## CROSBYTON CONVENTION

Commercial Secretaries, Newspaper Editors Hold Big Session at Youngest City of the Plains.

We were met at Plainview by Mr. White of Crosby County News, who was in with several autoes to transport the delegates over the beautiful plains to the thriving little city of Crosbyton. It was the writers good fortune to get a seat in the New Franklin Car driven by the dauntless Joe Cox, who has the name of being one of the best auto drivers on the Plains. Joe is just emerging into manhood and we bespeak for him a brilliant success in his line. We arrived at Crosbyton at 9 a. m. and found a large audience seated in the big tent provided for the occasion, awaiting our arrival.

Hon. Julian Bassett, the prince of entertainers, in a very happy manner delivered the address of welcome. Mr. Bassett claimed that this was his first attempt at speech making, but we would not have known it if he had not mentioned the fact, for he seemed perfectly at home on the rostrum. He spoke with emphasis and to the point.

Uncle Joe Foster came forward and on behalf of the delegates and citizens at large delivered the response in a most happy style, and as usual became very poetic at times. The session then adjourned to meet at the Roch House at 5:30, and in the meantime, we went for amusement and sight-seeing to the beautiful grove in the Canyon, where we found the tables groaning under their burden of good things to eat. After dinner we were delightfully entertained by Judge Bowler of Stamford and other speeches of note the program being interspersed with charming music rendered by the Floyada Band.

We met at the Rock House as guests of Mr. Bassett. After the association had transacted some business and having inspected the beautiful falls on the Blanco, we were called to partake of the splendid repast provided by Mesdames Johnson and Lewis. To say that we enjoyed this home like place, puts it mildly.

The Crosbyton Commercial Club does not do things by piece-meal. The very best of everything for their guests was provide and on a large scale. They lodged and fed about 500 people. They seemed to know just how to make you feel good. The people who gathered there were from every point in the Panhandle, and like all plains folk were of the higher class of citizens.

On June 9, at 10 a. m., the association was called to order by Pres. Callahan, who made an ad-

dress. The routine of business was taken up which consumed the greater part of the merry session.

At the close of the business session the Band rendered a musical program.

The Hon. Bob Lemons of Hale Center, delivered an instructive address.

Judge Copeland of Brownfield delivered an address with telling effect which tingled with reminiscences of the Plains.

Last, but not least, Col. Gainer of Gomez, took up his subject and delighted the audience with his instructive talk.

The association then adjourned till 2 p. m., at which time Tulia was selected for the next place of meeting.

Everybody was loud in their praise of the royal treatment they received at the homes of the Crosbyton people.

Your scribe was somewhat handicapped for the lack of information from headquarters.

Just a word about the place where the big barbecue was held. The trip from Crosbyton to the canyon was one of pleasure and interest, the distance being about four miles. When we arrived at the Caprock it was a beautiful sight to view. The long line of horsemen, carriages, wagons and autos winding their way down into the deep canyon. This road-way was built at an enormous expense, cutting into the side of the mountain and making great fills

across the gulches, all presenting a very picturesque view. This great concourse of people made their way down into the canyon without accident. This we attribute to the good management of the Crosbyton people, as they had attendants all along the line.

The grove of large cottonwood trees was an ideal place for such an occasion. These grounds are sufficient to accommodate a city. It was quite interesting to note how perfect the management and how orderly the crowd. When we beheld the long ditches used for roasting the ten head of beeves and when we inhaled the sweet aroma arising from the carcasses our appetites were whetted to a keen edge, it being already passed the noon hour. The meat was cut in slices and put on the long tables with bread and pickles. Then the announcement that dinner was ready. The reader is ready to say the "grand rush." No, they "prefered one another," each one seeing that his neighbors were served.

In talking with Mr. Bassett, we learned that the great Falls are going to be used to furnish power for their electric power and other purposes and that six sections of land on the canyon, including the historic ranch house were going to be set apart for a pleasure resort and game park. Deer, turkey and antelope are found in the grounds at present a buffalo herd will be added.

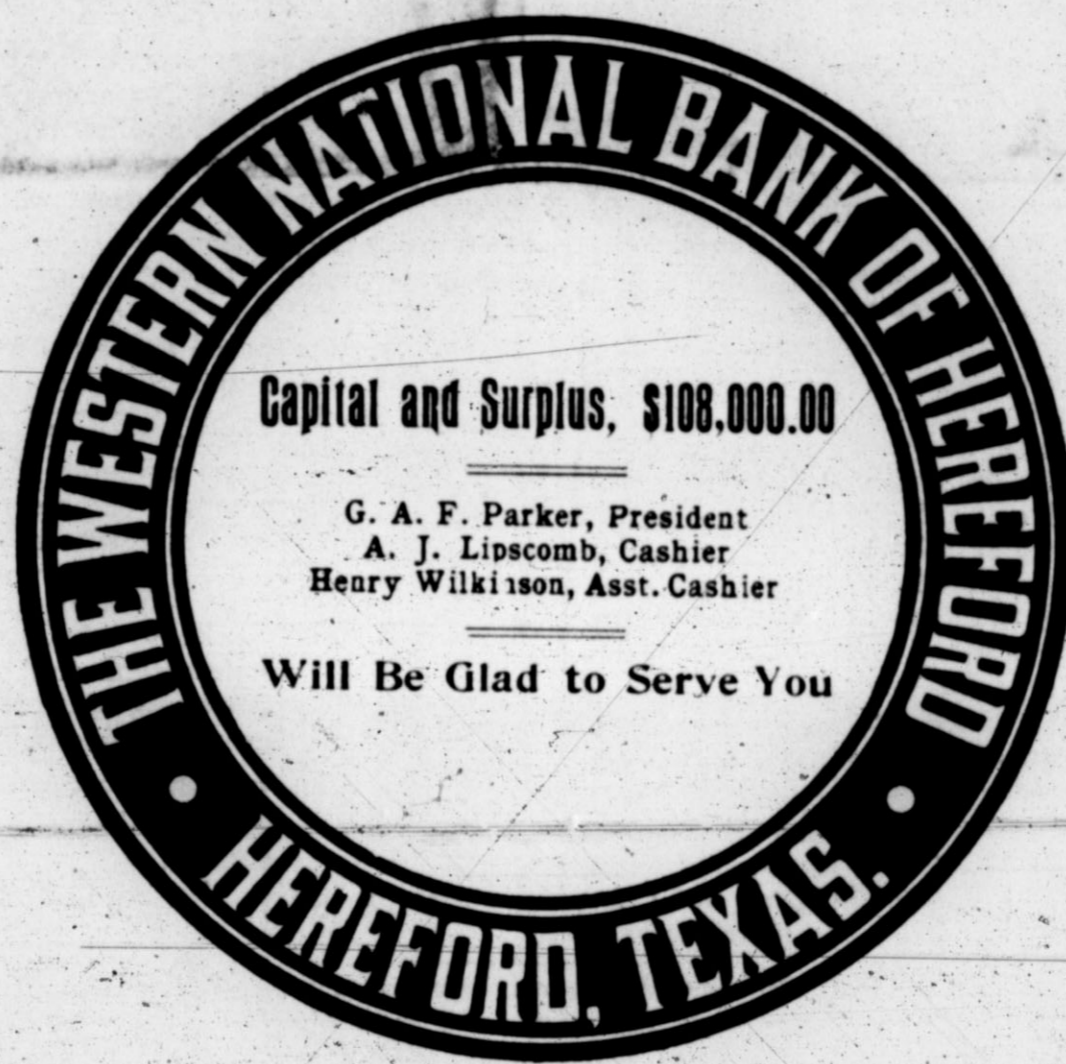

**The High School Building.**  
Will Hereford go backward? Tomorrow the voters of the Hereford Independent School District will vote on the building question. As advertised, it is proposed to vote bonds to the amount of \$25,000 for building and equipment. No one can say that the district does not need the building. Who is it that

will not support the proposition? There is the tax payer who invariably votes against public improvements; there is the man who thinks the amount is too much; there is the man who thinks the amount too small; there is the patron who does not approve the location; there is the man who thinks the school poorly managed; there is the patron

who allows personal feeling to overshadow his public duty; there is the man who is against the issue because some other man is for it. On the other hand, there are the men of public spirit; they are for the bond issue; there are the men who are able to lay aside personal preferences for the public good; there are the men who rise above the small things of this life and see larger growth for the city; these men are for the issue; there are men who count themselves as an important factor in the development of the country, these men stand in the spot light favoring the school. This last mentioned class must exceed the number in the first class.

Will Hereford go backward? Is there any reason to fear that Hereford has men who will vote against the growth of the school?

There is little use to hope that all the knockers have gone to other towns. Perhaps Hereford has as few as any town of its size, but that she has a plenty of this variety of folk is an admitted fact. The only way to keep the general public from finding out their existence is to overwhelm them with votes, "show them under," is the way to do it. Tomorrow is the day to do it. June the 19th, should be marked and celebrated as emancipation day for Hereford and such it will be.

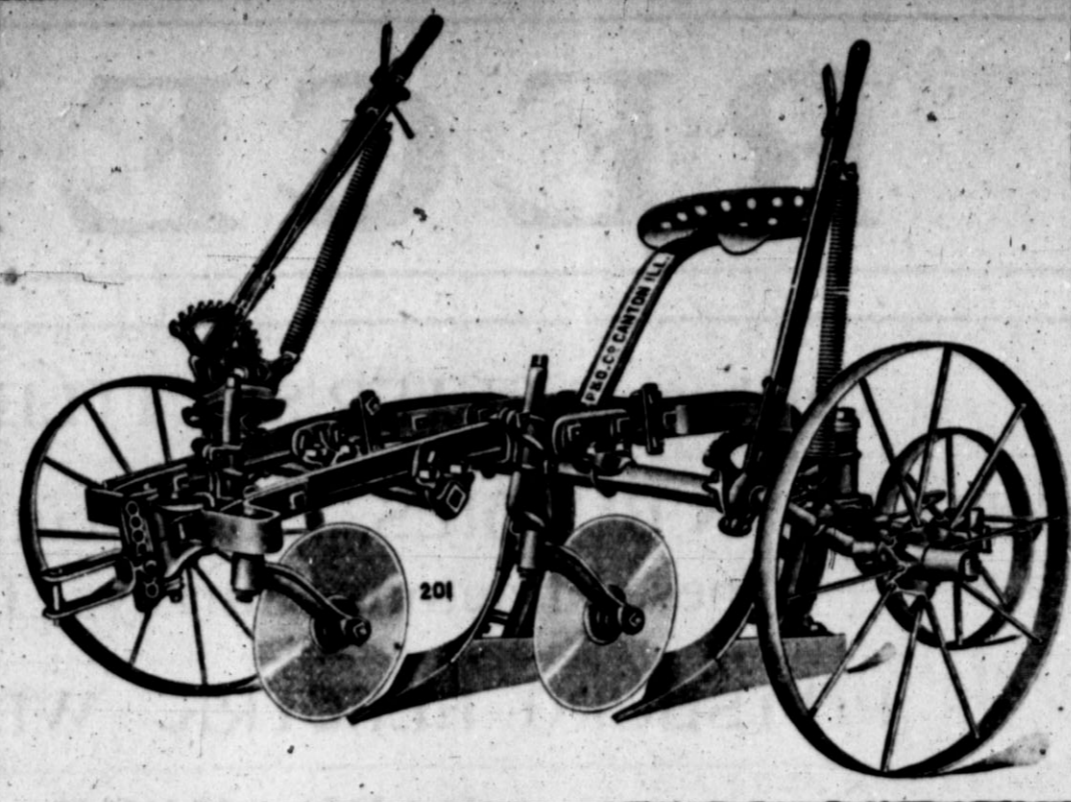

### Hurrah for the People of Black.

The people of Black and of the immediate vicinity met on Saturday, June 12, in the building lately erected by the Wright Land Company for a school building, to vote money for the purpose of carrying on a school, and also for a picnic and general good time.

Quite a number were present and the best of feeling prevailed. They voted ten cents on each one hundred dollars valuation, and also organized a Sunday School with thirty-eight members, and Mr. Charles Kelter as their superintendent.

Black is situated in a fine section of the Panhandle, and the people mean to keep abreast with the times.

It is an erroneous idea that some of the people in the old settled states have gotten, that if they come to the Panhandle to make their homes they leave behind all church and school privileges. Like the "Pilgrim Fathers" in colonial times, the thought of education and a pure, moral atmosphere is first in the minds of the people of the Panhandle.

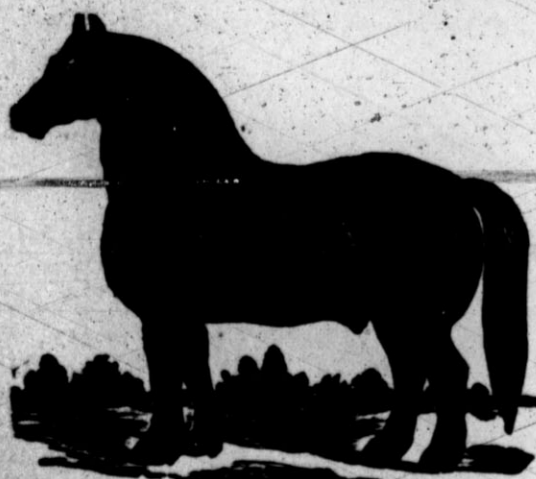

But it is to be regretted that The News must insult the people of a town; where the paper is so widely read by sending out such a narrow headed sport as a representative.

**Circulation of Air in Soil.**

Farmer's Bulletin:

A proper circulation of air in the soil is just as important as any other factor of plant growth. Nearly half of the volume of ordinary soils is occupied by air spaces. The air spaces in the soil wind in and out between the soil particles as they do in a pile of large stones. If the layer of water on the surface of the soil grains becomes so thick as to stop the air passages here and there the soil is then too wet for most crops and needs drainage.

Plants have no special breathing organs, the oxygen required in their breathing finding entrance all over the surface of the plant. Plant roots must therefore be supplied with air, and hence the soil must be porous enough to permit of free circulation of air. A good supply of humus and proper tillage will accomplish this result in clay soils. Sandy soils are usually too porous, needing humus to help them retain water.

Another reason why air must circulate freely in the soil is that large quantities of oxygen are required to insure proper decay of organic matter to supply plant food. Also, carbonic-acid gas is produced by the decay of organic matter, and this must escape easily to make room for the atmospheric oxygen needed in the soil.

The movement of air in the soil is frequently shown by the bubbles which appear at the surface of the soil just after a hard rain. As the water soaks into the soil it drives the air out, and bubbles may be seen at the surface if water enough is present to form them. One of the most important objects of plowing is to loosen up the soil and mix fresh air with it.

### SIDEWALK FEVER

This sidewalk epidemic is getting serious, but it is not as bad as our friends out of the state have imagined. It has been reported that many have feared that they would catch something awful if they should visit Hereford. There is no danger if you have been vaccinated with boosteritis serum. As the matter now stands, Hereford has 35 blocks of fine cement walks in the resident section and 11 blocks of ten-foot walks in the business part. Counted in feet, Hereford has 11,000 lineal feet of resident walks and 3,500 lineal feet in business section.

### SOUTH SIDE WARD SCHOOL

Patrons Hold Important Meeting in That Section. Money Raised. Committees Appointed for Further Work.

At a call for a meeting of the patrons of the public school who live on the South Side, a number met Monday night and discussed plans for a ward building in that section of the city. The meeting was called to order by W. H. Rayzor, who was chosen as permanent chairman. Fletcher Rogers was made secretary. J. P. Wood was made vice chairman. During the session, it was shown that the children on that side of the river and railroad were in danger every day they attended school on account of the Santa Fe closing two streets, leaving only Main street open, where all rural and city traffic, buggies, autos must pass.
