## Community Center Completion Due This Week

### Yule Lighting Contest Deadline Now Thursday

Deadline and boundaries of the Christmas Home Decorating contest were extended this week, according to an announcement by Mrs. Gerald Wilson, contest chairman.

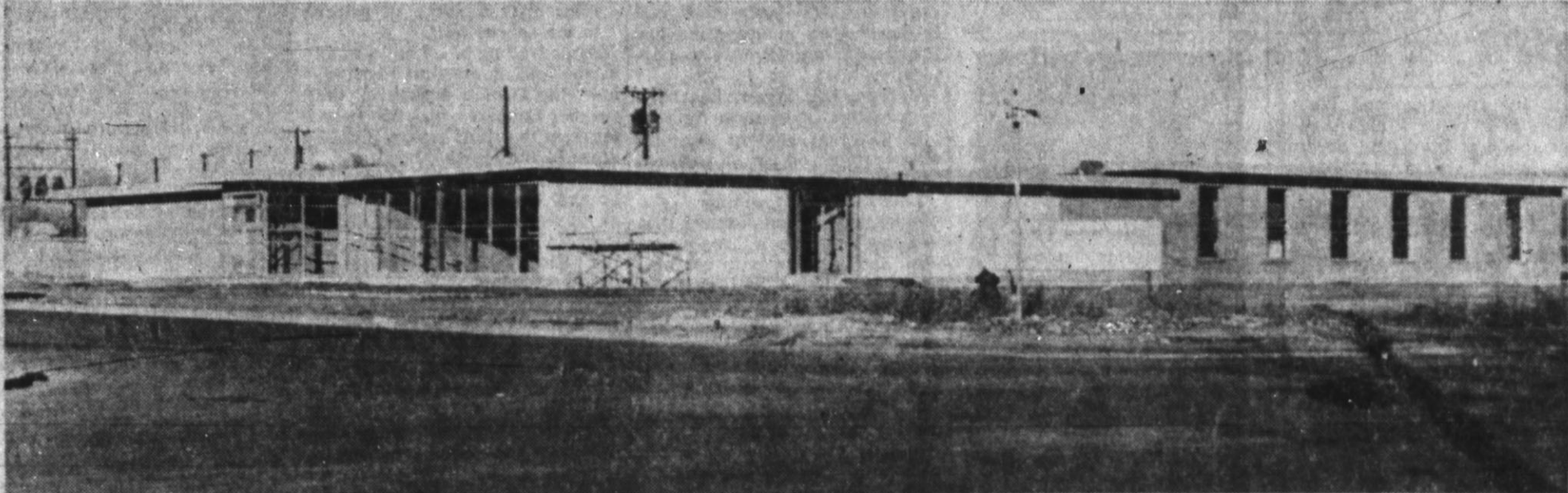
The revisions provided an entry deadline extension to 5 p. m. Thursday, Dec. 17, and a boundary extension to homes within a three-mile radius of Hereford, provided homes are located on paved roads.

Friday evening only one entry had been received in the annual contest, which this year offers \$350 in prizes. Mrs. Wilson, however, said many others had indicated intent to enter the competition. Three prizes, \$100, \$50, and \$25 will be given

in each of two classifications, Christmas spirit and Religious motif.

"Because the purpose of the contest, to stimulate the decorating of many Hereford homes during the Christmas season, would not be served unless there are a number of entries," Mrs. Wilson said, "the committee of businessmen furnishing the prize money felt that a minimum of six entries in each division would be required to justify the expenditure of such a sum for prize money."

Contest entries will be judged by a group of out-of-town judges on Friday night, Dec. 18.

Except for a few finishing touches, the new Hereford Community Center should be completed this week, according to an announcement issued by City Manager Dudley Bayne.

Finishing work on the \$107,400 project will culminate a year-old dream of youth and adult residents of Deaf Smith County.

The spacious community project went from the drawing board to reality just last May after city officials and building contractor Woodrow Killingsworth broke ground on the site at the corner of Park and Ave. C.

Work continued feverishly the past week in an effort to get jobs in final stages inside the 153 by 108-foot "L" shaped building. The concrete block and brick structure houses the latest in architectural design with modern lighting and heating units. Large glass doors and huge windows highlight features.

Built on a low-profile design, the fireproof building was constructed to take the normal scuffing of youth but to retain the beauty of a new building for years.

"Everybody should be proud of the new Center," said Bayne. "Although there was a cut of more than \$20,000 from original plans, no expense has been spared to have the finest materials go into construction." (Continued on page 2)

### New Telephone Books On Hand

The new Hereford telephone directories will be mailed Tuesday, Dec. 15, to subscribers here, according to an announcement made by Al Leach, manager for Southwestern Bell Telephone Company.

This year's directory has a buff cover and contains 23 "white" or alphabetical pages with approximately 3550 listings. The classified section or "yellow pages" contain 124 pages.

According to Leach, 6185 directories have been printed for distribution to telephone customers here. He also mentioned extra copies were printed as replacements for those used in public telephone booths and other places where much use occurs.

Names of persons who had telephones as of Nov. 18 will be included in the new book.

Old directories should be discarded as soon as the new issue arrives, Leach advised, but he cautioned phone users against throwing the old one away before off-used and out-of-town numbers are copied.

### Forecast A Delay Until April Or May On Widening Of Highway 60 In City

Widening of U. S. Highway 60 inside the Hereford city limits might not get underway until next April or May, a group of Hereford businessmen were told Friday.

Speaking at a special meeting, Charles W. "Chili" Smith said that if plans were submitted for approval within the next month, it probably would be at least April before work would start. Earlier it had been thought the job could start in January or February.

Called by the Tourist and Convention Committee of the meeting was designed to explain to those involved how the project would be handled, what it would do and how long it would take.

Smith told the 40 persons attending that plans were completed and money appropriated for the project, which would turn the highway into a four-lane divided road within the city limits.

Cost of the project will be about \$400,000, of which the city will pay \$60,000.

Only two items remain to be cleared up before the project starts, Smith said. First is approval from the main office of the Santa Fe Railroad to use railroad right-of-way for drainage. The other is a formal agreement between the City Commission and the Texas Highway Department.

"This project will take the best part of a year to complete," Smith confirmed. Extensive movement of utilities and installation of storm sewers are very time-consuming, he said.

"We will let traffic use that road as much as possible during construction," he added. At six times one or more crossings for north-south traffic will be left open. There will be chain saw cuts on both sides of the road, from the intersection with U.S. 385 east to Avenue K. Beyond that point, drainage will be by open channel. The road will be constructed in sections, so far as possible, Smith said.

Since the construction start, as outlined by Smith, would hit about the time wheat harvest begins, it would be possible to delay the construction, briefly. Smith said this could be requested by the City Commission, although he said such practices were discouraged.

### Hereford, Palo Duro Take Wins From Canyon, Dimmitt

Hereford won a nail-chewer from Canyon, 54-51, and Palo Duro of Amarillo romped over Dimmitt, 68-58, in Friday night games in the Hereford double-header.

Although the teams were playing pre-determined opponents, this put the winners, Hereford and Palo Duro, together at 8:30 p. m. Saturday, preceded by the Canyon-Dimmitt tilt at 7 p. m.

It took a determined effort for the Whitefaces to knock out Canyon, a team they had beat easily early in the season.

Trailing by four points, Hereford rallied in the closing seconds of the first period to gain a 13-13 tie. The lead changed hands four times in the second period before Canyon moved ahead and ran out the first half with a 29-28 margin.

Hereford gained two five-point leads early in the third quarter, only to see the Eagles

coming flying back. Three straight baskets by Jerry Richardson earned Canyon a 43-40 lead at the end of the third.

The score was tied once and the lead changed four times in a wild finale. Ronnie Botkins sparked the Herd's efforts as he bucketed eight points. Charlie Thomas hit a goal with three minutes left, as Hereford got in front to stay, 48-47. Botkins added two insurance points (Continued on page 2)

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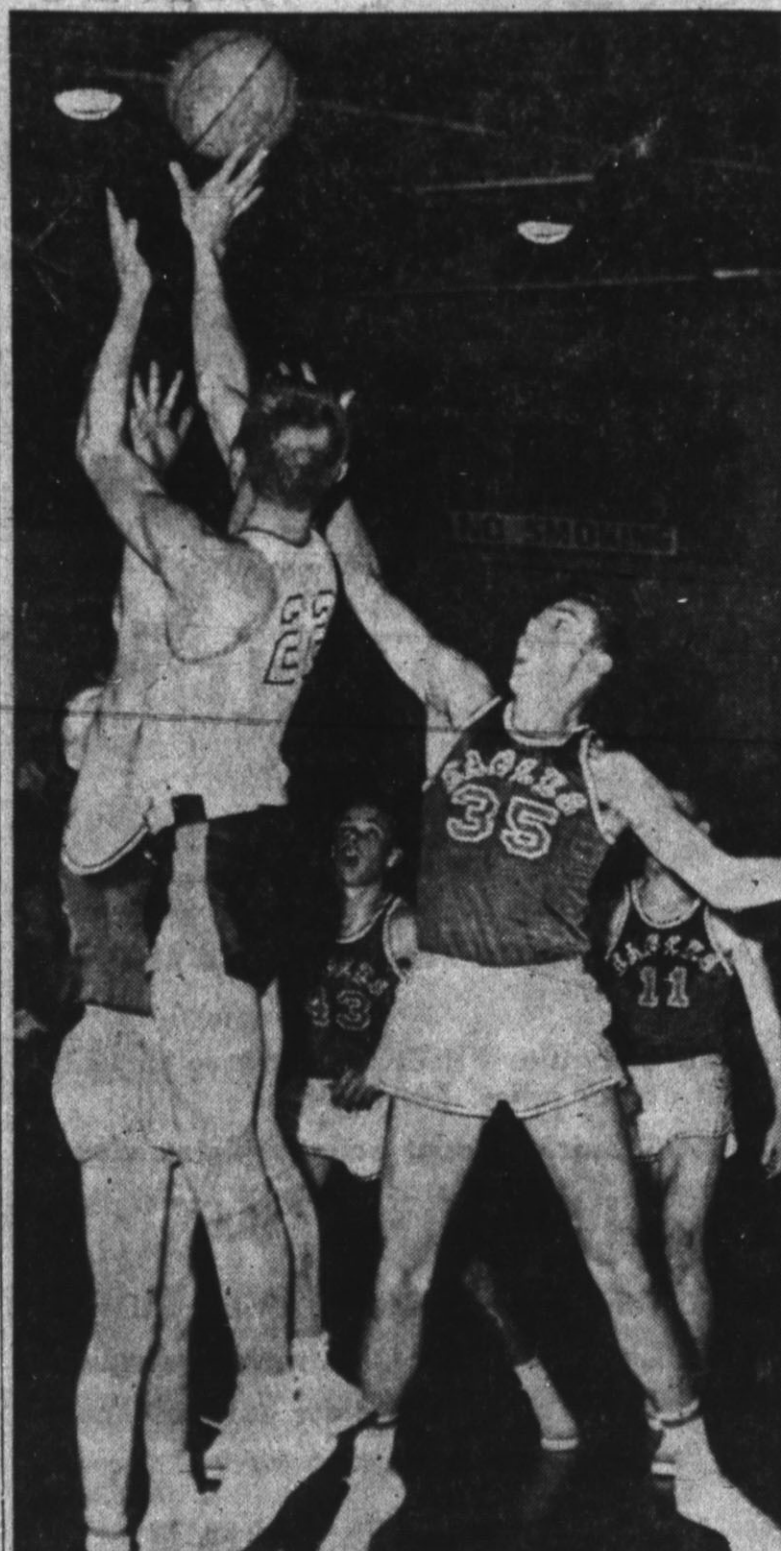

Other features of the building include heating and air conditioning fixtures in three zones, and the units may be operated separately or together.  
Most popular with the youth will be a 74 by 40-foot banquet and recreation room containing 18 30-inch globes for overhead lighting.  
Four meeting rooms will be open to any Hereford organization. The largest meeting room is 25 by 38-foot, and two smaller 24 by 18-foot rooms will be provided for groups. The smallest room is 14 by 17-foot and will take care of small group meetings adequately.  
A 45 by 25-foot lounge and reception room with floor-to-ceiling sliding glass doors leading to the patio will probably be used a great deal by craft

clubs. Adjacent to the lounge is a storage room for materials used by crafts and art clubs.  
Near the lounge room is a kitchenette for snacks. The small kitchen will provide a refrigerator, stove and sink combination.  
Adjacent to the banquet and recreation room is a huge kitchen with stainless steel sink. Appliances in the kitchen will include steam tables, refrigerator, stove, oven and a deep fryer.

Also connected to the banquet and recreation room is an office, which will also contain a phonograph and records.  
The building also contains two roomy tile bathrooms. A storage room is provided for folding chairs and tables when not in use.

In the reception and lounge room is a waist-high flower box made of brick and covered with tile.  
All entrances are of the storm-proof type. Later, a parking lot will be located at the front of the building.  
Bayne said Saturday that all major work inside the building had been completed. All that remained to be done was a little tile installation and painting, he said.

At the present time, only 400 folding chairs and 20 tables have been provided for furnishings. More furniture will be purchased when funds are available.

The Community Center is a joint project of Hereford and county residents and the Jim Hill Estate.

back and install new planking at the Main Street railroad crossing.

City Manager Dudley Bayne said the city already has on hand new traffic lights for the Main Street - Highway 60 intersection. These will be corner lights, similar to those installed recently at Main and U. S. 385. The city also is discussing the possibility of new street lights on U. S. 60 with the Southwestern Public Service Company.

For better control, the project also will include a slight change in the intersection of U. S. 60 and Park Avenue. East-bound traffic on Park will turn south before going onto U. S. 60. A triangular island will divert traffic into a short one-way flow from U. S. 60 west onto Park.

Park Avenue and U. S. 385 (5 Mile Avenue) will be used as the principal detour routes during construction, since they are maintained by the state. The city will change some of its traffic flow during construction in order that grain trucks and other vehicles can get across Main.

Representing the Highway Department at the meeting, in addition to Smith, were Virgil McGee of Amarillo, assistant district engineer; Vernon York, Hereford, resident engineer; and L. J. Clark, Hereford, senior party chief.

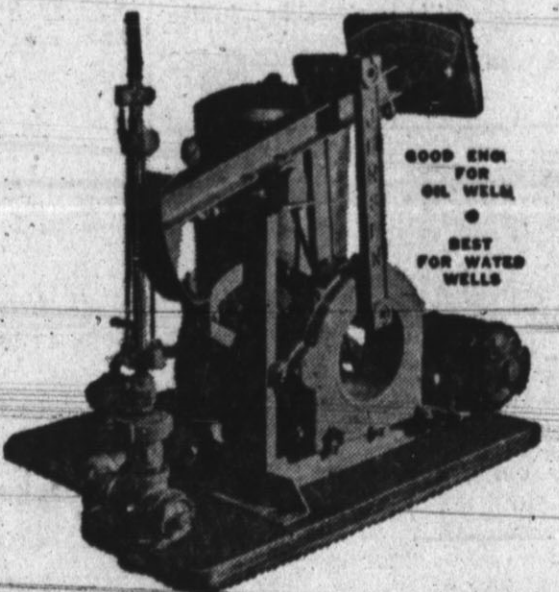

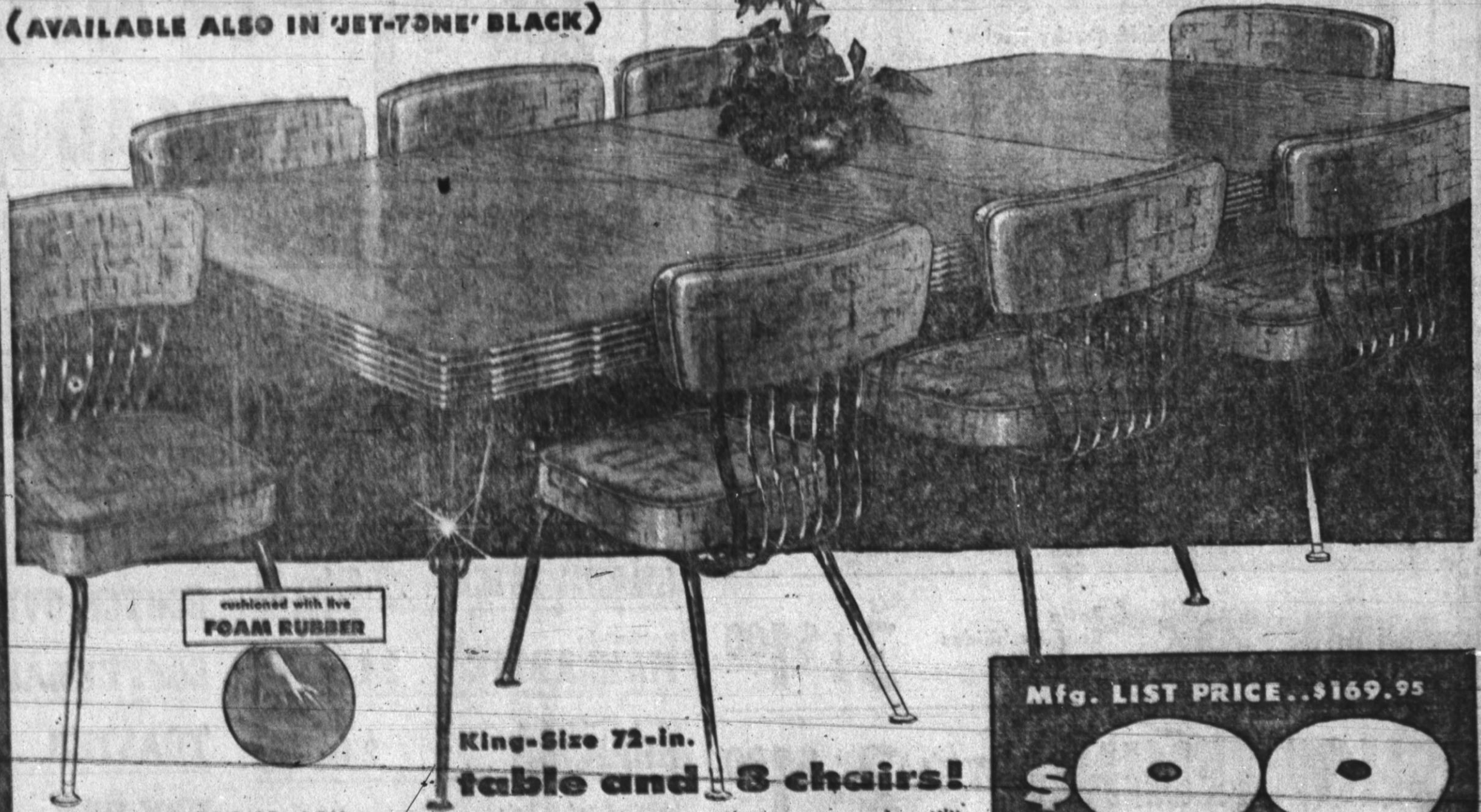

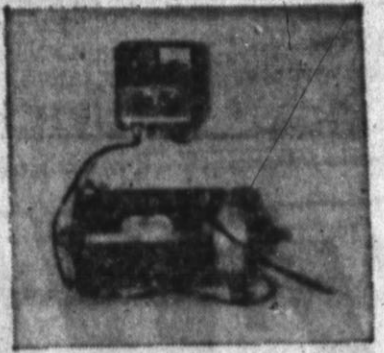

Let's Abolish The Poll Tax

Abolition of the poll tax as a prerequisite for voting is, in our opinion, long overdue.

This is an opinion we have held for many years, and have expressed editorially on many occasions. Within fairly recent memory, it was an opinion which was greeted with loud disfavor from certain elements of the Democratic party, who viewed any suggestion that the poll tax be done away with as a subversive Republican trick to undermine Democratic primaries, though it was never quite clear how the Republicans were expected to take advantage of this.

Now, however, for equally obscure reasons, leaders of all wings of the Democratic Party in Texas seem to have reached a rare unanimity on a proposal to abolish poll tax.

Abolition is favored, at any rate, according to their public statement by such diverse Demo political leaders as Senators Lyndon Johnson and Ralph Yarborough, House Speaker Sam Rayburn, National Committeewoman Mrs. R. D. Randolph, Committeeman Bryon Skelton and even Hemp-hill County Demo Chairman Jim Crow.

If for no other reason than the opinion that anything which would bring all of these people . . . and others . . . together even momentarily in the same political camp must be mighty powerful medicine and well worth trying, we would favor this proposal.

We do, seriously, favor it for much more compelling and sensible reasons, and hope that with all this political push behind it, the needed reform may finally come about.

What is proposed, actually, is a referendum vote on the question in the next Democratic primary. Although such a referendum has no binding legal effect, an expression of opinion in opposition to the poll tax by a sizeable majority of voters would certainly carry weight with the Leg-

They can, and often do, become a "pain in the neck" to their friends, acquaintances, family and associates.

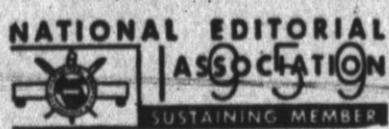

New Policy For Highway Group

A meeting was held this week to familiarize local residents with the Highway 60 widening plan and, along with other accomplishments, it indicates for the first time a genuine interest of cooperation on part of the Texas Highway Department.

Heretofore, the highway group has given us the impression of being a bit indifferent in general and, occasionally, downright high-handed. This new policy of considering the people involved certainly appears to be in order.

While we admit that the State of Texas spends far more money on most projects than does the city or county, it is also evident that the state workers finish their work and depart, while we have to live with any installation for many years to come. The policy of working with the individual community, though still maintaining state standards and meeting requirements, is certainly a democratic, practical system which we endorse 100 percent.

In our particular case of handling traffic during harvest rush, the policy should prove highly beneficial to the Highway Department as well as to local citizens. Recent defeat of Gov. Earl Long in his race for Lieutenant Governor in Louisiana; we hope, brings to a close the episode of showmanship which invaded state politics back in the 1930's. The era, it seems to us, has done little except to line the pockets and expand the ego of a few politicians.

Texas, with Jim Ferguson, Mr Ferguson and W. Leo Daniel, has contributed its part to the spectacle, along with Oklahoma and "Alfalfa Bill" Murray. Looking back, however, it is difficult for us to see any great achievement during the time these people held our highest offices. Like Gov. Long's spree last summer, they did bring a large amount of questionable publicity to our areas from time to time. Strangely enough, as well, they were supported by zealous enthusiasm on part of the majority.

With a more sober approach, at least based on integrity and conscientious administration, our government bids to become the serious business it really provides; politics, once scorned, again is reaching for a rightful place under the sun.

Passing of the spectacular politician seems to fairly well be summed up by the fellow who said:

"These politicians are a lot like cockroaches. It ain't so much what they eat or tote off as what they mess up and fall into."

An orphan grew up to become a bishop in Asia Minor in the Third Century. He fed the hungry, redeemed debtors, gave gifts to children and brought a convoy of grain ships to relieve a famine. He suffered long imprisonment by the Romans for his faith. His reputation for kindness made him one of the most revered and popular Christians, St. Nicholas. It is said that he compelled robbers to return stolen goods, that he gave bags of gold to a destitute father secretly at night as dowries for his daughters. When seen, he asked the father not to reveal his good deed. In remembrance, his holiday was celebrated by secretly leaving gifts for children at night. St. Nicholas became the patron saint of Russia, Greece, and Holland, guardian of maidens, merchants, sailors, scholars and children. Dutch colonists introduced St. Nicholas, whom they called Sinter Klaas, to America. Gradually the bishop in robes was depicted as "a jolly rosy-cheeked little old man, with a low crowned hat, a pair of Flemish trunk hose." So the spirit of a generous man of faith lives today in Santa Claus.

JUDGE HEARS LIQUOR CASE

Judge Harold LaFont will announce his decision soon on the validity of the recent local option liquor election in Precinct 4. He heard lawyers for the wets and for the drys speak before a packed District Courtroom Thursday morning, and at the conclusion of the arguments he invited the attorneys to submit their briefs for his study before an opinion could be issued. Whichever way the judge decides, it is expected the losing faction will appeal the case to the Court of Civil Appeals in Amarillo and the loser there will then appeal to the State Supreme Court. The knotty legal question is whether or not the Commissioners Court had the authority to call the recent election that made Castro County's Precinct 4 wet. Lawyers for prohibition contend the situation in Castro County is not the same as that which existed in Dimmitt County in South Texas when the State Supreme Court ruled that the commissioners there must call an election that subsequently turned a community in the county wet. The wet faction contends that the Dimmitt County decision applies to Castro County just as well and therefore the election was legal. Representing the wets is the Hereford law firm of Witherspoon, Aiken, Langley and Thomas. For the drys are Roy Boss and Kenneth Hobbs of Lubbock. —CASTRO COUNTY NEWS (DIMMITT)

GIN YARDS CLEAR OFF RAPIDLY

The steady hum of area cotton gins is just about over. The big rush of cotton has already passed, and when ginners clean out the cotton that is on their yards now, the 1959 ginning season will be over except for the scrapings. County-wide estimate of the cotton harvest by the Texas Employment Commission says that about 90 per cent of the county's cotton is harvested. The estimate is that 152,770 bales have been ginned. The TEC still thinks that the county will produce 170,000 bales, because gins in the county north of the Sandhills still will receive quite a few bales and this week had quite a number of bales on their yard. The climax of the ginning season came Wednesday night at one Littlefield gin. Gin manager Rex Love of Littlefield Farmers Coop said that his gin used a night crew for the last time Wednesday and the yard was clear enough to see the gin buildings from the office. "When the cotton trailers on the yard thin out enough that you can see the gins from the office, you know that it has slacked off," Love said. David Hampton from Hampton gin is still running with a night crew, but doesn't expect to keep night hours much longer. "A lot of farmers have been finished for some time, and there are only a few who have much cotton left," said Hampton. A happy note concerning the price of cotton was mentioned by Ross Lusden, whose gin is west of Littlefield. Lusden said that his gin was about finished, and had about 63 bales on the yard. When that is gone he doesn't expect many more bales to come in. Another price that has held up this year is cottonseed. Buster Owens at Western Cottonoil says that seed have brought about \$38 per ton, about the same as the price for seed last year. —COUNTY WIDE NEWS (LITTLEFIELD)

All the leading poultry breeders of Deaf Smith, Parmer, Castro and Randall counties are members of the association and most of them will have birds on exhibition.

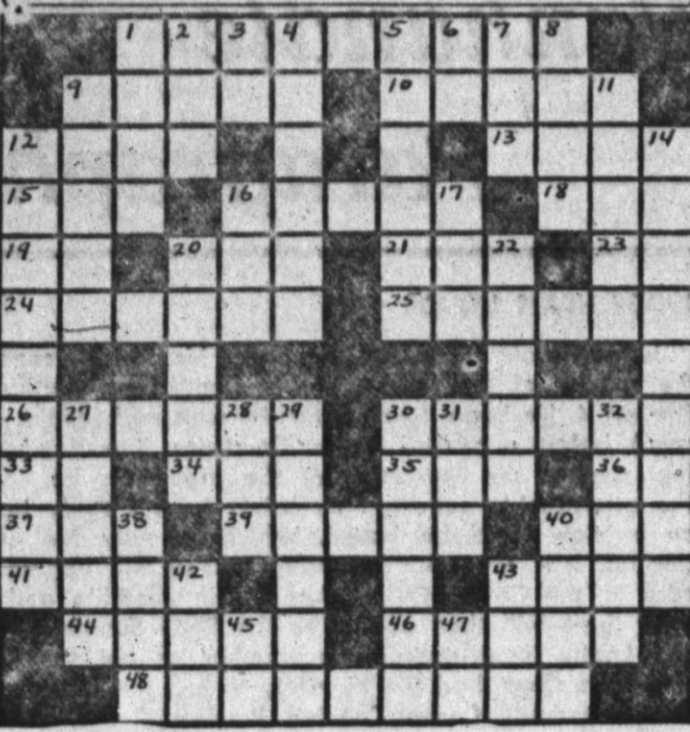

Nearly every boy goes through a time when he wants to be a fireman. Just for that stage there is a new suburban water pumper which shoots a continuous stream of water supplied by a hydrant which can be connected to any garden hose.

Does he plan to build skyscrapers? There's an architect-

ural kit of plastic inter - locking blocks then, with full instructions on how to reproduce Manhattan's famous skyline.

Potential musicians should be well - satisfied - even if the neighbors are not - with any of the new - plastic toy instruments which have correct tonal range.

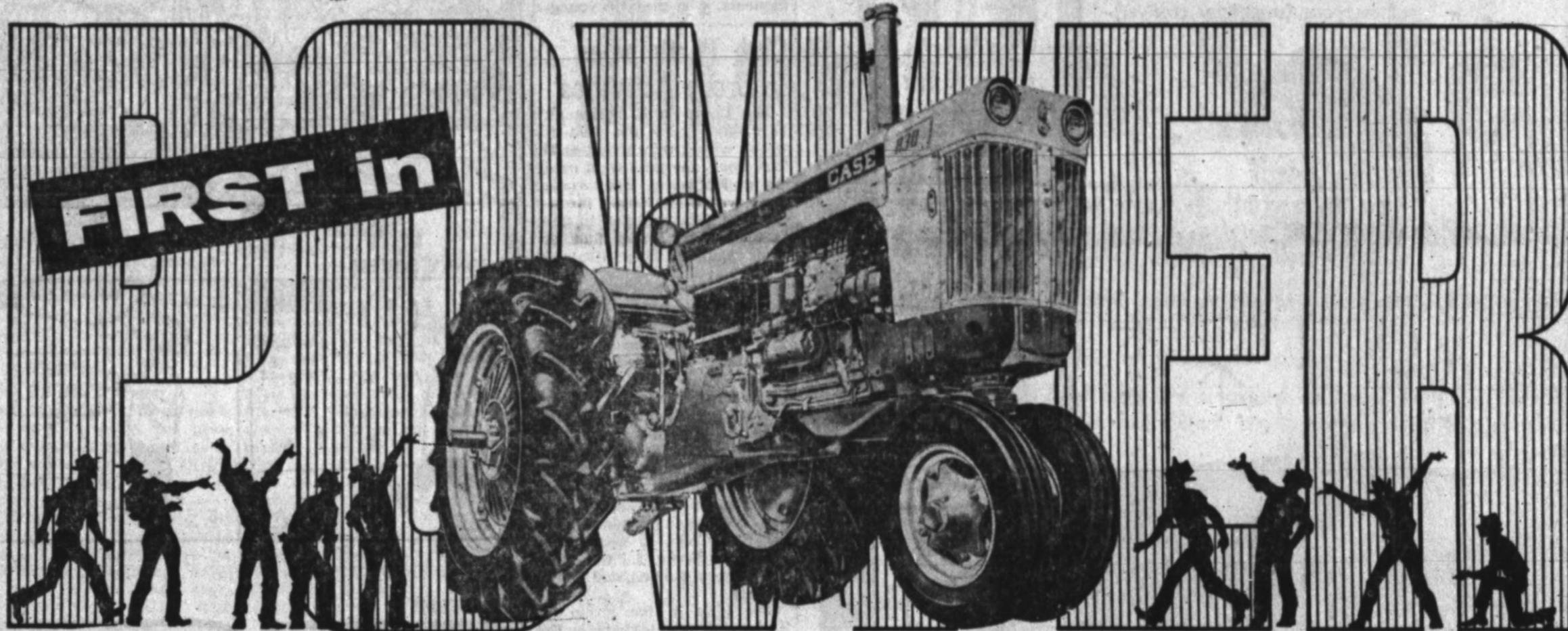

# Special Baby Furniture Makes Dandy Yule Gift

By Dorothy V. Whipple, M. D. Christmas is coming and if there are some aunts, uncles, grandparents around looking for ideas of what to give that new member of the family here are some ideas for them. They are going to be good-sized ideas not to be realized in the dime store — but you know that's a pretty important baby.

He probably has a crib, but if he hasn't quite arrived yet maybe you can supply the crib. This is a first essential. It should be sturdy and strong and big enough to last a good two years and then

be ready for the next member of the family. A mattress is needed, so firm that no little nose can bury itself and cut off circulation of air.

Crib sheets of the contour variety are wonderful when the baby is old enough to tear his bed clothes off the bed.

The piece of furniture I'd put

next in importance to a crib is a rocking chair. A nice big comfortable one with arms so that mother or dad can rest an elbow while they give those cosy rocks so much loved by both babe and parent. If it were possible I'd build in a lullabye. What a baby misses who has never been rocked and sung to. Our jet age babies need this lovely experience as much as our primitive ancestor.

Another piece of essential furniture for a baby is a playpen. Get it or give it early, long before the baby can really move about. Even quite young babies enjoy a change of scenery. It's good to take a baby out of his crib and let him stretch and wiggle about in a safe place. Before you know it he can turn over and even hunch himself about — before he is able to crawl.

Put him unprotected on the floor and you are apt to find him mixed up with the electric

light cord on the far side of the room. It goes without saying that never should a baby even only weeks old be allowed on a high place — a bed, a table, a couch, without someone right there beside him every minute.

When a playpen is used for playing, the crib can be reserved for sleeping only. This helps the child accept the idea that when he is put into his crib he is expected to sleep.

A playpen is safe. Also the baby who becomes accustomed to peering at the world through its bars will accept this restriction happily for months, whereas the child who is put in a pen for the first time after he has discovered the joys of going places under his own steam will rebel mightily at the restriction.

Of course a playpen must not be used as a jail. A baby must be let out of it from time to time, but it's wonderful to have

him happy in it for part of his waking hours.

Another useful item of furniture is a canvas chair in which the baby's back is well supported and in which he can bounce up and down. Some such chairs are so arranged they can hang from the ceiling, others are supported on a stiff frame. Babies love them and they are safe in them. A baby cannot stay in such a chair as long as in a playpen, but they certainly provide a welcome change.

A feeding table is also a useful piece of furniture. The ones in which the baby sits on a special seat in the middle of the table are especially useful, safer than the old-fashioned high chair.

Not only can the baby be fed in such a piece of furniture but he can play there too for short periods. A baby needs plenty of opportunity to wiggle and move about so several pieces of furniture that provide safety and wiggling space are useful and welcome.

## Selective Service Board Announces State Draft Quota

The local Selective Service Board announced recently that the state quota for Texas draft boards in January calls for 310

The state's January call of 310 compares with a quota of 454 for December and 447 for November. The January call is the state's share of a national quota of 7,000 men, all for the Army. The December national quota was 9,000.

It was also announced that local boards would send around 1,053 men for pre-induction physical and mental examinations. These men return home after being examined at examining stations.

Local board quotas for the January call already have been figured and are scheduled to be placed in the mails to the boards Monday.

The January quota will be filled with men who are at least 22 years old on Jan. 1, with the exception of volunteers or delinquents, who may be younger.

## Puffs, Eclairs Easy To Make

FACINATING TRIFLES, the cream puff and éclair! Watch shaped, puffed and golden. We re-pastries: the airy desserts with their fillings of whipped cream and thick custard are sure to be chosen.

French chefs whip up pate a choux — the pastry base for cream puffs and eclairs — at the drop of a white toque. The pate a choux is placed in a pastry tube fitted with a large plain tube and forced onto a baking sheet.

Puffs wanted? The mixture is forced through the pastry bag into small mounds. Then, holding the bag at an angle, each mound is cut off with a quick circular twist of the wrist.

Is it eclairs you cherish? Then force the pastry into strips, about four inches long and almost an inch wide; pull back at the end of the strip and, holding the bag obliquely again, cut off the flow with a quick movement.

Chefs make their own pate a choux. But lucky you, you can use a cream-puff mix that comes packaged.

No pastry bag? Or slightly scared to use one? Drop the mixture with the help of spoons. Our mother was past mistress at this, her puffs equal size, coming out of the oven perfectly shaped, puffed and golden. We member back to when we were very young, watching her preparing to serve them, cutting off the tops, filling them with the classic sweetened whipped cream. Then our small fingers were allowed to replace the tops. Next came showering them with confectioners' sugar, in fabulous snowy drifts, and last but not least — licking our fingers!

But we grew to be school-age, and came the day when we insisted this treatment of the cream puff was old-fashioned! Chef fashion, my mother began to fill them with creamy custard — like eclairs — and cover the tops with a glassy-smooth chocolate frosting.

Next the teen-age do-it-yourself stage. The puffs must be filled with vanilla ice cream and served with a thick chocolate fudge sauce. To have the sauce a sure-fire success, we often used condensed milk, and here's one way of making this accompaniment.

### CHOCOLATE SAUCE

Ingredients: 1 can (15 ounces) sweetened condensed milk, 2 squares (2 ounces) unsweetened chocolate, 1/8 teaspoon salt, 1/2 cup (or more) hot water, 1/2 teaspoon vanilla.

Method: Pour sweetened condensed milk, chocolate and salt into top of double boiler. Cook over rapidly boiling water, stirring often, for about 10 minutes or until thick; remove from heat. Slowly stir in water, a-

## Make A Smock For Tot Artist

SCHOOL DAYS take the older children out of the house, but the toddlers are left at home often frantically demanding extra attention from Mother.

A special project such as painting will give the younger children a chance to be creative as well as to have something of their own to display when older brothers and sisters come home from school.

A wise mother can give the painting project importance by providing a special outfit for the smock painter. It's easy to make a smock which will make small fry glow with pride.

Medium weight plastic can be stretched on the sewing machine. Local sewing center experts give directions for a simple plastic

smock. First make a paper pattern. Measure child across shoulders, from underarm to underarm and from shoulder to hemline. Smock should fit loosely around chest and get slightly fuller below. It should end above the knees. Make only one-half of pattern, then use as a guide to cut double-thickness of folded plastic. To avoid pinholes in plastic, fasten pattern with cellophane tape, and tape edges of plastic together before cutting so it won't slip.

Cut a three-inch slit at back of neck opening to fit over head. Cut a five-inch-wide strip of plastic to fit over bottom edge of smock and "baste" in place with tape.
