## Local roper heading to Super Bowl of rodeo Purcella, partner among top team roping duos; earn trip to National Finals Rodeo

After only five months as roping partners, Steve Purcella of Hereford and Steve Northcott of Odessa are headed to the National Finals Rodeo in Las Vegas on Dec. 1-10th. They will be competing against the top winning roping teams in the United States.

To those who are not familiar with the sport, this annual event is the Super Bowl of rodeo. To qualify, the pair had to be top money winners in 1995, and only 15 teams will make the cut. Purcella, the header, said his earnings are just over \$61,000 for the year and Northcott, the heeler, earned more than \$51,000. Accomplishing that feat was not an easy task. Purcella had to attend -- and win -- many rodeos to come away with that much money.

"I entered about 93 rodeos and made 85," said Purcella. The team is not going into this year's finals without experience. Purcella has qualified for the finals two times before. Northcott will make his first trip to the Las Vegas event. "I've been there before. This will be my third time to go," Purcella said. "I've placed fifth the other two times." Purcella, with his best horse

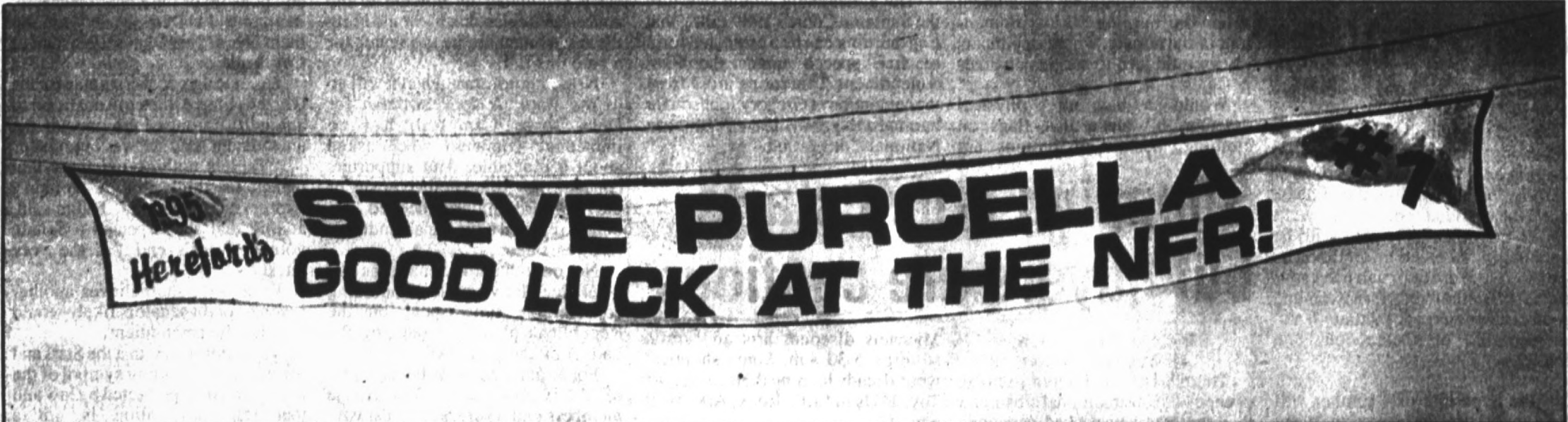
Butterbean, and Northcott, with his best horse Peppy, plan to leave for Las Vegas Tuesday. Although the team is relatively new, they seem to click together. When asked if the other was the best partner they have had, they both replied with a big grin, a small laugh, and a "yeah." "Of course that's what we are going to say with the other one sitting here," laughed Northcott. "We

probably wouldn't be going as a team if we didn't think that." In preparation for the big event they have been practicing three to four hours a day. "That's long enough," said Purcella. "We can run through about 80 steers in that amount of time." The team said they shoot for about 4.0 seconds, but 3.8 is their best time ever. "4.0 is really fast, so that is why

we try to make that time," said Purcella. At Nationals, they will compete for 10 straight nights. There will be a winner each night and then a cumulative winner on the last night. "After one bad night you're not out of the running," said Purcella. "That is the good thing about the Nationals. You have a chance to make up for it the next night." When asked who he looked up to on the roping circuit or who he patterned himself after, he said, "Nobody, really. I just try to do the best job I can do. That's all."

Northcott added that a good roper always pays attention to the winning teams in order to pick up new tricks of the trade. "Of course, we always watch the winning teams like Clay O'Brien Cooper," he said. "We will be roping against him at Nationals." "You are just thinking about what you need to do to get the best time," Purcella said about what goes through his minds when a steer comes out of the chute. He went on to say that a good roper doesn't worry about missing, he just worries about what needs to

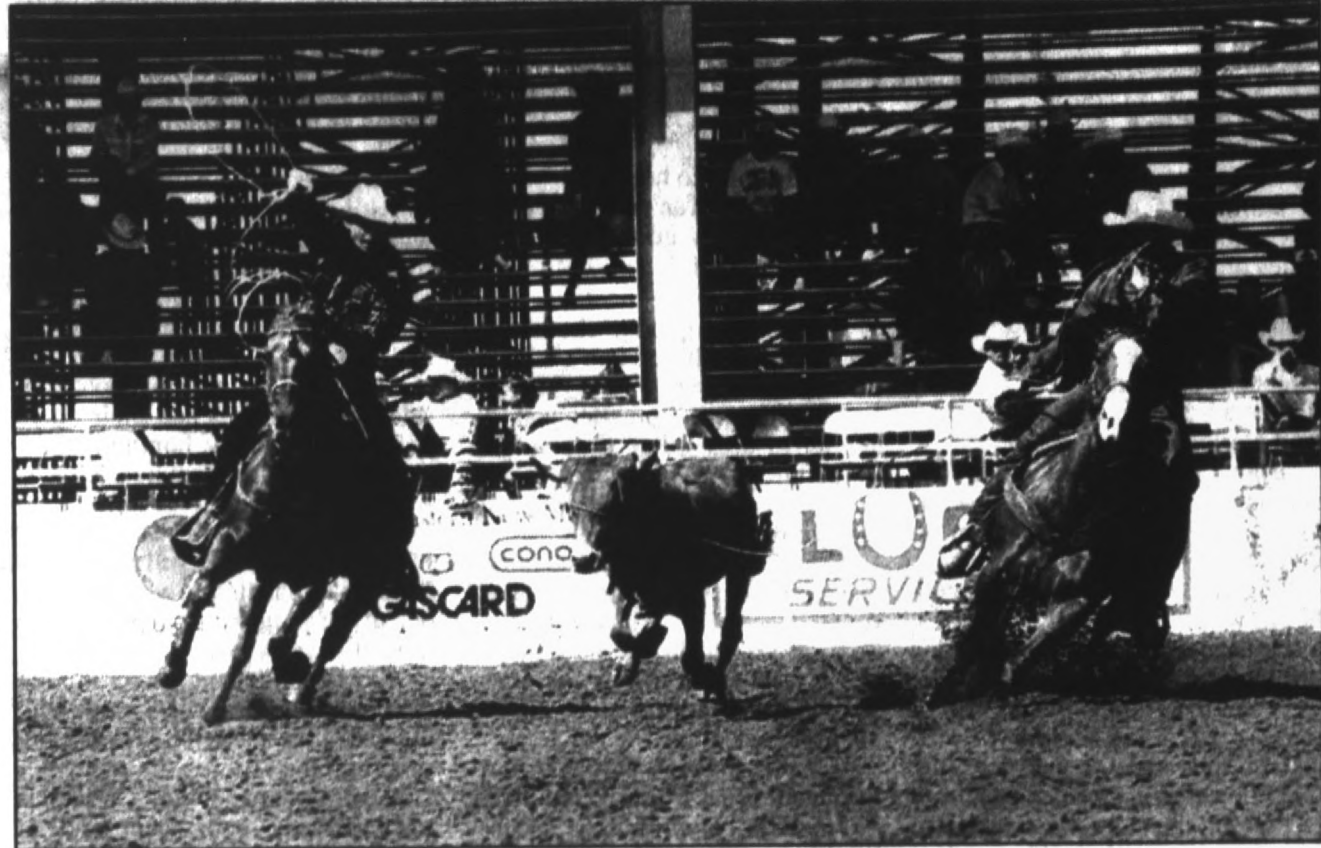


## Election year to get started with opening of filing period

Politics takes on local meaning in a few days when candidates for elective office begin the process toward primary elections next March. The filing period for county and state candidates begins Dec. 3, and ends on Jan. 2. Primary elections will be held March 12. Deaf Smith County officials whose terms end next year are Sheriff Joe Brown, Tax Assessor-Collector Margaret Del Toro, County Commissioner Tony Castillo of Precinct 1 and County Commissioner Troy Don Moore of Precinct 3. Although the list of state and local officials whose terms expire next year is limited, the main interest will be in the Presidential sweepstakes.

The U.S. Senate seat held by Phil Gramm will be up for election. Although Gramm is an announced candidate for the Republican nomination for President, he also is expected to file for re-election to the senate. Terms of U.S. Representative Larry Combest of the 19th Congressional District and State Representative John Smith of the 86th District also expire next year. At the state level, a railroad commissioner, member of the State Board of Education, chief justice and justice of the state Supreme Court and chief justice and justice of the Court of Appeals will be elected in 1996.

Candidates will file applications to have their names on primary ballots will party chairmen. The Democratic county chairman is Roddy Allred. GOP county chairman is Fran Tooley. Designation of a campaign treasurer also must be filed in the office of Deaf Smith County Clerk David Ruland. Voter registration will be conducted in Ruland's office, also. Deadline to register for voting eligibility in the March 12 primary elections is Feb. 12. Party primary runoff elections will be conducted April 9. General election day is Nov. 5.



## Clinton hesitant about offering specific budget-balancing plan

WASHINGTON (AP) - Asked by Republican congressional leaders for specific budget proposals, the Clinton administration is hedging until formal negotiations begin and providing only general "principles" for now. Since a truce that allowed the government to end a six-day partial shutdown was declared, senior

presidential advisers and Republicans in Congress have been sniping at one another in preparation for intense bargaining over the budget next week. On Wednesday, House Speaker Newt Gingrich, Senate Majority Leader Bob Dole and the chairman of the House and Senate budget committees asked President Clinton to provide "specific legislative proposals on how you would

accomplish (a budget) balance in seven years." The president has said he will veto the GOP plan, which calls for balancing the budget by 2002, but which includes squeezing \$270 billion in savings from Medicare and a tax cut of \$245 billion. As part of a temporary spending bill, Clinton and the congressional Republicans agreed to a seven-year budget plan, but also to protect Medicare, education, the environment and other spending programs the president considers important. "We cannot begin to resolve our differences until we first know what they are," the Republican lawmakers wrote Clinton. In a response Friday, White house chief of staff Leon Panetta wrote that neither the president's budget nor Congress' plan satisfies the objectives of the fragile agreement reached last Sunday. But he said he was not prepared to cite specific disagreements. "Each of us could take the position that we cannot begin talks until the other side shows in detail how it can meet all of the demands of the other," he wrote. "But such a position is unreasonable and unproductive."

Panetta instead listed nine "principles" Clinton would adhere to in negotiating a balanced budget "so that there is clarity as to what some of our primary concerns are."

Northcott said that as long as he has a good partner he just concentrates on what he needs to do. "If my header does his job I know what I've got to do," he said. "I don't worry about what he may do wrong. I concentrate on me." The adrenaline can be a plus too, said Northcott. Both men agreed that the adrenaline rush right before a cowboy breaks the bearer helps them to concentrate on their jobs. Purcella is a native of Roswell, N.M., where he learned his trade at a later age than most cowboys. He began roping at age 14. "I started roping to get out of running the chute," he said. "My dad and brother and me ran a roping operation as a side job and I got tired of running the chute, so I said give me a horse and I'll rope." He said it was something that just

came naturally to him. "I always had an easy time with it and I did pretty good when I first started," he said. He had to be good to choose it as his profession. If you don't win you don't make money. "We go out and practice just like anyone else would go to their job," Purcella said. "It's no different. You have to work at it to come away with any winnings." Northcott grew up around horses and roping. His brother and father still rope. Purcella is still in awe of the support he has received from the community. He said he appreciated all the encouragement. Purcella and his wife, Carla, make their home in the Westway community. Northcott, his wife Shelle, and their two children, Destiny, 6, and Stephanie, 8 months, live in Odessa.

# Flag protection amendment stalls in Senate after breezing through House

WASHINGTON (AP) - After cruising through the House on an overwhelming vote this spring, a proposed constitutional amendment to ban flag burning has lost momentum in the Senate, where opponents say it could lead to serious disputes in states.

Would a ban on "physical desecration" mean that flags on clothing, posters or buttons are

protected by law - or not? The tersely worded proposed amendment would leave it to the states to further define desecration, the opponents say. The amendment would overturn the Supreme Court's 1989 ruling that flag-burning can be a protected form of free speech under the First Amendment. That ruling arose from the conviction of Gregory Johnson for burning a flag at the 1984 Republican National Convention.

## Shopping crush starts, but buyers are cautious

The Christmas shopping season opened with the traditional crush, and though stores were packed, economic uncertainty had many shoppers looking, not buying. "It's just tougher times," said shopper Sharon Sky in Denver. "It seems as if my dollar doesn't go as far."

Retailers are betting on the Christmas sales to help turn around what has been a dismal year. Yet some consumers are showing caution about spending, citing an uncertain economy and overextended personal budgets. Many retailers, anxious about grim sales forecasts, opened their doors before dawn Friday, hoping to draw in day-after-Thanksgiving crowds with bargains and giveaways. "We're all crazy," said shopper Millie Ruffino at the Wal-Mart store in South Philadelphia, where crowds began forming at 6 a.m. "It's one time of year, but you have to do it." Crowds bolted into stores around the country as early as 5 a.m., with big discounts making early morning shopping the way to go. In Columbus, Ohio, Christmas trees already had been sold at

Michael's discount arts and crafts store by 5:30 a.m. Some shoppers were already loading their cars at the Toys R Us in Little Rock, Ark., by 8 a.m. The nation's retailers launched major promotions this holiday season to spur interest in wary consumers after months of depressed sales. Prices were slashed as much as 50 percent on everything from clothes to computers to sporting goods. "The retail banner years are long gone," said Dan Skoda, president of Marshall Field's department stores in Chicago. "I don't think anybody's looking for a banner year. ... We look for market share. We just hope for a bigger piece of the pie."

Some consumers are also thinking twice before saying "charge it" because they're already behind on credit-card repayments. The government reported last month that banks are seeing more consumer delinquencies in credit card and other installment loans. "A couple years ago I charged all the Christmas presents thinking that would make it easier," said Felicia Bumgarner, who was shopping at Bass Pro Shops in Springfield, Mo. "Man, you're paying Christmas off till June with the high interest rates."

There have been an average of eight flag-burning incidents a year since the high court's decision. Senate Majority Leader Bob Dole opened his presidential campaign in early September by vowing to the American Legion that he would bring the amendment before the Senate for a vote this fall. Now, it is not clear when it will go to the floor. A spokeswoman for Dole, Joyce Campbell, had no immediate comment when asked about a timetable. And supporters concede they're several votes shy of the two-thirds majority needed. The Senate rejected a similar amendment five years ago.

Not only that, the Senate has had a full legislative plate - including considerable time spent on the Republican plan for balancing the budget by the year 2002. For an amendment to become part of the Constitution, 290 House members and 66 senators must vote for it and 38 state legislatures must ratify it. There is one vacancy in the 100-member Senate, that of Bob Packwood, R-Wash. The House vote for the measure was 312-120, well above the

two-thirds majority needed. Forty-nine states - all but Vermont - have passed resolutions urging Congress to support the amendment. At last count there were 56 co-sponsors of the Senate measure, including 11 Democrats - among them liberal Sen. Dianne Feinstein of California. Susan Ridge, spokeswoman for the Citizens Flag Alliance, a coalition of about 100 groups lobbying for the amendment, said she was optimistic. "There's nothing out there that makes us think that it wouldn't happen in November," Ridge said, adding that she expected a Senate vote by year's end "at the very latest." Ridge said she believes another seven or eight senators likely would vote for the amendment. Supporters assert that the Stars and Stripes, as the binding symbol of the nation, must be protected by law and that flag desecration is not a free-speech activity protected under the Constitution's First Amendment. Sen. Orrin Hatch, R-Utah, who sponsored the measure with Sen. Howell Heflin, D-Ala., calls the flag "a unique symbol in our country."

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# Daughter of former caretaker offers memories of living at state cemetery

AUSTIN (AP) - A canopy of blue morning glories once covered Confederate soldiers' graves in the Texas State Cemetery. Large goldfish swam in the graveyard's fountain. Five milk cows helped keep the grass down.

State officials learned this from Viola Barnes, 93, who stepped forward to share her memories of living at the cemetery while her father was its caretaker in 1912-1950, the Austin American-Statesman reported Friday.

"It has made it alive," Gerron Hite, preservation architect with the Texas Historical Commission, said of details provided by Ms. Barnes about the 144-year-old cemetery.

The State Cemetery - final resting place of governors, war veterans and other Texas notables - is undergoing a \$4.7 million restoration. Ms. Barnes contacted the state in response to an appeal for information about the cemetery's past.

Her memory and her collection of childhood photographs have "really been the best" information source, Hite said.

Photographs show the cemetery once was surrounded by a fence of

concrete bricks, which Ms. Barnes said were made on the grounds. She said her job was to stand guard at the fence to keep out neighborhood children trying to climb it and attend funerals.

"They were curious; they were just children. I'd say, 'No, you can't come in here. No you will not. If you come in, I'm gonna call the police,'" she told the newspaper.

Officials learned from Ms. Barnes that a state-owned mule named Kit lived on the grounds. The animal pulled a mower and was buried on the property when it died. The grave hasn't been located.

Ms. Barnes' collection of about 75 photographs shows a well-manicured cemetery with many trees that don't currently grow there.

Her father, Ernest Robert Barnes, liked to make a flourish with flowers, growing chrysanthemums, roses, hollyhocks, pansies, sweet williams, phlox and other blooms.

Colorful flower beds shaped like a star and an anchor adorned the grounds.

"When we went out there, there was nothing. He made the place look like something," Ms. Barnes said.

Ms. Barnes also remembers a special task that had to be done every time it rained: Sheltering a bronze wreath that hung on the monument to Stephen F. Austin.

"When the weather got wet and all, it was staining up the marker, so we would take it home" until the rain stopped, she said.

No one knows where the wreath is today. Only its broken stem is on the monument.

"We'd heard there was a wreath. We didn't understand why it wasn't permanently mounted. There is just a hook there now. Without the photograph (from Ms. Barnes), you'd never know what it was for. Now, everything sort of falls into place," Hite said.

Growing up in a cemetery didn't frighten the Barnes children, Ms. Barnes said. To them, it was home and a place to work. The seven children helped their father by trimming the grass around the tombstones by hand.

"I got down on my hands and knees and cut around them with a pair of scissors. It saved the state money and gave us knowledge, too" about historical figures, Ms. Barnes said.

She added, "Every last one of us worked in that cemetery, even my mother."

Ms. Barnes, who has visited the cemetery with Hite, said she's willing to help officials any time.

"I'm still working, you might say," she said.

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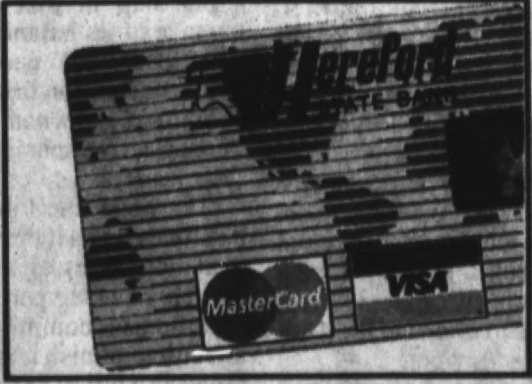


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# Texas playwright draws on experiences for work

## Horton Foote started as actor, changed directions on advice of actress-friend

WHARTON, Texas - Horton Foote directs his visitor to a book high on a shelf in his study.

"I think this pretty much sums up what I'm trying to tell you," he says as the book is retrieved and put in his hands.

He's been talking about how, as a boy, he absorbed the stories told by his elders and how those stories percolated through his mind and memory and gave him the material he's been transmuting into art for 55 years.

The book is Elizabeth Bishop's "Collected Poems." In his soft, Southern accent, the 79-year-old playwright begins to read from "The Moose," from a passage in which the narrator, on a long-distance bus trip, overhears two old people sitting in the back, talking quietly:

...uninterruptedly talking, in Eternity: names being mentioned, things cleared up finally; what he said, what she said, who got pensioned:

deaths, deaths and sicknesses; the year he remarried; the year (something) happened. She died in childbirth. That was the son lost when the schooner foundered.

Foote reads in a practiced voice, hitting the cadences exactly right, evoking the crystalline clarity of Bishop's verse. It's the voice of an actor, a man of the stage.

He took to drink. Yes. She went to the bad. When Amos began to pray even in the store and finally the family had to put him away.

He closes the book. "They never hid anything from me," he says, of his elders. "That was another extraordinary thing. They never said leave the room. They never shielded me from things they didn't think a child should hear. "So I got educated early."

Outside, the summer day is overcast and muggy, but Foote's study is dark and cool. The rectangular room is actually the enclosed back porch of the 78-year-old Foote family home in Wharton, a Gulf Coast farm town 60 miles southwest of Houston, off U.S. 59. The playwright was raised in this large two-bedroom wood-frame house - he was 1 when his parents moved in.

As a young man he wrote his first full-length play in the living room. In the back yard of the house next door stands a 300-year-old pecan tree whose branches he scrambled over as a boy. These days he spends about six months of the year in Wharton, living the rest of the time in a Greenwich Village apartment.

The study is furnished simply. At one end is a large wooden desk where he often writes. On the wall are books - poetry on the left, plays on the right. Two vinyl-covered stuffed chairs fill the other end of the room, and it is here Foote sits today, talking about his life and long career. In a corner, next to the window, stand his two Oscars, both for best screenplay: "To Kill a Mockingbird" (1962) and "Tender Mercies" (1983).

Foote is affable but with a reservoir of polite reserve - "courtly" is the adjective often and accurately applied to his manner. He's medium height, with bushy white eyebrows and a square face topped by white hair. He moves slowly, but speaks with vigor.

No, he says, his life hasn't changed much since winning the Pulitzer Prize for drama last year. That honor had one excellent result, though. It set his Pulitzer-winning play, "The Young Man From Atlanta," which had its premiere at the small Signature Theater in New York in January, on the road to Broadway. That journey will take it first to Boston's Huntington Theater, where it opens this month, and to Houston's Alley Theater, where it will run Feb. 16-March 16, 1996.

Foote has written more than 40 plays and seems as active as ever. In addition to working closely with director Peter Masterson on the Broadway-bound production of "The Young Man," he's mulling over a screenplay for a film based on William Faulkner's short story "Old Man." Foote adapted the story for television in 1958.

Actor Eddie Murphy's production

company has commissioned him to write an original screenplay based on the experiences of blacks in the Wharton area. And Foote hopes to continue filming his "Orphans' Home Cycle," nine plays based loosely on his parents' early lives. Small, independent films of four of the nine - "1918," "On Valentine's Day," "Courtship" and "Convicts" - have been made during the past 10 years.

Foote is one of those writers whose work is rooted in a sense of place. He doesn't write about New York or New Hampshire, both places he's lived much of his adult life, but about Wharton (called Harrison in his plays). He writes about the moral and existential conflicts of mostly ordinary people, about broken dreams, love gained and lost, courage in the face of disappointment. There's nothing flashy or histrionic about his work, but it is invested with a deep humanity.

"Early on I said to myself that I would like to write a kind of moral and spiritual history of a place," Foote says. "I don't often say that because it sounds a little pretentious, I know. But that's really what I set for myself."

Foote is a fifth-generation Texan, with deep roots in Wharton and the state. On his father's side of the family, there were the Hortons and the Footes. The Hortons came to Texas in 1834 and had a large plantation outside Wharton. When Texas was admitted to the union in 1846, Albert Clinton Horton became the state's first lieutenant governor, serving as acting governor for some months while James Pinckney Henderson was fighting in Mexico. The Footes came to Galveston sometime before the Civil War and owned shipping fleets. Both families lost their fortunes during the war.

Foote's mother's family had better luck. The playwright's maternal grandfather bought a large amount of

cotton farmland around Wharton after the Civil War. Foote's father ran a clothing store just off the town square and managed the farms his wife had inherited. The couple had three sons. If not rich, the family was well-to-do.

"We had our ups and downs, typical of a small-town family in those days," Foote says of life in the extended family of his boyhood.

"It was very hard on the males because there was so little to do. My

uncles were just never very ambitious, and they had difficult and tragic lives in many ways. Most of them inherited land, but they never farmed it; they had people working it, so they didn't have much to do.

"My aunts, on the other hand, were extraordinary women, very strong, and all had very fulfilled lives."

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Foote's father told stories, and he heard men spinning yarns when he helped at his dad's store. But the women were the great storytellers of the family, he says. One aunt - Louisiana Texas Patience Horton - "could really make the hair of your head stand up." They talked about their own lives, about their neighbors, about the past and the present, about "what he said, what she said," as Elizabeth Bishop put it.

Foote learned about point of view, about how the angle from which events are seen can be as interesting as the events themselves. "Sometimes it was almost like a riff," he says, drawing a term from jazz. "They would tell the story, and then tell it the next night with variations."

At the time the young Foote didn't know how he would use the stories he was hearing. But he did decide, at the age of 11, that he wanted to be an actor. Why is something of a mystery to him even today. It wasn't as though

Wharton in the 1920s was some hotbed of the dramatic arts.

The best Foote can say is that, like an East Texas preacher, he "got the call." He resolved that after graduating from high school he would go off and become an actor. On

graduation day, he would be just shy of 16.

His parents were remarkably supportive about the whole thing.

"Oh, my God, when I think back

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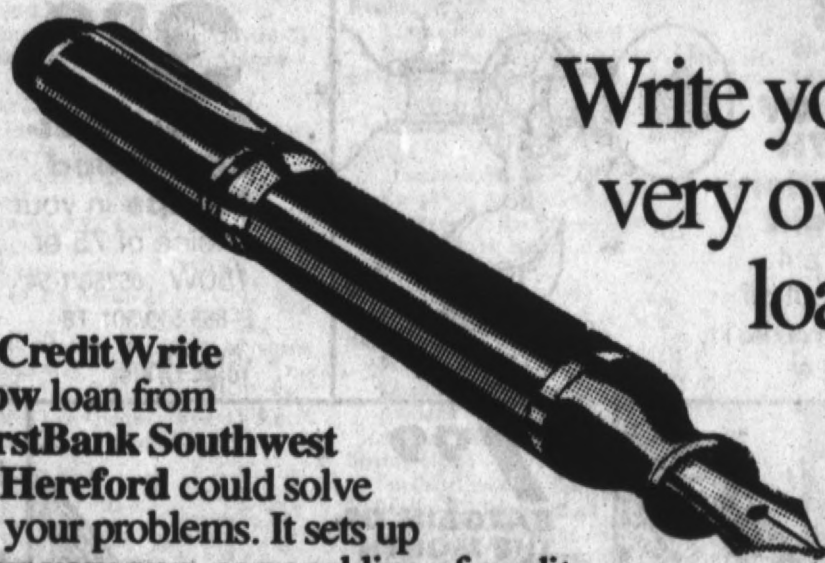

## Emmitt's knee injury won't end his season

IRVING, Texas (AP) - Thanksgiving came one day late for the Dallas Cowboys.

A medical report contained good news on Emmitt Smith's left knee, injured during the third quarter of Thursday's 24-12 win over Kansas City.

Smith, who has missed only one game due to injury in his pro career, sustained a mild sprain of the medial collateral ligament against the Chiefs and could play Dec. 3 when Dallas plays host to Washington.

"Doctors said Emmitt will be listed as probable day-to-day and he could play next week," said Cowboys spokesman Rich Dalrymple. "Doctors will know more next Monday about his availability against the Redskins."

Smith rushed for 56 yards and scored on a 15-yard run before his injury. The touchdown was his 21st of the season, leaving him just three behind John Riggins' NFL record.

It looked like the NFL's rushing leader was gone for the season when he was carted off the field. He went down untouched after planting his shoe on Texas Stadium's artificial surface, which hasn't been replaced since around 1980.

But an MRI performed at Baylor University Medical Center on Friday "showed no serious damage," Dalrymple said.

"Emmitt's MRI is something we

can all be thankful for," Dallas coach Barry Switzer said. "Everybody knows his value to this football team. We're not going to rush his recovery."

"We've got 10 days before our next game and we're going to treat his knee and rehab it so that when he returns, he'll be 100 percent. Our medical staff is not setting a date for him returning to practice."

Owner Jerry Jones, who two years ago found out the hard way about Smith's value to the team, said, "We're thrilled about the news about Emmitt."

Smith missed the first two games of the 1993 season because of a contract dispute with Jones, who quickly yielded to Smith's demands after Dallas lost the two games without him. The Cowboys then rallied to win a second consecutive Super Bowl.

While the news was good about Smith, reports were disastrous on center Ray Donaldson.

The 37-year-old starter, signed after Pro Bowl center Mark Stepnoski went to the Houston Oilers during the offseason, is out for the season and the playoffs with a broken right ankle. He underwent two hours of surgery Friday.

Guard Derek Kennard will take over at center. Jones had refused to accept Kennard's retirement announcement this summer and enticed him into signing with the Cowboys.

## Cornhuskers race by Oklahoma

LINCOLN, Neb. (AP) - Don't expect the celebration of a third consecutive undefeated regular season to last long. No. 1 Nebraska has the Fiesta Bowl and a third straight national championship game just five weeks away.

The Cornhuskers (11-0, 7-0 Big Eight) will relax today, and many will watch No. 6 Florida State at No. 3 Florida on television. If the Gators win and beat Arkansas in the Southeastern Conference championship, they will play Nebraska in the Fiesta Bowl on Jan. 2.

Center Aaron Graham will be watching, but he was looking ahead to Tuesday's practice so the team can work on "the things we need to do to win another national championship."

Like run the football. Friday's 37-0 victory over Oklahoma saw the Huskers held to 271 rushing yards, their third-lowest total this season. Nebraska's offense didn't score a touchdown until 14:12 left in the game.

It didn't matter. The Nebraska defense scored two touchdowns and held Oklahoma to 241 yards, 144 below its average. Oklahoma had not been shut out by Nebraska since a 7-0 loss in 1942.

"Sometimes the offense carries us, but I thought we did a pretty good job," defensive tackle Christian Peter said. "I think we've showed throughout the year that we have a great offense, but we also have a great defense."

Nebraska needed it as quarterback Tommie Frazier and the Huskers offense sputtered. Frazier, considered a Heisman Trophy frontrunner along with Ohio State tailback Eddie

George, completed 12-of-25 for 128 yards with one interception and a 38-yard touchdown pass.

"I don't think I played a bad game," said Frazier, who improved to 32-3 as a starter. "I did everything I normally do. It's just that things didn't fall into the right places for me today."

The teams combined for seven fumbles, 12 penalties and 14 punts, but Oklahoma (5-5-1, 2-5) paid the most for its mistakes. Of its 14 possessions, 10 ended in punts, two in interceptions, one in a fumble and the other on downs. Oklahoma managed just 51 rushing yards, 162 below its average.

Oklahoma, which averaged 2.6 turnovers per game, also had nine penalties for 97 yards in the final game between two Big Eight Conference teams. Next year, the expanded league will be known as the Big 12.

"Our football team played giveaway throughout the year, and that was the story today," Oklahoma coach Howard Schnellenberger said. "I'd really like to see these two teams play with us taking out all our giveaways."

Nebraska opened the scoring on a 31-yard field goal by Kris Brown. On the ensuing drive, linebacker Jamel Williams picked off the third pass by Oklahoma redshirt freshman Eric Moore and returned it 31 yards for a touchdown. It was the fifth interception return for a score by Nebraska this season.

The Huskers added a 27-yard field goal by Brown, but punted three times and failed on a fourth-and-15 play on their other first-half possessions.

"They were doing some things that caught us off guard," Frazier said.

The Sooners offense never got started. Senior Garrick McGee, who replaced Moore after Oklahoma's third possession, completed half of

his 30 passes for 159 yards with one interception.

Nebraska opened a 20-0 lead midway through the third quarter when safety Tony Veland picked up James Allen's fumble and ran 57 yards for a touchdown.

George, completed 12-of-25 for 128 yards with one interception and a 38-yard touchdown pass.

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## Oilers must contain Broncos' rookie RB

HOUSTON (AP) - The best defense against Denver rookie running back Terrell Davis may be canceling his wakeup call.

Davis, a sixth-round surprise from Georgia, enjoys 10-12 hours sleep per night almost as much as he relishes gaining yards for the Broncos.

"I must be part bear or something, but I'll be in bed by 7:30 or 8 tonight," Davis said. "I've always needed a lot of sleep. Sometimes I read, but sleeping is the most relaxing thing I do."

Davis started preseason hoping he could make the Broncos' practice squad. Yet he'll be making his 12th start of the season Sunday when the Broncos play the Houston Oilers in the Astrodome.

Davis is a key reason the Broncos offense has added efficiency this season. He gives defenses more to think about than just stopping John Elway. He's rushed over 100 yards two of the last three weeks and needs 117 yards to reach 1,000.

"When you have a quarterback who can do the things downfield like Elway with Shannon Sharpe, you have to concern yourself with what they can do," Oilers coach Jeff Fisher said. "And that does a lot to open up your running game."

The Broncos haven't had a 1,000-yard rusher since Gaston Green in 1991. Davis had his best day Nov. 19 with 176 yards on 30 carries, the second in the NFL this season behind Marshall Faulk's 177 yards for Indianapolis against St. Louis on Oct. 1.

"We've been more productive the last couple of weeks than we

have all year," Broncos coach Mike Shanahan said. "Terrell has everything you look for in a running back. He's a good blocker, he has excellent hands and he gets stronger as the game goes on."

Shanahan became head coach last Jan. 31 with a new coaching staff and an open mind. He began preseason without naming a starting running back.

"We had no preconceived notion that one guy was going to be the guy," Shanahan said. "We evaluated throughout the preseason, and by the end there was no question that this guy was the most productive running back."

Davis has progressed each week. He got 135 yards against Arizona on Nov. 5 for his first 100-yard game as a pro and he knows who helped him get there.

"You look at the holes I'm running through - and who couldn't run through them?" Davis said. "It was just a matter of me getting adjusted to them. Early in the year, I was running where I wasn't supposed to run and now I'm more patient, waiting for the blocks."

"The success I'm having is actually everyone on the offensive line."

Shanahan has been most impressed with Davis' maturity.

"A lot of rookies come in and they get enamored with the media and their success," Shanahan said.

"We've just been watching film on them," Davis said. "They are a great defense and we know it will be a challenge to play against them."

But Davis probably won't lose any sleep over it.

## Nuggets down Mavs in overtime

Lucious Harris is the latest member of the Dallas Mavericks to cost his team a victory by missing from close range.

"I misjudged it off the backboard," Harris said. "I should have just shot it straight. But that's how it goes."

Jackson missed a similar shot Tuesday night at the end of regulation against the Chicago Bulls and the Mavs lost that game, too, 108-102 in overtime.

"This was a huge win," guard Jalen Rose said. "Any time you come into another team's arena 2-8, any win is huge. We made plays down the stretch and found a way to win. We need to keep finding ways to win."

Mahmoud Abdul-Rauf nailed 8-of-11 attempts from 3-point range and scored a season-high 39 points for Denver, which won for only the third time this season.

With less than 30 seconds left in the game, it looked like the Nuggets would win in regulation. But Jason Kidd's follow-up with 12 seconds remaining narrowed Denver's advantage to 103-101, and Kidd then stole the inbound pass and dunked with 8.3 seconds left for a 103-103 tie.

The Nuggets had trouble inbounding the ball and Don MacLean threw a pass out of bounds with 1.5 seconds left to give the Mavericks a chance for the win. George McCloud completed a 40-foot inbound pass to Harris underneath the basket, but the layup attempt bounced out.

At Seattle, Hersey Hawkins scored 27 points and Shawn Kemp added 25 points and 17 rebounds as Seattle

## Win over Baylor gives Longhorns new confidence

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) - Texas players say a Thanksgiving-night victory over Baylor is testament to a new, never-say-die spirit that has helped restore some prestige in the No. 9 Longhorns' program.

With quarterback James Brown, the Southwest Conference leader in pass efficiency and total offense, out of the game with a sprained left ankle, redshirt freshman Rich Walton opened against the Bears by spraying errant passes all over the field.

After six possessions, the Longhorns (9-1-1, 6-0 SWC) had 1 yard of offense, a turnover and no first downs. But Texas coach John Mackovic could be seen exhorting his players up and down the sideline.

"I kept telling Rich, 'You're doing just fine. Keep your tires pumped up because you're going to hit the groove,' and he finally did," Mackovic said of his team's 21-13 victory over Baylor (7-4, 5-2).

Players said recent Texas teams might have become discouraged and let the game slip away after such a poor start. But they said they have been toughened by adversities of the past couple of years: injuries, player suspensions, upset losses.

"In the past, I don't know that we would pull that game out," said cornerback Bryant Westbrook. "We might get our heads down and let it get away. But this team has been through a lot. We have more confidence, and we help pull each other through the tough times."

The sense rose to the challenge and shut down Baylor's explosive running attack, limiting the Bears to 164 yards of offense without a score in the first half.

The strong defensive effort gave Walton enough time to find a rhythm. He hit tight end Pat Fitzgerald on a 70-yard touchdown pass with 4:39 left in the first half.

The Longhorns went on to build a 21-0 lead before Baylor scored twice late in the fourth quarter.

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# Mascots form big part of SWC football legacy

## Special animals provide focus for school spirit, target for pranksters

SAN ANTONIO - They have stolen fans' hearts. Fans have just stolen their heart, hair, hide and all.

To many, mascots are as much a part of the Southwest Conference's football legacy as any player, coach or marching band.  
Everyone has their favorites. And preferences don't always reflect school ties.  
"When it comes to mascots, I've always been partial to (Texas') Bevo and the (Arkansas) Razorback," said former SMU coach Ron Meyer. "At SMU, I always wished we had some big Clydesdale, you know, standing about 20 hands high, to run out on the field with us. Instead, we had this little old Shetland (pony) ... I never could understand that."  
If an SWC gallop poll was taken, SMU and Texas Tech easily would finish with the highest marks. Those schools' horses make the football teams' field entrance an electric moment.

The Mustangs' first Peruna, a 150-pound show pony, made his debut Nov. 4, 1932, after being donated by T.E. Jones, the owner of old Arlington Downs. Jones also provided a red saddle blanket to go along with the horse.

Unfortunately, after just two years of service as SMU's mascot, Peruna ran out into the middle of Mockingbird Lane near campus and was struck by a car and killed. The horse was buried at Ownby Stadium, where a small statue marks both his grave and all other Perunas who have trotted off to that big pasture in the sky.

Texas Tech unveiled the first Masked Rider, Joe Kirk Fulton, against Auburn in the 1954 Gator Bowl. After seeing Fulton, a black-and-red cape flapping in the air, and his trusty steed, Blackie, dash around the field in Jacksonville, Fla., an Atlanta newspaper reporter wrote: "No team in any bowl game ever made a more sensational entrance."

But the 40-year-old tradition of the jet-black horse and Zorro-like rider racing around the field at full speed after Red Raiders' touchdowns also endured a tragic setback in 1994.

Tech's quarterhorse, named Double T, lost its rider and died after smashing into the wall as it tried to leave Jones Stadium through the southwest tunnel. This season in Lubbock, the Masked Rider only darts around the field when the team first enters.

"The most exciting mascot is the one at Texas Tech," said former Texas A&M coach Emory Bellard. "It's always been pretty dangerous what they did. He would go around that field and get the crowd working up in a sweat. I always told our kids to be alert and that, if they didn't want to get run over by that horse, don't let 'em score."

If the SWC mascots could ever get together and produce their own yearbook, Bevo, Texas' Longhorn steer, probably would be voted "Most Likely To Be Stolen."

One of the more memorable steer-nappings happened in 1963. And, as was often the case whenever SWC mascots disappeared from their pens, cages or secret hiding places, Aggies proved to be the culprits.

That season, A&M cadets had managed to swipe the mascot from nearly every opponent on the Aggies' football schedule, with the exception of LSU's tiger, Mike, and the University of Houston's cougar, Shasta. But Bevo, of course, was seen as the final stroke in A&M's mascot-marauding masterpiece.

"They took the steer back to College Station and about

mid-morning they confessed to the local Texas Ranger that they had taken it and told him where it was," said longtime UT sports information director Bill Little, who covered the caper as a student reporter for the Daily Texan.

"The Ranger goes out to this farm, and it wasn't there. So he comes back and it was kind of like the old saying, 'You in a heapa trouble, boy!' because what they had done was confess to what was at that time cattle rustling."

"All the other mascots they had stolen were relatively harmless. But when you stole cattle in the state of Texas back then, that was rustling and it was still punishable by hanging. I'm still not sure who was more relieved that the steer was eventually found safe and sound, the Texas fans or the Aggies that took him."

A Texas mascot heist during the early 1960s turned out far more disastrous. Some UT students once tried to swipe the Baylor bear cubs

from their stone-laden den in Waco. It got ugly real quick.

"As they went through the fence, one of the cubs started scratching the guy who was carrying him and he wound up hitting it in the head, with a hammer or something, and killing it," Little said. "The kids involved in it ended up being expelled from school. It was just a case where the kid with the bear panicked."

Baylor's bear cubs, given names like Ted, Joe College, Barney and Bailey throughout the years, usually have gotten the best of any would-be thieves. And their track record against other mascots isn't too shabby, either.

Former Bears coach Grant Teaff remembers a non-conference tussle between the hedges in Athens, Ga., where the best thing his coaching staff later saw on the game film was a classic stiff arm from the cub.

"Georgia had an old grouchy bulldog, and the tradition was to take the other mascot over to meet him," Teaff said. "The old bulldog was

slobbering up next to him, and that bear cub swatted that bulldog upside the head and knocked him silly. He must have rolled about 10 feet. We lost the game, but we won the mascot war."

One of Arkansas' wild hogs, Big Red II, snorted and drooled along the sidelines until it escaped from an animal exhibit in the Summer 1977. It didn't take long for an irate farmer with a shotgun to put an end to Big Red's piglet-fathering days.

"He got shot and killed for molesting that farmer's pigs," said Rick Schaeffer, Arkansas' sports information director. "He just thought it was another wild boar on the loose."

For obvious reasons, Houston always kept its cougar in a cage.

UH hasn't used a live cougar at its athletic events since 1988. Shasta V saw her last action that season. But the ferocious feline also was known for throwing a scare into the unsuspecting.

At a road game in 1975, the

Cougar Guard, fraternity brothers charged with Shasta's care, rented its customary adjoining rooms at a Memphis, Tenn., hotel. With the management's blessing, Shasta was given a room to herself.

Given such vacation-like freedom, she loved to stretch out and take cat naps in the bathtub.

"We went out to get something to eat and forgot to put out the do-not-disturb sign on her door," said Calvin Speer, a former Cougar Guard member. "When we got back, the desk clerk told us that a maid had gone in there to clean the room. Apparently, she ran out of there screaming."

At least the cat didn't get her tongue.

When it comes to mascot pampering, though, A&M's Reveille is hard to top. She hardly ever has it all that ruff ... make that rough.

All six Reveilles have been given a variety of special privileges in Aggieland. The dogs eat in the corps

dining hall, sleep in its dorm rooms and even attend classes with the members of the cadet outfit that take care of her.

The first Reveille, a skinny, black mutt hit by a carload of guilt-ridden cadets and nursed back to health, died at age 12 in 1944. She was given a full military funeral and buried just outside Kyle Field.

"That might be what a man wants to do, pass away and come back as Reveille," Bellard said. "She is royalty and treated in high esteem. That's the kind of dog's life you want to live."

## Ranchers believe cedar uses precious water

HUNT, Texas (AP) - To Hill Country ranchers Travis and Mary Lee, cedar is simple. Clear the stubby trees from your land and more desirable grasses and oaks thrive.

"Cedar sucks up all your water," explained Travis Lee.

In slightly more technical language, university and government researchers in the region are saying much the same thing about mountain cedar, a native evergreen formally known as Ashe juniper.

A five-year study concluding this month has found clearing cedar yields some additional water, which seeps into the soil or becomes runoff, helping to replenish the underground Edwards Aquifer.

Bill Dugas, who has conducted the

study for the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station at the Blackland Research Center in Temple, said for two years, two 40-acre pieces of property in eastern Uvalde County were studied for rainfall and evaporation before any cedar cutting was done.

In September 1992, chain saws were used to clear one of the pieces of land of small cedar trees. Mature cedar and cedar steep slopes that is considered a habitat for the endangered golden-cheeked warbler were not cut.

Then researchers continued to measure rainfall and evaporation.

Scientists expected water loss would be less where the cedar was cleared, and that's what they found. About 60,000 more gallons of water

per acre per year was discharged from the site cleared of cedar.

In the past year more water has still been yielded by the cedar-cleared land, though the amount has dropped to about 15,000 more gallons per acre per year, Dugas said.

"We've had a tremendous flush of growth of grasses and other woody plants. So we're getting less of a savings," he said. "It's why you can't do this for one year and know the answer."

Dugas conducted a similar study on mesquite trees in North Texas but did not detect the same water savings. The soil quality there is different, and grasses grow in place of mesquite almost immediately.

Dugas' cedar study is one of

several within the state-federal Seco Creek Water Quality Demonstration Project.

Phillip Wright, Seco Creek project manager with the USDA Natural Resources Conservation Service, said in a study about 1.5 miles from Dugas' work, researchers have found spring flow has been enhanced by cedar clearing.

On a 7.9-acre site, about 80 percent of the Ashe junipers were cleared. Again, larger trees that might be warbler habitat were left. Through 40 months of collecting data after the clearing, spring flow has increased.

"We've seen an increase of about 20 percent in the flow with about 30 percent less rainfall," Wright said, adding that he has seen no decrease in water savings.

These water findings could have important implications for the Edwards Aquifer recharge zone, a boomerang-shaped region stretching from Austin up through the Hill Country to north of Uvalde.

"There is a potential to increase water yield for these cedar-infested rangelands by doing selective Ashe juniper control," Wright said.

Though it is native to the area, the density of Ashe juniper has increased over the years possibly because of grazing and a lack of natural wildfires, researchers say.

Grazing is a big reason rancher Travis Lee wants to remove cedar from his land. With cedar growth, one cow can graze per 50-70 acres; without cedar, that figure increases to one cow per 15 acres, he said.

The Lees' 1,600-acre ranch used to be owned by Mary Lee's grandfather. In his days, cedar clearing was a routine chore.

"He used to burn all the time and keep all the cedar down," she said.

Last year, as the Lees were clearing a 36-acre patch of property, the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service recommended they stop so biological surveys could be done to determine if it is warbler habitat.

Their cedar clearing is on hold, they said, because they were warned that continuing with it could violate the Endangered Species Act. The Lees said they've never seen warblers on their property and that they were

planning to leave the mature cedars - or possible warbler habitat - anyway.

Like the researchers with the Seco Creek Project, Travis Lee said he's seen a difference in water flow when cedar is cleared.

"We've got a couple of gullies, the water production is much improved if you've cut the cedar," he said. His main interest is in making the land more "productive" for grass and oaks.

"Grass will not grow under these cedar trees," he added. "It (cedar) chokes off the water from everything else."

## Agriculture Department will conduct voluntary inspections

WASHINGTON (AP) - The Agriculture Department says it will provide voluntary inspections to plants that slaughter and process the meat of large, flightless birds.

The announcement follows petitions sent to USDA asking that its Food Safety and Inspection Service expand voluntary inspections to cover emus and rheas in addition to ostriches.

"There's been an increase over the years in the raising of these animals for meat," Hedy Ohringer, a spokeswoman for the inspection

agency, said Wednesday. "And the Emu Association has petitioned us to

offer this fee-for-service inspection...the way we have been doing for ostriches."

The inspections will be given at plants that want to pay for them. Ohringer said some plants want the checks so they can get the USDA stamp that certifies their meat is safe to eat.

To get an inspection, Ohringer said, plants will have to apply for a grant of inspection. Then, after an inspection, USDA officials will decide whether to give the plant a stamp of approval.

Ostriches and similar so-called ratiite species and other exotic and

game animals such as reindeer, elk, deer, antelope, water buffalo and bison are not included under mandatory meat and poultry inspection.

Inspection of those species is covered under the Agricultural Marketing Act, under which USDA can provide voluntary fee-for-service inspection for plants that want to pay for the service.

The Food Safety and Inspection Service has inspected ostrich meat through the experimental program on a fee-for-service basis since 1994.

The agency said it expects to implement voluntary inspection of ratiite species after it completes training and inspection guidelines.

Guest presenters include Dale O'Daniel, Texas Animal Health Commission, who will provide an update on vesicular stomatitis; Ward Stutz, AQHA Animal Welfare Task Force; and Sandra McCart, Texas Cruelty Investigation Bureau/Humane Society.

Economic issues facing the horse industry will be addressed at 10:30 with Dr. Dennis Sigler, nutritionist for Muenster Milling, Inc., presenting and update on equine nutrition.

The programs are geared toward anyone involved with or interested in horses, whether they show them, race them, breed them, board them or just ride them for pleasure.

## Fall potato crop to be lower

WASHINGTON (AP) - The country's fall potato crop is expected to be smaller than last year's record-setter, which should keep prices above those of 1994 through next spring.

The Agriculture Department estimates a crop of 20.1 million tons, down 5 percent from last year but still the second-largest ever.

Harvested acreage is slightly less than last year and per-acre yields are down about 5 percent, largely because

of poor spring weather, early frosts and scattered outbreaks of blight.

The most notable declines in yield were in North Dakota, 13 percent; Maine, 12 percent; Colorado, 11 percent; and Washington, 6 percent, the department said.

"A combination of the smaller fall crop and continued strong demand from processors will keep fresh-market potato prices above a year earlier through next spring," USDA's Economic Research Service said.

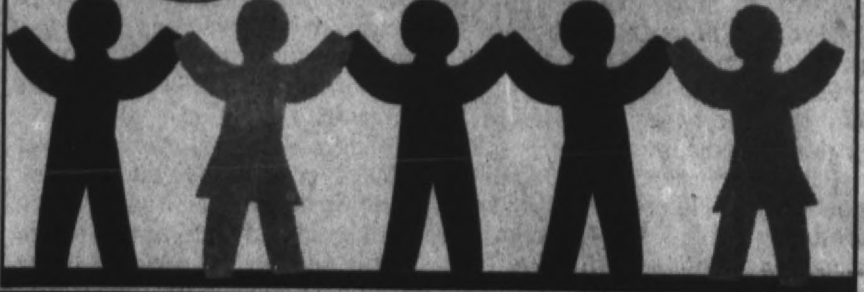
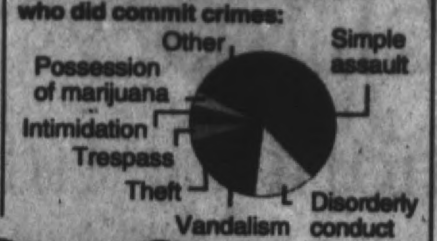
Of the 887,641 students in survey:

## To Your Good Health

DEAR DR. DONOHUE: Our two children are asthmatics, and so is my husband. It is a constant search for ways to help them. Medication helps somewhat, but never enough. I look around our home and wonder what I can do. Asthma moms need a bill of rights. Begin, please, by telling me just what an allergen is. -- Mrs. J.L.

ANSWER: Allergens are what trigger asthma symptoms. Exposure to them by the asthma patient sets off a variety of reactions.

The answer lies in avoiding or eliminating allergens -- which is easier said than done.

Your main concern is with indoor triggers, which include dust mites, molds and animal dander. Tobacco smoke, although not technically an allergen, irritates the asthma airways with the same result.

Here's the beginning of your bill of rights for an allergen-free world:

- Enclose mattresses, bedsprings and pillows in zipper-tight synthetic-fiber covers. Switch from natural to synthetic material for pillows and comforters. Avoid wool at all costs.
- Remove carpeting. Damp-mop rooms regularly. Use washable throw rugs and hot-water-washable curtains to replace heavy drapes. Hot water is death to mites.
- Find homes for any pets.
- Discourage stuffed animals.
- Keep humidity below 50 percent. Dampness encourages mite multiplication. If you have a damp basement, get a dehumidifier.
- Bleach-wipe bath surfaces.
- Close windows to bar outdoor allergens, such as tree pollen.
- Dry clothing indoors with a dryer. Add to those suggestions your own common-sense amendments.

## Between the Covers

Thanksgiving is over and now we are all trying to decide what to do for Christmas, there is so much to do and so little time and money. There are a couple of books coming out this week that you may find useful. One is **EASY DOES IT** put out by Leisure Arts and **LAST-MINUTE CHRISTMAS GIFTS** by Carol Taylor. These books will give crafting ideas for quick and classy presents for everyone on your Christmas list. If you are into sewing **FITTING FINESSE** by Nancy Zieman and **VINTAGE CLOTHING 1880-1980** may have something to interest you.

The fiction list this week begins with **RED, RED ROBIN** by Stephen Gallagher. This novel of suspense begins with Ruth Lasseter having to attend the company dance.

In order to mask her office affair she must find an escort that is able to play the part of lover. Tim Hogan seems suitable for the part. He is wistful and sweet, polite and boyishly handsome. What Ruth does not know is beneath the surface lies a rage, and a need for Tim to find the woman who can save him from his gruesome past. But if the woman fails she must pay the price.

Ruth narrowly escapes the hellish fate that Hogan has planned for her only to become obsessed with vengeance. Ruth wants to know who Tim really is and to do that she must uncover his dark past. As Ruth penetrates the heart of his madness, she finds herself locked in a chilling dance to the death.

**HANGING TIME** by Leslie Glass is a psychological thriller set in New York's upper West Side. Two blocks from the police station a sales woman is found hanging from the chandelier of a trendy boutique.

The woman is dressed in an expensive dress, but the heavy makeup

leaves her face disfigured. Maggie Wheeler had been dead for two days when her body is discovered. Detective April Woo and Detective Sergeant Mike Sanchez are the first to arrive at the crime scene, but their investigation produces few clues. They are at a dead end until a few days later.

In a little shop on Second Avenue another woman is found hanging, her face masked by thick makeup and her body draped with an oversized dress. As April accelerates her inquiries she receives an unexpected phone call from psychoanalyst Jason Frank. Dr. Frank had helped April with her first big case, and now he is asking for her help. Dr. Frank's new client has a "whopping personal problem".

Successful architect Millicia Honiger-Stanton is trying to have her mentally ill sister, Camille, committed. Camille's mood swings range from catatonic to frenzied, and she is becoming more reliant on the brutally controlling man with whom she lives. Millicia fears that her sister may be in danger as well as being dangerous.

As April and Jason work together it will take all of their knowledge, training and wisdom to end this drama of emotional terrorism.

**THE PERSIAN PICKLE CLUB** by Sandra Dallas is full of laughter and surprise in this novel about the ties that bind women together through good and bad. The time is the 1930s and the bad times have hit Harveyville, Kansas. The crops are burning up under the hot summer sun and there are no jobs to be found.

For Queenie Bean and many of the other young farm wives, the highlight of each week is the gathering of the Persian Pickle Club (named after a favorite quilting pattern). The local ladies dedicated to improving their minds, and exchanging gossip meet together to put their "well-honed" quilting skills to good use. Queenie says, "It's funny how quilting draws women together like nothing else."

When newlywed Rita Ritter comes to their small community Queenie eagerly welcomes her into the club. However, Rita is anything but a country girl. Rita wishes to develop a career in investigative journalism and before long Rita's prying uncovers the secret the Pickles have sworn to keep.

**HOW TO MURDER THE MAN OF YOUR DREAMS** by Dorothy Cannell is a tale of hapless romance and suspicious death.

Since the birth of the twins, Ellie Haskell has stayed home, gained weight and taken up the romance-reading habit that keeps her up until the wee hours of the morning. Now that she has found Gerta, a Swiss nanny and Mrs. Mallory, a house keeper, Ellie is ready to get back to her design career. Ellie hopes for a settled existence for a while.

Arriving for the Chitterton Fells Library League meeting Ellie hopes are dashed when she discovers a corpse

on the floor in the fiction stacks. Miss Bunch ran the library with an iron hand and now she is dead, with a copy of **The Dream Lover** in her hand. ## Cooper's prized possession is hot

BOSTON (AP) - When Gary Cooper's daughter had one of her father's prized possessions appraised, she found out it was a really hot item - as in stolen.

The 1777 letter written by George Washington was found to have been among 17 letters taken from the Massachusetts state archives in the 1940s.

Maria Cooper Janis, who was informed of the purloined letter by Christie's auction house, wrote state officials to say she would turn it over and explain "an unknown party" gave it to her father.

"The letter hung in the Cooper family library in Beverly Hills for many, many years," Janis wrote. "To the best of my recollection the letter

was given to my father in the mid-to late-1940s."

Secretary of State William Galvin said Tuesday he suspects the letter, appraised at \$24,000, may have been stolen by some of the people handling the documents at the time.

In the letter, Washington discusses when to release prisoners captured at the battle of Saratoga.

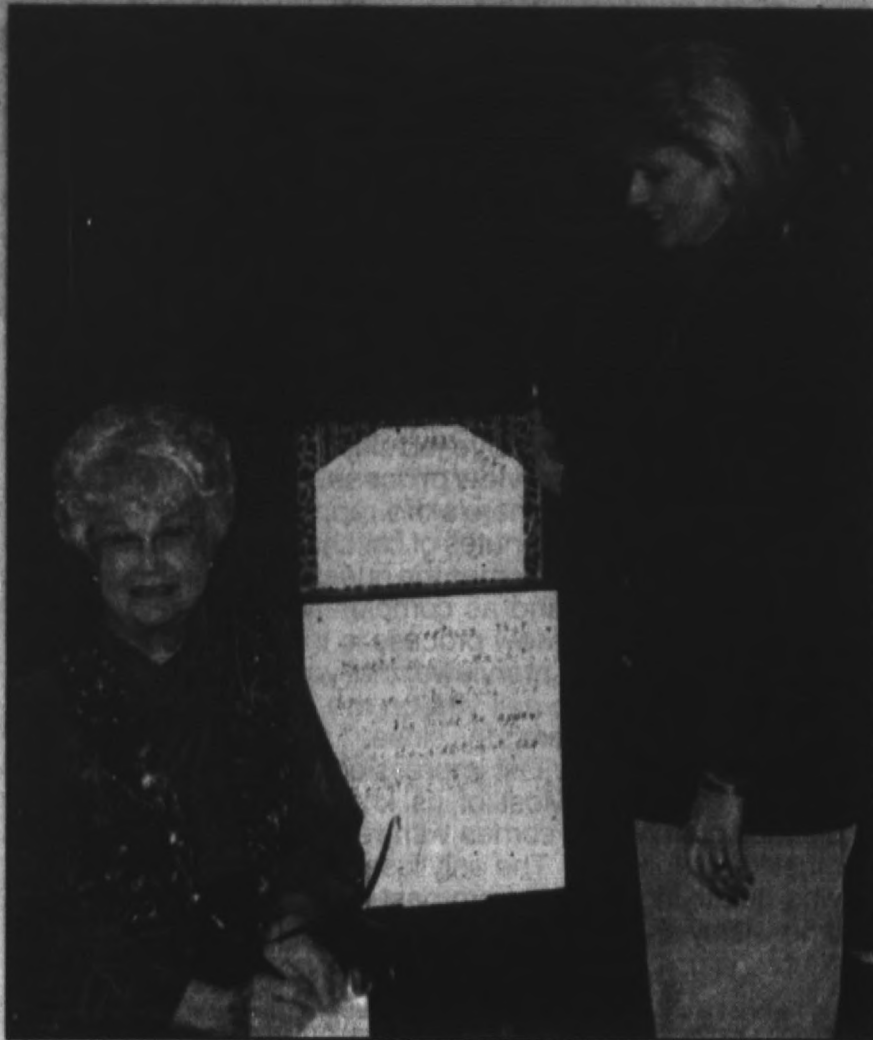

## Extension News

Even before holiday shopping swings into full force, the experts are trying to figure out the meaning of current consumer credit trends. Concerned that consumer-debt obligations have been growing twice as fast as wage and salary gains, the questions are why, when will it slow down and how will the slowdown affect the rest of the economy?

While credit use increased higher than expected over the summer months, more than twice as much credit card debt is available now than five years ago. Consumers seem to be drawn by lower minimum payments and the accelerated promotion efforts by the credit card industry.

Creditors are seeing consumers using more debt to maintain a desired lifestyle. Of particular concern is increased use of credit cards to buy groceries, health care and other services typically paid for by cash or check. As much as 10 percent of the U.S.A.'s credit card charges in 1994 were for such items. The delinquency rate for credit card payments is also on an increase in 1995.

The responsible credit card user does not use credit to buy consumable

items that will be eaten, worn out or used up before they are paid for. Only when the charges will be paid in full within the grace period of the account should such items be bought with credit.

To avoid credit problems, consumers are encouraged to limit their credit commitments, excluding the home mortgage, to 20 percent or less of their take-home pay. This rule of thumb is best applied when the consumer pays the maximum rather than the minimum payment they can afford each month.

The big challenge comes during impulse sales and holiday shopping. A 30 percent off sale price will not be a 30 percent savings if the bill is put on a credit card and paid out at the minimum payment rate.

The best way to control credit use is to leave the cards at home. Plan the amount you can afford to spend for gifts over the number of pay periods you have between now and the end of the year. Decide how to spread your gift allowance over the number of gifts to be bought, and have fun finding the special gift that sends the message you want to send without sending yourself into unmanageable debt.

# MINDING YOUR OWN BUSINESS

## ADVICE TO JOB SEEKERS

Recently, I visited with several people who were attending a business start-up workshop I was presenting. During the breaks and after the workshop, several of the attendees admitted that they were interested in starting a business because they couldn't find employment. For the record, going into business because you can't find work is not a very good reason. It often leads to a quick and painful failure.

A better alternative may be to reconsider the employment opportunities available. You might begin by conducting a thorough self-assessment to see why you're not getting hired.

Based on discussions with business owners and

personnel directors, I'd like to share some thoughts for the frustrated job seeker. Here are some good ideas for getting a job that will make both you and your future employer happy.

### Some "get-a-job" tips

- **Polish your résumé.** When it comes to résumés, one size does not fit all. Yes, you should have an attractive, accurate and error-free *standard* résumé. However, you should polish (customize) it to fit any specific job for which you apply. Tell the truth, but tell it well.
- **Know where you want to go.** The experts agree that the best potential employees aren't just looking for a job, they want to advance their career. By having some long-term career objectives, both you and your potential employer can more effectively judge your fit with the job.
- **Become a personal marketer.** You are the product. Who knows the product better than you? Develop a list of benefits you offer a potential employer. You should include your strengths, skills, education and special abilities. Compare your list with job requirements. The closer the match, the more likely the hire.
- **Get smart about technology.** Like it or not, technology will play an increasingly important role in future jobs. If you're not computer literate, take a continuing education class or college course. Use the time between jobs to learn all you can about using technology in the workplace.
- **Network with others.** Get out and meet people. Get involved with organizations. While you're working as a valuable volunteer, rub elbows with everyone you can. Don't be overly aggressive, but let folks know you are available.

- **Dress appropriately.** A human resources manager related this story. A young woman arrived for a critical interview in a skirt so short that it was nearly indecent. She had good qualifications, but was not hired because the length of her skirt caused a stir throughout the small company. "I couldn't hire her," the manager said. "She might get hired in New York, but not in our conservative community."
- **Don't talk yourself out of a job.** Answer all questions completely, but don't become a non-stop talker. Give the interviewer your undivided attention and listen carefully. Listening will help you understand complex questions, and in addition, is an impressive job skill.
- **Understand the interview process.** There are four parts to an interview. First there's the rapport building section, which includes a few minutes of chitchat so both parties will be comfortable. Next, comes the question and answer part. Respond honestly, and as completely as possible. The third part of the interview process is the selling part. You need to convince the interviewer that you are a good fit. The interviewer will try to sell you on the opportunity and the company. Finally, there's the close. Try to end on an upbeat note. You want your last impression to be a good one.
- **Don't give up.** Most of us know the frustration and disappointment that comes with rejection. However, you must keep applying. The only loser in this game are those who quit trying. Learn from past mistakes, use your free time wisely and don't give up.

## NBC's *Visitors of the Night* explores alien abductions

A mother fears both she and her daughter might have been abducted by aliens in NBC's *Visitors of the Night*.

The sci-fi thriller, premiering Monday, Nov. 27, stars Markie Post (*Hearts Afire*) as Judith Heald, a woman who has been having terrible nightmares about strange creatures since she was a child.

When her teen-age daughter, Katie (Candace Cameron, *Full House*), starts acting strangely, Judith begins to think they both might have been victims of alien abductions.

Judith meets with a hypnotherapist and begins to uncover frightening memories from her childhood. She thinks she might be losing her mind, until her nightmares start becoming too real.

Bizarre things are happening in the town as well: strange crop circles, power outages and marks behind the cars of some horses that got loose from their farm. But Judith's friend, Sheriff Marcus Ashley (Dale Midkiff), believes they are just teen-age pranks.

In a startling conclusion, Judith and Katie realize they must keep their relationship strong and face their fears together.

One of the aspects that attracted Post to the science-fiction movie was the mother-daughter relationship.

"I thought the relationship between the mother and the daughter was really fun - for an actor, fun to play - and the fact that they were intelligent, normal people, who wanted to deny what had happened to them, rather than to go headlong into the experience of being abducted," Post explains.

The stories of many alleged abductees and the idea of aliens focusing on people who are related were used to create the characters of Judith and

Katie.

"The (idea) was taken from people's experiences that have culminated in this story - those who have a common thread, a lot of it is in the movie," Post says. "I just thought it had some veracity and it was the best thing I had read in a long time."

Post chose not to interview any alleged abductees in preparation for her role, though.

"Actually, because this woman starts out completely as (someone who is) not a believer, and goes through this period of denial and disbelief, I wanted to stay just as 'ignorant' and let it evolve with the character," she says.

But, Post does have a fascination with stories of extraterrestrial life and abductions. She says she believes it would be interesting to have a close encounter with an alien herself.

"I think it would be sort of like what I expect dying is like: a good feeling, you know, that somehow fear is taken away because it feels natural and right," she comments. "I feel like that would be the way it was if it were ever to happen to me. Maybe it's because I'm sort of mentally prepared, so it wouldn't be so alien, as they say, to my experience."

*Visitors* offers viewers a chance to form opinions about whether there is life on other planets. Post has her own opinion.

"I definitely think there is life outside of our planet," Post believes. "I don't base my life on it, though. I think probably my faith in there being a God is stronger. I wouldn't deny that this could happen, and there is way too much evidence pointing to the fact that it does happen, and that it does exist."

"I would love for it to be true. Maybe my wanting it to be true makes me believe it."
