ember, 437; and January, 412. "We are not trying to provide anything extra comfortable or extra luxurious in the new jail," Skelton emphasized, "The only difference will be in having enough room for our prisoners now and in the

future." The present jail is not too secure, Skelton admitted, and there are no provisions for isolating dangerous prisoners, females, first offenders or juveniles. "Occasionally, we have had to release juveniles that should have been confined because we had no place to put them,'

Skelton pointed out.

Nor is there a place for insane persons, which are capable of harming themselves or other prisoners. Such cases are handled two or three times each

New jail laws state that cells for such persons must contain a minimum of 40 square feet, with a soft covering on the floor and walls. A hammock, instead of a bunk, also is required.

Other provisions, under the new law, provide that witnesses confined while waiting to appear be segregated from all other prisoners; that males be separate from females, juveniles from adults; first offenders, awaiting trial, from all classifications of convicted prisoners; and prisoners with contageous or communicable diseases from all other types of prisoners.

The law also specifies that individual, one-person cells must be provided for at least 30 per cent of the total jail capacity and that not more than 40 per cent of the capacity be in dormitory-type accommodations. The present jail is exclusively of the dormitory-type confine- ed for secretarial work. ment, with provisions for six

eight in another. Also included in the new law are provisions outlining the type of security arrangements which must be included, Most, but not all, of these are incorporated in the present jail.

Such items as sanitary arrangements, number of water night. closets, lavatories, showers, are all incorporated in the new jail law. Most of these requirements are met, at least technically, in the present jail.



Rooks has few equals in the profession he still proudly plies with the accuracy and rhythm of grew, and then he was billed the precision watches hanging above the cluttered workbench he has bent over for three score

Not only has he worked on something like a quarter of a million watches since moving to Troup in 1898, but for the past 30 years Rooks has also been responsible for thousands of "on time" railroad schedules.

Rooks is watch inspector for the northern Palestine division of the Missouri Pacific Railroad, East Texas operations several years ago.

There are 446 railroad men in the division and Rooks cleans their watches at least once each 18 months and makes all re-

The white-headed watchmaker doesn't hold with modern repairing machines and methods, claiming "they just don't do the work. "All railroad watches are

hand cleaned. You have to clean all pivot holes with peg wood (soft, pithless wood). It doesn't hurt the jewels and

is the only way you can really get a watch clean," Rooks claims.

Neither does the craftsman rely on modern timing devices to adjust the timepieces he painstakingly mends. Instead he prefers to make adjustments by hand over a 10-day period. "The railroad only allows 15.
