

'Blue Dog' Demos courted in budget battle

By ALAN FRAM Associated Press Writer WASHINGTON (AP) - Republicans laboring to strike a seven-year budget-balancing deal with President Clinton are courting conservative Democrats, hoping to pressure the White House to reach a compromise.

With bipartisan negotiations entering their second week today and no signs of progress, GOP leaders hope that if they can woo enough conservative Democrats to their side, administration resolve to hew to a hard-line position at the talks will

House Speaker Newt Gingrich warned today that if a deal to balance the budget isn't struck this month, "you will see interest rates skyrocket and the stock market crash.

He told leaders of the American Medical Association that "if we cave, if we walk off," the best chance in a generation to balance the federal budget will be lost.

attracts support from two dozen or more other fiscally conservative Democrats.

Republicans concede that they probably can't win enough converts to put together a veto-proof budget-balancing bill that would deal a devastating political blow to Clinton. They would need support from 55 Democrats to get the 290 votes needed in the House to override presidential veto, and from 13 Democrats to line up the required 67 votes in the Senate.

"It will be very difficult to get a veto-proof number," admits House **Budget Committee Chairman John** Kasich, R-Ohio.

Kasich says Republicans can gain by talking to conservative Democrats because "it obviously creates pressure on the president to put

something on the table" in the negotiating room.

Kasich and House Majority Whip Tom DeLay, R-Texas, met with the Blue Dogs last week. Kasich said Rep. David Hobson, R-Ohio, and Rep. Mike Parker, R-Miss., a former Democrat, would talk regularly with them and explore whether some middle ground can be reached.

Though the Blue Dogs share the GOP's goal of eliminating deficits by 2002, there are important policy differences. The conservative Democrats would ease the GOP's proposed savings from Medicare, Medicaid and scores of other domestic programs, and they oppose the Republican \$245 billion tax cut.

The GOP's divide-and-conquer strategy could unsettle administration officials and Democratic lawmakers. Many rank-and-file congressional

Democrats are eager to vote for a opposition by Minority Leader Dick budget-balancing plan before next year's elections, and if the party's unity behind Clinton shows signs of crumbling, so might the administration's tough bargaining position.

"We'll meet with anyone, any time, anywhere who has a constructive plan to balance the budget in seven years," said Rep. John Tanner, D-Tenn., one of the Blue Dogs.

When Republicans pushed a measure through Congress last month pledging Clinton to seek a seven-year plan for eliminating deficits, the administration lobbied hard against it. But 48 House Democrats and seven Senate Democrats voted for it anyway. In addition, 68 House Democrats voted this fall for an alternative budget-balancing plan the Blue Dogs produced, despite

Gephardt, D-Mo.

Those numbers might not apply as the budget endgame approaches. Some Democrats who might otherwise vote for a GOP budget might not do so if a major defeat for Clinton were at stake. Top Democratic aides say they are not worried.

As for their name, the Blue Dogs say it is a play on Yellow Dogs, the term many Southern Democrats used for themselves back when the South was so solidly Democratic that, it was said, voters would rather support a yellow dog than a Republican.

The group credits two former Bluc Dogs, Reps. Billy Tauzin and James Hayes of Louisiana, with coining the name because of the pressure they said Democratic leaders exacted on rankand-file conservatives to toe the party line.

Veteran U.S. judge assigned to preside over bombing case

By JENNIFER MEARS Associated Press Writer DENVER (AP) - The judge who presided over the desegregation of Denver's public schools and the trial of white supremacists charged with killing a controversial talk show host will oversee the Oklahoma City bombing case.

U.S. District Judge Richard P. Matsch was assigned the case Monday by the 10th U.S. Circuit

Court of Appeals. He replaces U.S. District Judge Wayne Alley, whose courtroom and chambers across the street from the Alfred P. Murrah Federal Building were damaged by the bombing. One of his staff members was injured.

On Friday, granting the wish of defense lawyers, the appellate court ordered Alley to step down, saying that while he had conducted himself professionally, "we conclude that a reasonable person could not help but harbor doubts about the impartiality of Judge Alley." Alley officially removed himself

from the case Monday.

"The judge who succeeds to this case will have to bear a dreadful burden, and I wish him or her well," he wrote.

Matsch, 65, a graduate of the University of Michigan Law School and a former bankruptcy judge and assistant U.S. attorney, was appointed to the Denver bench by President Nixon. He has presided over a number of high-profile cases.

He oversaw the federal prosecution of four members of the white supremacist, anti-Semitic group "The Order." They were charged in the 1984 slaying of Alan Berg, a controversial, Nazi-baiting broadcaster who was machine-gunned outside

his Denver apartment. Two were convicted and two were acquitted. There was tight security during that three-month trial, but Matsch came and went unaccompanied by bodyguards, a familiar figure in his black Western hat, conservative suit, long overcoat and black Western boots

Matsch also presided for two decades over the desegregation lawsuit that brought busing to Denver's public schools. He lifted that order in September, saying the Denver schools had erased "vestiges of next direction in the extent of past discrimination ... to the extent acticable

A profile of Matsch in the 1995 Almanac of the Federal Judiciary quoted trial attorneys who cautioned, "If you make a stupid argument in front of him, he will take your head off."

"The last think you'll see from Dick Matsch will be an O.J. trial." said Jon Holm, a Denver lawyer with

years of experience in federal court. Timothy McVeigh and Terry Nichols, who have been linked to right-wing militias, face the death penalty if convicted of murder and conspiracy charges in the federal building bombing, which killed 169

Defense lawyers have argued that their clients can't get a fair trial in Oklahoma because of the intense media coverage and because many people know the victims.

Prosecutors want the trial held in Oklahoma so that victims can easily attend.

Alley had agreed to move the trial to Lawton, Okla., a town about 90 miles southwest of Oklahoma City. It is scheduled to begin May 17.

Matsch will decide whether to move the trial.

"I've sold about 100 so far," the entrepreneur said, adding that she now has enough breeders to keep up with the demand that once warranted a three-month wait.

Not only are gliders easy to care for - diets consist mainly of fresh and dried fruits, nuts, seeds, mealworms and dry pet food - they make good companions, Moreno claims.

Dr. William Lammers, veterinarian in charge of the city's Animal Control Facility, gives his blessing to the tiny creatures, saying: "I don't have a problem with people keeping them. They're certainly not a health

threat.

Dr. Eduardo Moreno, a local internist, is tolerant of his wife's hobby, although he doesn't allow the menagerie of gliders, dogs, cats,

chinchillas, parrots, love birds, fat-tailed gerbils (duprasi) African dormice, chipmunks, ferrets, prairie dogs and hedgehogs into the house.

That perk is reserved solely for Kiwi the kinkajou, a distant relative of the raccoon.

Kiwi is her favorite, but the gliders run a close second.

"It's because they bond," she explained. "Some animals could care less about you. But these really do love you."

"One advantage is that you get to spend a lot of time with someone," Valkavich said.


