Mahon Defends Conservatism, Record

By BOBBY TEMPLETON **Brand News Editor** Incumbent candidate George Mahon of the 19th Congressional District defended

his record as a staunch conservative and his length of time in office during a campaign meeting and news conference

Thursday at the Caison Steak House. It

48Cases Run Through State District Court

When the district court decides to process cases, it gets with it as evidenced this week with the successful prosecution of about 48 cases. District Judge Mike Metcalf, who serves a six-county area has been unable to conduct court here for almost four months which provided a large backlog of cases.

This week, he was helped by visiting Judge Howard C. Davison of Lubbock who precessed mostly guitly pleas.

In all, 22 probated sentences were handed out, 11 persons were sent to serve time in the Texas Department of Corrections state prison, five cases were continued, three were dismissed, four did not reach court and three defendants were sentenced to the county jail.

Juries heard two cases, two guilty pleas and one postponment. After stiff penalties were decided in two delivery of marijana cases early this week, two defendants scheduled for trial plead guilty

Of the nonprobated cases, the following sentences were decided for defendants who will serve time in the state prison: Adam Lopez, three years; Edker Miller, six years; Manuel Zavala, three five-year sentences; Carroll Wayne Follis, two eight-year sentences; Hilario Fredriko Garcia, three years; Allen Ray Graves, two years; and Pedro Gonzales Jr., two four-year terms.

Probation was revoked on Garcia, Graves and Gonzales for offenses varying from Felony DWI to theft.

Also having probation revoked were Bert Haile, who was tried by jury early in the week, and Phillip Chavez. Chavez



was given two years in the county jail and Haile was given three years in the TDC following a six-year sentence by a jury for delivery of marijuana.

The other jury trial conducted this week involved Joe Lopez, who was given eight years for delivery of marijuana.

Of the guilty pleas, Demesio Mendoza received the largest number of sentences of the burglary of a motor vehicle. He was fined \$400 and given nine years probated in five counts. The sentences are to run concurrently.

Juan Flores was sentenced to five years for delivery of marijuana. He was probated on two counts.

Also receiving five-year probated sentences were Romo Leonardo and George Ramirez on two counts each of theft. They were fined \$500 on each count.

Johnny Mendoza was sentenced five years probated on two counts of burglary of a motor vehicle and Jerry Salazar was given a seven-year probated sentence on burglary of habitation.

was the kickoff of his re-election in Deaf Smith, Castro and Parmer Counties.

He is opposed by Republican Jim Reese of Odessa for the post. Mahon has held his office for over 40 years and hopes to retain it again in spite of the fact that he is 76-year-old.

CONCERNING REESE'S statement that he is more liberal now than before and has been in office too long, Mahon said "it's a fairy tale. Anyone in Washington will laugh at you if you tell them I'm a flaming liberal.'

He recently received a 95 per cent rating from the American Conservative Union and only an 11 per cent rating from a group which rates politicians on the number of votes cast toward liberal legislation.

"The main issue in this campaign is who can represent the people best," he emphasized. "I feel I can help people more with my power base. It enables me to give better service."

'I can't work miracles but I can make the voices of people in education, oil and agriculture heard," he said. "Although I can't make it heeded."

Since his district represents vast agriculture interests, the congressman said that he has been a great fighter for those concerns and plans to continue in that fight. He voiced need for a comprehensive agriculture bill next year and plans to be a part of its formation.

He feels that \$22 billion in agriculture exports represents a key to solutions in this area with respect to farm prices. It is a counter balance to the \$30 billion in oil imports to the U.S.

"I grew up on a farm and own one," Mahon stated about his experience to handle farm problems.

HE EXPRESSED A NEED for a sugar act and moted that some gains were made for area sugar beet raiser with the increase in duty on sugar imports.

"I'm concerned about slump in wheat prices, he said. "We need a target price. I also hope another grain embargo never happens again."

Former Secretary of Agriculture Earl Butz did not always please Mahon but he did call the agriculturalist a brilliant man. "I didn't like his opposition to the disaster payment program."

A large interest of the questions asked by the media representatives from Amarillo and reporters here centered on the deficit spending in federal government. After repeated attempts, Mahon finally admitted that a balanced budget was possible by 1980 or by the end of the next presidential term.

"It is ridiculous for people to think that a balanced budget can occur this year," he said. The reason lies in the fact that monetary commitments have already been made such as in defense budgets and money has to be appropriated for them.

He voted against the recent tax bill primarily because "I think people want reduced spending rather than lower taxes. Lower taxes would be nice, but it isn't the solution."

The last congress voted in \$70 billion in educed taxes which is the same amount said the presidential budgets have (See MAHON, Page 2)

Swine Flu Vaccine Received Here

Dr. Dirk Johnson, city health officer, reported Thursday that the first doses of the swine flu vaccine have been received in Hereford.

The State Department of Health Resources shipped Wednesday about 2,250 doses of the vaccine to local medical clinics for doctors to distribute to their patients on a first come first serve basis. The vaccines, ordered from the federal

government, are distributed to the clinics free although private physicians may charge for distribution at a going rate of \$3 to \$5.

Johnson said the amount of vaccine received so far is definitely not enough to conduct mass immunizations. However,

The Public Health Clinic is administering the vaccine free since it is state funded. It is receiving doses from the 2,000 amounts received by the Hereford clinic.

So far, the local clinics have given out very few doses with the Hereford clinic

11 Indictments Returned Thurs. **By Grand Jury**

The Deaf Smith County Grand Jury Thursday returned 11 indictments on 20 cases presented to it by Criminal District Attorney Andy Shuval and his assistant Schalan Atkinson.

The jurors, meeting at the county courthouse, also decided on six no bills, two passes and one defendant was recommended to county court.

Five defendants were indicted on Felony Driving While Intoxicated (DWI) charges. They included Joe Balderama, Kenneth Glenn White, Jose Valdez, Bernaue Moreno and Juan Rodriguez according to District Clerk records.

Indicted on burglary of motor vehicle charges were Greg Hooser on two counts, and Don Horn on - two counts. Glen Randell Sr., who was already sentenced earlier this week in a delivery of. marijuana trial, was indicted on burglary of motor vehicle enhanced charges. The jury meets about once a month for a term of about six months.

Firearms, Instruments **Taken In Major Thefts**

Hereford police are currently investigating two major thefts which occurred late Wednesday or sometime early Thursday.

THE THEFTS occurred at Stanton Junior High School, where approximately \$2200 worth of band instruments were taken, and at a mobile home on Ave. H, where a number of guns, tools and clothing were taken.

According to a spokesman for the city police department, thieves broke a window on the door of the band room at Stanton, then unlocked the door to gain entry.

Taken in the theft were a saxaphone, trumpet, trombone and three violins. A mobile home owned by Edwards James Tibljas was also burglarized, and total value of items taken in that theft amounted to \$1075.

AMONG THE Firearms taken were a .270 Remington valued at \$350, a 12 gauge Winchester shotgun valued at \$60. a 30-30 Winchester valued at \$125, a 20 guage Western Field shotgun valued at \$45 and a .22 magnum Colt pistol valued at \$130. Two cases of shotgun ammunition -

valued at \$120 were also taken, in addition to a socket set, hydraulic jack, a goose down jacket and two pairs of boots.

The police spokesman indicated that entry to the mobile home was gained by removing the window.

Investigation of both thefts continues.

THE POLICE spokesman also indicated that more arrests are forthcoming in connection with the burglary of the Pizza Hut and TagCo Industries here last weekend.

Some \$2000-\$2500 was taken in the theft of the Pizza Hut, and cash, a radio and office machines were taken at TagCo.

City police, working with Deaf Smith County sheriff's officers arrested Gerald L. Teagarden of 132 Ave A Wednesday and charged him, with two counts of burglary in connection with the weekend thefts.

The unions's 170,000 Ford workers get the next shot at considering the pact, which would provide the average assembly line worker 40 paid days off in 1979, the last year of the contract.




Suit Filed On CIA

General Aircraft Corp. of Bedford, Mass., filed the \$25 million claim with the CIA on Thursday.

The CIA declined to comment. The allegations involve a General Aircraft subsidiary, Helio Aircraft. In 1962, the company, said, the CIA approached it about taking over Helio as a cover operation. General Aircraft refused.

Job Report To Dampen Ford's Spirit

WASHINGTON (AP)- The Ford administration, concerned over the three-month rise in unemployment this summer, was braced for an unfavorable September jobless report today, the last to be issued before the presidential election.

"We'll be lucky if it goes down a tenth of a point," said L. William Seidman, a top presidential adviser, as the Labor Department prepared to issue the report.

Unemployment increased for the third month in a row in August, reaching 7.9 per cent of the work force, with 7.5 million Americans out of work. Although economists stress the impossibility of accurately predicting monthly statistics, administration analysts say unemployment could go up again.

"I don't think the change will be great one way or another but it could be up a tenth" of a per cent, said one economist.

He noted that both the number of new claims for unemployment insurance and the insured unemployment rate increased during the week of Sept. 12, when the new job figures were gathered.

The factor layoff rate also was up sharply last month.

The job report follows Thursday's announcement that wholesale price were

up nine-tenths of 1 per cent last month, the steepest rise in 11 months.

While the White House issued a statement asserting that Ford's economic policies will prevent a resurgence of inflation, Democratic presidential challenger Jimmy Carter seized on the report and said the Republican administration "is the first in history to give us the highest unemployment rate and the highest inflation rate combined."

Progress in reducing inflation and the gradual decline in joblessness earlier this year had been a strong point in Ford's election campaign.

But the slowdown in economic growth and three consecutive months of rising employment this summer have given the Democrats fresh ammunition in the waning days of the political campaign.

The inflation rate has held steady at 6 per cent this year, the level that Ford administration economists set as a goal for the year.

The September jump in wholesale prices followed a one-tenth of 1 per cent decline in August and increases averaging three-tenths of 1 per cent in the preceding three months.

HOUSTON (AP) - The League of Women Voters of Houston say it appears certain that Houston will be the site of the Oct. 15 presidential candidates.

Madeleine Appel, president of the Houston League, said Monday it is "99 per cent sure" that Sen. Walter Mondale of Minnesota, the Democratic vice presidential candidate, and Sen. Rober Dole of Kansas, the Republican vice presidential candidate, will debate in the 800-seat Alley Theater.

The Houston women's group issued an invitation several weeks ago to the candidates to debate the issues of the campaign on national television from the Alley's main stage.

Nina Vance, the Alley's producing director, said Monday she had not been informed of a decision to use the theater for the debate.






It seems most of Rockerfeller's inexcusable behavior is excusable because it is judged non-political'. This poses somewhat of a paradox if not a blatant inequity.


ACROSS FROM THE POST OFFICE IN DOWNTOW

Approval Nearing On Three-Year Ford Pact

tive settlement of the Ford strike has been approved by one top-level union board, but it must be okayed by a second before the rank-and-file gets to vote on it.

If the three-year agreement is approved by the United Auto Workers' National Ford Council today, it then goes to a vote at the 99 Ford bargaining units around the country.

Union officials have said they would not disclose terms of the agreement until after the council took action.

The pact that could end the three-week-old strike against Ford Motor Co. was approved unanimously Wednesday by the UAW's 26-member international executive board during the three-hour meeting.

Asked if the length of the . meeting indicated disagreement within the board on Ford's offer, Ken Bannon, a UAW vice president and director of its Ford department, said the time was used to "explain to our board details of the offer."

Ford's top bargainer, Vice President Sidney McKenna,

the settlement that he was "hopeful we will be back at work at most plants by the early part of next week, but at this point it is only a hope."

Union officials have said the general ratification would take at least a week. But contract snags at the local level could blocked renewed production at the 102 Ford facilities in 22 states.

By Wednesday, 42 of the 99 local bargaining units had reached settlement with local management on work agreements. Even after a national agreement is ratified, workers at plants still without local contracts probaly won't return to their jobs.

Cheese Souffles Touted As 'Super' Main Dishes

High and handsome, souffles are dishes of some substance even though their volume depends on the amount of air beaten into the mixture.

Cheese, of course, is the basic ingredient, along with eggs, but many others are used to fashion a main dish souffle. There's macaroni, for one; it's a natural accompaniment to the cheese and eggs.

How would you like ham and pineapple? There go well into another souffle. They might be the perfect answer as we approach the holidays when you may have just a bit of ham left over, such as a cup, which is what the recipe calls for.

Both of these souffles are made in the traditional manner which requires a sauce to which are added the egg yolks. It's best to separate the yolks from the whites when they're removed from the refrigerator and while still cold. Even a speck of yolk may prevent the whites from whipping to their fluffiest. You'll get better volume on the whites, however, if they're allowed to stand at room temperature before whip-

ping. The size of the souffle dish is also important. Both of these are the two-quart size which will give the best volume for the amount of ingredients used. Follow the time, as given. If you desire another check on doneness, shake the souffle very gently when you think it's done. If the center is firm, it's done. CUTLINE: Macaroni and






