Civic Center Still Short By \$14,000

With donations and pledges still coming in, Deaf Smith County residents still lack about \$14,000 in making payment in full for construction costs of Hereford Community Center, which is nearing completion at the corner of Park and Ave. C.

Therefore, in order to pay the contractor when building is completed, the city will need to borrow the deficient amount before taking possession of the Center, according to City Manager Dudley Bayne.

Bayne explained this week that Killingsworth Construction Company of Dimmitt must be paid in full when work is completed, but that county residents will be expected to pay the city for the amount borrowed by continuing to make donations and pledges toward the community project.

The Convention at that time numbered 2 1/2 million members. To date, funds recorded for the project include \$60,000 from the Jim Hill Estate and \$34,000 from residents in donations and promised pledges.

Total cost of construction is about \$108,000. Having raised \$94,000 of the amount, county residents therefore are obligated to raise about \$14,000. There will be no future formal drive in the city, Bayne pointed out, and said that various organizations and individuals will make up the balance.

Furniture already in the Center includes 100 folding chairs and 20 folding tables, which were recently approved at a meeting of Hereford City Commission.

Bayne plans to go to Dallas soon and purchase other furniture. Plans are to purchase Danish-modern furnishings. Work on the Center started last May after Killingsworth (Continued on Page 3)

Beauty At Home

Q. Please suggest some things I can do about dandruff on my scalp.

A. Your hair and scalp need more frequent washings -- at least two or three times weekly. Liquid hair tonic, especially for this purpose, will help -- also a conditioning oil or cream when you wash your hair. Take special precautions against leaning your head against the backs of public seats; don't try on other persons' hats; don't lend or borrow a comb; shampoo your head after shopping for a hat; clear the inside of your hat if your head perspires.

Q. What is an easy way of removing ink stains from the fingers?

A. Dip an old toothbrush or a nailbrush into vinegar and then into salt, and scrub the stains until they disappear.

Q. What makeup treatment will help to counteract a receding forehead?

A. By using a lighter shade of foundation on the forehead, so that the lower part of the face appears darker, the forehead will be highlighted into greater prominence.

Q. How can I with my make-up, disguise the bags or puffs under my eyes?

A. Use a darker shade of foundation base on the puffs to absorb the light, then apply a highlight base on the rim just under the puffs. This heightens the illusion of smoothness between the two. Pat the colors together gently and smoothly.

Q. The skin on my back and shoulders seems to have acquired a nice crop of blackheads. Please tell me what I can do about this condition.

A. Evidently you haven't been cleansing these areas properly -- with a brush! Soak the back and shoulders in cream or oil for a half-hour or so, then give the skin frequent scrubbing with a stiff brush and soapy water. Make this a regular habit.

Q. It is really necessary, for beauty's sake, to wear colored fingernail polish, or any kind of polish for that matter?

A. Not at all. Many women look beautiful with natural fingernails buffed to a good polish with nail powder.

Q. How can I choose the kind of rouge that is for me?

A. Try pinching your cheeks in order to discover your correct color tone, then choose your rouge accordingly. There are three types of reds: natural, blue-red, and yellow-red. Experts seem to agree that the cream rouge blended into your powder base gives a more lasting and realistic effect than powdered rouge applied on top.

Q. Can you tell me an easy way to make my naturally dark hair even darker without actually resorting to dye?

A. Olive oil, massaged nightly into the hair and scalp for several weeks, will do this.

Q. What is a good waist-slimming exercise?

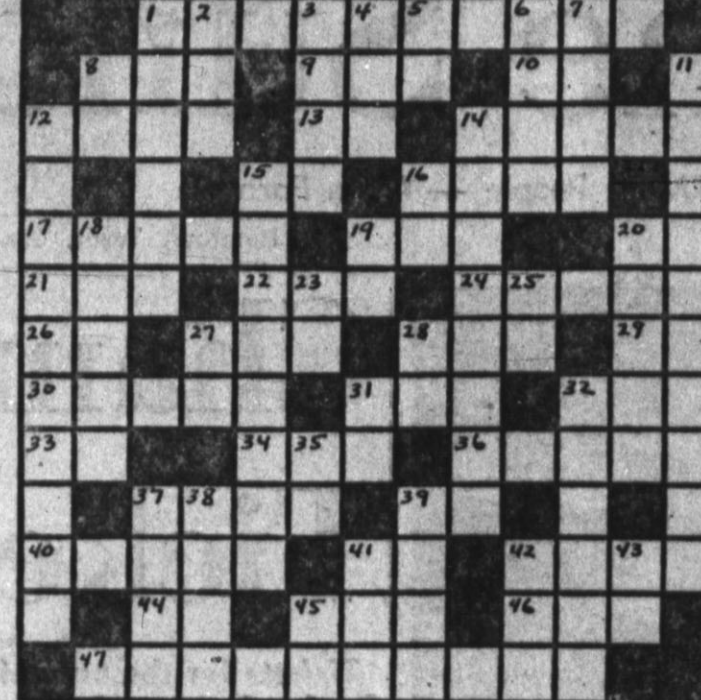
A. Stand tall, stretching hands high overhead, fingers touching. Keep your feet fairly far apart so you'll have a firm foothold. With hands still lifted, pivot at the waistline, turning the body from side to side, stretching arms as high as you can. It's a wonderful pulling effect that this exercise has on your waistline which does the trick.

teered to do the mural for the Umbarger Catholic church. As an officer, he was not required to work.
Bareheaded and armed with a small camera, Di Bello said little as he walked along the disintegrating paved roads, snapping pictures of rubble and the tall, concrete water tower. Occasionally, he would point to a spot in a wheat field and comment on a building which used to stand there.

One incident he recalled was when three fellow officers laboriously dug an 80 - yard tunnel, only to have the guards find it hours before they would have broken out.

In hesitant English, Mrs. Di Bello said her husband was having to study very hard in his classes, which left no time for painting. The Army Command and General Staff College is a year - long advanced training course for officers of field - grade rank, majors and colonels. Each year the college accepts a limited number of officers from foreign countries for advanced studies.

"Right now, I know more about the American Army than I do the Italian," Major Di Bello smiled.

One of his proudest moments came when he translated for then - General Dwight D. Eisenhower during a visit of the SHAPE Commander to Di Bello's armored infantry regiment. Di Bello also speaks faultless English.
He said he talked so much about Texas at the War College that his classmates had nicknamed him "Tex."

One of Pal Artho's sons, Willie, didn't remember Di Bello Wednesday except as one of several Italians who visited the school one day and sang. Their musical selection certainly was no accident. They sang a popular song of the day, "Don't fence Me In."

"We used to hear a train come by at night. It always whistled for a crossing near the camp. We used to tell each other we would be on that train some day. Then, in January of 1946, we got on the train and went to the West Coast, through the Panama Canal and home." Di Bello's eyes were thoughtful as he spoke.

Quietly, he ducked under a fence and walked across a field green with winter wheat to the small chapel that silently marked the former gravesite for five prisoners who died in camp. It was the end of his "sentimental journey".

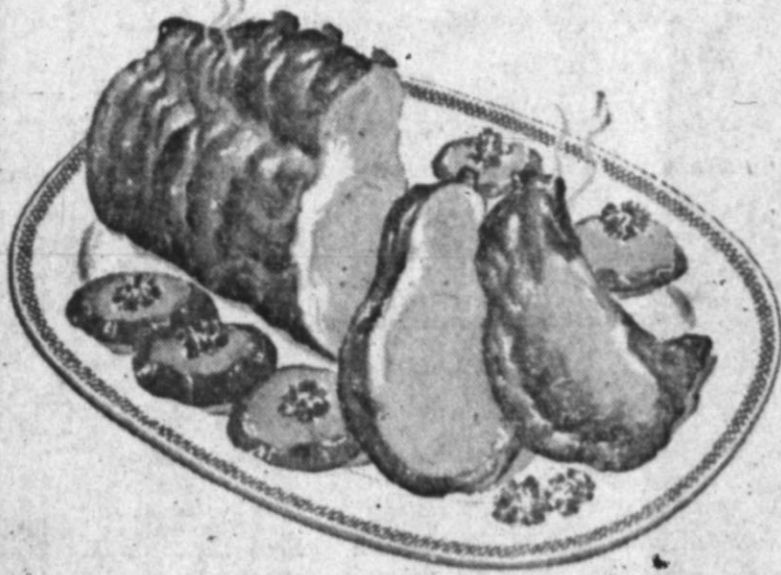

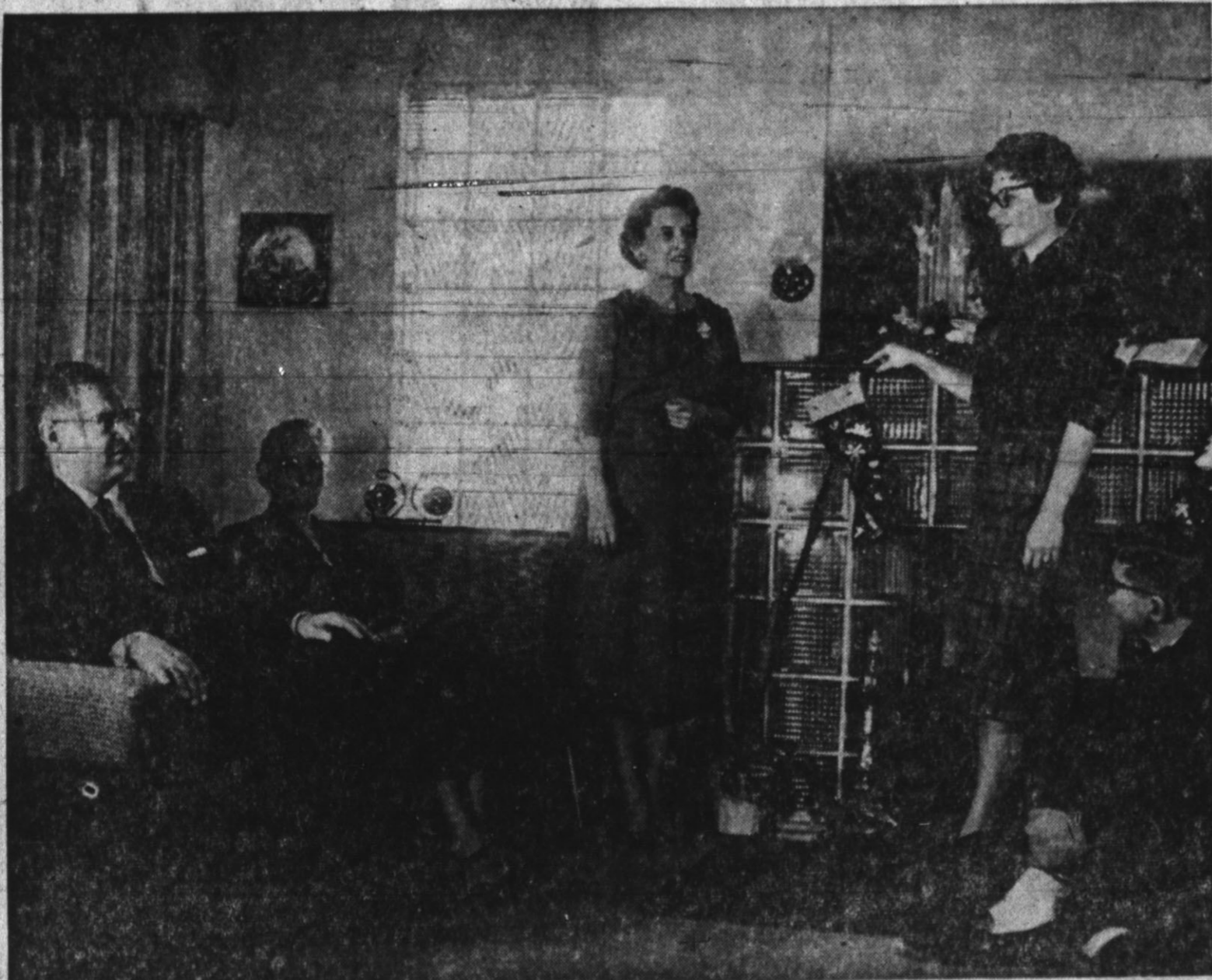

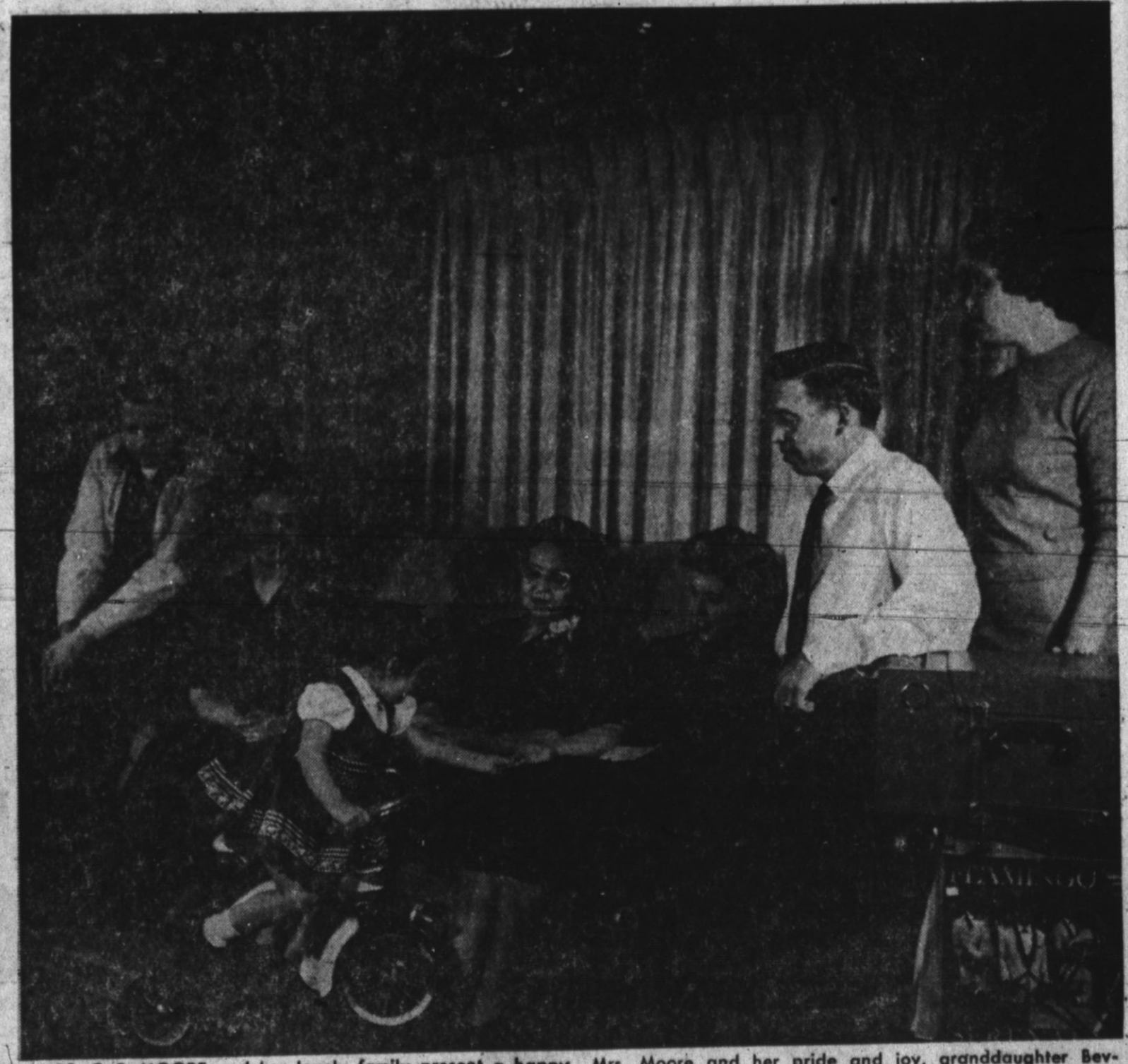

Color Slides Sell Original Paintings

By CARL BELL

PHOENIX, Ariz. — Now you can shop for original paintings in your own home.

Or, without moving from your easy chair, you can look at the works of American artists for pure pleasure, with no intention of buying.

Until recently, art had been presented and sold only through galleries. Most galleries are in large cities; and the market has been restricted further because a painting may be shown in only one gallery at a time.

But a new organization of painters — America's Artists in Particular, with headquarters in Phoenix — is using a modern merchandising method which makes it possible for a painting to be seen anywhere at any time.

Artists in Particular offers color slides of its members' works to the general public on a loan basis. A study of the slides or projections of the slides, along with accompanying descriptive material and price lists, gives a prospective buyer almost the advantage of seeing the originals in a gallery.

An original, when selected, may be purchased by mail.

On a screen — or even a flat wall — projections of the slides look amazingly like original paintings and may be enlarged for even more detailed study.

The coloring in the projection is true. Detail is sharp. Slides also may be studied through a viewer without the necessity of a projector.

A collection of 25 to 50 slides may be ordered for one dollar, to cover handling and mailing expense. Member artists seek to make money from the sale of originals, not from the slide collections, which must be returned.

The operation of Artists in Particular is applauded by artists, collectors and gallery owners alike.

"I am excited about this new opportunity to show my work in all regions of America," says additional painter - serigrapher Mark Coomer.

Although I am now represented by some fine regional galleries, I believe this plan will not only aid the galleries in their aims, but also many fine artists by having their

work appreciated in more homes and offices."

Clinton Hill, a nationally respected painter of moderns, describes the mail order method as a "means by which people

can become more easily exposed to art and learn by familiarization."

Billy Pearson, the jockey who earned television fame (and money) as an art collector and historian, said Artists in Particular represents "a completely new and original idea — art to be lived rather than looked at. At long last, art is being brought into many more homes across America."

Commercial artist - painter Frank Holt says, "It's the first major idea yet that will allow

the artist to reach the public with his original works."

Warren Brandon, co-founder of the Artists Cooperative of San Francisco, one of the Bay City's leading galleries, says Artists in Particular promises to support the artist "both financially and socially with the dignity he so well deserves."

Bill O'Brien, owner of a gallery founded in Chicago by his grandfather in 1855 and recently moved to Scottsdale, Ariz., says, "This movement will increase the active interest of the

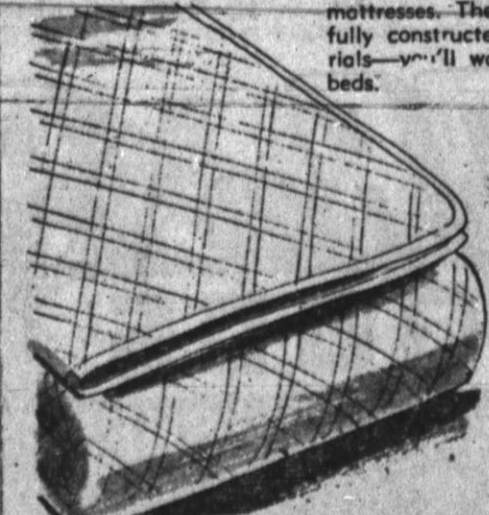

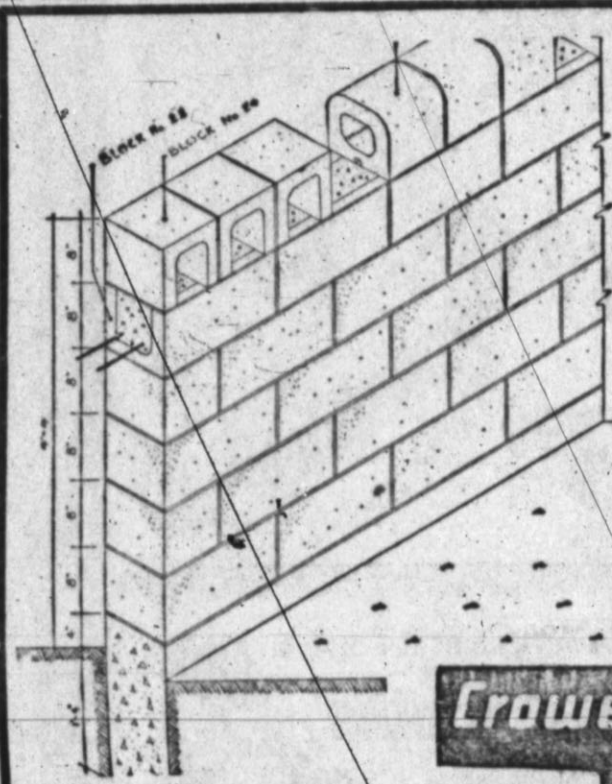

rescue with a heper — hormone lotions and creams.

What, you ask, does hormones do for the skin? Let me explain. Under the outer skin lies a layer of tissue which is very elastic and keeps the outer skin smooth and firm. When there is a shortage of hormones, this layer of tissue begins to shrink and shrivel. Soon its covering, the skin, begins to show tiny lines and in time will deepen into wrinkles, and when those wrinkles have formed there isn't much that can be done about it. Creams and lotions will help, but the wrinkles will still be there.

Girls, begin early; it is much easier to feed that tissue before it is starved, and also when it is fed the hormones it needs it takes much longer for the lines to deepen into wrinkles. If your skin is very, very dry, perhaps you will like creams best; but if you have normal skin, the lotion will suit better and is not messy to use. Let me give you a little tip — do not be too lavish with the creams or the lotions, for the skin can only absorb so many hormones and the rest is thrown off and wasted. The directions should tell you how much to use for a minimum of hormones for daily use, follow directions carefully and you cannot go wrong.

Now for the rough skin. There are packs and packs. Some make the face feel as if it was encased in granite and turns the skin very red; others are not so harsh, remain soft and creamy although left on for as much as half an hour and must be removed by scraping with a dull edge or tissues.

Both seem to have the same results, but the soft one does not redden skin and can be used and be ready for the public in minutes, while the hard pack keeps the skin red for some time. Never massage the skin of your face and neck heavily and always use an up and out motion as gravity pulls down so try to give a lift instead of a pull.

The abrasive soap is fine for adults as well as teenagers. It will remove roughness caused by chapping and being out in the weather or in a room that is too warm. Try it, remembering to rub lightly and to rinse well and follow with an emollient if your skin is the least bit dry. It will amaze you.

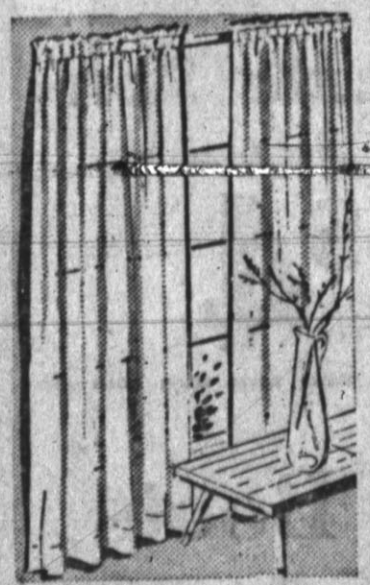


