WING AT CENTRAL TO BE READY

Hereford schools will op Monday, September 7, the date set last spring for the opening of the 1936-37 term. School authorities have been assured by contractors that work at Central school will be sufficie complete to permit the use of the main building, the east wing and all of the plumb-ing in the entire building. With that much of the building avail-able for use, school can be open-ed with little disturbance or interference because of building operations, Superintendent C. H. Dillehay stated.

High school students may begin enrolling on Friday, August 14, at 10 o'clock. The office will be open practically every day thereafte from 10 until 12 o'clock and from 2 until 4 o'clock in the aftern except on Monday, August 17. Mr. Dillehay said that since these hours have been set for the accommodation of students, they will be expected to arrange to enroll the time indicated. "Please do not ask to be enrolled before or after the hours named," he said, "for those who assist with the enrollment must have free time for other matters." Parents are children when they enroll.

Graduation Requirements. Subjects and units required for graduation are: English, four units; history, two or three units, including American History; chemistry or physics; one other science (for which agriculture or home first year algebra, plane geometry. and civics. 



KNOWS HOW TO VOTE

Strange as it may seem to those who are familiar with the mysteries of the ballot, there are a few people in Deaf Smith county who evidently do not understand how they should go about making their ballot choices. This was indicated in the recent primary election.

A few ballots were incorrectly marked. Some placed check mark beside the name of the candidate they wished to support. At least one person scratched only one name in each race, leaving in some instances as many as half a dozen unscratched candidates. Of course, these ballots could not be countd. However, in the latter case, when one name was scratched in a two-man race, it was evident from the remainder of the ballot that the person wished to vote for that candidate. But the election judges had no choice in the matter and were forced to award the vote to the other candidate.

Always clearly mark out those candidates to whom you are opposed, leaving untouched only those (one in each race) whom you wish to support.

NO PROVISION FOR DEFENDANTS

Because so many inquiries have been addressed to the regional office of the Social Security Board at San Antonio from mothers with dependent children, relatives and friends of crippled children and the blind, the unemployed and many who are in need but have not yet reached the age of 65, the following statement has been issued for their information:

Until Texas passes the necessary legislation and has its several plans approved by the Social Security Board, it is not possible for the blind, dependent children to receive Federal aid, and the unemployed to receive compensation provided for under the terms of the Social Security Act. Texas has qualified for old age assistance only, and those who are 65 and over who wish to make application for assistance under the Social Security Act should apply directly to Orville S. Carpenter, executive director, Texas Old Age Assistance Commission, at Austin, and not to the regnional office.

A JOINT RESOLUTION proposing an Amendment to the Constitution authorizing the Leg-islature to provide for Work-men's Compensation Insurance for employees of the State, and au-thorizing the Legislature to provide for the payment of premiums on such policies of insurance; providing the State shall never be required to purchase insurance for any employees; providing for the necessary publication and election; making an appropriation to

pay for same.

Be It Resolved By the Legislature of the State of Texas:

Section 1. That Article 3 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new Section to be known as Section 10 read as follows:

tion 59, to read as follows:
"Section 59. The Legislature shall have power to pass such laws as may be necessary to pro-vide for Workmen's Compensation Insurance for such State employees, laws as may be necessary to provide for Workmen's Compensation Insurance for such State employees, as in its judgment is necessary or required; and to provide for the payment of all costs, charges, and premiums on such policies of insurance; providing the State shall never he required to purchase insurance for any employee."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1936, at which election all voters favoring said proposed Amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the words:

"For the Amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide for the payment of Workmen's Compensation Insurance for employees of the State."

And all those opposed shall write or have printed on their ballots the words:

"Against the Amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide for the payment of Workmen's Compensation Insurance for employees of the State."

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have same published as required by the Constitution for Amendments.

Sec. 4. The sum of Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000) or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the Treasury of the State, not otherwise appropriated, to pay the expenses of such publication and election.


