


THE MASS EXODUS FOR the Easter break was noticeable in Hereford this week, with a lot of folks leaving town for a few days while the kids are out of school. The weather has been perfect for a spring vacation, but for many of us it is just a time to start working in the yard.

There isn't much to talk about at some parties until one or two couples have left.

THE NATION'S economic recovery, projected to continue through most of 1976, was reflected in local bank calls the past week. Legal suits against government entities are becoming popular locally as the Hereford City Commission joins the Deaf Smith County Comminers' Court and the Hereford School Board of Trustees in an unfortunate group of public bodies against which suits have been filed.

Dudley Bayne, city manager reported this week that Ray Richie, an Amarillo electrician, has filed a civil suit for \$25,000 against nine city officials.

The suit results from 'a series of confrontations between Richie and the city concerning his passage of a mast electrician's test authorized by the City Commission before a city electrical license is issued. Richie had previously earned a license, but failed to renew it for four years when he then decided he wanted to work within the city limits again this year.

City ordinance specifies that the test must be taken again and passed successfully before a new license is issued. No renewals are allowed if they have lapsed for a certain period of time.

THE SUIT, filed in district court in Amarillo is formally against the past members of the City Commission, Mayor Jim Sears, Bayne, city building inspector Bill Phipps, and city electrical board members Charles Laing and Charles Owens. No trial dates have been set as yet in connection with the suit.

City Commission members include Emory Brownlow, Frank Barrett, Paul Abalos, and Dub Boyd. Boyd is the only one no longer on the commission since he decided not to seek re-election. Stan Fry was elected in his place, but he is not liable for the suit.

Richie claims that he tendered the city an \$85 check on Jan. 23, 1976, to pay for license fees, but that the city refused the check. The suit states that the defendants had issued licenses previously in like circumstances.

It also stated that he was not properly notified of the license's expiration where

others were notified. In the suit, Richie claims he was denied due process by the city and that the testing procedure "is the arbitrary and unreasonable examination which is intentionally designed to keep new electrical contractors from being able to become licensed and compete in the Hereford electrical contracting market. It is a sham designed to prohibit persons who are not already licensed from acquiring a license in Hereford."

The suit asks judgement as follows: that the court declare the city practices regarding issuance of electrical licenses unconstitutional; that the defendants issue the plaintiff a master electrician's license; that Richie be awarded \$25,000; and that Richie recover all other relief to which he is entitled.

Bayne said the city has 20 days to answer the suit, which is being handled through City Attorney Earnest Langley.

Richie appeared before the City Commission along with his attorney Robin Green of Amarillo on February 2 to contest actions by Phipps to have Richie take the master electrician's test. He was planning to work on an apartment project within the city and he needed a license before he could proceed.

THE COMMISSIONERS voted at that time on a 3-1 decision to investigate the allegations presented and then confer with Green on the findings of the city. Abalos voted no to the arrangement although he did not specify his reasons.

Sears told the commissioners then not to elborate too much on the situation since "this could lead to a suit." As it turned out, a suit was filed and his advice was beneficial.

During the February meeting, Green alleged that his client, Richie, along with other applicants for master's electrician licenses were not fairly treated by tests. He specified that electricians from out-of-town were discriminated against.

A prime factor in the case involves two previous incidents when licenses were supposedly issued to two journeymen electricians who did not take a test. These issuances were said to have taken place since the electrical board last

considered the test two years ago.

Green also contended that the provided was not equal to all applicants since it was too time consuming because section and page numbers of certain answers contained in standard electrical code books had to be recorded. The test is compiled from the code book, which was the subject of some controversy.

Richie had refused to take the test as offered him. The test is an open book test and Richie claimed that even as such, the test was not fair. Sears had said that test was like that required of any other profession where a person is required to know his subject as reflected by tests.

AN AMARILLO ELECTRICAL IN-SPECTOR said his city's test also required page numbers but that it probably contained only about 100

them from the county clerk. The office. located on the second floor of the courthouse, is open from 8-12 a.m. and 1-5 p.m. during week days. The Brand will carry sample ballot in a

future issue listing all candidates for state, federal and local offices. On the local level, Alfred Smith,

Donald Henslee, Leroy Bodkin, Wallace Shelton Jr. and Gerald Parker are

running for county Precinct one position on the Commissioners' Court. The other commissioners' post open is precinct three. Incumbent Bruce Coleman is challegned by Roy Botkin in that race.

Uncontested races exist with Travis McPherson running again for sheriff and Nell Miller running for county tax assessor-collector.

So far campaigning has been relatively quiet with candidates running the traditional newspaper and radio advertisements. As the election draws nearer, though, the candidates ought to bring forth specific issues.

In the meantime, the national candidates for president have been providing campaign rhetoric.

Farmer Concern Fueled By Spiraling Cost Of Gas

It wouldn't be hard these days for local irrigation farmers to get the feeling that they won the battle, but are losing the war, particularly when they look at their monthly bills for irrigation gas.

BACK IN NOVEMBER, a long and controversial battle concerning the priority of natural gas as a fuel for irrigation drew to a close as the Federal Power Commission issued a ruling that irrigation gas has a No. 2 priority.

This ruling came after area farmers testified on the matter at regional hearings in Lubbock, and later sent representatives to additional hearings in Washington, D.C.

Lack of alternative fuels eventually became one of the key considerations which led to the favorable decision by the

Now, after winning the right to continue use of natural gas as an irrigation fuel, farmers are becoming aware that they simple can't afford to exercise that right much longer, due to the rapidly spiraling price of natural gas.

MEMBERS OF THE Plains Irrigation Gas Users Association, concerned over the fuel price situation,

met in Plainview last week to discuss the problems facing irrigators and voted to call for a special session of the Texas Legislature. The association is seeking action on the part of the governor and the legislature to deal with the utility problems facing farmers and housewives

in Texas. John Aikin of Hereford, attorney for the PIGUA, and Carl King of Dimmitt, president of the Texas Corn Growers Association met Saturday with Governor Dolph Briscoe to point up the need for a special session.

. Aikin and King particularly stressed the feeling of many area individuals that the pass-through billing of gas companies is being seriously abused.

According to Aikin, "The governor was unaware that farmers in our area are buy. gas from a company with no controls at all, and referred the matter to a member of his staff."

AIKIN REPORTED THAT the governor knew of the importance of irrigation to the local area, and that no alternate fuel is available for irrigation

"The pass-through on gas bills is a poor method of business, because it discourages competition. There is no incentive for gas companies to attempt to buy gas at the lowest possible prices." Briscoe commented.

Aikin pointed out that Governor Briscoe apparently felt that the State Railroad Commission would do something to help improve the situation.

The commission did take action Monday when it wiped out special authority which had been granted to Lo Vaca Gathering Co. to pass on all its gas costs to customers. The company was

That's because local banks did not receive their new bills from the Federal Reserve System in time to start distribution Tuesday. The bills were scheduled to appear today.


The new \$2 bill features a portrait of Jefferson on the face plate and the reverse plate ties in with the Bicentennial-presenting a copy of John Trumbull's famous post-Revolutionary

War painting, "The Signing of the Declaration of Independence.

The last printing of the \$2 bill was the 1963-63A series in May 1965. It was a U.S. note and bore the signatures of then Secretary of the Treasury Henry Fowler and Treasurer of the U.S. Kathryn O. Granahan. Lack of public demand across the nation resulted in the discontinuance

The revival of the bill is the result of a study by the Harvard School of Business which showed a need for currency between \$1 and \$5 bills. Another factor was the savings that would result from reducing the volume of currency handled.







County Rearranges Courthouse Parking, Considers Jail Standards

The Deaf Smith County Commissioners' Court approved a bid on a pickup for County agricultural extension agent, rearranged parking around the court house, accepted suggestions for a bicentennial project, conducted extended discussions on rebuilding part of the fourth floor of the courthouse, and began pursuing avenues of updating the county jail to meet minimum federal requirements during a lengthy, but rather routine meeting Monday at the courthouse.

County Judge Sam Morgan presided at the all-day session which included a closed session in the afternoon to discuss a salary situations of certain county employees. After the court reconvened in a called open meeting at 5:25 p.m., the commissioners passed a resolution calling for Governor Dolph Briscoe to

ordered to live up to its contracts.

AIKIN INDICATED that the time is rapidly approaching when area farmers will no longer be able to irrigate, due to the high price of irrigation fuel.

"The high price of gas in the Trans-Pecos area of the state has created a terrible situation, with farmers being filled \$1.80 and over per thousand cubic feet of gas." said Aikin. "Farmers are being forced to sell their engines, pull their pumps and stop irrigating, simply because they can't afford to pay the high price of gas. Our own average cost per gas in the local area is \$1.30 per mcf, local farmers may soon be in the same situation as their counterparts in the Trans-Pecos," he added.

A special committee appointed by the PIGUA was to meet in Dimmitt Tuesday night to determine the number and location of special meetings to be held concerning the gas situation.

Probable meeting sites are listed as Dimmitt. Plainview and Lubbock.

THE DEAF SMITH COUNTY
Commissioner's Court joined those
calling for a special legislative session
Monday afternoon when it unanimously
passed a resolution urging Governor
Briscoe to initiate such a session.

The commissioners also called for a copy of their resolution to be presented to Lt. Gov. Bill Hobby and Speaker of the House Bill Clayton.

Also joining the growing list of those calling for a special session was the board of directors of the Bovina Wheat Growers Inc. Directors of the organization voted to call for a special session at a Monday night meeting.

questions as opposed to Hereford's 150 questions. But Sears and other city officials looked at the test and could not find a requirement to list the section and page numbers.

Richie said the test was not hard with reference to material provided but that it was not feasible to take it within the allosted eight hours.

Another factor of the case is the use of a "Grandfather Clause" which allowed earlier electricians a license without a testing provided the applicant was not delinquent in his fees. However, Richie had not paid his fee in four years.

Green based a large part of his contentions on a city ordinace interpretations that the city nor the electrical board had approved the test and therefore the test could not be forced upon Richie before he was issued a license.

He asked the commissioners in February to grant his client a temporary license, but Sears said it couldn't be done in fairness to other electricians. It also could be considered admission of wrongdoings, he added.

A NEW STUDY commissioned by the Illinois Manufacturing Association confirms that Texas is more attractive to industry than any other state. A major reason for this favorable business climate—which benefits every citizen of the state—is that we've managed thus far to keep our taxes less burdensome than in other states.

Between 1964 and 1973 Texas gained 48 per cent more jobs in manufacturing. By comparison. California gained only 18 per cent while New York and Massachusetts lost about 10 and 4 per cent, respectively. It should be noted that Texas is one of only five states without a corporate income tax and one of only six without a personal income tax.

This tax climate is worth preserving—it is good for business and industry, good for the wage earner and the average taxpaying family. But the situation is fragile. If more is not done to hold the line on state spending, new taxes will be the inevitable result. Taxation in the U.S. is rising faster than wages and salaries, faster than national income.

While Texans bear a lighter tax load then most other Americans, the trend toward bigger government and higher taxes has become well established on both the state and local level. In the decade since 1966, state appropriations have increased 250 per cent; college and university spending has quadrupled; public school spending has tripled; and welfare spending has quadrupled.

The Governor's pledge of "no new taxes" was carried out in 1973 and 1975—the longest period with a tax bill in recent history. But the state comptroller now warns that the largest tax bill ever will be needed in 1977 if the spending trend continues. There is little doubt that a major tax battle is shaping up and that personal and corporate income taxes are potential targets.

two near the Johnson Farms, discussed Criminal District Attorney Andy Shuval's budget to include an investigator, and approved Morgan as the continuing county representative to the Manpower Consortium of the Panhandle Regional Planning Commission since the commissioners wanted to continue with the program.

CONCERNING THE PICKUP bid, the commissioners accepted the low price submitted by Orval Watson Ford. It amounted to \$5,765.69 for a 1976 pickup to be used by County Agricultural Extension Agent Justom McBride. He had been driving his personal vehicle before and the court earlier granted him permission to fill up at the sheriff's office fuel pump and to charge gas for out-of-town trips on a county credit card.

Other bids submitted included one from Cowboy Chevrolet for \$5,787.79 and one from John Osborn Pontiac for \$5,968. The county had offered each dealership the purchase of a 1972 Scout Jeep which the sheriff's office had been using. Only Orval Watson returned a bid on it for \$1,225, but the court decided not to accept it.

Based on a request from sheriff Travis McPherson, the court voted to establish 30-minute parking zones on either side of parking lot "island" in front of the SO entrance. This is to allow for those with brief business inside the courthouse to park near the building.

County employees and other drivers had been parking in the lot and tying up the spaces all day thereby forcing others to park further away. Orginally, the court decided in 1966 to set up limited parking ropes, but not throughout the whole lot.

A few spaces in front of the sheriff's office remains reserved only for law enforcement personnel. It is marked no parking for the general public.

BILL ALBRIGHT, Deaf Smith County Chamber of Commerce executive vice president, was given the court's sanction to paint and set up 4 by 8-foot signs at certain road entrances to the county to advertise this area as the top county in beef and agricultural production. James Y. Allen of the State Department of Public Welfare, offered the county a project to renovate the west side of the courthouse's fourth floor.

which would be used as office space for welfare programs such as food stamps. The cost was estimated at about \$55,000. The fourth floor is unoccupied.

He said his department would complete the suggested project if the court issues an order allowing the department to use the space for a certain period of time. The Welfare department renovates structures for their offices

The federal government pays the state welfare department back some funds bases on as yet an undetermined period of occupancy in the rebuilt offices.

The commissioners seemed interested, but took no action.

MCPHERSON WARNED that the county jail would have to meet specified federal standards by the middle of 1977 or early in 1978. This would include added facilities to house juveniles separate from adult inmates, an outdoor recreation area, and a completely separate entrance for transporting prisoners in and out of the jail.

"I would like the court to set aside at least \$100,000 for the jail," the sheriff asked, but the court members concurred that no funds could be stockpiled for specified purposes. However, they jointly agreed that the jail would have to updated when it was known exactly what corrections needed to be made.

Commissioner Bruce Coleman noted that the citizens wouldn't go for a bond issue and Morgan said that the needed funds would probably have to come from increased taxes when the time came to renovate the jail. Presently, about 40 inmates are houses on any given day throughout the year.

The possibility was mentioned of having the city join in the building for new facilities since the police department uses the jail.

A final action by the court was to approve a resolution to urge more funding for Texas highways since funds have been reduced recently for maintenance of the state's roads. "They are quickly deteriorating," Morgan said.

Shuval talked about the need for an investigator and discussed his budget expenses in reference to adding funds for the salary of such an employee. No action was taken. A special meeting is planned on the matters when District Judge Mike Metcalf can meet with the court.

County Grand Jury Returns 20 Indictments

The Deaf Smith County Grand Jury returned 20 indictments against individuals during a monthly session at the courthouse last week. Eight of the indictments were against persons still at-large and so their names were not released.

The 12 grand jury members decided on one no-bill and they passed over one charge.

Felony driving while intoxicated (DWI) topped the list of charges with four persons being indicted. They included Frank Joe Midrano, Luis Castillo, Jimmy Lopez Garza and Julius Roy Blalock. A Felony DWI is considered as such since it is at least the second time that a person has been caught drinking while driving.

Three of the indictments were lodged against Ernest Priento on three counts of burglary of habitation.

Three burglary of motor vehicle

Three burglary of motor vehicle charges were found against separate individuals. They included Demesio

Mendoza, David Casias and Adam L. Lopez.

Guadalupe Lopez was indicted for possession of a controlled substance which is synonymous with drug abuse

charges.

The remaining indictment was against Kenneth Buell Williams Jr. for forgery and passing of a check of insufficient

funds.

No definite trial dates have been set on the above cases although the district clerk said the next week of criminal jury trials is scheduled for the week of May 10 and that civil jury trials are set for the week of May 17.

Specific weeks are set aside for trials in the 69th Judicial District Court since district Judge Mike Metcalf is only able to come to Hereford about once a month for extended lengths of time. He lives in Dumas where the district court is headquartered.

The grand jury does not convene again until May 21.

Hereford Man Charged With Assault Of Officer

Felix Herrera Cavazos, 17, of Hereford, remained in Garza County jail at presstime in lieu of \$30,000 bond on charges of assault.

CAVAZOS WAS charged Monday with assault on a police officer in connection with the clubbing of a highway patrolman and the theft of the patrolman's rifle north of Post Saturday.

A juvenile was also arrested in connection with the case and was referred to juvenile authorities.

According to Garza County Sheriff Gene Gandy, the assault and theft occurred Saturday on U.S. 84 at about 9 p.m. Highway patroman Jerry Morris

was attempting to cite a driver for a

incident.

Morris was stunged but not seriously injured. He returned to his car to find his rifle missing and another car fleeing the scene.

March Criminal Activity Reported For SO, DPS

The Deaf Smith County Sheriff's Office reported that a total of 55 arrests were made and that property valued at \$12,267 was stolen during the month of March. This reflects activity of both the sheriff's department and the Texas Department of Public Safety patrolmen.

The information was included on the monthly report now being compiled by Sheriff Travis McPherson and his staff.

The report listed driving while intoxicated (DWI) as the major crime resulting in arrests. About 21 persons were charged with that offense:

Others are a follows: aggravated assault, 2; burglary, and Larceny-theft, one each; fraud, three; vandalism, one; drug abuse, four; drunkness, 11; and other offenses, 11.

Total offenses reported were two

assaults, three burglaries, and 12

larceny-thefts.

Offenses cleared by arrest or exceptional means included two assaults four burglaries, and 17 larceny-thefts for a total of 23 cleared cases.

Livestock stolen was valued at \$2,950 for the single highest valued stolen item. Miscellaneous property stolen amounted to \$8,055. About \$270 in clothing was taken, as was \$6 currency and \$977 in televisions, radios and similar pieces of property.

Churches Have New **Obligations**

Churches owning businesses not related to their religious or charitable activities should be aware that they now are subject to federal income taxes, the Texas Society of Certified Public Accountants warns.

Actually, say the CPAs, Congress voted seven years ago to end the tax exemption for unrelated church businesses. and all such firms set up since May 27, 1969 have been taxed like any other business.

But a grace period to the end of 1975 was granted to church businesses that were then in existence. And many of those in charge of these older church businesses, the CPAs fear, may have overlooked or forgotten that the requirements now apply to them, too.

Among the requirements, they say, is the keeping of detailed records and the filing of various returns and reports required by Internal Revenue Service.

Children Have **Education Benefits**

Education benefits are available to many dependents of veterans whose death or total and permanent disability was the result of their service. Jack Coker, Veterans Administration Regional Director, said today.

Dependents of service personnel missing in action. captured, interned or forcibly detained in line of duty by a foreign power for more than 90 days may also qualify for the VA education benefits.

In general, those eligible are children between 18 and 26 years of age and the spouses of veterans whose death or total and permanent disability resulted from military service after the beginning of the Spanish-American War on April 28.

Unless extended under certain conditions, a child's VA educational eligibility ends on his 26th birthday, plus any time period after his 18th birthday required to process the

The eligibility of a spouse ends on November 30, 1978, or 10 years from the date the veteran was found to have a total and permanent serviceconnected disability, or 10 years from the date of his death. whichever is later.

Spouses of service personnel declared missing in action. captured or detained in line of duty, are eligible for education benefit until Dec. 24, 1980, or for 10 years from the date the listing was made, whichever is later. Coker said.

For a spouse intending to take apprenticeship, on-the-job or correspondence training, eligibility is based on the 10-year period or October 24, 1982,

whichever is later. A child's marriage is not a barrier to the education benefits. Coker said, but the remarriage of a spouse ends his or her eligibility unless that

marriage is terminated by death

or divorce. The VA benefits provide up to 36 months of schooling, or the equivalent of 36 months if the student is enrolled on a part-time basis.

Unless the child of a veteran has been accepted by an approved institution for courses leading to a standard college degree, he or she will automatically receive VA counseling to assist in the selection of an educational goal and the development of a program to

An education plan must be submitted by or for the eligible child showing the goal, program to be followed, the school or schools selected and a program cost estimate. Coker added. Training may be taken at any

approved college, vocational, business or professional school. or at any approved institution providing apprenticeship or other on-the-job training. In addition to the types of

training listed above, spouses may enroll in secondary and correspondence schools or in schools offering farm cooperative programs.

Any program of education outside the United States may be pursued only at an approved institution of higher learning.

Monthly allowance rates paid under this program are \$270 for full time students, \$203 for three-quarter time students. and \$135 for half-time students.

Tuition costs only-limited to \$270-will be paid to less than half-time students.

Enrollees in full time cooperative courses will alternate classroom study with on-the-job experience, will recieve \$217 a month.

Eligible students may borrow up to \$600 per academic year to pursue a college degree course or one leading to a professional or vocational objective which requires at least six months to

Loans are available only to students unable to obtain student loans of the amount required under provisions of the Higher Education Act of 1965. . Full information on the VA dependents' education program can be obtained at the nearest VA office, veterans county service office, or veterans service organization.





Judging by television commercials, the average American housewife is obsessed with keeping her kitchen clean. But just how clean? .Suppose a health department Food and Drug inspector visited your kitchen. Would it pass the inspection?

According to the Texas Department of Health Resources, there's a good chance that it would not -- and that might be part of the reason that the incidence of food-borne disease. such as food poisoning, is far more common in the home than in public restaurants. Of course, how clean you keep

your kitchen, and the sanitary practices you follow in your own home, are entirely your own business. But you might find it interesting to compare your own food-handling practices with the official rules that food service establishments are required to follow. So let's take a brief health inspection of your

kitchen. We'll start with the kind food you serve your family general rule, whatever bought at the super rket should be okay, since the supermarket itself must abide by similar health department rules. But there are some things you need to check. Is every food item properly labelled to show both, the contents and the source? Did you pick up some dented canned goods? If you did, throw them out - you can't use them. The same is true of any food package that was accidentally broken or opened before you got it home.

You, know that jar of home-made pickled peaches your neighbor gave you? And the home-canned tomatoes you bought at a little fruit stand on a back country road? Throw them all out. Home-canned products can't be used in a restaurant: the danger of food-borne disease from improper processing is just too great.

· What about the way you store your foods? Dry foods, such as cereals, bread, flour, sugar, and so on, must be stored in air-tight containers once the original package has been opened. Out goes that half-empty cereal box in the pantry! Speaking of the pantry, you know that bag of potatoes sitting on the floor?

That's against the rules: all foods must be stored up, off the

Anything that might spoil at room temperatures must be either refrigerated or frozen -- of course. But is your freezer set to maintain zero degrees Fahrenheit? And does your refrigerator keep everything ... top to bottom, front to back -- at no more than 45 degrees? You'd better check with a good thermometer. Incidentally, if you're concerned about wasting energy by setting the refrigerator temperature that low, look at it this way: you'll probably make up for the loss because your foods will stay fresh and enjoyable several days longer at 45 degrees than they would at

50 degrees or more. One minor point to watch for: If you're in the habit of sticking fruit juice, beer, or soda pop cans in an ice cube container to cool them down quicker, you'd better not plan on using the ice for anything else. In fact, the health inspector will frown on storing anything in ice.

There's one major problem in almost every kitchen. When you're preparing a complete meal for your family, what happens if the meat is done before the vegetables are ready? According to the health inspectors, you'd better keep the meat hot -- no less than 140 degrees Fahrenheit. The same rule applies to all cooked foods. If you ever let cooked food stand for more than a couple of minutes at temperature below 140 degrees, you're not only breaking the rules -- you're openly inviting a serious case of food poisoning.

If there's one thing the average housewife probably thinks she's doing right, it's washing dishes -- especially if she uses an automatic dishwasher. Unfortunately, a health inspector probably wouldn't agree. Unless, of course, she uses a triple sink for hand-washing in three stages; washing in soapy water, rinsing in hot water, and a final sanitizing rinse in water that has been heated in hot water, and a final sanitizing chemical. No triple sink? No sanitizing rinse? No good. And the usual. automatic dishwasher in most

Children Have **Education Benefits**

Education benefits are available to many dependents of veterans whose death or total and permanent disability was the result of their service. Jack Coker, Veterans Administration Regional Director, said today.

Dependents of service personnel missing in action. captured, interned or forcibly detained in line of duty by a foreign power for more than 90 days may also qualify for the VA education benefits.

In general, those eligible are children between 18 and 26 years of age and the spouses of eterans whose death or total and permanent disability resulted from military service after the beginning of the Spanish-American War on April 28

Unless extended under certain conditions, a child's VA educational eligibility ends on his 26th birthday, plus any time period after his 18th birthday required to process the application.

The eligibility of a spouse ends on November 30, 1978, or 10 years from the date the veteran was found to have a total and permanent serviceconnected disability, or 10 years from the date of his death. whichever is later.

Spouses of service personnel declared missing in action. captured or detained in line of duty, are eligible for education benefit until Dec. 24, 1980, or for 10 years from the date the listing was made, whichever is later. Coker said.

For a spouse intending to take apprenticeship, on-the-job or correspondence training, eligibility is based on the 10-year period or October 24, 1982, whichever is later.

A child's marriage is not a barrier to the education benefits. Coker said, but the remarriage of a spouse ends his or her eligibility unless that

marriage is terminated by death

or divorce. The VA benefits provide up to 36 months of schooling, or the equivalent of 36 months if the student is enrolled on a part-time basis.

Unless the child of a veteran has been accepted by an approved institution for courses leading to a standard college degree, he or she will automatically receive VA counselling to assist in the selection of an educational goal and the development of a program to

An education plan must be submitted by or for the eligible child showing the goal, program to be followed, the school or schools selected and a program cost estimate. Coker added.

Training may be taken at any approved college, vocational, business or professional school, or at any approved institution providing apprenticeship or other on-the-job training.

In addition to the types of training listed above, spouses may enroll in secondary and correspondence schools or in schools offering farm cooperative programs.

Any program of education outside the United States may be pursued only at an approved institution of higher learning.

Monthly allowance rates paid under this program are \$270 for full time students, \$203 for three-quarter time students. and \$135 for half-time students.

Tuition costs only-limited to 5270-will be paid to less than half-time students.

Enrollees in full time cooperative courses will alternate classroom study with on-the-job experience, will recieve \$217 a month.

Eligible students may borrow up to \$600 per academic year to pursue a college degree course or one leading to a professional or vocational objective which requires at least six months to complete.

Loans are available only tostudents unable to obtain student loans of the amount required under provisions of the Higher Education Act of 1965.

Full information on the VA dependents' education program can be obtained at the nearest VA . office. veterans county service office, or veterans service organization.



Judging by television commercials, the average American housewife is obsessed with keeping her kitchen clean. But just how clean? Suppose a health department Food and Drug inspector visited your kitchen. Would it pass the inspection?

According to the Texas Department of Health Resources, there's a good chance that it would not -- and that might be part of the reason that the incidence of food-borne disease. such as food poisoning, is far more common in the home than in public restaurants.

Of course, how clean you keep your kitchen, and the sanitary practices you follow in your own nome, are entirely your own business. But you might find it interesting to compare your own food-handling practices with the official rules that food service establishments are required to follow. So let's take a brief health inspection of your kitchen.

We'll start with the kind of food you serve your family. As a general rule, whatever you bought at the supermarket should be okay, since the supermarket itself must abide by similar health department rules. But there are some things you need to check. Is every food item properly labelled to show both the contents and the source? Did you pick up some dented canned goods? If you did, throw them out -- you can't use them. The same is true of any food package tiffat was accidentally broken or opened before you got it home.

You know that jar of home-made pickled peaches your neighbor gave you? And the home-canned tomatoes you bought at a little fruit stand on a back country road? Throw them all out. Home-canned products can't be used in a restaurant: the danger of food-borne disease from improper processing is just too great.

What about the way you store your foods? Dry foods, such as cereals, bread, flour, sugar, and so on, must be stored in air-tight containers once the original package has been opened. Out goes that half-empty cereal box in the pantry! Speaking of the pantry, you know that bag of potatoes sitting on the floor?

That's against the rules: all foods must be stored up, off the Anything that might spoil at

room temperatures must be either refrigerated or frozen - of course. But is your freezer set to maintain zero degrees Fahrenheit? And does your refrigerator keep everything ... top to bottom, front to back -- at no more than 45 degrees? You'd better check with a good thermometer. Incidentally, if you're concerned about wasting energy by setting the refrigerator temperature that low, look at it this way: you'll probably make up for the loss because your foods will stay fresh and enjoyable several days longer at 45 degrees than they would at 50 degrees or more.

One minor point to watch for: If you're in the habit of sticking fruit juice, beer, or soda pop cans in an ice cube container to cool them down quicker, you'd better not plan on using the ice for anything else. In fact, the health inspector will frown on storing anything in ice.

There's one major problem in almost every kitchen. When you're preparing a complete meal for your family, what happens if the meat is done before the vegetables are ready? According to the health inspectors, you'd better keep the meat hot -- no less than 140 degrees Fahrenheit. The same rule applies to all cooked foods. If you ever let cooked food stand for more than a couple of minutes at temperature below 140 degrees, you're not only breaking the rules - you're openly inviting a serious case of food poisoning.

If there's one thing the average housewife probably thinks she's doing right, it's washing dishes -- especially if she uses an automatic dishwasher. Unfortunately, a health inspector probably wouldn't agree. Unless, of course, she uses a triple sink for hand-washing in three stages: washing in soapy water, rinsing in hot water, and a final sanitizing rinse in water that has been heated in hot water, and a final sanitizing chemical. No triple sink? No sanitizing rinse? No good. And the usual automatic dishwasher in most American homes won't pass inspection either.

TO KNOW WHAT TO DO WHEN A TORNADO IS APPROACHING MAY MEAN THE

When time permits, go to a tornado cellar, cave or underground excavation which should have an air outlet to help equalize the air pressure. It should be kept fit for use, free from water, gas or debris; and preferably equipped with pick and shovel. THERE IS NO UNIVERSAL PROTECTION AGAINST TORNADOES EXCEPT UNDERGROUND EXCAVATIONS.

1. Move at right angles to the tornado's path. Tornadoes usually move ahead at about 25 to 40 miles

1. Seek inside shelter, preferably in a strongly reinforced building. STAY AWAY FROM WINDOWS!

3. Standing against the inside wall on a lower floor of an office building offers some protection.

2. In homes: The corner of the basement toward the tornado usually offers greatest safety, particularly in frame houses. People in houses without basements can sometimes be protected by taking cover under heavy furniture against inside walls. Doors and windows on the sides of the house away from the tornado

1. In city areas: If, school building is of strongly reinforced construction, stay inside, away from windows,

2. In rural schools that do not have strongly reinforced construction, remove children and teachers to

2. If there is no time to escape, lie flat in the nearest depression such as a ditch or ravine



If in factories and industrial plants: On receiving a tornado warning, a lookout should be posted to keep safely officials advised of the tornado's approach. Advance preparation should be made for moving workers to sections of the plant offering the greatest protection. Keep calm. It will not help to get excited. People have been killed by running out into streets and by turning back into the path of a tornado. Even though a warning is issued, chances of a tornado striking one's home or location are very slight. Tornadoes cover such a small zone, as a rule, that relatively only a few places in a warned area are directly affected. You should know about tornadoes though, "just in case." Keep tuned to your radio or television station for latest tornado advisory information. Do not call the Weather Bureau, except to report a tornado, as your individual request may treup telephone linesurgently needed to receive special reports or to relay advisories to radio and television stations for dissemination to thousands in the critical area. Burial Allowances Texans Get Chance To Bite Sharks **Available To Vets**

The Veterans Administration today urged former servicemen and women to acquaint members of their families with the VA burial allowances available to veterans.

For example, VA will provide a payment of up to \$250 toward the burial expenses of eligible veterans. An additional \$150 is payable as a plot or interment allowance when burial is not in a National Cemetery or other cemetery under United States Government jurisdiction.

Burial or plot allowances are paid to funeral directors and cemetery owners if burial costs are unpaid, otherwise the proper claimant is the person who bore the expense of funeral and burial, Jack Coker, Veterans Administration Regional Director, noted.

In case the veteran's death is service-connected, payment of an amount not to exceed \$800 will be made. This payment is made instead of the usual burial and interment allowances.

Burial is available for all eligible veterans at all National Cemeteries except Arlington. Burial in these cemeteries is also available to an eligible veteran's spouse, minor children and, under certain conditions, to unmarried adult children.

Since 1967 burial in Arlington National Cemetery has been

limited to persons dying while on active duty, Medal of Honor winners, former service personnel on official service retired lists, certain high government officials and certain members of the immediate families of those listed or those already buried

The Veterans Administration will also, upon request, provide an American flag to drape the casket of the veteran.

A headstone or grave marker is also available for eligible veterans and memorial markers are provided for certain members of the armed forces who die on active duty and whose remains are not reco-

Eligible veterans are those discharged under conditions other than dishonorable and who served in the Spanish-American War, Mexican Border Period. World War I, World War II, the Korean Conflict, the Vietnam Era or who are peacetime veterans entitled to service-connected compensation at time of death or discharge, or who were retired for disability

incurred in the line of duty. Full information concerning these allowances and eligibility for them is available at any Veterans Administration Office. veterans county service office. or veterans service organiza-

Four tests were conducted. two each in Arlington and the north Dallas area.

In the first taste test, 128 persons were served four pieces of broiled, unseasoned fish. The four fish tested were redfish, used as the control piece.

Poultry Tips Given For Breed Choices

Whether you have a large poultry operation or are a small flock owner, you need to select the right breeds of chickens for the right job," says a poultry specialist for the Texas

Agricultural Extension Service. 'lt's not enough to use one breed of chicken for both egg. and meat production." says Dr. William O. Cawley. "An egg producer needs a certain breed of chicken and a meat producer needs another."

Cawley says birds selected for egg production should meet certain standards and that a leghorn-type bird is best for the production of high quality white shelled eggs.

"A hen should lay 240 eggs during the first year of production and should produce a dozen eggs on four pounds of feed or less," says the Texas A&M University System specialist. "A dozen eggs should weigh 24 ounces after the third month of production but should not weigh over 251/2 ounces after the first year."

Birds used for egg production should weigh between 31/4 weeks of age.

The mortality rate of the birds should not be more than 12 per cent during the first year of

"Egg shells should be of high uality, and no more than three per cent of all eggs produced hould have flaws such as weak shells or blood spots," notes Cawley.

For high quality meat production, the specialist suggests Cornish-cross birds with predominantly white feathers

They were given a small and a large piece of fish, the same as in the first test. This time they were also given two more pieces, one large, one small, that had been soaked in water for 15 hours," Schwartz noted.

He added that soaking the shark meat in water prior to cooking is thought to remove a bitter taste.

However, results showed the large, unsoaked piece of meat was rated the highest, 4.5, while the small treated piece was rated lowest, 3.5.

For the third test, "We made an effort to make the meat taste good by breading and frying it." Schwartz said. Some 80 testers were given three, bite-sized pieces of fish: one redfish, one soaked sharpnose and one untreated sharpnose. The treated piece had been soaked in water before cooking.

In that test, the control substance (redfish) and the soaked piece of shark meat scored identically, 5.4. The untreated piece scored slightly lower, 5.2

In the fourth test, 64 testers were given identical pieces of blacktip shark.

the other piece was also shark." Schwartz said.

Suprisingly, the piece identified as shark received a higher rating than the unidentified piece of fish. Of the 64, only four said they could not distinguish between the two pieces. There was, in fact, no difference, since both portions were blacktip shark.

"These results surprised us somewhat," Schwartz noted, "but it shows a general indication of positive reaction. as far as taste is concerned. The public in our samples thinks shark meat tastes good, and most of the shark meat got basically the same scores as redfish, which is an accepted good-tasting fish."

Regarding all four tests, Schwartz indicated much of the data have not been cross-referenced, nor has an analysis been completed. He said several computer tests still have to be applied to the data before a definite analysis can be drawn and results defined, "but people generall liked the product they tested, whether they knew it was shark or not."

Although attitude test resutls are not complete, he added, We do know that women are more averse to eating shark than men, and we do know that all species of shark do not taste



the same. The differences in taste, however slight, are real."

On the attitude survey, individuals were asked their reaction if they ate a piece ofgood-tasting fish and were told it was shark meat. Out of 199 respondents, 144, or 72 per cent, said they would be pleasantly surprised and continue eating. Only 23 persons, 11 per cent, said they would be upset at being told it was shark

meat and stop eating. "Our data thus far indicate. shark is not all that different in taste from other types of fish and what differences there are in the shark's favor. Its meat is of firmer and won't flake apart, 65 per cent of the animal is edible and there are no bones in the flesh," Schwartz noted.

More than 20 species of shark are found in the Gulf of Mexico. and Schwartz feels the shark supply is available in enough quantity to be marketable if people accept it as a source of

Texas Taxes

By BOB BULLOCK, State Comptroller

It's time to do something about the souring costs of unlines for residential users. Only by making a fundamental change in rate structures can the consumer be granted any real relief from skyrocketing gas and

electric bills. Although it has recently been suggested that the answer is to reduce taxes on natural gas and hope that the savings to the producers may be passed along to utility companies and ultimately to consumers, that proposal just doesn't make sense.

In the unlikely event that any savings would be passed on to the consumer, the average residential user might be saved a dollar a month on gas and electric bills.

And we would be robbing Peter to pay Paul in the sense that the Legislature would probably have to raise some other tax to make up for the loss of revenue that would

What we should do is pass legislation to require equalization of utility rates

Right now the big users of gas and electricity get a big break from both private and public utility companies. Gas and electric rate structures discriminate against the low-volume user—the excluse fromeowner or apartment dweller.

Presently, the more gas of electricity a consumer uses the lower the rate paid per unit. Big business, big industry, and big houses use tremendous amounts of gas and electricity, and the average residential consumeris forced by discriminatory rate structures to help pay

their utility bills Equalizing unitis rates would have two destrable effects-significantly lowering utility bills for the average homeowner and apartment dweller and encouraging

conscivation of energy by making every user in a given area pay at the same rate for gas and electricity, no matter how puch is used.

As I told the Ways and Means Committee of the Texas House of Representatives, which is considering the proposed reduction in the natural gas severance tax rate, it is also untair that citizens of other states can pay lower rates for

our gas than Texas users. We need to increase taxes on gas that goes out of state so that the people of Texas can benefit more substantially from our own natural resources. Taxes passed on to residents of other States are taxes Texans don't have to pay.

But let's not kid ourselves or deceive Texas' taxpaying unlity consumers. It won't mean much if anything in terms of their bills. It would bring the State of Texas more tax meome from out-of-state users who are presently getting a cheap ride on our

Present discriminatory undity rate storetures should, he changed by legislative action. It is untain and wasteful of our energy resources to charge

Crime Continues Rise in Texas

AUSTIN -- Crime continued to rise in Texas dur-

ing the last year The Department of Public Safety reported a dramatic leap of 14.7 per cent over the previous year. The count: 654,760 major criminal offenses during 1975, compared with 570,640 the year before.

Largest increase was in heavily populated rural areas near major cities. where crimes were up 29.4

By contrast, the smallest increase was in mostsparsely-settled rural areas, where the rate change was only 4.2 per

Col. Wilson E. Speir, DPS director, said Texas law enforcement officers continued to improve their crime clearance rates, reporting overall clearances of 25 percent compared with 23 per cent in 1974

Most major crimes were committed in urban areas. but the rate of increase there - 146 per cent was less than that for the rural territory.

Murder and homicide rates increased 2.8 per cent, rape 2.1 per cent, burglary 13 per cent, theft 20.2 per cent and auto theft 2.6 per

Courts Speak

Texas Supreme Court turned down the state's effort to collect \$262.5 million from Superior Oil Company for oil and gas produced in San Patricio

County on land involved in an ownership challenge.

In another case, the high court held persons charged with crimes cannot be committed to mental institutions without jury trials in civil proceedings.

The Court of Criminal Appeals reversed the conviction of a Houston-area massage parlor operator on charges of promoting prostitution.

Third Court of Civil Appeals concluded a wife of a serviceman who is divorcing him is not entitled to a part of retirement benefits he is still working toward.

New Rules Set

Texas Public Utility Commission's new proposed regulations would require users of lots of electricity to pay more.

Home consumers would benefit, but only those in rural areas will be under direct P.U.C. control starting next September.

Rules will not be adopted until after public hearings.

One of the regulations would require that electric utilities uniformly bill fuel costs to their customers by kilowat hours of consumption, no matter how much is used. Big consumers now get lower rates. Utilities could still base rates in part on lower cost of serving industrial consumers.

Rules would allow more time for paying bills and smaller penalties in event of late payments.

Vets Bonds Sold


Thirty-five million dollars worth of veterans land bonds have been sold at a low interest rate of 4.0623 per cent.





Keeping good family records is essential for realistic planning for the future, Linda McCormack. a family resource

management specialist, says. She also mentioned income tax returns as another reason for keeping good records. It's easier to prepare the income tax return if the family business affairs are in order first.

Mrs. McCormack is with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System.

"Although each family must work out its own home file system, some general guidelines may be helpful. Ask yourself a few questions for a starter," she said. -How easy or difficult would

it be for other family members to figure out your record system-or do you have a system?

Who in the family besides you knows where to turn for necessary information about the family assets and obligations?

-Do you have a list of people

who are important financial advisers?

"The list might include tax consultant, attorney, banker, insurance representatives, employer, all creditors and debtors." she suggested.

.. What happens if your home is burglarized or if there is a fire and all records are destroyed? Which ones can be replaced,



Tomatoes Popular But Fickle

Just about every home gardener has a few tomato plants that are his pride and joy. But there's more to growing a good crop of tomatoes than just setting out the plants.

"Tomatoes can be some of the most rewarding garden plants, but they can also bring frustration," points out Sam Cotner, horticulturist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

tomatoes. Cotner offers a few

'First of all, select varieties that are adapted to the area and that resist many of the common diseases. Such varieties as Spring Giant, Homestead, Porter, Terrific or Small Fry are excellent for most areas of

When buying tomato plants, that are about as tall as they are as , stakes.

Be sure to locate tomatoes in an area that receives at least six hours of sunlight a day.

"Plant tomatoes in a soil rich in organic matter and containing adequate fertilization. Allow about four square feet of space for each plant.

"Set the plants somewhat deeper than they were originally growing. Apply a starter solution; one can be made by For success at growing mixing one or two tablespoons of a complete fertilizer in a gallon of water.

To reduce wilting, set out plants on a cloudy day or late in the afternoon. Protect them from adverse conditions such as high winds or excessive heat by providing some cover, such as milk cartons with the ends cut

"As the plants begin to grow, select those that are short, provide some form of support to stocky and dark green-ones keep fruit off the ground, such

Cost of Cooking Varies Widely Between Appliances

By Robert L. Haney

Until recently, we bought cooking appliances Based on such factors as time or labor saving, whether they heated or smoked up the kitchen, and whether we had handy gas or electrical connections.

But no more. Most everyone has grown increasingly conscious of utility bills. And they bring home. in a personal way, the need to save energy.

Of the total national energy consumption, about one-fifth is used in residential services and 11 percent of the residential energy is used for food preparation. according to Dr. Richard E. Wainerdi. Director of the Center for Energy and Mineral Resources at Texas A&M University

So, sizeable amounts of both energy and money canbe saved in home food preparation if the more efficient appliances are selected and used in the most economical

The Consumer Research

Bruce

Center of the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station (TAES), Texas A&M University, did a study to compare the energy utilization of various appliances using different cooking methods and food quantities.

As you know there is a growing, almost bewildering variety of home cooking appliances. But in considering them, you'll find they fall into three categories, according to energy sources 13 electricity, 2) natural gas, and 3 liquid petroleum gas

The electric appliances. besides the regular ranges. now include a variety of small appliances and the relatively new microwave

Conventional ovens may be divided into three types: 1) ovens with no built-in cleaning feature, 2) continuous cleaning ovens cleaned by special catalysts and 3) self-cleaning ovens which are cleaned by pyrolysis chemical change by heat

To make a decision as to which is best, an individual must know the fuel source

and which oven type is the most economical from the standpoint of fuel use or fuel cost," according to Dr. Ki Soon Rhee of the TAES Consumer Research Center.

"Once you have selected the cooking appliance, you then have to decide the best cooking method for each type of food you prepare. since fuel cost for cooking will vary not only according to fuel source, appliance performance and food item. but also according to cooking method and food quantity. Rhee points out.

In our research, the ground beef patty was chosen as the food item due to the relative easiness of obtaining the same kind of samples. says Flowayne Drew TAES nutritionist who collaborated with Rhee in this research.

The cooking procedures were established based upon desired internal temperature and sensory evaluation of the cooked products.

Four cooking methods tested were surface cooking pan frying), broiling, baking and microwave cooking. For surface cooking and broiling of one or four patties, the cost for different fuels was cheapest for the natural gas. liquid petroleum gas was next, and electricity was highest. For baking, natural gas was much cheaper than both liquid petroleum gas and electricity, but the latter two were comparable.

As for the different cooking methods, surface cooking and microwave cooking were comparable and cost least followed by broiling and baking, respectively. When single-serving cooking was compared to four-Singer Annual Spring

serving cooking, the percentage increase in fuel consumption from the former to the latter was highest for microwave cooking, followed by surface cooking and baking in that order: there was no change for broiling. For various sensors characteristics, such as flavor, tenderness, appearance and overall acceptability: surface-cooked patties ranked highest and microwave-cooked patties lowest.

Can you save fuel by not preheating ovens when you bake or roast meat dishes? According to this study. some savings, although small, can be achieved by non-preheated baking. without sacrificing the quality of cooked meat.

How about fuel cost differences in terms of oven cleaning features? It is generally said that baking cost is lower in self-cleaning ovens. due to better insulation. than in ovens with other cleaning features, however, this study indicated that such a generalization cannot be made without specifying the brand or design of the appliances. Certain brands of continuous-cleaning ovens cost less for baking than other brands of self-cleaning

. How much would you expect to pay for operating as many as five pilot lights in a natural gas or a liquid petroleum gas stove? One may have to pay as high as \$2 per month for running pilot lights of one liquid petroleum gas range and \$0.80 for those of a natural gas range based on the September 1975 fuel rates in the Bryan-College Station area

Electric Bill Explained

Figuring out their electricity bill is as hard as deciphering "Greek" to most consumers.

But Patricia Seaman, a housing and home furnishings specialist, offers some insight into how utility companies bill their customers.

She is with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. The Texas A&M University System.

"First, it is important to consider the electric rate you are Each year the municipality or company supplying the electricity has to sign contracts with a company to purchase fuel for making electricity. Usually the fuel is gas, oil or coal. Warer and uranium can be used also," she

Most municipalities sign "take or pay" contracts with several sources so that they will have an adequate supply of fuel.

This means that at the time contracts are signed, the municipality or power company take that amount, they still have to pay for the contracted amount. This assures the consumer better prices, the specialist said.

"The electric rate consumers pay for fuel is based on that contract price, plus a cushion amount for fluctuations. Any cost over the rate is passed on to the users in the form of a fuel adjustment. If the customers of a municipality use less than agreed to in the contract, they still have to pay for the agreed

But before explaining the fuel adjustment, it's necessary to understand the regular billing charges," she continued.

of a 1970's adventure in a "The current bill you receive reflects the cost of fuel your supplier had to pay two months prior to the current date, along. with how many kilowatt hours you used last month. The ratesthat residential customers are charged can vary from one customer to another, because rates usually depend on the number of KWH used. Rate schedules generally are set up this way: the more KWH a customer uses, the less he pays for each KWH.

"For example, one municipality has a rate schedule like this, which also includes a winter and summer rate.

She explained that the difference between the summer and winter rates is a result of the Federal government determining that heat is essential in the winter and consumers should get a cost break during this high consumption period. Cooling costs in the summer do not get similar treatment since cooling is not considered

essential. "So four different costs may have been computed to arrive at the monthly charge appearing on the bill. And if your energy supplier had to purchase extra fuels over what is available from the company contracted with, you also have a fuel adjustment

"In this case the net energy charge per KWH is increased hundreth fourteen (\$0.00014) for each one cent or fraction thereof by which the cost of fuel to the city exceeds the cushion amount for the quantity of fuel containing, 1.000,000 BTU's," Mrs. Sea-

takes a position. The "call" the "put" and the 'straddle or double option' are the three basic forms of options that can be purchased. The strict definition of a commodity option is the "claim or right to buy (call option) or sell (put option) a specific commodity futures contract at a predeter mined price (striking price) within a given time period. The striking price incidentally is

the "agreed upon price at which the underlying futures contract can be bought or sold." Using sugar as an example: A six month call for sugar means

that an investor or "taker"

purchases the right to exercise his option or take profits if the price of sugar within the next six months should appreciate enough in value to cover the cost of his premium plus show a return or profit for his investment. In other words, if the "premium" (cash payment the taker makes in return for the right to be long or short the underlying futures contract at the striking price) for sugar is \$2,000 and the striking price is equivalent to 15 cents per pound per 50 ton contract (112,000 lbs), the sugar will have to increase in value to at least 17 cents per pound within the next six months before the taker can break even on his \$2,000 nvestment. This may not seem be a very large difference in price, but remember that when

the option is purchased the price of sugar may have been trading at 12 cents per pound. However, if the taker should have the good fortune to see sugar values appreciate above 17 cents within six months of his time limit, then whatever price the option is exercised at above 17 cents will result in profit. If the option is exercised at let's say 20 cents per pound, the taker will earn \$3,360 (1 cent per pound x 112,000 lbs x 3 cents)

minus commissions. Not a bad return for anybody's money. The opposite occurs for the aker of a puteoption. If the price of sugar should drop below the designated striking price then profits accrue once the cost of the premium is covered and the price moves lower. It is like being short the sugar futures, except that while the taker earns money as the price depreciates in value he has no extra risk if the price should suddenly reverse its trend and remain above the striking price for the

duration of his option.

The double option is the combination of a call option and a put option. The taker has the right to be either long or short the underlying futures contract within the specified time period.

The premium for "doubles" however, are usually about twice that of a regular call or

Presently only a few options can be traded but only in London. It is hoped that options trading will be allowed in the U.S. especially in the grain and livestock markets. . If this occurs, then a whole new speculative medium will blossom out of the commodity futures industry. In popularity and volume it could easily surpass the now famous stock options market at the Board of Trade in Chicago.

The average Texas dairy cow is producing 75 pounds more milk per month this year than last year and milk prices have improved. These two factors have boosted the outlook for dairymen in Texas, says Dr. Randall Stelly, a dairy marketing economist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service

"Dairymen can afford to feed a higher percentage of concentrated feed because they are

getting \$1.35 more per hundred pounds of milk this year than last and are paying about the same prices for feed.

The economist believes the heavier concentrate feeding and gains in milk production will probably continue throughout Stelly says milk production

during the first half of the year could be one per cent higher than last year's levels and that milk prices this spring will be 10 to 15 per cent above prices received a year ago.

"Even though milk prices are higher than those last spring. they are lower than prices received in December of 1975 because of a drop in wholesale

prices and an increase in available milk supplies," says the Texas A&M University System economist.

The support level for milk will be raised to \$8.13 per hundredweight beginning April 1, notes Stelly. This price, which is an increase of 42 cents, is 80 per cent of parity.

The official Class I (bottled fresh milk) price will be \$10.57 per hundredweight in April, an increase of \$1.40 over last April's price. However, it is 65 cents below the March price and 83 cents below February's price.

The economist says cash receipts in the U.S. dairy industry for 1975 totaled \$9.8 billion, up \$400 million from

1974 totals. He also expects cash receipts for 1976 to exceed last year's level because of more marketings and higher prices for milk.

On the retail price front. Stelly believes milk prices will be six to eight per cent higher than those of 1975.

As far as consumption is concerned, the average American consumed 546 pounds of fluid milk and equivalent in dairy products in 1975. This included more butter and ice cream but less cheese than in 1974. Stelly says. He attributes the decrease in cheese con-

sumption to lower beef prices.

Director Opposes Use Controls

The executive director of the Texas Water Quality Board recently told some 1,600 agricultural producers and others attending the Texas Animal Agriculture Conference at Texas A&M University that he is strongly opposed to land-use controls.



'Current beef prices are lower now than they are going to be for the remainder of the year and possibly longer," points out Dr. Ernest Davis, a livestock marketing specialist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

The low prices for Choice beef are due to two reasons, notes the Texas A&M University

System specialist. "First of all, both cattle and calf slaughter have climbed sharply in recent months-in February cattle slaughter was up 10 per cent and calf slaughter skyrocketed 33 per cent over the same month a year ago. Thus beef supplies increased sharply.

"The second reason for the drop in Choice beef prices was a decline in consumer demand. Consumers were besieged with Christmas bills the past two months and therefore had less money to spend on Choice beef." notes Davis.

Choice fed steers in Texas are currently bringing about \$34 per hundredweight compoared to \$46.75 at the beginning of the year. At the same time, the retail price of Choice beef has dropped from \$1.50 per pound to \$1.42.

What does the future hold? "The market has about bottomed out." believes the specialist. "Fed cattle market-

FEELING FAT Feeling too fat can give you a nasty case of the blahs and one of the most important aspects of dieting is replacing that negative attitude with a positive one. Try the following tips for rearranging your

state of mind: By following a diet of 1,000 to 1,200 calories a day, most dieters can lose a minimum of three pounds a week; many can lose up to five or six pounds per week on this caloric intake. Each evening make yourself a list of what you will eat the following day. Look up the calorie counts and list them next to the foods you plan to eat. Make sure the total is no more than 1.200 calories for the day. Keep that list with you throughout the next day and check the foods off as you eat them. Eat nothing that isn't on the list. If you feel uncomfortably empty during the day. have a diet soda. Make your food and calories list for the following day every night - and stick to it! Planning ahead is a good way to control your eating

In addition to planning a daily menu of the prescribed number of calories. make a pact with yourself that you will follow some of the following dieting rules:

1) Eat only in one spot, at your table. This precludes nibbling in bed, while you are driving, or snacks-onthe-run that you might not even notice you're eating. 2) Eat your food slowly and don't read or do anything else while youre eating. Just concentrate on the food you're putting in your mouth. Chew it well before you swallow and put your fork or utensil down between bites. Don't pick it up again until you've swallowed the food in your mouth. You'll find that eating in this way helps you to feel full sooner. 3) Eat at planned periods of the day. You can spread them out however you choose, but set aside certain hours when you will eat and don't eat at any other time. This helps to train your appestat to make you feel hungry only at specific periods of the day, usually those when others are eating so you can join them.






