## Flood to quit HISD board

### Resignation will allow employment of relative by district

Hereford Independent School District trustee Joe Flood will resign from the board when it meets Monday night, Superintendent Charles W. Greenawalt said on Saturday.

Flood, who has served since May 1993, will step down to avoid a conflict with the state nepotism law. The meeting -- the regular information/discussion meeting of the month -- will be at 6 p.m. Monday in the administration building, 601 N. 25 Mile Avenue.

In addition to the resignation, three other action items have been placed on the agenda -- the 1994-95 audit report, the Panhandle South Plains Center and a waiver request for Hereford High School.

Greenawalt said Flood's niece on his side of the family will be hired by the district.

Because there is a direct blood relationship -- she is the daughter of Flood's brother -- state law prohibits both of them to be affiliated with the district.

As a result, Flood has to resign before his niece is formally employed, Greenawalt said.

"It's unfortunate, but that's what he's going to have to do," Greenawalt said.

Flood's current term expires in May 1996, which Greenawalt said means no replacement is required.

He said state law says that the school board can either appoint a replacement for Flood or call a special election to fill the space. If more than a year had remained on Flood's term, a replacement would have been required.

However, Greenawalt said, because it expires next year, the board can opt to maintain a six-member board until May, when the next regular board election is held.

Greenawalt said trustees will discuss the matter during Monday's meeting.

In addition to the four action items on Monday's agenda, trustees will consider one information item and two discussion items.

The information agenda contains a technology update. Discussion items -- which are not subject to board vote -- are a proposed computer training facility and a policy

regarding access to records.

The 20-item agenda for Monday's meeting also contains the following:

- Recognition of the HHS girls cross country team, the team tennis players and the girls volleyball team.
- Reports from the HHS student council, Hereford Educators Association, Classroom Teachers Association, assistant superintendents and Greenawalt.
- A personnel report, which may be held in closed session.

### Stocking Fund helps provide holiday cheer to those less fortunate

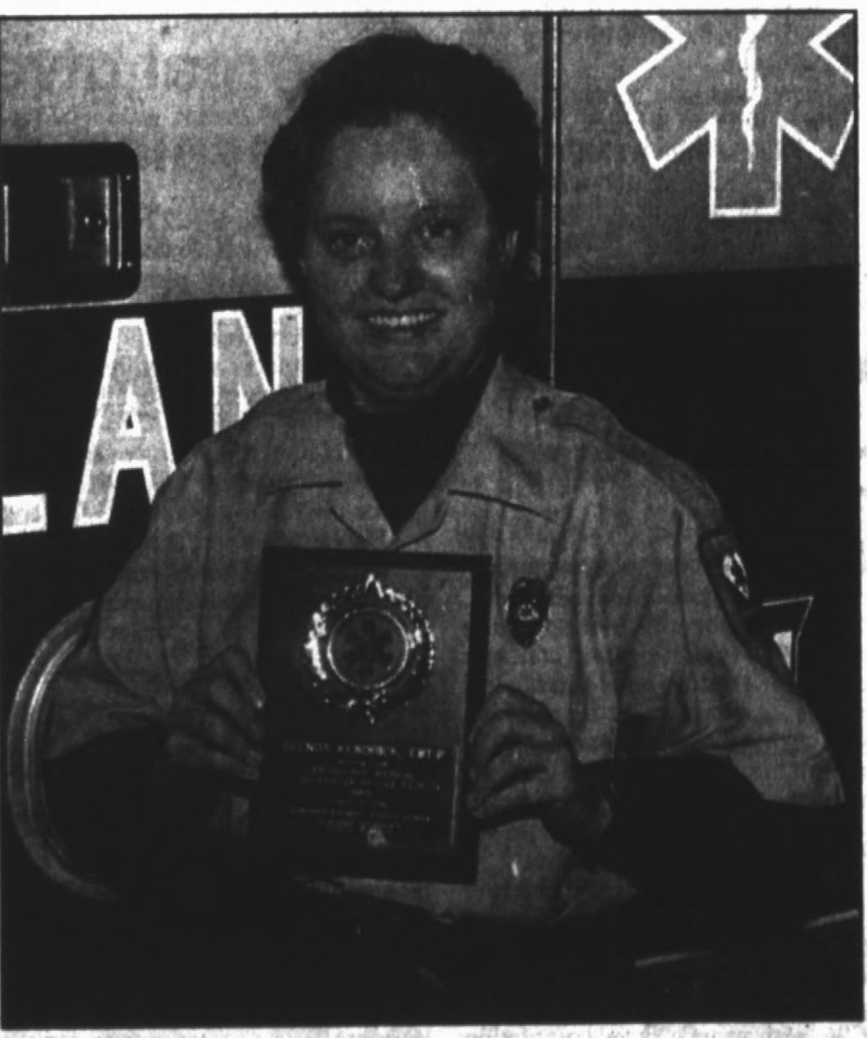

# SPS, Denver utility name holding firm

AMARILLO -- A holding company created by the pending merger of Southwestern Public Service Co. and Denver-based Public Service Co. of Colorado will be called New Century Energies, according to a joint announcement by the companies.

"We selected the name New Century Energies because we are building a new company to compete in an energy industry that will be markedly different as we enter the 21st century," said Del Hock, PSCo chairman and chief executive officer. "Changing regulation and increased competition are reshaping our business," added Bill D. Helton, SPS chairman and CEO. "We intend to be among the leading, growing companies in this new era."

New Century Energies will be headquartered in Denver. It will become the parent company of PSCo and SPS, which will retain their headquarters in Denver and Amarillo, respectively.

"PSCo and SPS will remain the

names our service-area customers know us by," said Wayne Brunetti, PSCo president and chief operating officer. "The utilities will continue to provide the low rates and quality service our customers expect. We believe that the approximately \$770 million in savings expected to result from the merger over the first 10 years will keep future rates lower than they would be otherwise."

The two companies filed merger documents with the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission and state commissions on Nov. 9. Shareholder votes are set for the first quarter of 1996, with an anticipated completion of the merger in fall 1996.

AT that time, Helton, 57, will become chairman and CEO of New Century Energies. Hock, 60, will retire and Brunetti, 53, will become vice chairman, president and chief operating officer of the new company.

All subsidiaries of the two companies will be under the New Century Energies umbrella.

# Taxpayers fund Disney World trip for 'non-essential' workers

WASHINGTON (AP) - They were deemed non-essential and sent packing during last month's government shutdown. But once back to work, more than 200 federal park rangers departed for Disney World, at taxpayer expense, to train to be better tour guides.

The rangers attended lectures on such topics as "The Power of Magic

in Shaping History," had dinner at Sea World marine amusement park and took field trips to Disney's Magic Kingdom and Epcot Center.

The government's final bill for the workshop two weeks ago is likely to fall between \$100,000 and \$250,000.

"It's a recognized training function, and they take a lot back to the parks. And we don't view that as a boondoggle," National Park Service spokeswoman Elaine Seyv

said. "It is a shame that it fell the week after the shutdown. But this was scheduled long before."

According to organizers, about 400 employees of the Park Service, Army Corps of Engineers, Forest Service, Fish and Wildlife Service and Bureau of Land Management attended the five-day National Association for Interpretation (NAI) workshop in Orlando, Fla. Nov. 26-30.

The Park Service, which faces large budget cuts, had the largest contingent, accounting for 351 of the 970 workshop participants, according to the NAI. The Park Service estimates 150 to 200 were paid by the government to attend, with an average cost of about \$1,000 each.

The Army Corps said it sent 12 staffers at a cost of about \$12,000 and the Forest Service said it sent 45 at a cost of \$43,877. The Interior Department estimated another 50 staffers went from BLM and Fish and Wildlife.

The main classroom was the four-star Buena Vista Palace hotel just outside Disney, where room rates normally run between \$130 and \$250 a night.

Participants, who got their rooms for \$99 a night, were offered three days' worth of six to eight hours of seminars and lectures on such subjects as "Goofy (and Educational) Nature Songs" and "Interpreting Resources Along Scenic Byways and Corridors."

In between, there was a Sunday night picnic at Disney's River Country water park, a dinner reception at Sea World and an entire day for field excursions, which ranged from NASA's Kennedy Space Center to wildlife refuges.

The most popular organizers say, were backstage tours of the Disney attractions, which drew about 150 of the conference participants, including Park Service spokeswoman Dana Dierkes.

"Uh-oh, I'm afraid I'm going to see this in the paper," said Dierkes when asked where she took her field trip.

# Golden Spread forms generator plant co-op

Golden Spread Electric Cooperative has announced the incorporation of GS Electric Generating Cooperative Inc., an affiliate cooperative which will operate as an exempt wholesale generator of electric power.

The cooperative is planning to build a 400 megawatt generating plant, then sell the output to Golden Spread beginning in 1998.

Deaf Smith Electric Cooperative in Hereford is a member system of Golden Spread.

Golden Spread owns property near Denver City and in Moore County south of Sunray, and has announced plans to use the Denver City site for the estimated \$165,223,000 project.

"The plan proposed by Golden Spread will provide the lowest cost power supply for the 94,000 retail member/consumers served by the Golden Spread member systems," said Robert W. Bryant, president of Golden Spread. "Golden Spread's studies show substantial savings for consumers compared to current rates paid for wholesale purchases from SPS."

The cooperative has applied to the Texas Public Utility Commission for

approvals needed to purchase power from the affiliate cooperative, and certification of the wholesale power contract between Golden Spread and GS Electric Generating Cooperative. Golden Spread in April received permission from the PUC to build the power plant, which will be powered by natural gas.

Currently, Golden Spread purchases more than 95 percent of its power requirements from Southwestern Public Service Co., and will continue to buy a block of power from SPS after completion of the new plant.

In addition to Deaf Smith Electric Cooperative, Golden Spread member systems are: Bailey County Electric Cooperative (Muleshoe), Greenbelt Electric Cooperative (Wellington), Lamb County Electric Cooperative (Littlefield), Lighthouse Electric Cooperative (Floydada), Midwest Electric Cooperative (Roby), North Plains Electric Cooperative (Perryton), Rita Blanca Electric Cooperative (Dalhart), South Plains Electric Cooperative (Lubbock), Swisher Electric Cooperative (Tulia) and Tri-County Electric Cooperative (Hooker, Okla.).

# Villarreal given prison term on cocaine delivery charge

A defendant in 222nd District Court Friday was sentenced to 25 years in prison after pleading guilty to a charge of delivery of a controlled substance, cocaine.

The original charge against Daniel Villarreal, 36, was a state jail felony, punishable by a term of two years probated five years, however three prior convictions elevated the offense to first degree felony.

During the court session, Judge David Wesley Gulley heard guilty pleas from Pascual Ramirez Lopez, 32, on two charges. He was sentenced

to 301 days in jail on a charge of attempted aggravated assault, reduced from aggravated assault. A charge of assault of a public servant was reduced from a felony to misdemeanor. His sentence was 53 days in jail.

On a motion to revoke probation, Judge Gulley issued an agreed order modifying terms of probation of Jose Javier Davila. He will be subject to intensive supervision for six months. His original sentence was 10 years' probation on a conviction for sexual assault.

# Texas Lottery

AUSTIN (AP) - Two Lotto Texas jackpots have been claimed, the Lottery Commission said Friday.

The Texas Lottery Commission presented a check for \$796,464 to Sue Haynes of Dallas on behalf of H.F. Partners.

It's the first of 20 annual installments from the \$15.8 million jackpot on Nov. 25, with winning numbers of 10, 24, 31, 42, 47 and 50.

A second check, for \$155,355, was given to Troy and Alleen Rudolph of Baytown on behalf of the Knox Trust.

It was the first installment on the \$3.1 million jackpot won Nov. 29, with winning numbers of 1, 2, 8, 16, 18 and 47.

Both winners requested minimum publicity, the Lottery Commission said.

# Clinton touts latest budget proposition

WASHINGTON (AP) - Pushing his latest balanced-budget plan as the right choice, President Clinton today promised to veto GOP-sponsored Medicaid cuts that he says would cost millions of children access to needed health care.

"That is unacceptable in a country that cares about its children," he said in his weekly radio address. "And I will not permit it to happen."

Clinton said the Republican budget, which proposes to cut \$163 billion from Medicaid over seven years, would repeal the federal guarantee of health care for 8 million people, including poor kids, people with disabilities, pregnant women, older Americans, veterans and people with AIDS.

On Wednesday, he vetoed Congress' seven-year plan for balancing the budget "through wrongheaded cuts and misplaced priorities" on grounds that it squeezed too much money from the Medicare and Medicaid programs for older Americans and the poor, respectively.

Clinton then offered a seven-year budget formula of his own, which he says balances the budget in the time frame the GOP insists on, but with less pain. His proposed Medicaid cuts amount to about a third of what Republicans are seeking.

"My seven-year balanced budget plan trims Medicaid and keeps costs down. It cuts federal spending, lets states be more efficient, targets the money more wisely," Clinton said, repeating his veto pledge. "But it doesn't end the guarantee of health care for millions of Americans who depend upon it now."

In a joint Republican response, Sen. Don Nickles of Oklahoma and Rep. John Boehner of Ohio said Clinton's plan relies on higher taxes and excessive spending and does not achieve true balance.

"Despite what he promised, it seems the president just can't deliver, can't live with slowing the growth of Washington spending enough to honestly balance the budget," Boehner said.

Nickles said the vetoed GOP plan would have eliminated income taxes for 3.5 million low-income families "but the president said no."

Congressional Republicans negotiating a budget agreement with Clinton bristled at his promise Friday to kill any plan that revokes the 30-year-old guarantee of Medicaid coverage for the poor and disabled.

Senate Majority Leader Bob Dole, R-Kan., said Clinton's insistence that the responsibility for the Medicaid program not be shifted to the states could hamper ongoing budget talks because the nation's 30 Republican governors strongly favor the change.

Republicans would achieve their Medicaid savings by giving states set amounts of money and the right to set benefit levels and determine eligibility. Low-income pregnant women, children aged 12 and under and people with disabilities would still have to be covered.

Clinton acknowledged the need to reduce the deficit, saying it was a burden on future generations. "But so is the neglect of our children. And we do not have to sacrifice our children to balance the budget," he said.

# Shepherds a dying breed around Bethlehem

"And there were in the same country shepherds abiding in the field, keeping watch over their flock by night." - Luke 2:8.

BETHLEHEM, West Bank (AP) - For thousands of years, shepherds have tended their flocks on the dun-colored slopes surrounding Bethlehem. King David herded sheep here in his youth, according to the Bible, and it was here that shepherds were said to have learned of the birth of Jesus.

But the number of those willing to ply their ancient vocation in this history-laden region is dwindling. Ibrahim Ali Tamaari, 55, has spent

his life following in the footsteps of his father and grandfather, leading his sheep through the rocky West Bank hills in search of scarce grass.

Tamaari is sorry to see shepherds disappearing from the fields around him; where once hundreds of shepherds worked, today there are scores. Tamaari's own son has found more lucrative work as a stonemason, and his father said he is glad.

"This job has no future," he shrugged in a recent interview, gesturing at the barren hillside.

"For two months in the spring it's beautiful," he added, surveying the rolling countryside, the pale steeples and minarets of Bethlehem visible in the distance. "It's green - you have nice views."

But the shepherd's life is a hard one, with little return for long days that start before dawn, Tamaari said. His face, framed by a traditional white keffiyah, is tanned and creased from years in the harsh Middle Eastern sun. Two gold teeth glitter when he laughs.

In a good year, he makes only about \$3,000 from his door-to-door sales of sheep's milk and cheese, and from the dozen or so lambs he sells to butchers in Bethlehem.

"If you're in good health, it's a good job," he said. "You feel free - your mind is serene. But if you think about money and how to make your family survive, your mind is no longer serene."

There are only about 50 cream-colored sheep with coffee-brown muzzles in Tamaari's herd - a quarter the number his father once had. Until kidney problems made it impossible, he supplemented his income with construction work in Israel.

"All these people used to have sheep - at least 100 each," he said, waving his hand at the homes dotting the hillsides. "Now it's hard to find someone with 20."

Tamaari's son Hamad helps support the family, which includes Ibrahim and his wife, their unmarried daughter, and Hamad's own wife and four small children.

Hamad "never touched the sheep," his father said. "He went to school and studied. He spends his money on his car."

Tamaari grows barley for his sheep on a tiny rock-filled strip, barely 450 square feet. When there is rain, he harvests enough to feed his flock. When there is drought, he must buy

grain from the market.

"It's expensive," he said pensively, adding that money weighs heavy on his mind. As if to prove his point - after unhesitatingly speaking to a reporter and letting his picture be taken in the field where he was plowing - Tamaari later refused to be photographed with his sheep unless he was paid \$100.

Two churches - one Greek Orthodox and one Roman Catholic - are located in the area known today as Shepherd's Field, near where Tamaari tends his flock just east of Bethlehem. The Greek Orthodox church, which dates back to the 5th century B.C., is built over a cave that early Christian pilgrims believed was where shepherds heard the news of

Jesus' birth in Bethlehem. The Roman Catholic church, just miles away, was built in the 1950s near the ruins of a Byzantine monastery.

The Anglican Church holds a carol service in Shepherd's Field each Christmas Eve before the main festivities in Bethlehem.

But Tamaari, like most of the shepherds in the region, is a Muslim. Asked why the area is named Shepherd's Field, he became apologetic, explaining that he had never gone to school or learned to read and write.

"It is a name since the time of Christ," he said, pausing to think. "It's important for the Christians. I don't know why it's called that. It was a long time ago."

## History of Christmas tree noted

AMARILLO, Texas - Oh, Christmas Tree. When you put one of the glorious evergreens, adorned with large red balls and tinsel, in your living room, you are honoring centuries of tradition.

The forerunner of today's Christmas tree was the Paradise Tree. In Medieval times, Dec. 24 was recognized as Adam and Eve Day. Churches would hold pageants acting out the story of Adam and Eve and the couple's subsequent fall from grace. The main stage prop was the Paradise Tree, decorated with large red apples to depict the forbidden fruit the first couple ate.

Medieval families began erecting their own Paradise trees at home and began adding communion wafers to symbolize the body of Christ. The wafers eventually were replaced with cookies, such as the gingerbread cookies used on Christmas trees today.

But long before the Paradise Tree, others were using trees to celebrate the anticipated end of winter. For Egyptians, placing green palm branches in their homes on the shortest day of the year symbolized life's triumph over death.

Romans decorated evergreens in their homes with toys and trinkets during Saturnalia, a winter festival in honor of their god of agriculture. Druid priests decorated oak trees with gilded apples for their winter solstice festivities, historians say.

As these various nations accepted the Christian religion, they continued their winter traditions, but changed their meanings to honor Christ. The evergreen trees today signify Christ bringing new life to the world after the long, dark days of winter.

Christmas trees topped with stars or angels depict the night of Christ's birth, where heavenly hosts and a star in the East guided shepherds and wise men to the manger.

Another popular type of decorating material is straw, such as tree ornaments, wreaths or sheaths made of the natural substance.

Straw decorations have evolved from a Finnish custom of spreading straw on the floor Christmas Day, symbolizing the stable and manger where Jesus lay. Before Christians adopted the custom, pagans in Slavic countries spread straw on their floors to ensure a good crop the next summer.

Another custom is to adorn a tree, mantle, doorway or table with an opulent array of fruits and flowers. This practice commemorates the

Christmas legend that says that on the night of Christ's birth, all the trees and plants of the Earth bloomed and bore fruit.

What tree is complete without silvery tinsel? The tinsel custom could have originated from the legend of the poor widow who worked hard to support her many children. The woman worked all day on Christmas Eve to get food for her small ones, but had no gifts to give them. Although she was tired after a day of hard labor, the woman decided her children would at least have a Christmas tree to enjoy while she recited the Christmas story and reminded them of the true meaning of Christmas.

She went to the woods nearby and felled a small fir tree. She gathered nuts, fruits, berries, scraps of paper and whatever else she could find to adorn the tree. Exhausted, she fell asleep. While she was sleeping, spiders worked on the tree, covering it entirely with their beautiful webs. As a reward for the woman's good will, God looked down on her tree and turned the webs into silver.

Lights on trees may be a combination of Roman and Hebrew customs. Romans placed candles on trees to celebrate the sun's return to the earth. Jewish people celebrate an annual Feast of Lights commemorating their victory for religious freedom. Christians now refer to Christ as the Light of the World and adorn their Christmas trees and homes with electric lights or candles.

Another popular custom is to place luminaria along a path leading to a doorway, especially on nights when there's a party inside.

Luminarias are customarily paper bags weighted down with sand and lighted with a small, votive candle inside. The custom has deep religious roots, and apparently originated in the U.S. Southwest, where natives learned of Christianity from the conquering Spaniards.

The people would set bundles of branches ablaze along roads and pathways in case Mary, Joseph and the baby Jesus should once again be wandering about on a cold winter night seeking shelter. The luminaria would guide them to a welcoming home.

Holly, with its green leaves and small red berries, has been used for centuries as a winter decoration. At Christian festivals, a circle of holly symbolizes Christ's crown of thorns. Because the plant bears fruit in winter, it also symbolizes the immortality he offers his followers.

No one knows who had the first Christmas tree in the United States,

but some believe German settlers brought the custom with them to the New World, others say the first was set up here by Hessians, Germans who were hired by the British to fight against Americans during the Revolutionary War.

## Celebrating Christmas in song

For as long as I can remember, I have enjoyed singing.

I enrolled in the Carol Choir when we joined a Presbyterian Church in Albuquerque when I was in second grade.

From then on through high school graduation, I was in a choir.

From Carol Choir it was on to Crusader Choir (boys, grades 4-6), then junior high choir.

At that point, our directors created a high school choir, which ultimately fed into the Chancel Choir for adults. At the same time in school, I began playing trumpet in fourth grade (at first I got a clarinet, but had to practice that on the front porch until a comet became available).

I still take out my trumpet sometimes and toot away, but I stopped formal playing after high school band.

Anyway, it was this extensive choral and musical background that has given me a deep love for music in general.

And while I have several types of music that are among my favorites (hymns, children's Christian songs and old-fashioned country gospel), I must say that Christmas music ranks right at the top among favorite types of music.

I look forward every year to hearing the classic hymns of Christmas on the radio and singing

them in church.

Our family has collected numerous Christmas tapes that we get out each year and, with us now having a car with a tape player, I can now listen to my heart's content as I travel around town.

I have no single favorite Christmas song -- instead, I just enjoy singing them all.

In anticipation of Christmas, I pulled out my trusty hymn book and looked up some familiar songs to find out a little about them.

Here's what I found, by song. "O Come, All Ye Faithful" -- This song was written in 1744 by John Wade, an English layman. It first appeared in his collection "Cantus Diversi" in 1751.

One hundred years later, Frederick Oakeley, an Anglican minister, translated it into its present form.

Since then, "O Come, All Ye Faithful" has been translated into

more than 100 languages.

"Joy To The World!" -- What better message can a song have than to proclaim "Joy to the world, the Lord is come!"

My book uses Luke 2:10 as the verse with this song: "And the angel said unto them, Fear not: for, behold, I bring you good tidings of great joy, which shall be to all people."

"Joy to the World" first appeared in 1719.

"What Child is This?" -- It took a serious illness to Scottish insurance salesman William Dix to bring him to God.

Following his conversion, Dix penned several hymns, including this one, written about 1865 and set to "Green Sleeves," a traditional English folk tune.

I can well imagine the shepherds, Mary and Joseph as they wondered at the newborn Babe, "What Child is This?"

"Away In A Manger" -- I dare say nearly everyone who has attended church for any length of time recalls seeing a group of pre-schoolers standing on the platform, wiggling,

waving, swaying and playing with dresses, singing "Away in a Manger."

Maybe children love this song so much more than others because it is so simple.

Or maybe it is because they can see the Baby lying in the manger much clearer than can those of use jaded by the years.

"Silent Night! Holy Night!" -- Probably one of the best-known Christmas songs in the world, this had a humble beginning.

Joseph Mohr, assistant priest in the Church of St. Nicholas in the Tyrol region of the Alps, learned that the church organ was broken.

He wrote the words to this hymn, then took it to organist Franz Gruber, who penned the music and guitar accompaniment.

The organ repairman, impressed by the simple song, carried it with him to the entire Tyrol region.

Today it is sung in all major languages of the world -- and all because the organ broke.

Once more, I run out of space before I run out of hymns, and so must leave off the stories of many others that make this season memorable -- including "O Little Town of Bethlehem," "It Came Upon A Midnight Clear," "Angels From the Realms of Glory," "White Shepherds Watched Their Flocks," "I Heard the Bells on Christmas Day," "We Three Kings of Orient Are" and many, many more.

I hope you enjoy the songs of Christmas as much as I do and sing them with the joy of the true meaning of the season.

**Pecos Enterprise on Texas sesquicentennial:**  
A special date in Texas history is fast approaching and no one seems to know or care.

That date is Dec. 29 which marks the 150th anniversary - the Sesquicentennial - of Texas becoming a state and being admitted to the union of the United States.

It was the 28th state admitted to the union. On July 4, 1845, Congress voted to admit Texas as a slave state after considerable debate and controversy. The admission became effective Dec. 29.

Calls from this newspaper to various elected officials, including the governor's office, met with nonawareness of the anniversary. Gov. George Bush could not be contacted directly to see if the state plans any official celebrations.

As far as we know, nothing is planned, apparently out of a lack of knowledge that this special date is coming up. We weren't aware of it ourselves until a reader brought it to our attention.

In 1986, a massive statewide celebration was held to commemorate the Sesquicentennial of the state's independence from Mexico. Texas was a republic from 1836 until it became a state in 1845, with the first members of the U.S. Congress taking office in February 1846.

It seems that Texans need to be aware of this anniversary with some type of celebration planned. However, time is running short.

**San Antonio Express-News on health education:**  
State Education Commissioner Mike Moses should have done his homework before deciding against applying for a federal grant that would supplement health programs in public schools.

Moses told the Associated Press that grants such as the one proposed by state Health Commissioner David Smith - this one worth \$500,000 - often impose teaching methods on health programs such as sex education on local school districts. ...

The concerns are understandable. But all Moses or his staff had to do was ask the (Centers for Disease Control) for more information about the grant before deciding not to apply.

The Austin-American Statesman did. The newspaper's findings: the grant allows schools to provide reproductive health services, but doesn't require it. ...

Explaining why the state did not apply for the CDC grant, state education officials say instructional programs and learning are a higher priority than health programs.

We agree with placing a high priority on instructional programs, but do not think the two concerns are mutually exclusive. ...

While some students learn about health issues at home, many do not. Information on many health issues is too important to be left to chance. If the schools don't provide it, who will?

## Rep. Combest comments Prioritize choices about the budget

There is a Christmas story by O. Henry you may recall, "The Gift of the Magi," about a young couple planning to give each other a wonderful gift.

However, without knowing the other's plans, the young man sold his gold watch to earn enough money to buy combs for his young lady's beautiful long hair. At the same time, the young woman had cut and sold her long hair to buy a chain for her young man's watch. Each wanted to do something good, but without knowing of the other's plans, their gifts ended up not being practical.

Legislators also must weigh practical decisions when trying to do good for the country. The gift of a balanced budget to America's current and future generations would lower interest rates by as much as two percent.

However, the key is in prioritizing for truly needed federal spending. For instance, Medicare will increase 6.4 percent every year over the next 7 years, saving it from going broke while asking seniors to pay only \$4 more per month than the president proposed last year.

Education, job training and student loan programs increase by \$25.7 billion; while veterans programs still increase in budget by \$40.6 billion. Instead of leaving the government running on autopilot and piling up debt, we are controlling spending in a glidpath toward a balanced budget.

Opponents of balancing the budget see any spending cuts as an opportunity to score debating points by sidetracking these negotiations with wild claims about devastating cuts. The truth is that there is little more than a penny's difference on the dollar-to-dollar comparison in what we want to spend to protect Medicare and what the president proposes.

Congress has insisted on the importance of having the president use the same set of figures in our budget talks. After agreeing to our use of real numbers in the negotiations to balance the budget in seven years, the president has now chosen to shift to another reason for opposing our balanced budget plan.

The president has issued a 22-page outline attacking the Republican budget as extreme, without submitting his own detailed proposal. By contrast, Congress sent the president the Balanced Budget Act that takes control of federal spending. The independent auditing of the Congressional budget Office(CBO) has certified that Congress' plan will balance the budget in seven years, but that the president's plan would continue deficits of \$200 billion over each of the next seven years.

On Dec. 15, the four weeks of negotiating time will run out, threatening another partial government shutdown. Congress and the president still have time to deliver a Christmas miracle of an agreement on a balanced budget for the next generation. Both have to be practical about it.

The snow was so deep we could walk up the drifts to the roof of the house so it was next to impossible to get to a friend's house.

At the time, my father was a construction superintendent at a war plant located about 15 miles from our hometown. When the first snow fell, no one was concerned about getting the men home. The feeling was that it would abate shortly.

Well, the fact of the matter is, the snow fell intermittently, in varying amounts, for several days. My father eventually rode a freight train home (along with other workers), changed clothes and got on another train to return to the job. Frankly, I never understood why.

Finally, the sun came out and

school re-opened. Nearly everyone could get there although some didn't want to.

You see, before the storm started, my class was assigned to write a paper, on what topic I don't remember. The theme was a disciplinary tool of the teacher. The whole class had acted up and he decided to teach us a lesson. First, it was a five-page assignment. When things went to pot again, he added five pages.

A fellow sixth grader who lived about 20 miles out in the country couldn't get to school when the doors opened again. The rest of us turned in our papers at the appointed time and went about our business.

Then, the snow started again, school was closed (in the middle of the day, as I recall) until after the Christmas-New Year's holiday, and we had more than two weeks on our hands.

At long last, the snow ended, roads cleared and buses could make the trips to bring country students to town.

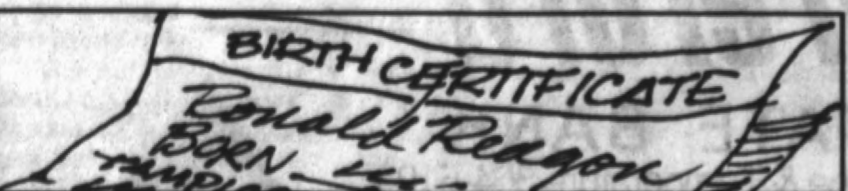
My friend, though, hadn't finished her paper and drew the ire of the teacher. He felt it was not unreasonable of him to expect her to turn it in. Everyone else had. She sassed him and got another five-page addition.

With snow still hip-deep, teachers were looking for alternatives to the beat-walking that was the No. 1 punishment. Students thought they had the upper hand.

That was a bad year. Teachers and students were fighting for the upper hand. The weather was creating havoc. Cattle were starving for food. Trucks couldn't get over roads to deliver hay or other feed. Rationing of some consumer goods was just around the corner. The "war effort" was on the minds of everyone.

Through the years, there have been plenty of blizzards. Some worse than others. But that winter cured me of any desire for snow.

While it's a pretty song, "I'm Dreaming of a White Christmas" is not at the top of my hit parade.

# 'Reinsteer' fills traditional role for Santa in Goliad

FANNIN, Texas - Now, Dasher! Now, Dancer! Now, Prancer and Vixen! On, Comet! On, Cupid! On, Donner and Diamond!

Diamond? Diamond isn't one of Santa's reindeer. He's a longhorn steer. In Goliad County, the 15-year-old bovine is the next best thing to a reindeer.

He's a reinsteer. For the past 12 years Diamond has helped ring in the Christmas spirit by pulling Santa Claus through Goliad's downtown square in a bright-red sleigh.

"It's so thrilling to see him enter the square and watch the kids," said Linda Marks. "It gives you chills seeing the kids run up to the sleigh. It really feels like Christmas."

Marks and her husband Travis own the gentle steer. Travis is usually the one steering the sleigh around the square. He said Diamond knows to walk around the square twice before heading back to his trailer to go home.

"It's a chance to enrich our lives to give something to Goliad and it's different. Only in Goliad will you see something like this," Travis Marks said.

Linda and her son Jonathan ride behind the steer-pulled sleigh in a golf cart.

How did the reinsteer come about? When the Christmas in Goliad celebration began 12 years ago, the Marks wanted to participate in the event. So Travis, a lifetime rancher who tamed his first longhorn to be ridden 65 years ago, thought if the large steers could be broken and could pull heavy loads in the fields, why couldn't they pull a sleigh with Santa Claus?

"I had the sleigh, but since there was no snow in Goliad, I decided to put wheels on it so it could go

through the streets," he said. He'd purchased the sleigh in Iowa years before to add to his ranch museum.

Diamond is one of his gentler longhorns. Two other Marks' longhorns are ridden annually in the grand entry of the Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo.

After his first appearance as a reinsteer, Diamond's job was keeping the crowds looking forward to seeing him each year.

The Marks are "very civic-minded people and it's so easy to ask them to do something for the community. They're Goliad's best ambassadors," said Myra Heard, Goliad Historical Commission co-chairman and the publicity chairman for Christmas in Goliad.

Travis began taming steers when he was 16. He broke his first longhorn for a man to ride from the ranch to New York City. That trip took 257 days, but it was a success.

About 25 years ago as a joke, Travis introduced an official of the Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo to the joys of riding longhorns. Ever since then, the steers have been a popular part of the grand entries of

each rodeo performance.

"People always want to ride the steers, but I get concerned because many do not even know how to ride a horse," Linda said. Usually the honors are reserved for show dignitaries, politicians or special guests.

In 1976, Travis helped to make a little more history in Goliad. He provided a herd of longhorn cattle to parade through town as part of the city's U.S. bicentennial celebration. The cattle spooked and literally stampeded through downtown.

"It went down as the fastest parade and the last stampede in an incorporated city," he said.

The Marks have about 60 longhorns. They plan to keep the reinsteer tradition going as long as they can.

# Grateful Dead disband four months after death of founder Jerry Garcia

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) - The Grateful Dead - R.I.P.

After 30 years of making music, the Grateful Dead, once the house band of the 1960s counterculture, is breaking up.

The move came four months after the death of its founder and guiding spirit, Jerry Garcia.

"After four months of heartfelt consideration, the remaining members of the band met yesterday and came to the conclusion that the 'long strange trip' of the uniquely wonderful beast known as the Grateful Dead is over," the group said in a statement Friday.

The Grateful Dead, which Garcia and other members formed in 1965 in San Francisco, was one of rock 'n' roll's top-drawing acts for three decades.

The band combined rock, bluegrass and folk influences in its songs, which included "Truckin'," "Casey Jones," "Sugar Magnolia" and "Friend of the Devil." Its only top 10 hit was 1987's "Touch of Grey."

The group rarely recorded in recent years, and the last Grateful Dead studio album, "Built to Last," was released in 1989.

Other groups had more hits, but the Dead attracted a doggedly devoted cult following that brought

together Haight-Ashbury dropouts, weekend hippies and establishment stalwarts. Sen. Patrick Leahy, D-Vt., and Massachusetts Gov. William Weld were among those who identified themselves as fans.

"In losing Jerry Garcia a great band clearly had its heart broken," Weld said. "I wish Bob Weir and the other members of the band success and happiness in the future and thank them for all the pleasure they've given this fan."

Legions of Deadheads followed the group around the country and overseas to attend the long, free-form concerts that became the Grateful Dead's trademark.

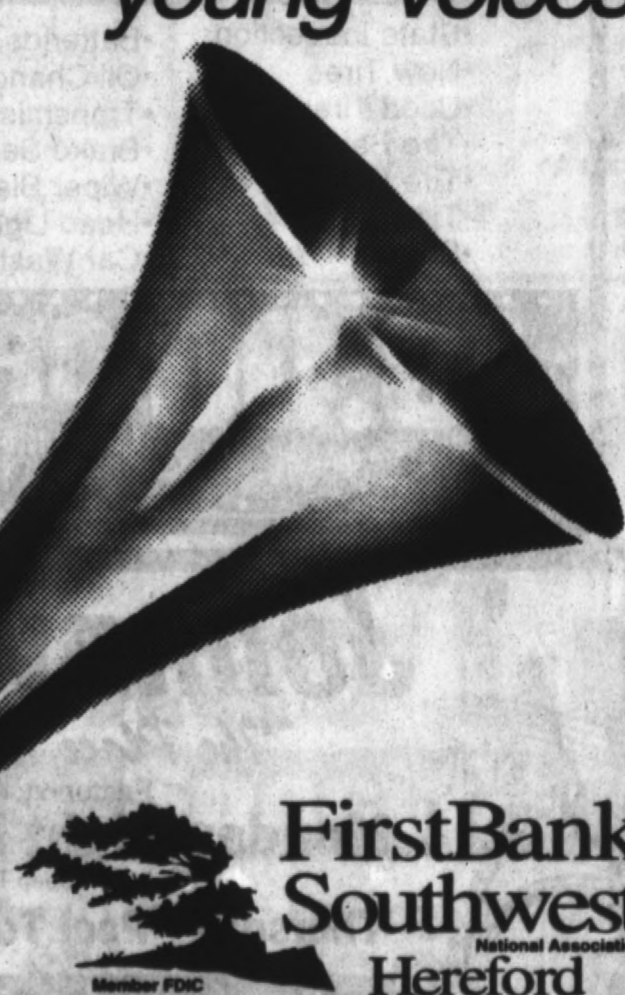

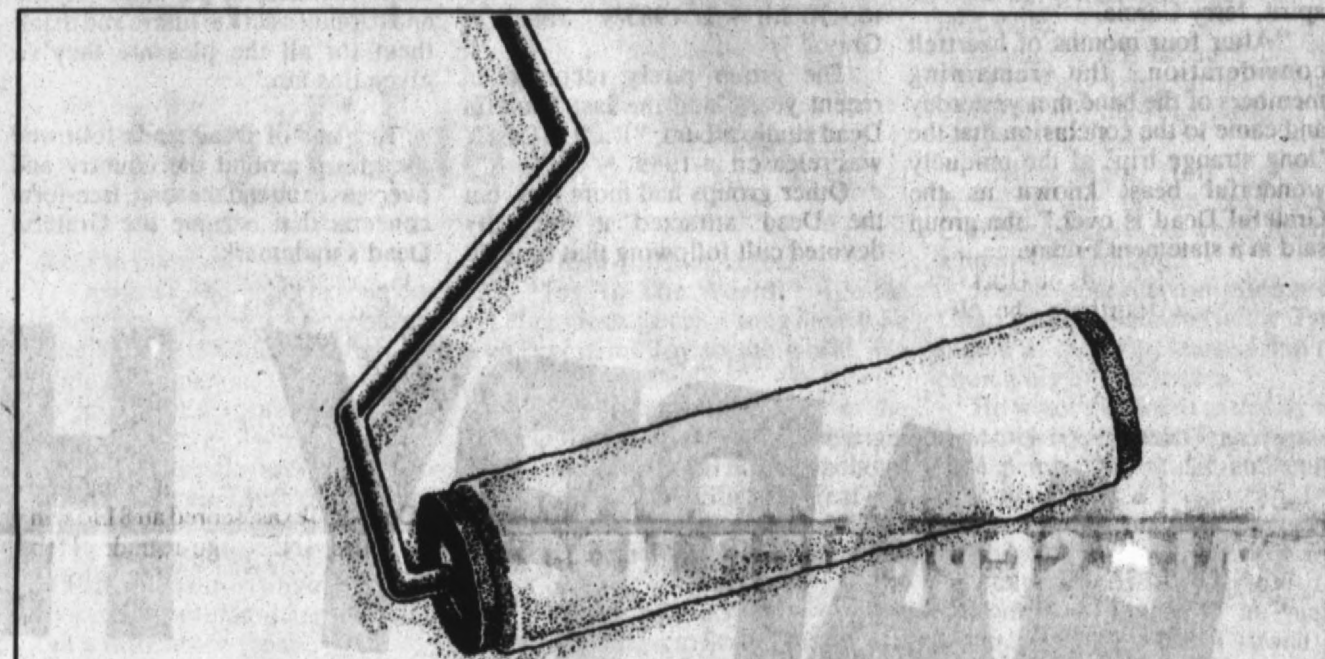

# Resurgent 'Horns dominate last All-Southwest Conference team

A year ago John Mackovic was under fire at the University of Texas. Now, he's The Associated Press Southwest Conference Coach of the Year.

The Longhorns rolled unbeaten through SWC play, posted a 10-1-1 record, and got a date to play Virginia Tech in the Sugar Bowl.

Texas dominated the mythical All-SWC team as selected by the league's coaches. Like everything else involving the SWC this year, it's the last one.

James Brown, the gutsy Texas sophomore quarterback who competed the final regular season game against Texas A&M despite a badly sprained ankle, earned Offensive Player of the Year laurels.

Brown put up 2,583 yards in total offense and with him in the lineup the Longhorns always had a chance to win. Texas is 13-1-1 when Brown starts.

Defensive Player of the Year went to Texas Tech's Zach Thomas, the gritty senior linebacker who returned an interception 23 yards for a touchdown with 30 seconds left to give the Red Raiders a 14-7 win over Texas A&M. Thomas had 130 tackles for the season.

Texas running backs Shon Mitchell and Ricky Williams shared the Offensive Newcomer of the Year honor while Texas A&M linebacker Dat Nguyen was the Defensive Newcomer of the Year.

Besides Brown, Texas had three other representatives on the first team offense and placed two more on the first team defense.

Wide receiver Mike Adams, offensive lineman Dan Neil and tight end Pat Fitzgerald were the other Longhorns on first team offense.

On defense, end Tony Brackens, who bounced back from missing four games with injury, and back Chris

Carter made the first team for the burnt orange.

Other players on the first team offense included running backs Leeland McElroy of Texas A&M and Jerod Douglas of Baylor, who tied in the voting, Texas A&M wide receiver Albert Connell, offensive linemen Jimmy Herndon of Houston, Fred Miller of Baylor, Ryan Tucker of TCU, and Hunter Goodwin of Texas A&M.

Michael Reeder, the All-American from TCU who made 23 of 25 field goal attempts, was the placekicker on the dream team.

In the defensive line, Brackens was joined by Texas A&M's Brandon Mitchell, Baylor's Daryl Gardner and TCU's Chris Piland.

At linebacker, Thomas was joined by Reggie Brown of Texas A&M and LaCurtis Jones of Baylor.

In the secondary, Carter was joined by Ray Mickens of Texas A&M, Marcus Coleman of Texas Tech, and Adrian Robinson of Baylor.

The punter is Tucker Phillips of Rice, who averaged 44 yards per boot.

Dennis Rodman showed the San Antonio Spurs what they were missing.

The Spurs castoff had 21 rebounds Friday night, helping the Chicago Bulls rebound San Antonio 46-33 in a 106-87 victory.

"As much as they don't want to face it," Michael Jordan said, "they didn't have a major rebounder in there and we did."

The New Jersey Nets pounded Indiana on the boards 52-27 and stayed undefeated at home by beating the Pacers 91-89.

"It simply came down to them winning it on the boards," Indiana coach Larry Brown said.

In other NBA games, it was Cleveland 113, Philadelphia 85; Orlando 105, Charlotte 95; Minnesota 112, the Los Angeles Clippers 94; Houston 113, Washington 107; Denver 103, Phoenix 98; the Los Angeles Lakers 120, Toronto 103; Seattle 120, Sacramento 103; and Detroit 121, Golden State 114 in overtime.

Rodman, traded in the offseason to the Bulls for center Will Perdue after wearing out his welcome in San Antonio, also helped hold David Robinson to two second-half baskets. Robinson finished with 30 points and Sean Elliott added 20, but San Antonio's five-game winning streak was snapped.

"Your pride wants to say he didn't do anything, but he was outstanding," the Spurs' Avery Johnson said. "And we've been having rebounding problems."

CINCINNATI (AP) - No. 17 Cincinnati is tired heading into its first big game of the season. On the plus side, the Bearcats have Darnell Burton back.

The Bearcats (3-0) had a lot going against them when they traveled to Arkansas Saturday for a nationally televised game. It's their third game in three days, and the first time they've been tested.

Cincinnati swept through its annual tournament, beating Wagner 100-64 Friday night in the championship game. The Delta Air Lines Classic wasn't much of a tournament: The other three teams have losing records and three of the four games were blowouts.

The only advantage to Cincinnati was the chance to rest its starters for Saturday's game.

In other college games Friday night involving Top 25 teams, it was No. 6 Georgetown 113, Sacramento St. 58; No. 9 Connecticut 93, Yale 66; and No. 21 Illinois 89, Southeast Missouri 70.

Burton, Cincinnati's only reliable 3-point shooter, supposedly was suspended for the season for violating a team rule. He was reinstated Friday and scored 14 points, hitting his first three 3-pointers.

Burton, coach Bob Huggins and the university have declined to talk about why Burton was suspended or why he was reinstated.

Burton played just 16 minutes and hit five of nine shots overall. Fortson had eight points as Cincinnati opened the game Friday with a 20-2 run. Burton came off the bench and hit three 3-pointers as Cincinnati pushed the lead to 31-11.

Tony Rice had 16 points to lead Wagner, which shot 33 percent. No. 6 Georgetown 113, Sacramento State 58.

At Landover, Md., Victor Page had 20 points and Allen Iverson 15 as the Hoyas (7-1) ran up their largest victory margin since a 112-39 defeat of District of Columbia in the 1989-90 season.

Georgetown made 24 steals, forced 37 turnovers and rested Iverson for

At Champaign, Ill., Richard Keene scored 18 points as the Illini (5-0) overwhelmed Southeast Missouri (2-3) despite shooting only 43 percent.

Illinois led by as many as 28 points in the second half. Keene, who scored 11 points in the first half, capped a 16-2 run with a layup with 7:41 to go, giving the Illini a 69-43 lead. The Illini led 36-25 at the half despite shooting only 32 percent.

Southeast Missouri led 20-12 with 8:44 to go when Keene sparked a 17-0 run with an alley-oop pass to Chris Gandy for a dunk, then added a layup and a 3-pointer.

# Christmas tree sales booming in East Texas

TYLER, Texas - East Texas area Christmas tree farm owners are dusting off branches and swinging their gates wide open in anticipation of a busy holiday season that could generate sales of more than \$7.2 million.

Christmas trees, the symbol of the season, have a relatively brief history in Texas, beginning in 1972 with two small demonstration farms - one in Smith County and the other in Orange County, between the cities of Orange and Beaumont, the Texas Agricultural Extension Service says.

The demonstration farms in Smith and Orange counties were started under TAES guidance as a means of proving that Christmas tree production could be a profitable venture in Texas and - of even greater importance - produce income for non-productive farm acreage.

Since the early 1970s, membership in the Texas Christmas Tree Growers Association ballooned to about 600

products in the mid-1980s, then stabilized at about 300 members where it stands today.

Currently, there are between 3,000 and 4,000 acres in Texas producing Christmas trees, including eight farms in Smith County, the largest number in the area.

Elsewhere around East Texas, the landscape is dotted with four Christmas tree farms in Wood County, three in Cherokee, Henderson and Upshur counties, and two in Van Zandt County.

There is also one farm each for Camp, Nacogdoches and Rusk counties.

A Smith County producer, Darrell Watson, owner of Watson Christmas Tree Farm, off County Road 2298 in the Chapel Hill community, currently serves as president of the statewide TCTGA, and the surrounding East Texas area probably has the heaviest concentration of Christmas tree farms in Texas, followed by the southeast and central regions.

"We're coming out of a glut of northern trees, but we see a good year ahead," Watson said. "You have to be competitive in service as well as price in this business."

Prices have fluctuated wildly over the years, based, of course, on supply and demand, but diminishing domestic Christmas tree production has stabilized prices for this season, which are currently at \$3.50 per foot for trees up to seven feet high in height, Watson said.

In recent years, area growers have grappled with both oversupply, which has put immense pressure on pricing, and the ever-increasing popularity of artificial trees, he said.

"A lot of people jumped into the Christmas tree business back in the early-to-mid-1980s because it had the appearance of easy money," Watson said. "People have since found that this is a very labor intensive business."

Watson said wholesale producers who sell on volume have also kept prices low, and the remaining long-term growers are shifting more of their emphasis to on-site sales.

To attract customers, Watson and his wife, Glenda, offer wagon rides, apple cider, coloring books for children and handmade wreaths to enhance the Christmas tree experience for families.

"To be successful, you have to sink a lot of money into equipment, chemicals, supplies and labor," he said. "We're getting back to a core group of growers and that will help keep prices where they need to be."

Latrell Heppner, owner of Heppner's Tree Farm off County Road 2216 in the Lake Tyler area, said the lure of choosing and cutting the tree brings more browsers to the farm every year, and she expects this year to be an improvement over last season.

"For the last couple of years, there has been a steady increase in demand here," Mrs. Heppner said. "We get a mixture of both young and old couples."

Margie Seagler, who owns and operates Seagler Tree Farm off FM 850 near Tyler with her husband, Gaylen, said Christmas tree growers can rarely predict which side of their business - on-site retail or wholesale - will perform best in a given year.

"Some years you have more retail and other years it's the other way around," said Mrs. Seagler, whose family farm production, like other East Texas-area Christmas tree farms, is almost exclusively planted in Virginia pines, the preferred variety for consumers.

Mrs. Seagler acknowledged that her family's interest in Christmas trees was prompted by an ongoing need to generate income for about 30 acres on the family farm.

"We wanted to find a way to make the land pay for itself," she said. "Business varies from year to year. Some years it is very good, and other years it seems like more people go with artificial trees."

Larry Dreesen, a Conroe-based TAES Christmas tree specialist, said TCTGA membership has stabilized at 300 because people have found that producing an annual crop requires more work - and money - than they were willing to invest.

Dreesen said he expected TCTGA membership to remain in the 300-member range for some time to come.

"No crop is easy, and a lot of people have found that out," Dreesen said. "Christmas trees are a good way to get small acreage into production, and a good source of supplemental income."

Location is a critical component of a successful Christmas tree farm, Dreesen said, noting that farms should be close to large affluent metropolitan areas in order to bring families into rural areas for the Christmas tree experience.

Like Tyler's Watson, numerous Christmas tree farm operators in Smith County and elsewhere statewide are putting greater emphasis on services and novelty items, developing a complete Christmas package by offering hayrides, petting zoos, wreaths, gifts, ornaments, picnic areas, apple cider and related holiday specialties.

"These types of products and services make for a real family outing, and they have been very successful," Dreesen said.

In Texas, most Christmas tree farms began as sources of supplemental income for retirees, or a second income ventures, on small-acreage farms, he said.

Texas growers surveyed early this year projected sales of 361,000 trees for 1995, but the figures are expected to decline drastically over the next few years due to the number of growers who are ceasing production.

The sales projection is for 278,000 in 1996, followed by 260,000 in 1997, 240,000 for 1998 and 247,000 for 1999, according to a TAES survey of Texas growers.

Since the growers projecting those figures will be in the business until 1999 and beyond, the late 1990s sales projections are credible, Dreesen said, but they do not take into account the 25-45 new growers who will begin growing trees each year.

The average Christmas tree farm takes four-five years to reach maturity for commercial purposes, TAES said.

Survey results from the last three years show that retail prices average around \$25 for a standard six-foot tree. Typical Texas growers plant between 700 and 1,000 trees per acre.

Not all trees planted survive the four years needed to reach sale size, Dreesen said. Probably only half live, depending on the weather, and some trees are not marketable.

Greater care and sound production investment can significantly increase the number of marketable trees per acre, he said.

Watson, the Tyler-based TCTGA president, said he is adding a 25,000-square-foot "sales barn" featuring a gift shop at his farm in the Chapel Hill area.

The addition of services and novelty shops are apparent on Christmas tree farms nationwide, he said.

"It's that way everywhere you go," Watson said. "To be competitive, you have to get more into other growth areas."

"We're trying to get people to come back year after year," he said.

## Tree farm owners call it 'Six Flags in the rough'

ALVORD, Texas - Richard and Karen Boyer are selling more than Christmas trees on their rolling, wooded farm northwest of Decatur.

They are selling a bit of old-fashioned Christmas, they say. That is how they see their latest business venture, which they say is a sort of Six Flags Over Texas in the rough, an entertainment experience connected to the annual Christmas tree quest.

Their customers can wander through 12,000 neatly trimmed Virginia pines, pick one special tree for their living room, and cut it themselves.

Children can see how the process of choosing a Christmas tree used to be - before truckloads of pre-cut trees displayed on asphalt city lots became the norm. "These are fresh trees, not Canadian trees that were cut three or four months ago and shipped thousands of miles," Richard Boyer said.

There is no asphalt on the Boyers' secluded 125 acres. Just lots of trees - Christmas and otherwise - along with miles of gravel roads, well-tended forest trails, picturesque ponds, pettable animals (including miniature donkeys) and even a concession stand with hot chocolate.

There is a bobcat den along the 1-1/2-mile nature trail, and pet deer roam the grounds. It is a no-hunting wildlife sanctuary sandwiched between boundaries of the Lyndon B. Johnson National Grasslands, where hunting is allowed in limited areas.

And for tree shoppers, "It's the true Charlie Brown Christmas," said Richard Boyer, 50, a Southlake insurance broker. "We set this up to be a real, old-time family experience, a place to get away from the city and find nature."

The Boyers bought the farm in 1983 "to have a place where we could go throw rocks," Richard Boyer said.

But after a while, he said, the couple decided they wanted to find a way to share the beauty and serenity of their land with others. They opened it to church and civic groups for weekend retreats, hayrides and picnics.

"Then I hit on this Christmas tree thing, thinking it might be a good hobby," Boyer said. "And instead of a hobby, it became our next entrepreneurial project."

With careful planning, the Boyers built the roads, trails, ponds and an extensive irrigation system. Six years ago, they planted the first pine seedlings.

Finally, last Christmas season, they opened Special Times Farm & Stable to yule tree buyers.

The farm is open from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. Saturdays only, until Christmas. The Boyers have been busy as

beavers, spraying the pines with a special green dye mixed with a pest-control agent so the trees don't introduce bugs into people's living rooms.

"It's a lot of fun, but it's a lot of work, too," Karen Boyer, 45, said as she took a break from her spraying chores. "But all the hard work is worth it when we see the people here having so much fun with their families."

Prices begin at \$25 for a 6-foot tree, and add \$5 for each foot over that, Richard Boyer said. The average price is \$35 to \$40, he said. Trees are available up to 15 feet tall.

# Last year's troubles forged 'Horns into champs

AUSTIN (AP) - Last year was supposed to be a stampede by the Texas Longhorns.

With Texas A&M on probation, the Longhorns were expected to win the Southwest Conference in a runaway.

But they did anything but, falling

victim to injuries, player suspensions, upsets and a coach's concussion before finishing in a five-way co-championship with a 4-3 league record.

This year, everyone was not only predicting Texas A&M would win the final SWC title, but the national championship as well.

So what did ninth-ranked Texas

do? Took the conference by storm, going unbeaten in the SWC and earning a berth in the Sugar Bowl against No. 13 Virginia Tech (9-2).

Texas (10-1-1) coach John Mackovic says last season's turbulence "forged our team like it's never been forged."

"I have used the analogy of when you build something with steel like a sword, a beautiful sharp sabre. It has to go through the hottest fire possible to temper the steel," Mackovic said.

"That's what makes it strong and allows you to finish it into something beautiful and ready for combat. I believe that is true in team building."

The fires of last year started before the season even began with the arrest of receiver Mike Adams, who was later acquitted of assault charges, and the suspensions of Adams and former receiver Lovell Pinkney on two separate occasions for off-field infractions.

During the season, there was a quarterback controversy, numerous injuries and the suspension of seven players, including Adams and Pinkney, for staying out too late just before Texas suffered a humiliating loss to Rice. The Owls hadn't beaten Texas since 1957.

After the Longhorns were routed by Texas Tech (33-9) and A&M (34-10), the groundswell built to have Mackovic fired.

But the 51-year-old coach, who complained of month-long side effects from a sideline collision suffered during the fourth game of the season, spoke one-on-one with his players to regain their confidence and rallied his troops.

Texas won its last three games, including the Sun Bowl in a dramatic 35-31, come-from-behind victory

over North Carolina, finishing the year 8-4.

"The only thing that gets you through the tough times is the reality that, if you do it right, you will come out stronger," said Mackovic, who went 6-5 in 1992 and 5-5-1 in 1993. "I think last year had a lot to do with our success this year."

With the late-season success came an unprecedented commitment to summer workouts by nearly the entire team.

Once the 1995 season began, the emergence of freshman fullback Ricky Williams and tailback Shon Mitchell, a junior college transfer, along with the leadership of sophomore quarterback James Brown helped the Texas offense get off to a quick start.

The defense gave up an average of 33 points over the first three games, but Mackovic huddled with defensive coordinator Gary Darnell and they emerged with a more effective, attacking style, armed with a wide array of blitzes and stunts.

The Longhorns endured a 55-27 loss at Notre Dame before tying Oklahoma 24-24 in a game that Texas led 21-0 in the first quarter.

But the turning point for the season came against Virginia on Oct. 21. Whether it was destiny or just plain luck, Texas kicker Phil Dawson booted a 50-yard field goal into a 20 mph wind with no time left, giving the Longhorns a 17-16 victory.

"It could have been ugly, a real tough season without that kick," said junior linebacker Tyson King. "We had some difficult games coming up on the schedule and it would have been hard to bounce back."

Texas players say Virginia's victory over Florida State the next week gave them confidence that they could play with anyone in the country. The Longhorns then ran the table with

consecutive triumphs over Texas Tech (48-7), Houston (52-20), TCU (27-19), Baylor (21-13) and Texas A&M (16-6).

"I don't know that there has been a tougher five-game stretch in the history of the Southwest Conference," Mackovic said. "Nearly every one of those teams was in contention for the title until we knocked them out."

Mackovic has gone from desperado to hero. He is negotiating a contract extension that would keep him at Texas through 2000.

"When I came here four years ago, I was hired to put Texas back where it was recognized nationally and appreciated on a national level," Mackovic said. "I believe we have done that. We have done it right by emphasizing academics and involvement in the community. I think this is a role model program."

With only seven senior starters, there are high hopes that Texas can sustain its success.

"Texas is on its way back," said King, who emerged as a vocal leader on defense. "You can't really say the

program's back until you've won year-in and year-out like Florida State and Nebraska. But we're getting there."

Most agree that Texas' success, namely the victory over Texas A&M, should help in recruiting as the Longhorns prepare to jump to the Big 12 Conference next year. The 1996 schedule includes Notre Dame and Virginia along with the new Big 12 foes.

"Getting good recruits to come in here and play for Texas is going to be what makes us great again," said senior defensive tackle Shane Rink. "I want to leave here and see us in the Big 12 championship game on a regular basis."

Former Texas coach Darrell Royal, who led the Longhorns to national championships in 1963 and 1969, is among those optimistic about the future.

"I think we are a much better football program now. It takes time and patience for things to gel," Royal said. "I know what that victory against the Aggies means, and I'm really happy for the coaches because, Lord knows, they have gone through enough."

called it "a tremendous loss," he also downplayed the impact it will have on the Cowboys. "Haley's been hurt several weeks, so his production had been down anyway," Switzer said.

The Cowboys will shift Pro Bowl defensive tackle Leon Lett to Haley's right end spot and Switzer predicted big things for Lett coming off the corner.

"I think Leon Lett will be a force outside," he said. "He's a tremendous athlete with great quickness. He's big and strong, and can run."

The loss of Haley and middle linebacker Robert Jones (groin) won't help a Cowboys run defense that gave up 140 yards on the ground to the Redskins last week. Dallas will have even more trouble stopping the run if Charlie Garner can play with a broken right thumb.

The presence of Garner, listed as questionable, gives Philadelphia a shifty change-of-pace to team with Ricky Waters, third in the NFC with 1,074 yards.

Garner doesn't talk to the media, but Rhodes said he wants to play.

"You don't want to run with the ball facing the defense that much, but we do have plays designed where he can carry the ball in his left hand and away from the defenders," Rhodes said.

The Eagles feel the key to containing the Cowboys offense is to shut down Smith's normal running lanes and pressure Aikman, something they never did in a 34-12 loss to Dallas.

The key for the Cowboys, who have beaten Philadelphia in the last seven meetings, may lie in snapping out of the malaise that seems to have filtered into the locker room.

"I don't think we're having a great deal of fun," said Smith, echoing comments Aikman made earlier in the week.

"When we play, we're not showing any emotion. I see guys, when we score touchdowns, (act) like it's another day in the park. That's something I'm not used to seeing around here."

The Cowboys could clinch a fourth straight NFC East title with a win, and Switzer said the high standards set over the past three seasons make it tough when Dallas does anything but win convincingly.

"They had more smiles and are more excited in Washington today because of the victory over the Cowboys last week than any victory we enjoyed this year," he said. "And the only one that will make us smile like that would be to win the Super Bowl."

## Name change means doctors can spend time practicing medicine

 The Family Medical Clinic has changed its name after 30 years of providing medical needs in Hereford and the area, but the faces are the same at St. Mary Family Healthcare Center, 807 West Park Ave.

The center is still staffed by Dr. Gerald Payne and Dr. Duffy McBrayer. Payne joined Dr. Hugh McCrary after Family Medical Clinic opened in 1965. The clinic was located at 904 E. Park Ave. McBrayer came in 1968, when the clinic opened new offices at its present location.

"We may arrange something like an open house to observe our 30th anniversary here," said Payne.

"Dr. Payne and I are happy to be instrumental in bringing another major health care network to Hereford," McBrayer said. "We know that the combined efforts of St. Mary Hospital, Family Medical Clinic and Hereford Medical Clinic will have a positive effect on health care delivery in the community."

Both doctors said the new association will provide administrative assistance, allowing the physicians to spend their time practicing medicine.

"We were put in a position of evaluating health maintenance organizations and doing reams of work on insurance," said Payne. "We

were not trained to evaluate insurance plans, and couldn't spare the time to be attending HMO board meetings."

McBrayer said the two came to a place in their practice where they had to make a change in order to keep emphasizing their primary goal of practicing medicine. "We approached Hereford Regional Medical Center first to determine if they were interested in assuming administrative responsibilities."

He added that HRMC was apparently advised to focus their efforts on the new rural health clinic. "But HRMC is still our hospital. In fact, St. Mary's told us that they expected us to support and work with the local hospital."

Payne noted that, as far as patients are concerned, "nothing has changed except the bookkeeping--the bills are mailed out of St. Mary's in Lubbock."

Payne and McBrayer have the same nurses and office staff, only the staff has better benefits under the St. Mary payroll, the doctors reported. All purchases of supplies which were being made here will stay the same.

Susan Neves, assistant vice president of St. Mary Hospital, announced that "St. Mary is very excited to expand its active participation in Hereford and committed to supporting the medical needs of the community."

"This initial step into the primary delivery system in Hereford is a

major point of the St. Mary Hospital mission of supporting quality health care in regional communities. The security of working closely with St. Mary also will improve physician recruitment and retention activities in the region."

The Hereford center is the 21st in a network of primary care facilities. St. Mary Hospital is developing throughout West Texas and Eastern New Mexico. The healthcare centers are part of an integrated delivery system the hospital has created in which physicians and the hospital work as a team to provide comprehensive primary and preventive care.

## Extension News

County Extension Agent, FCS Although some consider the chimney to be the most important component of a wood-burning unit, it is often the most neglected. Reported chimney fires have increased in recent years because more people are using wood in residential heating. There is no accurate annual recording of chimney fires occurring in the United States, but reported chimney fires numbered over 40,000 a few years ago. Many chimney fires go unreported.

Most chimney fires are caused by creosote's forming on the chimney flue. Creosote is the result of incomplete combustion. Gases formed during the burning process are carried up the chimney and are cooled enough to form a sticky liquid that runs down the flue liner. This liquid dries into a flaky, highly flammable substance called creosote.

At the least, the fire roars out of control in the chimney and thus damages bricks and weakens the mortar. At the worst, it engulfs the entire house and causes loss of life. Now that many people are using wood stoves to heat through the night,

it is well to note that about 60 percent of the total number of home fires occur between 10 p.m. and 6 a.m. during the usual sleeping hours. Consider adding fire detection like a smoke alarm system.

Cleaning your chimney is a simple way to reduce your chances of being involved in such a catastrophe.

Most chimneys need to be cleaned annually and some more often. But all chimneys should be inspected on a regular basis, especially prefabricated metal chimneys since deposits accumulate more rapidly compared with masonry chimneys. If your chimney shows signs of significant creosote buildup, it should be cleaned immediately.

Remember when writing your letter to Santa to ask for a smoke alarm and a carbon monoxide detector.

**Hints from Heloise**

Dear Heloise: I saw in your column directions for making gold Christmas ornaments from pine cones. I seem to have misplaced the column and I have been searching for these directions.

I would appreciate it if you would reprint the directions so my granddaughters and I can make these decorations for this Christmas. — Barbara Key, Winston-Salem, N.C.

I'm happy to reprint this for you and all the others who wrote.

You can use gold spray paint on the pine cones, but it's hard to cover the entire pine cone without wasting a lot of the spray paint.

To more thoroughly paint the pine cones, try this method instead. Use a 3-pound coffee can about 3/4 full with tap water. Pour some oil-based gold paint on the top of the water (the paint will float on top).

Wear rubber gloves to protect your hands and then dip each pine cone slowly into the paint/water. Be sure to turn and swirl them around in the mixture so the paint will coat the entire pine cone, then remove. If a pine cone does not get thoroughly coated the first time, just repeat the process.

Dry on a sheet of waxed paper or aluminum foil. You can also sprinkle a dusting of glitter over the pine cones before they dry for an added sparkle.

When dry, hang on the Christmas tree using red ribbon or add to a centerpiece or holiday wreath using pipe cleaners. — Heloise

A Treasury of Christmas Classics and Quick and Tasty Christmas Gifts are two of the new

books coming out this week to help you with gift and program ideas. You will have to come look under our Christmas tree for other Christmas treasures.

If you want something to read to take your mind off the holidays for a while you may be interested in some of the other new titles. Such as False Witness, the "masterful debut" of Dexter Dias. Tom Fawley agrees that he is the laziest and most cynical excuse for a man who has ever put on a barrister's wig. To Tom the law is no more than a way to make a living.

Fawley's new client is another of "society's mess", "a devil of a client" and one he would like to walk away from. Richard Kingsley, a "crippled pulp novelist", is accused of and has confessed to killing the beautiful 16-year-old Molly Summers. Molly was found stabbed 43 times without an apparent struggle in Stonebury Villages' ancient circle of stones. The case is a sensation to the press, and a scandal to the law. To Fawley the case is a journey that will change his life in ways he never imagined possible.

"How many of these do you think you've done? Abortions I mean" ... Ann now served three clinics in three states performing about 6,000 procedures a year. The girl silently slid the gun from her pocket. "Thirty thousand babies,". "Then your own lips have condemned you." She gently squeezed the trigger, just as she had been taught, and Dr. Ann Sloan is

dead.

The Presidential election is barely over, and J. Whitney Griswold is still basking in his surprise victory. Word of the doctor's assassination is just the beginning of a nation falling apart.

Robert James Waller, author of Bridges of Madison County has a new book entitled Puerto Vallarta Squeeze. Novelist Danny Pastor travels to Mexico's Puerto Vallarta in hopes that a new location will inspire a new story. Danny is mesmerized with the woman Luz Maria; the cantinas that play his kind of music; and the sweet

life. Just before Danny's money plays out and he is forced to return home empty handed, the story creating event happens. Danny and Luz are at a cafe and witness a shooter gun down an American naval officer.

The killer approaches Danny, the only other Anglo there, and asks for a ride across the border. Danny, bold and stupid with tequila says sure. This begins a journey unlike any they, or the reader, anticipate.

# MINDING YOUR OWN BUSINESS

Don Taylor

## THOUGHTS OF FAILURE

Hundreds of books and thousands of articles have been written about business failures. The experts offer many valid reasons. Among the most often mentioned are intense competition, lack of capital, failure to generate profits, lack of management skills and downturns in the economy. However, even armed with this knowledge more businesses will fail this year. I do not question the validity of these reasons. I agree they contribute to the demise of many small businesses. However, I would suggest that some of these reasons are only symptoms of other problems.

With this in mind, I'd like to offer some thoughts for your consideration. Just like you, I am a customer. We are all buyers of products and services. We can learn many lessons in business

management every day. Here are some reasons why we have business failures.

### Why businesses fail

• **Businesses don't fail because of competition, they fail because they don't compete.** Most owners of well-run businesses will tell you that competition keeps them sharp. Competition brings out their best.

Competition causes all of us to work harder and smarter. We must put out extra effort, be creative and find new ways to satisfy our customers. The new power retailers, tough global competitors and fast-growth service companies are raising the standards of competition every day. Constant improvement is our key to prosperity.

• **Businesses don't fail because of the lack of profits, but because they cease to please customers who guarantee their profits.** Some owners feel that profit comes from marking up their products substantially over their cost. Actually, profits come from satisfying customers.

If a business doesn't satisfy its customers completely, the customers will look for other sources to satisfy their needs. When they go, they take their profit potential with them.

• **Businesses don't fail because of downturns in the economy, they fail because they do not react quickly to changing conditions.** During the depression of the 1930s some American businesses prospered. The same is true of every recession and economic slowdown since.

Survival in tough times requires both quick thinking and quick reactions. Businesses that make transactions quickly, do well in difficult economic times. Unfortunately some find it easier to

blame the economy for their failure than to make changes to ensure their success.

• **Businesses don't fail because there aren't enough customers, they fail because they don't offer value and treat their customers well.** I'll admit there may be exceptions here. We recently saw several businesses in New York that require large numbers of daily customers to be successful. (Broadway shows, double-decker bus tours, and the high end shops on Fifth Avenue are good examples.) However, common sense should tell you not to open a clothing boutique in a nudist colony or a car dealership in an all-Amish community.

We must determine if there is a base level of customers to support our business in the first place. Then, if the customers don't come or the number of customers dwindles, we must look for weaknesses in our promotion strategy, value perception or service level.

• **Businesses don't fail because customers don't care, they fail because the owners or employees don't care.** I often hear business owners lament that customers aren't as loyal as they used to be. I don't agree. I think customers are as loyal as ever. However, fewer businesses are working as hard as they once did to earn their customers' loyalty.

Today, we have to care more to avoid failure. (We, means everyone in the business.) When customers sense that no one cares, they take their business elsewhere. Today's consumers are better informed and have more choices. They will not be faithful to businesses who do not care about serving them well.

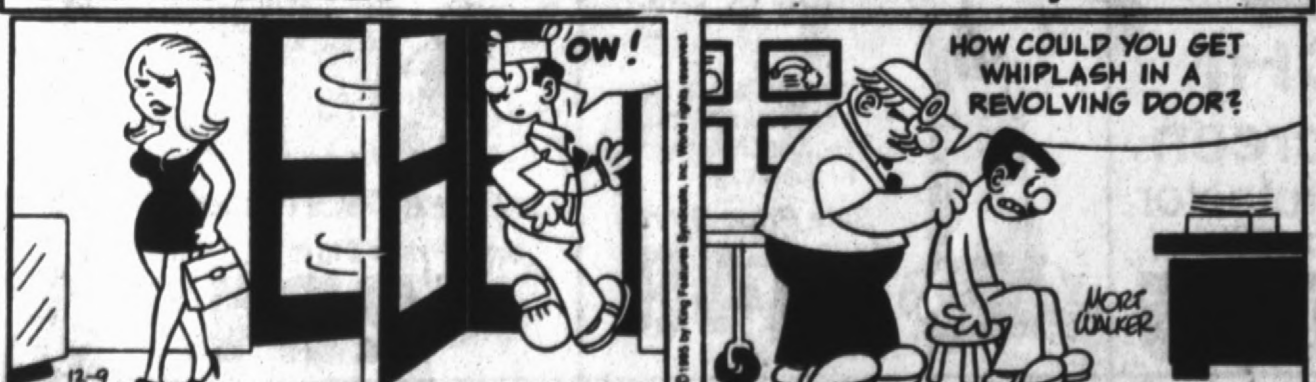

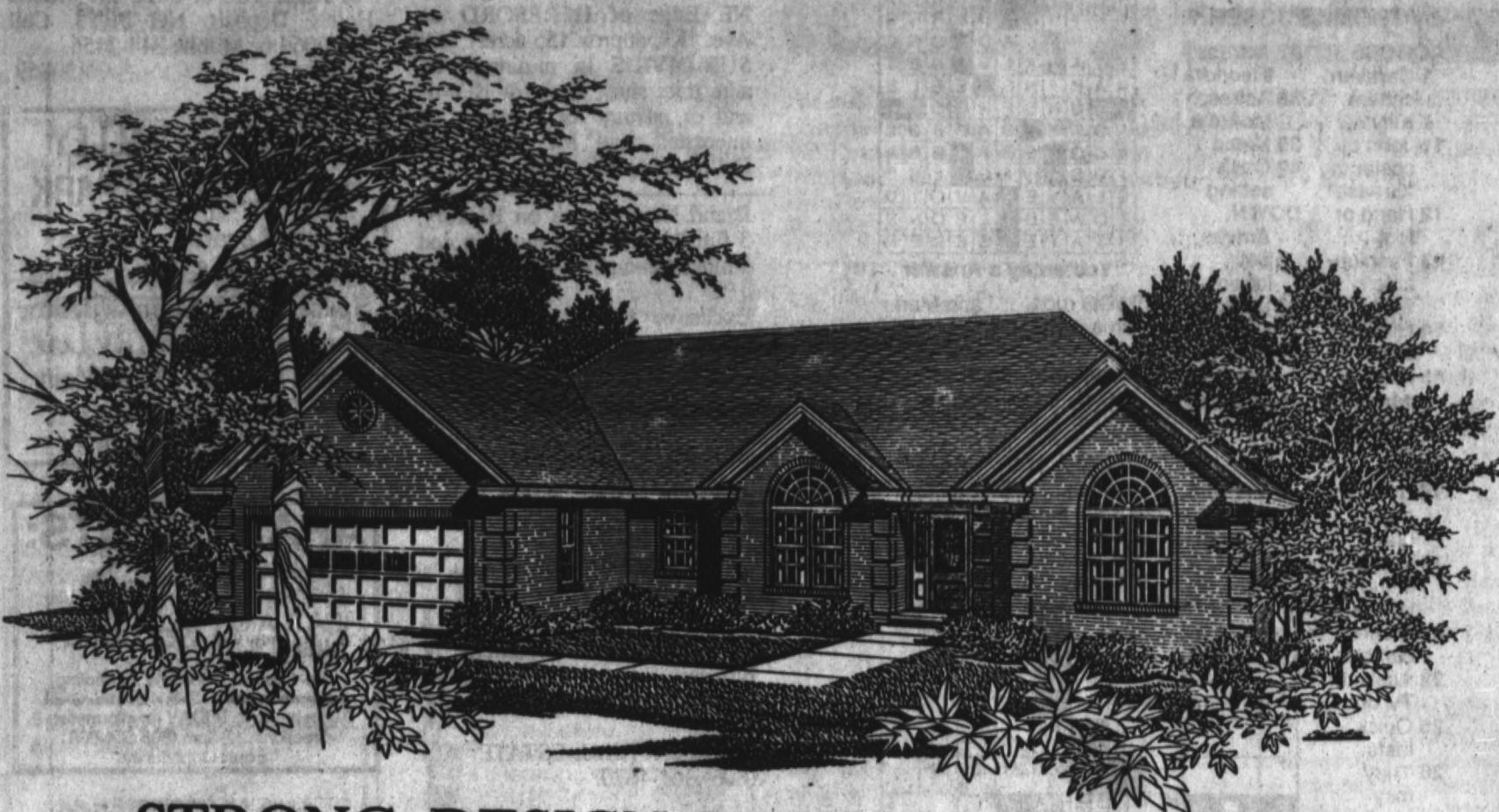

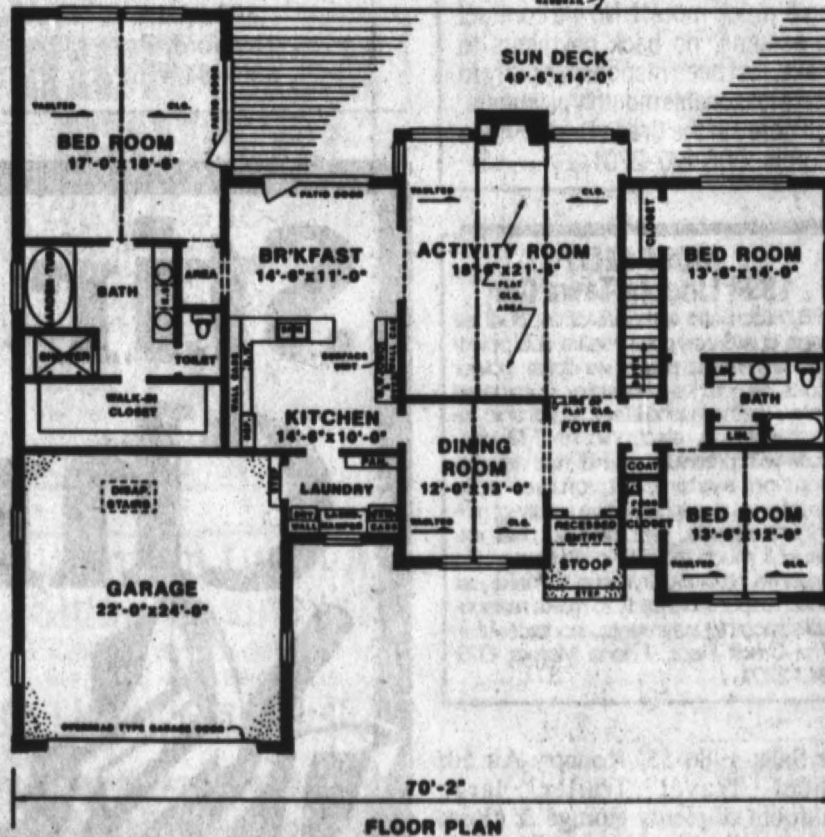

# Farm and Ranch

## Extension Agent's Notes

Beef cattle producers across Texas and around the country will have the opportunity to participate in a satellite teleconference on Dec. 12. The conference is hosted by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, the Texas Beef Council and the Texas Farm Bureau.

The conference will offer producers an interactive format that will allow for exchanges with conference speakers by calling or faxing in questions and comments to the broadcast studios at Texas A&M University in College Station.

The Texas A&M Research and Extension Center located at 6500 Amarillo Blvd. West in Amarillo will be one of the local area downlink sites where producers can attend in person. Registration at the Center will begin at 8 a.m. The teleconference begins at 8:30 a.m. and ends at 1 p.m.

Anyone with a satellite dish will be able to access this program. Producers can stay at their businesses or homes and still receive the information, if they have a satellite dish.

The conference theme is beef cattle production practices that impact beef quality and consistency. It will

offer an industry-wide perspective and features beef cattle producers, consultants and animal scientist who will discuss the major issues involving beef quality and value.

Targeting beef quality definitions, Texas A&M's Bill Mies, animal science professor at College Station will introduce comments by recognized industry leaders including Tio Kleberg of the King Ranch, Harlan Huffman, past chairman, Texas Beef Council, Jeanne Sowa, member of the National Livestock and Meat Board and Ken Jordan, owner of Jordan Livestock Auction at San Saba. Also featured are National Cattleman's Association president, Bob Drake and James Herring, Friona Industries president of Amarillo.

Dan Hale, extension meat specialist in College Station will lead discussion focused on how producer can improve the value and quality of calves through better management techniques. Dell Allen, Excel Corporation, Wichita, Kansas will be joined by Anne Anderson, beef industry and consumer consultant, Austin, and Chuck Hendricks, consultant to meat retailers in addressing this issue.

The results of the beef quality

audit, a nationwide industry analysis that interviewed producers, packers, retailers and restaurant operators also will be presented. It found the industry was losing \$280 per head because of misdirected production practices and selection of poor genetics. Additional reports by livestock specialist and case studies will feature producer feedback from the Ranch to Rail program.

Regional livestock quality updates will be offered by Dr. Ted McCollum, extension beef cattle specialist in Amarillo, Dick Bretz, manager, King Ranch Feedyards and Friona Industries James Herring. John McNeill, extension beef cattle program leader and director of the ranch to rail program will discuss how animal health adds value in calf production. Extension livestock specialist Ron Gill of Dallas will describe proper injection techniques and animal identification practices.

The final segment will feature improving value and quality of calves through genetics. Speakers having regional ties to the Panhandle include West Texas A&M's Ted Montgomery of Canyon and Minnie Lou Bradley, owner of the B3R Ranch in Memphis.

Selection of bulls for overall beef quality will complete the program followed by the question and answer period where producers will have the opportunity to interact with the speakers.

The teleconference is free and may be received by anyone having KU or C band receiver and satellite dish. Satellite coordinates are Telstar 401 (KU), transponder 11 or if using a C-band Telstar 303, channel 10.

Producers needing more information about the program can contact the Deaf Smith County Office of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service at 364-3573.

All programs sponsored by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service are open to people of all ages regardless of race, color, national origin, creed, socioeconomic standing, sex, religion or physical handicap.

## Grain Sorghum Association to hold meeting in Hereford

## Agriculture Briefs

WASHINGTON (AP) - Fewer trade barriers, rising incomes in other countries and a growing demand for healthful foods continue to drive up U.S. horticultural exports, Agriculture Department officials say.

In fiscal 1995, this sector - which includes fruits and vegetables as well as nursery and landscape products - posted its 11th consecutive annual increase in exports, reaching a record \$9.1 billion, up 12 percent from the previous year.

The most notable increases were in fresh vegetables, up 17 percent to \$167.9 million; fruit and vegetable juices, up 22 percent to \$115.6 million; frozen vegetables, up 33 percent to \$99 million; prepared and preserved vegetables, up 11 percent to \$58.8 million; and fresh citrus, up 9 percent to \$56.4 million.

## CRP burns to be reported to NRCS

Requests for prescribed burns on Conservation Reserve Program contracts need to be submitted to the Natural Resources Conservation Service prior to January 15, 1996.

Producers who feel that a burn is needed to revive or stimulate your grass stand, request a burn plan as soon as possible. Burning is not permitted as a means of weed control and unauthorized burns can result in penalties.

Prescribed burns are scheduled in late February or March, weather permitting.

Producers are reminded that even though they have a burn plan, they are responsible for any damage to adjacent land or property damaged by fire, smoke, or other fire related causes.

The Hereford Fire Department will no longer fight CRP grass fires unless lives or properties are at risk. Landowners are asked to plow or blade firebreaks for protection.

## 4-H News

By VANCE CHRISTIE

With the weather continuing to get cooler, there are certain things that you need to be doing to make sure that your animals stay healthy.

You need to be sure and keep fresh water out for all animals. There are also specific things that you need to watch for on your individual animals as we near the show season.

### HOGS

Be sure and keep fresh clean bedding available to help keep your pigs warm. You also may need to check your heat lamps to make sure that they are at the proper height. It is the season for PPLO in your hogs. Make sure and watch out for any stiffness in your pigs.

At the first sign of your pigs carrying a leg, start them on Lincomix. Your pig probably needs to be wormed again. Atgaurd, Ivomec, Tramisol, etc. can be picked up at local feed and vet supply stores. You also need to start putting oil on the pigs coat and brush them regularly.

### LAMBS

Make sure that your lambs have adequate shelter to get in out of the weather. If they have short wool you need to be sure and blanket them when the temperature drops below freezing.

Also, you probably need to get your lambs shorn, if their wool is longer than a couple of inches. This will allow us to monitor their condition better between now and the county show.

Be sure to worm you lambs every 6-8 weeks. Varieties of wormers can be found at feed and vet supply stores. MAKE SURE THAT YOU ARE EXERCISING YOUR LAMBS AS MUCH AS POSSIBLE! Also, it is very important that you work on setting them up everyday between now and the shows.

### STEERS

You need to be working with your calves everyday. Walk them and get them used to setting up. You also need to be brushing and combing their hair daily. The steers also need to be wormed on a regular basis.

It is very important that your

animals get enough exercise between now and the show. I realized that it is cold and the days are short. However if you want to be in the winners circle, you must work with your projects daily.

If you have any questions about what you need to be doing for your projects please contact me at the office. Also if you are interested in any of the 4-H projects please contact the County Extension Office at 364-1639. Educational Programs of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service are open to all citizens without regard to race, color, sex, disability, religion, age or national origin.

## Fans of quality TV will want to take Hallmark's *Journey*

A grandfather tries to help a lonely boy recover from the trauma of being abandoned by his mother in *Journey*, a poignant Hallmark Hall of Fame offering premiering Sunday, Dec. 10, on CBS.

Two-time Oscar winner Jason Roberts (*Julia*, *All the President's Men*) stars as Marcus, a crusty patriarch whose frequent clashes with his daughter, Min (Meg Tilly, a 1985 Oscar nominee for *Agnes of God*), eventually drive her from his household.

As the drama opens, the most recent shouting match between the two climaxes when Marcus cuttingly tells Min not to blame him for the fact that her husband walked out on her and their children, Cat (Eliza Dushku) and Journey (Max Pomeranc, *Searching for Bobby Fischer*).

Enraged, Min systematically destroys all existing photographs of herself and her family before storming out of the house, abandoning her children to the care of Marcus and her mother, Lottie (Academy Award winner Brenda Fricker, *My Left Foot*).

Teen-age Cat is able to channel her anger into chores around the house, but Journey is traumatized by the discovery his mother destroyed photos of him, and he blames Marcus.

That emotional wound festers until Marcus discovers a way to bring his grandson to understanding and healing. A passionate photographer, Marcus is able, through a camera's lens, to give Journey a sense of where he has come from, as well as who he is now.

Inspiration for this poignant story of loss and reconciliation came during a period of crisis for author Patricia MacLachlan (*Sarah, Plain and Tall*), who adapted her novel for television.

"This was the hardest book for me to write, I think, because it's about a mother going away," she says, "and I wrote it when my own mother had Alzheimer's disease and was, in a sense, leaving me. I felt very connected to this theme.

"If *Sarah, Plain and Tall* is about a family coming together, *Journey* is about a family coming apart – or at least coming to terms with loss. Maybe in the characters of Marcus and Lottie and their relationship with their 'abandoned' grandchildren, I'm telling myself that there's always somebody to care for you – maybe not a biological parent, but somebody."

While Min's actions are, at face value, horrendous, the role resonated with Tilly, a mother herself.

"Min, my character, is obsessing me," the actress admits. "I have three children myself, and trying to figure her out has been a real interesting process for me.

"I've become very protective of Min. If somebody criticizes her, I say, 'Hey, wait a minute. You've got to understand where she's coming from.'"

Tilly says she believes Min's chief dilemma is that she is ill-suited for the traditional female role in farm life.

"That's not Min," she says firmly. "She can't make a pie to save her life. She just can't. As society sees her, all she is is a big failure. And every time she turns around it's thrown in her face – especially by her father – what a failure she is.

"She's suffocating. So she leaves."

The only real choice Min is given, Tilly says, is whether or not to subject her children to a life on the road.

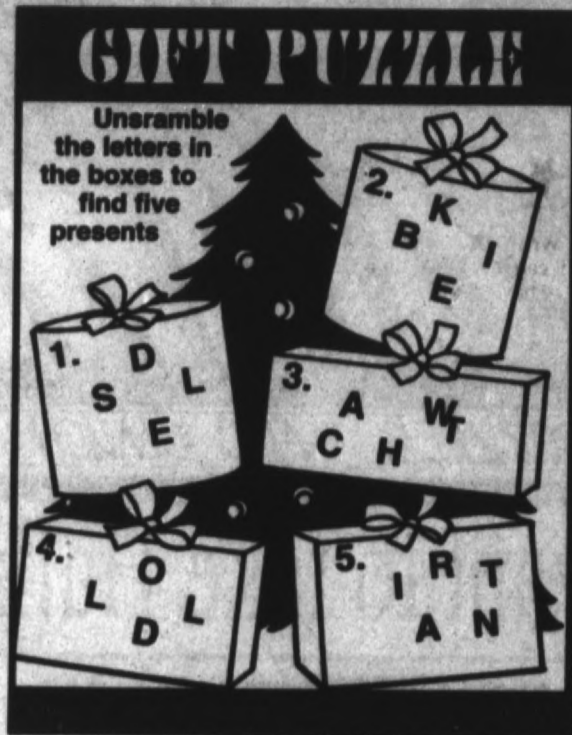
"She doesn't believe she's a good influence in their lives. And she isn't," she acknowledges. "So she excuses herself from their lives. She does the right thing."

## Kissinger and Nixon boasts uncanny makeup, mimicry

State-of-the-art makeup and some uncannily accurate performances enliven *Kissinger and Nixon*, a TNT movie premiering Sunday, Dec. 10.

A virtually unrecognizable Ron Silver and Beau Bridges, respectively, give fascinating impersonations of the two principals at a turning point in American history: the winding down of the war in Vietnam.

Writer and executive producer Lionel Chetwynd does a splendid job of distilling the labyrinthine political processes of the August 1972-January 1973 period - a time when then-national security adviser Henry Kissinger frequently found himself working at cross-purposes with President Richard Nixon - into a concise, literate teleplay based in part on Walter Isaacson's *Kissinger: A Biography*.

"If you look at that time very carefully, including the stresses and strains that ran through the White House, you begin to get total insight into Kissinger and Nixon - who they were as people," says Chetwynd.

"You begin to see the confusion be-

tween personal ambition, self-perception and national policy."

"Kissinger was the first person to understand that in the media age, not only does power make you a celebrity, but being a celebrity gives you power," adds author Isaacson.

In preparation for their roles, both Tony Award winner Silver (*Speed-the-Plow*) and Emmy winner Bridges (*Without Warning: The James Brady Story*) worked extensively with dialogue coaches and underwent lengthy makeup and hair procedures. It took three hours to turn Silver into Kissinger; Bridges' transformation into Nixon took five hours.

"In 1972, I was a young guy appearing on TV to announce where buses would leave for mass protests in Washington," recalls Bridges. "Like a lot of people, I was outraged at what Nixon was doing, but portraying him has definitely altered my view."

"They had great respect for each other because they were interested in the same issues," says Silver; "but I can't imagine two more different personalities."

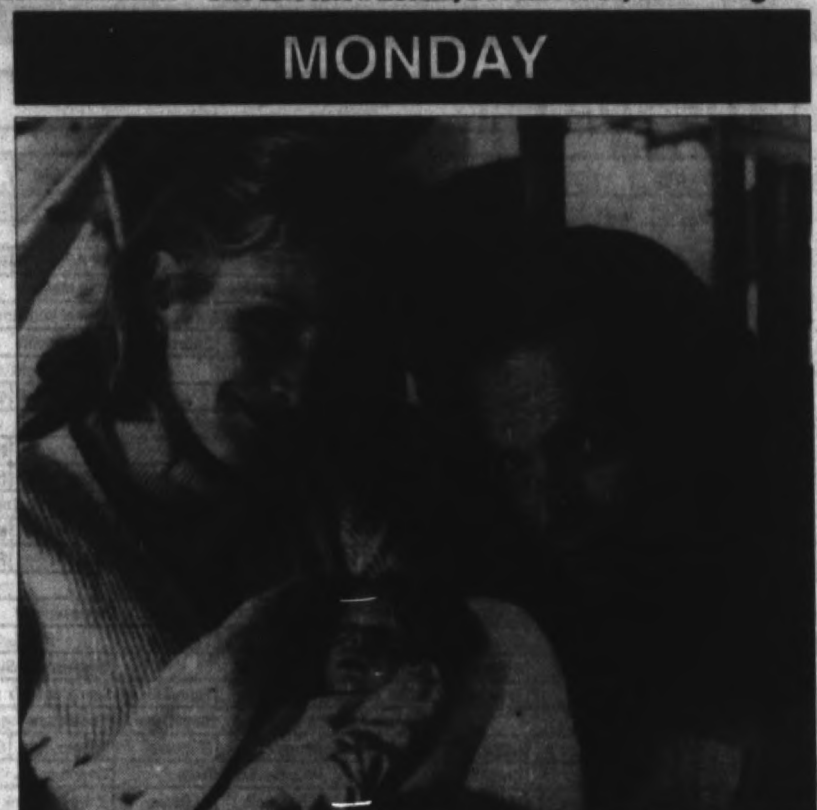

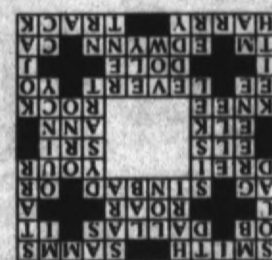



## The need for a will

You're not alone if you don't have a will -- you're in the company of over half of all adult Americans (Source: U.S. News and World Report, April 24, 1995). Yet the potential consequences to your estate if you die without a will can be significant.

Your state dictates who receives your assets. In most states, that means that your children will receive one-half to two-thirds of your estate with your spouse receiving the balance. All children will be treated equally, even if you would have preferred to give more to a minor child or to a child with special needs. If you have no children, your assets will normally be split between your spouse and your parents or brothers and sisters. Generally, the way the state will distribute your estate won't be the way you would have.

Your estate won't be distributed in the most tax-advantaged manner. By deciding who will receive what assets, you can sometimes control the ultimate amount of estate taxes that will be paid.

The court will name a guardian for minor children. One of the most significant advantages of a will for couples with minor children is the ability to name guardians. Additionally, you can specify when your child should receive assets or set up a trust for your children until they reach a certain age. Without a will, they will inherit the assets when they turn 18 or 21 (depending on your state of residence) and, until then, the court will appoint someone to control the distribution of those assets.

The court will name the executor of your estate. If you don't specify an executor in your will, the court will name one, usually a professional who

may charge a significant fee to your estate.

Even if you settle most of these issues by establishing a living trust or other form of trust, you probably still need a will with a "pour-over" clause requesting that all property not in your trust be put there after death.

There are several items you should consider before preparing your will. Spouses should each have separate wills rather than a joint will, since a joint will could prevent the surviving spouse from changing the distribution of assets. It is usually best to leave percentages of your estate rather than specific dollar amounts, since your estate may grow or shrink significantly over the years. Jointly owned property, such as homes or bank accounts, and items with specific beneficiaries, such as a pension plan or life insurance policy, cannot be disposed of through a will.

Be sure to list contingent beneficiaries in case your selected beneficiaries die or can't be located. You may want to name a favorite charity as a contingent beneficiary to ensure that your assets can be completely disposed of. In most states, you cannot completely disinherit your spouse unless you have a signed prenuptial or nuptial agreement. Although you can disinherit children, it is usually best to specifically state in your will that you are making no provision for them.

Once you prepare your will, be sure to review it periodically to make sure you are satisfied with the provisions and to ensure that revisions are not needed due to tax law changes. Also review your will if you move to another state or if your financial situation changes.
