The last week in August this land is planted in wheat, which is done on the level land with a Dempster drill and on the land having more slope with a three row lister to which a planter box has been attached. A crooked metal tube forces the seed against the under part of the plow point, which spreads the seed over a space of approximately 12 inches. One small disc on each side spaced about 14 inches apart is used to cover the seed. Two five-inch wheels four inches apart are used to pack the seed bed.

The remaining land is prepared for wheat the following way: After the wheat is combined, it is one-wayed. If necessary the rod weeder is used between this preparation and seeding time. The two methods of planting described above are also used in seeding this wheat, the Dempster drill on the nearly level land and a three-row lister on the more rolling land, this also being planted in 36-inch rows on the general contour. Nothing more is done to any of the wheat until the blowing season is over in the spring. Then the wheat is cultivated. This is done by the use of a disc, rod weeder and an A harrow. The first two cultivations are done by either the rod weeder or disc, the disc being run almost straight. A little later a 21-foot A harrow is pulled across the ridges to level the ground in order to make it easy for combining.

Mr. Jennings states that he has observed that a half inch rain will do his wheat as much good the way he produces it as an inch rain to the average farm. He has lost only approximately 10 acres of wheat this spring, which was located on the southwest corner of his farm. This was covered up by topsoil blowing from adjacent farms.

I recently saw his wheat and feel sure that he has a very promising prospect of a wheat crop this year should he receive an inch or two of rain within ten days or two weeks. The only wheat that I observed anywhere in the neighborhood is located three miles south of Mr. Jennings' farm, and this is a quarter section of wheat that has been summer fallowed for the past two years.

It would certainly be worth while for any farmer to go out and inspect Mr. Jennings' wheat, observe his equipment and talk to him about his methods.

The moisture conditions for the last two seasons were favorable for Mr. Jennings to plant his wheat and get a good stand. It may be in the future if moisture conditions, as of the first of September are not sufficient to insure a good stand, Mr. Jennings will find it advisable to delay his planting until sufficient moisture is available.

Many successful wheat farmers of this area practice the planting of wheat any time after the first of September when moisture conditions are favorable.
