Clemency May Cover 250,000

WASHINGTON (AP) - Presidentelect Carter's advisers have reached substantial agreement on a plan that could extend Carter's promise of clemency for draft violators to perhaps as many as 250,000 Vietnam-era servicemen with tarnished military records.

Carter, who had promised during the election campaign that he would pardon draft law violators, has been urged by some groups to broaden such a clemency program to include military deserters and veterans with less-than-honorable dis-

BOSTON (AP) - Doctors say they have successfully tested a new drug that fights the crippling symptoms of Parkinson's disease, even in patients who no longer respond to the primary medicine now in

One woman in the test reportedly regained the ability to talk, eat and sit up. "This is a major development," Dr. Abraham Lieberman, who directed the testing, said in an interview, "It represents a new therapeutic approach to the disease." which afflicts about one million Americans.

### Long Wait Called Cruel

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) - Gary Gilmore, who wanted to see his mother once more and then die on Monday, says it's "cruel punishment" to make him instead spend 32 days in a stripped-down cell awaiting a Jan. 17 date with the firing

The 36-year-old convicted killer vowed to renew his bid for freedom under a legal technicality, while his mother and capital punishment foes awaited court rulings on their efforts to stop the execution.

"Tell them to give me liberty or give me death." Gilmore told his attorneys Wednesday shortly after 4th District Court Judge J. Robert Bullock set the new date over his protests.

CARL KING of Dimmitt was named to serve another term as head of the organization, while Glenn Odom of Dimmitt was re-elected vice president and Barry Love of Dimmitt was named to another term as secretary-treasurer.

In addressing association members, King related that the TCGA now has members in 40 counties representing 1.4 million acres, adding that Texas leads the nation in corn yield per acre.

"We were organized in order to further research and legislation favoring corn production, and since our inception, the TCGA has fought for a decent farm bill," King stated. "With the target prices currently far too low, an excellent corn yield of 9000 pounds per acre is non profitable," he added.

King explained that present corn production expenses on land owned by the grower are over \$327 per acre, while expenses on land rented by the grower are over \$447 per acre.

"MOST CORN growers want to produce for the market, rather than government storage, and I think farmers should consider a voluntary cutback in acreage to avoid serious problems with surpluses," the TCGA head commented.

He added that there are hopes for a check-off program after the legislature convenes, explaining that the checkoffs would provide financing for needed corn research.

"Membership dues are fine, but we need some research money," said King. Ray Joe Riley of Hart presented a list of resolutions for consideration by the association members.

MEMBERS VOICED their approval of a resolution calling for the abolition of the cost of gas pass-through, or strict limitations on the pass-through, and called for forwarding copies of the resolution to Governor Dolph Briscoe and Speaker of the House Bill Clayton.

Among other resolutions passed by the TCGA were a call for valuations for ad-valorem taxes on agricultural land to be based on the agricultural value of the

industry, an important user of corn, the TCGA resolved that meat imports should be no more than the quantity allowed by the Meat Import Act of 1974, and that meat imports through Puerto Rico be included in this figure.

Association members gave unanimous approval to a three part resolution dealing with commodity prices, loans and

THE TCGA membership called for a loan rate on corn of not less than 90 per cent of the average cost of production, including production costs and land costs.

The resolution called for a target price on corn of not less than 105 per cent of the average true cost of production


The final phase of the resolution came after a period of discussion among association members, but the TCGA membership eventually resolved that the secretary of agriculture be allowed to control crop acreage if necessary in order to avoid a price-depressing surplus, by allotment or percentage deferral, encouraging soil conservation practices on the deferred acreage.

The association then entertained a motion from the floor to add a resolution in support of the English bill, which in the case of an embargo, would insure 115 per cent of production costs.

BARRY LOVE of Dimmitt gave a report on an orderly marketing effort, but reported that a Federal Trade Commission opinion virtually nipped the project in the bud.

"The FTC declared that farmers can't band together to restrict acreage and force the price upward, and also declared that our efforts to encourage marketing of grain throughout the year, rather than right at harvest time are frowned upon.
What I don't understand is how labor
unions can withhold their services until they obtain the price or wages they want, yet it is a violation for the farmer to follow the same procedure," Love declared.

TCGA members also voted to adopt an organization position in favor of Corn Growers Association.



Youth Still Listed As Critical

Steve Batenhorst, the 15 year old son of Mr. and Mrs. H.M. Batenhorst of Rt. 5 was still listed in critical condition in the Northwest Texas Hospital intensive care unit today, four days after he was injured in a motorcycle accident near the Canadian River Bridge Sunday afternoon. His life signs were listed as stable.

Batenhorst was injured when his motorcycle apparently struck a chuckhole and he was thrown from the vehicle.

He was taken to the Amarillo hospital Sunday by the Potter County helicopter, which flew him out of the rough terrain of the river bed area.

# **More Cabinet Nominees Named**

PLAINS, Ga. (AP)- President- elect Jimmy Carter is naming Rep. Andrew Young to be U.S. ambassador to the United Nations and Charles L. Schultze to be chairman or Carter's Council of Economic Advisers, informed sources

Sources in the Carter camp also said Joseph A. Califano is the top candidate to head the Department of Health. Education and Welfare. As chief Lyndon B. Johnson, Califano was the principal architect of the Great Society programs, many of which are administered by HEW.

Carter also is believed close to choosing Rep. Robert Bergland, D-Minn., to be secretary of agriculture. Carter is expected to announce the

appointments of Young and Schultze at a 2:30 p.m. EST news conference today. Young, a Georgia Democrat, will be the first black named to a high-ranking post in the Carter administration. The U.N. ambassadorship is considered to be

cabinet-level. Young, 44, was a strong Carter supporter during the primary election campaign and was viewed as helpful in putting together Carter's huge majority election. He won re-election to his third House term last month and previously had indicated some reluctance to leave Congress for the U.N. post.

Schultze, 52, has described himself as an economic liberal. He served as budget director from 1965 to 1967 in the Johnson fellow at the Brookings Institution, a think tank here.

The Council of Economic Advisers is a three-member panel that advises the president on a broad range of economic policy issues and forecasts economic trends. In the past, the person serving as CEA chairman has been one of the president's top two or three economic advisers.

Califano, 45, was a Pentagon lawyer when then-Defense Secretary Robert S. McNamara appointed him to be a top aide. In that role, he was involved in decisions leading to deeper U.S. involvement in Vietnam.

Califano transferred to the White House staff in 1965 after Johnson noted his work on behalf of a supersonic

Meanwhile, Carter has enlisted Sen. Henry Jackson, D-Wash., who favors the creation of a Department of Energy and Natural Resources, to help clear the way for government reorganization in the energy area.

Meeting with reporters and several dozen tourists in a park on the main street of Plains, Jackson said he would ask Chairman Abraham Ribicoff, D-Conn., of The Senate Government Operations Committee about speeding energy reorganization

Former Secretary of Defense James R. Schlesinger, who was fired from that post by President Ford last year, has been mentioned as a potential "energy czar" in the Carter administration. He previously served as chairman of the old Atomic Energy Commission.

The new budget, presented by president-elect Joe Shollenbarger, showed expenses totalling \$71,740. This represented an increase of about \$7,000 over the current year, although there were no major increases in any particular

Pointing out that dues had not been increased for almost three years, president Donald Hicks proposed an increase in memberships in order to fund the new budget. Directors approved an increase in business memberships of \$1 a month and in individual memberships of 50 cents a month. This will raise business dues from \$84 to \$96 a year, and individuals from \$42 to \$48 annually.

Directors reviewed statements of receipts and expenditures for November. Bill Albright, executive vice president, noted the chamber would end the year within its budget.

Boyd, environmental; Dewitt Seago, culture, arts, religion, education (CARE); Mike Carr, business; and Charles Schlabs, agriculture. Still to be named are rodeo and membership chairmen.

The local committee is seeking to have two factors included in any tax code approved by the Legislature -depreciation on the cost of irrigation wells, and water depletion based upon IRS tables. Directors approved a resolution submitted by the committee and it will be sent to the Governor and members of the state legislature.



# Ann Landers

Elderly Care Costly

DEAR ANN: Almost daily, and now in your column, something is published about 'warehousing!' and elderly and the inhumane conditions of homes for the aged. How many of these "experts" have actually faced the problem?

My 83-year-old mother has had two strokes. She is senile, can't walk, is very heavy and has no bladder or bowel control. Trained personnel is required to take care of her.

Unfortunately, my mother is very demanding. Her latest request is that we take her to the hairdresser, in an ambulance, if necessary. (There's a hairdresser in the home but mother doesn't like her work.)

When mother first became incapacitated my father tried to take care of her. It amounted to 24-hour-a-day duty and nearly killed him. She doesn't like being in the home, of course. They must tie her in a wheelchair so she can't fall out. They insist that she eat her meals and take her medicine. She views all this as a

conspiracy to "mistreat" her. Father visits her twice a day. I see her at least four times a week. For the privilege of keeping her in this "warehouse" we pay \$1200 a month.

I don't expect to live to be 83. If I make it I will surely be on welfare. Mother's illness will have wiped me out. As the nation's leading Arbiter of Conscience, how about presenting the other side? -- Another "Bad Child"

DEAR CHILD: I was inundated by letters from "the other side" and my heart goes out to all of you who are caught in this trap.

There are no easy answers. but it seems to me that if our great country could spend 150 billion dollars on the war in Vietnam, someone in Washington should be able to figure out a way to care for our elderly at a cost that will not pauperize whole families.

DEAR ANN LANDERS: Several years ago a woman who worked as my husband's secretary told him she thought she was falling in love with him. He said he took it "as a joke," reminded her that they were both married, and he swears on his mother's name there was no affair. The secretary moved out of town with her husband and family soon after her "confes-

I knew nothing of this episode until a few weeks ago when one of those "Language of Love" cards arrived. The former secretary had sent it to his office but it was mistakenly forwarded to our home. The card listed poetically "my reasons for loving you." The damn fool signed her name and added,

"Be happy."
I wonder if she realized how much anxiety her card has caused me. My husband must have liked her once, but now he says, "Forget the dumb broad." Well, it's not that





# ennison Prevails On **Short Yardage Plays**

Dennison is going to give you everything he's got.'

A 12-yard touchdown run last week against Washington is a prime example. Dennison slashed off tackle where he was challenged at the four-yard line. He struggled and staggered into the end zone with the tackler wrapped around him.

Dennison will probably never be a 1,000 yard gainer but he works as hard or harder than anyone on the Cowboy team.

'I compete against Doug Dennison," he explains. "That is. I compete against my own performance. I try to make Doug Dennison better every day.

It's up to the coaches as to whether they want to compare me against the other Dallas backs. I try to learn something new each day and this in turn helps me to grow each day, each

Dennison says he wants to develop into a broken field

"I want to get good in the open field because that's where the halfback can have a pay day," says Dennison. "You just don't get much yardage running up against defensive linemen. You may get a yard or two. But in the open field you get the chance to go one-on-one against a defensive back. That's the situation you always want."

Dennison has a hard, slashing style of running with tremendous explosion.

But he is perhaps the most unpublicized and unherald player on the Cowboy team. He will not start Sunday because Preston Pearson is a better pass

It would be easy for the Los Angeles Rams to overlook him in Sunday's National Conference title game. But he's been strictly poison for every team that forgot he was around.

"Dennison will be in there." says Landry. "He's the kind you like to go to war with."

But the Olympics are a big prestige item, and the networks are willing to risk a loss in order to give their image a big boost.

It's not a bad ratings booster, either. ABC averaged a 47 per cent audience share, meaning 47 per cent of the televisions. turned on were tuned to ABC, over the two weeks of the Summer Olympics. And the network drew a 35 per cent share over the 11 days of the Winter Games in Innsbruck.

ABC says it made a profit on the Olympics, a small one, but the network gained immeasurably in prestige.

CBS - The network is rated the favorite. CBS has worked very hard for the Games and may be willing to bid higher than the others. Network officials have pursued the Soviets vigorously for 21/2 years. Also, CBS has been in a slump lately and needs the Games badly to restore lost prestige.

ABC - Experience is the key to ABC's presentation. The network did a fine job in Innsbruck and Montreal, and the Russians were impressed. But there is a feeling that ABC. having already invested in the 1980 Winter Games in Lake Placid, N.Y., would be less than bereft if it lost out.

NBC - Rated the longshot. Network sources have been pessimistic over their chances of landing the Games, and the feeling in some quarters is that NBC isn't really sure if it wants







# Paarlberg Receives Promotion

WASHINGTON (AP) - President Ford has promoted Don Paarlberg, director of economics in the Agriculture Department, to the rank of assistant secretary but he will officially use the title only a few weeks.

Paarlberg, 64, was appointed Friday by Ford to the job of assistant secretary of agriculture for economics. Congress authorized the upgraded job this year, including an increase in salary to \$39,000 a year, compared with Paarlberg's old salary of \$37,800.

But Paarlberg, who has been in the top USDA economics job since he was appointed to it on Feb. 21, 1969, in the early days of the Nixon administration, will be leaving even before the Ford administration makes its exit Jan. 20.

A former Purdue University professor of agriculture economics, Paarlberg plans to return there and resume teaching early in January.

AMARILIO— "Cattle feeders are doing an excellent job of selling their finished cattle and probably will see stable prices during the remainder of 1976 and the first part of 1977." That's the outlook given by Jim Gill, market analyst for the Texas Cattle Feeders Association, after appraising the December 1 "Cattle on Feed" report released by the U.S. Department of Agriculture.

"The report shows that cattle feeders had marketed 13 per cent more cattle during November than they did in November 1975. This certainly backs up information we've

# Placement Of Wheat Under Loan Jumps

WASHINGTON (AP)- Farmers by Nov. 30 had placed 145.3 million bushels of wheat under government price support loans, a jump of 80 per cent in one month.

The Agriculture Department said Tuesday wheat tied up in the loan program totalled only 80.4 million bushels on Oct. 31. A year ago only 19.9 million bushels of wheat from the 1975 harvest were under loan.

Corn under loan totalled 102.2 million bushels as of Nov. 30, compared with 52.3 million a year earlier. On Oct. 31, there were 18.3 million bushels of corn under loan.

President Ford increased grain loan rates on Oct. 13, with wheat set at \$2.25 a bushel, compared with \$1.50 previously. Corn was increased to \$1.50 from \$1.25.

WASHINGTON (AP) - The Agriculture Department has bought 82.9 million pounds of frozen ground beef at a cost of \$55.9 million for distribution to school lunch cafeterias this year.

In addition, the department has bought 28.8 million pounds of canned beef costing \$23.9 million since the purchase campaign began last summer, officials said Friday.

The just-released USDA

report, from the seven major cattle feeding states, reveals that feeders have slackened the rate of cattle placements into yards during November compared to October. However, they did place 10 per cent more cattle this November than in the same period in 1975. Placements into yards in the seven states were 2,159,000 head. "This means there will be plenty of fed cattle for sale in April," Gill points out with caution.

"Pressure that may come by

April could be relieved if feeders continue to sell cattle with shorter than normal feeding time. Three per cent fewer cattle on feed Decmeber 1 (a total of 8 million head), coupled with possible shorter feeding time, will reduce total beef production. Some of the expected sprice pressure this spring could be relieved if cattle continue to move at lighter weights and fewer days on feed," the analyst says.

In Texas there were 1,725,000 cattle on feed on December 1, which was 5 per cent less than a year ago, but 4 per cent more than November 1. Texas placements during November were 380,000 head, 27 per cent below last month, but 11 per cent more than one year ago.



# Three Killed From Train-Truck Wreck

MARLAND, Okla. (AP)- Two crewmen and a truck driver traveling at about 90 miles an were killed near here Wednesday when Amtrak's "Lone Star' passenger train ripped through an oil transport truck in heavy fog in one of the worst rail disasters in Oklahoma history. authorities said.

There were no major injuries to the 110 passengers or 15 other crew members with the exception of cuts and bruises, Santa Fe railroad officials said.

The train, which had originated in Chicago and was the time of the crash.

on its way to Houston, was hour when the 9 a.m. crash occurred, said conductor Walter L. Hinkle.

The tank truck, which explosed into flames, was hurled 30 feet upon impact and the wreckage was dragged another mile and one-half before the train slowed to a stop, the Oklahoma Highway Patrol said.

Area residents said heavy fog limited visibility to about feet at

The train's front engine was heavily damaged and the baggage car was destroyed. The train's nine other cars received lesser damages. Officials said damages would be about \$500,000.

"I'm surprised the train didn't derail," said R.W. Kurtz, a Santa Fe trainmaster. He called the wreck "one of the worst in Oklahoma history."

Kurtz said the train staved on the tracks because wreckage debris had been pushed aside instead of under the engine.

The lack of injuries to the passengers, he said, was "a miracle.

Kurtz also said the train was traveling at about 90 miles an hour. He said it had begun to pick up speed after a stop in Ponca City, 10 miles north of

The wreckage smoldered until late Wednesday afternoon. Sante Fe officials said all

passenger baggage was lost but that is was insured. Also destroyed were 400 sacks of U.S. mail en route to Oklahoma City and Dallas. Most of the mail, according to

Ponca City Postmaster Jack Harris, was not first class, but parcels and lower-class pieces. Fire units from Ponca City, Marland and Continential Oil Co. were dispatched to the

The truck, owned by the Koch Oil Co. of Wichita, Kan., was traveling at about 80 miles an hour when it pulled onto the track in front of the train, Highway Patrol troopers said.

Police and railroad officials indentified the dead as trainengineer E. R. Hulse, 58, and fireman R.C. Young, 60, both of Arkansas City, Kan., and truck driver Kenneth McMains, 50, of Ponca City. Young is a former Arkansas City mayor.

The train passengers were taken by bus to the depot in Ponca City where they were later put on chartered buses to Oklahoma City, McAlester and Wichita.

Officials said a Citizens Band radio group alerted Ponca City police to the crash and fire about 40 minutes after the collision.





WASHINGTON (AP) - Job hunters should be most concerned about the impressions they make, according to the Bureau of National Affairs. The results of a personal interview, says the Bureau, have become the most important reason for hiring non-managerial employes as the use of pre-employment testing declined.

Most companies still give pre-employment physicals and almost half give psychological tests. A few require lie detector tests for sensitive jobs.




