John A. Johnson.

Uncle John Johnson is dead! When this message was passed along from friend to friend last Tuesday morning, the words left a deep feeling of sadness and sorrow in the hearts of his many friends and acquaintances. Uncle John, as he was familiarly known by his friends, had not been in good health for some months, and for the past several weeks, he had seemed to be gaining his former strength. But last Thursday night he sustained a partial stroke of paralysis, which effected his speech. From this time, he gradually grew worse until the end came at 10:30 a. m. Tuesday, August, 18, 1908. At his bedside were a few friends, who had come in to administer to his needs, his loving wife, his adopted son, Lee Johnson of Snyder, his brother, Jim Johnson and family of Amarillo, and his nephews, Edgar and Albert Johnson.

and his niece, Mrs. C. L. Sullivan. The funeral services were conducted from the family residence by Rev. Clarence Tuerman of the Church of Christ, of which Mr. Johnson was a member.

His friends acted as pall bearers: J. H. Head, G. M. Suggs, J. D. Bourn, H. O. Hubbert and Jno. D. Jarrott. A long procession of friends followed the remains to its last resting place. Interment was made in the Hereford City cemetery.

John A. Johnson was born in Haywood county, Tennessee, March, 2, 1851 and died at Hereford, Tuesday August, 18, 1908, being 57 years, 5 months and 16 days old. He was married to Miss Anpa Roberts at her home in Mississippi, December 26, 1870. One child was born but died in early infancy. In the fall of 1880 he and his wife moved to Denton county, Texas, where he lived until 1899, when they came to Amarillo.

In 1901, they came to Hereford and he was engaged in the grocery business up to the time of his death. Two brothers and two sisters survive him. Though he raised no children of his own, he had one adopted son, Jim Johnson, whose home is at Snyder, Texas, and his two nephews, Edgar and Albert and his niece, Mrs. C. L. Sullivan, made their home with him since their early childhood. He was as a father to them.

Uncle John was well liked by all who knew him. His congenial nature and kind heartedness made him "of good report" to every one. He was a successful business man, a good neighbor and an honest man.

GOOD WHEAT YIELD

Carson County Farmers Make Fine Yield of Wheat and Oats.

The following clipped from the Panhandle Herald adds another testimonial to the thousand others that the Plains are yearly piling up. Carson county is some 30 miles east from this county and is strictly on the Plains. The figures given here will be an eye-opener to many uninformed homeseekers.

Mr. Parker had 40 acres of oats that yielded 27 bushels per acre; and got 260 bushels of wheat from 20 acres. G. F. Orr had 15 acres of oats sown on sod that yielded 26 2-3 bushels per acre. Mr. Hartzel in the same neighborhood had 8 acres of wheat which went 26 1-4 bushels per acre, 80 acres that yielded 1645 bushels and 50 acres which made 16 bushels per acre. He sold part of his crop and deposited a check in payment of it which called for \$2,086.30. Mr. Pierce had 23 acres of wheat which yielded 23 1-3 bushels per acre and 90 acres that averaged 17 1-2 bushels per acre; 115 acres of oats that made 22 bushels per acre and tested 36 pounds. Mr. Apel sold and delivered 700 bushel of wheat.

All the wheat tested from 58 1/2 to 61 1/2 lbs. per bushel and the elevator is paying 95c per bushel for wheat and 45c for oats. Does it pay to farm in the Panhandle?

He had not been in good health for some weeks, but nothing serious was anticipated until Tuesday before his death, when complications set up and the physicians advised an operation for appendicitis. While everything was done that human skill could command to prolong his life, little hope was held out after his real condition was learned.

August 12, 1908.

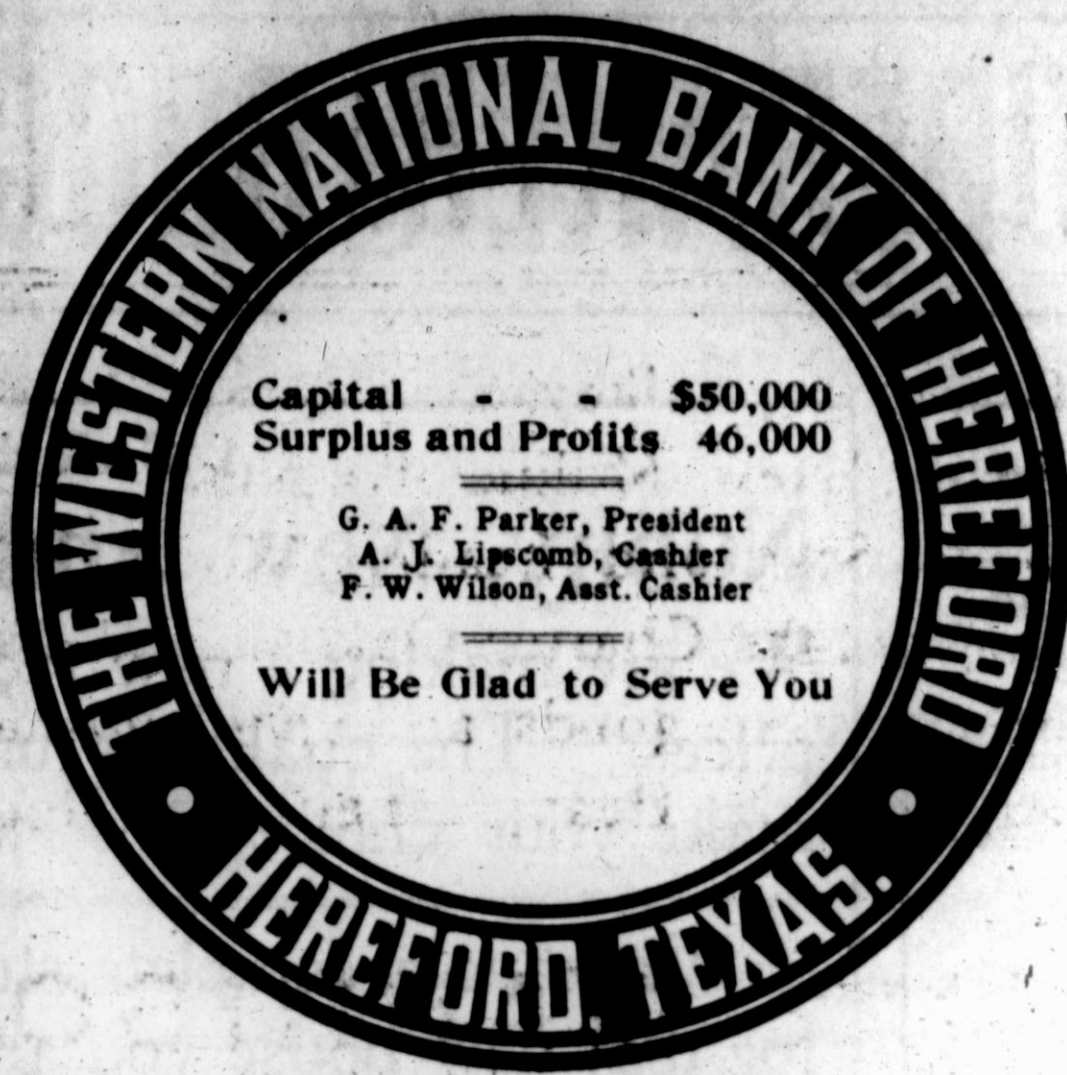

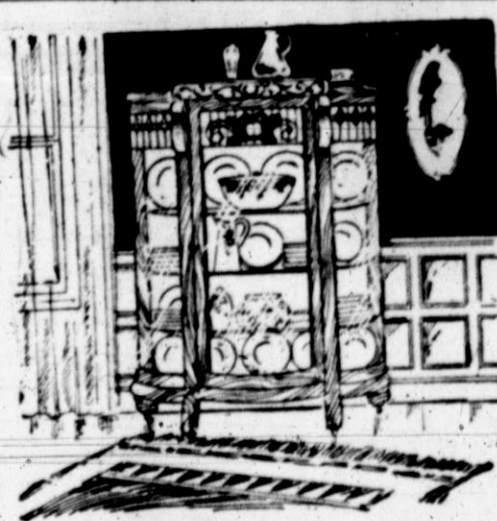

PROGRAM PARTIALLY COMPLETED

A General Good Time Anticipated—All The Committees Are Hard at Work.

LONG LIST OF PRIZES

This Year Will Bring the Finest and Best Farm Exhibits to Hereford.

Time is drawing near for the event of the year, the Tenth Anniversary of the birth of the city. The committees have all gotten down to business and are doing some effective work. The entertainment committee has secured some excellent attractions. As arranged the three days will be designated as follows:

- First day September 3rd.—Patriotic Day.
 - Second day, September 4th.—Educational Day.
 - Third day, September 5th.—Farmers Day.
- The name indicates somewhat the nature of the program for each separate day. Patriotism, education and agriculture, the three cardinals of American citizenship.
- PATRIOTIC DAY.**
Partial Program.
- 10:00 a. m.: Grand street parade and merchants carnival.
 - 10:30 a. m.: Overture Concert, —Hereford Concert Band.
 - 11:00 a. m.: Welcome address, —Hon. S. B. Edwards, Mayor of the City.
 - Second welcome address, —Prof.

J. E. Garrison, vice-president of the Hereford Commercial Club:

11:30 a. m.: Patriotic address by Hon. P. T. Gore, United States Senator from Oklahoma.

12:00 M: Basket dinner and barbecue.

1:30 p. m.: Band concert.

3:00 p. m.: Address by Judge Stephens of Vernon, Congressman from Texas.

4:00 p. m.: Address by Jno. W. Veale, State Senator.

The remainder of the day will be devoted to social intercourse, general amusement, base ball game, examination of farm and stock exhibits, balloon ascension.

Arrangements are under way for a general entertainment at night, beginning at 8:30. This entertainment will be under the management of one of the most popular readers and public entertainers of the state.

EDUCATIONAL DAY.

9:30 a. m.: Grand street parade lead by Hereford Concert Band.

10:00 a. m.: Special Band Concert.

10:45 a. m.: Address by Prof. E. H. Wray, Superintendent of Hereford Public Schools.

11:15 a. m.: Address by Prof. E. M. Haile, President of Hereford College.

12:00 M: Another good basket dinner and public barbecue.

1:30 p. m.: Band Concert.

2:00 p. m.: Meeting of the Civic League and report of work done.

2:30 p. m.: General entertainment, vocal and instrumental music, public reading,—by local talent.

4:00 p. m.: Balloon ascension, riding tournament, base ball:

6:00 p. m.: Shooting tournament, visiting teams from Dimmitt, Canyon City and Amarillo.

There will be something doing every hour of the day.

8:30 p. m.: Chautauqua Chalk Talk by Prof. Stonewall Brown of Waco. Mr. Brown is a young man of rare ability both as an artist and as a speaker. This chalk lecture will be a fitting close for Educational Day.

FARMERS' DAY.

9:30 a. m.: Grand Parade.

It is the purpose to have a large number of farm wagons in this parade decorated with products of the farm. A company of young lady horse back riders, a troupe of wild Indians, match teams, both draft and drivers. This does not bar anything else that might come into the parade.

The program of the day will be under the supervision of the Farmers' Institute. There will be a general institute in the morning and an address by some prominent agriculturalist in the afternoon.

None of these programs have been fully completed, but the various committees are at work and will be able to publish a complete program in a day or two.

The committee on entertainment makes the suggestion that as many merchants as possible put decorated wagons, floats or vehicles in the parade. The tastes and wishes of each firm will indicate what they should have. The farmers are trying to arrange a set of prizes for the merchants. This is reversing the game of prizes for fairs. Usually the merchants give all the prizes, but if the suggestion is carried out the farmers

will give a fat calf for the most attractive float, a load of hay for the best grocery display, a bushel of potatoes for the finest decorated buggy, a half dozen fryers for the best hardware wagon, a jug of buttermilk for the best new rig and a dozen other prizes. The merchants not to be out-done will make up a list of prizes with which to reciprocate the farmers, and they will not be behind tho they have to give "brought on" things.

PRIZES.

The list of cash prizes to be given this year will cover every thing that can be raised in the farms and gardens of the Panhandle. The committee on live stock is at work on the cash prizes for the stock exhibit, the flower committee is making a canvass for their exhibit.

THE BARBECUE.

The beef, mutton and pork to be barbecued will be furnished free for dinner only. This will be served at the general tables on the grounds to which every body is invited. Those who bring baskets, and every body should do so, may have their private spreads on the grounds and invite such of their friends as they see proper. The public table will have free beef, mutton, pork, coffee pickles and bread, a good meal for any hungry man. If you do not receive an invitation from a friend to join them in their private dinner, you are welcome to the public table. It is not the intention of the supply committee to furnish barbecue to be carried away from the grounds. When you want a supply, simply state your needs to the waiters and they will gladly serve you enough for your family.

A PUBLIC NUISANCE.

The rains during the summer have presented another problem to the City fathers. The water has been standing in holes along the gutters and the result has been more like hog wallows than streets of a city. In places the stench from these filthy spots goes up to heaven.

Most of the the holes have been made by allowing horses to remain hitched for hours at a time or even all day. The city had an ordinance to prevent all-day hitching but no effort was made to enforce it until last week when anti-hitching signs were tacked up. This question of hitching in main street is 'pestiferous'. Shall the city deny a farmer who has come to town to trade the privilege of hitching his team? Must the ladies who drive down town shopping employ a livery to drive or hold their horses? The Brand has not consulted the city attorney as to the scope of the ordinance, but judging from similar ordinances in other cities, the purpose of this anti-hitching law is to prevent the all-day hitching so commonly practiced on the main and post-office street. Delivery wagons, physicians buggies, real estate carriages, transfers, and all long-time hitchers would do well to inquire the meaning of the ordinance. If a farmer comes to town he usually hitches at the wagon yard or in the alley until he gets ready to load his purchases, when he drives on the main streets, but the large number of other horses that are stabled every day on the streets has brought about the effort on the part of the city authorities to keep the city in a clean and sanitary condition.

COURTHOUSE YARD.

The clean condition of the courthouse yard is the result of a contract between Sheriff Connell and a young lad who has been making a good business out of the weed cutting proposition. The beauty of the grounds is attracting attention of all new people and visitors. The trees have been kept from devastations of worms by the spraying process. This has been done at small cost but a good investment. The weeds in the gutters around the court house yard will go next.

HAVE YOU HARVESTED YOUR WEEDS?

The annual celebration is coming and all have not harvested their weeds. The committee should offer a ten dollar prize for the one who could show the biggest crop of weeds but it would be difficult to tell who would win. Many have had their weeds cut; others have NOT. It is really becoming a serious question. The high weeds may become the lurking place of wild beasts or hissing serpents, and when the children go in the streets they might be attacked and carried away.

WHY could not Hereford have her streets treated in the same way that Dallas contemplates doing some of her macadamized avenues. Crude oil is cheap and the process is said to give better satisfaction than anything else. The Brand sometime

ago offered a mild suggestion that the Commercial Club take the matter up, but nothing has come of it. Will the city take the matter up?

WHEN a Chinaman meets a Chinaman, he asks "Have you had your rice?"; and when a Herefordman meets a Herefordman, he should ask, "Have you cut your weeds?"

The New President of A. & M.
The appointment of an inexperienced man at the head of the only mechanical school of the state has lead many of the country papers to ask a few questions. The Childress Post thinks thusly:

R. T. Millner is to be the new president of the A. & M. College. He is at present Commissioner of Insurance and Agriculture and has been renominated to succeed himself. Mr. Millner is probably a good man, as he should be, but we have never heard that he is any sort of a school man. School work is a profession unto itself, as distinct as any other and one whose mastery requires years of unremitting toil. Hence to appoint a man who has had no experience to the management of one of our best educational institutions is a most hazardous piece of business. Furthermore, there are too many practical school men in Texas who would be glad to have such an appointment to make the appointment of a politician at all necessary or even excusable. Mr. Millner may make a fine school man but if he has had no previous knowledge of the work the chances are against him. School teachers have a hard lot in this life and we believe they are entitled to everything in their profession.

The Brand concurs in the conclusion of The Post but suggests that perhaps this job was given Mr. Millner on the promise that he do nothing to disturb the peace and dignity of the 400 obstreperous boys who have for years been "running" A. & M. College. While The Brand does not endorse the policy of the retiring president, yet, the all-wise board were certainly an unthoughtful set when they put such a man without college experience or training, though a good man, at the head of the institution.

Engle, N. M., August 12, 1908. The Hereford Brand.

As several have written me for information in regard to the government work on the Elephant Bute Dam to be constructed across the Rio Grande River twelve miles west of Engle, I will take this means of answering them.

The dam is to be of reinforced concrete, 90 foot high and the lake formed will cover 25,000 acres of land; the main tunnel to be used as a canal is to be cut under the mountain three miles; the railroad from Engle to the dam is to begin at once. They are working over one hundred men at present and hiring men all the time. The freight from Engle is being hauled by contractors.

There is a townsite at the dam. They have ordered a heavy power plant to light the town and run the construction machinery.

Proposed Amendment to the State Constitution Fixing the Compensation of the Governor and Lieutenant Governor.

JOINT RESOLUTION proposing an amendment to Article 4 of the Constitution of the State of Texas by amending Sections 5 and 17 of said Article 4 so as to fix the compensation of the Governor at eight thousand (\$8000) dollars per annum in addition to the use of the Governor's mansion, fixtures and furniture, and the compensation of the Lieutenant Governor at twenty-five hundred (\$2500) dollars per annum.

Be it Resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

SECTION 1. That Section 5 of Article 4 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to provide that the Governor of the State shall receive as compensation for his services, an annual salary of eight thousand (\$8000) dollars and with the use and occupation of the Governor's mansion, fixtures and furniture, said Section 5 as amended, to read as follows:

Section 5. He shall, at stated times, receive as compensation for his services an annual salary of eight thousand (\$8,000) dollars, and no more and shall have the use and occupation of the Governor's mansion, fixtures and furniture.

That Section 17 be so amended as to read as follows:

Section 17. If, during the vacancy in the office of the Governor, the Lieutenant Governor should die, resign, refuse to serve or be removed from office or be unable to serve or if he shall be impeached or absent from the State, the President of the Senate, for the time being, shall in like manner administer the government until he shall be succeeded by a Governor or Lieutenant Governor. The Lieutenant Governor shall receive an annual salary of twenty-five hundred (\$2,500) dollars per year, and no more. During the time he administers the government as Governor, he shall receive in like manner the same compensation which the Governor would have received had he been employed in the duties of his office, and no more. The President of the Senate, for the time being, shall, during the time he administers the government, receive in like manner the same compensation which the Governor would have received, had he been employed in the duties of his office.

Sec. 2. The Governor of this State is hereby directed to issue and have published the necessary proclamation for the submission of this resolution to the qualified voters for members of the Legislature of the State of Texas, to be voted upon on the day of the next general election of the State of Texas, which will be held on the day fixed by law therefor. All persons favoring said amendment shall have written or printed on their ballots as follows: "For the amendment to the Constitution fixing the salary of the Governor at eight thousand (\$8,000) dollars per annum, and the Lieutenant Governor at twenty-five hundred (\$2,500) dollars per annum." And those opposed to said amendment shall have written or printed on their ballots as follows: "Against the amendment to the Constitution fixing

the salary of the Governor at eight thousand (\$8,000) dollars per annum, and the Lieutenant Governor at twenty-five hundred (\$2,500) dollars per annum." And the sum of one thousand (\$1,000) dollars or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the Treasury of the State of Texas not otherwise appropriated to pay the expenses of such publication, proclamation and election.

Taxation—Submitting Amendment to Constitution.

JOINT RESOLUTION amending Section 3, Article 7, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, increasing the amount of tax that may be voted on school districts and providing for a majority vote of the property tax paying voters of such district to vote such tax.

SECTION 1. Be it Resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas: That Section 3 of Article 7 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be so amended as to hereafter read as follows:

Section 3. One-fourth of the revenue derived from the State occupation taxes and a poll tax of \$1 on every male inhabitant of this State between the ages of twenty-one and sixty years shall be set apart annually for the benefit of the public free schools, and in addition thereto there shall be levied and collected an annual ad valorem State tax of such an amount, not to exceed twenty cents on the \$100 valuation, as with the available school fund arising from all other sources, will be sufficient to maintain and support the public free schools of this State for a period of not less than six months in each year, and the Legislature may also provide for the formation of school districts within all or any of the counties of this State by general or special law, without the local notice required in other cases of special legislation, and may authorize an additional ad valorem tax to be levied and collected within such school districts for the further maintenance of public free schools, and the erection and equipment of school buildings therein, provided that a majority of the qualified property tax paying voters of the district, voting at an election to be held for that purpose shall vote such tax, not to exceed in any one year 50 cents on the \$100 valuation of the property subject to taxation in such district, but the limitation upon the amount of district tax herein authorized shall not apply to incorporated cities or towns constituting separate and independent school districts.

Sec. 2. The Governor of the State of Texas shall and he is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for the submission of this amendment to the qualified voters of the State of Texas at the next general election, or at a special election called by the Governor and the sum of four thousand (\$4,000) dollars, or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any money not otherwise appropriated to defray the expenses of publication of such proclamation. At such election the qualified electors voting and favoring said amendment shall have written or printed

on the ballot as follows: "For amendment to Section 3, Article 7, of the Constitution of the State, relating to public free schools," and those opposed to said amendment shall have written or printed on the ballot as follows: "Against amendment to Section 3, Article 7, of the Constitution of the State, relating to public free schools."

Proposed Amendment to the State Constitution Relating to Commissioners' Precincts.

JOINT RESOLUTION to amend Section 18, Article 5, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, so as to provide for subsequent redistricting of a county into commissioners' precincts, defining the manner thereof; for submitting same to the electors of the State, and making an appropriation therefor.

Be it Resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

SECTION 1. That Section 18, Article 5, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

Each organized county in the State, now or hereafter existing, shall be divided from time to time, for the convenience of the people, into justice precincts, not less than four and not more than twelve. The present county courts shall make the first division. Subsequent divisions shall be made by the commissioners' court provided for by this Constitution. In each such precinct there shall be elected, at each biennial election, one justice of the peace and one constable, each of whom shall hold his office for two years and until his successor shall be elected and qualified: provided, that in any precinct in which there may be a city of eight thousand or more inhabitants, there shall be elected two justices of the peace. Each county shall in like manner and in the first instance be divided into four commissioners' precincts, in each of which there shall be elected by the qualified voters thereof one county commissioner, who shall hold his office for two years and until his successor shall be elected and qualified. Subsequent divisions of a county into commissioners' precincts shall be made as is now or hereafter may be provided by law. The county commissioners so chosen, with the county judge as presiding officer, shall compose the county commissioners' court, which shall exercise such powers and jurisdiction over all county business as is conferred by this Constitution and the laws of the State, or as may be hereafter prescribed.

Sec. 2. That the sum of one thousand (\$1,000) dollars is hereby appropriated out of the State Treasury not otherwise appropriated for the purpose of defraying the necessary expense of submitting the above proposed amendment to the people of the State not otherwise appropriated for the purpose of defraying the necessary expense of submitting the above proposed amendment to the people of the State, at the next general or special election in the manner required by law, by the Governor of the State. Dustless Macadam Streets.


