(Continued from page one) The last week in August this land is planted in wheat, which is done on the level land with a Dempster drill and on the land having more slope with a three row lister to which a planter box has been attached. A crooked metal tube forces the seed against the under part of the plow point, which spreads the seed over a space of approximately 12 inches. One small disc on each side spaced about 14 inches apart is used to cover the seed. Two five-inch wheels four inches apart are used to pack the seed bed.
