stible material. Sec. 4. Every building hereafter of Hereford, shall have a parapet wall extending all around and at least three feet above the roof; and whenever any roof or upper story of any building within the fire limits is supported by pillars, such pillars shall be made of brick, stone, concrete or

Sec. 5. It shall be unlawful for any person, firm or association of perons to enlarge, or build an addition of any size or kind whatsoever, to any building within the fire limits of the city of Hereford, the outer walls which addition are in whole, or in part built of any material other than

All Manufacturers, Dealers and User of Explosives Required to Have Federal License

The 65th Congress passed an act to prohibit the manufacture, distribution, storage, use and possession in time of war of explosives, providing regulations for the safe manufacture, dis-

tribution, storage, use, and possession of the same, and for other purposes.

The law does not apply to explosives or ingredients while being transported upon vessels or railroad cars in conformity with statutory law or Interstate Commerce Commission rules; nor to small arms or shotgun cartridges.

Every person, firm or corporation that in any way handles explosives or ingredients are required to have license for the purpose and the local Licensor will furnish all, information and blanks.

This law is now in effect and any violator is subject to a fine of /not more than \$5,000 or by imprisonment not more than one year or by both such fine and hoprisonment



What City and Country can Produce In the Form of Poultry and Eggs If poultry production is doubled next year, as is readily possible with this city and country cooperation, we will have 6,500,000,000 pounds of meat food, in the form of poultry and eggs. This will release almost that many pounds of other meats, pork & beef. for our Armies in Europe, and for the armies and civillan populations of

the Allies If we do NOT product this amount of Roultry we may find ourselves short

of meat food to just that extent. It is a patriotic duty of the utmost importance that every farmer and ev-ery person in town do his part in producing this increase of poultry, which will help to win the war. It is also a profitable proposition for the average individual. Both town and farm families will produce at its lowest cost, meat food for their own use, and, by putting up eggs for winter use will arther reduce living expenses.

The poultry will be handled as a by-product of the farm and back-yard; each clock being large enough in numbers to utilize the scraps and waste from the kitchen and the "pick-ups" around the place, supplemented by some feed. But no flock should be out of proportion to the ground, space and kitchen wastage not so large that feed will become, relatively, too cosily an item. The idea is not only to increase our poultry production, but to ido it at very little cost, by turning the waste of kitchens and backyards ail






