

CHAMBERLAIN FLAYS LEAGUE AS A 'DELUSION'

Naval Games To Be On A Wider Basis

Maneuvers Will Cover 12 Million Miles Of Ocean

WASHINGTON, Feb. 22 (AP)—American naval maneuvers beginning in the Pacific ocean next month, officials disclosed today, will cover more than twice the territory utilized in last year's mock battles.

Strict Secrecy The maneuvers, largest in the nation's naval history, will progress over 12,000,000 square miles for nearly six weeks.

The navy high command indicated that the newly-strengthened rules for secrecy on ship construction will be carried over into the maneuvers.

To back up the secrecy efforts, fleet commanders will have a ruling issued by Secretary Swanborn last December, to the effect that "papers" may be driven off with gunfire, or taken captive.

Admiral Claude C. Bloch, new commander of the Pacific fleet, will be in charge of the intricate problems of navigation and fighting in the air and on the sea.

Insurgents Take Teruel

Govt. Forces Withdraw From City After 2 Months

MADRID, Feb. 22 (AP)—Hard-pressed government forces withdrew from Teruel today, surrendering the destroyed city to the insurgents exactly two months after its capture in one of the government's most effective offensives.

A defense ministry communiqué said the high command had ordered withdrawal from the strategic provincial capital, 160 miles east of Madrid, after it had been surrounded.

The chief of the 46th division, whose name was not given, formed his men into an attacking column which was said to have fought its way out of the city with all its men and equipment.

"We left no men, arms, munitions or food within Teruel," the communiqué stated.

(Insurgent advances at Hendaye said a large number of government forces had surrendered and more than 1,000 had been killed.)

It was presumed here the government troops fell back to Puerto Escandon, nine miles southeast of Teruel. These were the old defenses where the government stopped the insurgents early in the war and then held them for nearly a year and a half.

The loss of Teruel, though regretted, was not considered serious in military circles. In Madrid, it was said the government had won its objective at Teruel, which was to break up the insurgent offensive last fall.

Grand Jury Action Is Talked To Get Attorney's Bank Records

Committee Turns On M'Craw's Former Partner

DALLAS, Feb. 22 (AP)—A threat that the county grand jury at Austin might be asked to take action if the Mercantile National Bank here persisted in its refusal to hand over bank records of Tom C. Clark highlighted today's session of the senate general investigating committee.

The threat was hurled by Senator Joe L. Hill of Henderson, member of the committee and frequent critic of Attorney General William McCraw.

McCraw and Clark, now an assistant United States attorney general, formerly were law partners here.

Notwithstanding Hill's statement, the committee made no immediate headway in its effort to obtain deposit slips and ledger sheets relating to accounts of Clark and McCraw. The bank deferred complying with the request of the investigators because of a letter from Clark stating he would hold it legally responsible for releasing any information on his accounts to which the committee was not entitled.

Income Tax Returns Another outstanding development of the day was a sharp interchange between Clark and Hill in which Clark strongly intimated he believed Governor Allred had obtained his income tax returns for a purpose not authorized by law.

"Is it not true," the senator inquired, "that your income was only \$3,600 in 1934, jumped to \$63,000 in 1935 (first year of McCraw's administration as attorney general) and to \$71,000 in 1937?"

Clark replied that he did not remember the exact amounts but if Hill would show him the papers from which he was asking the questions he (Clark) would see if they correctly represented his income. Hill refused to hand over the papers.

"If those are copies of my income tax returns," Clark said, "there's only one way you could have obtained them an dithat's through the governor of Texas. The governor has no legal right to them except for a tax investigation."

The proceedings had changed almost entirely from a study of McCraw's actions to an investigation of McCraw.

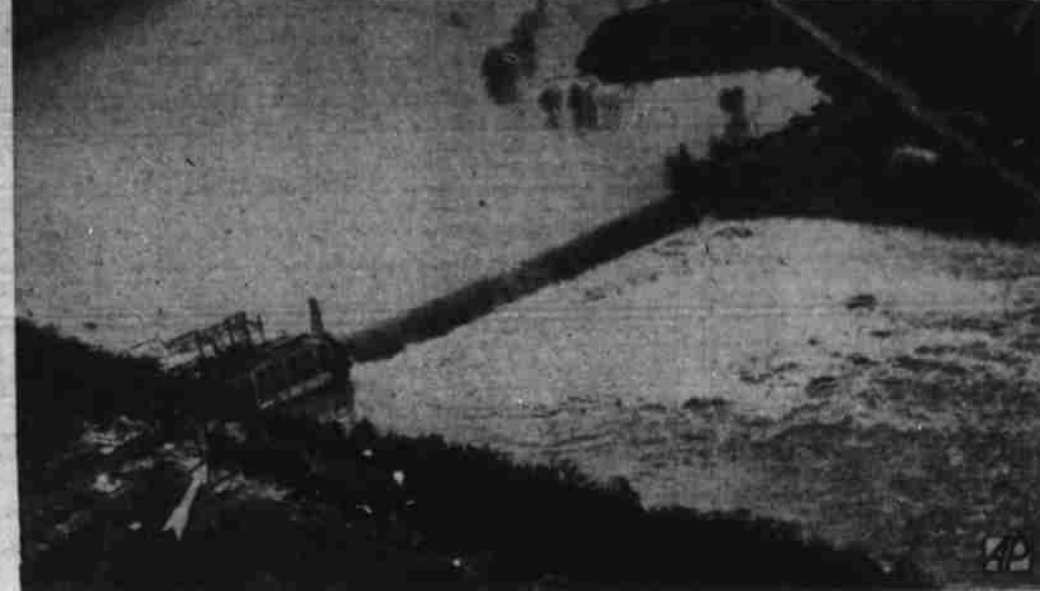

Hearing-Aid Devices Installed At Ritz; Those Of Faulty Hearing Now Can Enjoy Sound Pictures

Sound movies have been in commercial operation some 10 years now, but there probably are some people who have never appreciated the new scope of film entertainment. They are the people who are deaf or have difficulty in hearing.

But all that's changed now. There's a new device at the Ritz Theatre—quite an innovation for these parts—whereby the hard-of-hearing can have their handicap overcome. Installed and ready for operation are a group of headphones, connected with seats at the Ritz, which relay the sound in any required volume just as it comes from the screen.

The Ritz management gave the phones a test Tuesday morning for the benefit of newsmen. Those taking the experiment agreed that here is really a boon to those who want to attend movies but who have difficulty in hearing.

Senate Kills Move To Boost Relief Fund

Effort Made To Increase Appropriation To 400 Million

WASHINGTON, Feb. 22 (AP)—The senate rejected today an amendment to increase the emergency relief appropriation from \$250,000,000 to \$400,000,000.

Senator Bone (D-Wash.) proposed the amendment, contending \$250,000,000 was inadequate to finance relief for the remainder of this fiscal year.

The vote was 53 to 22.

Under his proposal the president could waive that contribution if he found some communities could not advance it.

Democratic leaders, seeking a final vote on the bill before nightfall, opposed Bailey's amendment as well as one by Senator Bone to increase the appropriation to \$400,000,000.

CUM, CANDY AND FALSE TEETH

WASHINGTON, Feb. 22 (AP)—Foreigners bought \$1,177,587 worth of American chewing gum in 1937, export trade statistics showed today.

The gum bill, which was four times that for chocolate candy, almost equaled figures on false teeth.

SAYS IT CAN OFFER NO PROTECTION TO SMALL NATIONS

Prime Minister Speaks Out In Defense Of New Policy, Answering Labor Party Opponents

LONDON, Feb. 22 (AP)—Prime Minister Neville Chamberlain today shouted to an angry opposition in the house of commons that the league of nations as protection against aggression was "a delusion" and demanded that Geneva throw off its "shams and pretences."

"We must not try to delude ourselves, and still more we must not try to delude small, weak nations, that they will be protected by the league against aggression."

"We know that nothing of the kind can be expected."

"The League is unable to provide collective security for anybody x x x," Chamberlain declared. "I would stay in the League because I have faith that it will be reconstituted x x x."

"But I doubt very much if the League will ever do its best work so long as its members are nominally bound to impose sanctions (economic penalties) or impose force in support of its principles x x x."

"Nations that remain in the League must not be saddled with risks they are not prepared to take x x x."

"If the League would throw off the shams and pretences which everyone sees through and come BELLIN, Feb. 22 (AP)—Optimism for the future of German domination in central Europe rose today as news read with intense interest of British Prime Minister Neville Chamberlain's efforts to come to an understanding with Premier Mussolini of Italy.

Nazi figures that two of their main ambitions would be realized by the time Reichsfuehrer Adolf Hitler visits Mussolini in Rome early next May. They are:

- 1. That Nazi-inclined Germans in Czechoslovakia will have been completely satisfied and will be to Germany what the free city of Danzig and the Austrian republic now are. 2. That Germany will have regained her war-lost colonies.

The reason for this optimism lies in the fact that Chamberlain seems to be acting precisely according to the plan Hitler and Mussolini agreed upon between themselves for the pacification of Europe during their long conversations here last September.

Chamberlain, taking a step away from the League of Nations machinery so staunchly supported by Eden, chose the speed of direct negotiations in his program designed:

- 1. Quickly to settle old differences with Italy, in conversations at Italy's request in Rome. 2. Then to find an amicable solution.

Hospital physicians said none suffered serious injuries.

British Envoy Is Killed In Fall During Race

DERBY, Eng., Feb. 22 (AP)—Hugh Lloyd Thomas, 48, British minister to Paris, was killed today when his horse fell in a steeplechase race.

Thomas had been secretary for seven years to the Duke of Windsor when he was Prince of Wales and held the rank of minister in Great Britain's Paris embassy, second only to the ambassador, Sir Eric Phipps.

PLANES IN CHILE

SANTIAGO, Chile, Feb. 22 (AP)—Five big United States army bombing planes, homeward bound from a goodwill flight to Buenos Aires, arrived at 12:58 a. m. (CST) today at Los Cerrillos airbase here.

They made the transcontinental crossing from Buenos Aires, over the lofty Andes chain, in four hours 31 minutes.

They had soared over the Andes at an altitude of 20,000 feet and had crossed the Argentine-Chilean border at 11 a. m. They flew over the famous statue of the Christ of the Andes as they had done on the flight to Buenos Aires.

The triumph increased his winter winnings to \$2,678.33 and lowered his stroke average to 72.08, taking the top spot from Johnny Revolta of Evanston, Ill., who finished far out of the money.
