State University scientist insisted he did not give special weight to the fact that some of the blood stains had been linked to Simpson and the victims.

'Eavesdropping' gives no indication of aliens

**By GEOFF SPENCER Associated Press Writer** SYDNEY, Australia (AP) -They picked up signals from satellites, aircraft, automatic garage door openers and even microwave ovens, but not a peep from an alien.

After five months of electronically eavesdropping on the universe for signs of life, scientists ended a sweep of the southern skies today.

"We didn't find anything, but we learned a lot," said Jill Tarter, project scientist for the Search for **Extraterrestrial** Intelligence Institute. "We'll keep looking. The search has only just begun.

The institute, based in Moun-tain View, Calif., plans to move its Project Phoenix search back to the northern hemisphere.

Starting Feb. 3, scientists used high-tech scanning equipment attached to the Parkes radio telescope, a huge white dish in Outback sheep country, to listen in on billions of radio waves across the stars.

They claim it is the most histicated and systematic arch ever.

Space is full of natural radio static. The group was trying to find deliberately sent signals that would stand out from the background.

A big problem was signals from human technology.

Special scanning equipment, with the help of the Parkes dish and another nearby radio telescope, cut out much of it. Even so, there were more than 100 false alarms.

Satellites and other space probes - and overhead jets - were the worst culprits, but there were more down-to-earth sources as

well. Remote-controlled garage door openers puzzled the scientists for a while.

"We had to ban the use of microwave ovens in the kitchen because of the signals they produce," said Tarter.

Tarter, like many of her co-workers, once searched for extraterrestrials on behalf of NASA. But Congress axed funding for the U.S. space agency program in 1993 after some lawmakers complained the search was

The project was later revived as a private operation funded by donations.

Dear Heloise: What is minimum. size for postcards sent by mail? I would like to recycle the fronts of pretty greeting cards by using them as postcards. - Joyce Burns, Ponchatoula, La.

This is a wonderful way to save money, recycle and keep in touch. According to the United States Post Office, postcards must be:

• Rectangular. • Not less than 31/2 inches high, 5

 Not larger than 4¼ inches high, 6 inches long, or 0.0095 inches thick. Postcards require a 20-cent stamp,

but if the card is larger than 41/4 inches by 6 inches, it is not considered a postcard and you'll need to attach a 32-cent stamp or more, depending on the weight:

If you are unsure if what you are mailing fits the criteria for a postcard, please ask your local post of-

inches long, or 0.007 inches thick.

I also told him that if anybody approached him to try something, all he had to say was, "I have asthma, and it could kill me." I could see he was scared by what I said but not quite convinced.

Two years later, my son called me late at night. He was beside himself. A boy in his class had sniffed an inhalant and was dead before the ambulance could get him to the hospital. My son kept saying, "It's

true, Mom. It's true what you said. It go for groceries, a doctor's appointcan happen. It's terrible. I am so glad you warned me."

**DEAR VERMONT MOTHER:** I'm sure many parents have never heard of getting high on inhalants.

Thank you for opening their eyes. DEAR ANN LANDERS: I became a bit angry while reading those columns from people who want to take away old folks' driving privileges. If young drivers would use a little common sense, we older folks wouldn't always be in their way. Why are they in such a hurry? Where are they going that another three minutes would make such a difference?

The young people on the road scare me to death. I will be 70 next month and would gladly quit driving if someone would provide me with a chauffeured care every time I must

**DEAR BOISE:** Thanks for blowing your top. Your points are valid. Although teen-agers may be responsible for a lot of traffic accidents, seniors are more likely to be involved in fatalities.

According to a recent article in the Chicago Tribune, the rate of fatal accidents per miles driven is higher for drivers over 75 than for teenagers. In accidents occurring at speeds under 33 mph, 86 percent of occupants over 60 years of age died,

compared with none under 40.

A driver's skills can be impaired due to illness, aging or injury. A recent survey by the University of Florida reported that half of all drivers with Parkinson's disease and two-thirds of all who had suffered a stroke or passed out in the last year continue to drive. The older a person gets, the greater the chances are that he or she will have an accident:

Of course, this does not let the teen-agers off the hook. A word to parents: If your child gets a citations for a traffic violation (speeding, running a red light, etc.), you should take away his or her driving privileges for two solid weeks, even if the car is his or her own. It could save that child's life.



AP Sports Writer WIMBLEDON, England (AP) -Top-seeded Andre Agassi overwhelmed Australian qualifier Andrew Painter in straight sets today to reach the second round at Wimbledon.

Agassi, the 1992 champion, looked sharp as he cruised to a 6-2, 6-2, 6-1 victory in just one hour, 17 minutes.

Painter, a 19-year-old Tasmanian with a world ranking of No. 530, was playing his first match in a tour-level event. It showed.

Painter committed 17 double faults to go with his 13 aces. In one game alone, trailing 5-1 in the first set, he served six double faults and had four aces before holding serve. In the second set, he double-faulted on all four of his serves in the seventh game to fall behind 5-2.

Agassi was in complete command as he took the ball early and ripped shots cleanly to all corners of the court.

While Painter struggled just to win

a game in the third set, Agassi showed no mercy. On match point, with Painter stranded at the net, Agassi moved up on a short ball and drilled a forehand passing shot close to his body.

"I've grown to love it here," Agassi said. "I enjoy being a part of history here ... Every time I come back here, the emotion and the excitement seems to bring out some great tennis."

In women's play, defending champion Conchita Martinez, second-seeded Arantxa Sanchez Vicario and No. 5 Mary Pierce all won in straight sets.

Martinez crushed Asa Carlsson of Sweden 6-1, 6-1, in just 47 minutes.

Sanchez Vicario, mixing her strong baseline game with occasional forays to the net, needed less than an hour to beat Katarina Studenkiova of Slovakia, 6-2, 6-1.

Pierce, making her Wimbledon debut, took 57 minutes to dispose of Sandra Dopfer 6-1, 6-2.

"I was a little bit nervous," Pierce

said. "I didn't know what to expect, but it was a great feeling playing here for the first time."

Also winning in straight sets was No. 4 Jana Novotna, who defeated Karin Kschwendt 6-4, 6-4.

Top-seeded Steffi Graf was set to olay 14-year-old Swiss phenom Martina Hingis. Sanchez Vicario, a clay-court







DEARDR. DONOHUE: I am finding it increasingly difficult to cut my toenails, even after a hot shower. Please advise. - K.L.

**ANSWER:** A shower seldom is the answer. You need to soak your feet. Soak them for about eight minutes in warm water to which you've added a teaspoon of table salt per pint. Then try clipping. If the nails are still resistant, soak again.

Many older people find it difficult even to reach their toenails for trimming. A family member can assist. Sometimes, only the help of a podiatrist will do. A podiatrist also can check for a fungus infection that might be interfering with proper toenail care.



WASHINGTON (AP) - Warren E. Burger, the retired chief justice who wrote the Supreme Court opinion that forced President Nixon to release the Watergate tapes, was a conservative jurist who also won praise from liberals.

The nation's 15th chief justice, Burger served from 1969 to 1986, the longest tenure this century. He died on Sunday at age 87.

"Justice Burger was a strong, powerful, visionary chief justice who opened the doors of opportunity," President Clinton said in a statement issued in Little Rock, Ark. "As chief justice, he was concerned with the administration of the court, serving with enthusiasm and always making sure it was above reproach.'

"His expansive view of the Constitution and his tireless service will leave a lasting imprint on the court and our nation.'

**Burger died at Sibley Memorial** Hospital of congestive heart failure, said Toni House, spokeswoman for the court.

A champion of judicial reform, Burger retired in 1986 and devoted full attention to his duties as the unpaid chairman of the Commission on the Bicentennial of the United States Constitution.

In that post, he led the national celebrations of the Constitution's 200th anniversary in 1987 and the Bill of Rights' 200th anniversary in 1989

Burger had performed no judicial duties since 1986. In recent years, he suffered from recurring pulmonary problems. He was hospitalized several times with pneumonia.

On the bench, Burger was a politically conservative judge who rarely showed sympathy for criminal defendants or their asserted rights.

But he also wrote numerous opinions praised by liberals. Burger spoke for the court in decisions that inaugurated busing as a tool for the racial desegregation of public schools, expanded public access to

the nation's courts and enhanced women's protections against sexual discrimination.

He wrote the opinion that in 1974 forced Nixon - the man who had nominated him to the court - to surrender White House tape recordings and papers for use as evidence in the trial of presidential aides accused of covering up the Watergate scandal.

The ruling was a major factor in Nixon's decision to resign.

Burger also wrote the landmark 1973 decision that supplied the still-used legal definition of obscenity. He said material is obscene, and

therefore not protected by the Constitution's free-speech guarantee, if it appeals to a morbid interest in sex with patently offensive depictions of sexual conduct, and on the whole has no serious literary, artistic, political or scientific value.

At the Supreme Court, he was known as a man with an eye for detail. He chose the carpeting for the court's public cafeteria and much of the building's furniture.

Burger created the Institute for Court Management and the National Center for State Courts and made numerous other administrative innovations. He played a key role in bringing about technological advances and better training for judges and lawyers.

About his many projects for improving the administration of justice, Burger once said, "I didn't initiate them because I loved them; it wasn't that kind of work. I initiated them because they were 30 or 40 years overdue."

A longtime campaigner for prison reforms, Burger said the country should move away from "prison warehouses" and instead build "factories with fences" in which inmates learn a marketable skill so they can earn a living after their release.

He was a collector of antiques and wine, a sculptor and painter of considerable skill, but his customary

80-hour work weeks left little time for those hobbies until the bicentennial commission ceased to exist in 1992.

Burger was also an outspoken opponent of televising federal court proceedings, especially the Supreme Court's public argument sessions in which lawyers present their cases to the justices.

Although most state court systems allow some television, radio or still-photography coverage, federal courts do not.

Aside from the chronic back pain he suffered since contracting polio as

a youth, Burger generally enjoyed good health throughout h is judicial career. He began having serious health problems in 1988, when he was hospitalized for three days, suffering from exhaustion and pneumonia.

Burger was born in St. Paul, Minn., on Sept. 17, 1907, to a family of Swiss and German descendants. His father worked as a railway cargo inspector and sometime traveling salesman.

Burger worked days as an insurance salesman while earning his undergradu-ate degree at night from the University of Minnesota, and later earned a law degree at night at St. Paul College of Law

He joined a Minneapolis law firm in 1931, and eight years later made his first foray into politics by managing the Minnesota gubernatorial campaign of a young Harold Stassen.

President Eisenhower named Burger to the U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals for the District of Columbia in 1956.

Thirteen years later, Nixon selected him to replace Chief Justice Earl Warren. Burger had criticized rulings of the Warren court, which enhanced the rights of criminal suspects.

Burger's wife of 61 years, Elvera, died last year. They had a son, Wade, and a daughter, Margaret, and two grandchildren.

**Golden Spread Electric Coopera**tive has received proposals totalling 2,555 megawatts from bidders responding to plans to expand generating capability.

The co-op has received approval from the Texas Public Utility Commission for a certificate of convenience and necessity for construction of a new 400 megawatt generating plant for serving peak loads.

Golden Spread also is seeking to evaluate new opportunities within the electric utility industry for alternative power supply resources.

The new plant is scheduled for initial operation in 1998 and will be powered by natural gas. A final site for the plant has not

been made. However, two sites are under consideration. One is in Moore County south of Sunray and the other involves properties cast of Denver City in Yoakum and Gaines counties. The proposals received from other utilities and independent power

suppliers for both new capacity and demand side control options could eliminate the company's need for the new generation plant. The bids are being reviewed by a consultant being reviewed by a consultant, which will compare them to the

The common thread running through the bills is the need to deter new illegal immigration at the border while detecting undocumented aliens already in the United States.

Some 4 million people are believed to be in the United States illegally, having overstayed their visas or entered the country without authorization. Another 350,000 or so are believed to enter illegally each year.
