## Hospital clinics doing well

The operation of Hereford Medical Clinic, which is under contract by Hereford Regional Medical Center, received a glowing report during Tuesday night's hospital board meeting.

The clinic has shown a profit of \$39,692 for five months of operation. The hospital is responsible for the operation of the clinic and provides physician guarantees for the two new doctors staffing the clinic.

Ron Rives, chief executive officer

of HRMC, said the clinic "has far exceeded our expectations." Dr. Kent Walker and Dr. Howard Haysom are the physicians at the clinic. The success of the clinic, however, has resulted in Dr. Walker moving this week to another office because of space limitations.

The hospital also reported on the operation of Hereford Health Clinic, which was approved under a rural health center program. While the clinic is in the "red," Rives said a loss

of \$50,069 for five months was not unexpected. It was estimated that the clinic would need to see at least 6,000 patients a year to break even.

Rives said the clinic is now drawing enough patients each month to reach the annual total. Start-up costs were high and the first month's loss was about \$16,000. February's loss was only \$3,684.

Rives also reported that the hospital's Emergency Medical System and Home Health Care departments were doing well. The EMS made 123 ambulance calls in February for a total billing of \$45,952. Monthly collections were \$28,007, which is about average.

Home Health made 1,425 combined visits during the month and total billing was \$126,434. The five-month total of visits is 7,029, or 1,226 visits ahead of last year. Radiology procedures and physical and respiratory treatments are also up for the year.

## Rives given 6 percent raise

After an evaluation of the chief executive officer at Hereford Regional Medical Center last month, the Deaf Smith County Hospital District board voted to increase the salary of Ron Rives by six percent, it was learned by *The Hereford Brand* when minutes of the meeting were approved Tuesday night.

Following a closed session of directors after the Feb. 15 board

meeting, the board reconvened in open session and voted an increase in the CEO's salary from \$65,000 to \$68,900. The raise was effective Feb. 1, 1994, with a car allowance of \$6,000 a year remaining the same.

The board approved the salary hike by a 4-1 vote, with John Perrin, Mal Manchec, Boyd Foster and Merle Clark voting for the action, and Scott Turner voting against.

## Five tickets have numbers that cool Texas Lotto fever

AUSTIN (AP) - For millions of Texans the hoopla of a record \$75 million Lotto Texas jackpot is over. For five lucky fortune-seekers, it's just beginning.

Five tickets purchased in Arlington, Corpus Christi, Dallas, the Dallas area and the Houston area matched all six numbers drawn Wednesday night, said lottery spokesman Steve Levine.

The winning numbers were: 4, 12, 23, 29, 41, 46.

"Today was absolutely fantastic and crazy and nuts, and tomorrow or someday soon we're going to make five people very happy," Levine said.

The winners, who get \$15 million each, must claim their prizes at Lottery Headquarters in Austin.

Wednesday's jackpot proved prosperous not only for ticket-buyers, but those administering the lotto and selling the tickets were winners as well.

Retailers earn 5 cents on each \$1 ticket sold. The state Treasury profits, too. Levine said roughly 35 percent of lotto proceeds go to the state's general fund, which pays for most government operations.

Sales records were broken throughout the day Wednesday.

Levine said final sales totaled \$30.7 million. That broke the record for one-day sales - \$24.1 million set on May 1, 1993.

From 6 p.m. to 7 p.m., sales were in excess of \$3.5 million - the highest amount ever in a one-hour period.

The lottery also notched record sales on the days leading up to the drawing: \$2.1 million on Sunday, \$6.98 million on Monday and \$12.4 million on Tuesday.

Southland Corp. added extra help at its 3207-Eleven stores that sell tickets.

"All of our stores were given extra labor hours, part-time people were asked to work extra hours, the staff is working overtime. Our management people are out there helping, too," said Karen Raskopf, spokeswoman for the Dallas-based convenience store chain.

"It's the busiest we've ever seen in the Texas stores," she added.

Although oddsmakers say the chances are better of being struck by lightning than the 1-in-16 million shot of winning the lotto with a single \$1 ticket, it didn't

cool Texans' gambling fever.

Ticket-buying began early and continued all day.

At a San Antonio Stop-N-Go store, the parking lot was so crowded in the morning that people were double parking their cars while they dashed in to buy lottery tickets.

There was a constant line at the cash register.

"If I won it, I wouldn't live to enjoy it. I would fall over dead," one woman exclaimed. Others in line laughed and nodded in agreement.

The record jackpot was \$20 million larger than any ever offered in Texas and ranked No. 9 nationally.

The highest prize ever offered by a U.S. lotto game was \$118.8 million by California on April 17, 1991. It was claimed by 10 winners.

Each time the Texas jackpot has hit \$50 million, there have been multiple winners - 14 on May 1, 1993, and three on July 7, 1993.

If no one had matched all six numbers Wednesday, the jackpot would have hit \$110 million Saturday, lottery officials said. Now, it goes back down to \$3 million.

## Harding pleads guilty, given fine, probation

PORTLAND, Ore. (AP) - In a quiet voice in a packed courtroom, Tonya Harding gave up her sport in exchange for staying out of prison.

Tonya Harding, national figure skating champion, became Tonya Harding, convicted felon. She pleaded guilty to conspiring to hinder prosecutors investigating the attack on her rival, Nancy Kerrigan, and resigned from the U.S. Figure Skating Association.

"I'd just like to say I'm really sorry I interfered," she told the judge on Wednesday.

Harding will get no jail time and will not be prosecuted in any other jurisdiction. But, at age 23, her competitive career is over, and \$160,000 in fines and court costs won't leave much money from her lucrative deal with the television show "Inside Edition."

As part of the agreement with prosecutors, Harding must get a psychiatric evaluation and undergo counseling.

"I am committed to seeking professional help and turning my full attention to getting my personal life in order," Harding said. "This objective is more important than my figure skating."

Harding was to have left the country this morning to skate in next week's world championships in Japan. Now, her travel is restricted to Oregon, Washington and California during three years of probation.

Without her USFSA membership, she can't compete in any amateur event and is barred from the two

lucrative pro-am competitions. Promoters may not want her in ice shows, given the taint of the Kerrigan affair.

Ending Harding's competitive skating career was important to deputy district attorney Norm Frink, who watched in frustration as she maneuvered in court to avoid discipline from the U.S. Olympic Committee and the USFSA.

"I think it was a matter of justice," Frink said. "What made this case especially significant was the attempt to defraud a national institution."

Kerrigan was struck above the right knee in Detroit on Jan. 6, knocking her out of the national championships and leaving Harding free to win the title and a spot on the Olympic team.

Harding's ex-husband, Jeff Gillooly, said she was in on the plot and gave the final go-ahead to eliminate Kerrigan from the event.

In her guilty plea, Harding admitted to conspiring with Gillooly and her bodyguard Shawn Eckardt to concoct a false alibi only hours after her return from the nationals on Jan. 10.

Left unresolved is the central question: Was Harding in on the plot? Frink insists the answer is yes.

"There is obviously substantial evidence for her involvement in the conspiracy and the aiding and abetting of the assault," he said.

Judge Donald Londer ordered Harding to pay a \$100,000 fine, \$10,000 in prosecution expenses and contribute \$50,000 to Special Olympics. She also will serve 500

hours of community service.

"Perhaps the only good thing to come of it is the realization by Tonya Harding that perhaps she has placed too much value on her goals and not enough value on herself as a person," said her attorney, Bob Weaver.

Kerrigan's father, Daniel, said at the family home in Stoneham, Mass., Wednesday night that Nancy and the family wanted more time before commenting.

Bob Fields, a neighbor of the Kerrigans, said the conviction "will get Nancy off the hook."

"There's been too much pressure on her. The newspapers built her up as a queen and now they're tearing her apart," Fields said.

## Youth hurt in truck wreck

A 15-year-old Hereford boy escaped serious injury when he lost control of a pickup truck and rolled it over on County Road G two miles east of Hereford Tuesday.

The Texas Highway Patrol said the youth was not wearing a seatbelt when the rollover occurred around 4:45 p.m. A 15-year-old passenger in the truck who was wearing a seatbelt was not injured.

Officers said the driver was taken to Hereford Regional Medical Center, treated, and released.

Citations are pending against the teenager for traveling at an unsafe speed, driving without a license, and operating a motor vehicle while not wearing a seatbelt.

## San Jose water system operation being eyed by state agency, city

Operation of the water system in the San Jose community of Deaf Smith County is continuing uninterrupted as a study of future management of the system is underway.

A mediator for the TNRCC met earlier this week with city and county officials in a fact-finding conference.

A meeting on March 29 with a Texas Natural Resources Conservation Commission has been set for further talks on operations of the system.

The water system for San Jose residents is a self-contained

operation, serving about 100 customers from two Ogallala wells.

Hereford City Manager Chester Nolen met Tuesday with the TNRCC contract mediator, Maria Baiza, and representatives of San Jose.

Jurisdiction of the water system lies with TNRCC, which recently was organized as the umbrella for state water and environmental authorities.

The TNRCC is looking at alternatives for operating the water system, Nolen reported. He said he expects the Hereford City Commission to study the possibility of

assuming management.

"There have been no decisions made," Nolen emphasized. "The mediator will report to the TNRCC."

Disputes over management of the water system have arisen in the community. The board that sets policy for the water service also "has some decisions to make," said Nolen.

The sewer system in the San Jose community is connected to the Hereford system, Nolen observed, but water service is separate from the City of Hereford.

**WASHINGTON** - Israeli Prime Minister Yitzhak Rabin is offering Syria a "territorial compromise" on the Golan Heights to rescue Mideast peace talks while rejecting PLO demands for tough new security measures.

**BELGRADE**, Yugoslavia - Serbs and Croats have agreed to hold talks on turning their uneasy truce into a formal end to the war that began the bloodletting in the Balkans. The talks under Russian auspices are another sign that Washington and Moscow are pushing the warring parties in the Balkans toward an overall peace settlement.

## Astronauts packing gear for trip home

**SPACE CENTER**, Houston (AP) - Five astronauts aboard shuttle Columbia shut off some science experiments and conducted final work on others today before packing for the journey home.

The two-week engineering and technology flight is to end Friday morning with a landing at Florida's Kennedy Space Center.

If Columbia touches down as scheduled, it will be the second-longest flight in shuttle history - 13 days, 23 hours and eight minutes. But if the weather forces even an extra 1 1/2-hour lap around the world, the crew will set an endurance record. The weather forecast, however, is good.

Astronaut Pierre Thuot today worked on shutting down a protein crystal growth experiment that has operated mostly on its own and with commands from Earth. His crewmates stowed the 50-foot robot arm that was used to test a new magnetic grappling system.

Thuot also conducted a final observation for a study of shuttle glow. The halo that appears when space gases collide with the shuttle can hinder telescope observations.

Scientists on the ground commanded canisters in Columbia's cargo bay to release nitrogen gas several times during the flight to see how that would affect the orange glow. Contrary to what they had predicted, the glow was smothered.

"It will take us several months to look at our data and draw some conclusions, but we're certainly getting a lot of data to help solve the mystery," said Gary Swenson, an atmospheric scientist at Lockheed Research and Development Laboratory in Palo Alto, Calif.

# Oil producers urging initiatives to increase prices, raise revenue

**DALLAS (AP)** - Initiatives independent oil producers are promoting in Washington would have an especially strong effect in Texas, which produces a quarter of the country's energy, industry representatives have said.

Producers on Wednesday urged federal officials to help the industry with a \$3 per barrel tax incentive for low-producing, or stripper, wells and other initiatives that phase out at a price floor around \$20 per barrel.

The recommendations came as the Independent Petroleum Association of America and the National Stripper Well Association capped a two-day "oil summit" on the energy industry's troubles.

"Time is not on our side. We need to act quickly before too many more wells are shut in and too many more people in the industry lose their jobs, because thousands already have," said George Alcorn, petroleum association chairman and president of Houston-based Alcorn Exploration Inc.

About 75 percent of Texas' wells are stripper wells, totaling about 17 percent of the state's oil production, said Julian Martin, executive vice president of the Texas Independent Producers and Royalty Owners Association.

"Whatever we can do in Washington is enormously important to Texas," Alcorn said.

On Monday, Sen. David Boren, D-Okla., said President Clinton has agreed to a meeting to discuss ways to bolster the industry, at the request of some 120 members of Congress.

Boren is coordinating a bipartisan congressional effort to craft an emergency package to help the industry. Production and employment

already were dwindling and imports on the rise, but the industry has reeled anew since oil prices sank to around \$14 a barrel last fall - and stayed down.

"This is a very challenging time for our country's oil industry, and a time of crisis," Kansas Gov. Joan Finney said at the Dallas meeting.

Congressional staffers are still working on the package of proposals, petroleum association president Denise Bode said, and they likely won't be finished for another week or two. So the figures in the proposals could change, she said.

Alcorn and others said the measures could include a tax initiative for stripper wells - which produce up to 10 barrels a day and two to three barrels on average - and other tax credits and incentives that would only stay in place when prices fall below a set floor. The group also supports an oil import fee, an idea that has yet to sail in Washington.

In addition, Virginia Lazenby, president of the National Stripper Well Association, said her organization is discussing with federal officials the idea of buying stripper production for the Strategic Petroleum Reserve at an undetermined floor price.

Fast relief is crucial to the \$10 billion marginal well industry, which supports 75,000 jobs and produces some 1 million barrels of oil a day, Ms. Lazenby said.

"We have a serious problem. Our product sells for less than it costs to produce and there's no fat to cut," she said.

Some 13,600 workers in the nation's oil and natural gas industry have lost their jobs since November, and low crude oil prices threaten 75,000 more of the current 343,000 workers, Alcorn said.

# Proposal on charge for records assailed

**AUSTIN (AP)** - A proposed guideline that would likely increase charges for people seeking public records from state agencies has been met with criticism from state, media and citizen groups.

State officials and open records advocates met for a panel discussion Wednesday at the first Open Records Awareness Day sponsored by the Texas comptroller's office.

At issue is a proposed state guideline that would define "readily accessible information" as that which can be located within 15 minutes.

The rule is being proposed as part of a set of General Services Commission guidelines for open-records charges by state agencies that was ordered by the Legislature last year.

If the proposed limit is put into effect, people seeking public records could be charged fees for a request that takes a state agency more than 15 minutes to fill.

Suzy Woodford, executive director of Common Cause of Texas, a public watchdog group, said she was concerned agencies will abuse the rule by deliberately taking longer than 15 minutes to produce the records and then

overcharge the public to help cover agency expenses.

"When a state agency is using the Open Records Laws to cover employees' salaries, the costs become Draconian," Ms. Woodford said.

John Cranfill, a representative of Texas Media, and Madeleine Johnson, an attorney with the Texas attorney general's office, agreed.

"Recovering the cost of the copy or the cost of the person going to make the copy is OK," Ms. Johnson said. "We can see some reasonableness in saying those charges can be included in certain circumstances."

"But if you get an agency that uses the rule to recover the cost of the copying machine, the costs of computer equipment, the air conditioning and lights, where do you draw the line?"

"Where you draw the line might make the difference between a copy that might cost 10 cents and a copy ending up costing five dollars."

John Poulard, executive director of the General Services Commission, acknowledged that state agencies may interpret the proposed limit differently.

"Information that is readily available is in the eyes of the beholder," Poulard said. "It's very subjective."

# Former Hereford resident seeks office in Arkansas

Former Hereford resident Phil Sciumbato recently announced his candidacy for the office of sheriff in Benton County, Arkansas. Now a resident of Morning Star, Ark., he is running on the Republican ticket.

Sciumbato is a 1965 graduate of Hereford High School, attended West Texas State University and majored in criminal justice at Amarillo College. He has been involved in law enforcement since 1970, first as a patrolman for the Hereford Police Department.

Sciumbato also served as a deputy sheriff in Potter County and later as an agent with the Multi-County Organized Crime Unit in Amarillo. He moved to Bella Vista in 1981 to assume a detective position. He was promoted to captain in 1982 and served in that position until January, 1993.

The veteran officer is the founder and coordinator of Operation State Safeguard, a non-profit drug education program for students throughout the state of Arkansas. Since May of 1993, he has worked

parttime with the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers and the Cave Springs(AK.) Police Department.

During his career, Sciumbato has received at least 12 law enforcement awards from various organizations including the Arkansas Sheriff's Association, National Child Safety Council, and the American Legion and VFW. He also was honored with the Melvin Jones Fellowship Award from Lions Club International.

Sciumbato's mother, Bea, still resides in Hereford, as do a brother, Albert, and a sister, Joan Noyes. His wife, Lynn, is the daughter of Wes and Pat Fisher of Hereford.

NationsBank recently named Andrew Wingert, a former Hereford resident, as president of its Park Cities Banking Center in Dallas.

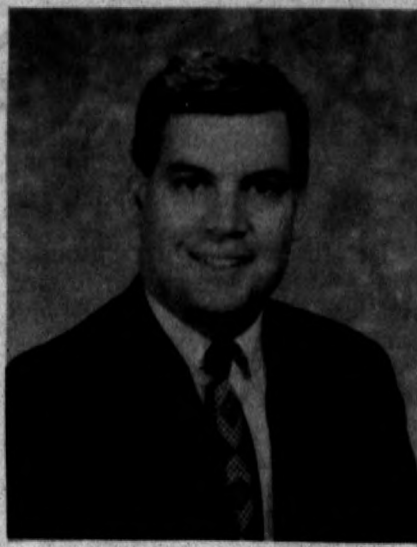

## Newton gets big offer from Philly

## New Orleans ousts Aggies in 1st round of NIT tourney

NEW ORLEANS (AP) - New Orleans seems to have found the groove again after an 11-day layoff.

"Our slow start was definitely attributable to the long layoff," guard Reni Mason said after UNO's 79-73 victory over Texas A&M in Wednesday night's first round of the National Invitation Tournament.

Freshman Detric Willoughby climaxed a barrage of outside shooting with a 3-pointer in overtime that put the Privateers ahead to stay.

"The difference was we hit a couple of key baskets down the stretch. Willoughby's 3 was huge," said UNO coach Tim Floyd.

The victory moves New Orleans (20-9) into the second round against Vanderbilt, a first-round winner over Oklahoma.

Texas A&M ended its season at 19-11.

The Privateers, who missed all five of their 3-point attempts in the first half, made six 3-pointers in the second half and overtime to overcome the Aggies' superior inside game.

Willoughby's 3-pointer gave New Orleans a 75-73 lead with 2:20 left in overtime. Texas A&M did not score in the final 2:32.

Mason made a layup and Willoughby hit two free throws to extend the Privateers' margin of victory.

Tony Madison led New Orleans with 18 points, Gerald Williams scored 17 and Melvin Simon and Willoughby had 16 apiece. Michael McDonald had 14 rebounds and three blocked shots while playing 39 minutes on a sprained knee.

"McDonald controlled the defensive board," Floyd said. "We were not even going to play Mike because he had hardly practiced in a week. The trainer came to me right before the game and said, 'If you're going to play him, start him because the knee will be loose and it won't tighten up.' I never imagined we'd get that kind of game out of him."

Chuck Henderson led the Aggies

with 19 points, and Brett Murry and Joe Wilbert scored 14 each.

The Aggies missed an opportunity to win in regulation when David Edwards missed a free throw with the score 68-68 and five seconds remaining. His free throw moments earlier had tied the game.

"I didn't feel any pressure," Edwards said of the missed free throw. "It just rimmed in and rimmed out."

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# Kentucky heating up for NCAA tournament

Kentucky is on a roll heading into the NCAA tournament.

The Wildcats (26-6) won the Southeastern Conference tournament last week, beating then-No. 1 Arkansas 90-78 in the semifinals and No. 14 Florida 73-60 in the final.

They hope to keep the momentum going against Tennessee State (19-11) Friday in the first round of the Southeast Regional at St. Petersburg, Fla.

"Right now, I feel we're at our highest point of the season," coach Rick Pitino said.

Last year, Kentucky used an SEC tournament title as a springboard to reach the Final Four. The third-seeded Wildcats think they're

capable of going just as far this year.

"If we make our press a factor in the tournament as we have in the past three weeks, we'll have a chance of going all the way," forward Jeff Brassow said.

Kentucky's strengths are pressure defense and 3-point shooting. In the SEC tournament, the Wildcats made 40 of 95 long-range shots and forced 17 turnovers per game.

"We never go into a game and say we're going to take this many 3s," said guard Travis Ford. "It depends on what the defense gives us."

If Tennessee State concentrates on stopping Kentucky's 3-point shooting, Ford said the Wildcats will go inside.

"We have a strong inside game,"

he said. "We're just going to take 3s when we're open."

Tennessee State, which upset Murray State 73-72 in the Ohio Valley Conference championship game, is making its second straight NCAA appearance. The Tigers lost to Seton Hall 81-59 in the first round last year.

"They're one of the 64 teams," Kentucky forward Rodrick Rhodes said. "They're doing something right."

Center Carlos Rogers is Tennessee State's biggest threat. The 6-foot-11 senior averages 24.8 points and 11.6 rebounds a game.

"He's an outstanding post-up player with good hands," Pitino said.

"And they have an excellent point guard in (Tim) Horton. They have all the components to be an excellent basketball team."

In other games Friday at St. Petersburg, Marquette plays Southwestern Louisiana, Michigan State faces Seton Hall and Duke meets Texas Southern.

In the East Regional at Landover, Md., the matchups are North Carolina-Liberty, Boston College-Washington State, Indiana-Ohio University and Temple-Drexel.

The Midwest Regional at Oklahoma City has Arkansas-North Carolina A&T, Illinois-Georgetown, UCLA-Tulsa and Oklahoma State-New Mexico State.

The pairings at the West Regional

in Sacramento, Calif., are Minnesota-Southern Illinois, Louisville-Boise State, Virginia-New Mexico and Arizona-Loyola, Md.

The tournament started with games at Uniondale, N.Y., Lexington, Ky., Wichita, Kan., and Ogden, Utah.

The Temple-Drexel game matches two Philadelphia teams that haven't met since 1986.

While Temple (22-7) has reached the final eight of the NCAA tournament three times since 1988,

Drexel (25-4) is making its first NCAA appearance in eight years.

"We're the guys on the outside always looking in," said Drexel guard Jim Rullo. "This is a great chance to show what we've got."

Temple coach John Chaney isn't overlooking the Dragons, who got an automatic bid by winning the North Atlantic Conference tournament.

"There's a risk in playing a team like that, because they're so highly motivated," he said.

## Hornets return to form, rout Hawks

Defense is back in Charlotte with the return of Alonzo Mourning and Larry Johnson.

The Hornets, last in the NBA in points allowed with 108.7 per game, have given up an average of 98.5 points while winning three of four games, including a 92-79 victory over Atlanta on Wednesday night.

Charlotte held the Hawks to 35 percent shooting while holding the opposition under 100 points for just the 19th time in 61 games.

"Defense is just a commitment for the guys to rotate and help each other out," Frank Brickowski said. "No one guy can stop anyone in this league. It takes help. That's what it's all about. As long as we play defense and let that be a constant, we're going to be in ball games."

Mourning had 20 points and three blocked shots, and Johnson scored 16 points in his fourth game back from a sprained lower back injury.

"We felt like this was a momentum builder," coach Allan Bristow

said. "Our defense stepped it up. Defense is what won the game for us."

Elsewhere in the NBA, it was Chicago 101, Boston 100; Orlando 100, Dallas 98; Indiana 109, Phoenix 98; San Antonio 110, Portland 102; the Los Angeles Lakers 129, Washington 94; and Sacramento 132, New Jersey 111.

The Hawks, who trailed by as many as 22 points in the second half, got as close as eight in the fourth quarter, but couldn't rally all the way back.

Duane Ferrell led the Hawks with 15 points. Only two of the 12 Hawks shot 50 percent or better from the field.

**Spurs 110, Trail Blazers 102**

Dale Ellis and David Robinson scored 27 points each and Ellis came within two of becoming the first NBA player with 1,000 3-point goals as San Antonio won at home against Portland.

Ellis had 19 points and three

3-pointers in the first half, helping the Spurs lead by as many as 18, but he missed all three of his attempts in the second half to stay at 998 for his career.

Clifford Robinson scored 21 points for Portland.

**Lakers 129, Bullets 94**

Nick Van Exel had 21 points and 11 assists and Los Angeles manhandled visiting Washington on the boards, outrebounding the Bullets 61-28.

Sedale Threatt scored 12 of his 16 points in the first quarter, lifting the Lakers to a 36-22 advantage the Bullets never threatened.

Rex Chapman scored 24 points for Washington.

**Kings 132, Nets 111**

Sacramento scored 46 points in the fourth quarter to stay in front of New Jersey.

Mitch Richmond scored 25 points for the Kings, who led by as many as 29 in the final period, reversing a

132-102 loss to the Nets at the Meadowslands Arena on Nov. 14.

Derrick Coleman scored 29 points for the Nets.

**Pacers 109, Suns 98**

Indiana won its 11th straight home game as Reggie Miller scored 21 of his 34 points in the second half, rallying the Pacers from a 16-point deficit against Phoenix.

The Suns, whose four-game winning streak was snapped, led 54-38 before Indiana scored the last 10 points of the first half.

Kevin Johnson scored 23 points and Charles Barkley and Cedric Ceballos 20 apiece for Phoenix.

Horace Grant led the Bulls with 20 points, and Pippen scored 17. Brown scored 27 points for the Celtics.

**Magic 100, Mavericks 98**

Orlando dealt visiting Dallas its ninth consecutive loss when Donald Royal hit a fallaway jumper at the buzzer.

Charisse Sampson scored a career-high 34 points and grabbed 15 rebounds to lead the Kansas Lady Jayhawks to a 72-63 victory over Stephen F. Austin.

Rebounding was the difference as the No. 15 Lady Jayhawks outrebounded the Lady Jacks 57-32.

The victory allowed Kansas (22-5) to advance to the second round of the tournament. They will play Penn State, the top seed in the Midwest, on Saturday.

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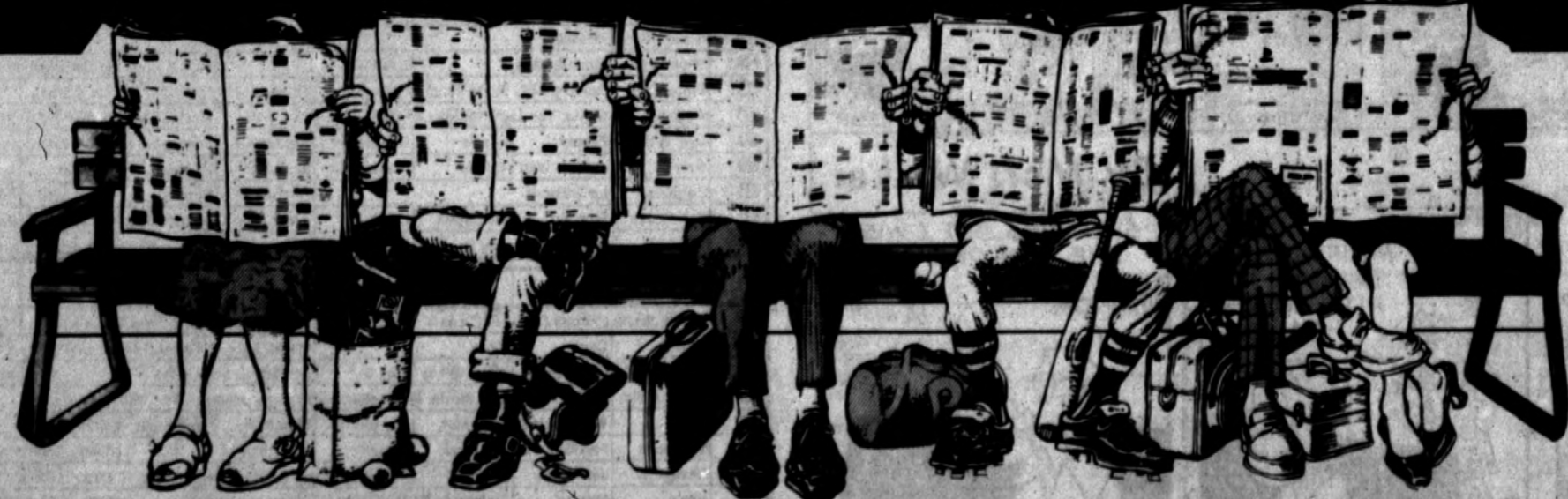

 In case there were any questions about his surgically repaired wrist, Don Mattingly has answered them in spring training.  
 His latest statement came Wednesday, when he hit two home runs and drove in three runs as the New York Yankees beat the Detroit Tigers 5-2 at Fort Lauderdale, Fla.  
 "I like swinging the bat good," he said. "It's a confidence builder for down the road."  
 Mattingly also draws encouragement from last season. His .291 average and 17 home runs represented his highest levels in those categories since 1989. He totaled 86 RBIs despite being limited to 134 games by a pulled muscle in his left rib cage.  
 That healed, he had minor surgery on his right wrist Nov. 8. Mattingly

said the wrist is fine, and it certainly is permitting him to turn on the ball, as evidenced by four homers this exhibition season.  
 But Mattingly - 10-for-17 this spring with eight RBIs and multi-hit efforts in each of his last four games - says he's not trying to hit for distance.  
 "I want to throw some hits out there," he said. "No matter who you are, you don't want to go north without running the bases."  
 Mattingly connected twice off Bill Gullickson.  
 Opening-day starter Jimmy Key pitched five scoreless innings for New York. He allowed just one hit. Eric Davis hit a two-run homer for the Tigers.

## NFL may add 2-point conversion

 NEW YORK (AP) - Commissioner Paul Tagliabue has long been convinced one of the solutions to the NFL's touchdown drought is the two-point conversion. Now the owners seem set to go along with him.  
 The league's rule-making competition committee, meeting in Orlando, Fla., has approved the new conversion rule, adopted 36 years ago by colleges, and will present it to the owners at their meetings in Orlando next week.  
 "We need to create incentive to score touchdowns," Tagliabue said of the proposed change. "Now we have an eight-point touchdown. It's an incentive to go for a touchdown rather than kick a field goal."  
 Last year, 24 percent of the NFL's

points came on field goals, the most in league history. There also were three field goals for every four touchdowns compared to two TDs for each field goal a decade ago.  
 One reason is better kickers - 76 percent of field-goal attempts were successful last season, compared to 59 percent in 1970.  
 Colleges adopted the two-point conversion in 1958 and it was used in the old American Football League before it merged with the NFL. It also was used in the United States Football League.  
 But the NFL always resisted the change - in part because it has overtime, in part because it was a rule in rival leagues, and in large measure because coaches didn't want to be faced with additional decisions.  
 The attitude among coaches, however, has changed. The change

is backed strongly by such former college coaches as Dennis Green of Minnesota, Jimmy Johnson of Dallas and Bobby Ross of San Diego.  
 The NFL proposal, which must be approved by 21 of the 28 active teams, will put the ball at the 2-yard-line rather than the 3, where it is placed in college. NFL spokesman Joe Browne said the 2-yard line is preferred, because that's where the ball is put for kicks and it will encourage use of the new play.  
 If approved, the new rule would take effect this season.  
 Unlike colleges, however, the defensive team will not be able to score on a botched conversion attempt. Under a rule adopted by the colleges in 1988, the defense can get two points by returning an interception or a fumble for a score.

## Ask Dr. Lamb

DEAR DR. LAMB: I also have a problem with mucus in my throat. It is thick and brownish and seems to sit around my voice box causing me to have to clear my throat to speak and breath better. I worked with harsh cleansers and chemicals just before this started to happen. I am no longer working with these chemicals. In your column, you mentioned that the secretions get thick because the tissues are dehydrated. That makes sense in my case because my face was right over the top of cleansers and chemicals.

I have used baking soda and water to gargle to clear the mucus. Also, a humidifier at night helps to keep the mucus from sticking in my throat, but this doesn't cure it. I would like to know if the dehydrated tissues are in the nose or in the throat or both. What can be done to correct this?

DEAR READER: Usually in such cases, the cells in the lining of the sinuses and nasal passages have undergone changes that decrease the amount of fluid they produce. That is the common cause for postnasal drip. The sinuses produce about a quart of thin, clear fluid each day. Because it is thin, it passes down the throat and a person is totally unaware of this. The fluid cleans and moisturizes the air before it is inhaled into the lungs. When these cells produce only a small amount of liquid, the secretions are thick and may stick in the throat. The thick glob is what one feels and tries to clear from the throat.

cells that stop producing dilute secretions are not easily stimulated to produce more fluid. Humidifying your environment does help. So can inhaling steam, to soften and liquefy the secretions. You may find that drinking lots of water will improve your body's hydration, which may help relieve your symptoms.

I have included a discussion of this problem in my new Special Report 137, Sinusitis, Dry Nose, Postnasal Drip, which I'm sending you. As people age, the lining of the nose becomes smooth and pale. The decrease in specialized tissue in this area over the turbinates that form secretions increases these problems.

DEAR DR. LAMB: This may seem trivial, and vain it may be, but I am curious, and it is of personal concern. I'm a 38-year-old male and have lamented for the past 15 years on my inability to grow a beard. There are some areas of my face in which there simply isn't any hair growth and they happen to be in areas of importance in growing a viable beard. Is there any method known to promote beard growth?

DEAR READER: I'm afraid very little has been done for this condition. From a health standpoint it is not important unless there are other signs of hormone deficiencies, which your letter does not suggest. Just remember that many ethnic groups have very little facial hair — the native American Indian is a good example — even though the male may be very masculine in other characteristics. Beards don't equate to masculinity.

Your genes probably did not create hair follicles that produce long, coarse hair shafts. To my knowledge it has never been tried, but since minoxidil stimulates the growth of facial hair when used to treat high blood pressure, it would be interesting to see if Rogaine, a minoxidil lotion for baldness, would stimulate facial hair follicles to produce prominent hair shafts rather than fine fuzz. You would need a prescription to try it, however.

## Facts about snack foods

Snacking is one of America's favorite pastimes. The average American eats over twenty pounds of snacks per year and the industry's sales total over \$4 billion.

Where did snack foods come from and where are they going? Here's a look at the past, present and future of some of America's favorite snacks.

### Potato Chips

The first potato chip was created in 1853 in Saratoga Springs, NY. A chef prepared the salty, thinly sliced potatoes in response to Cornelius Vanderbilt's complaint that his fried potatoes were too thick.

Lucky for us, Vanderbilt loved the new chips and they began to be served in restaurants. In 1895, Americans wanted them in their households, too, and potato chip companies sprang up across the country. By the 1970's potato chip sales topped \$1 billion.

Today, with the average American eating six pounds of them per year, potato chips make up almost half of all salted snack food sales.

Herr Foods Inc., a leading snack food manufacturer, got into the business in 1946, around the time the first potato chip flavor was introduced. This flavor was barbecue and reflected the popularity of outdoor barbecues after World War II.

Herr's Director of Marketing, Daryl Thomas, comments, "Trends in snack foods follow American lifestyle trends. After World War II, American tastes were more varied, and potato chip companies responded by offering new flavors." The next flavor after barbecue was sour cream and onion, or "putting the dip on the chip," and is still a favorite today.

In the past ten years, spicy ethnic and cheese flavors have become popular with Americans. The Snack Food Association reports that new chip flavor on the market include scampi and lemon and spicy chicken.

Herr's expects the ethnic and cheese trends to continue well into the 90's. The company already offers Old Bay and Red Hot flavored potato chips, and just recently introduced cheddar and sour cream potato chips.

### Pretzels

Pretzels date back to 610 A.D., when French monks began twisting them from unleavened bread dough to award children who learned their prayers. The first commercial pretzel bakery in the U.S. was established in Pennsylvania in 1861, and ever since, the treat has been popular in the mid-Atlantic states.

Over the past few years, however, sales have boomed countrywide, and pretzels have become the second most popular salted snack food. Thomas explains, "Pretzels are naturally low-

calorie, cholesterol-free and tasty, so many snack food companies added pretzels to their product lines. Herr's has been selling pretzels for many years, and most recently added apple and cinnamon and honey mustard pieces to the line."

While Americans continue to be concerned with health and nutrition, they are not willing to sacrifice good flavor when it comes to snack foods.

Thomas notes that recently, in a Food Marketing Institute survey, nutrition took a back seat to taste in terms of what consumers considered important. Pretzels will continue to be popular, because they offer the best of both worlds.

In response to the rising purchasing power of children, Herr's will soon be coming out with a pretzel in the shape of the company's mascot, Chipper the chipmunk.

### Corn Snacks

Although corn chips were not marketed in the United States until 1932, crude versions of today's corn and tortilla chips were being pounded out by Mexicans in 5000 B.C.

While all corn items, including cheese curls and corn chips, are popular now, tortilla chips are the runaway favorite. Again, this trend is attributed to Americans' love for all things ethnic—especially Mexican food. The Mexican trend began in the early 90s and in 1992 alone, consumers bought nearly \$2.2 billion worth of Mexican packaged foods.

Herr's sees the ethnic craze carrying well into the future and plans to introduce Southwestern Ranch tortilla chips this month.

But Bart backers came out in force. And so did Bart. In February, he offered some advice for parents who didn't want the name: Relax. It could be worse.

"At least they didn't call it Beavis & Butt-head Elementary," the spiky-haired troublemaker said in a statement printed by The Greenville News.

## Hints from Heloise

Dear Readers: Income tax season is upon us and April 15 is the deadline that most of us dread! If you prepare your own return, here are a few hints to try to help reduce your stress and errors.

Collect all W-2's, applicable interest statements and records/receipts if you are itemizing before beginning the return. Also, go over your W-2 and make sure all the information is correct. If there is an error, no one but your employer can change it.

The tax form booklet you receive in the mail may not include every form you need, but your local IRS office will have them available. Also some post offices, banks and libraries have them.

Have plenty of sharp pencils with erasers, a scratch pad and calculator handy.

Choose a time to do your tax work when you will have no interruptions. When completed, set it aside and rest your eyes a while (or even a day), then go back over it and check for any errors. Run a tape or add the numbers at least twice or three times for good measure.

Be sure and sign and date the tax return. Attach appropriate W-2's to the front of the tax return and put any schedules and forms to the back of the return, in sequence number order (each form has a sequence number in the upper right-hand corner).

Never send original tax receipts. Always make copies to include. Also, if you owe money, be sure to include your payment with the return.

Thank goodness tax season only comes once a year! — Heloise

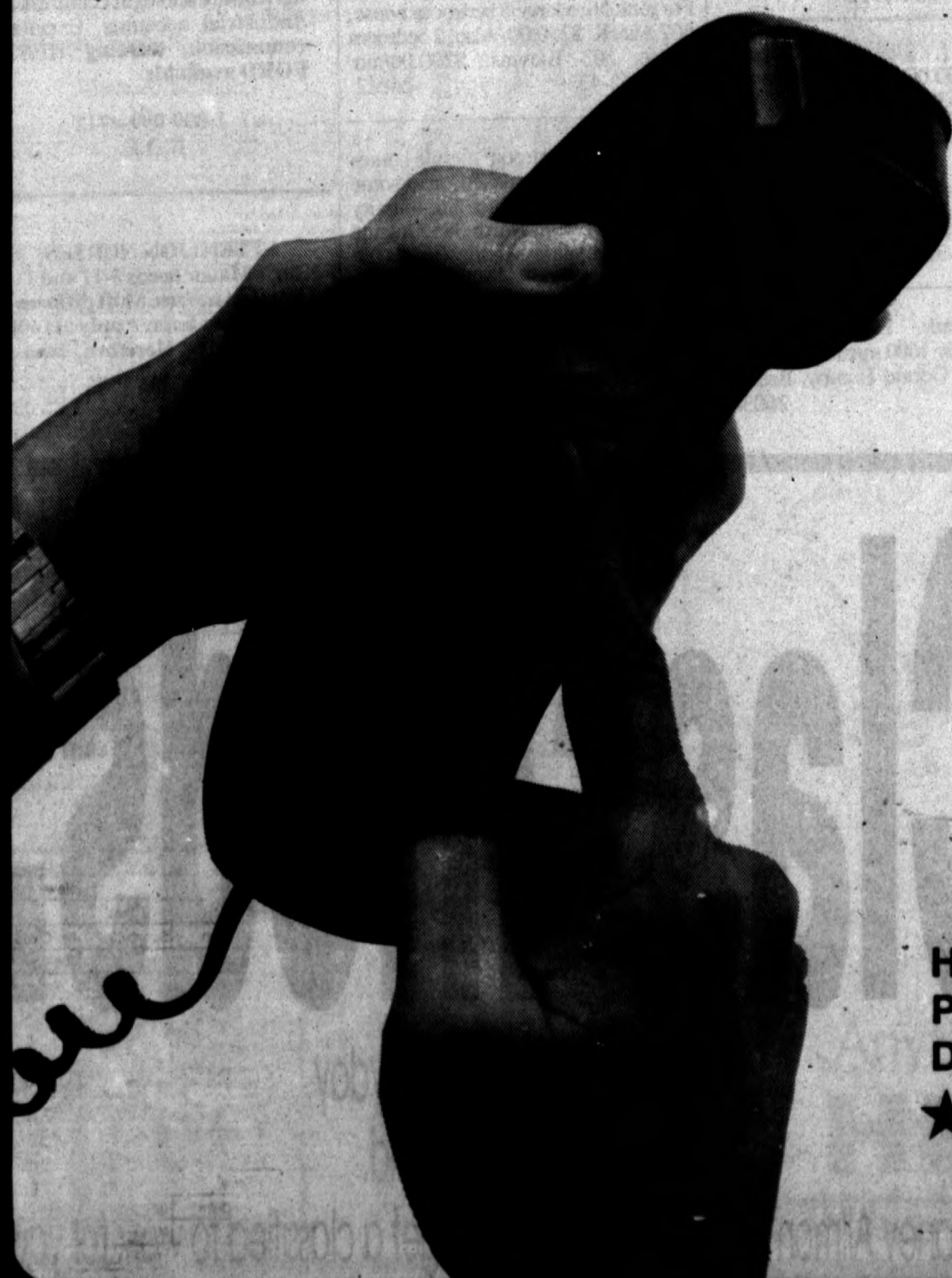

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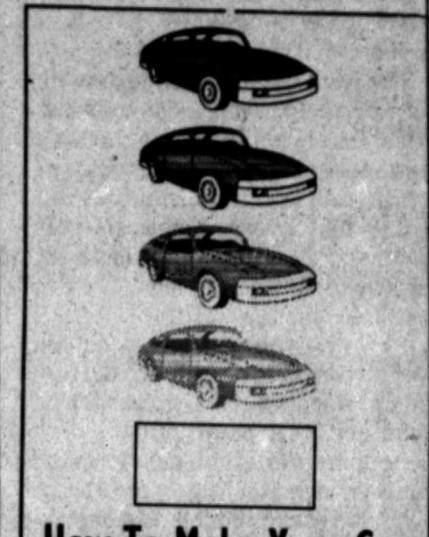

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# House continues work on various crime bills

WASHINGTON (AP) - The House Judiciary Committee defeated an effort to let aged, harmless prisoners go free as it labored over a measure that would impose life sentences without parole on some three-time

losers. The action came the same day it was revealed that the federal judges told Congress that they oppose key portions of the Senate-passed crime bill, including mandatory minimum sentences such as that included in the "three strikes and you're out"

measures. The House committee was to continue work today on a three-strikes measure and numerous other crime bills that, if passed by the full House, would be worked out in conference with the Senate. The Senate's three-strikes measure

would impose life sentences for any three violent or serious drug-related crimes. The House committee version would require that the third felony strike - the one triggering a life sentence - be a violent crime. In addition, one of the other two strikes must be a violent crime in the House bill.

The committee Wednesday rejected a bid to eliminate drug felonies entirely but limited the drug crimes that qualify to those involving a specific minimum amount of drugs, such as 50 grams of crack cocaine. Qualifying crimes would be those that now carry 10-year mandatory minimum sentences.

By a 21-14 vote, the panel rejected an amendment to let the federal Bureau of Prisons ask a court to free a three-strikes prisoner who had served 25 years of a life sentence, was at least 60 and posed no threat to anybody.

# Demos, GOP heckle each other on health reform bill

WASHINGTON (AP) - The term "Oxford-style debate" doesn't quite capture what transpired on the floor of the House. Democrats and Republicans staged a forensic food fight, hectoring, heckling and haranguing each other over health reform.

It was part drama, part farce, with lawmakers' blustering and bullying for nearly two hours over whose health plan posed a bigger threat to the republic. The Republicans repeatedly played their trump card, citing chapter and verse from the 1,342-page Clinton health plan. They called it a recipe for health care rationing and an impending calamity for small business.

"We ought to quit lying to ourselves about the power of government to play King Canute and tell the waves to stop coming in," House Minority Whip Newt Gingrich said. The debate - an experiment to get away from scripts and encourage unfettered exchanges in Congress - got personal.

The Justice Department, he noted, opposes anything less than life without parole. Meanwhile, the chairwoman of the U.S. Judicial Conference's committee on criminal law told Brooks that the judiciary opposes mandatory minimum sentences, including "mandatory life sentences for persons convicted of a third felony offense."

U.S. District Judge Maryann Trump Barry of Newark, N.J., also criticized a Senate crime bill provision making federal crimes out of thousands of gun-related infractions "that have traditionally and properly been prosecuted by the states."

The committee also approved measures that would: -- Allow a victim of violent crime and sex abuse to speak or present evidence during the sentencing phase of the assailant's trial. -- Ensure that child assault victims need not suffer permanent injury for an assailant to be convicted of a felony.

"I know you want us to defend every word on every page of the bill. That's fine, that's a great debate technique," Gephardt said. Four of the eight debaters had spent the day battling in the House Ways and Means health subcommittee over a modified version of the Clinton health bill.

The chairman, Rep. Pete Stark, D-Calif., infuriated Republicans there by suggesting that Rep. Nancy Johnson, R-Conn., acquired her health care expertise through "pillow talk." Johnson is married to a doctor. Stark later apologized. He prefaced one exchange with Johnson during the debate by saying, "The gentle lady's expertise is known far and wide in the medical

area." "And I earned it on my own," Johnson said. When Johnson lit into restricted coverage of mammograms in the Clinton plan, Stark demanded to know why she voted against more liberal benefits in his bill. "Did you say you wanted mammograms or not?" he asked.

Stark and Rep. Henry Waxman, D-Calif., mixed it up with Rep. Thomas Bliley, R-Va., and Rep. Bill Thomas, R-Calif., while the two congresswomen from Connecticut went toe to toe. "I won't support a plan that doesn't help small business," said DeLauro.

"Don't you go home?" asked Johnson. "Small businesses tell me they're barely surviving." The Democrats' cheering section dwindled from 12 to five, as the debate raged on.

Both sides seemed pleased with the results of the debate, broadcast by C-SPAN and National Public Radio. And callers gave it high grades for drama and excitement. "We have to remember the House of Representatives is really a substitute for violence," Gephardt summed it up on a postmortem on C-SPAN.
