RAIN AND HAIL!

PLANTING OF ROW CROPS TO START: 5 INCHES FALL AT FRIONA

Rain and hail swept down on Hereford out of the northwest yesterday afternoon, bringing an estimated two and one-half inches of moisture and doing considerable damage. A vericonsiderable damage. A table cloudburst, the storm halfed traffic for a short time as automobiles were drowned out and streets flooded.

The downpour apparently was centered around Hereford, although Black reported about an equal amount of moisture. The rain gauge at the First National Bank registered only 1.6 inches, but it probably was stopped up by hailstones during the heaviest fall. Gauges on the soil conservation project west of Hereford varied from 1.5 to 1.75 inches, with workers estimating the hallstorm as considerably lighter than here.

Highway 60 through Hereford and numerous streets were flooded by a foot or more of water. Leaves and limbs were beaten off trees and small plants were crushed. Although no glass broken by the hailstones was reported, tops were said to have been pounded full of holes on several cars caught in the storm, and several electric signs in the business section were damaged. Communities as near as Friona and Vega had only light showers. The storm apparently extended to the southeast where no reports were available this morning. .

Varying from a steady down-pour that brought great benefit to farmers to a cloudburst that all but flooded the Friona section, the entire Hereford territory received life-giving moisture Monday night, the first rain this year in sufficient quantity to provide good seasoning.

The rain came out of the west late in the afternoon, flooding the western section of the area, and then passed over, only to return Monday night with a steady fall that lasted several hours.

To Rush Planting. Since farmers have waited for just such seasoning before starting the planting of row crops, the work was expected to be in full swing this week end. Row crop planting is expected to be heavy





About Pension

This is the first of a series of questions that the people of Texas are asking. Orville S. Carpenter, state pension director, answers them frankly and to the point:

Q-Why cannot assistance paid to every person in Texas who is 65 years of age or older?

A-First, because the Texas law says that assistance may be paid only to those "in need"; second, because the Federal Government position of guard in the Tucumcari, will not allow us to pay Federal money to people who are not in ow, with def

Q-Will not Federal money mean

a lot to Texas? A-Yes. It will mean that sev eral millions of dollars each year will be given to the aged people of Texas that they would not otherwise get; it will mean that with it a person will be able to receive as much as \$30 a month, and without it no one could get more than \$15 a month.

Q-What does the Federal law say about "need"?

A-It says that the Federal ap propriation is made for the purpose of enabling states to assist "aged needy individuals." (Sec. 1.) O-Was this "aged needy individuals" question checked?

A-The Social Security Board stated that this was the correct interpretation of the law.

Q-How does the Texas definition of "needy" compare with that of other states?

A-Texas has the most libera definition of "aged needy individuals" in the United States. The Texas law is more liberal on this point than that of any other state in the Union.




